

#### BUSINESS RULES OF THE CONFERENCE.

1. Two sessions shall be held daily, as follows: From 8 to

11.30 A. M., and from 1 to 5 P. M.

2. The Chairman shall take his seat precisely at the time to which the Conference adjourned, open and conduct the devotional exercises. The Secretary shall call the roll, and read the minutes of the preceding session, after which business shall proceed as follows:

(a) Committee Reports. (b) Petitions. (c) Unfinished

Business. (d) Miscellaneous Business.

- 3. Anyone wishing to speak shall arise and respectfully address the chair. In case more than one should address the chair at the same time, the Chairman shall decide who is entitled to the floor.
- 4. No one shall be allowed to speak more than ten minutes on any subject unless he receives permission by the chair.
- 5. No one shall speak the second time until all who desire have spoken. He shall then ask permission of the Chairman.
  - 6. It shall be the duty of the Chairman to preserve order.

1. Committee on Worship.

- 2. Committee on Communication.
- 3. Committee on Finance.

7. Committee on Examination of Presiding Elders, Local Preachers, Evangelists, and Missionaries.

  - 10. Committee on Resolutions.
  - 11. Auditing Committee.

#### OTHER COMMITTEES.

1. Committee on Examination of Probationers on the Reading Course.

2. Committee over the Presiding Elders. 3. Poor Committee or Board of Deacons.

4. Stationing, Boundary and Appropriating Committee.

5. Foreign Mission Board.

#### SPECIAL LAWS AND RESOLUTIONS.

We print here from the Records for convenient reference the following Laws and Resolutions, together with the time of their enactment:

#### I.—MEMBERS OF THE ANNUAL CONFERENCE

A.—The following shall be the members of the Annual Conference:

(a) Ordained Ministers.

(b) Probationers who have charge.

(c) One Delegate from each charge, elected by ballot at the last Quarterly Conference in the Conference year. (Act of General Conference, 1892.)

(d) Each Quarterly Conference shall elect one Alternate Delegate to the Annual Conference. (Enacted March 7,

1898.)

(e) It is requested that all the members of the Annual Conference shall be present at each session. In case of absence they shall submit a written report and cause of absence. (Enacted February 3, 1892.)

(f) If a Delegate fails to be present at the beginning of the Annual Conference Session, except detained through sickness or accident, the Conference is not bound to recognize him as a member. (Enacted February 3, 1894.)

(g) The Delegates from the Missions who expect support from the Conference shall not be members of the Stationing. Boundary and Appropriating Committee. (Enacted February 22, 1897.)

B.—Advisory Members.

The following shall be Advisory Members of the Annual Conference:

- (a) Annual Conference Licensed Evangelists, and Missionaries.
  - (b) Quarterly Conference Licensed Missionaries. (c) Local Workers. (Enacted February 7, 1896.)

#### II.—READING COURSE.

A.—The Annual Lessons for each class shall be divided into two parts, and Probationers shall be examined semiannually. (Enacted February 1, 1895.)

B.—Probationers shall be examined by a written examination by a committee to be appointed annually by the An-

nual Conference for this purpose.

They shall make 20 per cent. on each book, and an average of 40 per cent. on the whole, in order to pass. No probationer shall be ordained until he has passed the Reading Course. (Discipline, page 109.)

#### III.—APPLICANTS FOR THE MINISTRY.

A.—No Applicants for the Ministry shall be received into the Conference as Probationers who are not willing to submit themselves unconditionally to the Stationing Committee. (Enacted February 3, 1890.)

B.—All Applicants for the Ministry shall be examined on our Articles of Faith and Church Discipline at the same time and place when the Probationers are examined on the Read-

ing Course. (Enacted February 8, 1893.)

C.—No Probationer shall be ordained who is not fully in line with our doctrine, with the itinerant plan, and submission to the Conference. (Enacted February 3, 1890.)

D.—No Probationer in the Ministry or in the office of Deacon shall be ordained who uses or deals in tobacco. They must use their influence against the same. (Enacted February 4, 1885.)

#### IV.—SPECIAL SERVICES.

A.—Matrimony.—Each Minister-in-charge shall preach a sermon on Matrimony at each appointment on his charge in the first year.

B.—Temperance.—Each Minister-in-charge shall preach a sermon on Temperance at least once a year at each ap-

pointment.

C.—Home Missions.—The Presiding Elder shall hold a Missionary meeting (annually) at every appointment with the assistance of the Minister-in-charge and take up a collection for the (Home) Missionary Cause. (Discipline, page 84.)

D.—Foreign Missions, Harvest Home.—Each Ministerin-charge shall continue to hold a Harvest Home Service at each appointment annually, and speak on Foreign Missionary Work. The Annual Foreign Missionary Offering shall be received on this occasion. (Enacted February 3, 1894.)

E.—Missionary Day.—The Minister-in-charge shall see that the Superintendent of each Sunday-School appoint a "Missionary Day" annually. In this service the necessity of establishing and supporting Foreign Missions shall be impressed upon the minds of the children, and a collection taken up for the same. (Enacted February 3, 1894.)

F.—Charity.—The Pastor, or somebody appointed by him, shall hold a Special Service in October, at each appointment. On this occasion the Annual Offering for the Poor shall be received. (Enacted February 20, 1897.)

All moneys collected for charitable purposes, not paid over to the Treasurer of the Poor Fund, shall be included in the report of the Treasurer of the Board of Trustees. (Enacted

February 20, 1897.)

G.—Collections.—The pastors shall have charge of the Foreign and Home Missionary collections until Annual Conference, unless needed sooner. (Enacted September

17, 1900).

H.—Gospel Workers.—RESOLVED, That a free-will offering for the Gospel Workers be made in each class at a monthly prayer meeting held by their respective class-leaders, which shall be delivered to the Presiding Elder at the Quarterly Conference and reported to the Annual Conference. (Enacted February 20, 1897.)

I.—The Lord's Coming.—WHEREAS, We believe that the coming of the Lord is rapidly approaching; therefore

RESOLVED, That we recommend our Ministers to give still more earnest prominence to this blessed hope of the Church, as we see the day approaching. (Enacted February 4, 1894. Amended March 4, 1899.)

J.—Class Meetings.—The Minister-in-charge shall hold a class meeting four times a year in each class, and read the general rules or get them read once a year. (Discipline,

page 80.)

#### V.—QUARTERLY CONFERENCE RULES.

A.—The Minister-in-charge shall see that the Annual Statistical Report be correctly compiled and appended to the proceedings of the last Quarterly Conference of the current year, as follows:

(a) Report of Board of Trustees.

(b) Report of Stewards.

(c) Report of Presiding Elder's Collections.

(d) Report of Sunday-School Superintendent.

(e) Report of Home and Foreign Mission Collections. (f) Report of Annual Election of Officers. (Enacted Feb-

ruary 3, 1892.)

B.—All officers of Quarterly Conference who are absent from Quarterly Conference shall submit a written report and a satisfactory excuse. Failing to do this, they shall appear before the next Quarterly Conference. If such are absent the second time without submitting a written report and statement of the cause of absence, he shall be removed from

office. (Enacted February 3, 1894.)

C.—RESOLVED, That we will not permit any of our Quarterly Conference License Workers to travel as Evangelists, except by permission of the Annual Conference. (Enacted February 22, 1897.)

D.—The classes shall elect no Ministers to any office.

(Enacted February 3, 1894.)

#### VI.—MISCELLANEOUS.

A.—Transfers.—When a good-standing member moves from one class to another, his or her name shall be trans-

ferred at once. (Enacted February 3, 1894.)

B.—Campmeetings.—The advisability of having boarding stands at the various campmeetings shall be left to the decisions of the Presiding Elders. (Enacted September 17, 1900).

C.—Charges.—No charges shall be brought against any Annual Conference member which have not been recorded in the Quarterly Conference proceedings of their charge, except such as have been committed or discovered since the last Quarterly Conference. (Enacted February 2, 1891.)

D.—No person shall be elected to the office of Deacon, Class Leader, or Sunday-School Superintendent who uses

or deals in tobacco. (Enacted February 20, 1897.)

E.—The expenses of any committee of investigation appointed by the Presiding Elder shall be presented to the Annual Conference and paid by the Ministers. (Enacted March 7, 1898.)

### Seventeenth Annual Conference.

#### FIRST SESSION.

The Seventeenth Annual Conference of the Mennonite Brethren in Christ, of the Pennsylvania District, convened in the Mennonite Brethren in Christ Church, Reading, Pa., at

8.30 A. M., September 14, 1900.

The first session was opened by singing and a very practical and searching address on Ephesians 2d chapter by the Chairman, C. H. Brunner, P. E., followed by a season of earnest prayer for the blessing of God and the guidance of the Holy Ghost during this Conference session.

RESOLVED, That R. D. Dreisbach be appointed Re-

porter.

RESOLVED, That it be a standing rule for the Secretary to appoint his assistants. He apppointed Wm. S. Hottel, Recording Secretary; E. N. Cassel, Statistical Secretary; H. B. Musselman, Financial Secretary.

RESOLVED, That the Editor of the Journal shall be elected by acclamation. C. H. Brunner was elected.

RESOLVED, That the rules of last year's Conference be

adopted without any change.

Rev. Wm. Weidner, of the Evangelical Association, was received as an advisory member of this body.

#### SECOND SESSION, FRIDAY AFTERNOON, SEPTEMBER 14.

Committee on Examination of Presiding Elders, Local Preachers and Missionaries:

We examined the Presiding Elders, H. B. Musselman; local preachers and missionaries and found no charges against them. Committee:

Committee on Examination of Travelling Elders: We examined all the travelling elders and found no charges against them, with the exception of three, who were too careless in visiting. Committee:

Committee on Communication:

We read the letter of Brother H. F. Betz, delegate of Erwinna, and did not deem his excuse worthy of acceptance. Therefore we recommend him to the mercy of this Conference. Committee:

Committee on Examination of Quarterly Conference Records:

We examined the books and found them all correct, with these exceptions: Walnutport and New Tripoli, last Quarterly minutes not recorded in Quarterly Conference book and Secretary's name not properly signed; Erwinna and Bridgeton, some reports found wanting.

Recommendations:

The Reading class recommends J. C. Roth, and the Home Missionary Society M. P. Zook and William S. Hottel to this Conference for Annual Conference Licenses. Committee:

Examining Committee on the Discipline and Reading

Course: (See Report).

Since Brother C. M. Layton, probationer, was absent at each of the four examinations the past Conference year, to the grief of the Examining Committee, we kindly ask this Conference for advice in this matter. Committee:

W. G. GEHMAN, R. D. DREISBACH. Note.—J. L. Boyer served on this committee for one examination and was succeeded by A. B. Musselman, who served until his decease.

Auditing Committee:

We examined the Quarterly Conference books and find all correct with the exception of Reading, a mistake in adding summary financial report on page 89. Erwinna had no summary report. There was a slight mistake in adding the accounts of the Home Missionary Society. Committee:

Committee on Statistics:

We examined the schedules and found only four that were correct. Committee:

The Pastors' oral reports were continued.

The reports were very encouraging. The work, in general, is in a prosperous condition, spiritually and financially. A real missionary spirit is dominant in nearly all the classes. RESOLVED, That C. H. Brunner, Presiding Elder, re-

RESOLVED, That C. H. Brunner, Presiding Elder, report the Home Mission work, and W. B. Musselman, the Missionary Presiding Elder, report the work of the Gospel

Workers' Society.

The report of the Presiding Elder showed good work accomplished for the Lord. A great number were saved and filled with the Holy Ghost through his Home Mission workers in halls and tabernacles. The report of the Missionary Presiding Elder was very interesting. Financially, the Lord does provide marvelously that they always pay their rent in advance. Many were saved, baptized and filled with the Holy Ghost during the past year. A spirit of unity exists between the Church and the Gospel Workers' Society more than ever before.

WHEREAS, The Erwinna class had no pastor for some time, and had many discouragements in various ways for

unavoidable lack of pastoral care; therefore

RESOLVED, That in view of these considerations, we excuse H. F. Betz for his absence, and express our sympathy for them.

The report of the Treasurer of the Beneficiary Fund was read and received. (See report.)

The following applicants for the ministry expressed the nature of their call: J. C. Roth, M. P. Zook, W. S. Hottel.

RESOLVED, That the candidates for ordination, R. L. Woodring, J. G. Shireman and W. J. Fretz, be referred to the Committee on Ordination.

The report of the Secretary of the Foreign Missionary

Board was read and received. (See report.)

The Lord touched hearts, and a real glory-cloud of the missionary spirit hovered over the Conference.

Adjourned by prayer by W. K. Ziegler.

#### THIRD SESSION, SATURDAY MORNING, SEPTEMBER 15.

Opened by singing and prayer by W. B. Musselman, after which the minutes of the previous session were read and received.

We recommend this Conference to ordain Elders R. L. Woodring, J. G. Shireman and W. J. Fretz, on Sunday afternoon. Committee:

RESOLVED, That C. H. Brunner preach the Conference sermon on Sunday morning, and that W. B. Musselman preach the Ordination sermon in the afternoon.

We have examined the applicants, Wm. S. Hottel, J. C. Roth and M. P. Zook, and recommend the Conference to receive them according to the discipline. Committee:

Committee on Plainfield and Bangor Church Property: We have considered the subject of the Plainfield Church property and did not deem it advisable to sell the same at the present time. We have also examined the affairs of the Bangor Church property and found that the rights of the Mennonite Brethren in Christ terminated in the death of the late Elder David Henning some 12 years ago. The financial reports of the Presiding Elder, in connection with the Home Mission work, were read and received, giving him the privilege to arrange it for the Conference Journal according to his discretion. (See report.)

RESOLVED, That the charges of the Reading Course Committee against C. M. Layton be referred to the Committee on Ordination, including the Presiding Elder.

Brother A. M. Clauser, who had made a missionary trip through the Western States, gave an interesting report of his journey.

RESOLVED, That we elect a Committee on Appeals to the General Conference, consisting of Wm. Gehman, C. H. Brunner and L. B. Taylor.

The report of the Secretary of the Finance Committee was

read and received. (See report.)

RESOLVED, That the Committee on Resolutions draw up memorials concerning the deaths of Elders G. A. Wentz and A. B. Musselman.

WHEREAS, We, as a Conference, clearly see the evil effect of any preachers of the Gospel speculating in real es-

tate or personal property; therefore

RESOLVED, That this Conference desire the Committee on Appeals to draw up a resolution as an appeal to the General Conference to enact a law to prohibit Presiding Elders from any speculations whatever.

RESOLVED, That we, as a Conference, unitedly protest against higher percentages, as well as against more books of theories, arts, etc., in our Reading Course. We rather

advise more study on the Bible.

RESOLVED, That the advisability of retaining Field's Theology in the Reading Course be referred to the Committee on Appeals.



#### REPORTS.

### I. FOURTH ANNUAL (1½ YEARS) REPORT OF BOARD OF FOREIGN MISSIONS.

#### A.—SECRETARY'S REPORT.

With grateful hearts we wish to acknowledge the goodness of the Lord in this difficult work during the past. It is worthy of mention also how the dear ones at home have

cheerfully, without any pressure, contributed ample funds for the support of this work so that the quarterly allowances could always be sent in advance.

August 26, 1899, the Board met at the Quakertown campmeeting to consider Elder J. E. Fidler and Elder A. M. Clauser as missionary candidates. After much prayer it was decided that Elder J. E. Fidler and wife be recommended to the Armenian Relief Committee as a missionary to Turkey, pledging their support. Elder A. M. Clauser and wife were recommended to Sprunger's Bible School for a course of training.

The following is an abstract of reports received for this Conference:



C. F. SNYDER.

Thibet: Brother C. F. Snyder has been writing very faithfully and encouragingly, although not being able to report much visible success as conversions. baptisms, God has marvelously preserved his life and health in these perilous times. He and Brother William Christie held some tent meetings, preached Gospel to many Chinese and Thibetans, and sold many portions of Scriptures. They opened a station at Paongan, Thibet, in 1898, but

were forced to abandon it and return to Taocheo, on the eastern borders of Thibet, where he has charge of a station now.

Turkey: Very encouraging letters have come from Sister Rose Lambert, who, in company with Sister M. Gerber, arrived at Hadjin Dec. 17, 1898. May 15, 1899, having received an offer from the pastor of a church in Switzerland for the support of 100 orphans (they support 200 now), they opened their orphanage and by this time they have a family of 80 boys and 120 girls. For the greater part of the year they had been giving employment to from 50 to 100 poor widows, who gladly worked for from 4 to 10 cents a day, on which they supported themselves and 4 to 6 children.

One young man donated his beautiful vineyard, garden and fruit trees to the orphanage, besides giving his whole

time teaching the boys the carpenter's trade. Three other young men gave their whole time without taking wages. Twelve native helpers are employed. They also have their own shoemaker and baker. Quite a large number of the orphans have been saved already, and three have fallen asleep in Jesus, leaving a bright evidence of their conversion. A number of young men who have also been saved have been earnestly desiring the opening of a Bible School. April 1, 1900, they opened another orphanage at Sis, two days' journey from Hadjin, where they have 50 orphans. The Lord has marvelously provided the means through friends from America, South America, England, Germany, Russia and Africa to the amount of \$6,365 up to April 1, 1900. Elder J. E. Fidler and wife and daughter Bertha, under appointment of the Armenian Relief Committee, sailed from New York April 18, 1900, for Antwerp, thence by rail to Marseilles, where, after a delay of 15 days, they sailed for Mersina, arriving May 31. A two-days' journey brought them to Sis, and two days more to Hadjin, June 4.

Chile: H. L. Weiss writes: "While we would enjoy to meet with you at your campmeetings and Conference, we could not wish to stay, so we are content, for our lot has fallen on pleasant places. We are neither afraid nor discouraged. We held two conferences over the holidays—the German Conference at Victoria and the Chileno Conference

at Quillem. We have organized the work in North Chile into a German Missionary Society, which is self-supporting, besides assisting the work in the south. I visit these churches several times a year, hold their Conferences and Conventions.

"We have now taken possession of the unoccupied southern part of Chile, having a parish of 200,000. Our work here is Spanish. We have our own printing press and print 1,000 copies of our Spanish paper, 'La Alianza Cristiana,' weekly for free distribution, besides a large number of tracts."

Under date of Jan. 6, 1900, Brother Weiss writes: "Several of our converts died triumphant in the faith. Three of the brethren have been put to jail for the Gospel's sake. Another, a Chileno convert, was compelled to kneel down and pray, and was then shot and killed."

#### PROCEEDINGS

OF THE

# ELEVENTH ANNUAL MINISTERIAL CONVENTION.

The Eleventh Annual Ministerial Convention of the Mennonite Brethren in Christ, of the Pennsylvania District, convened in Reading Church, 10th and Oley streets, on September 13, 1900.

The Chairman, W. B. Musselman, opened the convention at 9.15 A. M. by singing, prayer and appropriate remarks, and was followed by the enrollment of members, after which the minutes were read and received.

All members of the Annual Conference shall be voting members and all others present advisory members.

The Convention Bar shall occupy the first two pews of the Church, and the Amen Corner on the men's side.

No speaker shall speak longer than five minutes on any subject or oftener than once, except by permission of the Chair.

Upon request of the Convention the Chairman appointed Elders O. S. Hillegass and W. G. Gehman a committee to decide which of the essays, if any, shall be published in the "Gospel Banner."

The following essays were then read and discussed:

1. An essay on "The Believer's Attitude Towards Laying

Up Earthly Treasures," by Elder W. Steinmetz.

By laying up we mean accumulating for future use. The Word says, "Lay not up for yourselves earthly treasures upon the earth." I Tim. 9:10 we read that they that would be rich fall into temptations, snares, etc. If desires for riches bring forth such fruit, what will the obtaining and holding fast of them result in. The rich man's money has not been the means of evangelizing the world. God is not hard up for money—He owns all things. We are God's stewards, and privileged characters to work with our hands, for the purpose of giving to others.

2. An essay on "The Minister; His Home and Family,"

by Elder J. G. Shireman.

The minister is one ordained of God, to be about the Master's business only, and should be too busy to find time for a vacation, for fishing, hunting, or animal recreations, etc. In his home he is supposed to be master of the situation, and worthy of being called lord by his wife, and should command the respect of his children. His home should be a sample of cleanliness and purity, and void of all questionable literature. The wife should live up to the doctrine preached, and carry out the pastor's discipline in the Lord, and make the home a pleasant place for all.

3. A discussion on "Secrecy," opened by Elder W. K.

Ziegler.

An offering was lifted, and the forenoon session was closed by prayer by Elder R. L. Woodring.

#### SECOND SESSION, 1.30 P. M.

Opened by singing and prayer by Elder W. Steinmetz. The questions were answered by Elder W. G. Gehman.

1. An essay on "Our Home Mission Work," by Elder C. H. Brunner.

Home mission work begins right at home. The Home Missionary will never amount to anything unless his heart is in the work. The preacher who cannot find enough mission work on his own charge would make a very poor home missionary. The idea of a mission is to have it worked up and established, same as a self-supporting circuit or station. A good home mission worker should make a good worker for the foreign field.

Revs. Leopold, Weidner, Wentz, Farnsworth and Von Neida, of the several Churches, were received as advisory

members.

2. An essay on "The Shepherd and His Flock," by Elder R. D. Dreisbach.

A true shepherd is one that cares for and gives his life for the sheep. A shepherd will not feed his flock on stones, clubs, etc.; even the one that uses paper to feed his flock might reflect suspicion as to the quality of his flock, as goats are well known to feed on paper from ash-heaps. If sheep, they will follow their shepherd.

3. A discussion on "Is it Advisable to Have a General Superintendent Over Our Conferences?" was opened by

Elder G. A. Campbell.

An offering was lifted and the afternoon session closed by prayer.

#### EVENING SESSION, 7.00 P. M.

Opened by singing and prayer by Elder O. S. Hillegass. The following officers were elected: Chairman, Elder R. L. Woodring; Secretary, Elder W. G. Gehman; Committee on Programme, Elders W. K. Ziegler, H. B. Musselman and C. H. Brunner.

The questions were answered by Elder H. B. Musselman. 1. An essay on "Adoption," by Elder E. T. Schick.

Scripture plainly teaches that there is none good, no not one. The whole head is sick—all have gone astray. Man is desperately, incurably wicked—all flesh is as grass. Being born of the flesh is flesh. Souls are brought into God's family by being born into it. Not patched up—but made new. Begotten again. Being born again, and receiving the spirit of adoption. "As many as received Him, to them gave He power to become the sons of God. Because ye are sons, He has given us the spirit of adoption." Adoption also means attaining his majority—becoming of full age. We shall finally be adopted publicly before worlds, as such who have suffered, labored and been disciplined to rule and reign forever.

2. An essay on "War in the Old and New Testament

Times," by Elder R. L. Woodring.

War is defined as a contest between nations and states for territory, destruction and dominion. The first-born of man, Cain, manifested the spirit of war upon his brother. In the Old Testament God raised up men and nations to root up and plunder for disobedience to His law.

War in the New Testament: A sign of the times—wars and rumors of wars—permitted by a Supreme God to fulfil

His wrath.

So-called Christendom is honey-combed with scepticism, animosity, rebellion to God—mockers of the last days—ripening for the great slaughter and garner of the great God.

The spirit of war pervades the air—strife and dissatisfaction everywhere—all bound in bundles for the great threshing time to come. It is our duty to pull men out of the fire, and run men out of this dangerous world into the heavenlies

—Christ our eternal safety and refuge.

The following essays were recommended to be published in the "Gospel Banner" by the Committee on Publication: "The Minister; His Home and Family," by Elder J. G. Shireman; "War in Old and New Testament Times," by Elder R. L. Woodring, and "Adoption," by Elder E. T. Schick.

RESOLVED, That the next Ministerial Convention be held a day prior to the next Annual Conference, and at the

same place.
