

# IN MEMORIAM



Pastor Ernest B. Hartman

Rev. Ernest B. Hartman was born May 17, 1905 at Royersford, Pa. He was one of four sons that were born to Ellsworth and Nora (nee Weidner) Hartman, all of whom responded to the call of God and entered the ministry of the Bible Fellowship Church.

Herbert W. died September 9, 1957 while serving Bethany Church at Mount Carmel. Ernest B. died August 25, 1968, while serving the church at Sinking Spring; Jansen E. is President of Berean Bible School; Wilbur W. is Pastor of Calvary Church, Shamokin, Pa.

His wife, Esther J. survies him, also one son James, one daughter Janet and two grandchildren.

After attending grade school and high school in Royersford, he was employed as a knitter at the Spring City Knitting Mills.

On August 13, 1924 he entered the Gospel Herald Society and labored for the Lord at Harrisburg, Pa., Newark, N.J. and Jersey City, and Chester, Pa. Brother Hartman was licensed by Annual Conference in 1927 and ordained in 1926.

While serving the Chester, Pa., appointment, the church was organized with Ernest as the Pastor. Other appointments served were: Philadelphia, Calvary (1941-1948); Scranton (1948-1952; Graterford-Harleysville circuit (1952-1959); Zionsville (1959-1967). He accepted a call to pastor the Church at Sinking Spring, Pa. beginning his ministry there on Sunday, October 15, 1967. After a brief ministry of about ten months, he was stricken with a serious illness and went to be with the Lord on August 25, 1968.

Brother Hartman was a dedicated servant of the Lord; his loyalty and sincerity could not be questioned. He was loved and respected by all whom he ministered.

The influences and fragrance of his life remains a precious memory to those who were privileged to know and labor with him. For him, the race is run, and his the rest after toil and labor.

# Business Rules of the Conference

- 1. Two sessions shall be held daily as follows: From 9:00 a.m. to 12:00 noon and from 1:30 p.m. to 5:00 p.m.
- 2. The Chairman shall take his seat precisely at the time to which the Conference is to convene, open and conduct the devotional exercises. The Secretary shall call the roll and read the minutes of the preceding session, after which business shall proceed as follows:
  - (a) Committee Reports, (b) Petitions, (c) Unfinished Business, (d) Miscellaneous Business
- 3. Anyone wishing to speak shall rise and respectfully address the chair. In case more than one should address the chair at the same time, the Chairman shall decide who is entitled to the floor.
- 4. No one shall be allowed to speak more than ten minutes on any subject unless he receives permission by the Chair.
- 5. No one shall speak the second time until all who desire have spoken. He shall then ask permission by the Chair.
  - 6. It shall be the duty of the Chairman to preserve order.
- 7. A Resolution to be effective must appear on the Minutes of the current year's proceedings. Said Resolution must appear on the Minutes for at least three successive years before it can be placed in the Standing Rules of the Conference.
- 8. Robert's Rules of Order is the basis for our parliamentary procedure.
- 9. Two copies of the Reports of all Standing Boards and Committees shall be mimeographed and sent to the Pastors one week previous to Annual Conference. Questions may be asked and corrections made before inclusion into the Annual Conference minutes. Reports shall not be read publicly, unless called for from the Conference floor.
- 10. Any exception to the Standing Rules may be allowed by three-fourth (3/4) of the Annual Conference. The reason for such exception shall be fully spread on the Minutes.
- 11. All proposals to amend our  $\,$  FAITH & ORDER must pass reading at two Annual Conferences by a two-third vote by ballot before final adoption.
- 12. The District Superintendent and the delegates of all Stations and Circuits shall constitute the Stationing and Appropriat-

ing Committee. The Annual Conference may grant the status of a Station to a Mission Church which has contributed a minimum of \$4,500.00 to the Pastor and has petitioned Annual Conference requesting the change declaring that it no longer desires Church Extension appropriation.

If a Station fails to contribute \$4,500.00 to the Pastor, it shall forfeit its voice in the Stationing and Appropriating Committee.

The Stationing and Appropriating Committee shall have the right to revise the above amount annually.

13. At the Adjourned Session of the Annual Conference, a Nominating Committee shall be elected, composed of four ordained ministers and three laymen, to present nominees for the elections of the following year's Annual Conference.

 $\underline{\text{Year Books}}$  -- The Secretary of the Annual Conference shall be Editor and Publisher of the Year Book. The official minutes of the Annual Conference shall be published therein.

The Secretary of the Annual Conference shall send Year Books to the Eastern and Western Clergy Bureaus and to any other agencies deemed advisable.

The Church shall be responsible to pay for Year Books within one week after receiving them.

In case a church or parsonage is built or purchased during the year, a photograph of the same shall be taken and a cut inserted in the Year Book next year.

# By - Laws

(Special Laws and Resolutions)

Members of the Annual Conference shall be as follows:

- l. All ordained ministers of the Bible Fellowship Church laboring under the direction of the Annual Conference.
- 2. All Probationers who have charge of a Conference appointment under the direction of the Annual Conference.
  - 3. All retired ministers of the Bible Fellowship Church.
- 4. Lay delegate(s) from each Church or Circuit as provided by the FAITH & ORDER

Advisory members of the Annual Conference shall be as follows:
1. Ordained ministers of the Bible Fellowship Church who retain their membership in one of our local Churches, and who are engaged in Christian service not directly responsible to our Annual Conference.

- 2. Church Extension Pastors
- 3. Missionaries who hold membership in one of our Local Churches and are under the supervision of the Board of Foreign Missions of the Bible Fellowship Church.
- 4. Advisory members shall not be permitted to participate in Conference discussions except by request of the Chairman.

### APPLICANTS AND PROBATIONERS

A. No applicant for the ministry shall be received into the

Conference as a Probationer who is not willing to submit himself unconditionally to the Stationing and Appropriating Committee.

B. No Probationer shall be ordained who is not fully in accord with our doctrine, with the itinerant plan, and submission to the Conference.

### LCOAL CONFERENCE RULES

- A. Each Pastor shall see that the Summary Financial Reports are correctly compiled and appended to the proceedings of the last Local Conference of the current year.
- B. No person shall be elected to the office of Deacon, Class Leader or Sunday School Superintendent who uses or deals in tobacco.
- C. The Local Conference accounts of the Stewards shall be from quarter to quarter, and the reports on the Schedules from October 1 to September 30. In case a Pastor is changed, his allowances shall end with the month of September. The Pastors shall report the amounts received from the Church Extension Fund at the Local Conference.
- D. In case a Local Conference desires to sell church property, they must receive the approval of the Board of Directors before conveying title.

### BOARDS AND COMMITTEES

The following Boards and Committees shall, as soon as practicable after their election, elect a President and Secretary: Board of Directors, Board of Foreign Missions, Board of Church Extension, Board of Victory Valley, Board of Mizpah Grove, Committee on Publication & Printing and Sunday School Promotion Committee.

The Annual Conference shall elect a Treasurer annually who shall be the Treasurer for the Board of Directors, Board of Foreign Missions, Board of Church Extension, Board of Victory Valley, Board of Mizpah Grove, Committee on Publication and Printing and Sunday School Promotion Committee.

The Treasurer shall keep an account of the amounts drawn by each Board in a book furnished by the Annual Conference and report

to the Annual Conference the standing of each fund, and furnish each member of the Board of Directors annually with a statement itemizing the various securities held and the monies on deposit in banks and trust companies.

All Boards and Standing Committees shall submit a full and classified report of their work, financial and otherwise, to the Annual Conference. They shall hold meetings annually or more often.

Board of Directors -- The Annual Conference shall elect a Board of Directors annually consisting of five ordained ministers who are members of the Annual Conference and willing to minister under the direction of our Conference, the FAITH & ORDER and the By-Laws of the Corporation, and four laymen in good standing with their Local Conference, which Board shall then organize by electing the following officers: President, Vice-President, Secretary and Treasurer.

The Board of Directors shall transact all the business of the Corporation which was previously taken care of by the Executive Board for the Annual Conference.

All vacancies occurring between Annual Conference sessions shall be filled by the remainding members of the Board.

The Board of Directors shall have charge of all the property belonging to the Corporation including property now held by the Executive Board in trust for the Annual Conference of the Bible Fellowship Church, except where there is a regularly organized class or church that has a local Board of Trustees and where the Annual Conference has otherwise provided for, by electing a separate Board of Trustees.

The Board of Directors shall determine how and where the money of the Corporation shall be deposited, and also have the right to place it on certificate of deposit, or savings deposit, or make other substantial investments.

The Board of Directors shall not buy nor sell any property except by the approval of all the members of the Board or by Annual Conference resolution.

The Board of Directors shall have the authority to sell any property deeded to a local Board of Trustees at places where for any reason there is no longer a local Board, or class, or organized church, and execute and deliver a lawful deed and conveyance, and use the net proceeds of the sale of such property for other church properties as it may deem advisable.

The Board of Directors shall have the right to borrow money and issue mortgages or make loans against any property of the Corporation by the approval of all the members of the Board, or by Annual Conference resolution. The Board shall also authorize the satis-

faction and cancellation of any mortgages as notes fully paid.

It shall have charge of all the old Local Conference records, class records, and all other records that are no longer needed by the various classes, boards or committees.

It shall act as a Board of Advisors to the Pastors and the Board of Church Extension in matters relative to the purchasing of properties for church purposes and the erection of churches and parsonages.

The title to Church property where the Church is incorporated shall be conveyed directly to the Corporation. In cases where the Church is not incorporated the conveyance shall be made to a Board of Trustees duly elected according to the Rules of the Annual Conference (setting forth their names), their successors and assigns. Whether the title is conveyed to a corporation or to a Board of Trustees, said title shall contain a trust clause in the following words:

The title to parsonages shall be conveyed in like manner as the churches and shall contain the following clause of trust:

In trust, that said premises shall be kept, maintained and disposed of as a place of residence for the use and occupancy of the preachers of the Bible Fellowship Church who are from time to time duly appointed in said place according to the rules and usages of said church, and if sold, the proceeds to be used according to the rules of said church. If the congregation controlling this property shall be disbanded the property shall be controlled and disposed of according to the rules of the Bible Fellowship Church.

Board of Foreign Missions -- A General Secretary shall be elected annually by ballot by the Annual Conference from among the ordained ministers. By virtue of his office he shall be a member of the Board of Foreign Missions. The Board of Foreign Missions shall be composed of the District Superintendent, General Secretary, three ordained ministers and four laymen. All money contributed throughout the Conference for the cause of Foreign Missions shall be paid into the Annual Conference treasury. They shall disburse the funds that they receive for the spread of the Gospel in heathen lands according as they deem good and proper.

Each Pastor shall hold a Foreign Missionary Service at each appointment annually soon after Annual Conference and speak on foreign missions. At this service a subscription for Foreign Missions shall be taken to be collected before February 1.

The members of the church shall be respectfully recommended to forward their funds for the foreign missionaries through the Board of Foreign Missions and not to the missionaries directly, which would lessen or cause to neglect their contributions in the direct channel provided by Conference for the support pledged to our respective missionaries.

The Pastor shall see that the Superintendent of each Sunday School appoint a "Missionary Day" semi-annually. In this service the necessity of establishing and supporting Foreign Missions shall be impressed upon the minds of the children, and an offering taken for the same.

The Women's Missionary Societies that have been or may be organized in our churches shall be recognized by and report to the Local Conference.

 $\frac{\text{Publication and Printing}}{\text{ministers as a Committee}} \ \text{or Publication}$  and Printing. This Committee shall have charge of the Publication and Printing Fund.

The Annual Conference shall supply class books, steward books, parsonage fund collector's books, trustee books, and all other account books for the different charges to be paid out of the Publication and Printing Fund. All expenses of materials used by the Secretary of the Annual Conference shall be paid by this Fund.

All expenses of committees of investigation, appointed by the District Superintendent, shall be paid out of the Publication and Printing Fund.

Ministers' Retirement Fund -- This shall be a permanent Fund for the benefit of retired ministers of the Bible Fellowship Church.

The object of this Fund shall be to provide and pay annuities to itinerant ministers of the Bible Fellowship Church who by reason of age are no longer qualified to continue in active service; also to provide and pay annuities to the widows of such itinerant ministers according to the rules hereinafter stated.

The Fund shall be sustained by -- First, from the Annual Conference Administrative Budget.

Second, each Pastor shall pay into this Fund from his salary and from his Church Extension appropriation and each District Superintendent from his salary as follows: one percent of the first thousand dollars or fraction thereof,  $1\frac{1}{2}$  percent of the second

thousand dollars and above. Payments shall be made at the Adjourned Session and at the Annual Conference.

Third this Fundwill also welcome gifts, bequests and devises from any sources.

This Retirement Fund shall be deposited with the Treasurer as a separate account and be under the management and control of the Board of Directors of the Annual Conference.

Annuities -- First -- If a minister of the Bible Fellowship Church has attained the age of sixty-five (65) he may retire from the active ministry and dating from the time he received Annual Conference license he shall receive an annuity of thirty dollars and eighty cents (\$30.80) for each year of active service payable in monthly installments.

Second -- The retirement age for District Superintendent and Pastors is established at 72 years.

Third -- Services rendered after the age of seventy-two years shall in no case increase the Annuity. Annuities shall in no case exceed twelve hundred thirty-two dollars per year. If, however, the money in the Retirement Fund at any time should not warrant the payment of the Annuities in full, the Board of Directors shall determine the amount of the monthly installments pro rata.

Fourth -- No minister shall be entitled to the full amount of the Annuities unless he and the congregations that he served shall have paid in full as stipulated in paragraph one, two and three for the period of five years. No exceptions to this rule may be made except by the decision of the Board of Directors.

Fifth -- In case a minister is located by the Annual Conference he ceases to be a member of the Retirement Fund. In this case one-half of the dues he had paid into the Fund shall be refunded to him and he thereby forfeits all further claims upon the Fund. A minister who has given thirty years or more service and desires to change his occupation and be placed on the Local Preachers list shall become an annuitant at the age of seventy years, and receive an annuity for the years of actual service.

Sixth -- Widows of deceased ministers who had complied with the provisions of the fund shall receive annuities beginning at the time of the death of the husband provided that the said widow shall have attained the age of sixty-five years or at the time that she shall attain the age of sixty-five years, and continue until the time of her death or remarriage or her severance from church membership of the Bible Fellowship Church. Widows of ministers who were retired and receiving annuities at the time of the marriage shall in no case receive any annuity. Widows' annuities shall be compiled at the rate of \$15.40 for each year that she was the wife of a minister who was in active service, giving his whole time to

ministry in the Church, but in no case to exceed six hundred sixteen dollars in one year.

The Treasurer shall acknowledge to the various Pastors any contributions which he has received from time to time for this Fund.

### SPECIAL SERVICES

- A. Matrimony -- Each Pastor shall preach a sermon on Matrimony at each appointment on his charge in the first year.
- B. The Lord's Coming -- Believing that the coming of the Lord is rapidly approaching, therefore we recommend our ministers to give still more earnest prominence to this blessed hope of the church as we see the Day approaching.
- C. As the scriptures contain a number of instances where children of Godly parents were formally and publicly dedicated to the Lord, (I Sam. 1:24-28; Mark 10:13-16), we heartily encourage our people to dedicate their children to the Lord by prayer and laying on of the hands of the Elders, who shall then furnish proper certificates.
- D. Class Meetings -- Each Pastor shall hold a class meeting four times a yearin each class, and read the general rules or have them read once a year.

### MISCELLANEOUS

- A. Transfers -- When a good standing member moves from one class to another, his or her name shall be transferred at once.
- B. Each Pastor shall bring an itemized report to the Annual Conference, according to the form of the report of the Financial Secretary.
- C. No charge shall be brought against any Annual Conference member which has not been recorded in the Local Conference proceedings of their charge, except such as have been committed or discovered since the last Local Conference.
- D. Church Extension Funds -- Whenever any District Superintendent desires any money from the Church Extension Fund, he shall inform the Secretary of the desired amount, who shall then take note of the same and forward the request to the Treasurer, who shall forward the same to the District Superintendent, up to the amount appropriated to him at the Annual Conference.
- E. The Pastor, by virtue of his office, shall be counted as an officer of the Sunday School.
- F. Annual Conference Minutes -- The Committee on Examination of Annual Conference Minutes shall carefully compare the Annual Year

Book with the Annual Conference Minutes and note any and all errors, make a copy of any and all corrections, omissions or additions and certify in the following form:

We hereby certify that we have examined the Annual Conference Minutes for the Session of......and found them correct except as follows:....

Two copies of this certificate shall be made and signed by the Committee and pasted into two copies of the Conference Year Book, one to be held by the Chairman of the Annual Conference and one by the Secretary. These shall serve as the Records of the Annual Conference.

- G. The Director of Church Extension shall be recognized as a travelling Elder and is a member of the Board of Church Extension.
- H. The Director of Church Extension shall under all circumstances function in cooperation with the District Superintendent, and in all matters of importance act only by the approval of the Board of Church Extension.
- I. Two copies of the completed work of the Committee on Church Government shall be submitted to each Pastor by the Secretary of the Committee immediately upon completion.
- J. Any Church may use a nominating committee to make nominations for Church officers when this desire is expressed by a Local Conference resolution. The Pastor shall be chairman of this Committee.
- K. The Board of Directors shall receive all Local Conference petitions. The Secretary of the Local Conference shall be responsible to give a copy of the petition(s) to the District Superintendent at the Local Conference where the petition(s) was passed. The Secretary of the Board of Directors shall send two copies to each Pastor.
- L. All needs for support of missionary work not under the jurisdiction of the Board of Church Extension shall be controlled by the Board of Foreign Missions.
- M. The travelling expenses for all official Church business shall be  $8\ensuremath{\lozenge}$  per mile.
- N. Each Church shall establish its own minimum support that it will pay its Pastor. This action shall be by the Official Board at a meeting held no later than November 1. Report of this action shall be made to the local congregation not later than November 15.
- 0. The offering for the Home for the Aging shall be paid at the Adjourned Session.

- P. The Conference Secretary shall inform in writing all men who are not present at Annual Conference of their election to Boards and Committees.

#### ARTICLE X ELECTING AND INSTALLING ELDERS

Every congregation shall elect elders in keeping with the qualifications set forth in Scripture. Elders must be male members in full communion in the church in which they are to exercise their office.

When persons are elected to this office and have declared their willingness to accept its responsibilities, they shall be set apart in the following manner:

In a service of worship, the minister shall state in a concise manner the warrant and nature of the office of elder together with the spiritual qualifications required for its exercise and the duties to be fulfilled. He shall then address to the candidate, in the presence of the congregation, the following questions:

- 1. Do you believe the Scriptures of the Old and New Testament to be the Word of God, the only infallible rules of faith and conduct?
- 2. Do you sincerly receive the FAITHAND ORDER of the Bible Fellowship Church as containing the system of doctrine taught in the Holy Scriptures?
- 3. Do you approve of the government and discipline of the Bible Fellowship Church?
- 4. Do you accept the office of elder in the congregation and promise faithfully to perform all the duties thereof?
- 5. Do you promise to promote the purity, peace and unity of the church?

After the elder-elect has answered these questions in the affirmative, the minister shall address to the members of the church the following questions:

- 1. Do you, the members of this church, acknowledge and receive this brother as an elder?
- 2. Do you promise to yield him all that honor, encouragement and obedience in the Lord, to which his office entitles him?

After the members of the church have answered these questions in the affirmative by holding up their right hands, the minister shall proceed to set apart the candidate by prayer to the office of elder and shall give to him and to the congregation an exhortation suited to the occasion.

The office of elder is perpetual since it involves the gift of God which cannot be laid aside at pleasure. Yet an elder may become by age or infirmity incapable of performing the duties of his office, or he may, though not chargeable with either heresy or immorality, become unacceptable in his official capacity to a majority of the congregation. For any of these reasons an elder may be declared inactive and therefore he shall no longer serve as a member of the Board of Elders.

If any particular church by congregational vote prefers to elect elders for a limited time in the exercise of their functions, this may be done; provided, the full time be not less than three years, and the Board of Elders be made to consist of three classes, one of which shall be elected every year; and provided that elders, once installed, shall continue to be elders, though inactive when they are not re-elected to serve as a member of the Board of Elders.

All active and inactive elders shall subscribe annually to the

FAITH AND ORDER of the Bible Fellowship Church. No person can be divested of this office except by deposition for failure to maintain standards of doctrine and life in keeping with the dignity of this office, but all elders, whether active or inactive, must maintain proper standards.

# ARTICLE XI MINISTERS LABORING IN OTHER CHURCHES OR ORGANIZATIONS

An ordained minister of the Bible Fellowship Church, consistently with his ordination vows and without prejudice to his ministerial standing, may properly under certain circumstances and conditions, labor in churches or organizations other than those of the Bible Fellowship Church.

The following rules must be adhered to in such cases:

- l. Such labor shall not require the performance of functions inconsistent with his ordination vows required of ministers and other provisions of the FAITH AND ORDER of the Bible Fellowship Church.
- 2. They shall not be regarded as under the sole jurisdiction of the organization in which they serve. Such an organization must recognize that those who hold credentials with the Bible Fellowship Church are under its discipline in their faith and life.

# ARTICLE XII THE QUALIFICATIONS FOR THE CHRISTIAN MINISTRY

This material has been approved and appears in the mimeo FAITH AND ORDER, page 19.

#### ARTICLE XIII PROCEDURE FOR RECOGNITION OF A MINISTER

All men who desire to have ministerial credentials with the Bible Fellowship Church shall apply to the Ministerial Candidate Committee. Initial application should be made in writing to the chairman of the Committee; any minister in the denomination can supply the name and address of the current chairman.

Every man who is called to serve as pastor of a Bible Fellow-ship Church must have credentials with the denomination. Men who who serve as supply pastors for an extended period of time shall be required to establish a proper relationship with this Committee.

Men Entering the Ministry. The Ministerial Candidate Committee divides those under its care into three groups: Applicants, Candidates and Probationers. An Applicant is a man who offers himself to this Committee for service in the Bible Fellowship

Church; young men are encouraged to seek this recognition as early in their educational program as they sense the call of God to the ministry. A Candidate is a man whose application is accepted and who remains under the guidance of the Committee; men move to this group when they near the completion of their educational preparation for the ministry. A Probationer is a man who has been approved by this Committee, has passed an examination on the FAITH AND ORDER of the Bible Fellowship Church, and is working in a Bible Fellowship Church or in one of the denominational ministries. After a Probationer has served at least two years, he may be recommended to the Credentials Committee for ordination examination. The minimum period of probationary service may be extended; having served as a Probationer does not guarantee ordination. Internship or field work programs enhance the value of this probationary period when churches and men desire.

Men Received from Other Churches. This material has been approved and appears in mimeo FAITH AND ORDER, page 20 - first four paragraphs.

Ordination. The Bible Fellowship Church understands ordination to the Christian ministry as the laying on of the hands of the elders of the Church accompanied by prayer and is the public recognition by the Church of gifts previously given by God to one called to the ministry of the Word of God. The examination for ordination is conducted by the Credentials Committee of the Bible Fellowship Church. As long as an ordained minister maintains a relationship to this denomination he remains under the care of the Credentials Committee subscribing annually to the FAITH AND ORDER.

#### ARTICLE XIV PULPIT SUPPLY PROCEDURE

### ARTICLE XV AGENCIES OF THE ANNUAL CONFERENCE

The churches individually and as a body recognize their responsibility for the growth of the church in this country and overseas, for the ministry, for education, for camps and conferences, for youth work, for publications, for ministerial pensions and relief and for other appropriate concerns.

The Annual Conference shall establish boards, committees or offices, temporary or permanent, incorporated or unincorporated for the discharge of these responsibilities.

Such agencies shall perform all their acts as the servants of and in accordance with the rules of the Bible Fellowship Church; they shall be accountable to and submit reports to the Annual Conference as it may require.

The Annual Conference shall be empowered to consider the programs of such agencies with a view to correlating their work, preventing duplication of effort and guiding the development of denominational programs. Each agency shall administer its own program and finances in conformity to policy which has been approved by the Annual Conference.

#### ARTICLE XVI CHAIRMAN

In order to conduct the business of the Annual Conference in an orderly and efficient manner, a chairman shall be chosen by and from the membership of the Annual Conference.

The chairman by his election shall be considered to possess, by delegation from the whole body, all authority necessary for the preservation of order and directing the operation of the Annual Conference according to the rules of the Bible Fellowship Church. In deciding issues in the meeting of the Annual Conference when there is a tie vote, he shall have the deciding vote. If he be not willing to decide, he shall call for a second ballot; if the result is again tie, the issue shall be lost.

The chairman of the next Annual Conference shall be chosen by ballot at the last session of each Annual Conference. He shall be eligible to succeed himself twice. After the close of the Annual Conference, the Chairman shall have the power to convene the Annual Conference by circulating a written call for such a meeting giving the members sufficient notice to prepare properly to attend.

#### ARTICLE XVII SECRETARY

Each Annual Conference shall choose from its members by ballot a secretary to record its transactions. It shall be the duty of the secretary, besides the recording of the actions, to preserve the records carefully and to prepare for publication the proceedings of the Annual Conference. He shall furnish certified excerpts from the minutes of the Annual Conference when properly requested; when such excerpts are given, they shall be considered as authentic evidence of the fact which they declare. The secretary shall be empowered to appoint any assistants he needs.

#### ARTICLE XVIII AMENDMENTS

Amendments or alterations in the Form of Government of the Bible Fellowship Church shall be made only in the following manner; The Annual Conference, after proper discussion, may propose changes to the churches by a two-thirds majority of those voting at the Annual Conference, but the changes shall not be valid until presented to the particular churches and approved by a two-thirds majority of those voting at a succeeding Annual Conference; when the second Annual Conference shall give such approval, it

shall declare that the changes have been adopted and are in effect.

Amendments or alterations in the Articles of Faith of the Bible Fellowship Church shall be made in a way similar to that of amending the Form of Government with the following additions: The elders of each church shall vote upon proposed changes and approval shall be necessary from two-thirds of the churches prior to the second vote of the Annual Conference.

None of the provisions of the second or third paragraphs of this article may be changed except by the process set forth in paragraph two.

The above 8 Articles were adopted for first reading.

"d. Are you willing to serve a church as stationed by the Annual Conference through Pulpit Supply? Yes or no. ", and,

Whereas, the question quoted from the Faith and Order Questionnaire implies that the Pastor who has not been assigned by the operation of Rules 1 through 6 under "Annual Conference Action" will be consulted but he has no choice except to concur in the action of the Stationing Committee, and,

Whereas, the apparent conflict between our practical application of Rule 9 and question "d." of the Faith and Order Questionnaire should not exist, therefore, be it,

Resolved, that, regardless of precedent, it is the concensus of this Conference that, under the existing rules, a man whose name appeared on the Availability List who is without an assignment by the operation of Rules 1 through 6 must accept whatever assignment is given him by the Stationing Committee; and that every church without a Pastor after the operation of Rules 1 through 6 must accept the man assigned to it by the Stationing Committee; and further, that when there is an unassigned Pastor holding credentials with the Bible Fellowship Church and a duly organized church without a Pastor, the Stationing Committee must assign the Pastor to the church and the said church must acknowledge said man as its Pastor.

The following articles from the Committee to Coordinate Legislation Proposed by the Board of Church Extension were adopted: (First Reading)

IV. Any Church which desires financial aid from the Conference shall make written application to the Board of Church Extension on forms provided by that Board.

V. Financial aid to Churches shall be made by the Board of Church Extension upon approval of the required application.

VI. That all Churches which receive financial aid from the Board of Church Extension shall be under the jurisdiction of the Church Extension Department. The Board of Church Extension and the Director may counsel and advise the Churches under their jurisdiction in matters of pastoral relations and pulpit supply.

VIII. The Board of Church Extension shall participate in Annual Conference Pulpit Supply procedures on behalf of the missions under its jurisdiction to supply pastors for them. It shall seek to call a pastor for each of these missions, according to the By-laws of the Bible Fellowship Church which govern Pulpit Supply in which the Board of Church Extension shall function in lieu of the Official Board.

Whereas, Harold E. Snyder has resigned from the Youth Fellowship General Committee, therefore,

Resolved, that we elect a replacement for him. Leroy O. Herb was elected.

Resolved, that moving expenses of churches and missions in the Church Extension Department be included in the Conference Administrative Budget, along with the Moving Fund of all other churches effective October 1969.

Resolved, that when missions are received into Annual Conference membership they be asked to make annual contributions to the Conference Administrative Budget.

Resolved, that resolution two on page 18 and resolution two on page 20 of the 1967 Year Book be presented for Second Reading as follows:

Resolved, that the Board of Church Extension be composed of the District Superintendent and the Director of Church Extension, by virtue of their offices, and three ordained ministers and three laymen who are elected by ballot by the Annual Conference. The elected members of the Board shall comprise three classes of one minister and one layman respectively. Each class shall be elected in turn, for a three-year term. (Second Reading)

It was adopted.

Resolved, that the Board of Church Extension shall, as part of its annual report, present to Annual Conference for adoption a proposed budget for the fiscal year beginning October 1 of the year following. The budget shall include projected needs for planned new church openings.

After being adopted by Annual Conference, the budget for Church Extension may serve as a guide to the churches in their giving for Church Extension. Each Official Board shall, by June 15, submit to the Board of Church Extension its best estimate of the amount the Church may be expected to remit for Church Extension by Annual Conference. (Second Reading)

It was adopted.

Harvey J. Fritz, Jr., Secretary of the Board of Church Extension, noted the following appointments of the Board for the 1968-69 year:

Weaber was assigned to the Bible Fellowship Church of Graterford as Assistant Pastor.

Whereas, the approved report of the Stationing and Appropriating Committee did not name pastors for two of our congregations, and,

Whereas, Robert Salzman and Terris L. Byrd are under the care of the Ministerial Candidate Committee and they have been accepted by the churches as supply pastors through counsel with the Conference Superintendent, therefore,

Resolved, that Robert Salzman berecognized as supplypastor for Cedar Crest Bible Fellowship Church and Terris Byrd be recognized as supply pastor for Sinking Spring Bible Fellowship Church.

Resolved, that the Secretary send a letter to Robert Salzman and Terris Byrd relative to the above action.

Whereas, the Department of Public Instruction of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania requires that an institution of higher education possess an endowment fund of \$500,000 or the equivalent in order to be recognized as a degree granting institution and as a college, and,

Whereas, it is advisable for our Berean Bible School to seek and to maintain such recognition, and,

Whereas, our level of giving to the School in recent years has consistently reached the equivalent of the earnings of such a fund invested at 5% per annum, therefore,

Resolved, that the Annual Conference guarantee the annual support of Berean Bible School in the minimum amount of \$25,000 to be received from Bible Fellowship Churches and from individuals who indicate that their gifts are to be credited to the Bible Fellowship Church.

(Yes 61 No 5)

Resolved, that we hold an adjourned session on March 8,1969 at Graterford Bible Fellowship Church at 9:00 a.m. The first order of business shall be consideration of the report of the Board of Church Extension regarding duties of the Director of Church Extension.

#### REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON CREDENTIALS

The Committee on Credentials held three meetings during the year in the performance of its duties.

The <u>Faith and Order</u> questionnaire was sent to each of our ministers holding credentials with us. All the brethren signed and returned it, having answered all the questions in the affirmative except as follows:

- 1. In some cases Ordained Ministers Working With Other Organizations, Ordained Ministers Retired or on Leave of Absence and Foreign Missionaries, did not answer yes to question four: "Are you willing to serve a church as stationed by the Annual Conference through Pulpit Supply?" The reason for this is obvious and proper.
- 2. Norman Weiss did not answer yes to question four because he is committed to the Board of Church Extension for the ensuing Conference Year.
- 3. Letters of resignation for service in the Bible Fellowship Church were received from: Russell T.Allen, Earl M.Hosler and Robert Paul.
- 4. Daniel G. Ziegler answered yes to question four, but observed that his acceptance of the position of Interim Director of the Church Extension Department will place some limitations on his time in a pastorate.

Several letters were returned with the <u>Faith and Order</u> Questionnaire, raising questions about the following:

- l. Is it possible for a person who is Dispensational in his approach to Scripture honestly to affirm his acceptance of our Faith and Order?
- 2. "Misgivings" concerning the article on "Free Agency" and "Election" were expressed. Do these articles teach a "limited atonement".
- 3. Clarification of the article on "Second Coming" was requested.
- 4. Is the signing of the <u>Faith and Order</u> Questionnaire to be considered binding, as a contract?

The Credentials Committee offers the following answers to these questions, based on our understanding of the <u>Faith and Order</u>:

1. The Committee gets the impression that the issue is taken with some articles simply because the position they represent is not popular with some of our membership. If this is the basis of dissent, the Committee feels it to be the wrong basis on which to proceed. The question must be, is it Biblical? rather than, is it well received? That means that unity must be sought, not by polls but by the demanding task of Biblical Study.

It also means that we must be willing to accept differences of opinion in those areas where Scripture is not sufficiently clear.

We believe the only hope for the Bible Fellowship Church is its confidence that the Bible is the Infalliable Word of God and our reliable guide in Faith and Practice. Anything that weakens that fundamental committment means our ultimate rejection by God.

- 2. The Committee fully recongizes that there are some differences in emphasis among us. It simply points out that these differences all lie within the framework of our articles of Faith. We know of no denomination that demands as broad a commitment as to that which our pastors subscribe. This represents a commitment to the teachings of historic Christianity in such a degree that it should provide a firm basis of cooperation. Let us not blind ourselves to that vast area of truth in which we all agree. Our differences are really not as great as some would make them.
- 3. In cases where questions are raised about our articles on "Free Agency" and "Election", the problems seem to be not so much with what these articles say, as with what some brethren are reputed to interpret them to say. No one has made any effort to show them to be unbiblical as they stand. A question has been raised as to whether they teach a "limited atonement", which is considered an unbiblical doctrine by one of the brethren who wrote us. We simply say that it is possible that some of our Pastors may believe in a limited atonement we are not aware of that but these articles of Faith do not, and were not intended to teach it.

Certainly these articles do not rule out human responsibility. Nor do they deny that we are to preach the Gospel to every creature. Nor do they deny that we are to "persuade men".

- 4. The article on "The Second Coming of Christ" clearly teaches a Pre-Millenial return of Christ. It does not deal with the question of the time relationship between the Rapture and the Tribulation.
- 5. When the articles of Faith were passed many of our Pastors held to a Dispensational approach to Scripture, and did not consider the articles inconsistent with that approach. Many continue to be of that persuasion now and have no difficulty with the Articles of Faith.
- 6. We believe that our affirmation of the question on the Faith and Order Questionnaire should be considered a commitment which we plan to keep. We do not say it is unalterable, but Christian ethics requires that we be sincere at the time we sign it.

The Ministerial Candidate Committee recommends Paul Kuder and Keith Plows for Ordination. The Credentials Committee, after an examination of these men, believes that they are called of God to the Gospel Ministry.

They have served acceptably during their probationary period within our Conference, and are in accord with the <u>Faith and Order of the Bible Fellowship Church</u>.

We, therefore, Recommend that Paul Kuder and Keith Plows be ordained during the Thursday evening meeting of this Annual Conference.

The Credentials Committee received favorable reports concerning the Ministers of the Conference from the District Superintendent. We are grateful to our Lord for giving to the Bible Fellowship Church, godly, conscientious ministers.

During the year our Brother Ernest B. Hartman was called home to be with the Lord. We express our deepest sympathy to the family in their loss, but take comfort in the glorious assurance we have in Christ.

Whereas, Russell T.Allen, Earl M.Hosler and Robert Paul have resigned from ministry in the Bible Fellowship Church, to minister in other churches,

We recommend that we accept their resignations and drop their names from our roll of ministers.

In a letter dated September 26, 1968, Rev. W. B. Hottel requests that the Annual Conference grant him an indefinite leave of absence in order that he might wait upon God in prayer and seek God's will for the future.

We, therefore, recommend that W.B.Hottel be granted his request and that his name be listed as an Ordained Minister on leave of absence.

We recommend that the Stationing and Appropriations Committee give consideration to granting some financial assistance to Pastor W.B. Hottel.

In order to clarify the function of the Committee we would herewith state that we do not station Pastors, nor do we supply Churches with Pastors between Conferences. Our only relationship to pulpit supply is the preparation and distribution of the Availability List.

#### REPORT OF THE YOUTH FELLOWSHIP GENERAL COMMITTEE

"And Jesus said unto them, Come ye after me, and I will make you to become fishers of men." Mark 1:17. The Youth Fellowship General Committee is launching a program known as "The Year of the Net". The heart of the program is a locally planned and executed youth-to-youth evangelistic witness through the Youth Fellowship and involving all believing youth in the endeavor.

The Youth Fellowship General Committee will sponsor an Evangelistic Youth Rally with Rev. Tom Skinner at the Pottstown Youth Center on Friday Evening, November 29, 1968. Other activities will include three Winter weekends and a Youth Week next Summer at Pinebrook, and various other types of functions to reach youth with the gospel.

The members of the committee met on eight occasions last year to conduct the work committed to them.

It was the privilege of this group to work with the Sunday School Promotion Committee in planning the youth emphasis at the Sunday School Convention conducted at Bethlehem. A staff of well qualified speakers was on hand and over two hundred young people attended the sessions.

The College-Career young people enjoyed a shore retreat held at Ocean Grove, New Jersey, on August 16-18. Pastors Daniel Ziegler and David Watkins were the speakers and thirty eight young people were in attendance.

The Fall Retreat, September 6-8 at Victory Valley Camp was open to the Junior and Senior High young people with an invitation given to pastors and youth sponsors to attend sessions on Saturday. The theme for the weekend as "The Year of the Net". The purpose of this retreat was to train our youth for the 1969 program. Over 100 young people attended. Several stated the inspiration the weekend brought to them.

We recommend that each Youth Fellowship remit an offering for the work of the Youth Fellowship General Committee, and that this offering be payable to the treasurer of the Youth Fellowship Committee and that it be submitted to the secretary of said committee at the Adjourned Session of this Conference.

During the past year a sub-committee from the Sunday School Promotion Committee and a sub-committee of the Youth Fellow-ship General Committee met to discuss the possibility of coordinating their efforts in order to have a more comprehensive Christian Education Program. Therefore, we request the Eighty-Fifth Annual Conference to approve the following recommendations in order to carry out an effective Christian Education Program:

- l. We recommend that the first reading of the following proposed legislation be adopted by this conference. Resolved that the Youth Fellowship General Committee be dissolved as of the 86th Annual Conference, and further resolved, that Annual Conference elect a Board of Christian Education composed of six ministers and six laymen to oversee the work of Christian Education throughout the Bible Fellowship Church. The twelve members of this Board of Christian Education shall be comprised of three classes of two ministers and two laymen, respectively, each class to be elected annually inturn for a term of three years. (To initiate the proposed, two ministers and two laymen shall be elected for a two-year term, and two ministers and two laymen shall be elected for a one-year term).
- 2. We recommend that Annual Conference consider a joint report of the Sunday School Promotion Committee and the Youth Fellowship General Committee further detailing the above proposal.
- 3. We recommend that the treasury balance of the Youth Fellowship General Committee be turned over to the Board of Christian Education.
- 4. We recommend that every church make an annual contribution to the work of the Board of Christian Education at the Adjourned Session of Annual Conference. (We suggest the contribution for each church be at least equal to the combined offerings for Youth Fellowship General Committee and Sunday School Promotion Committee).

#### REPORT OF THE SUNDAY SCHOOL PROMOTION COMMITTEE

"Him we preach and proclaim, warning and admonishing every one and instructing every one in all wisdom, in comprehensive insight into the ways and purposes of God, that we may present every person mature-full grown, fully initiated, complete and perfect, in Christ." Ampl. Col. 1:28.

This past year much time has been spent in preparing a more comprehensive program for the Sunday Schools and the realm of Christian Education. This was initiated by having a joint meeting with the Sunday School Promotion and Youth Fellowship General Committees to explore related areas of Christian Education. One result of the joint meeting was the unique program of the past Sunday School Convention, which had strong youth and adult emphases. The Convention was well attended; many complimentary remarks were made by those who attended.

The visual aids library has continually supplied our schools with film strips this past year. The past year the committee appropriated \$300 for needed equipment and some of the new split 35mm filmstrips were added to the visual aids library.

We recommend, that every Bible Fellowship Sunday School make a contribution for denominational Sunday School promotion. This contribution should be mailed to the Financial Secretary of the Committee before April 1, 1969.

There has been much expression concerning overlapping of responsibilities between the Sunday School Promotion and Youth Fellowship General Committees and we realize coordination is essential between the two committees. Also in order to have a comprehensive Christian Education program in the denomination we request the eighty-fifth Annual Conference approve the following recommendations to implement the Christian Education program:

1. We recommend that the first reading of the following proposed legislation be adopted by this conference.

RESOLVED, that the Sunday School Promotion Committee be dissolved as of the 86th Annual Conference, and further

RESOLVED, that Annual Conference elect a Board of Christian Education composed of six ministers and six laymen to oversee the work of Christian Education throughout the Bible Fellowship Church. The twelve members of this Board of Christian Education shall be comprised of three classes of two ministers and two laymen, respectively, each class to be elected annually in turn for a term of three years. (To initiate the proposed, two ministers and two laymen shall be elected for a three-year term, two ministers and two laymen shall be elected for a two-year term, and two ministers and two laymen shall be elected for a one-year term).

- 2. We recommend that Annual Conference consider a joint report of the Youth Fellowship General Committee and the Sunday School Promotion Committee further detailing the above proposal.
- 3. We recommend that the treasury balance of the Sunday School Promotion Committee be turned over to the Board of Christian Education.
- 4. We recommend that every church make an annual contribution to the work of the Board of Christian Education at the Adjourned Session of Annual Conference. (We suggest the contribution from each church be at least equal to the combined offerings for Youth Fellowship General Committee and the Sunday School Promotion Committee).

# REPORT OF THE SEVENTY-SEVENTH ANNUAL MINISTERIAL CONVENTION

The Seventy-Seventh Ministerial Convention convened on Tuesday and Wednesday, May 21 and 22, 1968 at Victory Valley Bible Camp.

The officers of the Convention were Daniel G. Ziegler, Chairman and Harold C. Weaber, Secretary. The program for the Convention was planned by the Board of Church Extension.

On Tuesday morning, the Convention opened with singing and Harvey J. Fritz, Jr., led in prayer. The theme of the Convention was Evangelism and Church Growth. Two papers were presented by Donald Knauer, "A Study of the Greatest Growth Period in Bible Fellowship Church History" and Donal Nilson, "Why Has Bible Fellowship Church Growth Slowed and Stopped Since 1950?" These papers were followed by a discussion period moderated by James Koch.

In the Tuesday afternoon meeting two papers were presented by Willard Cassel, "Let's Analyze Our Successes A Look at Churches That Have Grown and Produced Leaders in the Last 20 Years" and Jansen E. Hartman, "Why Did They Die?" An Analysis of Factors in the Demise of Bible Fellowship Churches?" William A. Heffner moderated a discussion period on these papers. Donald T. Kirkwood then presented a paper, "Is This the Time to Expect Bible Fellowship Church Growth?" This paper was followed by a discussion period moderated by John Dunn.

There were two papers presented in the Tuesday evening meeting. Harold Shelly, Jr., presented a paper, "Comparison of Growth of the Bible Fellowship Church and the United Missionary Church Since 1952" and Carl C. Cassel, "The Bible Fellowship

Church in the Cities (100,000 plus population)". A discussion period followed which was moderated by Frank Herb. Then David Watkins presented a paper, "Socio-Economic Factors in Church Growth." Keith Plows moderated a discussion period.

The Wednesday morning session began with a paper presented by Ronald C. Mahurin, "Church Buildings and Growth". Harvey Fritz, Jr., moderated the discussion period following this paper. Two papers were then presented by James A. Beil, "Church Discipline and Growth" and C.E. Kirkwood, "Church Merger and Growth." George Herb moderated the discussion period.

The Wednesday afternoon session began with a tape-recording by Ron Hoyle, "What Can We Learn from Foreign Missions to Help Our Home Churches Grow?" The discussion period was moderated by Russell T. Allen. The business of the Convention was conducted and the various Committees submitted reports.

A resolution was accepted that the next Ministerial Retreat be held at Pinebrook on May 20 and 21, 1968. Earl Hosler was elected chairman. A motion was passed to elect a vice-chairman to serve on the committee and to be chairman of the 1970 Convention. Bruce A. Ellingson was elected. Paul Zimmerman was elected secretary. Mark Smith and Keith Plows were elected to the program committee.

A paper was presented by John H. Herb, "How Can the Ingrown Church Begin to Grow Out." John Riggall moderated the discussion period.

The Wednesday evening meeting was a period of discussion and prayer for the spiritual and numerical growth of the Bible Fellowship Churches.

A word of appreciation is expressed for the delicious meals that were prepared and served by the members of the Zionsville Bible Fellowship Church.

# CONFERENCE SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT

- "... There we saw the giants... "Numbers 13:33a
- "...We are well able to overcome... "Numbers 13:30b

God gave command to Moses to search the land of Canaan during one of the most crucial periods in the history of Israel. After forty days of searching out the land the respresentatives from the various tribes reported their findings to Moses and the congregation of Israel.

Someone has said, "You will always find what you are looking for." The testimony of the spies verified this statement. The majority looked for the negative aspects and saw obstacles and adversities. The longer they searched the more they found and the larger they loomed before them until finally they all appeared as

giants stalking the land. Men of poor spiritual perception always possess that unique ability to make mountains out of molehills. They completely miss spiritual blessings apparent to others due to preconceived ideas which cannot be eradicated from their minds.

After the spies magnified the obstacles they proceeded to minimize their own abilities and completely failed to reckon on the omnipotence of God who had promised to enable them to overcome all difficulties involved in subduing their enemies. In the midst of the resulting confusion it was the minority that had complete confidence in God's ability to bring victory.

World news media confirms the fact that we live in confused and changing time. Political, cultural and moral concepts are being eroded by reaction and rebellion. Newsweek recently reported that national morals had slipped more in the past year than in the fifty preceeding years.

But God's Truth is eternal. Man's need for the Gospel is still a matter of life and death. The work of Christ remains the only endeavor of everlasting consequence. There is nothing more worthy of our disciplined prayer and earnest service than the ministry which God has committed to His people.

The outlook of the Church on the future has always been different from the view of non-christian leaders. The expressions of the world leaders lead their followers to say; "Let's eat, drink and enjoy free sex, for tomorrow we will rise in a nuclear cloud or be smothered by the weight of overpopulation. The scientist-inventor Ulric Jelinik visited a college where he and the agnostic Julian Huxley spoke to students. He said, "I listened to Huxley present a dreary picture of the future. He made me feel like digging a hole and crawling in and drawing the shades."

The church has often been accused of being indifferent toward grim realities. However, history proves that in the darkest periods the church has led the way in meeting human need. The concerned Christian does not say, "The world is on the way to destruction, I'll just remain indifferent and see God's Word proved true since there is nothing I can do. The truly dedicated servant of Christ will recognize the world situation and seek to meet the needs of those about him in the strength of Christ. In a day of moral indifference our Bible Fellowship Church has a greater responsibility than ever to meet the needs of men with the truths of God's Word.

The most important advance by the Bible Fellowship Church this past year was the acquisition of Pinebrook after many months of discussion and negotiations with the Pinebrook Foundation. The purchase price finally agreed upon was four hundred thousand dollars which included the land, buildings and a large amount of furnishings. The adjoining farm owned by Richard Crawford was

also purchased for sixty thousand dollars, bringing the total land area purchased to approximately 185 acres.

The enthusiastic response to the "open house" on Labor Day by members and friends of the Bible Fellowship Church was overwhelming with over three thousand visiting Pinebrook throughout the day. We want to express our appreciation for the wonderful volunteer labor donated by many individuals and church groups before and after Labor Day.

Throughout the fall, winter and spring seasons week-end retreats for young people and married couples are being conducted at Pinebrook by various church groups. By the beginning of October reservations were made completely filling the present facilities from the end of December until nearly the end of March. In addition some reservations have been made in all other months until the close of June. Reduced rates are offered to groups from the Bible Fellowship Church. A full program of Bible Conference-type ministry is being planned for the months of July and August.

On Saturday, September 14 a service of dedication was held at our new Home for the Aging at Nazareth, Pa. We are grateful that our God has enabled us to erect this beautiful edifice. The Administrator, Rev. F. B. Hertzog and his wife have gone far beyond the call of duty in meeting the challenge and responsibility involved in this undertaking. We also appreciate the fine staff obtained for the commencement of this phase of our work.

The attendances at Mizpah Grove this summer exceeded that of previous years, as people realized that this was the final encampment at this location. During the two weeks of meetings there were many who indicated their desire for spiritual help and some of these made profession of faith in Christ. In addition those attending the meetings continually spoke of blessings received and a larger number of letters were received than in any recent year testifying of needs met and spiritual growth experienced as God's Word was proclaimed. Those who attended will long remember the memorable closing service as we reflected on the Lord's mercies bestowed upon us in the past and rejoiced in the prospects for the future.

The Mizpah Grove property has been sold to the Allentown School District and the funds received have been applied toward the purchase price of Pinebrook.

A nationally known corporation had expressed interest in purchasing our property located in Upper Macungie Township and prepared an agreement of sale. Later this offer was withdrawn. Presently Lehigh's Economic Advancement Project has expressed an interest in this property and presented to the Board of Directors a sales agreement with the intent to develop an industrial park in this area. The final settlement is contingent upon the availability

of an adequate supply of water and proper sewer facilities. These must be provided by the township or the city of Allentown. The sales agreement requires that forty per cent of the purchase price shall be paid when settlement takes place. If this sale is completed the proceeds from the settlement will be applied towards our present indebtedness on this property and the purchase of Pinebrook.

Each year we have cause for thanksgiving as we learn of local churches engaging in new building programs and other major improvements to properties. Some of the recent developments include the following:

ALLENTOWN (Bethel) is proceeding with the purchase of several properties south of their present church which will provide excellent room for expansion and future parking. They are also planning to make some needed renovations to the parsonage together with redecorating.

BETHLEHEM - After numerous vexing delays work has commenced on their new church edifice which will be located at the outskirts of the city. The eight acres of land at the building site will also provide an adequate parking area.

BLANDON renovated and redecorated their parsonage prior to Pastor Kirkwood's moving last fall. Most of the work was performed by men and women from the congregation resulting in a minimum expenditure of funds.

CATASAUQUA also renovated and completely redecorated their parsonage prior to the arrival of Pastor Butler. In addition they furnished the house since the Pastor's family came from England. Presently they are completing work on their lower church building to provide proper facilities for additional Sunday School class rooms. Several men from this congregation have done most of the work on these projects.

DENVILLE has continued to experience the Lord's blessing in numerical growth and urgently needs additional space for parking. They are now considering the possibility of purchasing one of the properties adjacent to their present building.

HARLEYSVILLE - This congregation for many years worshipped in a small structure with very limited space for their Sunday School program. They are eagerly looking forward to the dedication of their new building on November 24. It is located on the tract of land where their parsonage is presently located.

HARRISBURG has enjoyed steady growth through the years since they moved to the excellent location in the northern section of this capitol city. Permission has been granted by the city officials to proceed with a large addition to their present structure which will provide additional space for Christian Education facilities and an expanded sanctuary.

PARADISE church is located on a busy highway and possesses one of the most beautiful sanctuaries in the Bible Fellowship Church. The men from the church donated their time and put a new roof on this building making the outside of the building very attractive.

ROYERSFORD continues to rejoice in the Lord's blessing experienced and is now proceeding with their building program at a good location on the outskirts of this community.

STROUDSBURG has recently taken formal action at a congregational meeting to renovate and redecorate the interior of their church building.

WALLINGFORD continues to experience rapid growth requiring additional space. They recently acquired the property north of their present location containing over an acre of land and a spacious stone ranch house for sixty thousand dollars. This house is now being utilized for Sunday School classes and youth activities. They also plan to provide an apartment for missionary couples on furlough.

A cooperative spirit prevailed as the Church Extension Board met throughout the year. Many hours were spent in planning for the future of Church Extension for the Conference.

I represented Church Extension in thirteen of the Bible Fellowship Churches as well as in the Berean Bible School. When the request came in November for the Department to try and establish a church in the Phillipsburg Prospect Street Mission, the Board asked me to assume that responsibility. At the date of this writing the prospect for the continuation of this work is questionable.

## BELVIDERE, NEW JERSEY

The Church at Belvidere, New Jersey, saw another good year under the leadership of pastor John Herb. The evangelistic endeavors were blessed by the Lord. Several have made professions of faith through the year. There were 96 enrolled in the Vacation Bible School. Women's Missionary Society and the Youth Fellowship were started this year. The driveway and parking area have been improved. The people have contributed two thousand dollars more to the work this year than last year.

#### FINESVILLE, NEW JERSEY

Seven new members were received into the church fellowship and a Bible Club was started in Kitnersville with 15 children in attendance of whom four have received Christ as their Saviour. ### REPORT OF THE PRESIDENT OF BEREAN BIBLE SCHOOL

Ours is the task of keeping a treasure -a treasure of knowledge and truth, committed to our care -a heritage of the received Word of God given to the Lord's people for their salvation and preservation. Paul wrote in this vein saying, "O Timothy, keep that which is committed to thy trust, avoiding profane and vain babblings, and

oppositions of science falsely so called: which some professing have erred concerning the faith." (I Timothy 6:20,21) Berean Bible School was called into existence for the sake of the truth, and the educating and training of young Christians in that truth. With this in mind we shall seek to render in part an account of that stewardship.

### ENROLLMENT

Again this fall the number of registrants exceeded the record of the year before. Forty-three full-time and twenty-four in the special student category brought the enrollment in the collegiate division to sixty-seven. The evening school also had a record enrollment of forty-one in the Evangelical Teacher Training Association sanctioned courses.

The scheduling of courses in the evening has made it possible for those who are not able to attend the classes held in the day to begin or continue their education.

# FINANCES

The financial support of Berean by the sponsoring church, the Bible Fellowship Church, has reached a new high. Church giving, including Sunday School, came to \$32,429. for the fiscal year which ended June 30, 1968. We are grateful for this display of concern for the continued ministry of the school by our constituency. However, while giving by the church exceeded the budgeted amount by \$4,429. the total alloted from other sources fell short by \$6,682. This coupled with a deficit of \$9,250 in school income and soaring costs brought us into our first operational deficit in recent years. This deficit amounted to \$7,058. Since the school had no cash reserves it was necessary to borrow \$13,500 to meet current expenses to date. It is hoped that in the providence of God that this problem will be eliminated in the near future.

During the past fiscal year \$4,327 was spent on fixed assets and the new plant fund.

#### CHRISTIAN SERVICE

Christian service is one of the most important departments of Berean Bible School because of its ministry to the church and community. Every student is required to become involved in some phase of witness and ministry before the completion of his training. Faculty members also participate either in a supervisory capacity or in serving where their services are requested. Scores of assignments are carried out with hundreds in attendance at these events each week. Among the activities conducted besides the convocations sponsored by the school are Gospel Team meetings, a campus Bible Club, Youth for Christ Bible Clubs and musical group activities, Cedarbrook services, rescue mission services,

leadership in Christian Service Brigade and Pioneer Girls units, counseling at retreats and evangelistic campaigns, assistant to the pastor, teaching Sunday School classes, and the personal witness by word, tract and Scripture distribution. During the summer months students forego more lucrative jobs to give their time and talents to camp ministeries, Child evangelism and other varied forms of service. We are grateful to know that in this area the requests for assistance often surpass our ability to meet the demand.

The Christian Service ministry is expressive of the continued evangelistic emphasis of the School. While the educational and training program looks forward to the greater future usefulness of the students, yet present concerns demand our attention and efforts. Many now serving as pastors, missionaries and leaders had their taste of personal and public witnessing for Jesus Christ while students at Berean. This past year it was the same. The emphasis is upon the practical application of the principles received through the classroom instruction with a view toward giving confidence through meaningful service. Christian Service with evangelism is the keynote that will always be a part of the Berean program.

### DEVELOPMENT

There are several areas that come under the heading of development since they pertain to the future of Berean.

The first is that of the new campus and facilities. The Board has through several of its members participated in the work of the Planning Committee for the Development of the New Conference Center. The work of this committee resulted in the recommendation that the Pinebrook Bible Conference Grounds be purchased as a new site for Berean Bible School and the Bible Conference ministry. This purchase has been authorized by the Annual Conference action and settlement has been made so Berean will have a new campus when the fall term opens in September 1969. Much work lies ahead in planning and making the accommodations necessary to make the facilities suitable for educational uses. We accept this move as being the Lord's will for the school at this time and look forward enthusiastically to the great possibilities that lie ahead for its expansion.

The second is the academic recognition. The quest for greater recognition of Berean as an institution of higher education was vigorously pushed forward on two fronts this past year. Since it was ten years since the initial examination was made by the Accrediting Association of Bible Colleges, Berean was scheduled for an examination this part year. A self-study was completed and a team of examiners arrived on campus last April. The examiners report has been received and work is being done to carry out the recommendations made. While many departments of the school were given approval the suggestion made will aid greatly in the

strengthening of Berean as an institution.

For several years now we have also been in consultation with members of the Bureau of Institutional Studies and Services of the Department of Public Instruction, Commonwealth of Pennsylvania for the purpose of seeking approval to petition the courts of Lehigh County to amend our charter to incorporation to provide authorization to grant degrees. Our first step is to seek authorization to grant associate degrees for our present programs. This action is recommended in a communication to this body by the Board of Directors.

The benefits of the authorization for the power to grant associate degrees are many. However, we would like to list a few of these:

- l. Berean Bible School would be recognized as a collegiate instituion by the government. The school would then be listed along with other junior colleges as a bonafide institution of higher education operating within the framework of the requirements of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania.
- 2. The associate degree awarded would be more expressive of the standard of work completed than a general diploma. The requirements for the honor would be according to general standards and practices of other institutions of like standing. The degree itself would depend upon the programs approved.
- 3. Approval of Berean to offer programs for which authorization is given to grant associate degrees is an important step toward greater recognition and accreditation for Berean. Now we are unable to use the word college in our title or in any of our publicity. The word school in our title is confusing. We have been identified as anything from a Sunday school to a collegiate institution.
- 4. Approval and authorization to grant degrees would be for programs that would provide a base for the further development of Berean. The charter change would be broad enough to provide for degrees on a higher level, providing programs for these degrees are approved by the Department of Public Instruction. After college status has been granted the institution must provide evidence that they have the resources necessary to support each program added. Our first step is to seek approval for the program we now offer and for those within the scope of our resources.
- 5. The recognition sought when acquired would aid those students who transfer to other colleges to complete the requirements for a baccalaureate degree. While several schools, mostly Christian colleges, now grant transfer credit for work taken at Berean there are other schools where its work has not been recognized because of not being on the list of approved schools in the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania. The value of transfer credit should also be upgraded by the step thus saving students who enroll

at Berean both time and money in their pursuit of a baccalaureate degree.

- 6. Recognition by the Commonwealth will qualify both the school and students for privileges and benefits now provided by law. Male students can now obtain deferments as theological or ministerial students but not as other college students. Former members of the armed services who attend Berean would be eligible to receive the benefits provided by law. There are other advantages such as loans and grants for which the school may be eligible when approval is obtained.
- 7. Increasing numbers of high school graduates are enrolling in colleges without career objectives. Berean would be in a position to provide at least the first two years of college work with a a Christian life and world view to the uncommitted student. After the first two years of Berean, which are parallel to the first two years of many colleges, the student would be in a better position to make a decision relating to his educational program when his career objectives are known more fully.
- 8. The obtaining of approval and authorization to grant associate degrees should assist in student recruitment. Student enrollment should increase greatly as a result. While there is no guarantee of this yet it will be to our advantage to be able to advertise programs that eventuate in a standardized honor.
- 9. The increased emphasis upon education in our modern culture has made the completion of the first two years of college as essential as a high school diploma was a decade ago. Jobs for the non-skilled are disappearing. It can be expected that two years of college will be the minimum requirement for many vocations.
- 10. The best reason for seeking approval and authorization to grantassociate degrees as the immediate step in the development of Berean is that it will enable us to fulfill our educational stewardship to our Lord. We consider the said authorization as a means of reaching the objective set before us or preparing students in all areas of life, with a special reference to church vocations and Christian ministeries through a program of Biblical, general and professional studies.

One of the obstacles in the way of gaining fuller recognition by the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania and the Accrediting Association of Bible Colleges in the past has been the limitations of our present physical plant. Preliminary observations of the Pinebrook campus by officials of the two agencies have been favorable. Encouragement has been given to the move to Stroudsburg with an emphasis placed on sound planning and the working out of satisfactory working relationship with the sponsoring church.

The requirements for approval by the Commonwealth of

Pennsylvania are established by law. One of the stipulations is the requirement that each college hold an endowment of no less than \$500,000. The officials have indicated that they will waive this requirement if the following recommendation is carried out by this body - from a letter dated April 4, 1968 - "Also, in order to show continuing financial support in lieu of restricted endowment, a resolution by the fellowship conference to guarantee an annual contribution of \$25,000 is essential."

It is urged that this Annual Conference give attention to this matter. Since the church has given in excess of \$25,000 for the past several years there should be no serious objection to a commitment of this nature.

There are indications that a new day is dawning for the Berean Bible School, we beg you to stand with us in this battle for truth.

# REPORT OF THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS OF THE BIBLE FELLOWSHIP CHURCH

The Board of Directors met to conduct its affairs thirteen times during the fiscal year which began October 1, 1967 and ended September 30, 1968. The officers of the Corporation elected for the year were: President and Chairman, Arlington L. Seifert; Vice-President and Financial Secretary, Bryon C. Cassel, Treasurer, Harold W. Griest, Secretary, Jansen E. Hartman.

The Lord in His providence called home the treasurer, Harold W.Griest during the year. The following resolution is taken from the minutes of the Board:

"Whereas, Brother Harold W.Griest a member of the Grace Bible Fellowship Church, Wallingford, Pa., and a member of the Board of Directors and Treasurer of the Bible Fellowship Church for this past year, departed from this life on April 17, 1968 after an extended illness, therefore be it,

Resolved, that we express our thanksgiving to God for the gift of Harold W.Griest and his faithful service to the church for many years, and further be it,

Resolved, that we extend our heartfelt sympathy to his wife and family with the assurance that our God whose way is perfect will sustain them in this hour of bereavement."

Earl M. Hosler resigned from the Board as of August 15, 1968.

The advice of the Board was sought by several churches relative to the disposition or acquisition of property and the erection of new structures. These included churches in the following locations: Nazareth, Quakertown, Harleysville, Lebanon, Harrisburg and Bethlehem.

The Property Committee made its annual survey of the District Superintendent's home and authorized the making of necessary repairs to keep the property in proper condition.

During the year three ministers withdrew from the Ministers' Retirement Fund pension plan sponsored by the church after accepting calls from other churches. Refunds were paid to Earl M. Hosler, Richard H. Kline and Russell T. Allen.

Settlement was made on the house located at 2340 Union Street, Allentown and sold to Pastor T.D.Gehret.

The Mizpah Grove property was sold to the Allentown School District for \$160,000. The net proceeds of this sale, \$152,152.83, were applied to the purchase of the Pinebrook Bible Conference Grounds.

The Board carried out the assignment of negotiating and financing purchase of the Pinebrook Bible Conference grounds given by the Adjourned Session of the Annual Conference on April 13, 1968. The property with buildings and equipment on 185.3 acres located four miles north of Stroudsburg along highway route #191 was acquired from the Pinebrook Foundation and Richard T. and Elizabeth P. Crawford on August 30, 1968, for a total cost of \$460,000 including \$50,000 for personal property. The purchase was financed through the sale of the Mizpah Grove property, the issuing of a first mortgage of \$160,000 to the First National Bank of Allentown, a second mortgage issued to the Pinebrook Foundation for \$100 000, and unsecured loans of \$51,000 obtained from the First National Bank of Allentown. Total indebtedness at the time of purchase was \$311,000.00.

The Board has made an agreement to sell the Upper Macungie property to Lehigh's Economic Advancement Project, Incorporated for the development of an industrial park. The sale price agreed upon is \$5,000 per acre; forty percent of the total price is to be received when settlement is made, with the balance to be paid as the land is sold to industrial and commercial interest. Eighty percent of the total selling price is guaranteed to be paid within five years and a hundred percent within ten years. A down payment of \$10,000 was received when the agreement of sale was signed by the prospective purchasers.

A mortgage indebtedness of \$135,000 remains on the Upper Macungie tract with about \$100,000 having been paid toward the original purchasing price of the land.

# REPORT OF THE BOARD OF FOREIGN MISSIONS (for the year ending September 30, 1968)

Net Loss transferred to Statement M.

"And he said unto them, Go ye into all the world and preach the gospel to every creature." Mark 16:15

From the very first, the Church has been under orders to evangelize. Never have the orders been more urgent than they are at this present time. Spiritual destitution is apparent on every side. One writer speaks of it as, "our plunge toward the abyss of unbelieve". In the lives of many we observe the indifference, the bewilderment, the damaging shadows of despair; and the Church must speak an authoritative and a reinforcing word to the need of the age.

The answer to the ills of mankind do not lie in our views, opinions, or speculations, or arguments, but in a clear, decisive proclamation of the gospel. Our primary calling is not to give good advice, but to publish good news. Hear the words of the apostle Paul: "For I am not ashamed of the gospel of Christ: for it is the power of God unto salvation to every one that believeth." Rom. 1:16

And what is this gospel which we are to preach in all the world? Well, it is set forth plainly in the opening verses of chapter 15 of the first epistle to the Corinthians. "I declare unto you the gospel which I preached unto you, which also ye have received, and wherein ye stand; by which also ye are saved.... For I delivered unto you first of all that which also I received, how that Christ died for our sins according to the Scriptures: And that he was buried, and that he rose again the third day according to the Scriptures:" That was the gospel that Paul preached. It is the unchanging gospel which meets the need of the human heart. Here is good news for men estranged from God through sin, and this good news we are commissioned to proclaim.

Here then is the mission of the Church, to proclaim the good news of the redeeming work of Christ, to be His witnesses. Jesus said, "Ye shall be witnesses unto me both in Jerusalem, and in all Judea, and in Samaria, and unto the uttermost part of the earth." How desperately the world needs to hear the good news of the love of God and the redeeming work of Christ on Calvary!

We are living in a world of tragic divisions. There is strife between nations, there is distrust in industry, there are broken homes, there are people unwanted and unloved, and we have the only remedy. All that man's ingenuity can devise has been tried, but the gospel has not been given a real chance. Neither the politician nor the social reformer, admirable though the work of these may be, has the answer to the world's plight; but the gospel is still "the power of God unto salvation to every one that believeth."

The closing words of the gospel of Mark are an appropriate conclusion to the Great Commission: "And they went forth, and preached everywhere, the Lord working with them, and confirming the word with signs following."

As this report of the Board of Foreign Missions is presented, giving an accounting of the money received for the support of the foreign missionary program for the 1967 to 1968 conference year, it is well to pause and consider the financial need of this important ministry. The budget for the year was \$129,500.00. This was met by using the money contributed by all the churches of the conference during the year. In addition to this, the accrued interest, also the \$5,000.00 from the repayment of a loan and all of the previous balance was necessary.

The Board is grateful for the interest manifested in the support of foreign missions, but wishes to call attention to the serious need that exists in determining the budget for next year. Living costs are increasing abroad as well as at home. Our missionaries depend upon us and we do not want to disappoint them. May it be our burden to support this ministry of missions, as God has blessed and prospered. The amount that you give will determine the allowances that will be granted to our workers.

The Board of Foreign Missions met in regular session four times during the year. Members serving on the Board during the year were: A.L.Seifert, Chairman; T.D.Gehret, Secretary; Russell T. Allen, Willard E. Cassel, James G.Koch, Roy E. Williams, James R. Cressman, Kermit K. Gehman and Robert Breitegam.

#### REPORT OF THE BOARD OF CHURCH EXTENSION

"There is one body, and one Spirit, even as ye are called in one hope of your calling; One Lord, one faith, one baptism, One God and Father of all, who is above all, and through all, and in you all. But unto every one of us is given grace according to the measure of the gift of Christ." Ephesians 4:4-7

The call to unity must be within the framework of the fundamental doctrines set forth in the Word of God. Unity at any price is faulty, but unity in Christ is essential for the ongoing Church.

Church Extension is committed to the task of establishing a witness "in Jerusalem, and in all Judea, and in Samaria,..." This year has been one of endeavor, but seeing doors close for the moment. Sunday services and a Wednesday evening prayer service began at the Prospect Street Mission of Phillispburg, New Jersey during the year, but lack of development necessitated the termination of that ministry on October 13, 1968. Another area for witness was Hacketstown, New Jersey. All necessary preparations were made to invade this developing area for Christ. The Board decided to withdraw from the scene temporarily when informed that the Missionary Baptist opened a full-time pastor on the field.

The Board met with representatives of American Mission for Opening Closed Churches and the American Sunday School Union of Philadelphia to discuss ways and means of cooperation. Prospects for an Inner-City ministry in conjunction with the American Sunday School Union are in preliminary stages.

Other responsibilities of the Board included: placing Donald Barnhart in a training program under the supervision of Pastor Carl C. Cassel; meeting with the Ministerial Candidate Committee to discuss placement of candidates to assure adequate manpower to supply personnel for Church Extension; trips to churches under its care; placing financial responsibility for pastoral support in the hands of the Official Boards; receiving representatives from the Bible Fellowship Church of Denville, New Jersey and conferring with them on their projected plan of branch-church outreach.

The 1968 Ministerial Convention program was committed to the Board of Church Extension which was held at Victory Valley Camp. The theme for the two-day assembly focused on "Evangelism and Church Growth in the Bible Fellowship Church". Many hours of research and preparation went into the papers presented, thus contributing to an area of study needed within the Bible Fellowship Church. These dissertations can be procured by subject or in complete form at a nominal cost.

It was with deep regret that the Board of Church Extension accepted the resignation of Director of Church Extension, Earl M. Hosler, to be effective on or before September 1, 1968. Rev. Earl

M.Hosler accepted the call to be Pastor of the Grace Gospel Chapel at Rio Grande, New Jersey.

Pastor Austin B. Sullivan, Jr. felt led of the Lord to accept the position of Social Worker in the Children's Welfare Department of Northampton and Lehigh County. Austin terminated his work at Miller Heights Bible Fellowship Church in June and Donald Barnhart was assigned to that charge.

Rev. Daniel G. Ziegler, member of the Board of Church Extension and Pastor of the Bible Fellowship Church of Staten Island, New York, has been serving as Interim-Director since September 9, 1968 and he will continue in this capacity throughout the coming year. Remember him in prayer as he ministers in this capacity.

Contributions by the Bible Fellowship Churches have been a great encouragement to the Board. Advanced contributions enabled the Board to invest in Treasury Bills which have yielded additional income.

The Board of Church Extension has not been able to complete the study on the potential and duties of the Director of Church Extension, however, it will continue to study this assigned area.

Presently the Director's home is being occupied by the Herbert Dyke family on 424 Ridge Street, Emmaus, Pennsylvania. Rent is being received from the Board of Foreign Missions for the use of this facility.

# REPORT OF THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS OF THE BIBLE FELLOWSHIP CHURCH HOME

We are thankful to God for grace supplied, for devoted friends who prayed, and for consecrated workers who made it possible to carry on this worthy part of God's work. For eight years the Home was in operation at 38 South New Street, Nazareth, Pa. Clara Messner, the matron, assisted by Kathryn Rosencranz, looked after the interests of the Home and the comfort of the guests. We appreciate their devotion to the task to which God has given them.

Nineteen sixty-eight has been a year of achievement for the Bible Fellowship Church Home. On August 8, 1968, the new home at 7 South New Street, Nazareth, Pa., was approved by the Office of the Aging of the Department of Public Welfare and the Department of Labor and Industry of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania. Many friends attended Open House and the Dedication Ceremony, Saturday, September 14, 1968. The Administrator, the Reverend F.B. Hertzog, was in charge of the program.

The home will accomodate 28 guests. The bedrooms, which are 16 by 16 feet, are blue, green and beige. Each room has personal toilet facilities, a separate wash basin, large closet, two chests of drawers, two chairs, and separate beds. All rooms have been provided with curtains dividers, vinyl floor coverings or wall-to-wall carpet with matching draperies. The central living room, carpeted in beige-tweed, faces New Street and is located across from the Administrator's office. Modern dietary equipment has been placed in the kitchen to meet the needs of the guests. The dining room facilities can serve 32 guests comfortably.

The Board is very grateful for the offerings received from the Churches, the Women's Missionary Societies, Ladies Bible Class of Grace Church, Reading, Pa., and special gifts from individuals in the amount of \$5,783 to help purchase furniture, appliances and other equipment. Throughout the year the Home received donations with a cash value of \$580.

Various people are remembering the Bible Fellowship Church Home in their wills, as well as in their love gifts to the Lord's work. This institution is a non-profit, charitable organization, with all contributions tax deductible. #### REPORT OF THE BOARD OF MIZPAH GROVE

Apropos to the very nature of the ministry of Mizpah Grove was the climactic service of the Allentown District Camp on Sunday, July 21 which marked the completion of a most fruitful work at this location. A call to remembrance brought recollections of blessings untold; a challenge to resourcefulness brought to force the responsibility which rests upon the shoulders of members and friends of the Bible Fellowship Church.

Many talented persons blended toward forming a creative and interesting program staff: Donna Bailey served as Girls Program Director; Karen Ettinger served as C.I.T. Director and Assistant Coed Director; Don Knauer served as Boys Program and Coed Director; and Joseph Springer served as Assistant Program Director, giving inspiration to the athletic program and tirelessly worked on maintenance. Arthur "Toby" Frable served as Business Manager and horsemanship director. His wife, Betty Lou, served as counselor and head office secretary. Hank Snyder directed the two-week pioneer program for boys in a most successful manner. Rita Cressman directed the waterfront program as Red Cross swim instructor. The counseling staff of both senior and junior counselors inspired many new and stimulating ideas and activities in the area of special programs, sports, archery, music, writing, and nature. We had the faithful services of nurses Joan Springer, Ella Baker, and Janet Walters. Bill Belli served us well with his tasty cooking and his wife, Faye, served as assistant cook.

Seven girls comprised the counselor-in-training this year. Miss Ettinger provided a program of variety and depth in study and experience in Christian service and camping. The C.I.T. project of creating a worship center for the indoor chapel with red curtains, rustic cross, and the inscription, "Victory Through Christ," arcing the cross create a beautiful setting for the chapel. A camping trip to the Poconos was another enjoyable aspect of the C.I.T. program.

We are grateful for the services of our caretaker, Mr.Neil Montgomery, and we share with him in our prayers during this period of his wife's illness.

Development of the camp and its program is dependent in a real way upon our fellow Christians who share the vision of reaching children and teens for Christ through the intensive day to day contact of counselor to camper. We are thankful for the many men who participated in the three Work Days this past year on Saturdays, October 21, 1967, March 30 and May 18, 1968. Over 30 men responded each time.

We praise the Lord for all of you who helped to raise \$2,000 for debt reduction. Our debt is now \$19,000. We thank God for the group of men who are making the 1.9 acre pond possible.

We have several more challenges to meet:

- 1. To our public school teachers, we urge you to consider counseling at Victory Valley for several weeks.
  - 2. The need to build a new bath house in the Glen area.
  - The need to add kitchen storage and refrigeration, infirmary, program Staff office and meeting rooms.
  - 4. To find someone willing to pay the cost for one cabin unit a second cabin unit will be donated free.
  - 5. To continue to liquidate our indebtedness of \$19,000.00.

That each church make a contribution to Victory Valley Camp. The anticipated budget of the camp indicates need for contributions of at least \$5,550.00 by the churches. Checks shall be made payto Victory Valley Camp and sent to the secretary of the board before March 1, 1969.

Resolved, that we, the members of the Faith Bible Fellowship Church of Harleysville, petition the 85th Annual Conference meeting at Hatfield, Pa., October 14, 1968, to reopen the Faith and Order of our denomination and restudy our position concerning these two doctrines.

The following petition was found in the minutes of the Fourth Local Conference at Paradise, Pa.

Whereas, the Lord in His grace has been building His Church, adding to our number, and through the faithful stewardship of His saints, supplying our financial need, and

Whereas, full support for our pastor has been written into our budget for the new fiscal year, and

Whereas, the Bible Fellowship Church at Paradise desires, in view of the urgency of our times and the sufficiency of the Gospel, that funds graciously provided in past years for the establishment of a New Testament Church in our community now be directed to the establishment of other new churches, be it therefore

Resolved, that we, the membership of the Paradise Bible Fellowship Church, hereby petition the 85th Annual Conference of the Bible Fellowship Church, convened in Hatfield, Pa., on October 14, 1968, to recognize the Paradise Bible Fellowship Church as a self-supporting Station, with all the rights and privileges that pertain thereto, and further be it

Resolved, that we the Bible Fellowship Church at Paradise express our gratitude to our sister churches in the Bible Fellowship Church for their faithful assistance through the years and to our God for raising up and strengthening this testimony to His grace and for His glory.

#### REVISION

#### ARTICLE X ELECTING AND INSTALLING ELDERS

We offer a complete new wording for the last two paragraphs of the article on page 102.

AFTER PARAGRAPH: "after the members of the church... suited to the occasion", place the following three paragraphs:

The office of elder is perpetual since it involves the gift of God which cannot be laid aside at pleasure. Yet an elder may become by age or infirmity incapable of performing the duties of his office, or he may, though not chargeable with either heresy or immorality, become unacceptable in his official capacity to a majority of the congregation. For any of these reasons and elder may be declared inactive and therefore he shall no longer serve as a member of the Board of Elders.

If any particular chucch by congregational vote prefers to elect for a limited time in the exercise of their functions, this may be done; provided, the full time be not less than three years, and the Board of Elders be made to consist of three classes, one of which shall be elected every year; and provided that elders, once installed shall continue to be elders, though inactive when they are not reelected to serve as a member of the Board of Elders.

All active and inactive elders shall subscribe annually to the FAITH & ORDER of the Bible Fellowship Church. No person can be divested of this office except by deposition for failure to maintain standards of doctrine and life in keeping with the dignity of this office, but all elders, whether active or inactive, must maintain proper standards.

# ARTICLE XIV MINISTERS LABORING IN OTHER CHURCHES OR ORGANIZATIONS

We offer the following for paragraph one under article on p. 102, 1967 Year Book:

An ordained minister of the Bible Fellowship Church, consistently with his ordaination vows and without prejudice to his ministerial standing, may, properly under certain circumstances

and conditions, labor in churches or organizations other than those of the Bible Fellowship Church.

(Please note: the only change is the placing of a comma after the word may - ... prejudice to his ministerial standing, may,...)

### NEW -ARTICLE XI THE QUALIFICATIONS FOR THE CHRISTIAN MINISTRY

This material has been approved and appears in the mimeo FAITH & ORDER, page 19.

#### ARTICLE XII PROCEDURE FOR RECOGNITION OF A MINISTER

All men who desire to have ministerial credentials with the Bible Fellowship Church shall apply to the Ministerial Candidate Committee. Initial application should be made in writing to the chairman of the Committee; any minister in the denomination can supply the name and address of the current chairman.

Every man who is called to serve as pastor of a Bible Fellowship Church must have credentials with the denomination. Men who serve as supply pastors for an extended period of time shall be required to establish a proper relationship with this Committee.

Men Entering the Ministry. The Ministerial Candidate Committee divides those under its care into three groups: Applicants, Candidates and Probationers. An Applicant is a man who offers himself to this Committee for service in the Bible Fellowship Church; young men are encouraged to seek this recognition as early in their educational program as they sense the call of God to the ministry. A Candidate is a man whose application is accepted and who remains under the guidance of the Committee; men move to this group when they near the completion of their educational preparation for the ministry. A Probationer is a man who has been approved by this Committee, has passed an examination on the FAITH & ORDER of the Bible Fellowship Church, and is working in a Bible Fellowship Church or in one of the denominational ministries. After a Probationer has served at least two years, he may be recommended to the Credentials Committee for ordination examination. The minimum period of probationary service may be extended; having served as a Probationer does not guarantee ordination. Internship or field work program enhance the value of this probationary period when churches and men desire.

Men Received from Other Churches. This material has been approved and appears in mimeo FAITH & ORDER, p.20 - first four paragraphs.

Ordination. The Bible Fellowship Church understands ordination to the Christian ministry as the laying on of the hands of the elders of the Church accompanied by prayer and is the public

recognition by the Church of gifts previously given by God to one called to the ministry of the Word of God. The examination for ordination is conducted by the Credentials Committee of the Bible Fellowship Church. As long as an ordained minister maintains a relationship to this denomination he remains under the care of the Credentials Committee subscribing annually to the FAITH & ORDER.

#### REPORT OF THE HISTORICAL COMMITTEE

The Historical Committee mettwo times during the year. Consideration was given to matters pertaining to preserving the archival collection, making the historical materials readily accessible to responsible persons who are interested in understanding Bible Fellowship Church history, and encouraging and promoting appreciation for the heritage of our local churches and denomination among our constituency.

The committee encourages formation of, and addition to, local church archives in each of our congregations. The committee seeks the kind of historical appreciation and perspective among Bible Fellowship Church people that will eventuate in significant materials being offered for inclusion in our archives, which are housed at the Berean Bible School. Persons who have such articles

to offer may communicate with the archivist or with any member of the Historical Committee. An accurate description of the materials being offered should be submitted. The materials themselves should not be submitted until the donor is instructed concerning their acceptance.

#### REPORT OF PENSION COMMITTEE

The Pension Committee during the year continued its study of how to improve benefits available for our ordained ministers after retirement age has been reached. No conclusions have been made. A proposal to use a life insurance company for the investment of the available funds holds promise of producing more than is produced by the present plan. But the development of the study thus far is inconclusive and the committee will continue it and obtain similar proposals from other insurance companies.

With 36 active ministers' Contributions and \$5,000 from the administration budget we are adding to the existing fund at an average rate of \$209.48 per active minister. The proposal we have is based on an average input of \$250.00 a man a year merely to illustrate what can do done.

This is a proposal from Home Life Insurance Company for a plan qualified under section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code. A plan so qualified permits the self-employed minister to deduct his own contributions to the plan from his taxable income.

Each policy is issued by the company to the individual minister and he can make a contribution to the plan greater than the standard provision for his personal contribution without in any way affecting the other members in the plan, with this increased contribution on his part increasing his own ultimate benefits.

The maximum benefit under our existing program is \$102.68 per man per year, the proposal promises to yield the following results:

This proposal does not require any part of the reserve that has been developed. While seeking other proposals, we will also study the possibility of using the existing reserve to supplement the annuities for the older men in the group thereby making available to them annuities that, hopefully, might more nearly match those available under the life insurance proposal for men under 39 years of age.

Under this insurance proposal seven options are provided including an election to take a life income with a survivorship, which will guarantee the Pastor a monthly income as long as he lives. At his death, 2/3 of this amount is continued as guaranteed monthly income for the lifetime of the widow.

Studies are also being made to determine how best to provide life insurance for the pastor's wife and his dependent children.

### REPORT OF THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS OF THE BEREAN BIBLE SCHOOL

The great task of equipping men and women for Christian ministry may be summarized by Titus 2:11=15. "For the grace of God that bringeth salvation hath appeared to all men, teaching us that, denying ungodliness and worldly lusts, we should live soberly, righteously, and godly, in this present world; Looking for that blessed hope, and the glorious appearing of the great God and our Saviour Jesus Christ; Who gave himself for us, that he might redeem us from all iniquity, and purify unto himself a peculiar people, zealous of good works. These things speak, and exhort, and rebuke with all authority. Let no man despise thee."

Berean Bible School has faced some major problems this past year as well as major opportunities for advancement.

Several times throughout this year it was necessary to make loans to keep the regular expenses paid. This is indicative of the financial pressall schools are facing together with the rise in the cost of living.

A major part of this year was spent in discussing and seeking the answer to what direction the academic program should take. That is, should we pursue a two-year junior college program of liberal arts or continue in the tradition of the three or four year Bible College program?

A vast amount of effort went into the preparation of a self-evaluation study during the past two years. This work was consummated this year. The school applied for accreditation with the Accrediting Association of Bible Colleges.

Studies and meetings were part of the task of the planning committee to study the advisability of moving the campus to Pinebrook near Stroudsburg, Pa. At the Adjourned session of Annual Conference on Saturday, April 13, 1968 it was resolved to purchase Pinebrook and in this resolution the decision to move Berean was implied.

President Jansen E. Hartman continues to serve untiringly and and enthusiastically for the cause of Christian Higher education and the Lord.

The Board has accepted the resignation of Mr. Herbert E. Anderson as of September 15, 1968.

We <u>recommend</u> that each church be encouraged to support Berean Bible School at a level equal to 4% of its annual offerings and that this support be submitted to the school intwelve monthly payments. The laymen on the Board of Directors of Berean Bible School shall maintain contact throughout the year with the pastors and Official Boards of each church, keeping them informed of the

work of the school and its needs.

We recommend that Annual Conference approve the filing of an application by Berean Bible School with the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania, Department of Public Instruction for the granting of associate degrees and such honors as are appropriate to the programs offered, and further resolved that the Board be authorized to make changes in the Charter of Incorporation necessary to implement the granting of degrees.

# REPORT TO THE 85th ANNUAL CONFERENCE OF COMMITTEE TO CO-ORDINATE LEGISLATION PROPOSED BY THE BOARD OF CHURCH EXTENSION

The following was prepared for presentation to the Adjourned Session of the 84th Annual Conference. It deals with the material assigned to it by the following resolution:

"RESOLVED: that a study committee comprised of two representatives elected by each of the following: Board of Church Extension, Credentials Committee, Ministerial Candidate Committee, Committee to Study Pulpit Supply and Committee on Church Government correlate the proposed legislation submitted to this Annual Conference by the Board of Church Extension with legislation proposed by their respective Boards and Committees, and that this Committee report to the Adjourned Session of this Annual Conference." (p. 19, 1967 Year Book)

After a lengthy and thorough discussion of the various problems which the legislation presented, the Committee makes the following recommendations offered as legislation for First Reading:

- I. Any congregation meeting the standards of Article XVIII of the FAITH & ORDER is a member of the Annual Conference and shall be known as a church.
- II. Any congregation which has a relationship to the Bible Fellowship Church but has not yet met the standards for recognition as a church shall be called a mission.\*
- \* The term "mission" is used in a technical sense, but this does not preclude the use of the term "church" in any of the congregation's public relations activities.
- III. When in the opinion of the Board of Church Extension, a mission has attained to the standards set forth in Article XVIII, the Board shall recommend to Annual Conference that this mission be recognized as a church and that it be admitted to the membership of Annual Conference. This recognition will be by a majority vote of Annual Conference.
- IV. Any Church which desires financial aid from the Conference shall make written application to the Board of Church Extension on forms provided by that Board.
- V. Financial aid to Churches shall be made by the Board of Church Extension upon approval of the required application.
- VI. All Churches which receive financial aid from the Board of Church Extension shall be under the jurisdiction of the Church Extension Department. The Board of Church Extension and the Director may counsel and advise the Churches under their jurisdiction in matters of pastoral relations and pulpit supply.
- VII. The Availability list shall include the names of all men who indicate a willingness to pastor a Bible Fellowship Church who are ordained or who are probationers. The Ministerial Candidate Committee shall inform the Credentials Committee of probationers who are willing to pastor a Bible Fellowship Church.
- VIII. The Board of Church Extension shall participate in Annual Conference Pulpit Supply procedures on behalf of the missions under its jurisdiction to supply pastors for them. It shall seek to call a pastor for each of these missions, according to the By-laws of the Bible Fellowship Church which govern Pulpit Supply in which the Board of Church Extension shall function in lieu of the Official Board.
- IX. For procurement of pastors to open new churches, the Board of Church Extension shall be permitted to call available men. If a

pastor accepts such a call he shall notify the Credentials Committee of his acceptance not later than September 1 and reference to his commitment be included on the Availability List. The Board of Church Extension shall confirm to the Credentials Committee his commitment not later than September 1.

In addition to the above, we also recommend that:

The Fourth resolution on page 18, 1967 Year Book, not be presented for Second Reading.

### REPORT OF THE CONFERENCE CENTER PLANNING COM-MITTEE

The Committee met several times during the year to carry on the work. This included recommending to the Adjourned Session the purchase of Pinebrook and the planning of the program for Labor Day at Pinebrook.

1. Whereas, there was discussion about including Victory Valley Camp in the planning for our Conference Center, and

Whereas, the Conference Center Planning Committee has studied the evidence and has voted to exclude Victory Valley Camp from the Conference Center due to the distinctiveness of the children's and teenage programs and the difficulty of maintaining these programs in close proximity to a school or Bible Conference therefore.

Resolved, that the 85th Annual Conference declare that Victory Valley Camp be excluded from the Conference Center at Pinebrook.

2. Whereas, the 85th Annual Conference will elect the Berean Bible School Board, the Pinebrook Bible Conference Board and the responsibility for the work of the Conference Center at Pinebrook, therefore,

Resolved, that these Boards carry out the commitment with Wolf and Hahn, Architects and further

Resolved, that this committee be dissolved.

### REPORT OF PULPIT SUPPLY COMMITTEE

The Pulpit Supply Committee planned and presented the program held on March 9, 1968, to further the understanding of the Proposed System presented originally in 1966.

The Committee notes the repetition of old difficulties and the occurrence of some new problems as evidence of the continuing inability of the present system to cope with our pulpit supply problems.

The Committee has become aware of a group of men who feel the present system can be adequately revised. The Committee itself did not share this opinion. However, to allow progress it recommends that a committee of five men who believe the present system can be made adequate by revising it be appointed by the Chairman and that it be given the assignment of preparing such a revision and to present it to the Adjourned Session of the 85th Annual Conference.

### REPORT OF STATIONING AND APPROPRIATING COMMITTEE

The Committee ratified the action of the local churches and of the pastors who accepted calls from such churches under our pulpit supply procedures.

After organizing and reviewing the progress made under our pulpit supply procedures, the delegates from the mission churches were invited to join the committee as advisory members.

The record made at the 85th Annual Conference shows that in the year just ended, nine of our churches did not give their ministers in cash the minimum of \$4,500 required for membership in the Stationing and Appropriating Committee that was set as becoming effective October 1, 1968. Without further identifying these churches in this report, they are being encouraged at least to meet this minimum during the coming year.

On page 91 of the 1967 Year Book is a recommendation from the Board of Church Extension that the appropriation to the Conference Superintendent made out of funds contributed for Church Extension work be discontinued.
