




Business Rules of the Conference

3. Anyone wishing to speak shall rise and respectfully address the Chair. In case more than one should address the Chair at the same time, the Chairman shall decide who is entitled to the floor.

4. No one shall be allowed to speak more than ten minutes on any

subject unless he receives permission by the Chair.

5. No one shall speak the second time until all who desire have spoken. He shall then ask permission of the Chairman.6. It shall be the duty of the Chairman to preserve order.

Special Laws and Resolutions

We print here from the Records, for convenient reference, the following Laws and Regulations, together with the time of their enactment.

I.—MEMBERS OF THE ANNUAL CONFERENCE.

A .- The following shall be the members of the Annual Conference:

(a) Ordained Ministers.

(b) Probationers who have charge.

(c) One delegate from each charge, elected by ballot at the last Quarterly Conference in the Conference year. [Act of General Conference, 1892.]

Each Quarterly Conference shall elect one Alternate Delegate to the Annual Conference, who shall serve in case the regular Delegate is unable to do so. [Enacted March 7, 1898.]

It is requested that all the members of the Annual Conference shall be present at each session. In case of absence they shall submit a written report and cause of absence. [Enacted February 3, 1892.]

If a delegate fails to be present at the beginning of the Annual Conference session, except detained through sickness or accident, the Conference is not bound to recognize him as a member. [Enacted February 3, 1894.]

The delegates from the Missions who expect support from the Conference shall not be members of the Stationing, Boundary and Appropriating Committee. [Enacted February 22, 1897.]

B-Advisory Members.

The following shall be Advisory Members of the Annual Conference:

(a) Annual Conference Licensed Evangelists and Missionaries.

(b) Quarterly Conference Licensed Missionaries.

(c) Local Workers. [Enacted February 7, 1896.]

II.—APPLICANTS AND PROBATIONERS.

A.—No applicants for the Ministry shall be received into the Conference as Probationers who are not willing to submit themselves unconditionally to the Stationing Committee. [Revised October 17, 1903.]

B.—All applicants for the Ministry shall be examined by one of the Presiding Elders as mutually agreed upon, on our Articles of Faith and Church Discipline at the same time and place when the Probationers are examined on the Reading Course. [Enacted February 8, 1893.]

C.—The Annual Lessons for Probationers on the Reading Course for each class shall be divided into two parts. Probationers shall be examined semi-annually by a written examination by a committee to be appointed annually by the Annual Conference for this purpose. [Enacted February 1, 1895.]

D.—The Traveling and other expenses of the Reading Course Committee and Probationers at the spring examination shall be paid out of

the Conference Fund. [Enacted October, 1906.]

E.—No Probationer shall be ordained who is not fully in line with our doctrine, with the itinerant plan, and submission to the Conference. [Enacted February 3, 1890.]

F.—Licenses shall be written and given by the Chairman of the Annual Conference and signed by the Presiding Elder, as Chairman.

III.—QUARTERLY CONFERENCE RULES.

A -Each Pastor shall see that the Summary Financial Reports are

correctly compiled and appended to the proceedings of the last Quarterly Conference of the current year.

B.—The Presiding Elder shall nominate the Secretaries of the Quarterly Conference and the Quarterly Conferences shall elect them. [Enacted October 15, 1906.]

C.—All officers of Quarterly Conference who are absent from Quarterly Conference shall submit a written report and a satisfactory excuse. Failing to do this, they shall appear before the next Quarterly Conference. If such are absent the next time without submitting a written report and statement of the cause of absence, they shall be removed from office. [Enacted February 3, 1894.]

D.—We will not permit any of our Quarterly Conference Licensed Workers to travel as Evangelists, except by permission of the Annual Conference. [Enacted February 22, 1897.]

E.—No person shall be elected to the office of Deacon, Class Leader, or Sunday School Superintendent who uses or deals in tobacco. [En-

acted February 20, 1897.]

F.—The class leaders and stewards shall be elected shortly before, and their term of office begin immediately after, the last Quarterly Conference. [Enacted October 28, 1904.]

G.—The Quarterly Conference accounts of the Stewards shall be from quarter to quarter, and the reports on the schedules from October 1 to October 1. In case a pastor is changed his allowances shall end with the month of September. The pastors shall report the amounts received out of the Home Mission Fund at the Quarterly Conference. [Revised October 15, 1910.]

H.—The former pastor shall see that the rent is paid for the month of October before he moves from his charge. [Enacted October 15, 1905.]

I.—The pastors shall leave their former charge as soon as possible after the Conference. [Enacted October 15, 1905.]

IV. BOARDS AND COMMITTEES.

The following Boards and Committees shall, as soon as practicable after their election, elect a President and a Secretary:

Executive Board, Board of Foreign Missions, Board of Trustees of the Orphanage and Home, Board of Publication and Printing. The Chairman and Secretary of the Annual Conference shall be President and Secretary of the Home Mission Fund.

The Annual Conference shall elect a Conference Treasurer annually who shall be the Treasurer for the Executive Board, Board of Foreign Missions, Board of Trustees of the Orphanage and Home, the Home Mission Fund, the Annual Conference Fund and the Beneficiary Society.

The Treasurer shall keep an account of the amounts drawn by each Board in a book furnished by the Annual Conference and report to the Annual Conference the standing of each fund as well as the total in the Treasury.

All Boards and Standing Committees shall submit a full and

classified report of their work, financial and otherwise, to the Annual Conference. They shall hold meetings annually or oftener.

Executive Board.—The Annual Conference shall elect an Executive Board Annually consisting of five ordained ministers that have submitted themselves unconditionally to the Annual Conference.

This Executive Board shall constitute a Board of Trustees and hold the title of all property belonging to the Annual Conference, except where there is a regularly organized class or church that has a local Board of Trustees and where the Annual Conference has otherwise provided for, by electing a separate Board of Trustees.

The Executive Board shall direct as to how and where the money

the Executive Board shall direct as to now and where the money in the Annual Conference Treasury shall be deposited, and also have the right to place it on certificate of deposit, or savings deposit, or make other good, safe and substantial investments.

It shall have the right to buy any property that it may deem good and necessary for the furtherance of the work of the Annual Conference. It shall have the authority to sell any property that it holds in

trust and execute and deliver a lawful deed for the same.

It shall have the authority to sell any property deeded to a local Board of Trustees at places where for any reason there is no longer a local board, or class, or organized church, and execute and deliver a lawful deed and conveyance, and use the net proceeds of the sale of such property for other church properties as it may deem it advisable.

It shall have the right to borrow money and issue mortgages on the properties that it holds in trust or give other securities, and shall have the right to loan out any money that it may have on mortgages or other good securities, and also satisfy said mortgages or securities.

It shall have charge of all property belonging to the Annual Con-

ference unless otherwise provided for.

It shall have charge of all the old quarterly conference records, class records, and all other records that are no longer needed by the

various classes, boards or committees.

It shall act as a Board of Advisers to the Pastors and the President of the Gospel Herald Society in matters relative to the purchasing of properties for church purposes and the erection of churches and parsonages. The President of the Gospel Herald Society shall purchase no property for church purposes without consulting the Executive Board and receiving its consent.

It shall act as a Board of Advisers to the Laymen's Benevolent Society in all matters not clearly stated, and in matters of dispute that

may arise from time to time between Annual Conferences.

It shall purchase all tabernacles and living tents pertaining to tabernacle outfits, and the lumber for camp-meeting purposes and all new furniture and such articles as may be needed.

It shall designate the place and arrangement for the storing of

the camp-meeting equipage and tabernacle outfit.

Campmeetings held in Mizpah Grove shall pay into the treasury of the Executive Board, rent for the lumber that they use at the rate designated by said Board.

In case there is a balance left over at the various campmeetings after all the expenses are paid the balance shall be paid into the treas-

ury of the Executive Board.

The title to all real estate held, controlled or possessed by any local class, church or congregation shall be vested in a Board of three Trustees to be annually elected by the Quarterly Conference of said local class, church or congregation in trust for the Annual Conference

of the Mennonite Brethren in Christ of Pennsylvania after the follow-

ing form:

To A, B and C trustees and their successors in office in trust for the Annual Conference of the Mennonite Brethren in Christ of Pennsylvania.

Foreign Missions.—A.—The Annual Conference shall elect annu-

ally a Board of Foreign Missions consisting of five members.

All money contributed for the cause of Foreign Missions throughout the Conference shall be paid into the Annual Conference Treasury. They shall disburse the funds that they receive for the spread of the Gospel in heathen lands according as they deem good and proper.

B.—Each Pastor shall continue to hold a Harvest Home Service at each appointment annually, and speak on Foreign Missionary Work. These services shall be held soon after the Annual Conference, and a subscription for Foreign Missions shall be taken on the occasion, to be collected before February 1. [Enacted February 3, 1894.]*

C.—The Pastor shall see that the Superintendent of each Sunday School appoint a "Missionary Day" annually. In this service the necessity of establishing and supporting Foreign Missions shall be impressed upon the minds of the children, and a collection taken up for

the same. [Enacted February 3, 1894.]

Orphanage and Home.—The Annual Conference shall elect a Board of Trustees for the Orphanage and Home consisting of eight ordained ministers and four laymen. They shall be elected for a term of two years in such a manner that the term of office of four ministers and two laymen expires at each Annual Conference.

The Board of Trustees shall have the privilege to elect or appoint a Superintendent, sub-boards or committees to carry forward the work of the Home and the farm connected therewith, and shall direct

all other matters relative to the same.

It shall have the right to purchase additional property from time to time as it deems necessary to carry on the work of the Home and shall also have the right to sell any property that to the best of its judgment it may deem advisable for the interest of the work under its supervision and trust and execute and deliver good and lawful deeds and conveyances for the same.

It shall have the right to remove any of the present buildings or to erect additions to the present building or erect additional buildings as may be needed to carry on the work of the Home and the farm

connected therewith.

It shall have the right to borrow money and give mortgages or other securities on the properties. It shall have the right to loan out any funds in its possession on mortgages or other securities or make other investments with the funds that it may have on hand, and also satisfy all mortgages or other securities.

It shall decide as to who shall be admitted into the Home and on what conditions, and shall also decide to whom and to what extent the Board shall give help to worthy poor throughout the Church.

the Board shall give help to worthy poor throughout the Church.
All moneys or donations of any kind received by any Pastor for
the Orphanage and Home shall be forwarded as soon as practicable
to the Superintendent or Managing Committee, who shall acknowledge
the receipt of the same.

^{*}Note. The members of our Church shall be respectively recommended to forward their funds for the Foreign Missionaries through the Foreign Missionary Board and not to the missionaries directly, which would lessen or cause to neglect their contributions in the direct channel provided by Conference for the support pledged to our respective missionaries.

Each Pastor shall hold a special service at each appointment on which occasion the Annual Offering for the Poor shall be received. The Pastors shall bring this offering to the Annual Conference and pay it into the Annual Conference Treasury as Orphanage and Home funds.

All money collected for charitable purposes not paid over to the Treasurer of the Board of Trustees of the Orphanage and Home shall be included in the report of the Treasurer of the local Board of Trus-

tees where collected.

In case there are any poor in any class that need help beyond that given them by their respective classes, the deacon on that charge where there is one, or the Pastor where there is no deacon, shall make known the nature of the need to the President of the Board of Trustees of the Orphanage and Home, who shall bring the matter before the Board. The Board shall assist as it may deem it advisable.

Publication and Printing.—A.—The Chairman shall appoint a committee of three as a Board of Publication and Printing. This committee shall have charge of the Annual Conference Fund. [Revised October 15, 1910.]

B.—An offering shall be lifted once a year in a prayer meeting, in each class by their respective class-leaders for this Fund. The pastor in charge shall bring the same to the Annual Conference. [Enacted

October 20, 1902.]

C.—The Annual Conference shall supply class books, steward's books, rent books, trustee books, and all the other account books for the different charges to be paid for out of the Conference Fund. [Enacted October 15, 1906.] Also the expenses of materials used by the Secretary of the Annual Conference. [Enacted October 15, 1910.]

D.—All expenses of committees of investigations, appointed by the Presiding Elder, shall be paid out of the Conference Fund. [Revised

October 17, 1903.]

Camp Meeting Equipage.—The Chairman of the Annual Conference shall appoint a committee of four, who, under the direction of the Presiding Elders shall see that the Camp-meeting Equipage and Tabernacle outfits are kept in good working condition and repairs. They shall purchase such articles as will be necessary to the proper maintenance or upkeep of the Camp-meeting Equipage and Tabernacle outfits. For the payment of their expenses they shall submit bills from

time to time to the Executive Board.

In case any Pastor, or the President of the Gospel Herald Society desires to use, or cause to be used a tabernacle he shall make application for the same to his respective Presiding Elder. In case the privilege to use a tabernacle is granted, the Presiding Elder shall inform the Equipage Committee. The Pastor or the President of the Gospel Herald Society shall be present in person and in conjunction with a member of the Camp-meeting Equipage Committee shall see that the tabernacle and outfit is shipped. The expenses of this shall be paid by the one that uses or causes the tabernacle to be used.

be paid by the one that uses or causes the tabernacle to be used.

The number of tabernacles to be used on the respective Presiding
Elder Districts and in the Gospel Herald Society shall be mutually

agreed upon by the Presiding Elders.

Laymen's Benevolent Society.—The Annual Conference shall elect annually a Board of three Trustees from among the laity for the Laymen's Benevolent Society. The Annual Conference shall elect and designate them as President, Secretary and Treasurer of said Board.

The Treasurer shall acknowledge to the various Pastors any contributions which he has received from time to time for this Fund.

Whenever a member of the Society dies, the Pastor shall return

the membership book to the Secretary.

Whenever a member of the Laymen's Benevolent Society fail to pay his contribution till after Feb. 1, after it was due he shall pay then and thereafter at the rate under which he would re-enter at that time as a Beneficiary. The Pastor shall be careful that the names of members shall be written correctly and alike in both the Member's Certificate Book and the Pastor's Book. The Pastor should always be careful to send names of members exactly as recorded when he forwards the respective contributions to the Treasurer through the Secretary. If for any reason or other the names of members should change, then the change should be recorded on the books and the Secretary of the Society be informed accordingly.

Camp Meetings.—A.—The advisability of having boarding stands at the various camp meetings shall be left to the decision of the Presiding Elder. [Enacted September 17, 1900.] There shall be a General Camp Meeting Committee, consisting of two Presiding Elders and the Chairman of each Camp Meeting Committee, to which matters that may refer to Camp Meetings in general may be referred. [Enacted October, 1906.] The collections for Camp Meetings shall be reported by the Chairman of the General Camp Meeting Committee and be recorded by themselves on the Summary Statistical Report. [Enacted October 16, 1909.]

B.—All bills of camp meeting expenses shall be submitted to the Secretary of the Committee in an itemized form giving date of all expenses. The Secretary shall have the bill O. K'd. by the Chairman of the Committee and issue an order on the Treasurer, who shall pay such orders when properly signed by the Chairman and Secretary of the Committee.

The Secretary shall enter the bills in his book as they are submitted, and also enter all money as it is received, giving date, and name of party from whom such money is received, making the Camp Meeting Committee creditor for all money received and debtor for all money paid out. He shall also compile a summary of receipts and expenses at the end of the record of all expenses for the year.

The Treasurer shall make himself debtor in his book for all the various amounts of money as they are received and creditor for all money paid out, giving date and name of party or parties from whom the money is received and date and name of party or parties and number of order to whom money is paid. [Enacted October 10, 1908.]

Gospel Worker Society.—A.—A. free-will offering shall be lifted for the Gospel Workers in each class at a monthly prayer meeting held by their respective class-leaders. [Enacted February 20, 1897.]

B .- Each class shall lift a free-will offering for the Missionary Pre-

siding Elder every Quarter. [Enacted February 20, 1897.]

C.—Whenever the Gospel Worker Society turns one or more missions over to the church, a committee, consisting of the Presiding Elders, Treasurer, and Missionary Presiding Elder, shall appraise the personal property or real estate belonging to said mission in case the Church chooses to buy said property, paying the same out of the Home Mission treasury. [Enacted October 28, 1904.]

Journals.—A.—The Annual Conference minutes shall be published only in the Conference Journal. The Secretary shall be privileged to curtail them as he sees fit and have them published in the Gospel Banner. [Revised October 14, 1907.]

B.—The pastors shall pay their Conference Journals within one week after they receive them. [Enacted October 13, 1905.]

C.—The Secretary shall send Journals to our Foreign Missionaries and also the local Railroad Companies. [Enacted October 12, 1908.]

D .- The Secretary of the Annual Conference shall also be Editor of

the Conference Journal of the same session.

E.—The Editor of the Conference Journal shall arrange a brief report of the Sunday services at the Annual Conference to be published in the Conference Journal. [Enacted October 13, 1905.]

In case a church or parsonage will be built or purchased during the year, a photograph of the same shall be taken and a cut inserted in

the Conference Journal of next year.

V.—SPECIAL SERVICES.

A .- Matrimony .- Each pastor shall preach a sermon on Matrimony

at each appointment on his charge in the first year.

B.—The Lord's Coming.—Believing that the coming of the Lord is rapidly approaching, therefore we recommend our ministers to give still more earnest prominence to this blessed hope of the church as we

see the Day approaching. [Enacted February 4, 1894.]

C.—As the Scriptures contain a number of instances where children of Godly parents were formally and publicly dedicated to the Lord. (1 Sam. 22:28; Mark 10:13-16,) we heartly encourage our people to dedicate their children to the Lord by prayer and laying on of the hands of the Elders, who shall then furnish proper certificates. [Enacted October 5, 1901.]

D.—Class Meetings.—Each pastor shall hold a class meeting four times a year in each class, and read the general rules or get them read

once a year. [Discipline, page 72.]

E.—Camp Meetings.—Camp meetings shall be held annually according to the decision of the Presiding Elders and pastors of their

respective districts.

F.—Sunday School Conventions.—One or more Sunday School Conventions shall be held annually. The officers shall be elected at the Annual Conference. The committee on programme shall meet six weeks before the convention to arrange a programme. Each Sunday School shall be represented by the Superintendent, and one delegate from the laity. The Superintendents, Delegates and Essayists shall have their fares paid. Each Superintendent shall take up a liberal collection to defray the expenses of the convention. [Enacted October 29, 1904.]

G.—Funerals.—We recommend our ministers not to officiate at Sunday funerals, and use their influence strongly against the same. [En-

acted October 29, 1904.]

VI.—SPECIAL OFFERINGS.

A .- Foreign Missions.

(a) Foreign Missionary Offering—Annual.

(b) Missionary Day in Sunday School—Semi-annual.

B.—Home Missions.

(a) Home Missionary Offering—Annual.(b) Missionary Presiding Elder—Quarterly.

(c) Gospel Workers' Society-Monthly.

C .- Offering for the Poor-Annual.

D.—Beneficiary Fund—Annual.

E.—Conference Fund—Annual.

VII.-MISCELLANEOUS.

A .- Transfers .- When a good standing member moves from one

class to another, his or her name shall be transferred at once. [En acted February 3, 1894.]

B.—Each pastor shall bring an itemized report to the Annual Conference, according to the form of the report of the Financial Secre-

tary.

C.—No charges shall be brought against any Annual Conference member which have not been recorded in the Quarterly Conference proceedings of their charge, except such as have been committed or discovered since the last quarterly conference. [Enacted February 1, 1891.]

D.—Each pastor shall record the mailing lists of the subscribers of the "Eastern Gospel Banner" and "Gospel Herald" in a book together with an accurate statement of the account of each subscriber to be transferred to his successor. [Enacted October 15, 1906.]

E.—The Secretary shall ask the publishers of the "Gospel Herald" and "Eastern Gospel Banner" to furnish each pastor with a copy of the mailing list of the subscribers in his charge through the Presiding Elders, soon after the Annual Conference.

F.—Beneficiary Fund.—We recommend each Pastor to make a special effort to swell the Beneficiary Fund to assist the worthy wi-

dows of our deceased pastors. [Enacted October 29, 1904.]

G.—Collections.—The pastor shall have charge of the offerings for the Poor, Foreign and Home Missionary work, and Conference Fund, until the Annual Conference, unless needed sooner. The offerings for the Missionary Presiding Elder and Gospel Workers shall be delivered to the Presiding Elder at the Quarterly Conference and reported by the pastor to the Annual Conference. All collections received on a charge for the building or purchase of churches, parsonages or other purposes on another charge shall be reported by the pastor where collected. [Enacted October 28, 1904.]

H.—Home Mission Funds.—Whenever any Presiding Elder desires any money from the Home Mission Treasurer, he shall inform the Secretary of the desired amount, who shall take note of the same and forward the request to the Treasurer, who shall forward the same to the Presiding Elder, up to the amount appropriated to him at the An-

nual Conference.

The Pastor, by virtue of his office, shall be counted as an officer of the Sunday School. The number of officers and teachers of the Sunday School shall be determined by the number of offices and not only by the number of persons holding the offices.



It is with a deep sense of the mercies of God, that we are once more permitted to submit this report. God's goodness has been bestowed upon us in every way, giving us special strength, both physically and spiritually,

enabling us to meet with all the appointments during the year. The much patience and forbearance shown us by the ministering brethren, as well as by the church at large, together with the many kindnesses bestowed upon us, and the much prayer in our behalf, has been a great help to us. "Having therefore obtained help of God, I continue unto this day" (Acts 26:22).

The labors of the various pastors have been signally blessed, and the work in general is in a good spiritual condition. The Church attendance has been very good throughout. Prayer meetings have been largely attended

and the various Sunday Schools are in a flourishing condition. Open air meetings have been held with an excellent interest manifested. The many young people on the various charges have been making good progress on spiritual lines. They manifest a willing and obedient spirit, being kept plain in attire, and can be counted on for God. We also have a noble band of fathers and mothers who have stood by the work for many years, and are still fruitful and flourishing as the years roll by. A number of our aged people have been laid away during the year to await the Master's call at His glorious appearing.

The pastors are devoted to their respective work, and the self-sacrifice shown by them has had a good effect upon the laity as well as upon the public in general. The offerings of the district have been larger than ever, and the various parsonage debts have been reduced in a most creditable manner. All of the Church finances are in good shape.

The new church built on the lot at Main and Durham Streets, Bethlehem, at a cost of almost \$37,000, has been dedicated to the worship of Almighty God in the early part of the year, and is now being made good use of. The building is neat but plain, and has been affording ample room to accommodate all who desire to come. The class and friends have done most nobly in subscribing and contributing towards the paying of this building. The brethren stood by the pastor in a most creditable manner, and we wish to give both pastor and people their due honour in the sacrifices made in this behalf. May this Church be used for God's glory and be flooded with Divine power, in a manner even exceeding the former Church building, which had been so signally used for God, for these many years. Repairs have also been made at a number of Church properties on the various charges which are indeed noteworthy.

Two Camp-meetings were again held on the District which were much owned of God. Both were held in Mizpah Grove, Allentown, Pa., The first Camp-meeting (Bethlehem Division) had 238 tents, and the latter (Allentown Division) had 195 tents. The attendance was excellent at both of these gatherings, and people came from far and near to attend this feast of tabernacles. The Word was preached with power, the Lord giving the brethren much liberty through the power of the Holy Spirit. The altar was filled to overflowing with seekers, and we have reason to believe that much fruitage has been the result. The expenses were of necessity very high, but were easily met by willing hands and hearts who contributed most nobly.

All of our pastors were spared us, and were remarkably kept at their posts of duty for which we praise God. The future outlook for the work of the District is encouraging in spite of the unrest prevailing on all sides. The Church at large has a wholesome missionary spirit, and the pastors are unconditional men for God. Whatever surprises may be ahead, whatever lightning changes may develop, the Church looks for her "Lord in the air" (I Thess. 4:17). The world longs for Creation's Lord to hush her groans and bid her birth-pangs cease (Rom. 8:22). Lo, at any "moment" the saints' Hope may be realized (I Cor. 15:52). The day shall yet dawn when it is said, "The kingdoms of this world are become the kingdoms of our Lord and of His Christ" (Rev. 11:15). May God enable us all to ever remain true, and to be of such who take heed to the Saviour's command, "Occupy Till I Come" (Luke 19:13). REPORT OF THE PRESIDENT OF THE GOSPEL HERALD SOCIETY.

(From Oct. 1, 1919, to Aug. 31, 1920, 11 months only.)

The Lord has been bountifully blessing the Gospel Heralds and their labors during the past year. They are preserved in health and strength for which we praise our Lord.

There are missions in Harrisburg, York, Scranton, Lebanon, Philadelphia. In Lancaster just recently we rented a real nice, spacious hall near Center Square, where glorious meetings are being held. We closed Washington, N. J., mission, sold the property and moved to Jersey City where glorious open-air meetings are being held, and Gospel Herald papers are being sold Hitherto we have been unable to secure a suitable mission place, however. This appears like a promising mission field for us.

Tent meetings were held in Lancaster for about 10 weeks. A very good interest was manifested. At this time tent meetings are being held in Harrisburg, Philadelphia, and Scranton. These tent meetings are very well attended. Souls have been saved at each of these places and believers have been led into deeper truths. A large number were baptized recently and which are not recorded in this report.

In all the missions the Lord has been working effectually. People are being separated unto the word and work of the Lord. The Sunday Schools are progressing nicely. Grand forward strides have been made in co-portage work. A large number of Bibles and Testaments, other good books, the Gospel Heralds, Daily Food Wall Rolls, Bible Calendars and wall mottoes were sold. This is good seed sown from which some one may expect to reap a harvest sometime. A large amount of literature was sold at the Mennonite Brethren in Christ Camp Meetings.

The chapel and lot funds in various missions are gradually swelling. The various offerings are very good thru the sacrifices of God's people and friends of the work.

The Home Mission meetings held throughout the Mennonite Brethren in Christ conference were well attended and the people of the Lord pledged freely for the missionary cause. The Pastors received the heralds most cordially and were successful in making the attendance good and the subscriptions liberal. The subscriptions were far in excess of any previous year. The society expresses their thankfulness to the Mennonite Berthren in Christ in the name of the Lord for past favors shown in giving so freely and liberally and in supplicating the throne of grace in behalf of the Heralds and their work entrusted to them, thus enabling them to hold forth the word of life to hungry souls who are languishing in a land of prosperity for want of the Bread of Life.

The Heralds are submissive and loyal to God and their President, and active in His service and willing to sacrifice for God and His cause. They and their work are not without testings and trials, but the God of all grace and power gives new enablings in His name, and prepares a people for our Lord's glory till He comes.

XII. EXECUTIVE BOARD.

THE NINETEENTH ANNUAL REPORT OF THE EXECUTIVE BOARD.


The Board held a number of meetings this year, most of which were of a rather informal nature. The Annual Conference again re-elected the same members on the Board.

The Board spent a great deal of time and money on improvements in Mizpah Grove during the year. Last fall we secured 30 Oriental Plane trees from Andrew F. O'Connel of Overbrook, Pa., 6 for the Home Farm and the remaining 24 we planted in Mizpah Grove. Many of these, however, failed to grow. This was strange as among the many trees which we planted in former years very few failed.

The driveways in the grove had been in a bad condition and needed repairs very much. With the aid of a number of the pastors and a few hired men these were put into a fairly good condition. We used a lot of stones besides 107 tons of crushed stones. A good deal more material and labor should be expended along this line.

When we purchased the grove, ten years ago, we drilled an artesian well at the entrance, 42 feet deep, which has hitherto supplied us with an abundance of the best fresh, clear water. Only on a few occasions were there signs of failing. However, the great demand for water from the rapidly increasing number of campers and attendants at the Camp Meetings, especially on hot Sundays when people had to wait a long time to get water, and to guard against a possible failure of the well, the Board decided to dig another well near the upper end of the grove.

After many disappointments we secured Mr. J. Wilmer Shaw, of Quakertown, who drilled a six inch well 72 feet deep. This, when finished, contained 40 feet of water, also clear, cold and soft. [Although in a limestone region we found no limestone in either of our wells.

The gutters on the roof of the auditorium had broken down. So we spent quite a lot of money raising and securing them and patching the roof.

We also made 12 new benches for the auditorium, a lot of spruce end poles for the tents, and bought a stove for the Campers' Dining Hall.

We purchased 305 boards, 10 inches wide and 105 scantling, 3 by 4 inches,

for tent floors.

The Board also purchased an additional 40 feet along the south side of our property, 700 feet long, from Andrew S. Keck, for \$1,000. Being within the limits of the city of Allentown, the ground is naturally very expensive.

We now own a very beautiful and valuable grove, 416 feet wide and 700 feet long along the south side of Lawrence Street, containing 6.685 acres. We also own 5 lots, 20 feet wide on the north side of Lawrence Street extending 120 feet along the east side of Ellsworth Street, for 60 feet of which we paid \$25 a foot front, five years ago.

According to the will of our late Elder William Gehman, we have received the sum of \$1,000 from his estate to be used wherever most needed.

THE FIFTEENTH ANNUAL REPORT OF THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF THE ORPHANAGE AND HOME.

The Board of Trustees has discontinued the Board of Managers during the year and is now meeting regularly every month at the Home to make settlement with the Manager, Titus Hottel.

Titus Hottel has again ably managed the affairs of the Home and the Farm. He is always concerned that the work in its various branches should go forward harmoniously and that the income of the Institution should always be above the expenses, and that the herd and crops should do well. He is concerned that the orphan boys should be taught to be obedient and live good Christian lives.

Elmer Willits lives in the farm-house and labors diligently on the farm-The Board of Trustees has engaged Paul Teel to labor on the farm. He lives in the tenant house adjoining the farm.

The health of Katie Feairheller has been greatly improved and she is again giving good service in the Home. Alice Musselman, who has been laboring faithfully during the past year, has been relieved of her duties for the present on account of failing health.

The orphan boys are keeping well and are obedient and rendering very good service on the Farm when not in school. The aged sisters are keeping in good health and are enjoying the hospitality of the Home.

Maria Widmaier, an aged sister of German birth, and a member of the Evangelical Association of Philadelphia, has been admitted during the year and is greatly enjoying the Christian influences of the Home.

A public sale of the Holstein-Freisian cattle was held in April, at which almost the entire herd of cattle was disposed of. Since that time some cattle have been bought so that at the present time the herd comprises twenty-four head.

The cattle and swine have done well during the year and the crops have been good. The Lord has blessed the work.

XIV. Foreign Missions.

THE THIRTY-SIXTH ANNUAL REPORT OF THE BOARD OF FOREIGN MISSIONS.

We have much reason to praise the Lord again for His help rendered to us during the past year. The Lord has gloriously blessed our work in the homeland in the salvation of souls and the edifying of the Church. When the Home Mission work prospers the blessings will naturally flow out into the Foreign fields. The pastorates and missions throughout the Church and in the missions of the Gospel Herald Society have been blessed and strengthened.

Three Camp Meetings were held with much spiritual blessing and power, and many converts. Two Camp Meetings were held in the Bethlehem District in beautiful Mizpah Grove, Allentown, Pa., as follows: Bethlehem Division, July 3rd to 11th, 238 tents; Allentown Division, August 14th to 22nd, 195 tents. One was held in the Mount Carmel District, in Edgewood Grove, Shamokin, Pa., July 24th to August 1, with 130 tents.

We were glad to have Dr. R. H. Glover, Foreign Secretary of the Christian and Missionary Alliance, with headquarters and offices at 690 8th Avenue, New York City, with us at the first-named of these Camp Meetings. He gave us two strong messages which we trust will bear much fruit for the Master.

We were also privileged to have Pastor Wm. Fetler, of Philadelphia, Director of the Russian Evangelization Society, with us at the Camp Meeting. He had with him 18 young men, Russians, from his Training School in Philadelphia, whom he expects to take to Russia for active Missionary work this fall.

The Annual Conference, held at Reading, Pa., October 16–20, 1919, had re-elected H. B. Musselman, W. G. Gehman, C. H. Brunner, E. N. Cassel and W. S. Hottel, as the Board of Foreign Missions. The Board at its first meeting re-organized with the same officers, namely, President, H. B. Musselman; Secretary; C. H. Brunner. The Treasurer of the Annual Conference by virtue of his office, is Treasurer of the funds of the Board of Foreign Missions. The Board held four meetings during the year.

Among the changes during the year have been the following: Rev. M. B. Fuller, of India, has come home, and because of his age and declining health may not be able to return to the field. Rev. C. H. Miller, of Argentine, has retired from our fellowship. The Board decided to accept Rev. and Mrs. Wm. C. Cadman of Annam, Rev. and Mrs. Samuel Kerr of India, and Mrs. Nettie Meier of Chile. thus making in all 22 missionaries and 4 ordained native pastors supported by the Pennsylvania Conference.

Brother and Sister M. P. Zook and their two sons, after spending eleven months in the homeland on furlough, returned to Chile again. Brother and Sister Wm. C. Cadman and daughter also returned from furlough, sailing from New York August 28th for Annam, via England and France. Brother and Sister S. P. Hamilton, after a furlough, also expect to return to India in October or November.

We still continue to send to all our missionaries the Eastern Gospel Banner, Gospel Herald, Christian Life Missionary, Gospel of Jesus, Jewels for Jesus, Christian Life Teachers' Quarterly, Young People's Societies' Quarterly, Daily Food wall roll and a Diary. Many comments and words of thanks and appreciation have been received from the various fields relative to the blessing and help these publications have brought to them for their own personal benefit, as well as for use in their services. Many articles have been translated and printed in different languages.

REV. ALBERT B. SIMPSON.

Rev. Albert B. Simpson, founder and President of the Christian and Missionary Alliance, fell asleep in Jesus at his home at Nyack, N. Y., on October 29, 1919, in his 78th year.

It was the privilege of the writer, as Secretary of the Board of Foreign Missions, upon inviation, to be present at his funeral in the Gospel Tabernacle, 692 Eighth Avenue, New York City, on November 4th, 1919.

The large Tabernacle, which he built and in which he served as pastor for 30 years, was much too small to hold the many friends who had gathered to pay their last tribute of respect. The ceremonies were simple, yet very impressive.

Dr. Simpson was born on Prince Edward Island, of old-school Scotch Presbyterian parents. His father, James Simpson, was a successful shipbuilder. Owing to financial reverses he moved to western Ontario when Albert was three years old. There in a little log cabin near Chatham, ten miles from town and church, with no luxuries and few comforts, and few books, he changed the maiden forest into golden fields of grain. No doubt Dr. Simpson owed his strong, robust constitution to the hardships and toil of his younger days. The Sundays were kept strictly, forbidding all work and play. After returning from a twenty-mile ride to and from church on a springless wagon over bad roads, the family spent the day reciting the shorter catechism and the Bible. The mother, who was very fond of poetry, was the cultured and highly endowed daughter of William Clark, member of the Provincial Assembly.

In 1865, Albert graduated from Knox College, Toronto, and became pastor of Knox Presbyterian Church, Hamilton, Ontario, the same year. In 1874 he accepted a call to the Chestnut Street Presbyterian Church, Louisville, Ky., and in 1880 became pastor of the Thirteenth Street Presbyterian Church, New York City. In 1881 he resigned his pastorate and withdrew from the New York Presbytery and was immersed in a very humble mission building in New York City. Here he started out to preach a four-fold gospel, trying to reach the non-churchgoing masses especially. With a few dozen earnest Christians standing by him he preached the Gospel in halls, theatres and tents. In 1882 he organized what is now the Gospel Tabernacle with 35 members. Rev. A. E. Funk says that when he became associated with Dr. Simpson in 1885 he "found that the church with about fifty members was paying \$6,000 annual rent for the Twenty-Third Street Theatre, and was supporting the full Gospel work carried on therein every evening of the year." In 1889 he built the present church building seating 1,000 people. In February, 1880, he printed the first number of *The Gospel in All lands*, an illustrated missionary magazine, the first one of its kind in the United States. This was the beginning of his literary work. His published volumes, not counting tracts and pamphlets, number over 70. It is said that "he never found it necessary to retract or modify his testimony, or to revise his earlier writings to meet new conditions."

Nothing can equal personal contact in human influence over other lives. Dr. Leon Tucker said about Dr. Simpson: "His voice was a wonderful vehicle for his message—melodious and musical, full, resonant, passionate and triumphant. He was a poet-preacher. While multitudes were going broader he was going deeper." One of the speakers said at his funeral, "No man ever gripped my soul like Dr. Simpson." His voice was heard in all the large cities of the United States as well as in Europe and many of the heathen countries, while his writings are read and his hymns are sung all over the world in many languages. As an organizer of Foreign Missionary work he had no equal. During his lifetime, the Christian and Missionary Alliance which he founded occupied 16 countries, built up 108 stations and nearly 400 out stations occupied by over 300 missionaries assisted by more than 600 earnest native workers with a total foreign church membership of over 10,500.

God buries His workers but carries His work right on. Rev. Paul Rader, Pastor of the Moody Tabernacle in Chicago has been chosen President of the Christian and Missionary Alliance to succeed Dr. Simpson.

Africa.


Boma, near the mouth of the mighty Congo River, is the gateway for all missions operating in Belgian Congo. It is also the headquarters of the missions of the Christian and Missionary Alliance in the Belgian Congo. Rev. and Mrs. E. E. Crist are stationed here and have charge. Brother Crist is the Chairman of the Executive Committee.

In one of his reports he writes as follows:

"This has been the busiest year I have ever seen in Congo. There seemed to be so much extra work. Then too, Mrs. Crist has not been well; she has suffered from rheumatism for a long time, then in June she sprained her ankle on a broken step and it took months for her to recover from it. Later, about two months ago she simply collapsed, she had no more strength and any little thing would make her tired. She just seems to be run down in her system and she cannot get her strength back. I had wanted her to take a vacation for almost a year but she did not want to go. Now she has gone to one of our other stations for a couple of weeks rest. It may be too late, though, for her to get much benefit, and we may have to go on furlough in the Spring.

"I wanted to write you about a trip which I took recently with Brother Myers to Brazzaville, the capital of French Congo. We went, hoping to get permission from the French Governor to begin work in their Colony, but they will not consent at present, at least not until the Peace Treaties are fully adjusted. We do not know how much longer we will have to wait but ask that you will join with us in prayer that the Lord will remove every obstacle.

"We do not know when we shall be able to enter French Congo, but hope it will not be long until the way opens. Pray that every obstacle may soon be removed. The people need the Gospel and are dying without a knowledge of it. Neither do the French people want them to have it. They are per-

fectly willing for us to teach industrial work to the natives, also to teach them French, but so far as the Gospel is concerned they do not want it." (For detailed account of this trip see "Eastern Gospel Banner" for February 26, 1920.)

From other reports we gather the following:-

"There are many encouraging features of the work to report. It is exceedingly gratifying to note the constant progress manifested by our new missionaries in language study and in many other phases of the work. To facilitate the study of the language a new beginner's book is in course of preparation under the direction of Mrs. E. E. Crist. A new collection of native hymns is almost ready for the press.

"Last year the food shortage was a serious problem, but since abundant rains have fallen the outlook for food is promising.

"At Kinkonzi the prospering condition of the work made it necessary to erect another brick dwelling. We herald with joy and gladness the news of the beginning of the Bible Training School for teachers and evangelists. The new dormitory has been completed. The great burden of this work has fallen upon Brother E. R. Hess. The task is not easy, but against all difficulties he labors with the same zeal and devotion as he manifests in the spiritual upbuilding of the lives of these people.

"We have reason to praise.God for the advance made in our work. Brothers C. R. Myers and W. C. Boyer have itinerated several hundred miles into the French Congo. Provision is being made for new advances West and North of Boma, a section which has been little evangelized. Three schools have been opened in the district.

"We rejoice to hear of the noble stand taken by some of our Christians in the face of severe persecution. One native woman, having refused to live in sin, was cast into prison by her wicked husband. Sometimes for days she was without food but refused to deny her Lord. Finally her faith in the Lord Jesus triumphed and she was released, a victor."

In his Annual Report for 1919 Brother Crist reports 198 out-stations and sub out-stations, 228 native workers, 10 organized churches with a total membership of 3172. During the year they received by baptism 429. They still have 617 enquirers. They maintain 235 day-schools with an average attendance of 4522. The native workers conducted 27,800 services in villages apart from the main stations and 12,284 extra meetings were held by other Christians.

One of the great needs on this field is the opening of a training school for native evangelists. This is very evident when they have 228 natives converted from the raw material who shall teach others the way of salvation. Brother Crist writes, "Lack of food has prevented us from opening our Evangelists' Training School. The natives have been existing for the past year but many are thin and gaunt from malnutrition. There have been abundant rains thus far during this rainy season, and there is promise of better days coming. Just as soon as possible we expect to open this school."

"In 1918 we succeeded in opening one outstation one-half day from Boma," reports Brother Crist, "and although the teacher was there but half the time, we are glad to report one Christian from that place. The Chief of the village met our Evangelists in another village and, after listening to the Gospel, invited them to come to his village and teach his people. . . . When they arrived he urged them to stay. After learning of his desire I visited him and decided to place a teacher there. From the very first this Chief seemed to drink in the Gospel and when he understood its meaning he accepted Christ as his Saviour. He had to stand alone as none in his village nor any of his friends from surrounding villages approved of his step. He came to Boma occasionally to the Sunday Services and enjoyed hearing the Gospel. The last time he was here he told us that he had put away all his women except his first wife, and that he had stopped making clay pipes, saying: 'Since it is not fit for Christians to smoke tobacco, neither is it fit for me to make the pipes.' We rejoiced to see how God was dealing with him. He took sick and suffered about two months. The night before he passed away his wife wanted him to try some of the native medicines and fetiches. He rebuked her strongly, telling her that he was going to die and go to Heaven. He admonished her to forsake her sins and serve the Lord or she would never see him again. We prayed and hoped for his healing but we trust that his triumphant death may speak more loudly than his life could have done.

"In some districts the drought hindered the work much. The people are very hungry and weak in body. A mother of three little children went in search of food leaving the children at home. While she was away they

went to the woods where they found some roots which they brought home, boiled and ate. When the mother came home in the evening she found her three little ones dead, having been poisoned by the roots."

Some of these converts have to bear a great deal of persecution. "A young girl living near one of our out-stations," writes Brother Crist, "became interested in the Gospel and would stay at the school several days at a time to hear about Jesus. Her people tried in every way to persuade her to give up this new notion of hers but she refused. At last she was made a prisoner by the Chief and kept under guard for several weeks. When her people failed to induce her to enter a life of sin, her aunt took her to Matadi, sixty miles away, to some relatives in the most immoral section of the town, and there deserted her. Being without money, friends or food she became discouraged and in order to procure food she yielded to temptation. Being convicted of sin, a month later when she saw a man from the school she had attended, she returned with him to the school, confessed her sin, and promises to become a true follower of the Lord.

"Another case is the deacon of the church at Lolo who is also a teacher. Whenever he goes itinerating, several in the village who were at one time members of the church destroy his fields, steal his fowls, etc. The Chief of the village, though not a Christian, finally decided to put a stop to this and called all those who had been put out of church together intending to give them a beating. The deacon, feeling that this was not the right way to deal with them, interceded for them and the Chief was dissuaded from his purpose."

A Miss G. M. Welles, writing in the *Congo Mission News*, speaks of a meeting she attended at the Yema Church, built by Brother Hessa few years ago.

"On my way home from Mboka in Portuguese Congo where I have been residing, it was my pleasure to be at Yema Church quarterly meetings. Probably 1200 or more were in attendance. Sixty-four were baptized at that time, one of the number being an old woman with white hair. Another of the candidates was formerly, first a state kapita and then a Catholic teacher. Five years ago I knew of him as kapita, and several of our Christians received most shameful treatment at his hands, but the power of the Gospel has brought about a complete change in his life."

Rev. E. R. Hess.

Brother E. R. Hess is still faithfully laboring in the Belgian Congo. The following letter written by Brother Hess to Mr. Ralph C. Norton of the Belgian Gospel Mission was published in the Sunday School Times:

"On a recent itineration in my district I found much joy in reading in *The Sunday School Times* the account of your wonderful work among the Belgians. I made the matter known to the native congregation, asking them to pray earnestly for you and your blessed work.

"How we rejoiced together because God has at last opened the door of

the Gospel to the Belgians.

"It has so pleased the Christians of the Maduda Church that they have decided to send one-half of the tenth of their offerings during the year to your work; the other half goes to Palestine. And we are sure to feel the effects in Congo Belge, where the priests have so greatly baffled us in the past-by their iniquitous methods.

"The Maduda Church would appreciate a brief word from you. May God continue to make you a blessing to many. Herewith cheque for Frs.

Mr. Norton writes concerning this letter: "It has touched our hearts in a way that it would be impossible to describe. What a joy it is to have these children of God in South Africa fellowshiping with us in the Gospel here by their prayers and their gifts. It has also put us to shame."

This is a wonderful record from a poor African congregation just lately saved from heathen darkness. Someone must have planted this noble missionary spirit into the hearts of these simple, devoted prople. Where are the critics of Foreign Missionary work? Where are those who think that the Africans are not worth the trouble to bring them the Gospel? Let us hear from them. All this speaks very highly of the quiet, unassuming labors of Brother Hess.

We have not received much news from Brother Hess directly as he no doubt has been kept extremely busy, but we will insert the following extract

from the reports of Brother Crist:

"Mr. Hess has charge of Kinkonzi Station where he has put in the most strenuous year of his life. One dwelling house begun last year was finished with its necessary outbuildings. A brick dormitory, 18 by 135 feet, for the Evangelists' Training School, is almost completed. This, together with the spiritual work, has kept him extremely busy.

"Mr. Hess also has the oversight of the Maduda district. The Maduda Church had again to be divided. There are now five divisions with a total membership of 840. There are 68 schools taught by 66 teachers of whom only 15 receive any pay. The church is supporting three of their own teachers in the Kinkonzi district and has now sent the fourth one to the Vunzu district with still two others ready to come to the Boma district as soon as arrangements can be made. . . . Quite a number of young people have offered themselves for service for the Lord and are only waiting for the necessary training. We hope to see missionaries from Maduda going to all parts of the lower Congo.

"Besides that which they have already done the Church has undertaken to keep fields at all the schools for the teacher and his family, also to transport free of charge the missionaries and native workers who visit them, as well

as provide for extra carriers.

"Although Mr. Hess had so much other work he managed to spend several days with the people at the different schools giving special Bible teaching, finding the people very open and ready to receive the Word. The teachers also made good progress in the special studies he gave them."

From the latest reports we learn that they have opened a Teachers' Training School at Boma with 27 young men, evangelists, in attendance,

all of them hungry for Bible study.

Annam. Rev. and Mrs. Wm. C. Cadman.

Early in the year the Board accepted Brother and Sister Cadman as their representatives in the much neglected country of Annam, or French Indo-China.

Brother Cadman was converted in 1905 while working in a publishing office in London, England, convicted by the stand taken by a young fellow apprentice during persecution, although none of his family and friends were Christians. Soon afterward he went to Toronto, Ontario, joined the Prespetrian Church, attended a Bible School, later spent a year at the Nyack Missionary Training Institute, after which he went to Wuchow, South China.

After four years of publication and evangelistic work there he, with four other missionaries, went to dark Annam. One of these was Miss Hazenberg, whom he married soon after, and took charge of the work at Tourane and later on they opened their present station at Hanoi, the Capital.

We had the privilege of having Brother and Sister Cadman speak in a

few of our churches during their furlough.

Day after Christmas their little daughter Agnes, about five years old, took very sick and became perfectly helpless with something like spine disease. Through the earnest prayers of God's people she has, however, improved remarkably so that they could leave for their field of labor on August 28th.

In a letter from Brother Cadman on the day of their sailing he writes: "We are just off for the steamer. How wonderfully God has wrought on our behalf! Agnes is almost running around, all excited with going on the 'big,

big ship.' Hallelujah! All glory to God! We thank you and yours, dear brother, for their faithfulness in praying for her healing. Pray on for her complete recovery. We are returning to the work full of joy and praise to God, encouraged to know that we have a praying people to work with us.'

From some of their letters, articles, and reports we gather the following

items for this report.

"Indo-China is composed of five states, Tonkin, Annam, Cochin-China, Cambodia and Laos. The whole country is sometimes called 'Annam', but correctly speaking, 'Annam' is only one of the states of Indo-China.

Cochin-China is a French possession while the other states are French Protectorates. The latest French statistics give the population at 16,000,000. The Christian and Missionary Alliance is the only Protestant Missionary

Society working among all these many millions of souls.

"One or more Bible Training Schools are an absolute necessity. The missionary can then send the promising young men and women from among the members of his church to these schools and have them fitted out to become efficient workers. It is only through the Annamese themselves that we can ever hope to reach the millions of this land. The native workers know the language better than the missionary can ever hope to learn it. They also know the customs and traditions of their own people. The inestimable value of Spirit-filled, trained native workers has been proven in Tourane and Hanoi.

When the missionaries first entered Annam there was not a single page of Protestant literature to be found in the Annamese language, not a leaflet, not a tract. It was felt that to supply this lack we should have a mission printing press. This was made a subject of prayer and the money began coming in until enough was received to purchase, equip and run for the first year (1918) a small but practical printing press for the supply of Gospel literature.

"Besides clear, pointed tracts, we printed a hymnal of one hundred hymns in Annamese which are now used in the chapel services. The influence of the printed page is of incalculable value in Annam today, as these little leaflets are being scattered broadcast from this mission press telling the nillions of Annam of the love of the Son of Man who 'came to seek and to save that which was lost.'

"A number of years ago, under the auspices of the British and Foreign Bible Society, translations of the Gospels and Acts had been made and small, tentative editions printed. When missionary work was begun these editions were out of print and badly in need of revision. Therefore the Bible Society authorized the missionaries to engage qualified native assistants and prepare revisions and translate new portions of the Scriptures. Two of the Gospels, as well as Acts are now printed and on sale, while the other two Gospels, Romans and Genesis, are going through the press. Our aim is to give the Annamese people the whole Bible, sold at such a low price, and printed in such simple language, that all may own and read it. The missionary without the Bible in the colloquial language is handicapped in his work, and the native converts, deprived of the word of God, can not become strong. Our next aim is to give them translations of good spiritual books and pamphlets which have been widely used of God in other lands; as also Sunday School literature and the like; already cheap and immoral novels are being devoured by the youth of our land. Satan is stealing a march on us and sowing tares in atheistic and evolutionary literature. Hence this need is very urgent.

"To carry out all this program for Annam, God urgently needs missionaries. Yes, hundreds of them, men and women devoted to God, sure of their royal commission, whom no discouragments or disappointments, no humiliation, no lack of human sympathy or honors will ever be able to turn back from their appointed task. These are the men and women who have caught

the vision of Jesus, and of a great company of saved ones from Annam who have washed their robes and made them white in the blood of the Lamb, ready to meet the Bridegroom when He comes.

There have been a number of most remarkable cases of conversion from among the Annamese, principally from the educated classes. Space will not allow the accounts of them. Brother and sister Cadman have written a book on the work of the Lord in Annam which will soon be off the press, nicely illustrated, which will give very interesting sketches of the conversion of a number of faithful workers and members in the churches in Annam.

The Opening of Annam. Mrs. Wm. C. Cadman.

My parents, early in their lives, felt the call of God to leave the comparatively pleasant pastures and still waters of the home ministry, for the journeyings oft and far on the dry veldt of South Africa. Their missionary labors in that distant land—more especially among the Boers and the Dutch-speaking natives—were blessed of God. Also their only child was being "trained" for another work in another and yet more needy mission field.

In 1913, after the dear parents had both gone to their eternal reward, I set sail for Annam (French Indo-China).

Though three other missionaries were already in Tourane, yet work was only just being begun in the native Annamese language, as the previous two or three years had been spent in preparatory study of French and Annamese.

The meetings were first held on the veranda of the mission bungalow; and there on those quiet Sabbath mornings the little audience would gather to hear the old, old story. Most of them were men, and many came merely out of curiosity to hear something of the "deceiving doctrine"—for this is the definition of Protestantism which is given in the Roman Catholic dictionaries. We thank God that many of those who in those early days, came merely to hear "some new thing" have now come to know Jesus who alone can satisfy the craving of the human heart.

After a time, when I had a small working vocabulary of Annamese, I would go out to the little homes built of bamboo and straw with hard mud floors. Here the neighbors would gather while I tried to tell them some simple Gospel truths. Many a time a screaming baby or mischievous child would disturb, and the mothers would scold them noisily. Sometimes in the midst of an earnest sentence, some woman would ask the price of one's clothes, one's age, whether married or single, etc., etc.

Often on a Sunday afternoon I would take a walk along the seashore and stop and talk with a group of fisher-folk or enter some poor little fishing village and soon have an interested audience listening to the message of Jesus and his love.

Some months after my arrival in Tourane the first bamboo chapel was completed and thus a more commodious place provided for evening and Sunday meetings. Here we often had good audiences of attentive listeners—men, women and children. Those were days of seed-sowing and the harvest was not yet. Only a few were baptized during 1914 and 1915, but the Gospel was being preached in various out-lying villages as well as in Tourane itself.

In 1915 the Annual Missionary Conference was held in Tourane in the month of March and the future then appeared bright with promise. There were then nine missionaries on the field and it was decided to open up new work in Tonkin. Four missionaries therefore took up residence in the city of Haiphong, Tonkin. They did some itinerating, selling several thousand Gospel portions in Chinese.

Since these first days great advances have been made in the Tourane work. Two chapels have been built, an enlarged one next to the missionary home to replace the first one blown down by a furious typhoon, and another in a distant part of the city. Most encouraging of all, the infant church has grown rapidly numbering now over one hundred members from the various ranks of life. During the past year they have taken over the entire support of their own native preacher and Bible woman and also the upkeep of the bamboo chapels. Thus early in the work the importance of self-support is being grasped.

Last year some 450 children were attending the three Sunday Schools; two in Tourane and one in Hanoi. Sunday School picture cards are given as rewards.

Chile.

On April 13, 1919, Brother M. P. Zook, sister Zook and their two boys Walter and John Bradley, arrived in New York on furlough after spending almost fourteen years of continued service in Chile and Argentina. They spent their furlough very busily in Camp Meeting and Convention work. Brother Zook made an address at the Annual Conference at Reading in October, 1919, and during December and January he held missionary service at each of our appointments throughout the Conference. All of these meetings were well attended and very interesting and we trust will result in much fruit for the Master. Sister Zook not having been very strong, she spent several months at the Missionary Home, Wheat Ridge, Colorado, which seemed to be very helpful to her.

Arrangements had already been made for their departure for Chile on the 21st of February but on account of the illness of Sister Zook and the boys, of influenza, their sailing had to be postponed until March 20th, when the Secretary of the Board, accompanied by a number of the brethren, bade them farewell as they left the harbor on the S. S. Ebro.

In their company was a missionary couple whom they had known from Chile, also a young lady who was going to teach in the Methodist Mission School in Lima, Peru.

Later we received the following letter from Brother Zook:

"We arrived at our destination safely on the evening of the 9th of April and all felt happy to be on Chilian soil again. We had a good voyage all through and very little rough weather. I was not sick at all and the family was only sick for a few times and only a short while each time. So we thanked God for His evident blessing, and the answers to our prayers and those of others.

"Our brethren were sincerely glad to see us again and everywhere I have gone since we are home I have met the most enthusiastic welcome. The work has also gone forward without any serious hindrances during our absence. We have been enabled to see appreciable advances on many lines during the year. This was best manifested at our Annual Conference. The boys are now at school and seem to get along quite well."

The Annual Conference of the Missionaries and Native Pastors of Chile held at Freire, Chile, April 14-17, 1920, appointed Rose Z. LeFevre, Nettie Meier and S. Feldges as a committee to compile greetings and a snyopsis of their report to be sent to our Board. Their report follows:

Freire, Chile, April 17, 1920.

Dear Co-Laborers:

The members of the Chile Conference greet you in the name of our blessed Lord and Saviour, Jesus Christ "in whom are hid all the treasures of wisdom and knowledge" (Col. 2:3).

The missionaries and native workers of the Chile Alliance have keenly felt the home-going of our beloved leader, Dr. Simpson, during the past year. He has gone on before but his influence is still felt and we shall ever praise God for having had the privilege of knowing him and his saintly life.

Our annual conference, which usually convenes carly in January, had been postponed until April 14-17, because of the delay in the return of our Chairman. However, we are thankful that our chairman, Mr. M. P. Zook, arrived in Chile on the 9th inst. accompanied by Mrs. Zook and their two boys.

Chile did not escape the epidemics which made such havoc all over the world. While there has been much sickness and many deaths among the unsaved and even in some of the other missions, we praise the Lord that comparatively few deaths occurred in our congregations.

The Lord saw fit to take home Brothers Wm. Krause and Emil Jacobsen. While Brother Jacobsen was not officially connected with our mission, yet he was one of us and in full fellowship. While he was on his deathbed, he advised his congregations, numbering fifty-seven persons, to officially unite with us in church fellowship, which they have done.

We have been very happy to welcome into our midst the new missionaries, Mr. and Mrs. Bucher, who, after but four weeks in Chile, show marked progress in the language. We are glad for these reinforcements but when we realize the necessity of extension as well as manning and establishing our present churches, the need of more missionaries is imperative.

Another urgent need is more tarined native workers, and for this we


covet a Bible School for their training.

The present conference was the occasion of the dedication of a beautiful new chapel in Freire. Work is also in progress on five other new chapels in as many districts.

A number of conversions were reported from the new outstations opened

during 1919.

The Indian work is very encouraging. There have been a number of conversions but we are unable to report many additions in the church because of a common difficulty. The Indians live rather isolated and do not follow the marriage customs of the country, the greater part of them not having been married by law and do not see the necessity of doing it. This, of course, impedes their uniting with the church. A primary school has been opened

for the Indians and in rainy weather even some of the grown-ups attend. The native worker stationed there is very desirous that the Indians learn to read the Bible for they are almost all illiterate.

· Another day-school has been begun in one of our more northerly stations because of the opposition of the Catholic school teacher to the children of Christians. Two of the girl students were baptized at the close of the school year.

We thank you for your prayers in our behalf and covet them for the future, for we know that this is one of our greatest needs and without which we would face certain defeat.

We desire to extend our heartfelt thanks for your continued and liberal support during the year and your kind interest.

Working while it is day, we long for the coming of the Lord.

From reports gathered from other sources we find that the number of church members now is 1277. The total amount of offerings from these churches for 1919 was 14,778 pesos or about \$3000 in U. S. money.

Brother Zook writes that they had opened a work among the 100,000 Indians in Chile, which is promising most encouraging results. He states that "Rev. Vital Sanhueza, one of the Chilean pastors, felt the call of God to dedicate his life and talents to the evangelication of this needy people. One of the many interesting incidents met with in his work is related by himself. Through another converted Indian he got permission to hold a meeting in a new Indian reservation, where they never had heard the Gospel. He had engaged a house for the meeting on the following Sunday. Upon arriving there on the Sunday, in company with a number of his brethren from the congregation of Valdivia, he discovered the village was almost deserted. He went to the house where the service was to be held and found no one home except a young girl, who upon being asked where her parents were, simply shrugged her shoulders. Turning around, on a hill nearby they saw the men of the reservation mounted on horseback, and on approaching them saw that they were sulky and hostile.

"Mr. Sanhueza said to his brethren, 'We must not back down now.' So he rode up to the men and asked permission to hold the meeting, but was flatly refused. He then said, 'We will go to the public road and hold the meeting; no one can prohibit our preaching there.' He invited the men to follow, which they did. There they sang some hymns, testified and preached to the mounted congregation. The prejudice and mistrust was entirely broken down, and the Indians became quite enthusiastic in their approval of the preaching and invited the brethren to come back again, assuring them that they would find a home where they could preach. They also followed them a long distance on their way home, continually assuring them of their good will."

Brother Feldges also writes relative to this grand work among the Indians:

"Our special worker among the Mapuche Indians, Brother Sanhueza, reports many openings and has already 20 baptized believers in his congregation. They are getting ready to build a meeting-house for the Indians in Niebla, near Valdivia. Two of our Indian brethren are in prison under false charges. It is difficult to do anything for them, because their enemies have money and influence with which to prolong any action that might be brought against them and cause it to fail. One Christian was brutally murdered with an axe. The murderer had stolen this man's ox because he was an 'evangelical deceiver'."

"We will triumph in Thy victory" (Ps. 20:5).

"We cannot refrain from giving glory to God for his goodness and mercy all along the way. In a cottage meeting the other night, while listening to the testimonies, the thought came to me, no doubt of the Lord, that the people in the homeland, who hold us and the work here, up in prayer, have a right to know and to rejoice with us and give glory to God for all His wondrous works.

"Our hearts are filled with joy as we see precious souls coming to the Saviour. We have been praying to God for a revival, and although we are having such cold, wet weather, people come out to the meetings; and even if we have meeting every night, they do not find it too much.

"One Sunday night lately, as the invitation was given for souls to come to seek the Lord, one young man ran from his seat to the altar and cried aloud for mercy, and it did not take long for him to find peace and pardon at Jesus' feet. Others followed, and we know there was great joy both here and among the angels of God. One young man, such a slave to drink, has been wonderfully saved, and although he could not read, he is now learning and making good progress; he is full of joy and gladness; he says he wants all to know what the Lord has done for him, he has asked to be baptized and says he wants to go all the way with Jesus.

"Another young man, also recently converted, when he heard the former ask for baptism, saw that he was not living up to his privileges and was not obeying God as he should. A few days later, as we visited at his home, he told us he could not sleep all night because he had not obeyed God. He has now asked to be baptized and others are following, praise God.

"One sister, in her testimony said the other night, she has to weep at times now when she thinks of the time when she was in such awful darkness, and now knows and enjoys the Gospel of Jesus Christ.

"New people are coming to the meetings right along, and we are looking to God for their salvation. God is blessing the work of the Sunday School. He has given us some good teachers, and all scholars show deep interest in the lessons, also in the Bible questions which are given from Sunday to Sunday. This week they are learning all the names of the Books of the Bible by memory. Some have answered most of the questions that Brother Brunner has put in the "Eastern Gospel Banner." Of course not in English, but in Spanish. There has been much talk of enlarging the chapel, so as to have more room for the Sunday School. The children are asking for prayer; they want to serve the Lord. Beloved, pray for us and the work, we as never before long to see real Bible salvation preached and lived in these dreadful days of lukewarmness and formality and when it often seems to us that the enemy is doing all in his power to destroy and devour. But God is able to save and keep, and do exceeding abundant above all that we ask and think. Praise His name evermore!"

Sister LeFevre is still located at Valdivia, having charge of the mission there and also of the printing plant.

The Alliance Mission in Chile prints a very interesting little paper called the *Chile Missionary Tidings*, of which Miss LeFevre is the editor and publisher. She also prints thousands of tracts in Spanish. "According to the new postal regulations in Chile," she writes, "the postage on all foreign correspondence has been doubled; we now have to pay 40 cents, Chilean money, on each letter to the homeland.

"The past year has been one of some trials and testings for the Valdivia Church, 'but God' has been faithfully caring for His own and blessing His work. It has been a time of reconstructing and through faith and prayer victories have been won and encouragements have taken the place of discouragements but there are still needs that keep them much in prayer. There is a good interest in the meetings and the attendance in the Sunday School by actual count has just doubled.

"Quite a number have been baptized in Valdivia during the year. Most of them are young people and we praise the Lord for these lives which have been given to Him.

"The Directory for the new year was elected the last night of the old year, also seven young men of the church were newly-appointed as exhorters to work with some others who were already in the work. It is especially encouraging to see how these young men, some of them yet in their teens, have consecrated themselves to the Lord and His service. They are earnest in Bible study and faithful in all the services of the church, and workers in the Sunday School and in the evenings and on Sundays when their time is not occupied in the chapel, they go out two by two to the different parts of the city and surrounding country preaching the Gospel in the open air or in the homes of the people where they can find an open door and distributing tracts. They are all young men who are employed during the day and have not much opportunity for study but they are glad to witness for the Master who has saved them. We wish our readers could know them personally and we know you would love them. Some one would be glad for a course in a Bible School and we feel the Lord would have some consecrate their lives to His service. Hold them up in prayer that they may be kept humble and faithful and grow in grace and the knowledge of the Lord and be real soul-winners for Him.

"During the middle of January the workers gathered for a week's Bible Conference in Ran Bueno. The chapel was filled to overflowing daily. The last evening the altar was filled with those seeking salvation and victory in the Lord.

"Rio Bueno is a town of about three thousand inhabitants and the surrounding country is well populated.

"Our mission has had a regular work established there for about fifteen years and we have a chapel there with living rooms for a pastor, but because of lack of workers for the past few years there has been no pastor stationed there, and it has only had occasional visits from the pastor in La Union, a town quite a distance away, and as Rio Bueno has no railroad connection it is not so easily reached for regular visits by workers from other stations.

"Our members in Rio Bueno generously entertained the Conference and gladly did all they could for the visiting workers and manifested their hearty appreciation of the Conference and glad fellowship with the workers and are desirous that souls be saved and believers edified in their town and gather regularly for meetings even though there is no pastor. At the close

of the Conference they made an earnest and definite appeal that a regular worker be stationed in Rio Bueno. The Christians there feel the need of it and there is a large population lost in sin and spiritual darkness and needing the Gospel. There is not even a regular Sunday School in the town. They should really have a pastor, but the only answer that could be given to their request was that the Committee would consider the matter and do what they can to help them. But our workers are scarce and there are more open doors than there are workers to enter them, so it seems they will have to wait a little longer and in the meantime precious souls for whom Jesus died are passing into a Christless eternity.

"Dare we be indifferent to this call for help? Are there none to answer, 'Lord, here am I, send me'? 'The fields are white unto harvest but the laborers are few.' And there are other needy places in this country where there are hungry hearts calling for help. If you cannot go you can be an intercessory missionary. 'Pray ye the Lord of the harvest that He would thrust forth laborers into His vineyard'."

A Conference at Villa Rica.

"In the homeland," writes Sister LeFevre, "often the great event of the year for many earnest Christians is an annual camp meeting. It is sometimes looked forward to with earnest prayers and interest for weeks or months before. And some who have gone to the "regions beyond' love to think back over some blessed days spent at some camp meeting in the woods when the Lord blessedly met them, and possibly they may be tempted at times to feel a little homesick for another such spiritual feast.

"Here in Chile we have not yet arrived at a real camp meeting, but we praise God for a little foretaste of such a happy occasion. The first week of October we held our Semi-Annual Bible Conference at Nuble, about fifteen miles back from the railroad at Loncoche, and it was in some respects novel and different from other Conferences.

"This district of our mission field is in charge of two of our native pastors, Brothers Riveros and Higuera, who work among a scattered population in a country district between Loncoche and Villa Rica. One of them has about nine regular preaching places and the other six. Much of their time must be spent on horseback traveling over rough mountain roads in order to fulfill their many duties. By their ceaseless labors they have won many for the Lord whose hearts are aglow with love and zeal and it was a real joy and inspiration to spend a few days among them.

"The Conference began on Thursday and so Wednesday was a day of travel for the workers. After a trip on the train we arrived at Loncoche where a number of well-saddled horses awaited us. All were soon mounted and started off eastward towards the mountains where the grand snow-capped Villa Rica volcano arose in the distance. The roads went up hill and down, over streams and through woods, and in some places were not so bad but most of the way were very rough and sometimes with mud up to the horses' bodies, and often steep and full of deep gullies but our horses were plucky and surefooted. Sometimes the roads were so bad that we turned aside through fields or woods, but ours was a happy, cheerful group of travelers even though a drizzling rain accompanied us part of the way.

"After four hours of horseback riding we reached our destination about dark. Usually our headquarters for a Conference is a chapel and a pastor's or missionary's home, but here we found new conditions awaiting us. All the workers of the Conference were entertained by a good brother in the country. His large country home, although not yet completed was generously given over to the Conference. The best rooms were fixed up for comfortable bedrooms; a large hall had boards put in for seats and was arranged for a chapel. Our kind host and hostess worked hard, early and late, to serve their many guests. Not only was the 'fatted calf' brought forth, a full-grown one at that, but sheep, hog and poultry were generously sacrificed in honor of the Conference visitors who fared sumptuously every day. The young people of the neighborhood gathered and gladly helped at serving tables or in any way they could. From the very beginning we felt welcome and at home and the whole plantation was put at our disposition.

"At first it seemed such a lonely out-of-the-way place to have meetings and as we looked around over the hills and woods one might wonder where enough people would come from to have a meeting; there was no town for miles around, no trolleys nor coaches and only a few farm houses scattered over the hills, yet we never had a Bible Conference with better attendance and interest throughout than in this clearing in the woods in camp meeting style. The people came from miles around on foot or horseback, some coming a distance of thirty miles. They came for the morning meetings and stayed all day and heartily enjoyed all the services, sometimes until near midnight; then they retired to a nearby house where they often continued singing and praying. Many slept just on the floors or boards without bedding. Whole families came long distances, mothers carrying babies and little children running along. They did not bring much food for themselves, some only a small bag of toasted wheat flour which they mixed with water to eat. They had such a keen appetite for spiritual food that they thought little of material things.

"The day sessions were occupied with Bible studies, and papers on different phases of Christian work were read and discussed. The evenings were given to evangelistic services. There was such a sweet responsiveness among these humble country people and we felt the ground had been prepared by faithful prayer, so that the seed sown fell in good ground and readily sprang up, and souls were saved and hearts filled with joy and blessing. Then the testimony meetings were times of praise and rejoicing. The people had real testimonies for they came into vital touch with the Lord who had done great and mighty things for them. They joyfully testified to salvation, deliverance from vices and the power of sin and liberty from the bondage of image worship and penances of the Roman Catholic Church; they testified to healings

and to the glorious hope of soon meeting the Lord in the air. Also there were little groups between services, sometimes out on the hills or surrounding woods when hearts were poured out in supplication and praise.

"But Sunday was the great day of the feast and early in the day the people came marching up in a procession singing hymns. We were favored with a beautiful day and it was soon evident that the people could not near all get into the house. So in a sawmill nearby that belonged to our host, boards were arranged for seats and the afternoon meeting was held there in the open air. Between three and four hundred people gathered. The beginning of the afternoon was devoted to a short memorial service for our dear Brother Jacobsen who in July went home to be with the Lord. Later we had a baptismal service at the river near by, when five persons consecrated themselves to the Lord and publicly confessed their faith by baptism. A large crowd witnessed the impressive service and several of the brethren spoke.

"Words are not adequate to describe the blessings of those Conference days, the spiritual hunger and earnestness of these humble, sincere people that live away in the country and have so few advantages. Only about once a month can their pastor give them a regular preaching service. At present they have no chapel but they are preparing to build one. As we think of their fervent prayers, hungry hearts and loving gratitude, we know that it surely was worth any sacrifice it may have cost to win them for the Lord, and we wish it were possible for the dear ones in the homeland to really see and know them as they are, and you would not ask, 'Does missionary work pay'?"

"In this land there are many other country districts with thousands of lost souls who have not yet heard the message of salvation because there are none to go and tell. They too might be singing praises to the Lord if they only knew. We trust you will remember them in prayer."

Mrs. Nettie Meier.

Mrs. Nettie Meier, stationed at Valdivia, Chile, was also accepted by our Board. Having had a little money when she came to Chile she supported herself up to this time. In a letter dated July 29th, 1920, she writes:

"When Brother Zook returned from the States in April he brought me the very surprising, but agreeable news that the Mennonite Brethren in Christ had undertaken my support. Last week I received my first allowance, thanks to your worthy Board, and I am now writing to express my heartfelt gratitude. I really count it such a privilege to be adopted into the Mennonite family, and am looking to God that He may bless every giver a hundred fold in spiritual blessings. I hope to be the very best investment you have, by God's help. I take this as another token of His love.

"I could not begin to tell how good He has been to me ever since I came to Chile. I count it such a joy to be His child, such a privilege to be called and chosen as His servant.

"The splendid literature that you folks send out has been coming for several months now. This is another cause for gratitude to God and your people for it has been a great blessing to me to read the good articles. The children's papers provide me with good articles for my Children's Class that meets every Wednesday afternoon.

"Our Sunday School is flourishing and our Spanish meetings are well attended in all kinds of weather. Victoria has always been looked upon as a hopeless place but God has honored our faith and humble efforts and eternity alone will tell how much good really has been done.

"Believe me, I am truly grateful to you and the body of people you represent. I covet your earnest prayers for a continual ingathering of souls and the perfecting of the believers here. If not before, we shall know each other when Jesus comes to gather us home."

China.

The missionaries supported by our Board are all located in Kansu Province in Western China, on the borders of Tibet. As one of their stations, the Lelacheur Memorial Station, formerly Ru-pa monastery, is located within Tibet and many Tibetans live in the Chinese border towns our missionaries have many opportunities to bring the Gospel to these poor benighted heathen. Besides many special opportunities during the great market, trading and fair seasons when many Tibetans come to the border towns to trade.

Rev. and Mrs. Wm. Christie are living at Titao. As Brother Christie is the Chairman of the Executive Committee of the West China Mission and has to spend much time travelling through the Province holding Foreign and Native Conferences, Rev. and Mrs. Mosely are also stationed at this place.

In one of his letters Brother Christie writes:

"We receive the Eastern Gospel Banner, Gospel Herald, Christian Life Missionary regularly. Some copies however,, got lost in the mail, probably through the rebellion in the province of Shensi, east of us, but this cannot be helped. We also get the Christian Life Teacher's Quarterly. This comes

about a month after the beginning of the quarter but we are glad for the helps for the two months of the quarter. We send our warm thanks to you and the Board for all these presents. We assure you, we all appreciate good reading matter out here.

"We rejoice to hear that you are still adding more missionaries to support. May the Lord make this the means of great blessing to those who give for

their support.

"I wish the Lord would send out some of the fine strong young men from your Conference. Men who have been fully conquered by Jesus, tested and approved. O for men who wholly follow the Lord and permit the Holy Spirit to use them.

"Pray for me. I shall have to be on the go from the end of April up to the end of August, visiting stations, holding conferences and Committee meetings. The Lord is blessing and prospering the work."

The Lord has been greatly using the brethren in this difficult field having added "56 fresh converts during the past year." However, the "Assemblies of God," whose leaders have received their experience, training and language through and at the expense of the Alliance mission, have, through their strenuous efforts, succeeded in leading astray quite a number of the members of the Kansu Mission, trying to locate as near to the Alliance missions as possible and build up their work from the members of the Alliance stations instead of saving souls from heathen darkness and superstition. Relative to this matter Brother Christie desires us to pray especially.

Rev. and Mrs. C. F. Snyder.

Rev. and Mrs. C. F. Snyder are stationed at Hochow. This is a large city, the centre of a population of over 400,000. It is the centre of Mohammedanism in China, having more Mohammedanism than any other city in China.

Brother Snyder reports that the Lord is blessing the work on their station An Evangelistic Band has traversed the Hochow District three times during the past three years. They have made ten tours reaching 37 market towns and 841 villages, held 1398 preaching services and dealt personally with 2902 souls of whom 43 made profession of faith in Christ.

As a rule these towns occupied about a month at a time after which the workers spent some time at home for relaxation and rest as the poor food and water, bad, unsanitary, vermin-infested sleeping quarters, etc., demand a change. Concerning one of these tours Brother Snyder says:

"Five or six times preaching in connection with traveling is about the sum total of a day's work—twenty minutes or even longer the time consumed

in delivering one message.

"The people in the different villages are summoned together by the loud blast on an old style Chinese trumpet or on a modern military horn.

"Curiosity is awakened in new places as to the significance of this rumpus, and as the people flock together inquiries are forthcoming what official business this could be—fear is removed when the truth of our mission is made known. Should the town or village be of large size several open air meetings are held—otherwise only once. Subsequent to preaching Scripture portions are offered for sale, or perchance, tracts distributed.

"In this way a good deal of territory has been traversed in the country district of Hochow—to the southwest to the rock range 60 li—from there on the south another 60 li—; to the west to the village of the famous late Moslem general Ma an-liang 120 li; to the north to the limit of Hochow boundary on that side 150 li; to the east till to the banks of the Tao River 100 li.

"Last week I incorporated myself into the ranks of the band and sallied forth into the above last-named region, i. e., the noted Tong-hsiang (east country) where for the greater part the population is Moslem.—

"They are originally Mongols but during the putting down of the Mongols who at one time under the regime of Ganghis Khan over-ran all Asia and a good portion of Europe, by the Chinese and later on an injection of Mohammedanism caused a change here.


"The populace of Tong-hsiang still converse in their native gibberish—those along the main highway know Chinese—while there are many in the remoter places, in particular, women who can not speak in Chinese; thus one finds the anomaly of people in person Mongolians, as also in talk; in religion Mohammedans."

Mrs. C. F. Snyder writes an account of one of their late services:

"Brother Snyder was away to the outstation, 20 miles away, so the services were in charge of the evangelist, Mr. David Nang. It was a full day, with over one hundred children at the Sunday School, more people than our little chapel could accommodate and some were turned away.

"Our Sunday School text was the same one that you are probably now reciting over in America, 'If God so loved us, we also ought to love one another.'

"The women in attendance were over thirty in number. The morning evangelistic service brought a message about sin and its consequences. This message was given by our bookseller who does not very often preach from the pulpit. He is an ex-soldier, and though he would not be counted among the wise, his message came from the heart.

"One woman who has been in some trouble and who looked ill, came into the service for the first time. On her back was sewed a piece of red cloth with some characters written upon it and on each shoulder two little pieces of cloth were also attached. This was supposed to be helpful for her sickness. She arose in the meeting to confess the Lord, and in an after service we had prayer with her. I told her she should take the pieces off her dress. And so during the next meeting she pulled off her outside garment and began ripping them off, even though it was meeting. I said nothing, but thought, let the good work go on. She said, 'Now I believe.' Anyway she went away with a simple catechism and a large Gospel Poster to put up on her walls in her home. Oh, that Jesus Christ might be born in many of these hearts!

"The Chinese New Year's days are now at a close and things will go on in their normal condition again. Fire crackers and the beating of drums has been the order of day and night for the last two weeks. The night of the 'Lantern Festival,' the street was crowded with people and the chapel was opened and there was preaching until ten o'clock.

"Continue to pray for us that the Word of God may run and that God may yet give us a time of great soul-gathering here.

"When we saw all the idolatrous worship during these New Year's days, we could not help but say—'But His hand is stretched out still.' One wonders at His love and mercy; 'How unsearchable are His judgments and His ways past finding out!'

"Some one has said, 'It is when we begin, continue and end our work at the Master's feet, that our service will be of the right kind'."

Brother and Sister Snyder expected to leave Hochow about the middle of September, sailing from Shanghai on the first week of November for the homeland on furlough. Their permanent address during their furlough will be care of T. H. Brenneman, 122 Crescent St., Goshen, Ind.

Palestine.


Rev. E. O. Jago.

Brother Jago after having spent a short time in America on business returned to Palestine, sailing from New York, November 6th, 1919. Writing on the steamer as they were approaching Naples, dated November 19th, he says:

"I have been quite sick upon the voyage . . . For awhile it was quite serious, days in bed with pain, but am feeling quite a little better now. Pray for us. I came aboard worn out and should really be beginning my furlough

rather than starting for the field. But Cod is able to make all grace abound and to those that have no might he increaseth or giveth strength. I yet look with delight upon my visit at Mizpah Grove Camp Meeting and meeting with the brethren. I loved them from the very first and felt that they took me right into their hearts and love. Am reading your paper, the Eastern Gospel Banner today; a fine paper. God bless you all, brethren. Had a very rough voyage, two men lost overboard, one at the beginning and one day before yesterday."

From later reports from Brother Jago we learn the work at Jerusalem and Beer-sheba is going on with splendid opportunities and bright prospects. Brother Jago hopes very soon to open work in a Moslem village called Sittawf, two and a half hours walk from Jerusalem. He says, "I have secured a copy of a photograph of the plans of a great new Jewish Temple which the Jews hope to have erected within two years. Is this the temple in which the Anti-Christ is to sit?" Is not this significant?

Not quite finished.

"The British Mandate over Palestine was confirmed by the Allied Supreme Council at its recent San Remo meeting. The Military Government, therefore, gave place on July 1st to a Civil Administration with the Hon. Herbert Samuels as Governor, with his headquarters in the palace built by the German Kaiser on Mount Scopus. As he is a Jew, there is considerable feeling of resentment among the Moslem and Oriental Christian sections of the population, which are bitterly opposed to Jewish control. Several outbreaks have taken place, and the whole situation is very unsettled and calls for earnest prayer.


Miss Mary A. Butterfield.

In a recent letter dated March 15th from Miss Mary A. Butterfield, one of our representatives in Jerusalem she writes:

"I have so many things to thank you for—the papers, the calendar, the diary and your Foreign Missionary report. I appreciate them all but more especially the thought behind them. . . God has been answering prayers, but there is yet much land ahead to be possessed. Our church and Sunday

School are well attended. The day school has about 100 under Mrs. Jago with three teachers who teach them God's Word as well as secular studies. It would do you good to hear them repeating whole chapters of the Bible and singing hymns. The Boy's school is doing well under the management of Miss Best and Mrs. Clark. The Lord is working in the hearts of these boys. They sometimes make open confessions in evening prayers. Some have come forward to the altar in the church also and have confessed Christ as their Saviour . . Miss Parsons expects soon to go to Beersheba and reopen the work there. Mr. Jago and Mr. Payne will go on ahead and have some meetings there. The people are waiting expectantly for the work to open up again."

The Arabs have declared Prince Feisel as king of Damascus, laying claim to all of Syria, Palestine and the country beyond the Jordan from the Euphrates to the Red Sea. The Allies as well as the Jews will naturally oppose this Mohammedan advance while some are opposed to all European dictatorship.

Miss Butterfield urges us to pray for the work in Palestine, the salvation of souls, especially of the young people.

She left Palestine May 1st for her furlough, extremely weary in body and mind, needing a complete rest. The only way for her to get away was on a U. S. Army transport via the Philippines and the Pacific.

The latest reports say: "We have been seeing definite decisions for Christ at our Sunday night services in the church, including Jews, Moslems and Oriental Christians and a number of young men are anxious to get out with the Gospel message to the villages of Palestine and Moab."

Conclusion.

Before we submit our annual financial statement We wish to thank all our pastors and officers as well as the members of our various congregations and Sunday Schools for the interest they have continued to manifest and the noble offerings they have given toward this great work. We also desire to thank our many friends not connected with our work, some unknown by face to us who have helped, some giving hundreds of dollars, in order that the Gospel might be carried to the "regions beyond," in order that the coming of our Lord and Saviour Jesus Christ might be hastened.

The rates of transportation on ocean steamships have increased enormously since the beginning of the war, but until of late missionaries could obtain special rates. These special rates for missionaries have, however, been withdrawn and yet are granted to members of the Diplomatic and Consular service and other government officials. The Committee of Reference and Counsel of the Foreign Missions Conference of North America is endeavoring to secure a re-establishment of these reduced rates.

EVENING SERVICE

The evening service was opened by the Pastor, H. K. Kratz, at 7:30 o'clock, with an inspiring song service, followed with a stirring sermon on "What Constitutes Separation from the World?" by Pastor C. H. Brunner, of Allentown, Pa. 

XIX. Conference Report.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE APPOINTED TO COMPILE A REPORT OF THE CONFERENCE AND SUNDAY SERVICES FOR THE EASTERN GOSPEL BANNER.

The Thirty-Seventh Session of the Annual Conference of the Mennonite Brethren in Christ of Pennsylvania convened in Ebenezer Church, Main and Durham Streets, Bethlehem, Pa., September 23–27, 1920.

All the active Ministers and all the Delegates were present at the opening of the first meeting.

The Conference opened with the presence of God in evidence. Very good and encouraging reports were given by both the Pastors and Presiding Elders Sacrifices were made along many lines, and a holy zeal was shown as is evidenced by the results seen in their labors. A healthy progress was noticeable along various lines. The finances are excellent, the missionary offerings being twenty-six percent higher than last year. The statistics have also increased.

The spiritual end of the work is gratifying, as we behold both young and old enjoying themselves in the services of the Lord and purifying themselves for the Coming of Christ.

The lines of separation are still very noticeable among us as a body of believers and we trust that this distinction may be preserved among us.

On the various charges the Pastors report large congregations composed of members and friends of the work. The prayer-meetings are largely attended; the open-air services are influencing many and the missionary prayer-meetings result in much fruit.

Many were saved, baptized, sanctified and healed during the year. The church buildings are too small to accommodate the people comfortably in a number of places.

A large and commodious church building was completed and dedicated during the year at Main and Durham Streets, Bethlehem, Pa., at a cost of nearly thirty-seven thousand dollars. The seating capacity is about eleven hundred. The building is nicely arranged, having a large main auditorium, a prayer-meeting room, a Sunday School room, and two balconies. There is also a large and nicely arranged basement well adapted to serve refreshments for special occasions.

The Gospel Herald Society and Gospel Workers' Society of which Elders W. G. Gehman and W. B. Musselman, respectively, are the Presidents, are

doing a great and noble work along home missionary lines both in conducting services in Missions and selling literature from house to house.

The Sunday School work is making progress along the various lines; the fruit is seen in the conversion of a number of children. The Sunday School literature of the "Christian Life Series" is being used throughout the schools.

The Home Department is increasing in numbers and influence, people being reached in this manner and brought into the churches.

The Foreign Missionary work is ever widening out; a few new missionaries were accepted during the year. The total number being twenty-six. Their reports were very encouraging, showing the results of the Gospel in the salvation of a large number on the various fields.

N. H. Wolf, A. G. Woodring and W. F. Heffner were ordained to the Ministry.

The different offerings were much higher than last year. The Home and Foreign Missionary money amounted to \$35,291.99. The total offerings for all purposes collected during the year amounted to \$165,647.61, or \$78.44 per member.

H. B. Mussselman and W. G. Gehman were re-elected Presiding Elders; C. H. Brunner and B. Bryan Musselman, Vice-Presiding Elders; H. B. Musselman was elected Chairman of the next Annual Conference; C. H. Brunner, Secretary, and Allen M. Gehman, Treasurer.

Pastor W. S. Hottel was granted his request to put in the balance of his time in general missionary work after the editing of the "Christian Life Series" of Sunday School quarterlies.

The Conference was owned by the Lord, the deliberations were clear and satisfactory. There was a spirit of unity prevailing throughout and the decisions were whole-heartedly accepted by the Pastors and the Delegates who represent the various classes.

There were seven delegates elected, four from among the Ministry and three from among the laity, the Presiding Elders going by virtue of their offices, to be sent to the General Conference to convene at Kitchener, Ontario, Canada, October 13, 1920.

The evening services were well attended and the addresses were of a spiritual and instructive nature. The services were owned by the Lord.
