

Purpose: the Board of Missions is delegated by Annual Conference to direct and promote the Missions program of the Bible Fellowship Church, and to select, oversee, and care for its missionaries who serve in foreign countries and in the United States of America (in ministries other than Bible Fellowship churches and agencies).

<u>Composition</u>: The Board of Missions shall be composed of the Executive Secretary, the Financial Secretary, four ordained ministers, and three laymen.

Election: Four ordained ministers and three laymen shall be elected by Annual Conference for terms of three years in the following classes:

- I. Two ministers and one layman
- II. One minister and one layman
- III. One minister and one layman

The Executive Secretary and the Financial Secretary shall each be elected for a term of three years by the Board of Missions subject to ratification by the Annual Conference. The election of these officers shall be in such a manner that their terms shall not expire at the same time.

The Chairman of the Board of Missions shall be elected annually by and from the Board of Missions at its organizational meeting. The Chairman, the Executive Secretary, and the Financial Secretary shall comprise the Executive Committee of the Board of Missions.

Duties of the Board of Missions:

- 1. To formulate objectives and policies for the missions program of the Bible Fellowship Church as conducted in foreign countires and in the U.S.A.
- 2. To interview and examine all prospective candidates for missionary service in foreign countries and in the U.S.A. and to make decisions pertaining to approval and support of individuals who are committed to the Articles of Faith and who endeavor to obey the Order of the Bible Fellowship Church.
- 3. To exercise oversight and spiritual care of the missionaries and candidates serving under the direction of the Board of Missions.
- 4. To maintain within the missions program of the Bible Fellowship Church standards compatible with the Faith and Order.
- To supervise and care for financial and administrative matters pertaining to the Board of Missions.
- To promote interest and involvement in missions in conjunction with the Local Churches (e.g. assisting Missionary Committees and Women's Missionary Societies).
- 7. To submit a written report to Annual Conference.
- 8. to designate which particular churches will comprise the various Women's Missionary Society (W.M.S.) Regions.

9. To appoint a W.M.S. General Committee composed of four members: President, Vice-president, Secretary, and Treasurer.

Duties of the Chairman of the Board of Missions:

- 1. He shall serve as Chairman of the Executive Committee.
- 2. He shall prepare an agenda for each Board Meeting in consultation with the Executive Committee.
- 3. He shall call Board and Executive Committee Meetings and preside at the same.
- 4. He shall appoint committees as necessary and monitor their progress.
- 5. He shall arrange for all applicants to be interviewed by the Board of Missions.
- 6. He shall arrange for all missionaries to be interviewed periodically by the Board of Missions.
- 7. He shall be responsible to see that the Board's decisions and policies are implemented.

Duties of the Executive Secretary of the Board of Missions:

- 1. He shall call for and conduct the election of the Chairman.
- He shall keep an accurate record of the proceedings of this Board's meetings and distribute the same to all Board members.
- 3. He shall be the custodian of the Minutes and records of this Board and of the files of the applicants, candidates, and missionaries.
- 4. He shall be responsible for all correspondence with particular churches, applicants, candidates, missionaries, and others, except correspondence pertaining to financial matters.
- 5. He shall receive all inquiries and applications for missionary service.
- 6. He shall be responsible for public relations for the Board and seek to promote interest and involvement in missions among the constituency of the Bible Fellowship Church.
- 7. He shall seek to know and to minister to the spiritual needs of the missionaries.
- 8. He shall represent the missionaries and their

- needs to this Board and to the particular churches.
- 9. He shall annually submit the Board of Missions report to the Annual Conference.
- 10. He shall personally interview missionaries on furlough at the earliest possible time.

<u>Duties of the Financial Secretary of the Board of Missions:</u>

- He shall receive all monies for the Board of Missions and deposit them as directed by this Board, make all disbursements for this Board, and keep accurate records.
- 2. He shall be responsible for all correspondence pertaining to finances.
- 3. He shall annually submit a financial report for inclusion in this Board's report to the Annual Conference.
- 4. He shall have the financial books audited annually.
- 5. He shall make recommendations to this Board for all investments, and invest as directed.

Contributions:

All financial contributions to the Board of Missions shall be sent to the Financial Secretary of the Board. The members of the Bible Fellowship Church are encouraged to forward their contributions for missionaries through the particular church to the Board of Missions, and not to the missionaries directly.

The Credentials Committee and the Ministerial Candidate Committee shall furnish to the Registrar prior to Annual Conference lists of those ministers qualified to be members of Annual Conference and those who shall be advisory members of Annual Conference.

Alternate delegates who are to be seated in the Annual Conference bar shall report to the Registrar. The Registrar shall communicate their presence to the Chairman. They shall be seated at the beginning of a meeting of Annual Conference, and this action shall be recorded in the minutes of that meeting.

Any member desiring to be excused from any meeting must present in writing the reason for such absence to the Registrar. This information will be submitted to the Chairman of Annual Conference, and the Annual Conference shall decide the validity of each request.

The names of absentees shall be recorded in the minutes of each meeting, with indication as to whether the absentee is excused.

The Registrar shall also provide for the registration of all advisory members of Annual Conference and for any official representatives from other bodies or organizations. He shall notify the Chairman of the

presence of such persons at the session.

The registration records shall be turned over to the Secretary of Annual Conference after adjournment.

(This material will appear as Article V of the By-Laws of Annual Conference, p. 94, 1981 edition of the Faith and Order; the numbers of the succeeding articles will be changed in sequence.) (FIRST READING)

Choosing Leaders Other Than the Continuing Offices of Elders and Deacons

Should the Board of Elders deem it necessary to have positions of church leadership other than Elders and Deacons, and other than officers and leaders of church organizations, it shall recommend to the congregation the creation of such positions of leadership. If the congregation approves, such leaders shall be chosen by one of the following ways:

- (1) election by congregational vote upon:
 - (a) being presented by nominating committee,
 - (b) being nominated by congregational ballot;
- (2) appointment by Board of Elders.

Though these leaders may not meet all the Biblical qualifications for the office of Elder, nevertheless their lives shall be in keeping with the Standards of Worship and Life. Being chosen for one of these positions of leadership does not make one a member of the Board of Elders or Deacons. The following shall be the procedure in case of death, resignation, or removal of a church leader other than an Elder or Deacon:

- (a) the Board of Elders shall review and act upon the resignation or removal of the leader;
- (b) The Board of Elders shall either appoint someone or determine the time of a congregational meeting to fill the vacated position due to death, resignation, or removal.

Officers and other leaders in church organizations shall be elected or appointed in harmony with the Faith and Order and according to the By-laws of the particular church and/or the By-laws of the organization.

(The first paragraph under #4 "Other Organizations in the Particular Church" shall be deleted.)

(This material will replace the present material in Article IV "Choosing Leaders other than continuing Offices of Elders and Deacons,"page 64 of the 1981 Faith and Order)

It shall process and approve all applications for the military chaplaincy, and its Chairman shall be the representative of the Bible Fellowship Church to the General Commission on Chaplains and Armed Forces Personnel.

(This material will appear under duties of the Credentials Committee, p. 124 of the 1981 Faith and Order as #5. Present 5 and 6 will become 6 and 7.)

The Bible Fellowship Church qualifies to have men with its ministerial credentials to serve under the U.S. Armed Forces Chaplains Board under the endorsement of the General Commission on Chaplains and Armed Forces Personnel. Applications for such service shall be made through the Credentials Committee.

Corporate Officers in a Particular Church

In an incorporated congregation the authorized legal representatives shall be chosen from among the members of the Board of Elders according to its respective Articles of Incorporation.

When an incorporated congregation becomes incapable of electing elders and seeks to maintain its work,

the Board of Directors of the Bible Fellowship Church shall appoint elders who, upon ratification by the congregation, shall be the corporate officers of the particular church.

Committee on Program

Appointment

The Chairman of the Annual Conference shall prior to the adjournment of the Annual Conference appoint the Committee on Program for the succeeding Annual Conference.

Duties

- 1. The Committee on Program shall establish and oversee a program for the succeeding Annual Conference designed to bring spiritual blessing and challenge to the members of the Conference. The frequency and length of the sessions proposed shall be in balance with the business concerns of the Conference.
- It shall submit its proposals to the Committee on Agenda at least six weeks prior to Annual Conference.

Committee on Agenda

Appointment

- 1. The Committee on Agenda shall receive from any agency or particular church requests for time in the agenda of the Annual Conference. Such requests must be in writing and in the hands of the Committee at least six weeks prior to the beginning of the Annual Conference.
- 2. It shall establish the order in which standing and special reports shall be considered at the Annual Conference.
- 3. It shall circulate the proposed agenda two weeks prior to the Annual Conference.

Appointment

- It shall receive from each church the completed Summary Statistical Report forms and a copy of the minutes of the congregational meetings of that year.
- 3. It shall meet on the Thursday preceeding the Annual Conference to tabulate these reports for submission to the Annual Conference.

Appointment

- 1. The Committee to Examine Annual Conference Minutes shall compare the Annual Conference Proceeding as printed in the Bible Fellowship Yearbook with the official minutes of the Secretary of Annual Conference.
- 2. It shall report in writing to the next Annual Conference any and all discrepancies between these two records.
- 3. It shall submit to the Annual Conference two copies of the Bible Fellowship Yearbook certified to contain true and correct copies of the Preceedings of the previous Annual Conference.

 These copies shall be placed in the archives.

Committee on Resolutions

Appointment

The Chairman of Annual Conference shall appoint the Committee on Resolutions from the membership of the Annual Conference at the first meeting.

1. The Committee on Resolutions shall devise any resolutions it deems helpful to present for approval by the Annual Conference, including resolutions of thanks giving and appreciation, of changes in rules or by-laws, of establishment of the place and time of the next Annual Conference.

2. It shall present the resolutions proposed to the members of the Annual Conference in writing for consideration.

Committee on Communications

Appointment

- It shall respond in writing to each communication sent to the Annual Conference unless that communication is referred to another Board or Committee.
- It shall report to the Annual Conference the names of all those who sent communication and the nature of the response by the Committee.

Committee on Auditing

Appointment

The Chairman of Annual Conference shall appoint the Committee on Auditing from the membership of the Annual Conference at the first meeting.

Duties

Fellowship Church to ascertain:

- (a) whether the report is made from an audited account.
- (b) who made the audit,
- (c) cash held by the agency on the date of the report, and
- (d) depositories in which the funds are maintained. (See Faith and Order, 1981 edition, page 135, 136, Miscellaneous By-laws of Annual Conference #4 and #7.)
- 2. It shall make a report to the Annual Conference stating the results of their examination, including the names of any agencies which have not met the requirements of the Faith and Order and the ways in which the report was incomplete.

Tellers

Appointment

The Chairman of Annual Conference shall appoint from the membership of the Conference tellers to conduct the elections.

Duties

- 2. The Tellers shall distribute and collect the ballots.
- 3. The Chairman of the tellers shall enlist associate members of the Conference to tabulate the results of the elections in which duplicated ballots are used. For special elections and other voting conducted during the meetings of the Annual

Conference, the tellers shall tabulate the results.

4. the Chairman of the tellers shall announce the results of the elections and other voting and keep records of the results.

Timekeeper

Appointment

The Chairman of Annual Conference shall appoint a Timekeeper from the membership or the advisory membership of the Annual Conference.

- 2. If any participant has the floor for ten minutes at one time, the Timekeeper shall inform the Chairman of the Conference.

The following shall be inserted as paragraph #4.

A minister who retires may serve as a minister in any elective or appointed position only until his current term of office is completed. A retired minister may serve in an advisory capacity on any conference board or committee at the request of the particular board or committee. (FIRST READING)

Retirement from the Ministry of the Bible Fellowship Church

Any minister of the Bible Fellowship Church who has attained the age of 65 years or who has completed at least 40 years of service with the Bible Fellowship Church is eligible to retire from active service.

Any minister of the Bible Fellowship Church who has attained the age of 72 years must retire from active service by the end of the month in which he becomes 72 years of age.

Any minister of the Bible Fellowship Church who has rendered at least 30 years of service to the Bible Fellowship Church and who has not attained 65 years of age shall be eligible for early retirement from active service, but shall not be eligible for retirement benefits until he has attained 65 years of age.

Any minister holding credentials with the Bible Fellowship Church and seeking retirement shall notify the Credentials Committee of the Bible Fellowship Church at least 90 days prior to the effective date of his retirement. The Credentials Committee shall set the effective date of the retirement, change the status of the minister on the conference records, and notify the Board of Directors of the effective date of the retirement. The Board of Directors shall determine the starting date and the amount of benefits to be received according to the rules of the Minister's Retirement Fund. ministers pastoring a church shall dissolve the Pastoral relationship through the rules of Pulpit (FIRST READING) Supply.

Resolved: that paragraph A under VI retirement age, page 109 of the 1981 Faith and Order be amended to read:

A minister of the Bible Fellowship Church who has attained the age of sixty-five (65) years or who has

completed at least 40 years of service with the Bible Fellowship Church may retire from active service.

(The provision for payment after 40 years of service, but before 65 years of age, is applicable to only those ministers who are currently on the roll who have paid into the fund for forty years.)

The congregation shall have the right to agree, to suggest changes, or to disagree with such recommendations. Agreement indicates the congregation is ready to follow the leadership of the Board of Elders. Suggesting changes indicates the congregation believes the Board of Elders has overlooked some factors and should revise its recommendation. Disagreement indicates the congregation is not ready to follow the leadership of the elders.

Even though the elders are to rule under Christ's authority and the congregation is to follow, yet the elders should use wisdom and carefully consider the propriety of taking action that is not supported by the congregation. It is not only the responsibility of the Board of Elders to lead but also to provide sufficient information, sound reasoning, and ample time for the congregation to follow intelligently.

The elders must distinguish between those areas of disagreement that are matters of preference and those that are matters of principle. Even though the decisions of the congregation are not binding on the elders according to the authority invested in the office in the Scriptures, yet the elders shall seek to rule in harmony with the decision of the congregation except where the standards of Scripture would be repudiated, the cause of Christ harmed, or the Faith and Order violated. Whenever there is disagreement, the Board of Elders needs to consider prayerfully the reasons for the disagreement by the congregation in determining the appropriate action to be taken by the Board in exercise of its leadership.

Revis**ion** of Article VI Business Rules of Annual Conference.

The following will replace the material currently in Article VI:

- 1. Each meeting of Annual Conference shall be opened with prayer.
- 2. The Chairman shall convene the Conference at the prescribed time and shall lead the Conference in devotions at the first meeting after which the Secretary shall establish the roll. Each succeeding morning meeting shall begin with devotions after which the minutes of the meetings of the preceeding day shall be read. Business shall generally proceed according to the agenda.
- 3. Two sessions shall be held daily as follows: from 9:00 A.M. to 12:00 Noon and from 1:30 P.M. to 5:00 P.M. Evening meetings are optional at the discretion of Annual Conference.
- 4. The parliamentary procedure shall follow Robert's

- Rules of Order except where superseded by the By-Laws for Annual Conference.
- 5. Anyone wishing to speak shall rise and respectfully address the Chairman. In the event that more than one should address the Chairman at the same time, the Chairman shall decide who is entitled to the floor.
- 6. No one shall be allowed to speak more than ten minutes on any subject unless he receives permission from the Chairman.
- 7. No one shall speak the second time on a given motion unless permission is granted by the Chairman.
- 8. The Chairman is responsible to preserve order.
- Reports of Boards and Committees to Annual Conference:
 - a. All Annual Conference Boards and Committees elected by ballot shall send copies of their reports to the members of Annual Conference no less than one week prior to Annual Conference. Study Committees appointed by the Chairman shall follow the same procedure.
 - b. Reports which have been previously circulated shall not be read publicly unless requested from the Conference floor.
 - c. The reports may be questioned and corrected before being accepted by Annual Conference.
 - d. Two corrected and signed copies of each report shall be given to the Secretary of Annual Conference upon acceptance of said report for inclusion in the Conference Yearbook. These copies shall be signed by the person submitting the report.

- 10. The election procedures of Annual Conference shall be:
 - a. Nominations shall be closed at the opening of each meeting for all elections to be conducted at that particular meeting.
 - b. Nominations and elections for a particular Board or Committee shall not take place until the report of that Board or Committee has been accepted by Annual Conference.
 - c. A ballot listing the names of all nominees shall be prepared and duplicated at the direction of the tellers for those elections.
 - d. The ballots shall be marked by each member of the Annual Conference and be submitted to the tellers.
 - e. The tellers with the aid of the associate members of the Annual Conference shall tabulate the results and prepare run-off ballots as needed.
 - f. Elections, according to the will of the Annual Conference, may be conducted by use of oral nominations, name(s) written on ballots by members of the Annual Conference, and ballots submitted to the tellers.
- 11. Any exception to the implementation of the Rules of the Faith and Order other than the Articles of Faith may be allowed by a three-quarter majority of Annual Conference. The reason for such exception shall be fully spread on the minutes. Such exceptions shall be subject to annual review until approved at second reading.

 (FIRST READING)

12. Revision of Article XI, Amendments to the Faith and Order

The following shall replace the material under Article XI, pages 136-137, 1981 edition of the Faith and Order.

Amendments to the Faith and Order

The Annual Conference may propose to the churches amendments or changes in the Articles of Faith of the Bible Fellowship Church by a two-thirds majority of those voting. After the approval of a first reading of the proposed change, the pastor and delegate of each particular church shall be responsible to inform their Board of Elders of the proposed change. The Board of Elders of each church shall vote on the proposed change, and an affirmative vote by a majority of the total number of elders shall be required for approval. Before the Annual Conference can consider a second reading of the proposed amendment or change in the Articles of Faith, approval of the proposed change must be reported within twentyfour (24) months to the Secretary of Annual Conference by the Board of Elders of at least two-thirds of the churches.

Amendments or changes in any portion of the Faith and Order of the Bible Fellowship Church except the Articles of Faith may be proposed to the churches by a two-thirds majority of those voting at Annual Conference. After the approval of a first reading of the proposed change, the pastor and delegate of each particular church shall be responsible to inform their Board of Elders of the proposed change. The amendment will be declared to be in effect when approved by a two-thirds majority of those voting on a second reading of the amendment at a succeeding Annual Conference.

A special rule is an enactment of Annual Conference limited to one year of application. It may not violate the Faith and Order of the Bible Fellowship Church. It may be reenacted on an annual basis. It may be placed in the Faith and Order by simple majority vote of Annual Conference after being enacted at three successive sessions of Annual Conference.

(FIRST READING)

13. Revision of Article I, Annual Conference, page 91. 1981 edition of the Faith and Order.

The last two paragraphs shall be replaced with the following.

The proceedings of Annual Conference shall be conducted according to the Business Rules of Annual Conference. The Annual Conference shall keep and publish a record of the proceedings of its meetings and make it available to the membership of the churches.

The budget of Pinebrook Junior College was presented to the Annual Conference.

Whereas: the Ministerial Candidate Committee has referred Barry J. Minsky, as a minister whose credentials are in good standing with the Bible Fellowship Church, to the Credentials Committee for a decision relative to his ecclesiastical endorsement for service as a United States Military Chaplain, and

Whereas: the Credentials Committee has interviewed Barry J. Minsky, and believes him to be competent to serve in the military chaplaincy, and

Whereas: present legislation does not clearly specify who has the authority to approve men for the military chaplaincy, therefore be it

Resolved: that the 98th Annual Conference of the Bible Fellowship Church hereby grants Barry J. Minsky ecclesiastical **endorse**ment for service as a full-time military chaplain.

Frank L. Herb, Jr. led in prayer of dedication for Barry J. Minsky.

Resolved: that the following paragraph entitled "Sunday Bible Schools" be substituted for the paragraph with the same title on pages 29-30 of the 1978 Yearbook.

SUNDAY BIBLE SCHOOLS

Each Sunday Bible School shall have the following officers: General Superintendent, Assistant Superintendent, Secretary*, and Treasurer*. These officers shall serve for a term of one year. The General Superintendent and Assistant Superintendent may be elected by and from the membership of the particular church or appointed by the Board of Elders. Each Sunday Bible School is responsible to the Board of Elders. The Pastor, by virtue of his office, is also an officer of the Sunday Bible School.

QUALIFICATIONS OF STAFF MEMBERS

- 1. Each one shall confess Jesus Christ as his Lord and Savior and give evidence of this in his conduct.
- 2. Each one shall be faithful in his attendance of the public services of the particular church.
- 3. Each one shall be faithful in attendance of staff meetings.

DUTIES OF OFFICERS

The General Superintendent shall:

- 1. Provide each class with a born-again teacher as directed by the Executive Committee.
- 2. See that the school is properly graded.
- Preside or arrange for a leader at each session of the school.
- 4. Periodically survey the work done in the various classes and departments.
- 5. Cooperate with the Pastor in the administration of the Sunday Bible School.
- 6. Report regularly to the Board of Elders all information requested by the Board to maintain oversight.

- Be responsible to carry out the directives of the Board of Elders in regards to the Sunday Bible School.
- 8. Report annually to the congregation concerning the status of the Sunday Bible School.

The Assistant Superintendent shall:

- 1. Assume the responsibilities of the General Superintendent in his absence or incapacity.
- Have as his special interest the oversight of absentee visitation and stimulation of Sunday Bible School promotion.

The Secretary* shall:

- 1. Be appointed by the Executive Committee.
- 2. Be responsible for enrollment and attendance records.
- 3. Provide the General Superintendent with all necessary information for reports.

The Treasurer* shall:

- 1. Be appointed by the Executive Committee.
- Be accountable for all monies received as determined by the by-laws of the Particular Church.

The Departmental Superintendent shall:

- 1. Be appointed by the Executive Committee.
- Lead and direct all departmental activities consistent with the spiritual goals and objectives of the particular Sunday Bible School

- 3. Work closely with the General Superintendent, keeping the Superintendent informed on all matters relating to the department, i.e. discipline problems, teaching needs, material requirements, et cetera.
- 4. Be aware of absentees, advising the Assistant Superintendent when students are absent for three and six weeks consecutively.

DUTIES OF TEACHERS

Each teacher shall:

- 1. Endeavor to lead his students to a saving knowledge of Jesus Christ and to nuture those who have made a profession of faith in Christ.
- 2. Thoroughly prepare himself through prayer and Bible Study to teach the Scriptures, making use of teacher manuals and/or other resource materials.
- 3. Become personally acquainted with each of his students, so that lessons may be relevant.
- 4. Be faithful in the visitation of students and follow-up of absentees.

EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE

- It shall be composed of Pastor, General Superintendent, Assistant Superintendent, Secretary*, Treasurer*, Departmental Superintendents, and/or others appointed or elected in accordance with the by-laws of the Particular Church.
- 2. It shall meet at the call of the General Superintendent.
- 3. It shall arrange for meetings of the entire Sunday Bible School staff.

- 4. The General Superintendent or Pastor shall preside at all meetings.
- 5. It shall be responsible to provide each department with personnel as needed.
- 6. It shall exercise oversight in the assignment of all teachers, assistants, and substitutes.
- 7. It shall review and act upon the resignation or proposed removal of any teacher or officer of the Sunday Bible School.
- 8. It shall be responsible to maintain a high degree of spirituality, positive Christian conduct, and full cooperation on the part of the Sunday Bible School staff.
- 9. It shall approve all curricula to be used in the Sunday Bible School.
- 10. It shall approve all furnishings, equipment, and teaching aids to be used in the Sunday Bible School.
- 11. It shall endeavor to provide a program of teacher training.
- 12. It shall approve all projects conducted by the Sunday Bible School or individual classes.

ENROLLMENT PROCEDURES

- A visitor who attends for three consecutive Sundays shall be enrolled as an active member.
- 2. A member is dropped from the active enrollment after thirteen consecutive absences, and is maintained on the roll as an inactive member for six months.

*NOTE: The duties of the Secretary and Treasurer may be combined into one office, Secretary-Treasurer, in accordance with the by-laws of the particular

church.

Whereas: the present Church Home, a 28-bed facility, does not offer a comprehensive program which includes skilled care, and

Whereas: an intermediate nursing facility offers only a limited scope of services resulting in a decreased number of persons interested in utilizing the present facility, and

Whereas: the present location of the Church Home does not permit expansion, and

Whereas: the ever-changing health care regulations place the future of intermediate nursing facilities in doubt, and

Whereas: future financial viability is becoming a major concern in operating a 28-bed facility, and

Whereas: it is deemed in the best interest of the $\overline{\text{Bible Fellowship Church}}$ to authorize and actively further the construction of a long-term care facility (skilled nursing facility),

Therefore, be it

Resolved: that the incorporated Bible Fellowship Church by and through its directors and officers be, and is hereby, authorized and directed to enter into an agreement for the purchase, from Weber Construction of Fleetwood, Berks County, Pa. as described in Deed Book Volume 1644, Page 1038, recorded in the Recorder of Deeds Office for Berks County, in Reading, Pa., for the purchase price of FIFTEEN THOUSAND (\$15,000.00) DOLLARS per acre, less TWO THOUSAND FIVE HUNDRED (\$2,500.00) DOLLARS which has been paid by the Bible Fellowship Church Home to obtain an existing option, and be it further,

Resolved: that the Agreement for the purchase of the land be contingent upon the following:

- 1. The property, after appropriate site survey, be deemed suitable for building the desired facility.
- 2. The obtaining of all local, state, and federal approvals for the construction of the facility.
- 3. The obtaining of financing acceptable to the

- Bible Fellowship Church for the purchase and development of the property and construction of the facility;
- Such other matters as may be deemed necessary or desirable;

And be it further

Resolved: that the incorporated Bible Fellowship Church by and through its directors and officers be and is hereby authorized and directed to proceed expeditiously to carry out the intent of the resolution, which is the financing and construction of a long-term-care facility (skilled nursing facility) projected to contain no more than one hundred twenty (120) beds at a cost not to exceed THIRTY THOUSAND (\$30,000.00) DOLLARS per bed.

Article II - Purpose: The purpose of this Missionary Society shall be to:

- A. Give diligence to intercessory prayer in behalf of missions.
- B. Encourage sacrificial giving in behalf of missions.
- C. Support missionary projects both home and foreign.

- D. Correspond with missionaries.
- E. Assist missionary candidates and missionaries on furlough.
- F. Promote spiritual growth among the members of the society.

Article III - Membership:

The membership shall be open to Christian women of like faith, who are interested in missionary work and desire to share in this fellowship.

Article IV - Officers:

The suggested officers of the local Women's Missionary Society shall be a President, Vice-President, Secretary, Treasurer, and Corresponding Secretary. Each local Women's Missionary Society shall elect the officers that it deems necessary. No one shall serve as President who is not a member of the Bible Fellowship Church.

The officers shall be elected annually in a Spring meeting.

The Executive Committee shall be constituted of the elected officers. The Pastor shall be an advisory member of the Executive Committee.

A vacancy occuring in any office shall be filled by election.

BY-LAWS:

Article I - The Society shall meet regularly as arranged by the Executive Committee.

Article II - Duties of Officers.

President:

 To oear responsibility of leadership of the Women's Missionary Society.

- 2. To preside at the meetings of the Society and of the Executive Committee.
- To present reports at Congregational meetings, if required.

Vice-President:

- 1. To preside in the absence of the President or when the President so directs.
- 2. To assume all duties of the President in the absence or incapacitation of the President.

Secretary:

- 1. To record all minutes of the meetings of the Society and of the Executive Committee.
- To record attendance and to keep a membership roll, if desired.
- To supply the President with statistical reports for the Congregational meetings, if required.
- 4. To carry on all correspondence relative to the Women's Missionary Society, and to promote correspondence with the missionaries if there is not a Corresponding Secretary.

Corresponding Secretary:

- To be a liaison between the Society and the missionaries.
- To promote correspondence between the Society members and the missionaries.

Treasurer:

1. To receive and disburse funds, and keep accurate records.

2. To provide the President with financial reports for the Congregational meetings, if required.

Article III - Participation in Regional and Conference-Wide Women's Missionary Society Programs.

A. Regional Programs:

- 1. The Board of Missions shall establish groupings of churches for Regional Programs.
- 2. The officers of the Women's Missionary Society of each church of a region shall constitute an organizing committee for the region.
- 3. Each regional committee shall establish officers as it deems necessary.
- 4. Regional officers shall be elected at an Annual Meeting held in the Autumn. These officers shall be members of the Bible Fellowship Church.
- 5. The elected officers shall plan regional programs, including the establishing of frequency and dates of regional rallies.

B. Conference-Wide Programs:

- A general committee composed of four members: President, Vice-President, Secretary, and Treasurer, shall be appointed by the Board of Missions.
- This committee shall have the responsibility of developing Conference-Wide programs of the Women's Missionary Society. (SECOND READING)

Resolved: that the Article "Dedication of Children" be included in the Faith and Order under Standards of Worship and Life as Article VII, with all subsequent articles renumbered. (FIRST READING)

STANDARDS OF WORSHIP AND LIFE ARTICLE VII DEDICATION OF CHILDREN

Child dedication is a voluntary act wherein believing parents publicly present their child to the Lord as an outward expression of their gratitude to Him for the child and as a formal appeal to God for divine assistance in the rearing of the child. It is not to be confused with infant baptism. It is not to be viewed as an ordinance of the church, nor is it to be considered as having saving efficacy.

Because the child is a gift from God, the parents promise, as God's stewards, to bring up the child entrusted to them in the discipline and instruction of the Lord. 2

In dedicating their child in the presence of fellow believers, parents are publicly dedicating themselves to the faithful fulfillment of their parental responsibilities³ and are acknowledging their need for the prayerful support and encouragement of those fellow believers.⁴

The act of child dedication becomes meaningful

only as the parents explain to the child the meaning of this act and consistently carry out the promises made before God and the brethren at the time of the dedication. When one of the parents is an unbeliever, only the believing parent shall make the public presentation.

Colossians 3:21 "Fathers, provoke not your children to anger, lest they be discouraged."

3Deuteronomy 6:4-9 "Hear, O Israel: The Lord our God is one Lord: And thou shalt love the Lord thy God with all thine heart, and with all thy soul, and with all thy might.

And these words, which I command thee this day, shall be in thine heart; and thou shalt teach them diligently unto thy children, and shalt talk of them when thou sittest in thine house, and when thou walkest by the way, and when thou liest down, and when thou risest up.

And thou shalt bind them for a sign upon thine hand, and they shall be as frontlets between thine eyes.

And thou shalt write them upon the posts of thy house, and on thy gates."

REPORT OF THE MINISTERIAL CANDIDATE COMMITTEE

"Not that we are adequate in ourselves to consider anything as coming from ourselves, but our adequacy is from God, Who also made us adequate as servants of a new covenant" (II Corinthians 3:5-6a, NASB). May the Lord continue to provide ministers for the Bible Fellowship Church who realize their own insufficiency, but who also experience the adequacy that comes from God.

The Ministerial Candidate Committee met eight times during the year to accomplish the work entrusted to its care and oversight. Fifteen interviews were conducted by the Committee as a whole and fourteen examinations were administered and corrected.

The Seventh Annual Orientation Program was conducted at Pinebrook Junior College in June, 1981, for the men under the care of the Committee. The Orientation Program includes sessions on the doctrinal distinctives of the Bible Fellowship Church, the denominational agencies and their functions, practical theology, and a homiletics clinic during which members of the

Credentials Committee and the Ministerial Relations Committee joined with the Ministerial Candidate Committee in evaluating sermons presented by the probationers, candidates, and applicants. The Eighth Annual Orientation Program is scheduled for June 7-10, 1982.

George R. Bryson, James A. Wickstead, and Bryan G. Upton were recommended to the Credentials Committee for the Examination relative to Ordination. G. Wayne Clapier was recommended to the Credentials Committee for consideration of the recognition of his prior Ordination credentials.

MEDICAL INSURANCE PROGRAM

REAL ESTATE

The conditions in the conditional agreement for the purchase of additional real estate in Finesville, NJ were not acceptable and could not be modified; therefore, it was declared null and void.

Counsel was offered to the mission at Wappinger's Falls. NY on a real estate transaction.

AD HOC STEWARDSHIP COMMITTEE

A group of members of the Bible Fellowship Churches and agencies attended the annual meeting of the Christian Stewardship Council. The report of this committee is attached. The Board of Directors urges serious consideration and approval of the recommendation of the Ad Hoc Stewardship Committee.

MINISTERS' RETIREMENT FUND PAYMENTS

The 97th Annual Conference asked the Board of Directors to study again the basis of income on which payments are made to the Ministers' Retirement Fund. After considerable discussion, the Board approved a new policy brought to the 98th Annual Conference as a recommendation. The recommended policy is that each minister pay into the Ministers' Retirement Fund on the same amount of income on which he pays or would be required to pay into F.I.C.A. (Social Security) Although this is different from prior approaches to the problem, this approach commends itself in that it deals with each minister on the same basis.

EASTON, PA

The church in Easton, PA, has continued to function with two elders appointed by the Board of Directors, plus the Pastor and one elder elected by the congregation. The Church borrowed \$1,500.00 from the Fund to Assist Churches during the 1980-1981 year.

RECOMMENDATIONS

We recommend that the Annual Conference approve the following:

- 1. That the annuities paid from the Ministers'
 Retirement Fund beginning October 1, 1981 shall
 be \$102.00 per year of service up to forty years
 of service for each annuitant.
- 2. That the Administrative Budget for the 1981-1982 year as presented be approved for use effective October 1, 1981.

- 3. That the Administrative Budget for the 1982-1983 year as presented, be approved for circulation to the churches in solicitation of their pledges by April 15, 1982.
- 4. That the rate for mileage reimbursement for official travel shall be 18 cents per mile.
- 5. That the amount on which ministers shall pay the required percentage into the Ministers' Retirement Fund is the amount on which he pays or would pay according to the Federal Insurance Contributions Act. (F.I.C.A. or Social Security).

FINANCIAL STATEMENT

The financial statement of all accounts of the Board of Directors is attached. The books and these statements have been audited by Walter A. Davis.

REPORT OF AD HOC STEWARDSHIP COMMITTEE

In its report to the Ninety-Seventh Annual Conference, the Board ofDirectors of the Bible Fellowship Church recorded its intention to send a representative to the next meeting of the Christian Stewardship Council (1980 Yearbook, page 51).

A delegation of eight from the Bible Fellowship Church, representing the Board of Directors and five agencies attended the annual meetings of the Christian Stewardship Council, March 9-11, 1981 in Arlington Heights, Ill. Jansen E. Hartman represented the Board of Directors. James A. Beil represented the Bible Fellowship Church Home. Roy A. Hertzog represented the Board of Foreign Missions. John H. Riggall represented Pinebrook Bible Conference. Clyde W. Snyder represented Pinebrook Junior College. Daniel G. Ziegler represented the Church Extension Department. Bruce A. Ellingson also represented the latter two agencies. Mark T. Smith attended as an

interested layman at his own expense.

Through the kindness of the administration and Board of Directors of the Home, the delegation was able to travel in that agency's van, thus realizing a considerable saving in travel costs while fostering fellowship and interaction on the trip.

By means of 25 sessions and workshops, the whole field of stewardship and planned giving was introduced and opened up to the participants by men and women who are recognized and proved leaders of the evangelical community in these fields. Our delegation divided itself up to take in as many different workshops as possible. We also obtained cassette tapes of most addresses and workshops, which were very valuable. A sampling of the topics includes: "Starting and Maintaining a Planned Giving Program," "How a Computer Can Be Used for Fund Raising," "The Basics of Foundation Solicitation," "Conducting an Annual Giving Program,", etc.

In addition to interacting during, and especially on the return trip from the meetings, the delegation formed itself into an Ad Hoc Stewardship Committee with the following purpose: To bring together implications from the Christian Stewardship Council and to seek to implement them in, and to make them profitable to our church. The Committee met twice after the Arlington Heights meetings.

The Committee voted to request that the Board of Directors recognize it as an ad hoc committee of the Board of Directors and include this report with its report to the Ninety-Eighth Annual Conference.

The Committee reports a consensus regarding the following propositions:

1. Stewardship must be regarded as a biblical ministry, which must comprehend all of life, including finances but excluding nothing else.

- The stewardship concepts and practices of the particular churches and the denominational agencies must be addressed and upgraded. We have lagged behind where we ought to be.
- 3. We must emphasize integrity, responsibility, ethics and accountability as we seek to upgrade and expand our stewardship ministry and practices.
- 4. We are particularly missing the mark on deferred giving, which would be a blessing to our people and a help to our churches and agencies.

The Committee has recommended to the agencies of the Bible Fellowship Church that each establish a stewardship committee within its Board.

The Committee believes there is an acute need for a denominational stewardship program for the Bible Fellowship Church. This program must be operated by an agency, which will not become an end in itself, but will be a servant of the particular churches and the agencies in their stewardship ministries.

Our people who are spiritually mature will want to maximize their service for Christ and their impact for the kingdom and glory of God. We must do all we can to help them do so. It is important, therefore, to challenge, educate, and counsel our constituency in planning their giving, maximizing their contributions, and in estate planning. Because we believe the Bible Fellowship Churches and our agencies are worthy and faithful means that the Lord is using to fulfill His purposes, which are well managed and effective in accomplishing their purposes, they are worthy of the loyalty and best support of our people. Their story must be adequately and fully told and they must be assisted in their stewardship ministry. Many other ministries and organizations, some much larger and more aggresive than the Bible Fellowship Agencies, are appealing to our people for support. Many of these are less worthy and/or deserving of our people's support, and few are more needy than our own agencies, which are closely operated by, and responsible and responsive to our churches and

their members, and seek faithfully to submit to and practice the Faith and Order of the Bible Fellowship Church.

This Committee recommends that work continue toward formation of a stewardship program for the Bible Fellowship Church through a committee of Annual Conference.

This Committee has formulated the following guidelines for a stewardship agency, which we commend to the continuing study committee for its consideration:

- 1. That a stewardship agency for the Bible Fellowship Church be formed, and that it be named Stewardship Council of the Bible Fellowship Church.
- 2. That this Council shall be comprised of:
 - a. One representative of each participating agency of the Bible Fellowship Church chosen by his respective agency, with his term of office to be determined by his agency.
 - b. Three members at large representing the particular churches and elected by Annual Conference for the purpose of representing the particular churches. These men shall be elected to three-year terms, their terms of office expiring in successive years.
- 3. That the duties of the Council shall be:
 - a. To challenge the constituency of the Bible Fellowship Church to faithfulness in total stewardship of life.
 - b. To educate the constituency of the Bible Fellowship Church concerning various means of carrying out financial stewardship.
 - c. To assist particular churches, upon their invitation, to develop their own stewardship programs.
 - d. To assist agencies of the Bible Fellowship Church, upon their invitation, to develop their own stewardship programs.
 - e. To assist churches and agencies within the Bible Fellowship Church to solicit for various financial programs.

- f. To provide services to the constituency of the Bible Fellowship Church whereby they can contribute financially to Bible Fellowship Church ministries.
- g. To report to Annual Conference, said report to include an audited financial report.
- h. To co-ordinate and approve with sensitivity the stewardship programs of various Bible Fellowship agencies so as to guard against duplication, competition, overexposure, and undue aggressiveness.
- 4. That this Council be funded by:
 - a. An appropriation in the Annual Conference Administrative Budget.
 - b. Appropriations from the participating agencies.
 - c. Fees charged to particular churches for services rendered by the council.
 - d. Fees charged to agencies for services by the Council.
- 5. That the following be considered in the by-laws of this Council:
 - a. The Council's primary function is to channel funds to the churches and agencies of the Bible Fellowship Church rather than to be the recipient of gifts for its own support.
 - b. All agencies of the Bible Fellowship Church are prohibited from solicitation from the Bible Fellowship constituency for major capital campaigns and deferred giving programs except through, or by approval of, the Stewardship Council of the Bible Fellowship Church.
 - c. Services to particular churches shall be rendered by the Stewardship Council of the Bible Fellowship Church only upon the invitation of the particular church.
 - d. Suggestions for giving to all denominational agencies shall be offered as stewardship programs are presented to particular churches.

We recommend that the Ninety-Eighth Annual Conference adopt the following:

Resolved: that an Ad Hoc Stewardship Committee be formed by this Annual Conference, to be comprised of the men who have served on the Ad Hoc Stewardship Committee, chosen by and representing six of the agencies of the Bible Fellowship Church, these men being: James A. Beil, Bruce A. Ellingson, Jansen E. Hartman, Roy A. Hertzog, John H. Riggall, Clvde W. Snyder, and Daniel G. Ziegler, together with a representative of the Victory Valley Board, chosen by that Board, and three at-large members elected by This committee shall continue to this Conference. study the formation of a stewardship program for the Bible Fellowship Church, including delineation of a statement of philosophy and policy and formulation of by-laws for such a program. The committee shall report to the Ninety-Ninth Annual Conference.

REPORT OF THE CHURCH EXTENSION DIRECTOR

Then Jesus came to (the eleven disciples) and said, "All authority in heaven and on earth has been given to me. Therefore go and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit, and teaching them to obey everything I have commanded you. And surely I will be with you always, to the very end of the age."--Matthew 28:18-20

On Thursday evening, September 24, 1981, a wonderful vignette of the church extension ministry was formed at the meeting of the Mid-Hudson Church Planting Team. It was the second meeting in a row at the

Wicksteads' home in Poughquag,NY (we usually rotate among the three area parsonages), necessitated because of interviews for membership. The Mid-Hudson Team serves as a surrogate Board of Elders for the Poughquag, Wappingers Falls, and New Fairfield missions. The team is made up of Pastors James A. Wickstead, Robert L. Draper, and Herbert K. Lea and the Director. Tom, of the Thomas and Suzanne Ward Aquila and Priscilla Team in Poughquag, also sits in with the team.

We had just had the joy of interviewing and approving for membership Richard and Shirley Mackey as the tenth Committed Family of the Poughquag congregation. The gathering of ten Committed Families is the "trigger" that releases the process of development and selection of elders, which will lead to full formation as a particular church. The brethren in Poughquag hope to be able to gain Annual Conference membership in October of 1982.

There remained yet another membership interview for the team that Thursday evening. Marie, a young wife and mother who had recently moved with her husband and three children into the farmhouse next to the Grange Hall in North Clove where the Poughquag congregation meets, and has been attending the meetings, had requested that she be interviewed.

Marie began by stating how much she appreciated the church next door and how much she was learning from the Scriptures through her participation with the congregation. As the interviewers asked questions about her conversion and her understanding of salvation, it became apparent that Marie's knowledge of the subject was incomplete. Marie had been brought up in the Roman Catholic Church. A few years ago, as an adult, she had been baptized into the Mormon Church. Perhaps this accounted for her concept of salvation based on works. "Marie, if you were called this day to face the Lord God, on what basis would you hope or expect to enter heaven?"

"I'd tell Him I had tried to live a good life." "But God has stated that 'all have sinned,' and 'the soul that sins shall die;...the wages of sin is death'. What about the sins you have committed?" "I'd ask Him to forgive me, and I believe He would be kind and gracious." "But, Marie, from the beginning, when man first sinned, the Lord decreed that 'without the shedding of blood there is no forgiveness'..."

And so, lovingly and patiently, in turn, the members of the team shared with Marie the wonderful good news of the Father's provision of salvation through the death in the place of sinners of His Son, Jesus, "the Lamb of God", and the justification of the guilty, who receive the imputed perfect righteousness of Jesus. Her eyes filled with tears as the Holy Spirit revealed His truth and opened her heart to receive and believe it. In a simple but beautiful "out loud" prayer, Marie thanked the Lord for Jesus' death for her and committed her life to Him as Lord. "I feel warm and clean inside", she said as she thanked the team for sharing the Good News with her.

In July, at Bible Fellowship Week at Pinebrook, another Marie, from Wappingers Falls, NY, shared publicly how she had been transformed by Christ from one who was angry everyday with others and herself to one who is now at peace with others, herself, and her God. She came to Jesus through the ministry of the Wappinger mission. So did Vern and Betty. was my privilege to have dinner at their home after preaching for Pastor Lea while he was away on vacation. After the meal, some good conversation led into an unplanned impromptu study of Romans 8. next day Vern and Betty invited Christ to be their Lord and soon became the first committed family in Wappingers Falls. Their profession was preceded by months of attendance of the meetings, hearing Brother Lea open the Word to them with joy and amazement that they could understand and appreciate the Scriptures.

On the staff at Victory Valley this past summer was

"Mr. Steve", just a few months old in the Lord, one of a number of older teens and young adults who have been saved recently in New Fairfield, CT. Steve served conscientiously and well at the Valley as a counselor, as did Elaine Thiel as cook, another New Fairfield convert.

Last fall, six young people from the Newark, NJ, congregation were students at Pinebrook Junior College, five of whom had been brought to Christ through the Bible Fellowship mission in that city. At least six alcoholics have also been saved through that ministry —as have scores of other folks.

This past spring a man and his wife surprised the folks at Camden, DE, where they publicly and vocally confessed Christ during a Lord's Day worship service. Just a few weeks ago, Ron Erb led to Christ the first disciple of the new Irvington mission, a woman who was contacted through door-to-door visitation and invited Ron to her home for a Bible Study.

In the midst of planning, traveling, surveys, mailings, bookkeeping; while reporting concerning goals, attendance figures, building projects, budgets, receipts and expenditures, we are liable to fail to see or to lose sight of the persons who are constantly coming to Christ and being transformed by His grace through the church extension ministry. During my thirteen years of service as Director I have known literally hundreds of people who have been converted directly through the work of the Department. Most of these are credible disciples, who continue to grow in grace and to produce "fruit that remains."

But professions of faith are not the "bottom line" of church extension. That can only be the formation of new churches. Forthrightly to project goals for new churches planted, to measure our work on that basis and to accept nothing less as success is somewhat risky. Some have counselled that it might be better "p.r." and might project a better, surer, more positive image of success if we declare that our purpose is "to evangelize". If you state that as a goal and proceed widely to disseminate the Gospel, you cannot fail, according to that counsel.

The reason evangelism cannot be the final objective of our work is that we have been commissioned to do more—to make disciples by baptizing people and teaching them to observe all that Christ has taught and commanded. This can be done only in and by churches. Mere evangelism (Gospel presentation) at its best can be only truncated fulfilment of our Great Commission. Jesus said, "I will build My church" (Matthew 16:18) and, like Paul and Barnabas in the apostolic era, the Holy Spirit calls men to do "the work to which I have called them" (Acts 13:2) still today.

Not even the great Apostle Paul succeeded in planting a church in every place where he preached the Gospel. We have no evidence of churches in Salamis and Paphos on Cyprus, or in Perga, Pamphylia. Paul does not seem to have formed a church in Troas (Acts 16:8, II Corinthians 2:12,13) or in Neapolis, Amphipolis or in Apollonia in Macedonia. There is no evidence that Paul's ministry in Athens eventuated in the formation of a church. But we would be foolish if we became fixated on Paul's "failures" and regarded him as unsuccessful rather than beholding the many churches which he did plant and agreeing with his own late life assessment, "I have fought the good fight, I have finished the race, I have kept the faith. Now there is in store for me the crown of righteousness..." (II Timothy 4:7-8)

In aiming to plant churches we must take risks, knowing that we shall almost certainly fail to achieve the goal in every place that we try to form a church. Even the Son of God ministered in communities where "He could not do any miracles except lay His hands on a few sick people and heal them. And He was amazed at their lack of faith..." (Mark 6:5, 6)

Jesus preached and worked miracles in cities and villages in His day which refused to respond and repent when, He said, even such sinful cities as Tyre, Sidon, Sodom, and Nineveh would have heeded and repented (Matthew 11:20-24; 12:41).

Jesus instructed His disciples that they would come to homes and towns that would not welcome or listen to them (Matthew 10:11-13). "If anyone will not welcome you or listen to your words," He told them, "shake the dust off your feet when you leave that home or town" (v. 14). Again, "When you are persecuted in one place, flee to another. I tell you the truth, you will not finish going through the cities of Israel before the Son of Man comes" (v.23).

Paul and Barnabas followed the Lord's directions literally with respect to the Jews of Antioch of Pisidia. When the Jews became abusive, Paul and Barnabas said, "We had to speak the word of God to you first. Since you reject it and do not consider yourselves worthy of eternal life, we now turn to the Gentiles" (Acts 13:46). The latter "were glad and honored the word of the Lord, and all who were appointed for eternal life believed" (v. 48). When those who were hostile to the Gospel stirred up persecution against the apostles and expelled them from the region, "they shook the dust from their feet in protest against them and went to Iconium" (v. 51).

Now Jesus makes no mistakes. And we probably make more than Paul did. We may fail to plant churches because of unbelief or opposition or because of our own mistakes and inadequacies. There come times when we must, no matter how reluctantly, admit that it does not appear that we shall achieve our goal of a new church in some target areas and "cut our losses" and transfer the resources elsewhere where the prospects for achievement of the objective appear better. Even when that happens, however, we have not totally failed. In all of our withdrawals and closings of the 70s, Franklin Township, Neptune,

Belvidere, Carmel, and, by merger, Freehold, there were people who came to know Christ and continue to live for and serve the Lord. One of our converts in Franklin Township, for example, has returned there as a trained, ordained minister to plant a church for another evangelical denomination. In each of these places there was both wide and deep seed-sowing evangelism and there will be everlasting results.

With the discovery of the minutes of our Conferences prior to 1895, we have an almost complete record of our denomination's history of church planting. It teaches us what we might expect to discover from the Scriptures -- in order to plant new churches you must take risks and be prepared to fail; in fact, you may have more "failures" than successes. We presently have 44 fully formed churches. Throughout our history, in addition to those 44 target communities in which churches now exist, the Conferences recognized 83 other works as "churches", "charges", or "pastoral appointments." These include three attempts in Norristown, PA and two each in Plainfield (Northampton County), PA, and Belvidere and Phillipsburg, NJ. Earlier attempts, before successes, were made in Hatfield, Allentown, Blandon, PA and Newark, NJ, not to mention two "failures" in Lancaster before the present successful start in 1950. Eight of the failures had become fully formed and recognized churches that subsequently died, the farthest away being in Wadsworth, Ohio in the 1870s. There were also seven communities that were abandoned when congregations relocated to new communities that were distinct from those they had left.

Even if we count the eight fully-formed churches that later died as successes, the lesson from our failure might be, "you may need to be prepared to attempt three new church starts for every one success (that is, mature church established).

All eight of the congregations that were part of the Department one year ago have enjoyed measurable, demonstrable progress toward maturity during the year, and two more new missions have begun in 1981.

Fully formed churches continue in the Department until they have demonstrated ability fully to support themselves. Our oldest church, Finesville, NJ has continued to develop under the faithful pastoral leadership of D. Thomas Phillips. New families have been added and attendances have continued to grow. Steady financial growth brings the prospect of self-support near. The prospect of acquisition of a property adjacent to the church building for a parsonage did not come to fruition.

Camden, DE has solidified and become stronger through the year, in spite of some key people being transferred out of the area. The people show appreciation for and confidence in their pastor, James G. Koch. Some of the younger believers show a heart burden for evangelism and a willingness to be part of a witness outreach. This church will continue to grow and wholesomely impact the Capital area for the Gospel.

The remaining eight Department ministries are "missions", that is, they are not yet under government by local elders and thus recognized as "churches" with Annual Conference membership.

Nearest to that important stage right now is Poughquag, which has "taken off" in recent months and now has ten Committed Families in its membership. All of this has happened while Pastor James A. Wickstead has worked three or four days a week at secular employment to provide a major portion of his family's support. He expects within the next few months to be able to devote full time to the work.

Poughquag furnishes an example of faithful and persistent evangelism over several years through a Good News Club for children and teens at High Meadows Mobile Home Park. Two committed families have come to Christ and to Valley Church from High Meadows along with the wife and mother from a third family. Others among the many families being impacted by this fine ministry in a needy place may be expected to follow in the future.

There are two other "organized missions" in the Department—that is, they have formed a membership roll but have not yet gathered their ten committed families, are not yet into the process of developing and choosing elders.

The Newark (Glasgow), DE mission has been pastored faithfully from its inception by Arthur J. Frisbie, who has all this while worked full-time as a machinist. The mission presently has six committed families. Its outreach strengths have been through caringly relating to the needy and by creative and vital ministries to teens and children. The congregation takes responsibility to seek to minister to the families of the youths and children who are reached through its programs. Lord's Day attendance has recently climbed into the 30s.

Pastor Robert L. Draper serves the New Fairfield, CT mission, known as Gateway Bible Fellowship Church. Spearheaded by a movement to Christ among older teens and single young adults, this congregation has recently come out of a period of growth plateau, with several new families becoming regular in attendance and rather steady flow of new visitors. There are only three or four committed families presently declared, but a number of others may be "on the brink."

It is not beyond the realm of possibility that either or both the Glasgow and New Fairfield missions might complete their roster of committed families within the year and present themselves to the Nonety-Ninth Annual Conference for membership.

We have five "unorganized missions" in the Department, none of which has yet begun to form a membership roll, two of which are new in 1981, and two of which have not yet begun public meetings.

The oldest and largest of these unorganized missions, in fact, the largest congregation in the Department, is in Newark, NJ, where Bert Baker serves as organizing pastor. Over the last year, average

attendance at Lord's Day morning worship has averaged near 70. Several recent Sundays brought attendances near or above 90. The Sunday school has been growing substantially. A Vacation Bible School reached nearly 100 children who had not previously attended any of the congregation's activities. A Crisis Task Force has been formed to lead the congregation to minister help to those in desperate need in Jesus' name. The congregation recently prayerfully adopted a goal of seeing twenty more adults added to the fellowship by the end of 1981 and the people are undertaking specific steps to help achieve that goal.

The growth of the Sunday school makes it urgent that two additional rooms, one in the basement and the other on the second floor, be made ready for use. Architect's drawings have been completed. To put the rooms into service in conformity to city and state codes including an exterior fire escape, will entail expenditure of about \$2,500.00 plus a lot of volunteer labor.

If the Newark mission is able to organize its membership roll this year, it could come in with about twenty committed families. Finding, training, and installing qualified local elders may take some time in Newark.

The mission in Wappingers Falls, NY, with Herbert K. Lea as pastor, has met for most of the year at the Community Services Building in the Village of Wappingers Falls. This second floor suite of rooms in an old factory building is far from ideal, but has allowed room for growth. The mission has two committed families with several others as potential. Attendances, which have gone through both ups and downs during the year have recently been running in the 30s. There have been several baptismal services during the year.

A very attractive public building in the town of Wappinger that would provide very much better location, room, appearance, and parking may shortly become available for rent. It could provide a significant growth opportunity to the Wappinger mission.

The work of the Eastwick mission in Philadelphia received a sharp impetus in August when Pastor Roger Reitz and his family moved to a new home at the heart of the target area. This move has occurred with the approval and financial commitment of Emmanuel Church, which is also served by our only circuit riding preacher. Several other churches and denominations are planning or beginning church planting attempts in Eastwick. We have, however, a good head start and many contacts already in the area. We may pray that public worship will begin within the next year.

It may be necessary for us to acquire a piece of the rapidly disappearing vacant land in Eastwick for a future church building. We have begun exploring steps toward that end. A two or three acre plot in Eastwick could cost up to \$70,000. Please pray for the Lord's direction and provision.

In February Pastor Randall A. Grossman began formation of the new Kutztown, PA, mission. A series of Sunday evening evangelistic meetings led to the start of morning worship on Easter Sunday. Brother Grossman, a native of nearby Topton, is an alumnus of Kutztown State College and Biblical Theological Seminary. He was saved as a collegian, nurtured at our Blandon Church, and more recently part of the Hatfield Church.

The Kutztown congregation meets at the well-situated Fire Hall Auditorium. A Sunday school was recently begun. Worship attendance has climbed into the 20s, with about six families acting as if they are committed.

One of the heartening aspects of the Kutztown mission has been the hearty encouragement and help of the other churches in Berkes County. Not only have our four nearest churches prayed, encouraged, and helped in practical ways, but they have all also provided

designated financial support for Kutztown. These churches may be modeling a fruitful new regional approach to new church planting.

Ronald C. Erb is our newest church planter, located in urban North Jersey. Ron is a son of the Royersford Church and an alumnus of Lancaster Bible College. He served, sponsored by his home Church, as a summer missionary with Pastor Baker in Newark in 1976 and received a burden for inner city evangelism that just would not go away.

After Brother Erb had spent a week in intensive doorto-door evangelism in each of three potential target
neighborhoods to test their responsiveness, and upon
recommendation of the Newark Team composed of Pastors
Baker and Erb and the Director, the Board of Church
Extension selected the City of Irvington as the
target for the new mission. This effort will especially
focus on the part of the city that is east of the
Garden State Parkway, somewhat isolated from the rest
of Irvington, and immediately contiguous to Newark.
It was in precisely this same vicinity that the old
Irvington mission was located over forty years ago,
which later became the first Newark church. The
target area is only a few minutes from the present
Newark congregation in Clinton Hill.

Pastors Erb and Baker already have their eyes on the very needy West Side neighborhood of Newark as a possible site for a future daughter congregation as soon as their churches gain enough strength to become mother churches.

To assert that the true goal of the Church Extension Department must be the formation of new churches is not in the least to deprecate or diminish evangelism. This has been a year of wide Gospel sowing. Some examples: Pastor Grossman covered every home in Kutztown this summer, knocking on the doors of over 1200 homes and leaving two locally-produced pieces of literature, one of which was a forthright Gospel tract. Pastor Reitz conducted 10 Five Day clubs

outdoors on the streets of Southwest Philadelphia during the summer. These clubs enrolled over 250 children from 154 families. 48 of these children memorized all 5 Scripture memory verses. An invaluable helper in these clubs was a young lady from Royersford, Carolyn Bortz, who served in the city as a summer student missionary supported by her home church.

Two of our missions, New Fairfield and Wappingers Falls, made massive direct mailings to every home in their respective target areas. These mailing of 7000-8000 pieces carried very clear and urgent Gospel presentations and appeals for response. They entailed a great deal of work by these small congregations. The Department office has a standing offer to "pick up the tab" for the bulk mail postage for all such mass mailings. This helps to account for the large postage expenditures. Bulk rate postage for 8000 pieces comes to \$304.00. The cost of materials and printing, which the congregations must bear, is much higher.

The Wappinger mission also undertook a large inperson distribution of invitations to their first anniversary service in May. They covered hundreds of people and homes, with good help from folks from the Lebanon church and the New Fairfield mission.

The three Mid-Hudson missions helped in summer evangelistic outreach to campers at nearby Clarence Fahnestock State Park through a weekly Saturday evening hymn sing through the summer.

These are only some of the ways in which large-scale evangelism was carried out. Each of the churches and missions has numerous other ways of seeking creatively and effectively to reach people with the Gospel, not to mention the personal impact of transformed lives, which is perhaps the greatest evangelistic means of them all. When the Lord raises up a ministry of the Church Extension Department in a community, that community will

invariably be significantly touched by the Gospel through that ministry, whether or not the goal of a fully-formed church is achieved in that place.

Our commission is also to baptize. On each of two summer Sundays just three weeks apart at Tymor Forest Park, the Poughquag mission baptized five persons who were adult or teenage. The baptism of the rest of the Department congregations are recorded in the Statistical tables in back of this Yearbook.

And we are commissioned to teach. Teaching is done in Sunday schools, children's church, youth fellowship, Pioneer Girls, and Christian Service Brigade groups, Vacation Bible Schools, Children's Bible Clubs, and home Bible studies. In each place the Lord is raising up among the converts those who become teachers, who teach both God's truth and people who are or will become disciples. Probably the most effective teaching is done by those "teachers of teachers", the pastors-teachers whom God has called and equipped to be organizing pastors of these new congregations, who stand before their people with open Bibles to "feed the flock of God". In this preaching-teaching ministry, God uses them mightily to build disciples.

In order for the extension of the church to move beyond where we are right now there must be planning. Paul and his companions wanted to preach in Asia, but were prevented (Acts 16:6). They tried to enter Bithynia to plant churches, but the Holy Spirit did not allow them to do so (v. 7), for He was directing them to Europe (vv 9, 10). The Acts and the Epistles abound with descriptions of how "the whole surrounding regions" of various cities were reached with the Gospel. This was not by chance, but by well-designed strategies and plans. Paul wrote to the church in Corinth about his "field that God has assigned to us, a field that reaches even to you". (II Corinthians 10:13). He goes on to say that he hopes that "as your faith continues to grow, our area of activity among you will greatly expand, so that we can preach

the Gospel in the regions beyond you". (vv.15,16) To the Roman believers, he reveals his strategy and planning when he writes of how "from Jerusalem all the way around to Illyricum, I have fully proclaimed the gospel of Christ: (Romans 15:19). He goes on to tell them that since "there is no more place for me to work in these regions,...I hope to visit you while passing through and to have you assist me on my journey (to Spain) after I have enjoyed your company for a while" (vv 23,24).

So we continue to develop strategies and plans for more new churches. We have a top priority plan to start two or three new churches in the growing and needy Atlantic City area of New Jersey. The first step in fulfilment of this plan, which we call "Project Beachhead", is the gathering of a \$30,000 launching fund. We presently have a little over \$11,000 toward that goal, 37.3%. We invite and urge those who share our vision and concern to give to help the fund reach this goal.

And we still hold to the results of our survey of the needy Luzerne County, PA, which indicates that we could responsibly mount a plan to start up to five or seven new missions there, when and if the Lord provides the means (men and/or money) to do so.

We have a number of other communities in view in the midst and on the fringes of our present territory where we could responsibly attempt to plant churches—small towns, growing suburbs, and populous inner—city neighborhoods, all in great spiritual need. This year we have done specific survey work in Atlantic and Essex Counties, NJ and Susquehanna County, PA.

Between the initial awareness of potential target areas and surveys of them and the actual planting of churches there, "soil testing" is in order, to ascertain their spiritual responsiveness. In the earliest years of the history of our denomination, "soil testing" was done most frequently through the ministry of our great itinerant evangelist, Eusebius Hershey. This was specifically done by Brother

Hershey and others in eleven counties of PA and also in New York, Ohio, and Ontario. Later this was done by the denomination through the camp meetings and tent campaigns in various places. Local churches have done this through the years in nearby communities by open air meetings, protracted evangelistic meetings, extension Sunday Schools, cottage prayer meetings, Sunday school bussing, extension Vacation Bible schools, and Bible clubs and home Bible studies. Such efforts should be encouraged and should continue. If such "soil tests" prove an area is responsive and if a strong nucleus can be gathered, new churches can be formed.

Some recent examples of "soil testing" by the Church Extension Department include a summer of canvassing in the Vestal, NY area to explore possible relocation of the Binghamton mission before it was terminated, tent meetings and canvassing in the Warnersville-Sinking Spring, PA areas at the start of that church in 1964, door-to-door visitation by PISCES personnel in advance of five TIE missions in East Central New Jersey in 1970 and 1971 and the aforementioned samples by Ron Erb of three potential target neighborhoods a few weeks ago.

Two possible "soil tests" by the department may be coming up shortly. The mid-Hudson Team has been made aware of a community where there may be a wide-open door for planting a new church. Survey work is presently underway, which, if positive, should lead to some specific testing programs. And a small group of believers in a town in northeastern PA have indicated interest in the possibility of a new church in their community. A reasonable test there may be a series of home Bible studies.

We have articulated goals through the end of 1985, which we have called "DESIGN FOR ENLARGEMENT". It is now time for serious goal-setting and planning beyond that year. The Board of Church Extension has been willing to look ahead and has held several "think sessions" during the past year to point

toward long-range strategy and goals. These will continue in the next year. Some targets to consider, among others, might include the massive Washington-Baltimore-Maryland-Virginia metroplex, and, in an era of a maturing of the US population, the Adult Communities (for those over 52), and, as a step toward becoming more geographically dispersed, a Sun Belt strategy that would aim to plant some new churches in a growing area more distant, such as Florida, for example. In this long-range planning process, the Board will welcome imput from across the brotherhood, in hope of achieving a broad-based consensus, so that the goals might really be "owned" by the whole Church.

"DESIGN FOR ENLARGEMENT" aimed for 20 new church starts in the 1975-1985 decade. Right now we have eleven to go to achieve that goal. That would mean 2-3 churches in each of the four remaining years—not an impossible dream, though it may be rather improbable. But God is able.

The first of the eleven new church starts that remain to be achieved under the goal may already be underway, though not part of the Church Extension Department. Under the Howell, NJ church a home Bible study was begun in Edison, NJ through which a number of people have come to Christ. About two months ago Sunday evening worship began, led by Pastor John Vandegriff. These meetings have run between two to three dozen persons in attendance. A new daughter church may already be in formation.

Our churches could demonstrate their commitment to this goal and maximize their impact toward its fulfillment in three ways: (1) a broad-based, massive effort dramatically to increase commitment of monies for church extension between now and 1985, (2) a pointed prayer campaign to the Lord to raise up laborers, church planters, to sow and reap in a spiritually needy America, and (3) a genuine effort by the churches individually or in cooperation with other nearby churches to start at least one daughter

church where one is really needed before the end of 1985. These three simple steps, taken in faith, could take us past our goal by December of 1985.

If we can achieve or closely approach that goal of 20 new church starts and if a simple majority of those started make it to maturity, the 1975-1985 decade would have been the greatest decade of church planting and expansion in the history of our Church.

BOARD OF CHURCH EXTENSION

The ministry of the Church Extension Department is well characterized by the familiar words of the Apostle Paul, "A wide door for effective service has been opened to me, and there are many adversaries" (I Corinthians 16:9). The Board has found this to be true as it met seven times during the past year to conduct its business.

The perennial financial problem remains. Inflation makes church planting even more costly than it has been in the past, while offerings for Church Extension ministries have decreased this year. Yet many opportunities are before us. We believe we could take greater advantage of these opportunities if we had greater financial resources. We are especially thankful for the willingness of some of the men in the department to work part-time to help support themselves and thus allow for financial resources to go further.

In spite of financial pressures we are thankful that the Lord has enabled us to end the year on an improved financial base. The financial report shows a beginning deficit of approximately \$11,000 and a closing balance of approximately \$4,000 which reflects a \$15,000 turn-around. This has come about by curtailing some hoped-for expenditures and close financial management.

The adversary attacks when works seem to be doing well. Wappingers Falls, New York is an example. In the early part of the year there were several who professed faith in Christ and the mission was

growing numerically. In recent months, however, problems arose causing several to leave the congregation. Those who remain are desirous of going on and are pulling together in unity.

The mission in the Eastwick area of Philadelphia is another example of adversity. After a few years of difficulty in making meaningful contacts, Pastor Reitz was finally able to gather together a group for Bible study. This seeming breakthrough was short lived, however, as the group disbanded.

Yet Eastwick is another wide door. Over 250 children attended side-walk meetings this summer. Pastor Reitz and his family have moved into the neighborhood with the hope of reaching the people by living with them.

The mission in Poughquag, New York has had recent encouragements. This fall the ninth committed family became members. When the congregation has ten committed families it may begin to organize and seek recognition as a church. There are several families who could become the tenth committed family.

Other "wide doors for effective service" have also opened. The Newark, New Jersey mission continues to grow as several have professed faith in Christ. This work is attempting to meet special needs of its people by establishing a single parents group and a tutoring program.

Another feature of Newark this year was the way in which the roof of the parsonage was replaced. Several men from the Spring City Bible Fellowship Church did this as a Saturday work project. They enjoyed the fellowship of working together in Newark. The congregation and the Board appreciate this tangible contribution as a "labor of love" from Spring City.

Doors have opened as two men have accepted calls from the Board of Church Extension during the past year. On February 1, 1981, Randall A. Grossman began to minister in Kutztown, Pennsylvania, endeavoring to start a new mission. To date there are 10-12 people attending regularly and three families have committed themselves to the mission.

On June 1, 1981, Ronald C. Erb began serving in Northern New Jersey. After extensive study of several area his target area was established as Irvington, New Jersey.

During the year the Board visited two Church Extension fields. In November the brethren spent a day in Newark, New Jersey; and in June they spent two days visiting the three missions in the Mid-Hudson area. This proved most valuable, as they could tour the area, see the facilities with which the brethren work, and, most importantly, fellowship with the people of these congregations. Each visit included an evening meal with the congregation followed by a time for sharing and worship, and concluded with discussions between the congregation and the Board of matters of pertinent and mutual interest. The Board believes that such sessions are extremely helpful, and plans to continue this program by visiting other areas in the future.

We are endeavoring to find "the wide doors for effective service" the Lord has for us. One way is by enlarging our stewardship program. In March the Board was represented at the convention of the Christian Stewardship Council in Chicago by Bruce A. Ellingson and Daniel G. Ziegler. They, along with representatives of other agencies of the Bible Fellowship Church, found this helpful. Their report is included in the report of the Board of Directors of the Bible Fellowship Church.

The Board has spent much time this year in "think sessions". At these sessions the Board has worked at projecting goals and formulating strategy for the future extension of the Bible Fellowship Church.

The revised 1981-1982 budget of the Board of Church Extension is presented with this report.

The Historical Committee met twice in the past year to carry out its work. The committee rejoices in the progress of the projects it has undertaken.

The new hymnbook, The Rose of Sharon Revisited, has been prepared and distributed at this conference. The desire of the committee is that these hymns might be a blessing to our churches.

The publication of the minutes of our conference from 1859 to 1895 is proceeding smoothly. Final editing and preparation for printing is even now underway.

The preparation of a new study of our history has been entrusted to Dr. Harold Shelly, who has begun his work. It is the intention of the committee to nave his work in print for our centennial Annual Conference in 1983.

The collection of archival materials continues to grow thanks to the concern and effort of those who are passing on historical materials to us. The archives are presently stored in the Spring City Church.

Whereas: it would help the committee to have its own financial accounts and treasurer in the coming year, therefore be it

Resolved: that Annual Conference allow the Historical Committee by rule of exception to begin to operate by the proposed by-laws immediately.

Resolved: that past minutes of the boards and committees be deposited for storage and preservation in the denominational archives, and be it further

Resolved: that each local church be encouraged to place its minutes and past records for storage and preservation in the denominational archives where they will be available to the local church as it desires and available to those doing study and research. (FIRST READING)

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF FOREIGN MISSIONS

When has the world been in such a bankrupt condition as it is now? There is religious, moral, economic, and political trouble everywhere — and where is the solution for these problems? We believe in Jesus Christ, who is the only ONE Who can heal our world. But the question is, "What can we do NOW to help the situation?" We believe in the great commission that Jesus gave when He said, "All authority in heaven and on earth has been given to me. Therefore go and make disciples of all nations, baptising them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit, and teaching them to obey everything I have commanded you. And surely I will be with you always, to the very end of the age." Matthew 28:18-20 (NIV)

The preaching of the gospel works. It changes the lives of people and makes them new creatures in Christ Jesus. Our missionaries have been faithful in carrying out the great commission in many countries as well as in our own land of America. It PAYS to be a missionary church, knowing that we have part in the great plan that God has given to us. The interest in missions in our denomination is the best ever. May it continue to expand and grow with each year. We know that the physical church withers, dies, decays when we lose the vision of the program of God. All of us need to be concerned about the unsaved, the lost, the perishing. We cannot escape our responsibility. May we, by the grace of God, respond by saying, "What would you have me do, Lord?" or "Here am I, send me."

During this past year the members of the Board gave good evidence of their interest in the work of missions by attending five business meetings. Our missionary family is strong, with several new applicants requesting to become members. Fred and Marian Gibbons have been received into the fellowship and are serving in Kenya. David and Ruth Schappel have been accepted and are under appointment of the Board. Phil and Nancy Yerrington

finished language school and are now in Spain in missionary work. Two missionary families have resigned from their mission board: Paul and Betty Everhart, Dean and Donna Stortz.

The annual budget was increased again this year to an all-time high of \$336,555.00. Of this amount, \$320,630.00 was alloted for salary support, 13,250.00 for missionary assistance, and 2,675.00 for Board operation. However, we are still operating in a deficit and trusting the Lord to meet the need through the increased giving of our churches.

The Board again expresses their thanks to the members and friends of the Bible Fellowship Church for their generous giving.

The Pastor-Layman Missionary Seminar was held in the Spring City Bible Fellowship Church. A good interest has been shown in some regional missionary rallies. The Conference-Wide Rally was held in the Reading church.

I want to express my thanks to the members of the Board for their interest, prayers, and help during the last year. It has been a very busy year, with many responsibilities of mission work, but the Lord has given His strength and help when needed. We are encouraged in His ministry. NEWS UP-DATE OF OUR MISSIONARY FAMILY



THE ANDERSONS - Serving their second missionary term in Ecuador as teachers and "dorm parents". Keith and Carol, shown with their two daughters, are kept busy in the local church and Christian school, teaching English and conducting several Bible Classes. They also hosted many different summer missionaries during the past year.



THE BABCOCKS - Mel and Jan are deeply involved in the Victory High School at Palmer, Alaska. Of great interest is the work done with summer missionaries seeking the Lord's will for their lives. A high percentage of Arctic Mission's personnel started out as such. Mel has been appointed Purchasing Agent for the Alaskan field.

SHARON BACHMAN - lives in Philadelphia and works among Jewish people, spreading the gospel on a one-to-one basis. Sharon is preparing a storybook on the Book of Esther for Jewish children.

THE BUTLERS - Besides teaching in the Moorlands Bible College in England, Brian is reaching out to many international students with the gospel. After spending a three month sabbatical leave from his work at Moorlands, Brother Butler went to Africa, seeking God's will for missionary work there.

THE CAMPBELLS - Holly and Bill are serving In Tunisia, seeking to win people to Christ in a very difficult area of the world. Besides working as a doctor, Bill labors among the people of that land, presenting Christ as their Saviour.

THE CHOWS - After spending some time in Indonesia, Moses will be returning to the States to be involved in the AFC preaching ministry.

THE DYKES - Herb and Betty have spend over 30 years in India and have been involved in the field of education, working under the Christian Missionary Alliance. This past year another church was organized under their ministry. A number of believers have been baptized.



THE GEHMANS - Richard and Flo, with their two children arrived in Kenya this past summer after spending a year's furlough in the States. Richard, as Principal of Scott Theological School, holds a very important

position in the ministry.



THE GIBBONS - new members of our Missionary family, are ministering in Kenya under the Africa Inland Mission. Fred and Marian, with their son Jonathan, are happy to be part of the Bible Fellowship Church.



THE HARLEYS - Judy with Kenneth shown in front of their book display. The Harleys are the only American missionaries working on the Orinoco River among the Criollo (mixed blood) people of Venezuela. They are kept busy visiting 8 different groups of believers several times each year. In addition evangelistic outreach is carried on combining efforts with these groups of believers as well as in cooperation with members of the congregation in the home port of Ciudad Bolivar. For 15 years an annual family camp "Mizpah Camp" program has been in operation.

HARTMAN - Connie has had a physical problem during the year, spending some time in Holland to receive help. Now she has returned to Austria and is deeply involved in her ministry. Connie will be coming back to the States in May of 1982.



THE HOFFMANS - Since 1965 the Hoffmans were engaged in construction and technical assistance with the Wycliffe Bible Translators, being stationed in New Guinea. Now, for a time, Aaron and Marlene are living in Texas, still serving the mission. Aaron has been assigned in the development section in project funding. Marlene will begin her assignment in the late fall.

THE HOYLES - A church with 18 members was organized this past year. Although the number of believers has not increased, attendance has been very good during Christmas and a special musical program where testimonies were given. Ron and Doris continue to teach and hold discussion groups. The family camp ministry continues to be a strong outreach during the summer.

THE KAUFFMANS - Tim and Wanda continue to work in construction in Zaire. Inflation has caused problems with their support, but they continue in a quiet way to do the work under the Unevangelized Fields Mission for the last eighteen years.



THE MANNEYS - For the last fourteen years the Manneys have been in Ecuador with HCJB. Dave is the Director of International Programming, being responsible for the programming in 14 languages. Rosemarie continues to be active in the French service.

THE MOORES - Working under the Gospel Missionary Union, Bill and Eunice are engaged in the literature ministry through the avenue of a Christian bookstore called 'The Ark". This past year the profit from the three Alaska bookstores were used to finance the initial phase of a church-planting ministry in south-east Alaska. Bill is serving as deputy director of the local governing board of GMU, Calvary Bible Church.

THE MOYERS - Ed and Ruth have been missionaries with the Bible Fellowship Church since 1957. Their responsibility has been to plant new churches, training of laymen in evangelism and special emphasis on reaching the youth. Their son Doug and his wife Sherry are preparing for mission work.



THE MOYERS - Both Duane and Joetta are involved in the ministry with his parents in the Lamentin Church.

THE MULLS - have spent one term on the field in Keyna. Both are deeply involved in Scott, training young men and women for the Lord's work. Having spent a time home on furlough they will be going back to Africa sometime in January of 1982.



THE POYSTIS - Since 1958 the Bible Fellowship Church has supported them in their ministry, first in Austria and now for the last several years in Sweden. Earl's eye problem has improved. In August he had his second cataract operation, but he now is able to see with both eyes. The gospel message continues to get

into Russia including soldiers in the army.

RIGGS - Ruth, a retired RN, is serving the Lord as a nurse in Ecuador. Many opportunities have been given to her to present Christ. She knows that the Lord wants her in South America at this time.



THE SCHLONECKERS - Dave and Roxy pictured with their family, are ministering at Christiansen Academy in Venezuela. During the last months of this year Dave was laid aside with infectious hepatitis. It will be a time before he can resume his activities. They are now in their second term of service.

THE SHELLINGS - They are foreign missionary workers in the States, working with international students who come to the USA to study in our colleges. They are now living in Tampa, Florida and have been kept very busy, on a one-to-one basis with students from many parts of the world.

THE SOLTS - Dave and Georgina, working under the Latin America Mission, are serving the Lord in Mexico. Besides being busy with the film ministry, they teach and seek to spread the Gospel in their area. The Solts are one of three of our missionary families engaged

in the Radio ministry. The Board of Foreign Missions took on their support in 1956.

SOLT - Lillian, a second generation missionary, is a Registered Nurse serving in Costa Rica under the Caravans project. The people there are extremely poor and have great needs. Lillian is trying to help people spiritually and physically.

They spent a year home on furlough but had difficulty in getting their visa. They will be leaving for India again in the early part of January, 1982. Their son David will be going back with them. REPORT OF THE STUDY COMMITTEE ON TOTAL ABSTINENCE AND CHURCH MEMBERSHIP

At the 97th Annual Conference the following resolution was passed calling into existence the study committee and defining its task:

Whereas: there appears to be some division of convictions on the matter of Article #9A on total abstinence, and

Whereas: there appear to be areas that need further clarification in the light of the discussion to date on the subject, therefore,

Resolved: that the Chairman of Annual Conference appoint a committee to study the subject of total abstinence and its relationship to church membership. This committee shall be composed of nine members: six pastors and three laymen, with Jansen E. Hartman, Chairman of Annual Conference, being a non-voting ex-officio member, and the Chairman of the Committee. This committee must bring its report to the 98th Annual Conference.

The study committee has met for six full-day sessions and individual members have spent many additional hours in sub-committee and personal study to complete the assigned task. After much study, debate, and prayer, the study committee unanimously approved the following material to be presented for your consideration.

We recommend that the following material be adopted at first reading to replace the material in Article IV of the Standards of Worship and Life, Section A, Alcoholic Drinks, page 37 of the 1981 Faith and Order:

We recognize that the misuse of alcoholic beverages is one of the most serious social problems in the United States, causing suffering, physical and emotional disorders, and frequently contributing to violent crime and death. The Scriptures teach that drunkeness is sinful¹. We acknowledge that, due to the addictive quality of alcohol, even the moderate use of such beverages may contribute to woeful consequences² and we also acknowledge that the moderate use of alcoholic beverages is offensive to many believers.³

For these reasons we strongly and persistently warn of the dangers of alcoholic beverages and require all members of the Bible Fellowship Church to abstain totally from the use of them. However, because we believe that total abstinence is not a test of salvation, churches so desiring may receive those who do not meet this membership standard as associate members. Associate Members may not vote or hold office.

Let us walk honestly, as in the day; not in rioting and drunkenness, not in chambering and wantonness, not in strife and envying. Romans 12.13

Know ye not that the unrighteous shall not inherit the kingdom of God? Be not deceived. neither fornicators, nor idolaters, nor adulterers, nor effeminate, nor abusers of themselves with mankind, Nor thieves, nor covetous, nor drunkards, nor revilers, nor extortioners, shall inherit the kingdom of God. I Corinthians 6:9, 10

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS OF PINEBROOK JUNIOR COLLEGE

The Board of Directors of Pinebrook Junior College met five times during the year. In the November meeting the Board organized for the year by electing Mr. L. James Roberts, Jr., Chairman; Russel Ruch, Treasurer; and Nicholas J. Sheetz, Secretary. Standing committees were also chosen. These committees and the Long Range Planning Committee met throughout the year and conducted the business assigned to them. The administration, faculty, and

staff served faithfully, and we express our appreciation to them for making possible the continued progress experienced by the College. Finally, we thank our great God for His loving care and blessing during the year.

The 1981-82 student body includes students from eleven states, District of Columbia, and eleven foreign countries. The student body also includes eleven percent American blacks. This is the most culturally diverse student body Pinebrook has been privileged to serve. The southeast Asian students which the College began to serve in 1980 are responding well to the program. Some of these were Christians upon entry to Pinebrook and others have become Christians during their time as students. Others are considering the claims of Christ and others have not returned. The Administration and Board have noted no negative effect to the life of the College through the admission of a limited percent of non-Christian students. Guidelines are being devised to evaluate more thoroughly the policy which allows for acceptance of such students.

During the year the College received approval to grant the degree Associate in Applied Science in Secretarial Science. The Academic Dean, the Faculty, and the Board of Directors are working together in planning further curriculum development.

In May 1981, thirty-four students were graduated. Of these, 25 received the Associate in Arts degree, five the Associate Arts in Business Administration, and four the Associate in Applied Science in Secretarial Science. Enrollment for the fall 1981 semester is 135, with 117 being resident students. Total enrollment is slightly lower than last fall, but the incoming class of '79 was the largest in the history of the College. A lower percentage of students was eligible to return because of academic difficulties during the 1980-81 year.

All members of the 1980-81 professional staff are

working with the College during the 1981-82 year. Mr. and Mrs. Douglas Widmer were added to the staff as Residence Managers. Mr. Widmer also coaches men's athletic teams. The Widmers are living in part of the house formerly housing the President. New parttime faculty are Dr. Lewis Judy, Education, and Mr. David Smith, Drama. Additional positions have been approved in the Financial Aid and Development offices. Pray that the Lord will provide the right persons for those positions.

The process of Middle States Candidacy continued with the apointed consultant visiting the campus twice during the past year. The purpose of the October 1981 visit is to determine whether Pinebrook is ready to enter Self-Study. This activity ordinarily leads to a full team visit to determine whether the College should be granted full membership status in the Association. Pray with us that the will of the Lord might be done.

No major building renovations were undertaken during the year, but many smaller projects improving the usefulness and appearance of the properties were completed. During the year the President was granted a housing allowance and moved off campus. Part of the house he formerly occupied is being used to house students. Architect W. Wayne Batten is working with the Administration and Board to develop a long-range facility and property use plan.

The annual audited financial report accompanying this report shows income in excess of \$600,000 and an unrestricted funds deficit of \$6,812. While this deficit is not large, it is imperative that the College gain financial strength each year rather than lose ground. Giving by Bible Fellowship Churches showed a small increase for 1980-81. We thank you for this support and encourage you to consider increasing your support to the College as the Lord enables you to do so. We request that support from the churches be submitted in monthly or quarterly payments.

May the blessing of the Lord be upon our churches and agencies as we serve Him during the coming year.

Notes to Financial Statements June 30, 1981

(1) Summary of Significant Accounting Policies
 Accrual Basis - The financial statements of
Pinebrook Junior College have been prepared on the
accrual basis except for depriciation accounting as
explained below. The statement of current funds
revenues, expenditures, and other changes in a
statement of financial activities of current funds
related to the reporting period. It does not
purport to present the results of operations or the
net income or loss for the period as would a statement
of income.

To the extent that current funds are used to finance plant assets, the amounts so provided are accounted for as (1) expenditures, in the case of normal replacement of movable equipment and library books; (2) mandatory transfers, in the case of required provisions for debt amortization and interest; and (3) as transfers of a non-mandatory nature in all other cases.

Fund Accounting - In order to ensure observance of limitations and restrictions placed on the use of the resources available to the College, the accounts of the College are maintained in accordance with the principles of "fund accounting". This is the procedure by which resources for various purposes are classified for accounting and reporting purposes into funds that are in accordance with activities or objectives specified. Separate accounts are maintained for each fund; however, in the accompanying financial statements, funds that have similar characteristics have been combined into fund groups. Accordingly, all financial transactions have been recorded and reported by fund group.

Within each fund group, fund balances restricted by outside sources are so indicated. Externally restricted funds may only be utilized in accordance with the purposes established by the source of such funds and are in contrast with unrestricted funds over which the College retains full control to use in achieving any of its institutional purposes.

Endowment funds are subject to the restrictions of gift instruments requiring in perpetuity that the principal be invested and the income only be utilized.

All gains and losses arising from the sale, collection, or other disposition or investments and other noncash assets are accounted for in the fund which owned such assets. Ordinary income derived from investments, receivables, and the like, is accounted for in the fund owning such assets, except for income derived from investments of endowment funds, which income is accounted for in the fund to which it is restricted, or, if unrestricted, as revenue in unrestricted current funds.

All other unrestricted revenue is accounted for in the unrestricted current fund. Restricted gifts, grants, endowment income, and other restricted resources are accounted for in the appropriate restricted funds. Restricted current funds are reported as revenues and expenditures when expended for current operating purposes.

Investment in Plant - Physical plant and equipment are stated at cost or, in the case of gifts, at fair market value at the date of donation. In August, 1976, Pinebrook Junior College purchased the Coopersburg facility and some furniture from the Roman Catholic Diocese of Allentown. The total cost of \$538,750 was financed by a first mortgage loan from the First National Bank of Allentown and a second mortgage loan from the Allentown Diocese. The deed for this property is in the name of the Bible Fellowship Church.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS OF PINEBROOK BIBLE CONFERENCE

The Lord's blessing has been upon the ministry of Pinebrook again this year. It was one of the best years spiritually, numerically, financially, and physically since we have purchased the grounds. Many new people and church groups enjoyed the facilities for the first time. We give praise to our Lord for all of this.

The interest of our constituents is on the increase. During the Bible Fellowship Weeks, hundreds witnessed the tremendous ministry of Pinebrook and its outreach to people. In 1980 one week was given exclusively for our Bible Fellowship Conference. It was such a great success that this year two weeks were devoted to our people. Next year three weeks, June 26 to July 17 have been reserved so that more can take advantage of spiritual growth and Christian fellowship. It is our vision that the people will request the entire month of July as "Bible Fellowship Month" at Pinebrook; this being one way to help solidify our denomination.

The retreat program continues to expand each year. Already, by actual count, 13 weekends are full from September until March. Some of these groups will be coming for the first time. Twice this year we were taxed to capacity, one weekend with 489 registered and one day with 550. The Sno-Glo was a great success and we thank the Lord for the interest that our youth have in their retreat at Pinebrook.

Some of the projects completed this year were: new roof placed on Viewbrook and dining room buildings; repairs on the indoor and outdoor swimming pools; renovating of several rooms; landscaping of the area in front of Honeybrook; insulating and placing of storm windows in several units; painting of the shower building in the camping area; electrical changes made in the camping area; air conditioning of Fellowship Hall by interested friends; second

furnace added in Fellowship Hall by outside contractors.

During the year there were some changes in personnel of our staff. The Strahles retired after spending 13 years on our staff. The Cressmans are retired in California and the Bigleys are involved in a new ministry in Florida. Karen Rawn and Pastor and Mrs. Bernard Coble are now working with us in the Pinebrook ministry.

I believe the Lord has His hand upon this ministry because of the way He is reaching out to all people and saving many souls. I thank the Lord for the staff and their willingness to work together. If the Lord tarries, Pinebrook will continue to be a very important agency of the Bible Fellowship Church. Please pray for this part of the Lord's work and the missionary outreach which it has.

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF DIRECTORS OF THE BIBLE FELLOWSHIP CHURCH HOME

This Report presents a resume of the activities of the Bible Fellowship Church Home during this past conference year, and points out factors which have contributed in achieving the objectives of the Home's ministry.

"The specific duty of the Board of Directors of the Bible Fellowship Church Home is to be responsible for maintaining a home for the aging and infirm and to engage in such other forms of benevolent and charitable work in connection with said Home as may be determined". (Bible Fellowship Church Year Book 1976, page 155).

A major focus of the Board of Directors this past year has been evaluating its specific duty. A basic assumption has been developed that the future of the Bible Fellowship Church Home is in doubt for the following reasons:

- 1. the present Church Home does not offer a comprehensive program which includes skilled care. As an intermediate nursing facility, the scope of services offered is limited, resulting in a decreased number of persons interested in utilizing the facility.
- 2. The present location of the Church Home does not permit expansion.
- 3. The ever-changing Health Care regulations places Intermediate Care Facilities future in doubt.
- 4. The future maintenance of financial viability is becoming a major concern in operating a 28-bed facility.

Based on this assumption and the responsibility given to the Board of Directors to maintain a home for the aging and infirm, a course of action was studied to include the possible development of property, located A planning and management consulting firm, Third Age Inc. was contacted for the purpose of assisting the Church Home Board in the necessary feasibility studies required prior to the initiation of the pr-posed construction program. In February 1981 a sample questionaire was distributed to the larger Bible Fellowship Churches in Bethlehem, Allentown, and Reading areas. The results indicated that the majority of persons who responded would not object to the Fleetwood area and that they were in favor of the concept of a "life care center". It also concluded that the majority of persons who responded would not have the financial means to live in a "life care center", as presented by Third Age, Inc. Therefore, Third Age, Inc. concluded that the Bible Fellowship Church should not at this time become involved with the development of a life care community at the Fleetwood site.

After much prayer and discussion the Board of Directors decided to continue to seek God's will and resolved at the June 11, 1981 Board meeting to proceed with the building of a Skilled Nursing Home on the Fleetwood property. An ad hoc committee comprised of James Beil, Charles Hersh, and Robert Zentz was appointed to formulate recommendations on how to proceed with the building program. During the September 14, 1981 Board meeting a report was presented and the following resolutions were adopted:

- Contract with Batten and Ebert Architects to develop a comprehensive site plan and building design.
- 2. Prepare necessary required documents to be presented to the Health Systems Council of Eastern Pennsylvania for the construction of a 90-120 bed long term care facility.
- 3. Begin necessary agreements for the purchase of the 11.5 acre tract in Fleetwood, PA.

- 4. Enter into agreement with Horst Construction Company for consultation during the project development.
- 5. Enter into agreement with John S. Cole and W.N. Serfass and Company for the negotiating and arranging of financing for the proposed Long Term Care Facility.
- Appoint a Building Committee comprised of James A. Beil, Bert N. Brosius, Charles G. Hersh, and Robert Zentz.

The Board is also reminded that if the agreed-upon plans call for a relocation, a coincidental plan for the present property and program must be developed.

The Board of Directors' prayer is that we all agree to seek God's guidance for all that is before and to seek, by His direction, a consensus of His will for the Home and its program.

As to the present home and program, it has been stable. The finances have been adequate with an adequate balance being preserved for the future programs.

The program has been meeting the needs of the residents, especially the weekly Sunday Services provided by the Bible Fellowship Churches in the Lehigh Valley and other local churches.

The interest and concern of all the Bible Fellowship Churches for the Home is also manifested by the contributions of food stuffs, underpads, and gifts as well as visits by many churches and individual members. For this generosity the administration is most grateful.

The Administrator, James A. Beil, and the entire staff is to be commended for each member's faithfulness in providing for concerned nursing care- nutritious and appetizing meals, a balance of activities, and clean surroundings for each resident, and also for the efficient operation of the Business office.

The Board of Directors requests your faithful and earnest prayers for the Administrator, James A. Beil, the residents, the staff and the affairs related to the Bible Fellowship Church Home.

Recommendations:

- That the amendment to the Faith & Order, page 121, section 7 - Board of Directors of the Bible Fellowship Church Home, as found on pages 22, 23 of the 1980 Yearbook be adopted for second reading.
- 2. That the following be adopted:
 Whereas: the Faith and Order concerning the election
 of the Board of Directors of the Bible Fellowship
 Church Home has been amended, and,

Whereas: this amendment needs to be implemented, and

Whereas: the members of said Board, in order to implement this amendment, have agreed to resign; therefore, be it

Resolved: that this 98th Annual Conference accept their resignations, and further

Resolved: than an election be held to implement this amendment as follows:

Two ministers, one layman - 3 years Two ministers, one layman - 2 years One minister, two laymen - 1 year.

3. The Board of Directors of the Home is seriously pursuing the matter of building a new Long Term Care nursing facility in Fleetwood, PA. This facility would have 90 to 120 beds and the cost of such a project would be up to \$30,000 per bed. The Board hereby requests that authority be granted to purchase the desired tract of land in the Borough of Fleetwood and also that authority be granted to borrow the necessary funds to build the facility.

Notes to Financial Statements June 30, 1981

Significant accounting policies followed by Bible Fellowship Church Home, Inc., are described below to enhance the usefulness of the financial statements to the reader:

A. Accrual Basis

The accompanying financial statements have been prepared on the accrual basis. The statement of support and revenue, expenses and fund balance presents the results of its activities; it does not purport to present the net income or loss for the period.

To the extent that general funds are used to finance plant assets, the amounts so provided are shown as transfers to the plant fund.

B. Fund Accounting

To observe limitations and restrictions placed on the use of the Home's resources, the accounts are maintained in accordance with the principles of "Fund Accounting". This is the procedure by which resources for various purposes are classified for accounting and reporting purposes into funds that are in accordance with activities or objectives specified.

C. Investments

Investments are carried at market value. Unrealized gains and losses from changes in market values are reported in the statement of support, revenue, expenses, and changes in fund balance.

D. Plant Fund

Land, buildings, and equipment are recorded at acquisition cost. Exhaustible property and equipment are depreciated on a straight-line basis over their economic useful lives as follows:

REPORT OF THE BOARD OF VICTORY VALLEY CAMP

When we praise God for His faithfulness at Victory Valley Camp, we are not referring to a piece of real estate near Zionsville, but something far more encompassing.

- I. Victory Valley is People
- -People like Jim and Debbie Thornton, whose full-time committment to the camp this year has proven so beneficial. Jim's duties as director have demonstrated both leadership and concern for staff and campers alike.
- -People like the Board of Directors, made up of both pastors and laymen, many who over the past year have developed new concerns and personal commitments to the camp life.
- -People like the dedicated staff, who really are the ones who have the greatest influence on the campers. This year we had a tremendous staff that showed real servant attitudes and spiritual maturity.
- -People like our campers, fifty per cent of whom were returnees and thirty-three per cent who were from Bible Fellowship Churches. Sixty-eight campers attended senior high week, (75% of these had attended

senior high weeks in the past), and most desire to return next year. This week has proven to be very successful. We praise God for forty-seven campers who made a first-time profession of faith and many others who sought further spiritual guidance. These will be followed up during the winter months.

II. Victory Valley is a Denominational Ministry

-The camp is dependent on the offerings of each Bible Fellowship Church. The churches have responded by giving \$11,600.00 this past year.

Many of our churches have responded by providing volunteer labor for special projects, the most recent being replacement of the barn roof.

-We praise God for the 68% of the summer staff that came from Bible Fellowship churches.

-Many of the Bible Fellowship Churches hosted Jim & Debbie Thornton, allowing them to present the Valley's needs to the local congregation. These churches viewed a slide presentation depicting camp life.

III. Victory Valley is Real Estate

-This past year, the Valley enjoyed many improvements to its physical plant. The white house was painted, the barn has a new roof, and the new cabin is winterized.

-The physical plant also requires large expenditures of monies. We have needs this year for a new truck, and an apartment for an assistant director.

IV. Victory Valley is God's Work

- -Our desire is to glorify God and give Him the praise.
- -Victory Valley Camp is a member of the American Camping Association, and as such we must meet very $_{\mbox{\scriptsize high}}$

standards. ACA sent two visitors to our camp this summer to objectively grade VVC according to 180 standards. We received a positive mark on 172 of them. This high score gives testimony to those outside our fellowship that we have an excellent camp. Those within our fellowship need to thank God for what He has given to us and continue to support what He is doing in our midst.

-Victory Valley has grown to the place of needing more than one full-time person. However, we have not grown to a place financially where we can take on the added financial burden. Therefore, the Board is now looking for an assistant director who would live at camp and raise his own support. Victory Valley is a fruitful missionary outreach, but we would like to accomplish more during the off season. Another year-round person will allow us to change our ministry during the off season from a physical up-keep of grounds and facilities to a spiritual ministry of follow-up and Biblical emphasis into our campers' lives.

VI. New Camp Policies

Any church giving one percent of its total church offerings is entitled to a 25% discount on their lodging for any weekend rented during the following months: March, April, October, November, or December.

Please notice that this does not apply for the renting of days, partial weekends, or weeks. Nor does it apply to the months not mentioned above.

The customary 10% discount for all Bible Fellowship Churches on lodging and food will be in effect when the 25% discount is not in effect.

We have also found it necessary to set a minimum number of twenty people in attendance when you wish camp to cook for you. When groups do their own cooking there is a minimum charge of \$200.00 for

any weekend or overnight. (15 people for a weekend or 20 people for overnight).

If two groups are here during the same weekend, they may pool their numbers to meet the minimum.

Any group with over 50 has the right to refuse another smaller group from renting the same weekend. However, we reserve the right to put two groups together if neither has over 50 people in attendance.

We will have another cabin winterized and that will raise our capacity to 75 people during the winter months.

REPORT OF THE COMMITTEE ON EXAMINATION OF MINUTES OF PARTICULAR CHURCHES

The Committee met on Tuesday, October 6, 1981 to examine the minutes of the particular churches. Seven churches did not foreward their minutes to the location of Annual Conference by the specified time. Three churches presented their minutes to the committee during their meeting. It was necessary to make special arrangements to examine the minutes of four churches.

The 1980-81 minutes of all congregations in the Bible Fellowship Church have been examined on the basis of the suggested format for congregational meetings as stated in the By-Laws for Particular

Churches in the Faith and Order of the Bible Fellowship Church (p. 63, 1981 edition). The Committee noted definite improvement in the quality of the congregational minutes and commends pastors and secretaries who have given their attention to improving the records of the proceedings of the congregational meetings in their churches. Despite the progress, omissions continue to be found in the minutes of some congregations, and these have been called to the attention of those churches. The most significant omissions include:

- a. The minutes of eleven churches gave no evidence of an audit of the financial records of the congregation.
- b. The minutes of five churches gave no indication of the existence of a pastoral relations committee in the congregation.

The committee recommends that the pastors and secretaries of the churches give particular attention to correcting these omissions and perpetuating proper and accurate record-keeping in each congregation.

The committee has been entrusted by Annual Conference with the responsibility to verify that the delegate and alternate delegate are elders in the congregation, that they have been duly elected, and that they are the individuals reported to the Secretary of Annual Conference. The most convenient way by which the committee can fulfil this responsibility is for a list of the active elders in the congregation at the time of Annual Conference to appear in the Annual Report of the Board of Elders or at some conspicuous place within the minutes. Please assist the committee by cooperating in this matter.

No petitions to the 98th Annual Conference were found in the minutes of the churches.

A time of singing, prayer, and a brief message by the officiating Pastor shall be followed by the questioning of the candidate (s).

Can you testify that through repentance toward God and faith in the Lord Jesus Christ you have experienced the forgiveness of **yo**ur sin and enjoy peace with God? If so, answer "Yes."

(The Minister shall immerse the candidate, saying,)

, upon the confession of your faith in the Lord Jesus Christ as your Savior, I baptize you in the Name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit, Amen.

DEDICATION OF A CHURCH BUILDING

(See Articles of Faith, Article XVIII The Church, F & O, p. 19-20)

(Officiating Pastor) Beloved, in this solemn hour, in the presence of the Lord, the God of Heaven and Earth, the Source and Giver of all good, Who has

given us the desire and ability to build this house, we now give thanks for its completion and dedicate it to His service and glory.

Our blessed Redeemer gives us the precious assurance that He will meet with His people where they assemble themselves together.
