


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

## **Business Rules**

## ....of the Conference

1. Two sessions shall be held daily, as follows: From 8 to 11:30 a.m.,

and from 1 to 5 p.m.

2. The Chairman shall take his seat precisely at the time to which the Conference adjourned, open and conduct the devotional exercises. The Secretary shall call the roll, and read the minutes of the preceding session, after which business shall proceed as follows:

(a) Committee Reports. (b) Petitions. (c) Unfinished Business.

(d) Miscellaneous Business.

3. Anyone wishing to speak shall rise and respectfully address the Chair. In case more than one should address the Chair at the same time, the Chairman shall decide who is entitled to the floor.

4. No one shall be allowed to speak more than ten minutes on any

subject unless he receives permission by the Chair.

5. No one shall speak the second time until all who desire have spoken. He shall then ask permission of the Chairman.

6. It shall be the duty of the Chairman to preserve order.

## Special Laws and Resolutions

We print here from the Records, for convenient reference, the following Laws and Regulations, together with the time of their enactment.

## I.-MEMBERS OF THE ANNUAL CONFERENCE.

A .- The following shall be the members of the Annual Conference:

(a) Ordained Ministers.

(b) Probationers who have charge.

(c) One delegate from each charge, elected by ballot at the last Quarterly Conference in the Conference year. [Act of General Conference, 1892.]

Each Quarterly Conference shall elect one Alternate Delegate to the Annual Conference. [Enacted March 7, 1898.]

It is requested that all the members of the Annual Conference shall be present at each session. In case of absence they shall submit a written report and cause of absence. [Enacted February 3, 1892.]

If a delegate fails to be present at the beginning of the Annual Conference session, except detained through sickness or accident, the Conference is not bound to recognize him as a member. [Enacted February 3, 1894.]

The delegates from the Missions who expect support from the Conference shall not be members of the Stationing, Boundary and Appropriating Committee. [Enacted February 22, 1897.]

B .- Advisory Members.

The following shall be Advisory Members of the Annual Conference:

(a) Annual Conference Licensed Evangelists and Missionaries.

(b) Quarterly Conference Licensed Missionaries.(c) Local Workers. [Enacted February 7, 1896.]

## II.—APPLICANTS AND PROBATIONERS.

A.—No applicants for the Ministry shall be received into the Conference as Probationers who are not willing to submit themselves unconditionally to the Stationing Committee or Gospel Herald Society. [Revised October 17, 1903.]

B.—All applicants for the Ministry shall be examined by their respective Presiding Elders on our Articles of Faith and Church Discipline at the same time and place when the Probationers are examined on the Reading Course. [Enacted February 8, 1893.]

C.—The Annual Lessons for Probationers on the Reading Course for each class shall be divided into two parts. Probationers shall be examined semi-annually by a written examination by a committee to be appointed annually by the Annual Conference for this purpose. [Enacted February 1, 1895.]

D.—The Traveling and other expenses of the Reading Course Committee and Probationers at the spring examination shall be paid out of the Conference Fund. [Enacted October, 1906.]

E.—No Probationer shall be ordained who is not fully in line with our doctrine, with the itinerant plan, and submission to the Conference. [Enacted February 3, 1890.]

#### III.—QUARTERLY CONFERENCE RULES.

A.—Each Pastor shall see that the Summary Financial Reports are correctly compiled and appended to the proceedings of the last Quarterly Conference of the current year.

B .- The Presiding Elder shall nominate the Secretaries of the Quar-

terly Conference and the Quarterly Conferences shall elect them. [En-

acted October 15, 1906.]

C.—All officers of Quarterly Conference who are absent from Quarterly Conference shall submit a written report and a satisfactory excuse. Failing to do this, they shall appear before the next Quarterly Conference. If such are absent the next time without submitting a written report and statement of the cause of absence, they shall be removed from office. [Enacted February 3, 1894.]

D.—We will not permit any of our Quarterly Conference Licensed Workers to travel as Evangelists, except by permission of the Annual

Conference. [Enacted February 22, 1897.]

E.—The classes shall elect no ministers to any office. [Enacted Feb-

ruary 3, 1894.]

F.—No person shall be elected to the office of Deacon, Class Leader, or Sunday School Superintendent who uses or deals in tobacco. [Enacted February 20, 1897.]

G.—The class leaders and stewards shall be elected shortly before, and their term of office begin immediately after, the last Quarter-

ly Conference. [Enacted October 28, 1904.]

H.—The Quarterly Conference accounts of the Stewards shall be from quarter to quarter, and the reports on the schedules from October 1 to October 1. In case a pastor is changed his allowances shall end with the month of September. The pastors shall report the amounts received out of the Home Mission Fund at the Quarterly Conference. [Revised October 15, 1910.]

I.—The former pastor shall see that the rent is paid for the month of October before he moves from his charge. [Enacted October 15,

1905.7

J.—The pastors shall leave their former charge as soon as possible after the Conference. [Enacted October 15, 1905.]

#### IV.—BOARDS AND COMMITTEES.

Executive Board.—An Executive Board, consisting of five unconditional men shall be elected annually, who shall have power to act as Trustees with authority to purchase, hold, sell or otherwise dispose of personal property and real estate in behalf of the Annual Conference of the Mennonite Brethren in Christ of Pennsylvania. [Enacted October 8, 1908.]

Foreign Missions.—A.—A Board of Foreign Missions consisting of five shall be elected annually. The President shall call and preside over the meetings of the board held annually or oftener. The Secretary shall communicate with the Foreign Missionaries and report to the Annual Conference. The Treasurer shall report the financial standing

of the treasury to the Board.

B.—Each Pastor shall continue to hold a Harvest Home Service at each appointment annually, and speak on Foreign Missionary Work. These services shall be held soon after the Annual Conference, and a subscription for Foreign Missions shall be taken on the occasion, to be collected before February 1. [Enacted February 3, 1894.]\*

C.—The Pastor shall see that the Superintendent of each Sunday School appoint a "Missionary Day" annually. In this service the necessity of establishing and supporting Foreign Missions shall be impressed upon the minds of the children, and a collection taken up for

the same. [Enacted February 3, 1894.]

\*Note. The members of our Church shall be respectfully recommended to forward their funds for the Foreign Missionaries through the Foreign Missionary Board and not to the missionaries directly, which would lessen or cause to neglect their contributions in the direct channel provided by Conference for the support pledged to our respective missionaries.

D.—The Treasurer of the Home and Foreign Funds shall be authorized to loan money without interest out of these funds to the M. P. E. of the Gospel Workers Society, according to the judgment of the Treas-

urer and Presiding Elders.

Orphanage and Home.—A.—The Annual Conference shall elect a Board of Trustees consisting of eight ordained ministers and four laymen who shall have full charge of all the arrangements and management of the Orphanage and Home. They shall be elected for a term of two years. They shall be so elected that the term of office of four preachers and two laymen expires at each Annual Conference.

B.—The money paid to any pastor for our Orphanage and Home shall be paid to the Treasurer of the Board of Trustees, through the Secretary. The Secretary shall credit it on the Records and the Treas-

urer shall acknowledge it. [Enacted October 12, 1906.]

C.—The Pastor, or somebody appointed by him, shall hold a Special Service at each appointment, on which occasion the Annual Offering for the Poor shall be received, to be paid into the treasury of the Board of Trustees of the Orphanage and Home. All moneys collected for charitable purposes, not paid over to the Treasurer of the Board of Trustees of the Orphanage and Home shall be included in the report of the Treasurer of the local Board of Trustees. [Enacted February 20, 1897.]

D.—In case there are any poor in any class that need help beyond that given them by their respective classes, the deacon on that charge where there is one, or the pastor where there is no deacon, shall make known the nature of the need to the President of the Board of Trustees of the Orphanage and Home, who shall bring the matter before the Board. The Board shall assist as they deem it advisable. [Enacted October 15, 1910.]

Camp and Equipage.—A.—The Chairman of the Annual Conference shall appoint a committee of four who, under the direction of the Presiding Elders, shall have charge of the Camp Meeting Equi-

page and Tabernacle Outfits. [Enacted October 16, 1909.]

B.—In case there is more collected at a camp meeting than is needed to pay all expenses, the balance shall be paid to the Treasurer of the Annual Conference, who shall hold it as an Equipment Fund to be used to buy equipments for camp meetings, such as tabernacles, lamps, etc., as may be needed from time to time according to the decision of the Presiding Elders and the General Camp Meeting Committee. [Enacted October 28, 1904.]

Publication and Printing.—A.—The Chairman shall appoint a committee of three as a Board of Publication and Printing. This committee shall have charge of the Annual Conference Fund. [Revised

October 15, 1910.]

B.—An offering shall be lifted once a year in a prayer meeting, in each class by their respective class-leaders for this Fund. The pastor in charge shall bring the same to the Annual Conference. [Enacted October 20, 1902.]

C.—The Annual Conference shall supply class books, steward's books, rent books, trustee books, and all the other account books for the different charges to be paid for out of the Conference Fund. [Enacted October 15, 1906.] Also the expenses of materials used by the Secretary of the Annual Conference. [Enacted October 15, 1910.]

D.—All expenses of committees of investigations, appointed by the Presiding Elder, shall be paid out of the Conference Fund. [Revised

October 17, 1903.]

Gospel Workers' Society.—A.—A free-will offering shall be lifted for the Gospel Workers in each class at a monthly prayer meeting held by their respective class-leaders. [Enacted February 20, 1897.]

B .- Each class shall lift a free-will offering for the Missionary Presiding Elder every Quarter. [Enacted February 20, 1897.]

C .- Whenever the Gospel Workers' Society turns one or more missions over to the church, a committee, consisting of the Presiding Elders, Treasurer, and Missionary Presiding Elder, shall appraise the personal property or real estate belonging to said mission in case the Church chooses to buy said property, paying the same out of the Home Mission treasury. [Enacted October 28, 1904.]

Journals .- A .- The Annual Conference minutes shall be published only in the Conference Journal. The Secretary shall be privileged to curtail them as he sees fit and have them published in the Gospel Ban-

ner. [Revised October 14, 1907.]

B .- The pastors shall pay their Conference Journals within one week after they receive them. [Enacted October 13, 1905.]

C .- The Secretary shall send Journals to our Foreign Missionaries and also the local Railroad Companies. [Enacted October 12, 1908.]

D .- The editor of the Conference Journal shall arrange a brief report of the Sunday services at the Annual Conference to be published in the Conference Journal. [Enacted October 13, 1905.]

### V.—SPECIAL SERVICES.

A.—Matrimony.—Each pastor shall preach a sermon on Matrimony at each appointment on his charge in the first year.

B.—The Lord's Coming.—Believing that the coming of the Lord is rapidly approaching, therefore we recommend our ministers to give still more earnest prominence to this blessed hope of the church as we see the Day approaching. [Enacted February 4, 1894.]

C .- As the Scriptures contain a number of instances where children

of Godly parents were formally and publicly dedicated to the Lord, (1 Sam. 22:28; Mark 10:13-16,) we heartily encourage our people to dedicate their children to the Lord by prayer and laying on of the hands of the Elders, who shall then furnish proper certificates. [Enacted October 28, 1904.]

D .- Class Meetings .- Each pastor shall hold a class meeting four times a year in each class, and read the general rules or get them read

once a year. [Discipline, page 72.]

E .- Camp Meetings .- Camp meetings shall be held annually according to the decision of the Presiding Elders and pastors of their respective districts. The advisability of having boarding stands at the various camp meetings shall be left to the decision of the Presiding Elder. [Enacted September 17, 1900.] There shall be a General Camp Meeting Committee, consisting of two Presiding Elders and the Chairman of each Camp Meeting Committee, to which matters that may refer to Camp Meetings in general may be referred. [Enacted October, 1906.] The collections for Camp Meetings shall be reported by the Chairman of the General Camp Meeting Committee and be recorded by themselves on the Summary Statistical Report. [Enacted October

F .- Sunday School Conventions .- One or more Sunday School Conventions shall be held annually. The officers shall be elected at the Annual Conference. The committee on programme shall meet six weeks before the convention to arrange a programme. Each Sunday School shall be represented by the Superintendent, and one delegate from the laity. The Superintendents, Delegates and Essayists shall have their fares paid. Each Superintendent shall take up a liberal collection to defray the expenses of the convention. [Enacted October 29, 1904.]

G .- Funerals .- We recommend our ministers not to officiate at Sunday funerals, and use their influence strongly against the same. [Enacted October 29, 1904.]

C .- Offering for the Poor-Annual.

E .- Conference Fund-Annual.

### VII.-MISCELLANEOUS.

A .- Transfers .- When a good standing member moves from one class to another, his or her name shall be transferred at once. [Enacted February 3, 1894.]

B .- Each pastor shall bring an itemized report to the Annual Conference, according to the form of the report of the Financial Secre-

tary.

C .- No charges shall be brought against any Annual Conference member which have not been recorded in the Quarterly Conference proceedings of their charge, except such as have been committed or discovered since the last quarterly conference. [Enacted February 1, 1891.]

D.—Each pastor shall record the mailing lists of the subscribers of the "Gospel Banner" and "Gospel Herald" in a book together with an accurate statement of the account of each subscriber to be transferred to his successor. [Enacted October 15, 1906.]

E.—The Financial Secretary of the Annual Conference shall be Sec-

retary of the Home Mission Fund. [Enacted October 13, 1905.]

F .- Beneficiary Fund.-We recommend each Pastor to make a special effort to swell the Beneficiary Fund to assist the worthy wi-

dows of our deceased pastors. [Enacted October 29, 1904.]

G .- Collections .- The pastor shall have charge of the offerings for the Poor, Foreign and Home Missionary work, and Conference Fund, until the Annual Conference, unless needed sooner. The offerings for the Missionary Presiding Elder and Gospel Workers shall be delivered to the Presiding Elder at the Quarterly Conference and reported by the pastor to the Annual Conference. All collections received on a charge for the building or purchase of churches, parsonages or other purposes on another charge shall be reported by the pastor where collected. [Enacted October 28, 1904.]

## **FIRST SESSION**

THURSDAY FORENOON, OCTOBER 13, 1910.

The Twenty-seventh Annual Conference of the Mennonite Brethren in Christ of Pennsylvania, convened in the Tenth and Oley Streets Church, Reading, Pa., at 8 a.m., October 13, 1910.

The first session was opened by singing, "Blest be the Tie that Binds," followed by a season of earnest prayer for the blessing of God and the guidance of the Holy Ghost for this Conference session.

After this the Chairman, H. B. Musselman, gave us a very earnest address, basing his remarks on Col. 3:8-17.

# REPORTS

## I. Executive Board

## THE NINTH ANNUAL REPORT OF THE EXECUTIVE BOARD.

The securing of suitable groves for Camp Meetings has of late years become a very perplexing problem. Therefore, after much searching, we purchased a tract of about six acres of woodland in East Allentown for this purpose. More than five acres of this were purchased from John F. Saeger for the sum of \$2,791.44; from the same man we later purchased an adjoining lot for \$300.00. We also purchased a small adjoining tract from Andrew S. Keck for \$368.09. Thus we have a flue grove fronting 700 feet on Lawrence Street.

All the ministers of the Conference devoted a number of weeks of hard labor, free of charge, in clearing out the underbrush, removing dead trees, stumps and stones, grading streets and filling up. Some hired help was also used which, together with hauling, dynamite,

tools and fares, amounted to \$455.18.

We drilled an artesian well 44 feet deep through granite rock, which has furnished us during the two camp meetings which we held in the grove with an abundant supply of the very best and coldest water. Though this is in a limestone region, our well is entirely free from it.

This well, with cement floor, iron pump and drain complete, cost

us only \$134.32.

We also constructed a substantial permanent pulpit and two large tollets, all, painted and complete, costing \$168.92. This is all for material except a few dollars, as the labor was nearly all free. So the grove complete, beautifully and conveniently located, cost us thus far only \$4,217.95. The place has been named "Mizpah Grove."

The pastor of the Philadelphia Mission was authorized by the last Annual Conference to take subscriptions throughout the Church for the Philadelphia church property. These subscriptions, amounting to \$1,496.70, were collected by the various pastors and paid to the Presiding Elder of that District through the Executive Board.

## II. Foreign Missions

## THE TWENTY-SIXTH ANNUAL REPORT OF THE BOARD OF FOREIGN MISSIONS.

With grateful hearts we again humbly acknowledge the goodness of God in the protection and care of our dear co-laborers in the "regions beyond." The ranks remain unbroken and all report good courage and are active in the work God has called them to. also wish to praise the Lord for opening the hearts of the dear people at home who have so liberally contributed to this noble cause. Our pastors have shown a deep interest and have done well to maintain the interest of the Church at home.

Chile .- The plan of the work in Chile is patterned after the Mennonite Brethern in Christ throughout, nearly all the missionaries being members of the Pennsylvania Conference. Brother H. L. Weiss is the superintendent and holds Quarterly Conferences, similar to those at home. Yet the work is under the Christian and Missionary Al-

liance.

Rev. A. B. Simpson, of New York, President of the Christian and Missionary Alliance, has paid them a visit during the past year,

which has been a very great blessing to the workers and the work.
At their last Annual Conference, at New Year, they made quite some changes in the stationing of the missionaries. They have less than \$1,000.00 debt on their chapels, parsonages, printing office and hospital, valued at more than \$20,000.00. This is remarkable. hope that before long some of their stations will be self-sustaining. Some of the brethern have three or more appointments to look after besides superintending and working at the building of chapels and parsonages.

Brother Weiss has moved his family and headquarters from Valdivia to Santiago, the capital of Chile.

Brother Simpson has been urging them to send some of their trained men out to evangelize the adjoining Republics of Peru, Argentine and Bolivia, and fill up again with native workers and new

Thibet .- C. F. Snyder and family are still living at Taochow. Brother V. G. Plymire is staying with them. They are doing both Thibetan and Chinese work. They also visit a Thibetan monastery Brother Snyder and family, together with Brother Plymire, made a trip of some 30 miles, preaching to the Thibetans and distributing gospels.

Brother Snyder and Brother Plymire made a long and dangerous missionary journey from March 14 to April 16, visiting a number of important places, traversing part of the country where probably no white man ever travelled before. This trip was made with a view of selecting a site for the opening of a new station as well as preaching the gospel and distributing llterature as they went. Brother Snyder reports 800 miles traveled on horseback. Plymire travelled over 1600 miles on foot and horseback. They expect to hold tent meetings this summer, by last reports.

Turkey .- The work in Hadjin Turkey has been moving on nicely and unmolested this year. Brother Barker has opened a new station nearer to a railroad station. Sister Rose Lambert, Matron of the Orphanage, the only representative of this Conference in this field, is home for a rest. After passing through the severe strain of the massacres of the spring of 1909, she broke down in health and the Local Board decided to send her to Egypt and later on to America until her health should be restored, when she expects to return to

the field again,

## III. Orphanage and Home

THE FIFTH ANNUAL REPORT OF THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF THE ORPHANAGE AND HOME AT CENTRE VALLEY, PA., FROM OCTOBER 6, 1909, TO SEPTEMBER 28, 1910.

The Lord has been marvellously leading this work during the past year. The Board of Trustees instead of electing a Superintendent this year elected a Board of Managers, which had charge of the affairs of the Home, consisting of H. B. Musselman, J. C. Roth and E. N. Cassel; and a similar Board for the management of the Farm, consisting of H. B. Musselman, E. N. Cassel and Allen M. Gehman.

Upon the desire and request of Brother O. B. Bartholomew, the

Board released him from his duties on the farm.

Brother Titus Hottel, who had been working on the farm for several years, having been chosen by the Board, accepted the management of the Farm and Home. We believe the Lord has given us the right man for the place, a man who works for the interest of the Church and the work in general.

#### The Home.

Brother Hottel resides in the Home and is the manager of the same. Both he and Sister Hottel enjoy the work.

Sister Kate Feairheller, the Matron of the Home, has been kept very busy canning, drying and preserving, besides caring for the inmates, one of whom is an invalid. She seems happy and enjoys her work more than ever.

Joseph Preisch and his wife Fianna have been for more than twenty years members of our church at Bethlehem, Pa. From the time that the church was contemplating the purchase of a Home, Brother and Sister Preisch manifested a deep interest in the same, and both frequently expressed their desire to spend their last days in the Home. They were both well advanced in years and Sister Preisch having been an invalid for many years, Brother Preisch had been attending to the household duties.

Before arrangements were fully completed to receive them into our care, Brother Preisch took sick and died. After the death of Brother Preisch we took care of Sister Preisch and on July 14, 1909, we removed her to the Home. We also paid all the funeral expenses of Brother Preisch and ordered the erection of a suitable tombstone over his grave.

Sarah Moll has been a member of the Allentown class for a number of years and has been a loyal sister. She was admitted to the Home July 21, 1909. She seems to be contented at the Home and well satisfied.

Elmer Arndt, an orphan boy, thirteen years old, from Vera Cruz, Pa., was admitted into the Home in April of this year. He has since been converted, baptized and added to the Church. He takes delight in farm work and young cattle and is very willing and obedient.

Mary Steiner and her husband were admitted into the church at the Chestnut Hill Camp Meeting about twenty-five years ago. They lived at Bangor at the time. Shortly afterward Brother Steiner died and the Church paid his funeral expenses. Sister Steiner being an invalid and poor, was then removed to Zionsville, Pa., where the Church supported her until about five years ago, when, having become entirely unable to take care of herself, arrangements were made with Sister Anna Romig, of Zionsville, who took her into her home and cared for her under the charge of the Board of Deacons. Since the Board of Deacons has been discontinued the Board of

Trustees of the Orphanage and Home has been paying Sister Romig for her care and support.

Sister Gephart, an aged sister of Montgomery County, who is blind, has also been receiving some support through the Board.

#### The Farm.

We have purchased a three-acre field adjoining the farm. We have also erected two silos and purchased a complete outfit for filling the same.

The labors of our manager and his assistants have been blessed with good success. The Lord has given us good crops, the herds have been prolific and the outlook in general is very encouraging. A number of improvements have been made on the farm and implements.

Brother and Sister C. J. Kline have also been doing well on the farm. They are very loyal and obedient to the Manager as well as to the Board.

Brother Wm. Moyer, the hired man, has also been doing grandly. In short, we believe all these have been doing their work as unto the Lord. Everything moves along harmoniously.






