

#### WITH THE LORD



TIMOTHY D. GEHRET was born in 1885 in the Terre Hill parsonage the son of Rev.and Mrs.A.B.Gehret. He peacefully passed from this life on Sunday, November 21, 1971 in the Allentown Hospital, Allentown, Pa.

A memorial service was held on Wednesday, November 24, 1972 in his home church, Allentown, Bethel. The service was conducted by Pastor James G.Koch and Jansen E.Hartman. The Pastors' Quartet sang.

Brother Gehret was active in the ministry and even into his years of retirement. He was licensed to preach in 1921 and served the following churches: Harrisburg, Philadelphia (Calvary), Scranton, Sunbury, Easton and the Fleetwood-Blandon circuit.

In 1945-54, he served as District Superintendent of the Bethlehem District and then from 1962-67 as District Superintendent of the Allentown District. Although retiring on age in 1967, he kept a keen interest in the affairs of the church. He filled many pulpits in supply.

During his ministry he held many administrative offices: Chairman of the Board of Directors of Berean Bible School, Chairman of the Board of Directors of the Bible Fellowship Church Home, General Secretary of the Board of Foreign Missions and Secretary of the Annual Conference. He was also delegate to the General Conference on several occasions.

The following are excerpts from the reflections on the life of Brother Gehret as presented by Jansen E.Hartman at the Memorial Service:

"All of us have observed the life of Brother Gehret. Each of us has received something from him.

"As the servant of Jesus Christ, he was gifted of God for the benefit of the church. Whatever residue remains with us, all honor for it belongs to God. Only God can regenerate a man, anoint his lips and give him a message. Such was the story of Brother Gehret's life and ministry.

"I asked one minister what he remembered most about Brother Gehret. He said, 'He had a heart for pastors.'

"There is an element of completeness to his ministry which was allowed to continue into his period of retirement.

"In his dealing with others, he was always direct and forthright. It was not difficult to know where he stood on issues. Although men differed with him on positions, I never knew him to be bitter. He was a man of integrity."

He is survived by his widow, Esther (Deppe), two sons, Robert W.of Ephrata and Lloyd of Allentown and a daughter, Marilyn also of Allentown. Also three grandchildren.



WINFRED B. HOTTEL was born in 1920 in the parsonage in Philadelphia (Salem) and passed from this life on May 8, 1972 after an illness of over two years. He was the son of the late Rev.F.M. Hottel and Mrs.Ida Hottel who survives him. Also he is survived by his widow, Edna R.(Lee) and two children: Darlene, wife of Jonathan Reynolds, Zionsville, Pa., and David at home. Pastor Hottel held his membership in the Blandon Church while on a leave of absence from the active pastorate. He served faithfully as class leader and Sunday School teacher.

A private interment service was held in the afternoon of May 11, 1972 and a public memorial service was conducted that evening in the Grace Bible Fellowship Church, Reading, Pa.

Pastor Arthur H.Frable, brother Hottel's pastor, read Romans 8: 18-39 and then reflected on the attitude of Brother Hottel in the light of impending death and extreme suffering.

Rev.Carl C.Cassel sang two of Brother Hottel's favorite hymns: "Guide Me, O Thou Great Jehovah" and "O the Depth of the Riches."

In the message, Pastor Jansen E.Hartman paralleled the truths of Psalm 49 to the testimony of Brother Hottel's life. As the Psalmist declares that there is no fear when times of trouble come, so Brother Hottel knew no fear in the light of his departure from this life. The two years of his illness were years of blessing both to his own soul as he was drawn into a special revelation of the love of God and in the lives of those who visited him as they observed the radiance of spiritual victory in the life of one who truly practiced faith in the declaration of God's Word that all things work together for good to them that love God.

W.B.Hottel pastored churches in: Binghamton, N.Y., Stroudsburg, Philadelphia (Emmanuel), Philadelphia (Calvary), Mount Carmel and Terre Hill. He was graduated from Reading High School in 1938, Albright College in 1943 and Eastern Baptist Theological Seminary in 1945. He was ordained to the Gospel ministry in 1947.

Pastor Hottel's body was laid to rest in the Laureldale Cemetery, Reading, Pa. His spirit is at home with the Lord, rejoicing in the mighty deliverance of a sovereign Saviour.



PAUL T.STENGELE, a son of the late Franklin and Sophia (Weir) Stengele, died suddenly on Monday October 2, 1972 at the age of 75 years, 9 months and 15 days, while in the midst of moving from his home at Orefield, Pa., to a new residence in Bethlehem, Pa. However, instead of moving to Bethlehem, God saw fit to move him to his heavenly home.

Paul T. or P.T.Stengele as he was known to his intimate friends was a active minister of the Bible Fellowship Church from 1918 until the time of his retirement in 1961. He was saved at an early age and dedicated more than half of his life time to the Lord's work. After spending several years in the former Gospel Herald Society, in training for the ministry, under the leadership of the Rev. W.G.Gehman, he was licensed to preach in 1918 and ordained in 1923.

During his 43 years of ministry he served the following pastorates: Scranton, Easton, Bethlehem and Reading. He served for 8 years as District Superintendent of the Allentown District, and Chairman of the Annual Conference for the same number of years. He was a member of the General Conference Executive Committee for several terms, a delegate to General Conference on several occasions, and served as a member of numerous Boards and Committees of the Church.

He was keenly aware of his call to the ministry, dedicated to his work, studious, and a preacher of the Word. He was a man of faith and prayer, with strong convictions, and was a fearless and conscientious preacher. It is needless to say that his ministry was blessed of God, souls were saved and established inthhe faith. His influence continues to live in the lives and witness of those who sat at his feet and shared his ministry.

He leaves to mourn his wife Gertrude (Cobb) Stengele, a son Royce G. of Kilgore, Texas; a daughter Eunice, wife of Robert P. Jones of Bethlehem, Pa., a sister Ruth of Cleveland, Ohio; four grandchildren.

Like Enoch of old, brother Stengele walked with God and God took him; St.Paul tells us that to be with the Lord is far better. We know also that this separation will only be for a little while, we shall meet him in the morning when our Lord shall gather His own unto Himself in that home He has gone to prepare for us.

## BUSINESS RULES OF THE CONFERENCE

- 1. Two sessions shall be held daily as follows: From 9:00 a.m. to 12:00 noon and from 1:30 p.m. to 5:00 p.m.
- 2. The Chairman shall take his seat precisely at the time to which the Conference is to convene, open and conduct the devotional exercises. The Secretary shall call the roll and read the minutes of the preceding meeting, after which business shall proceed as follows:
  - (a) Committee Reports, (b) Petitions, (c) Unfinished Business, (d) Miscellaneous Business
- 3. Anyone wishing to speak shall rise and respectfully address the Chair. In case more than one should address the Chair at the same time, the Chairman shall decide who is entitled to the floor.
- 4. No one shall be allowed to speak more than ten minutes on any subject unless he receives permission by the Chair.
- 5. No one shall speak the second time until all who desire have spoken. He shall then ask permission by the Chair.
  - 6. It shall be the duty of the Chairman to preserve order.
- 7. A Resolution to be effective must appear on the Minutes of the current year's proceedings. Said Resolution must appear on the Minutes for a least three successive years before it can be placed in the Standing Rules of the Conference.
- 8. Robert's Rules of Order is the basis for our parliamentary procedure.
- 9. Two copies of the Reports of all Standing Boards and Committees shall be mimeographed and sent to the Pastors one week previous to Annual Conference. Questions may be asked and corrections made before inclusion into the Annual Conference minutes. Reports shall not be read publicly, unless called for from the Conference floor.
- 10. Any exception to the Standing Rules may be allowed by three-fourth (3/4) of the Annual Conference. The reason for such exception shall be fully spread on the Minutes.
- 11. All proposals to amend our FAITH AND ORDER must pass reading at two Annual Conferences by a two-third vote by ballot before final adoption.
- 12. The Annual Conference may grant the status of self-support to a church which has contributed the minimum pastor's salary and has petitioned Annual Conference requesting such status declaring that it no longer desires Church Extension appropriation.

(The minimum Pastor's salary is \$5,400.00 effective October 1, 1971)

13. At the last meeting of Annual Conference a Nominating Committee shall be elected, composed of four ordained ministers and three laymen, to present nominees for the elections of the following year's Annual Conference.

Year Book - The Secretary of the Annual Conference shall be Editor of the Year Book. The official minutes of the Annual Conference shall be published therein.

The Secretary of the Annual Conference shall send Year Books to the Eastern and Western Clergy Bureaus and to any other agencies deemed advisable.

The Church shall be responsible to pay for Year Books when ordered.

In case a church or parsonage is built or purchased during the year, a photograph of the same shall be taken and a picture inserted in the Year Book next year.

## (SPECIAL LAWS AND RESOLUTIONS)

Members of the Angual Conference shall be a follows:

- 1. All ordained ministers of the Bible Fellowship Church laboring under the direction of the Annual Conference.
- 2. All Probationers who have charge of a Conference appointment under the direction of the Annual Conference.
  - 3. All retired ministers of the Bible Fellowship Church.
- 4. Lay delegate(s) from each Church as provided by the FAITH AND ORDER.

Advisory members of the Annual Conference shall be as follows:

- 1. Ordained ministers of the Bible Fellowship Church who retains their membership in one of our local churches, and who are engaged in Christian service not directly responsible to our Annual Conference.
  - 2. Church Extension Pastors
- 3. Missionaries who hold membership in one of our **lo**cal Churches and are under the supervision of the Board of Foreign Missions of the Bible Fellowship Church.
- 4. Advisory members shall not be permitted to participate in Conference discussions except by request of the Chairman.

## APPLICANTS AND PROBATIONERS

- A. No applicant for the ministry shall be received into the Conference as a Probationer who is not willing to submit himself unconditionally to the Annual Conference.
- B. No Probationer shall be ordained who is not fully in accord with the FAITH AND ORDER of the Bible Fellowship Church.

#### LOCAL CONFERENCE RULES

A. No person shall be elected to the office of Deacon, Class Leader or Sunday School Superintendent who uses or deals in tobacco.

- B. In case a Local congregation desires to sell church property they must receive the approval of the Board of Directors of the Bible Fellowship Church before conveying title.
- C. The Women's Missionary Society shall report to the Local Conference.

#### CONFERENCE TREASURER

The Annual Conference shall elect a Treasurer annually who shall be Treasurer of the Board of Directors of the Bible Fellowship Church and Board of Victory Valley.

He shall deposit all the various funds in banks and trust companies approved by the Board of Directors of the Bible Fellowship Church in the name of the Bible Fellowship Church.............

Treasurer. The various Boards shall draw on the Treasurer for the funds needed, using form of voucher check furnished by the Annual Conference. They shall not draw beyond the amount of their respective funds except by permission of the Board of Directors of the Bible Fellowship Church.

The Treasurer shall keep an account of the amounts drawn by each Board in a book furnished by the Annual Conference and report to the Annual Conference the standing of each fund, and furnish each member of the Board of Directors of the Bible Fellowship Church annually with a statement itemizing the various securities held and the monies on deposit in banks and trust companies.

#### BOARDS AND COMMITTEES

Board of Directors of the Bible Fellowship Church - The Annual Conference shall elect a Board of Directors consisting of five ministers who are members of the Annual Conference and willing to minister under the direction of our Conference, the FAITH & ORDER of the Bible Fellowship Church and the By-laws of the Corporation, and four laymen in good standing with their Local Conference, which Board shall then organize by electing the following officers: President, Vice-President, Corporate Secretary and Financial Secretary.

All vacancies occurring between Annual Conference sessions shall be elected by the remaining members of the Board.

The Board of Directors shall have charge of all the property belonging to the Corporation including property now held by the Executive Board in trust for the Annual Conference of the Bible Fellowship Church, except where there is a regularly organized class or church that has a local Board of Trustees and where the Annual Conference has otherwise provided for, by electing a separate Board of Trustees.

The Board of Directors shall determine how and where the money of the Corporation shall be deposited, and also have the right to place it on certificate of deposit, or saving deposit, or made substantial investments.

The Board of Directors shall not buy nor sell any property except by the approval of all the members of the Board of Directors or by Annual Conference resolution.

The Board of Directors shall have the authority to sell any property deeded to a local Board of Trustees at places where for any reason there is no longer a local Board, or class, or organized church, and execute and deliver a lawful deed and conveyances, and use the net proceeds of the sale of such property for other church properties as it may deem advisable.

The Board of Directors shall have the right to borrow money and issue mortgages or make loans against any property of the Corporation by the approval of all the members of the Board, or by Annual Conference resolution. The Board shall authorize the satisfaction and cancellation of any mortgage as notes fully paid.

It shall act as a Board of Advisors to the Pastors and the Board of Church Extension in matters relative to the purchasing of properties for church purposes and the erection of churches and parsonages.

The title of Church property where the Church is incorporated shall be conveyed directly to the Corporation. In cases where the church is not incorporated the conveyance shall be made to a Board of Trustees duly elected according to the Rules of the Annual Conference (setting forth their names), their successors and assigns. Whether the title is conveyed to a corporation or to a Board of Trustees, said title shall contain a trust clause in the following words:

The title to parsonages shall be conveyed in like manner as the churches and shall contain the following clause of trust:

In trust, that said premises shall be kept, maintained and disposed of as a place of residence for the use and occupancy of the

preachers of the Bible Fellowship Church who are from time to time duly appointed in said place according to the rules and usages of said church, and if sold, the proceeds to be used according to the rules of said church. If the congregation controlling this property shall be disbanded the property shall be controlled and disposed of according to the rules of the Bible Fellowship Church.

Board of Foreign Missions -A General Secretary shall be elected annually by ballot by the Annual Conference from among the ordained ministers. by virtue of his office he shall be a member of the Board of Foreign Missions. The Board of Foreign Missions shall be composed of the General Secretary, four ordained ministers and four laymen. All money contributed throughout the Conference for the cause of foreign missions shall be paid to the General Secretary of the Board of Foreign Missions. They shall disburse the funds that they receive for the spread of the Gospel.

The members of the church shall be respectfully recommended to forward their funds for the foreign missionaries through the local church and not to the missionaries directly, which would lessen or cause to neglect their contributions in the direct channel provided by Annual Conference for the support pledged to our respective missionaries.

<u>Ministers' Retirement Fund</u> - This shall be a permanent Fund for the benefit of retired ministers of the Bible Fellowship Church.

The object of this Fund shall be to provide and pay annuities to ministers of the Bible Fellowship Church who by reason of age are no longer qualified to continue in active service; also to provide and pay annuities to the widows of such ministers according to the rules hereinafter stated.

The Fund shall be sustained by:

- 1. From the Annual Conference Administrative Budget
- 2. Each Pastor shall pay into this Fund from his salary and from his Church Extension appropriation as follows: one percent of the first thousand dollars or fraction thereof,  $1\frac{1}{2}$  percent of the second thousand dollars and above. Payments shall be made by April first and at the Annual Conference.
- 3. This Fund will also welcome gifts, bequests and devises from any source.

This Retirement Fund shall be deposited with the Treasurer as a separate account and be under the management and control of the Board of Directors of the Bible Fellowship Church.

<u>Annuities</u> - First - If a minister of the Bible Fellowship Church has attained the age of sixty-five (65) he may retire from the active ministry and dating from the time he received his Probationer's

License he shall receive an annuity of thirty dollars and eighty cents (\$30.80) for each year of active service payable in monthly installments.

Second - The retirement age for Pastors is established at 72 years.

Third - Services rendered after the age of seventy-two years shall in no case increase the Annuity. Annuities shall in no case exceed twelve hundred thirty-two dollars per year. If, however, the money in the Retirement Fund at any time should not warrant the payment of the Annuities in full, the Board of Directors shall determine the amount of the monthly installments pro rata.

Fourth - No minister shall be entitled to the full amount of the Annuities unless he and the congregation that he served shall have paid in full as stipulated in paragraph one, two and three for the period of five years. No exceptions to this rule may be made except by the decision of the Board of Directors.

Fifth - In case a minister is located by the Annual Conference he ceases to be a member of the Retirement Fund. In this case one half of the dues he had paid into the Fund shall be refunded to him and he thereby forfeits all further claims upon the Fund. A minister who has given thirty years or more service and desires to change his occupation shall become an annuitant at the age of sixty-five (65), and receive an annuity for the years of actual service.

Sixth - Widows of deceased ministers who had complied with the provisions of the Fund shall receive annuities beginning at the time of the death of the husband provided that the said widow shall have attained the age of sixty-five years or at the time she shall attain attain the age of sixty-five years, and continue until the time of her death or remarriage or her severance from church membership of the Bible Fellowship Church. Widows of ministers who were retired and receiving annuities at the time of the marriage shall in no case receive any annuity. Widows' annuities shall be compiled at the rate of \$15,40 for each year that she was the wife of a minister who was in active service, giving his whole time to ministry in the Church, but in no case to exceed six hundred sixteen dollars in one year.

The Treasurer shall acknowledge to the various Pastors any contributions which he has received from time to time for this Fund.

#### SPECIAL SERVICES

- A. Matrimony Each Pastor shall preach a sermon on Matrimony at each appointment on his charge in the first year.
- B. The Lord's Coming Believing that the coming of the Lord is rapidly approaching, therefore we recommend our ministers to give

still more earnest prominence to this blessed hope of the Church as we see the day approaching.

C. As the Scriptures contain a number of instances where children of Godly parents were formally and publicly dedicated to the Lord, (I Sam.1:24-28; Mark 10:13-16), we heartily encourage our people to dedicate their children to the Lord by prayer and laying on of the hands of the Elders, who shall then furnish proper certificates.

#### MISCELLANEOUS

- A. Transfers when a good standing member moves from one class to another, his or her name shall be transferred at once.
- B. No charge shall be brought against any Annual Conference member which has not been recorded in the Local Conference proceedings of their charge, except such as have been committed or discovered since the last Local Conference.
- C. The Pastor, by virtue of his office, shall be counted as an officer of the Sunday School.
- D. Annual Conference Minutes The Committee on Examination of Annual Conference Minutes shall carefully compare the Annual Year Book with the Annual Conference Minutes and note any and all errors, make a copy of any and all corrections, omissions or additions and certify in the following form:

We hereby certify that we have examined the Annual Conference Minutes for the Session of......and found them correct except as follows......

Two copies of this certification shall be made and signed by the Committee and pasted into two copies of the Conference Year Book, one to be held by the Chairman of the Annual Conference and one by the Secretary. These shall serve as the Records of the Annual Conference.

- E. Any church may use a nominating committee to make nominations for Church officers when this desire is expressed by a Local Conference resolution. The Pastor shall be chairman of this Committee.
- F. The Secretary of Annual Conference shall receive by September 1, all Local Conference petitions. The Secretary of the Local Conference shall be responsible for sending a copy of the petition(s) to the Secretary of the Annual Conference. The Secretary of the Annual Conference shall send two copies to each Pastor by September 15.
- G. All needs for support of missionary work not under the jurisdiction of the Board of Church Extension shall be controlled by the Board of Foreign Missions.

- H. The travelling expenses for all official Church business shall be  $10\phi$  per mile. (Effective, October 15, 1971)
- I. The Conference Secretary shall inform in writing all men who are not present at Annual Conference of their election to Boards and Committees.
- J. Each Board and Committee shall have its records audited by an auditor(s) chosen by the Board or Committee prior to preparing its report for Annual Conference and that the name of the auditor(s) be included in the report to Annual Conference.
- K. The tenure of men elected to study committees created for a specific assignment shall continue until completion of the specific assignment. Vacancies due to death, resignation or other cause shall be filled by further elections.
- L. Each church shall make an annual contribution to the Board of Christian Education by April 1.
- M. Each church shall contribute to the support of Pinebrook Junior College, to be remitted to the college in twelve monthly payments, or four quarterly payments.
- N. All Church Extension funds shall be forwarded quarterly to the Treasurer of the Board of Church Extension.
- O. Each church shall make an annual contribution to the Bible Fellowship Church Home. Checks shall be made payable to the Bible Fellowship Church Home and submitted by April 1.
- P. Each church shall make an annual contribution to Victory Valley Camp. Checks shall be made payable to Victory Valley Camp and sent to the Financial Secretary of the Board of Victory Valley before March 1.
- Q. All foreign missions funds shall be forwarded quarterly to the General Secretary of the Board of Foreign Missions.
- R. The mimeographed copies of the Articles of Faith and Order of the Bible Fellowship Church which have been adopted by the Annual Conference be our official FAITH AND ORDER. This shall be the official FAITH AND ORDER to which the Pastors shall annually subscribe.

  - d. Appropriation from Administrative Budget
- 5. The Business Manager shall deposit all funds in a bank or trust company approved by the Board of Publication and Printing to be disbursed at the direction of the Board.

#### ARTICLE X - ANNUAL CONFERENCE

The church consists of many congregations which need mutual counsel and assistance to preserve soundness of doctrine and discipline, to enter into ioint efforts for the advancement of the work of Christ and to prevent infidelity, error and immorality. From this arises the importance and usefulness of assemblies of particular churches.

The assembly of churches shall represent, in one body, all the particular churches of this denomination and shall be called the Annual Conference of the Bible Fellowship Church.

The Annual Conference shall consist of every ordained minister laboring in direct relationship to the Bible Fellowship Church, and its agencies, every ordained missionary, every ordained minister who is retired, every probationer who has been called to pastor a church, and one lay elder from every properly constituted church with a membership of two hundred or less and one additional lay elder for every hundred members in excess of the first two hundred, ordained ministers on leave of absence, ordained ministers who retain membership in one of the churches and who are engaged in Christian service not directly related to the Annual Conference, probationers who have not been called to pastor a church and missionaries who hold membership in one of the churches and are under the supervision of the Board of Foreign Missions, shall be advisory members of the Annual Conference. They shall not participate in the deliberations of the sessions except by permission by the chairman.

The Annual Conference shall provide legislation, govern the affairs of the churches on the denomination level and receive appeals, complaints or other references from churches about doctrine or government. It alone shall have the power to amend the FAITH AND ORDER. It shall decide issues as a final court of appeal. Although it is responsible for these duties, it shall not invade the autonomy of the particular churches.

The Annual Conference shall have the power to resolve questions of doctrine or discipline seriously and reasonably proposed; to reprove, warn or bear testimony against error in doctrine or immorality in practice in any church; to examine and license candidates for the ministry; to ordain, install, judge and remove ministers; to examine and approve or censure the records of particular churches; to unite or divide congregations at the request of the people; to provide supervision of vacant pulpits and to give counsel in calling pastors.

It shall keep and publish a record of the proceedings of its sessions and make them available to the membership of the churches.

Each meeting of the Annual Conference shall be opened and closed with prayer. The business sessions shall be conducted according to the Standing Rules (Business Rules of the Conference). The parliamentary procedure shall be according to Robert's Rules of Order except in places where the standing rules provide otherwise.

# ARTICLE XI - MINISTERS LABORING IN OTHER CHURCHES OR ORGANIZATIONS

An ordained minister of the Bible Fellowship Church, consistently with his ordination vows and without prejudice to his ministerial standing, may properly under certain circumstances and conditions, labor in churches or organizations other than those of the Bible Fellowship Church.

The following rules must be adhered to in such cases:

- 1. Such labor shall not require the performance of funtions inconsistent with his ordination vows required of ministers and other provisions of the FAITH AND ORDER of the Bible Fellowship Church.
- 2. They shall not be regarded as under the sole jurisdiction of the organization in which they serve. Such an organization must recognize that those who hold credentials with the Bible Fellowship Church are under its discipline in their faith and life.

# ARTICLE XII. - THE QUALIFICATIONS, FOR THE CHRISTIAN MINISTRY

# ARTICLE XIII - PROCEDURE FOR RECOGNITION OF A MINISTER

All men who desire to have ministerial credentials with the Bible Fellowship Church shall apply to the Ministerial Candidate Committee. Initial application should be made in writing to the chairman of the Committee; any minister in the denomination can supply the name and address of the current chairman.

Every man who is called to serve as a pastor of a Bible Fellowship Church must have credentials with the denomination. Men who serve as supply pastors for an extended period of time shall be required to establish a proper relationship with this Committee.

Men Entering the Ministry. The Ministerial Candidate Committee divides those under its care into three groups:

Applicants, Candidates and Probationers. An Applicant is a man who offers himself to this Committee for service in the Bible Fellowship Church; young men are encouraged to seek this recognition as early in their educational program as they sense the call of God to the ministry. A Candidate is a man whose application is accepted and who remains under the guidance of this Committee; men move to this group when they near the completion of their educational preparation for the ministry. A Probationer is a man who has been approved by this Committee, has passed an examination on the FAITH AND ORDER of the Bible Fellowship Church, and is working in a Bible Fellowship Church or in one of the denominational ministries. After a Probationer has served at least two years, he may be recommended to the Credentials Committee for ordination examination. The minimum period of probationary service may be extended; having served as a Probationer does not guarantee ordination. Internship or field work programs enhance the value of this probationary period when churches and men desire.

Men Received from Other Churches. This material has been approved and appears in mimeo FAITH AND ORDER, page 20 - first four paragraphs.

Ordination. The Bible Fellowship Church understands ordination to the Christian ministry to be the laying on of the hands of the elders of the Church accompanied by prayer and the public recognition by the Church of gifts previously given by God to one called to the ministry of the Word of God. The examination for ordination is conducted by the Credentials Committee of the Bible Fellowship Church. So long as an ordained minister maintains a relationship to this denomination he remains under the care of the Credentials Committee subscribing annually to the FAITH AND ORDER.

#### ARTICLE XIV - PULPIT SUPPLY PROCEDURE

This material has been approved and appears in 1971 Year Book, page 13-22.

#### ARTICLE XV - AGENCIES OF THE ANNUAL CONFERENCE

The churches individually and as a body recognize their responsilibity for the growth of the church in this country and overseas, for the ministry, for education, for camps and conferences, for youth work, for publications, for ministerial pensions and relief and for other appropriate concerns.

The Annual Conference shall establish boards, committees or offices, temporary or permanent, incorporated or unincorporated for the discharge of these responsibilities.

Such agencies shall perform all their acts as the servants of and in accordance with the rules of the Bible Fellowship Church; they shall be accountable to and submit reports to the Annual Conference as it may require.

The Annual Conference is empowered to consider the programs of such agencies to correlate their work, to prevent duplication of effort and to guide the development of denominational programs. Each agency shall administer its own program and finances in conformity to policy which has been approved by the Annual Conference.

#### ARTICLE XVI - CHAIRMAN

To conduct the business of the Annual Conference in an orderly and efficient manner, a chairman shall be chosen by and from the membership of the Annual Conference.

The chairman by his election shall be considered to possess, by delegation from the whole body, all authority necessary to direct the meetings of the Annual Conference according to the rules of the Bible Fellowship Church.

When there is a tie vote, the chairman shall have the deciding vote. If he is not willing to decide, he shall call for a second ballot; if the vote is again tie, the issue shall be considered lost.

Before the Annual Conference adjourns it shall elect by ballot the Chairman for the next Annual Conference. A Chairman shall be eligible to succeed himself twice. After the close of the Annual Conference, the chairman shall have the power to convene the Annual Conference by circulating a written call for such a session giving the members two weeks notice.

#### ARTICLE XVII - SECRETARY

Each Annual Conference before adjournment shall elect by ballot a secretary from its membership. He shall record its transactions, preserve the records carefully, and prepare for publication the proceedings of the Annual Conference. He shall furnish certified excerpts from the minutes of the Annual Conference when properly requested; when such excerpts are given, they shall be considered as authentic evidence of the fact which they declare. The secretary is empowered to appoint any assistants he needs.

Resolved, that in an incorporated congregation, the Board of Elders shall choose from their number the authorized legal representatives according to their respective Articles of Incorporation.

Resolved, that in an unincorporated congregation, three trustees shall be elected by and from the Board of Elders to be the authorized legal representatives.

- 6. All foreign missions funds shall be forwarded quarterly to the General Secretary of the Board of Foreign Missions.

On April 3, 1972, Pastor Harold C. Weaber, in response to a call from the church at Shamokin, Pa., began his new pastorate, having resigned his position with the church at Finesville, N.J. Prior to receiving Brother Weaber, Shamokin was without a pastor for six months.

On July 3, 1972, Pastor John H. Herb was installed as pastor of Salem Bible Fellowship Church of Allentown, Pa., having resigned his pastorate at Belvidere. Salem Church had been without a pastor for eight months following the resignation of Pastor Leon Overpeck, who retains his credentials with us but has taken employment with another Christian organization.

We praise God for the willing help of so many brethren who graciously assisted these churches while they were without a pastor.

On September 24, 1972, Pastor William W. Mull submitted his resignation to the church at Sunbury, Pa. The congregation has not yet voted on his resignation. No effective date has been set.

Pastor Daniel G. Ziegler, for thepast several years has been pastor of the Bible Fellowship Church of Staten Island, N.Y., and by the loving consideration of the people of Staten Island, also has served as Interim Director of the Church Extension Department. Having been elected full-time director of the Church Extension Department, Pastor Ziegler resigned his pastorate, effective September 30, 1972.

Reverend and Mrs.Richard J.Gehman are planning to return to Kenya on November 17, 1972. At his request, October 8, 1972, is the date when he will be relieved of his assignment as a supply pastor to the church at Stroudsburg, Pa.

At this date, the Bible Fellowship Churches named below are actively seeking men who are qualified and willing to consider a call to the respective pastorates:

Belvidere, N.J. Finesville, N.J. Staten Island, N.Y. Stroudsburg, Pa.

Several months ago, Pastor David J. Branning stated his opinion that his church would be benefited by calling another pastor. He was quite firm and sincere in his opinion, even though the Lord has blessed the ministry at Walnutport; during this year fourteen having been baptized and received into church membership. His congregation voted almost unanimously not to accept his resignation. After much soul searching and prayer, in the company of the elders of the Walnutport church, Pastor Branning withdrew his resignation and agreed to continue as pastor.

# The Minister's Salary

After excluding those churches who had pastors either part-time or for a part of the year, the 1971 Yearbook indicates pastors' salaries were in ranges as follows:

We recommend that the minimum pastor's salary be fixed at \$6000 effective October 1, 1972. If such a level for a pastor's remuneration is a hardship, we respectfully urge that church to make application to the Church Extension Department for assistance.

We also beseech each church deeply to consider the rising costof-living, including the circumstance that for a pastor an automobile is practically a must and generally must be purchased and operated out of the meager salaries allowed. As one measure of our salary scale, we call attention to the salary scale for public school teachers in suburban Philadelphia as of July 1, 1971:

In addition to the above, other increments are allowed in the starting salary for graduate credits and degrees so that the starting salary for a teacher with a Master's degree plus 30 additional credits is \$9,158 instead of \$7,630. Each level shown above represents one year's experience.

On July 1, 1972, the teachers' salaries shown above were increased about 3%. In the city of Philadelphia, the scale is about \$2,000 a year higher than in the suburbs.

"I am not speaking these things according to human judgment, am. I? Or does not the Law also say these things? For it is written in the Law of Moses, 'You shall not muzzle the ox while he is threshing.' God is not concerned about oxen, is He? Or is He speaking altogether for our sake? If we sowed spiritual things in you, is it too much if we should reap material things from you?" (I Corinthians 9:8-11, NAS).

We feel the care of the churches as a great responsibility. Pray for us, that the grace of God may supply the need of the Bible Fellowship Church, and that we be sufficient for the task laid upon us.

# REPORT OF THE EIGHTY FIRST ANNUAL MINISTERIAL CONVENTION

The Eighty-First Ministerial Convention convened on Monday through Wednesday, April 24-26, 1972 at the Pinebrook Bible Conference.

The officers of the Convention were: William W. Mull, Chairman; Daniel G. Ziegler, Vice-Chairman; Robert A. Minnig, Secretary. Other members of the Ministerial Convention Planning committee were David L. Branning and Austin G. Shelly.

The Convention began on Monday evening, April 24, 1972 with C. Peter Wagner, Associate Professor of Latin American Studies, Fuller Theological Seminary School of World Missions, giving a devotional pace setter. Chairman William W. Mull then led the brethren in an extensive period of prayer, which was followed by a Communion Service led by W. W. Hartman.

- Mr.C.Peter Wagner, Associate Professor of Latin American Studies, Fuller Theological Seminary School of World Missions, Executive Director of the Fuller Evangelistic Association, and author of such books as: Latin American Theology, 1967; A Turned-On Church in an Uptight World, 1971; and Frontiers in Missionary Strategy, 1972, was the main speaker for the Convention. The Seven Sessions of the Convention were based on the theme "Church Growth and the Bible Fellowship Church," with each session divided into two parts: a lecture by C. Peter Wagner and then interaction. The salient points presented and discussed were as follows:
- 1. that it is the will of God for the Church of Christ to grow, therefore the Bible Fellowship Church needs to reach out into the "Fourth World". that is, the unsaved and seek Conversion Growth for the glory of God alone;

- 2. that the Bible Fellowship Church needs to articulate Church Growth Goals both collectively and individually and then implement an aggressive strategy to meet them, since it is not God's will for us to advance like a mule or an ox,
- 3. that the End of the Great Commission is "to make disciples" or "committed Christians" and the Means to get there are: going, baptizing, teaching, preaching, witnessing and sending;
- 4. that the Bible Fellowship Church needs a "Vision of the Fruit" (John 4:35-38), as well as insight into the Laws of sowing (Matt. 13), pruning (Luke 13:6-9), and harvesting (Matt. 9:37-38), that is, test the soils, indentify the fertile soil, and then move in the manpower to work it;
- 5. that the Bible Fellowship Church community needs to think and act as a "Team" and that measures should be taken to make this a reality;
- 6. that the fastest way for the Bible Fellowship Church to grow is to start Mother-daughter churches and new churches in receptive areas by means of a Team of pastors, each of whom exhibit the gift of an evangelist;
- 7. that the Bible Fellowship Church, both collectively and individually, should maintain the same degree of racial integration as the general society surrounding them; and
- 8. that each minister of the Bible Fellowship Church help their people "discover" their spiritual gifts, and that each local church by way of an Extension Seminary develop "Class Two Leaders", that is, unpaid leaders who work out from the local church and are both spiritually and educationally qualified.

Four sessions were held Tuesday and three on Wednesday. The devotions each morning were led by James Bigley and Richard Gehman respectively. Tuesday afternoon was set aside for recreation and relaxation. The Business Meeting of the Convention was held on Tuesday evening at 7:00 p.m. and the following resolution was adopted:

Resolved, that we elect a Vice-Chairman, who will serve with the 1973 Ministerial Convention Committee, that is the Church Extension Board, and who will become Chairman of the 1974 Ministerial Convention Committee.

Willard E. Cassel was elected as the Vice-Chairman.

Having been stimulated by the "Church Growth" ideas set forth by C. Peter Wagner, the ministerial body passed the following resolutions prior to adjornment:

Resolved, that the present Chairman appoint a committee of

three to appoint a convener for each area to call pastors of the Bible Fellowship Church together for area ministerial meetings for prayer, evaluation, etc.

Resolved, that the previously named committee divide our denomination into geographic regions, and these regions be encouraged to meet at least quarterly to evaluate progress toward our growth goals, and that reports of these meetings be submitted to the Board of Church Extension.

Chairman William W. Mull appointed the following committee of three: Willard E. Cassel, Frank L. Herb, Jr. and Bruce A. Ellingson.

The Convention was adjourned in prayer by Daniel G. Ziegler.

### REPORT OF THE BOARD OF CHRISTIAN EDUCATION

The new Board of Christian Education of the Bible Fellowship Church, created and elected by the 1971 Annual Conference, continues, under a merger, the work of the former Sunday School Promotion Committee, and the former Youth Fellowship General Committee. Officers were elected as follows: Harvey J. Fritz, Jr, Chairman, William W. Mull, Secretary, and Robert Truett, Treasurer, and a Board treasury established by order of Annual Conference. The Board met four times during the Conference year

to conduct its business, including the planning and evaluation of numerous programs. One of its initial tasks was to define its areas of responsibility, and generally structure the Board. The Board considers the work of Christian Education to be of the greatest concern in our common work for Christ, and solicits the prayers of all the Conference for this work.

A key task during this first year has been the formulation and adoption of a set of By Laws and a Statement of the Philosophy of Christian Education to provide both goals and guidelines for the work of this Board. A committee of this Board, chaired by Bruce Ellingson, gave much thought and effort to this project, and the By Laws, as adopted by the Board of Christian Education, are presented to this Annual Conference for ratification. Assistance from the comparison with, comparable Boards of other denomination was undertaken. Internal organization and procedural methods were defined during this first year.

A second major task, inherited from the Curriculum Committee of the Sunday School Promotion Committee, and completed this year, was the preparation of a Pilot Curriculum, 'Studies in Biblical Doctrine'. The mammoth task of compiling these studies, based on the Statement of Faith of the Bible Fellowship Church, and totalling some 68 pages, was completed by a committee under the leadership of Keith Plows, the resultant document approved by this Board, presented to the churches, and plans executed for a first printing. It is hoped that wide and profitable use will be made of these doctrinal studies across our denomination. The responsibile committee deserves the gratitude of usall.

Among the programs carried on this year was the traditional Thanksgiving Youth Rally, held at Calvary Presbyterian Church Willow Grove. A group of approximately 600-650 young people profited from a dramatic presentation of the Gospel by the Faith Player Troup.

The blessing of God was evident during the two weekends of Sno-Glo in January, with a total of 450 young people registered. The well received speakers were Dr. Charles Signorina and Dean Carl Cassel. Evaluation of the Sno-Glo revealed the necessity for each church to send an adequate number of counselors for the group from that church.

An interesting innovation this year was the sponsoring of a Sunday School Superintendents' Retreat at Pinebrook. Under the leadership of Leon Naudasher, thirty churches were represented, with 71 over-night registrants, and 95 at the closing banquet. Speaker was Dr. Clate Risley. Response from the participants uniformly indicated a very helpful retreat. The possibility of a Sunday School Superintendents' Association within our denomination is being considered by a committee of this Board.

The Annual Sunday School Convention held at our Bethlehem

Church proved a great success with 328 registered adults (with many more in attendance), and 166 at the Youth Division. Principal speaker was Rev. Jack Hyles of Hammond, Indiana. His challenge to us all is well known throughout the Conference.

While attendance was less than last year, a very profitable Youth Week was conducted at Pinebrook, with some 20 decisions of various kinds registered by the young people. Elmer Johnson of Philadelphia College of Bible was principal speaker. Response of the young people to the program was enthusiastic.

The film strip library now housed at Royersford, was used 104 times this year by our Churches.

It is to be noted that many of the above programs, all of them considered very worthy, do not generate enough receipts to cover their own expenses. The matter of adequate funding for the full Board program over a year, has therefore caused considerable concern to the Board. Efforts were made at various times during the year to alleviate this problem. Restrictions may have to be placed on future programming because of financial liminations unless adequate funding from some sources becomes available.

#### RECOMMENDATIONS:

- 1. We recommend that the By Laws of the Board of Christian Education, and the Statement of Philosophy of Christian Education, included with this report, be ratified by the 89th Annual Conference.
- 2. We recommend that the churches substantially increase their annual giving to the Board of Christian Education to enable it to execute its program. These contributions shall be payable at Adjourned Session.

PROPOSED STATEMENT OF A PHILOSOPHY OF CHRISTIAN EDUCATION (For By-Laws of Board of Christian Education)

#### I. DEFINATION

By Christian Education we mean the process of the Holy Spirit working through the media of the inspired Scriptures, related materials, and Christian leadership to lead the individual:

- 1. To the experience of the new birth,
- 2. To a life of maturity in Christ.
- 3. To be equipped to render effective service in the will of God.

# II. IMPLEMENTATION

A. The aim of Christian education is Christ-centered.

To bring adults, youth, and children to Jesus Christ, and to lead them to commit every aspect of their lives to Him is the unquestioned goal of Christian Education. This involves in turn a double aim: there must be the imparatation of doctrinal truths,

and further, the inculcation of a life of personal fellowship with the Son of God.

B. The approach of Christian education is student centered.

We teach in order that we may bring about desirable changes in the lives of the students. Therefore our approach to the various aspects of education and to specific teaching sessions must be in terms of the student as an individual, and to his needs as a social being.

C. The <u>curriculum</u> of Christian education must be <u>Bible</u>-centered.

The great textbook to be used in Christian education is the Bible. Other materials may be used but they derive their message and authority from the Word of God. The textbook has been learned only when the students have become "Doers of the Word, and not hearers only."

D. The method of Christian education is experience-centered. Valid experience involves both content to be transmitted and student responses in living behaviour. The "pouring in" process of older education and the "creative" process of newer education must be seen together in Christian education. The Gospel is brought to a student from outside him, but salvation and growth in Christ, through the Holy Spirit, within. Therefore we can rightly use both processes.

E. The <u>organizations</u> of Christian education are church-centered. The New Testament views the Church as the corpus through which God works in the world. Called into being through the atoning work of Christ, nurtured in santification by the work of the indwelling Holy Spirit, governed by Christ as its head, the Church as the body of Christ is given directives for a variety of functions in the New Testament. With these functions the organizations of Christian education are concerned. Recognizing some differences between the institutional church and the fellowship of believers, Christian education must establish its organizational structure in the terms of the church, both as a formal institution and an informal fellowship.

#### BY-LAWS

#### ARTICLE I - NAME

The name of this board is ''Board of Christian Education of the Bible Fellowship Church.''

#### ARTICLE II - PURPOSE

The purpose of the Board shall be to give direction and assistance to the Bible Fellowship Churches in the implementation of a Christian education program based on our statement of philosophy of Christian education. This will include responsibilities in the several areas of Sunday School work, Youth programs, week day Christian education programs, and camping-retreats, and shall include constant exploration of effective methods for accomplishing our Biblical goals.

#### ARTICLE III - DOCTRINAL STANDARD

The doctrinal standard of the Board is the Articles of Faith of the Bible Fellowship Church. All materials produced by or endorsed by the Board, and programs and activities operated under the auspicies of the Board shall be in compliance with this doctrinal standard.

#### ARTICLE IV - MEMBERSHIP AND ELECTION

The Board of Christian Education of the Bible Fellowship Church shall be comprised of six ordained ministers and six laymen who are members in good standing of the Bible Fellowship Church. The Board shall be divided into three classes consisting of two ministers and two laymen each. Each class shall be elected in turn by the Annual Conference of the Bible Fellowship Church for a term of three years.

# ARTICLE V - ORGANIZATION OF THE BOARD A. Officers - The officers of the Board shall be Chairman, Vice-Chairman, Secretary and Treasurer.

#### B. Duties of Officers:

- 1. Chairman The chairman shall preside at all meetings of the Board. He shall perform such additional duties as may be prescribed from time to time by the Board.
- 2. Vice-Chairman The Vice-Chairman shall in the absence or disability of the Chairman perform the duties and exercise the powers of the Chairman.

#### 3. Secretary -

- a. The Secretary shall keep accurate record of the minutes of each meeting of the Board and shall provide copy of same for each member of the Board.
- b. The Secretary shall be responsible for all correspondence of the Board as directed by the Board.
- c. The Secretary shall perform such other duties as pertain to his office and as may be prescribed by the Board.

#### 4. Treasurer -

- a. The Treasurer shall receive all funds of the Board and deposit them in a depository designated by the Board.
- b. The Treasurer shall pay all bills incurred by the Board. Payment shall be made by check bearing the signatures of the Chairman and Secretary.
- c. The Treasurer shall disburse the funds of the Board in accordance with the direction of the Board, taking proper vouchers for such disbursements.
- d. The Treasurer shall keep full and accurate accounts of receipts and disbursements in books provided for that purpose and belonging to the Board.
- e. The Treasurer shall submit a summary financial report at each regular meeting of the Board. He shall prepare a detailed financial report for the annual report of the Board to the Annual Conference of the Bible Fellowship Church.
- f. The Treasurer's accounts shall be audited annually and certification of said audit shall be included in the annual report

of the Board.

- g. If required by the Board, the Treasurer shall give the Board a bond in form and in amount prescribed by the Board, for the faithful performance of the duties of his office and the restoration of the Board, in case of his death, resignation, or removal from office, of all books, papers, vouchers, money, and other property of whatever kind in his possession belonging to the Board
- h. The Treasurer shall perform such other duties as may be prescribed from time to time by the Board.
- C. Election The officers of the Board shall be elected annually at the first meeting following its election by the Annual Conference of the Bible Fellowship Church. The term of office shall be for one year or until successors have been chosen.

D. Vacancies

- 1. Of Board Members If for any reason a vacancy on the Board occurs the Board may request the Annual Conference of the Bible Fellowship Church to elect, at its next session, a successor to serve for the remainder of the unexpired term.
- 2. Of officers of the Board If for any reason an office of the Board becomes vacant the Board may elect a successor to serve for the remainder of the unexpired term.

E. Committees

- 1. In performance of its duties, the Board may organize into the following committees: Sunday School, Educational Aids, Youth and Finance. Additional committees may be added as deemed necessary by the Board.
  - 2. Duties of the Committees:
    - a. Sunday School Committee:
- (1) To offer assistance to the churches for training the staff and improvement of the program of the Sunday School.
  - (2) To offer suggestions for Sunday School curriculum.
- (3) To conduct convocations helpful to the Sunday School ministry.
  - b. Educational Aids Committss:
    - (1) To develop, procure and oversee an audio-visual

library.

- (2) To produce and publish literature considered necessary for the Christian education program of the denomination. c. Youth Committee:
- (1) To assist our churches in the development of youth ministries.
- (2) To oversee regional and denominational youth activities.
  - (3) To oversee camping and retreat programs for youth
  - d. Finance Committee:
- (1) To formulate an annual budget for the Board of Christian Education
- (2) To encourage financial support for the various minis tries of the Board of Christian Education
  - (3) The Treasurer of the Board shall be a member of

this committee.

- 3. Membership Each committee shall be comprised of three members from the Board of Christian Education and appointed by the Chairman of the Board at the first regular meeting following the Annual Conference of the Bible Fellowship Church. These appointees may in turn select such additional committee members as they deem necessary to perform the duties of their committee. The additional members shall be members in good standing of the Bible Fellowship Church. All committee appointments shall be subject to the approval of the Board.
- 4. Officers Each committee shall organize by electing a Chairman and Secretary. The Chairman shall be a member of the Board of Christian Education.

#### ARTICLE VI - MEETINGS

- A. Regular meetings The Board shall hold a minimum of three regular meetings annually.
- B. Special meetings Special meetings of the Board may be held at such times as deemed necessary. Special meetings may be called by:
  - l. Resolution of the Board
  - 2. Call of the Chairman
- 3. Written request to the Chairman by three members of the Board.

Notification of all special meetings of the Board shall be conveyed to each member of the Board. Said notice shall state the purpose of the special meeting

C. Quorum - Two-thirds of the membership of the Board shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business.

### ARTICLE VII - REPORT

The Board shall submit annually a written report to the Annual Conference of the Bible Fellowship Church.

#### ARTICLE VIII - AMMENDMENTS

The By-Laws of the Board of Christian Education of the Bible Fellowship Church may be amended, altered, or new By-Laws adopted by a majority vote of the members present at any duly assembled meeting of the Board. Said action can be enacted only after the proposed ammendment or alternation has been submitted in writing to each member of the Board at least two weeks prior to such meeting. All ammendments, alterations, or changes to the By-Laws are subject to the approval of the Annual Conference of the Bible Fellowship Church.

#### REPORT OF THE HISTORICAL COMMITTEE

The committee met twice during the year. At one of these meetings on August 9, 1972, Pastor Bean, Paul Cressman and Harold Snyder met at Pinebrook to view the archival materials. The bulk of the materials are presently being stored in two locked fire-proof files at the back of classroom C in the Echobrook building.

During the year a number of old pictures of the Gospel Heralds were added to the archival collection.

The question of where the materials shall be located has not

been completely solved. The Pinebrook Service Board has indicated that it will try to help the committee find a permanent place, but up to this time nothing definite has been determined.

It is the feeling of the committee that when a permanent location is secured, a more aggressive program to acquire new additions can be initiated.

The committee would like to begin collecting data on the significant events on the development of particular churches. If your church would like to contribute documents for such a section please submit them to the archivist - Hank Snyder. (The Historical Committee - E.W. Bean, Paul H. Cressman and Bright N. Heist.)

#### REPORT OF CHURCH EXTENSION DIRECTOR

"When they came to Jerusalem, they were welcomed by the church and the apostles and the elders, and they declared all that God had done with them." Acts 15:4

Paul and Barnabas had been chosen by the Holy Spirit and the church to be a church planting team. They had been engaged in fulfilling their commission, to announce the Gospel to men lost in sin and to bring together those who were transformed by that life-giving message into new churches. Upon returning from their first tour, they had the opportunity to go to Jerusalem, where the elders representing the churches had gathered for a conference and there to report how they had done what the church had sent them to do and how God had blessed their efforts with success.

One of the pleasant and happy duties of this office is to report to the elders representing our churches, gathered here for Annual Conference, how we, to whom you have committed the church extension task, have labored and how God has led and blessed.

The TIE Project in East Central New Jersey, in its second year, has seen positive but varied development of its four new churches. Programs, attendances, impact and offerings have all shown development. The mission in Franklin Township, Somerset County, now has eleven Christian families that have indicated their desire to be committed in membership. They have requested permission to organize, which has been approved by an Assessment Committee from the Board. Pastor Donald R. Knauer is leading the people in steps of training and preparation. We believe the day when they form a membership roll will be soon.

The newest new church in Howell Township, Monmouth County, has progressed and stablized since its first public service on December 5, 1971. They have met in a fine elementary school building for most of the year and outdoors during the summer. People have been saved and baptized and are going on in faith. A distinctive church, with a community mindedness and a strong

ministry to youth and children is taking shape under Pastor Robert L. Draper's leadership.

The mission in Freehold also moved to an elementary school during the year. There have been some real victories. A preliminary organizational meeting on September 27, attended by twelve persons, revealed sharp interest in the formation of a church in Freehold, with the prospect of as many as five families being initially committed. The pastor is Robert A. Minnig.

Progress of the Neptune mission has been steady but slow. Starting with an average of about 8 in the earliest months of the work, the attendance at worship increased every month up to the summer of this year, reaching 18 in June. A thoughtful and thorough evaluation by Pastor D. Thomas Phillips and the TIE Team led them to recommend to the Board that it reorganize the Neptune work in such a way that it, at its present stage of development, will not make such heavy demands on our resources. The Board has accepted Brother Phillips' resignation (he is awaiting a call to serve as pastor of another of our churches) and has asked the Director to serve for the year as interim pastor at Neptune. We expect that this mission will not require any cash appropriations this year. A reassessment of the future prospects at Neptune will be made at this time next year. Let us hope and pray for continuing development. An encouraging sign is the approval on September 26 by the Neptune Township Board of Education of the request to permit our mission to use an elementary school for worship. Other churches have been refused such permission in the past and it was the consensus of those who seemed to know best that the Board would likely refuse our request also. We believe our Lord directed otherwise.

The Neptune congregation began to worship in the school on Sunday, October 8. The school replaces the motel conference room, which had been used by the mission for more than a year and a half. During that time the owner of the motel graciously allowed us to meet there without charge. The school provides better facilities for worship and teaching and brings us into the sector of the township that has shown the greatest response to our message and ministry.

WhenPaul and Barnabas reported to the conference at Jerusalem they, as we, had much to recount of people saved, baptized and growing in grace and of new churches forming. But the account in Acts also reveals that they had news of opposition and struggle. These have not been absent in this modern day church planting work either. The enemy of God and of the souls of mendoes not give ground easily. There have been disappointments and set-backs. Some have lost interest and dropped away. Others have failed to grow as rapidly as they might have or declined to come through to complete commitment. Some discipline problems have had to be handled.

It is at the times of greater difficulty that the value of the team shines through most clearly. The TIE Team is made up of the four TIE pastors and the Director. At its weekly meetings it has studied through Acts together, discussed other books and concepts, prayed intensively for each of the missions and most, if not all, of the constituency of each. There has been mutual encouragement, counsel and assistance. The men of the Team believe every pastor would benefit from being part of such a team. The Team also serves as a surrogate Board of Elders for each of the missions. The wisdom of this has been readily apparent, especially in matters of discipline.

This has been a year of struggle for our two churches in western New Jersey, Belvidere and Finesville. Their respective pastors, John H. Herb and Harold C.Weaber, after a good many years of ministry in the Department, received and accepted calls to other of our churches. At this time both churches are without successors in their pulpits. We trust that they will be able to call men of God to preach and teach the Word of God in their midst soon. The Director has met a number of times with the Board and once with the congregation of each of these churches during their pastor-less interludes.

The oldest church in the Department, Walnutport, has made fine progress under the continuing pastoral leadership of David L. Branning. The congregation has requested no financial assistance for the coming year. We trust that this church will experience new joy and power as it fully supports its own program and gives increasingly in years ahead for the spread of the Gospel elsewhere.

The third summer of PISCES proved beneficial both to the 14 churches and 10 students (8 men and 2 women) who participated. We were especially pleased to have two seminarians return for a second PISCES summer. A significant number of special gifts from churches and individuals, some quite sizeable, enabled PISCES '72 to exceed what would otherwise have been possible. Some major improvements this year came out of careful evaluation of the two previous summers' programs.

This year has presented us with some opportunities to broaden out our ministry and our fellowship. One of the PISCES participants was a Korean national with a good theological training, who senses a burden from the Lord to reach the substantial and growing number of Koreans in the U.S. with the Gospel. With our support under PISCES he began a church planting attempt among Koreans, with fine initial success. The prospect is good that a church will be born. It could become a Bible Fellowship Church.

Another broadening experience has been our discovery and observation of a new work in inner-city Newark, principally among blacks, under sponsorship of the Africa Inland Mission. Our continuing interest and possible involvement in this ministry could

lead to one or more black Bible Fellowship Churches in Newark (and subsequently in other cities).

A third broadening experience for all of us was the stimulating presentation at the Ministerial Convention of church growth principles by C.Peter Wagner. We believe there is a stirring of church growth thinking, expectancy and goal-centered planning in many of our churches.

On September 28 the Ziegler family moved into the newly purchased Director's parsonage at 1049 Kenyon Avenue, Plainfield, New Jersey. The home is handsome, substantial and well suited to our use. It is in a lovely section of Plainfield, strategically situated for our purpose. It constitutes a sound investment and its provision will assure, through savings in time, travel costs, taxes and incidentals, a net reduction in the Department's operating expenses. In numerous ways we have seen the Lord's guidance and provision in locating and purchasing the Plainfield home and in selling the property in Emmaus.

In acquiring the parsonages in Plainfield and Howell Township and in other matters through the year we were made again to appreciate the counsel and help of the Board of Directors. A considerable portion of the financing necessary to purchase the Howell parsonage has been graciously lent by several believers who desire to see this work move ahead. We deeply appreciate their concern and their help.

Through the encouragement and assistance of the Board of Directors, the Board of Church Extension has formulated a plan, over at least the next four years, to lay aside a portion of the offerings from the churches as a reserve to be used to help finance the acquisition of land and buildings by new missions. These monies will initially replace the funds lent by the private parties for the Howell parsonage and will then, later, be available to assist other newly forming churches in their first real estate purchases, on a revolving loan basis. We want the Lord's people to realize that there is an acute need for such funds and to consider helping to provide them by giving to the Board of Church Extension for this new Fund or to the Board of Directors for the Fund to Promote Church Extension. Such gifts might include policies, bequests in wills, trust funds or possibly other means. These could play a crucial part in our church planting success in the years ahead.

The Director sincerely appreciates the fine, candid, healthy colleague relationship he has had during the year with the pastors who have labored in the Department and with the men of the Board. The church should be deeply grateful for such men who give of themselves far beyond the ordinary to the task of extending the church.

It was with deep mixed feelings of regret, relief and grati-

tude that our eight-year pastorate of the Staten Island church was terminated on September 30. This body of loving brothers and sisters in a key location, by permitting their pastor over the past four years to be increasingly immersed in the work of church extension, have made an almost incalculable contribution towards the fulfilment of our task. We pray that our God will richly bless, use and prosper them.

The Jerusalem Conference, to which Paul and Barnabas reported their church extension work, was called on to make a difficult and crucial decision concerning policy and direction of the future of such endeavor. It was the question of how much more, if anything, than saving faith in Jesus Christ, followed by baptism, ought to be required of new believers for acceptance into the church. The same kind of question must be faced and answered in this generation by the Bible Fellowship Church. It could be answered at this Annual Conference. Now, as then, the impact of our decision on the future course of church-planting evangelism will likely be profound.

#### REPORT OF PINEBROOK JUNIOR COLLEGE PRESIDENT

"Great is the Lord and greatly to be praised." Student enrollment for the fall of 1972 was seventy-five with a full-time student equivalency of seventy-two. Of these students, fifty-nine are boarding on campus. This is by far the highest number of students matriculated during my association with the school. Fifteen first year students come from Bible Fellowship Churches with others coming from Christian fellowships in New Jersey, Pennsylvania, New York, Nebraska and Bethlehem, Israel.

This new level of enrollment gives us a realistic opportunity to achieve a responsible financial position during this fiscal year. Please pray and work on our behalf so that a continued upward trend in total student body might be realized. Although we are planning to reduce our indebtedness during this fiscal year, we will need to continue growing in order to liquidate our indebtedness.

I am pleased to report that every faculty member who was offered a position for the 1972-1973 year has entered into contract with the school and each one is making a significant contribution to our educational effort. Faculty members are continuing to show a deep concern for one another and the students.

Graduates of Pinebrook are continuing to be accepted with advanced standing at various regionally accredited colleges and are acquiting themselves well in the college to which they go.

I wish to express our appreciation for the fact that Bible Fellowship Churches increased their financial support to the College during the past year. As I have traveled around to the various Bible Fellowship Churches, I have been pleased to note an open spirit concerning our ministry. We continue to need your prayerful concern and trust that we will be worthy of continuing and growing support from all Bible Fellowship Churches.

If one were to ask me to describe where we are at this point in our development, I would express the thought that we are at the place of possibilities. Our position remains fragile, but the evidence of God's blessing is abundant. Perhaps knowing that we have not arrived will cause us to depend on the strength of our great and good God. We remain convinced that there is a place for a good Christian Liberal Arts Junior College - may God allow us to be that school.

#### REPORT OF PINEBROOK CONFERENCE CENTER DIRECTOR

"Great is the Lord, and greatly to be praised."

Four years have passed into history since the Bible Fellowship Church purchased Pinebrook. The attendances and spiritual fruitfulness of this ministry have increased each year. Individuals from the Bible Fellowship Church and other groups have shared in this growth and blessing.

It was a very rare weekend during last fall, winter and spring when we did not receive news concerning several individuals receiving Christ as Saviour and Lord at Pinebrook. During one month last summer, there was an average of more than one person each day professing faith in the Lord Jesus Christ. These results stand in addition to the spiritual benefits enjoyed by God's saints. Much of these results must be attributed to the faithful and daily prayer ministry by many of the Lord's people on Pinebrook's behalf.

In addition to our growing Summer Bible Conferences, a number of additional convocations will be conducted this year. Many people are expressing a desire for Pinebrook to sponsor programs to meet the needs of various groups. A fall conference for married couples will be held on a weekend when the Poconos should be most colorful. Another fall conference will be held for pastors and wives to provide helpful seminars on counseling.

December will bring many young people from several states together for our Holiday Retreat, and many youth will attend the Sno-Glo Retreats in January sponsored by the Board of Christian Education. Several Bible Fellowship Churches are again planning adult winter retreats.

Next spring a weekend conference for families will provide a unique opportunity for parents and their children to receive spiritual and physical refreshment. Pinebrook will also conduct Fall and Spring Sponsored Banquests.

A new area of ministry being considered by our Conference Board is outreach through radio, which could feature many of our outstanding speakers and musicians on a daily basis. This venture, if carried out, will make thousands of new people friends of Pinebrook.

Pinebrook, with its strategic geographic location is will situated for serving the great need for a Christian Conference Center in the Poconos. Our location is near enough to the great metropolitan areas of American's Northeast for convenient travel(two hours from New York City, two and a half hours from Philadel—phia, three hours from Boston, five hours from Washington, D. C.), and far enough removed to give guests a sense of being away. Due to this tremendous location, our improving facilities, and our increasing public relations efforts, larger numbers are

being attracted to Pinebrook each year. Many people are for the first time becoming aware of the Bible Fellowship Church through having been at Pinebrook.

Last year's programs hosted about 20% more guests than the previous year, which represents a healthy increase. Because of our lack of housing, we are now forced to turn away many people or have them stay overnight at nearby locations and travel to and from Pinebrook each day. Another serious problem we continually face is a lack of sufficient rooms for meetings during our fall, winter and spring programs.

So there is a very obvious need for improving and expanding our conference facilities. The Board is presently discussing the possibility of erecting a new auditorium-gymnasium complex which would provide:

- 1. A large area which could be used for public meetings, seating 1200-1500 people, and which could be subdivided when desireable. This area could also serve as a gymnasium, when seats were removed, to provide suitable recreation facilities during inclement weather and the winter months.
  - 2. Several additional, smaller meeting rooms of various sizes.
  - 3. A spacious lobby, adaquate for convention displays.

Next a new motel-type unit, possibly with two floors, should be constructed for year 'round housing of Pinebrook guests. This motel should feature modern, comfortably-furnished rooms. The Dining Room should be renovated to provide an attractive interior. These two new buildings, along with a redecorated Diving Room, would give us a wonderful conference center, and would enable us to host groups week after week all your 'round, in addition to our weekend retreats.

During the past year I had the opportunity to visit a number of other conferences and was much impressed by the new and improved facilities contructed in recent years. All those with progressive programs appear to be flourishing and give evidence of much spiritual blessing and fruitfulness.

As you know, Pinebrook is one of the oldest Christian Conferences in continuous operation in the East. The year 1973 will mark our Fortieth Anniversary and we are planning to use this occasion to provide special events and make special efforts to commemorate this milestone. Perhaps a large amount of the funds needed to construct an auditorium-gymnasium could be raised during this anniversary year.

Our Conference Board has always operated in a manner revealing fiscal responsibility and a final note of praise is due for the Lord's blessings in meeting our ever-increasing obligations. Although increased financial obligations were placed upon us unexpectedly last year, we have been able to meet these responsibilities, in addition to our regular expenses.

The Lord has raised up many new friends who have a concern for the conference ministry and desire to assist this outreach for the gospel financially. We are also deeply grateful for the increasing number of Bible Fellowship Churches which are sending contributions regularly to assist in this work. These churches have been assured that their money will be used to further the Gospel in a direct way.

There are many doors of opportunity and the Lord has been blessing abundantly. "Brethren, pray for us."

The financial records which the Service Board has been able to gain during this past year have made it possible to make intelligent projections for the first time. There is a proposed list of capital priorities which would cover the next five years attached to this report along with the estimated cost of the improvements. If we are to achieve these goals, there will need to be wholehearted support of the Pinebrook project by our total constituency.

# REPORT OF THE BOARD OF FOREIGN MISSIONS (Year ending September 30, 1972)

Jesus said, "All power is given unto me in heaven and earth. Go ye therefore, and teach all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father, and of the Son and of the Holy Ghost; teaching them to observe all things whatsoever I have commanded you: and Lo I am with you, even unto the end of the world." (Matt. 28:19, 20). "And He said unto them, Go ye into all the world and preach the gospel to every creature. He that believeth and is baptized shall be saved; but he that believeth not shall be damned." (Mark 16: 15-16).

The commission was very plain. The last words of Jesus before His ascension were strong, "Go to every creature." "I have the power both in heaven and earth,".

This commission given to the disciples and to the church was so great that Jesus had to add a promise for their encouragement. He said, "Lo I am with you even unto the end of the world." This is the great promise for our missionaries serving on the field. The task is tremendous, but God has promised the necessary help if we but respond to the call of the Lord.

There is a vital link between the mission field and the local church. It is great to be able to say, "I have helped the foreign missionary caused for years." This is true with many of our people in the Bible Fellowship Church, but did you ever think how the missionary helps the local church?

God has asked us to share the good news of salvation to every creature. The commission is for the Christian at home as well as the missionary on the field. So He, as Head of the Church, has commanded us to share the good news of salvation with all men everywhere. For me to reach the people in India, Taiwan, South America, Africa, etc., I may be that link between Christ and the missionary on the field through prayer and sacrificial giving.

The missionary is helping the Christian at home to serve the Lord, and is giving him an outreach for the Lord that could not be had otherwise. The work is not theirs but it is OUR WORK.

As we help the missionary with our prayers and support on the field, we are actually helping ourselves fulfill the commission from the Lord. Your missionary on the field is working in behalf of you and your church.

Don W.Hillis, writing in the magazine, HORIZONS, gives us this thought provoking paragraph:

"Isn't it true? The missionary is a living evidence of the churches' response to the great commission...the missionary gives the home church an outreach it couldn't have otherwise.... the missionary gives believers within the home church a special opportunity to invest in eternal things.... The Church will share in the reward of the missionary's labour.... The Church is meant to be the vital link between Christ and his outreach in the evange-lization of the world...."

God is working and building His Church all over the world. It was with great interest that I read of how God is working in the land of Cambodia. Merle Graven, who has served under the Christian Missionary Alliance for many years in Cambodia, and now is the leader there, writes concerning the revival that is going on in that land inspite of the war. He said, "This is the greatest thing to happen in all my years of service."

Christian, let us all rally around the banner of our wonderful Saviour. Jesus IS working in this world NOW - and HE IS COMING SOON. Pray that you will be part of the blessings that He is bestowing in the world today. Some day soon the words found in Revelation will be fulfilled... "And lo, agreat multitude, which no man could number, of all nations, and kindreds, and people, and tongues, stood before the Lamb clothed with white robes, and palms in their hands; and cried with a loud voice saying, SAL-VATION TO OUR GOD WHICH SITTETH UPON THE THRONE, AND UNTO THE LAMB."

The Lord, in His divine will, removed from our midst a well-beloved brother, T.D.Gehret, who had served well as Chairman and General Secretary of the Board of Foreign Missions for many years. His experience and knowledge will be missed.

The Board met in regular session four times during the year, transacting business and dealing with matters relating to the missionary work. The members of the Board worked in a harmonious way seeking to help the missionaries in their needs. Our present missionary family is 48 adults and 75 children.

During the year, one of our missionary candidates, David Ream, was taken home to be with Lord. We do not question why, but we accept the will of God. Shirley Ream, his wife, is planning to continue her work preparing for the mission field. The Joseph Hoffman family and the Fred Venable family has been granted a year's leave of absence. Robert Kline, from our Reading church, was accepted as a missionary candidate. He and his wife Sandy, after completing their schooling, will be sent, the Lord willing, to Taiwan.

Rev. and Mrs. Brian Butler, who had been stationed at our Catasauqua Church, are doing missionary work in England at the Moorlands Bible College.

David and Mary Ellen Wurm were accepted as candidates in November of 1971, to serve in Alaska, under the Far Eastern Gospel Crusade, for one year.

This year was a year for missionaries on furlough: Leonard and Nina Buck, Olive Rawn, Bigleys, Kauffmans, Venables, Gehmans, Joseph Hoffmans, Ritters, Manneys, Hoyles, Solts, and the Campbells. Three of these missionaries enjoyed a short furlough instead of the usual year's stay: Ritters, Manneys and Campbells.

The Board gratefully acknowledges the generous giving from members and friends of the Bible Fellowship Church, which continues to make possible the granting of support to our dedicated missionaries.

All of our missionaries have served well during the year and

our missionary family is encouraged to continue to fulfill the great commission which Jesus gave.

The Board is planning to build a four-family missionary home for our furloughing missionaries on a plot of ground in the Allentown area - ground which will be given as a donation for missionary work if the zoning board will grant permission to build. Please pray for this project as the Board believes that it is urgent that we begin now with these plans so that in the near future we will be able to make provision for our missionaries home on furlough. The amount of money that is invested in certificates for this program is shown in our financial report.

The Women's Missionary Societies have ralled well in supplying a great many items to our missionaries. Many of our churches have strong societies which help to stimulate great interest in missions.

The six regions of the Women's Missionary Societies held rallies in both the spring and fall of the year. The Conference Wide rally was held in Allentown, Bethel, on May 11 with the following missionaries taking part: David and RoseMarie Manney (Ecuador), Wanda and Timothy Kauffman (Zaire, Africa), Richard and Florence Gehman (Africa), James and Renee Bigley (Africa). The large attendance showed again the good interest that prevails in the work of the societies on behalf of our missionaries.

The Board approved a sub-committee's work in the assignment of missionaries to the various churches.

The General Secretary presented the work of the Foreign Missionary Board at two meetings in the denomination:Cedar Crest and Bethlehem. He also attended the regional W.M.S. Rallies and four farewell services.

The need for the support of our missionaries is great. Due to inflation there is the need to increase the yearly support for them. We want you to be aware that the total amount of money designated to our missionaries, which is shown in our report in the Year Book, does not fully go towards their support. Each Mission Board varies as to what percentage is taken towards administrative expenses. This year will be a year of increased expenditures for their support. Will you pray about your giving?

As a new General Secretary for the Board of Foreign Missions, I want to personally express my thanks for your prayers and support during the year. With the pressing duties of the pastorage, I thank the Lord for enabling me to fulfill my responsibilities to the best of my ability. The members of the Board have been understanding and extremely helpful during the year.

Let us all be found faithful until our blessed Lord shall come. Maranatha.

# REPORT OF THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS OF THE BIBLE FELLOWSHIP CHURCH HOME

The Board of Directors is thankful for all the manifestations of support the Home has continued to receive during the past year. The loyal services of the Rev. F. B. Hertzog, the administrator, his staff, and the voluntary efforts of a great many individuals has been appreciated greatly. We are also grateful for the generous gifts of numerous persons, church groups, and business interests, the cooperation and understanding of families whose loved ones we seek to serve in a comforting manner, and the expressions of appreciation voiced many times by our residents.

The Board was grieved by the death of its chairman, the Rev. T.D.Gehret, who for twenty-six years was a member of the Board of the Home. He always took an active interest in the affairs of the Home. Brother Gehret was a man of faith and we thank God for his life and testimony.

We take humble pride in the unusually high occupany (100%) the Home has maintained throughout the past year. The coming year promises to be a very challenging and busy one for the Home. The Directors, the Administrator, and other concerned constituents of the church feel that God would have us enlarge our facility to accomodate twenty additional guests. This will enable us to operate more efficiently and economically than is presently possible. The estimated cost of a new wing, providing almost 8000 square feet of floor space and including a large sitting room, is \$231,847. At this report the sum of \$102,000 is available in the building fund. Considerable planning and preparation is going into this effort to raise \$129,847. The Directors feel that this facility will be a significantly important addition to the total ministry of the Home. Legacies of real estate, stocks, bonds, and cash have played an important role in the expansion and maintenance of the Home since the work began. The Board will still welcome any contributions towards the operation of the Hom. The anticipated budget of the Home indicates a need for contributions of at least \$9,200 by the churches.

### REPORT OF THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS OF PINEBROOK JUNIOR COLLEGE

Disbursements Balances '72

The Board met five times during the year to conduct its business and the Committees are to be commended for fulfilling their responsibilities. The Board organized with Harvey J. Fritz, Jr., Chairman; Nicholas J. Sheetz, Secretary; and Carlton Wentz, Treasurer.

As we look back over the past year we cannot do anything but give praise, honor and thanks to GOD for His faithfulness."Thy mercy, O Lord, is in the heavens; and thy faithfulness reacheth unto the clouds," (Psalm 36:5). To the words of the Psalmist we can say naught but Amen.

This fall we have seventy-five students enrolled, eighteen more than last year; sixty-one of these students are resident students, again eighteen more than last year. The resident students are being housed in the same buildings used last year. We believe this increase to be evidence of God's blessing upon our public relations program; both the promotional efforts and the aggressive program for follow up on all inquiries in our basic drawing area. More student aid from the Federal Work-Study Program, Economic Opportunity Grants, and National Student Defence Loans has made it possible for those involved in the follow-up program to assure those in need of financial help that help is available.

More students means more money, and the fact that the student body this past year was larger than in the previous year is one of the factors which has enabled us to reduce the deficit during the past year. Two other factors are also important. First, an increase in income from sources other than tuition, room and board, and fees: Contributions have been received from several churches not in the Bible Fellowship Church; a special fund beginning with the faculty, administration and Board of Directors and then encompassing other friends of the College; receipts of part of the legacy from the estate of A.L. Wentz; and increased contributions from Bible Fellowship Churches have helped to reduce the deficit. Finally, credit must be given to the administration for the control exercised on expenditures.

While we are not out of the woods, the overall picture is encourageing and we eagerly start the new year praying that this year we will be able to operate on a balanced budget. There has been some dialogue with the Middle State Association of Colleges and Secondary Schools regarding recognition by this group, but no real efforts can be put forth until we operate on a balanced budget. Meanwhile, Pinebrook Junior College graduates have been accepted with advanced standing by five regionally accredited colleges and one regionally accredited university.

The Pennsylvania Department of Education has again granted provisional approval of the programs offered by the College. As in the past, this provisional approval is for one year.

In an effort to improve living conditions in the men's dormitory, the College underwrote the cost of a pilot project in which

two small rooms were converted into one large room. This enables us to house three men in the area where two men used to be housed. The project was a success and two similar renovations are now in progress under the direction of the Service Board.

New furniture has been purchased for the entire girl's dormitory. Payment for this will take the form of depreciation payments over the next ten years.

The Board of Directors and the Faculty have developed a plan whereby the Faculty annually elects one of its members as Representative to the Board of Directors. John E. Brueckmann has served as the Representative during the past year.

We wish to express our thanks and gratitude to: The Administration, Faculty and Staff for giving of themselves, their time, their talents and their finances to the school and to all others who in any way, however small, have helped to make this year a success. May God bestow his richest blessing upon all of you.

We encourage our churches to support Pinebrook Junior College at a level of four per cent of their annual offerings and that this support be remitted to the College in twelve monthly payments or four quarterly payments.

We encourage all saints to daily pray for Pinebrook Junior College, that the College by God's grace may continue to grow and ultimately be what God would have it to be.

The attached financial report is part of the audited statement produced by W.N.Serfass & Co. of Bethlehem, the College Auditor. Copies of the full report of the auditor will be available at the sessions of the Annual Conference.

### REPORT OF THE BOARD OF CHURCH EXTENSION

"Except the Lord build the house, they labour in vain that build it." Ps. 127:1

The Board of Church Extension gives thanks to God for the evidences that He is at work in the churches and missions of our department. This can be seen by tangible things of changed lives and increased statistics. His work can also be seen in the way He has helped us deal with many problems and attacks of Satan.

On Thursday September 28, 1972, our full-time director moved into the new parsonage and headquarters located at 1049 Kenyon Ave., Plainfield, N.J. We thank God for the vision and leadership of Daniel Ziegler and pray that God will multiply his usefulness as he now devotes his full time and energy to the work of church extension.

The TIE churches have shown development in many ways, although the problems have increased with growth. The Neptune Church found it necessary to reorganize. There will be no full-time pastor on the field, but our director will minister there each Lord's Day.

Two of our established churches are presently without a pastor. Harold Weaber resigned from Finesville, N.J., to accept a call to Shamokin, Pa. John Herb resigned at Belvidere, N.J. to accept a call to Salem Allentown, Pa.

Our director again directed a summer PISCES program which involved 8 men and 2 women in active Christian service.

The following men worked under the direction of the department during the past year: Donald R. Knauer, Robert A. Minnig, D. Thomas Phillips, Robert L. Draper, John H. Herb, Harold C. Weaber and David L. Branning.

The board held ten meetings through out the year in which they carried on the necessary business. We make the following recommendations:

- 1. The adoption of the proposed budget for 1973-1974.
- 2. In order to pursue an agressive program of church planting evangelism in the future, we suggest that our churches consider giving for Church Extension at a level of 5% of their annual offerings. Smaller churches which find such a goal unrealistic might consider offerings of \$10.00 per member as a goal.

### REPORT OF THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS OF THE BIBLE FELLOWSHIP CHURCH

The Board of Directors of the Bible Fellowship Church held four regular meetings and three special sessions during the 1971-1972 year.

Consultations were held with the following churches on matters related to relocation and building: Graterford, Reading, Danville, N.J., and Harrisburg.

In accordance with authority granted by Annual Conference \$25,000.00 was borrowed to finance current operations at Pinebrook. A commitment has been received from a bank for the financing necessary to construct a sewerage treatment plant at Pinebrook. Negotiations are continuing on a cash settlement for an easement granted to the Pennylvania Power and Light Company to place power lines on Pinebrook property.

The Board of Church Extension called upon the Board of Directors to take title to two properties and to sell another. A parsonage was purchased located at 53 Sunset Drive, Parkway Pines, Howell Township, N.J. for \$30,500.00 and a parsonage

was also purchased to house the Director of Church Extension located at 1049 Kenyon Ave., Plainfield, N.J. for \$42,000.00. The house at 425 Ridge Street, Emmaus was sold for \$23,000.00. Also at the request of the Board of Church Extension, a sinking fund was established for the purpose of servicing loans made to the Board of Church Extension by individuals interested in investing money in expansion projects.

Planning continues on the construction of a sewerage treatment plant on the insistance of the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania. At this writing final plans and bids for construction have not been received.

On September 6, 1972, the supervisors of Stroud Township approved an ordinance which was the completion of a previous agreement between the Bible Fellowship Church and those supervisors. The ordinance indicated that the Township has vacated its rights to Pinebrook Road between Route 191 and Cherry Lane Road and its rights to Beacon Hill Road between a point at the edge of our property and Pinebrook Road; it also indicated our willingness to give the Township rights to relocate Beacon Hill Road in the present position. This change is to our advantage for both privacy and safety.

The PP&L has exercised its right of eminent domain to relocate a power line along Route 191 using about 13 acres of our land. At present Monroe County Court has appointed a Board of View which will decide what the PP&L shall pay the Bible Fellowship Church for the property taken.

Whereas, we no longer need the property at 1218 E. Rosemont Drive, Bethlehem, and

Whereas, we need to increase the annuities paid by the Minister's Retirement Fund; we

Recommend to the Annual Conference that we sell the Rosemont Drive property and place the proceeds in the Minister's Retirement Fund and,

Further, that the annuities for 1972-1973 year be increased by 20% and that the continuing of this increase be the subject of further study by the Board of Directors.
