

IN MEMORY

David W. Chappell was called home on July 26, 1988 at the age of 47. The swiftness of his homegoing is a vivid reminder that we are all but a moment from eternity and is a challenge to be ready.

Pastor Chappell was born April 18, 1941 in Philadelphia, Pennsylvania. He became a follower of the Lord Jesus at age 21 in Baguio, on the island of Luzon, in the Philippine Islands, while attending a missions conference. He was serving there on active duty for the United States Army. He began immediately to serve the Lord working with several other men from Clark Air Force base in the surrounding barrios.

David was gifted with art abilities which he used for the glory of God. He served for several years as art director for Child Evangelism Fellowship and with BCM International.

In 1978, David returned to Philadelphia College of the Bible Evening School for One year, and sensing the Lord's leading, he enrolled as a full-time student graduating in 1983 in Bible and Pastoral studies. While attending school, David was an active member of Faith Bible Fellowship Church, Spring City, PA. Upon his graduation, he accepted an assistant pastorate at Community Bible Fellowship Church, Howell, New Jersey. In June, 1984, he accepted a call from the Church Extension Department of the Bible Fellowship Church to serve as pastor of the Walnutport Mission. In addition to his pastoral responsibilities, David was serving as the Business Manager of Fellowship News at the time of his death.

Pastor Chappell is survived by his wife, Barbara, and three children, Cheryl, David and Rebekah and two grandchildren.

At his funeral, held at Cedar Crest Bible Fellowship Church, the Pastors' Quartet sang his favorite hymn, Be Thou My Vision, an indication of the desires of his heart. Pastor Chappell was recognized by colleagues and friends as a man of godly character and faithfulness. His quiet perseverance was appreciated by all who knew Him. His presence will be missed by all.

One of the members of the church where Pastor Chappell served, Janice Ahner, has penned the following tribute:

This gentle giant of a man With shoulder broad and tall Stood before us years ago To heed his Savior's call.

This gentle giant of a man With heart of purest gold Gave help to all, no matter when Too heavy was the load.

A. Purpose

It does this by evangelizing in areas, communities and neighborhoods and among people where Bible Fellowship Churches do not exist and by forming, fostering and nurturing to maturity new congregations. (SECOND READING)

<u>WHEREAS</u>, Pinebrook Junior College also has a significant number of women on the faculty and staff, and

<u>WHEREAS</u>, Pinebrook Junior College is not a church and does not function as a church and therefore such a change of policy would not be contradictory to the teachings of Scripture; therefore be it

RESOLVED, that the Principles of Order, page 162, 1986 Edition, Board of Directors of Pinebrook Junior College, Election be amended to read:

Itshall be composed of the President, five ministers and eleven laymen and/or laywomen. They shall be elected for a term of three years in classes as follows:

Class I: Three ministers and four laymen/laywomen Class II: One minister and four laymen/laywomen Class III: One minister and three laymen/laywomen (SECOND READING)

WHEREAS, the resolution concerning Article X-A of the "Standard of Worship and Life" found on page 34 of the 1987 Yearbook meets the criteria stated above, therefore be it

RESOLVED that Article X-Aof the "Standards of Worship and Life" be amended to read as follows:

RESOLVED, that Article X - A of the Standards of Life and Worship be amended according to the proposal on page 202 of the 1985 Year Book, as amended by the action of the 1986 Annual Conference:

A. Alcoholic Drinks - the use of alcoholic beverages is one of the most serious social problems in the United States. Its abuse has led to personal and family suffering, serious physical and mental health problems, and increased rates of accidental and criminal injury and death. The financial cost of such beverages and their consequences is a tremendous and unnecessary burden on all of society.

The Scriptures teach that drunkenness is sinful.1 Due to the addictive quality of alcohol, even the moderate use of such beverages may lead to serious consequences.2 This is especially true because the alcoholic content of such beverages has been tremendously increased since Bible times. Furthermore, moderate use may be a stumbling-block for believer and unbeliever alike.3

Therefore, we strongly and persistently warn our people of the dangers of alcoholic beverages and urge all members of the Bible Fellowship Church to abstain totally from the use, manufacture and distribution of them.

Report of the Committee on Arrangements

The concluding remark of the Apostle Paul to the Church at Corinth in regards to their worship services was simply: "But everything should be done in a fitting and orderly way". There is no question that this principle reaches beyond the order of worship and should permeate our lifestyles.

The Committee on Arrangements of Annual Conference for the past two years has been attempting to fulfill this verse by maintaining order and expediting the proceedings of the three days of Annual Conference. Hopefully the changes of the past and the new ones this year will continue to fulfill this aspiration.

The following is a list of procedures and points of information which should make things run smoothly during the 105th Annual Conference.

1. Pages

Again this year the Page System will be employed. Mr. Cliff Boone, the 'Head Page' has a team of six or seven individuals who will do their best to assist you. If you need a report or minutes, would like something distributed to the members of the bar, or need their assistance, signal them by raising your name plaque.

2. Lapel Tags & Name Plaques

Both the Lapel Tags and Name Plaques are essential for the operation of Annual Conference. The Lapel Tags will be needed for entrance to meals. The Name Plaques not only are used to call Pages, but also used by the Registrars in keeping attendance.

3. Priority Seating

The Chairman of Annual Conference has the right to establish Priority Seating. If there is a special reason for a Member of Annual Conference to sit at a specific location talk first with the Registrar. He will convey this to the Chairman.

4. Reserving Tables

Dining Room tables may be reserved by a representative of any Agency, Board or Committee. This request must be submitted, in writing, to Registrar no later than the coffee break before the meal. Display Tables are at a premium. Contact the Pinebrosk Bible Conference prior to Annual Conference to reserve one. Because of the lack of tables, only Agencies, Boards or Committees may use tables in Fellowship Hall.

5. Meal Tickets

Allmembers of Annual Conference, Missionaries and those under the care of either the Committee on Ministerial Candidates or Board of Missions are guests of Annual Conference and are entitled to all meals. Others, including wives and children (except approved kitchen-dining room workers), may purchase meal tickets at the Registrar's Table. The cost of the meals are \$2 - Breakfast, \$3 - Lunch, \$4 - Supper.

6. Addressing Annual Conference

Members of the Bar wishing to address the Conference as mandated in the Faith & Order [By-Laws for Annual Conference, Article VI-Business Rules of Annual Conference, #3-6]. In summary this states that to speak on an issue one is to rise and respectfully address the Chair. A maximum of ten minutes is given for speaking on any issue. One is not to speak the second time until all others who desire have spoken, then only after asking permission. Please wait until the microphone is brought to you before speaking.

WHEREAS, it is important that each official Delegate and Pastor receive all the reports from the Study Committees, Committees and Agencies and

WHEREAS, in order to coordinate this procedure one distribution point should be employed, therefore be it

<u>RÉSOLVED</u>, that all Study Committees have their reports to the designated distribution point by August 31st and further,

RESOLVED, that all Committee and Agencies have their reports to the designated distribution point by September 30th

RESOLVED, that the 106th Annual Conference be held October 24 - 26, 1989 at Pinebrook Bible Conference.

Report of the Board of Church Extension

"The church... enjoyed peace, being built up; and, going on in the fear of the Lord and the comfort of the Holy Spirit, it continued to increase." Acts 9:31

Often the church of Acts found itself experiencing great persecution during which it grew. Growth came also in times of peace. Knowing nothing of the persecution the apostolic church faced, we are thankful the church can also grow in times of peace.

Whether experiencing persecution or peace, the church needs to be built up and to continue in the fear of the Lord and the comfort of the Holy Spirit if it is to grow. Building up congregations and encouraging them to walk in the fear of the Lord and the comfort of the Holy Spirit are concepts the Board of Church Extension keeps before itself as it oversees the missions and churches in the department. In so doing the Board trusts God will use this ministry to increase the Bible Fellowship Church.

During the past year the Board met five times. Numerous committee meetings were also held.

A first step in building is to lay the foundation. The Board is pleased that in the providence of God foundation laying has recently begun in three new locations. Christopher Morrison and Dennis Spinney accepted calls to become organizing pastors for a New England team. These calls were effective July 1, 1988. The name Church Extension became literal as they began ministry in Connecticut and Massachusetts thus expanding the borders of our denomination into a new state.

Closer to our central areas, Dean Stortz accepted a call to serve as organizing pastor of a new mission in Ocean County, NJ. This was effective September 1, 1988.

As missions go on in the fear of the Lord they continue to increase. One evidence of this is arriving at the place of forming the first membership roll. Holmes, NY, under the leadership of Robert S. Commerford, came to this position this past year. The Assessment Committee, having met with and heard the testimonies of the ten committed families, rejoiced in learning how several had been saved and believers built up. The selection of elders and the recognition of this congregation as a church by Annual Conference is anticipated.

One evidence of a church being in the final stage of development in the Department is being financially self-supporting. The 1988-89 budget indicates that five churches (Camden, DE; Kutztown, PA; Pocono Mt., PA; Poughquag, NY; and Wappinger Falls, NY) require no appropriation. Having been in this category for three consecutive years, Camden DE and Kutztown PA "graduate" from the Church Extension Department being no longer under the jurisdiction of the Board of Church Extension as of this Annual Conference. Congratulations Camden and Kutztown!

The work of the Wider Horizon program continues. Robert W. Smock serves as coordinator on a voluntary basis. As time permits he continues to provide consultation services for Bible Fellowship pastors on behalf of the program.

Attaining Wider Horizon goal's requires establishing new missions. The Board is thankful steps were taken to establish three in the past year. Many more are needed.

Budgetary restraints did not permit the Board to offer full salary to the three men called to establish new missions. Their calls, therefore, made provision for them to supplement their income through additional employment. This arrangement has been termed "bivocational pastor". They are, as it were, "tent makers".

It is the opinion of the Board of Church Extension that if additional missions are to be established with the current level of financial resources available similar arrangements will be required. It appears that more bivocational pastors will be involved in Church Extension in the future.

For many years the financial reports and budgets of the Board have included pre-paid offerings from the thurches as part of income; that is money received during one year was to be expended during the following year. Effective in the 1989-90 fiscal year this practice will be eliminated and all funds received in a given year will be used to meet current expenditures.

To implement this system, pre-paid income from churches in the 1988-89 fiscal year will be allocated as follows:

- \$20,000 will be used to establish a continuing operating fund that must have a \$20,000 balance at the end of each fiscal year; interest from this fund shall be used for operating expenses.
- The remaining balance shall be used to establish an emergency reserve fund to be used for interest bearing emergency loans or as collateral for emergency loans; interest from this fund shall be retained in the fund.

In the providence of God Pastor David W. Chappell was suddenly called home to be with the Lord on July 26. He has served faithfully as pastor of the Walnutport, PA mission since 1984. We pray God's blessing, guidance and provision for his wife, Barbara, and their family. Being thankful for his ministry at Walnutport we pray God's strength and provision for this congregation. The Personnel Committee of the Board is endeavoring to call a pastor for this mission.

Having served for thirty years on the Board of Church Extension, Clayton E. Weber declined nomination for re-election. The Board is thankful to the Lord for this brother and his God-given desire to see the Bible Fellowship Church be extended through the founding of new congregations. May God bless him.

Daniel G. Ziegler has now served for twenty years as Director of Church Extension. The Board is thankful for his zeal, vision, and faithful diligence.

Report of the Church Extension Director

Twenty Years of Church Planting

"Lord, you have assigned me my portion and my cup;
You have made me secure.
The boundary lines have fallen for me in pleasant places;
Surely I have a delightful inheritance. "
Psalm 16:5,6

This is my twentieth report to Annual Conference as Church Extension Director. Two decades in this ministry and office!

King David of Israel became introspective in a poem one day. In it he acknowledged the sovereignty of the Lord God, who had caused David's "boundary lines" to put him in "pleasant places" and to lead to a "delightful inheritance". He reflects on the presence and the goodness of his Lord (Psalm 16:1,2,7,8,11), which calls forth praise from the Psalmist, and on the saints of God, in whom he finds delight (v.3).

The same kinds of thoughts and emotions fill my mind and heart as I reflect on these good years of service to my Lord and my Church. I trust the reader will find in this report some measure of the same praise and delight that King David expressed.

The Year in Review

Churches

1987-88 has been a positive and productive year for the Church Extension Department. It started a year ago with reception of Cornerstone Church of Bangor, PA into Annual Conference membership and graduation of Calvary Church, Finesville, NJ from the Department; it ends with two more churches, Camden, DE and Kutztown, PA graduating after having fully supported themselves for three years.

Two other churches have completely supported themselves for the past year, Pocono Mt., PA and Poughquag, NY, and are heading for graduation at the 197th Annual Conference, October, 1999.

The progress and growth of three other congregations has been demonstrated in property matters. The church in Newark, Delaware dedicated its lovely new building on December 6, 1987. Using this base, the congregation continues its vital life and outreach in its strategic location.

In New York State, the church at Wappinger Falls is in process of seeking to purchase land at a central location on a main feeder road on which to construct a meetinghouse. The congregation in Newark, NJ with the help of the Board of Church Extension and the Board of Directors, is seeking to purchase a large existing building in a prime location to provide for a greater constituency and a growing program.

Gateway Chrusch in New Fairfield, CT welcomed a new pastor on September 11. Dean A. Stortz accepted a call from the Board of Church Extension to form a new mission in Ocean County, NJ. John M. Reed replaced Brother Stortz in that Nutmer State prolpit.

Missions

The mission at Holmes, Pawling, NY has gathered together its first ten committed families and received approval to begin formation of its charter membership roll. One of the gauges of the progress of this vibrant young body of believers is that it is increasing its share of the support for its pastor by \$4,000.00 in the 1988-89 year. That congregation has chosen to call itself New Life Bible Fellowship Church.

On the Jersey Shore, the mission at Somers Point is known as Lighthouse Bible Fellowship Church. The highlight of the year at Somers Point was a colessal telephone and mass mailing curreach that saturated the area in early spring. Many of the churches sent volunteers to help in the dialing of over 20,000 numbers. Many more offered prayer support and financial backing for this large undertaking —a pilot project in a new outreach

methodology. At a Celebration Sunday on March 20th a large crowd gathered for worship. In the wake of the campaign worship attendance doubled, and results are still coming in. The mission is approaching organization of its membership roll as it now has 8 or 9 committed families on board.

Summer outreach at Somers Point was spurred on by Carol Watson and Jennifer Wilson, who served under our PISCES program as summer missionaries.

In North Jersey, the Edison Mission is undergoing a reorganization under the leadership of Dennis Cahill. A three phase outreach for Edison will include door-to-door survey work, systematic contacting of new families who move into the area and a phone campaign similar to the one at Somers Point, heading for an AprilCelebration Sunday. Permission has been granted to use one of the Edison public school buildings as a meeting place — a distinct answer to prayer.

The congregation at Walnutport, PA received a severe blow with the sudden death of Pastor David W. Chappell on July 26. Brother Chappell had served at Walnutport with diligence since 1984. The congregation has been standing together strongly. The Board of Church Extension has begun its search for a successor pastor for the Walnutport mission.

David Sng has found open and receptive hearts among Southeast Asian refugees in Philadelphia as he labors to share the Gospel and plant a church among them. His major methodology of outreach has been teaching English and tutoring young people. An informal Lord's Day worship service was begun in early summer in a home. Attendance has averaged 15 - 16, with keen response on the part of David's students and some of their family members.

New Missions

Anew mission in Pleasant Valley, Dutchess County, New Yorkhas begun as a daughter congregation of Valley Church in Poughquag, overseen by the Poughquag elders. David Way, one of the elders, has been serving bivocationally as interim organizing pastor. He has been accepted as a candidate under care of the Ministerial Candidate Committee. Worship began at Pleasant Valley in April and is presently running in the thirties and forties in attendance.

We have formed a new church planting team during the year in New England. Dennis Spinney and Christopher Morrison have accepted calls to serve bivocationally in planting two new congregations in the area where Connecticut, Massachusetts and Rhode Island abut each other. The first target area is Spencer, Massachusetts, which takes the Bible Fellowship Church into its sixth state. Brothers Morrison and Spinney will labor together in Spencer for at least one year before starting in the second location which has yet to be selected. In order to free them for twenty hours per week of ministry, both men are in need of new designated support.

Dean Stortz is our newest church planter. On September 15, the Stortz family moved into a newly purchased parsonage at 800 First Avenue, Manchester, Ocean County, New Jersey. The target area contains a large number of senior adults -- nearly one-fourth of the residents of Ocean County are 65 and over and more than 55% of the people in Manchester are in that rapidly growing segment of the population. In Ocean County there are at least 30-40 residential developments of various types restricted to seniors. Brother Stortz will target these older people in his ministry of church planting evangelism. In it, he will enjoy the fellowship of nearby Community Church in Howell, with Pastor John Vandegriff serving as his teammate for prayer, strategy and encouragement. Toward Brother Stortz' support, the Board of Church Extension has budgeted over \$15,000 for housing in that high cost area. He will serve bivocationally. We hope to provide a half-time salary package, which must be received in designated giving in order to be available for disbursement.

1987-88 is only the fourth time in the 130 year history of the Bible Fellowship Church that four new missions have been opened in one year. The others were 1910, 1894, and 1890. That number has never been exceeded. Of the 10 different years in which 3 or more new congregations have been started, 4 have occurred from 1970 through 1988.

During the year, the churches increased their support for extending the Church by \$20,407.20, or 15.6% over last year. We thank the Lord for this increased provision to move the work ahead.

One of the highlights of the year was the Second Annual Day of Prayer and Fasting, sponsored by our Mid-Hudson Team and held at the Kirk-in-the-Woods in Mt. Pocono on April7. Earnest united prayer was offered up to God for the churches, ministries, outreach and world mission program of the denomination.

During 1987-88, "The Lord has done great things for us, and we are filled with joy"

(Psalm 126:3).

A Personal Purview

Permit me some brief reflection on these two decades of directing the Church Extension Department — especially the years in Plainfield. We have lived in the Queen City for over 16 years. I have lived in the home on Kenyon Avenue longer than at any other house in my life. We have done most of our child raising at that address.

We have observed life in this small city through these years and learned much. We are among the longest residents on our block. We have seen whole families grow up as ours has. While we have been in Plainfield, seven people have died in the seven houses

closest to ours -- a reminder that life is brief.

And we have seen God at work in our neighbors' lives. We have been permitted in many ways to bear witness to the Savior. Persons in at least six or seven households within a block of our address and a like number elsewhere in our Community that we know of have come to know Christ, some at least in part through our witness and some, as far as we know, with no impact from us. And we believe we see the Lord at work in others' hearts and lives.

For nearly five years, I have been an aerobic walker. At least three times per week I walk three miles in under 42 minutes. This gets me out into the neighborhood and makes me feel good and invigorated. And I am reminded that if this physical exercise is good for me, spiritual exercise in godliness has far greater value (Timothy 4:8).

The Plainfields, with nearly 100,000 population, are short on Gospel preaching churches. We pray that they may become the site of one or more Bible Fellowship Churches in the

future

For most of our Plainfield years we have been part of our Newark congregation. It is the only church our two younger children have known. Our brothers and sisters in Newark have stood with us in some of life's saddest and happiest moments and they have become very dear to us.

The summer of 1988 has contributed two special experiences to my life. It was my privilege to fill a brief interim as preacher for our Denville church and it proved to be a

rich and delightful enjoyment to serve with God's dear people in Denville.

Our family of four traveled by auto across the U.S.A. and back, passing through 21 states on the way. For two weeks in the midst of the trip I was able to take a valuable course in Church Growth and my wife studied at a nearby college in her field of early childhood development. I am most grateful to the Board of Church Extension for granting me study leave and helping me financially in my graduate program and for allowing an extra week of vacation for that delightful and instructive trip.

"For the Lord is good and his love endures forever; his faithfulness continues through

all generations" (Psalm 100:5).

An Historical Overview

Twenty years is a good chunk of one's life, a credible segment of history. This anniversary provides a good opportunity to reflect on what the Lord has done. In the midst of the routine of our days and the busyness of our years, we may fail to note what our God has done and, as a result fail to appreciate His gracious working and to give Him the thanks and praise which He should rightly receive.

I wish to reflect on Bible Fellowship Church history as a series of twenty year segments. Ten years are called a decade; I am not aware of a name for twenty years -- perhaps a "duodecade"? Let's call each twenty year segment a score. The 130 years of Bible Fellowship Church history may be divided into six score -- the first, when statistics were sketchy and imprecise, is thirty years (1858-88) and the rest consist of two decades each.

Twenty Years of Growth

The score just closing has been rich with the Lord's blessings on the Bible Fellowship Church. These may be seen in the remarkable growth and upgrading of the various ministries of the denomination. During the score, Pinebrook Bible Conference and Pinebrook Junior College have acquired and developed their fine campuses and growing program. Victory Valley has grown. The vision of a high quality new home for the aging has become a reality in Fellowship Manor. A fine and useful archives has gotten up and going, a Historical Society has been formed, a long needed Stewardship Council has gotten underway and our missions program and number of personnel have mushroomed.

Most or all of these steps of progress could not have happened had not our Church been growing. In fact, in the score our total membership moved from 4460 to 6216, an increase of 1756, or 39.4%. A major factor in this growth has been the effectiveness and increase that God has given through the Church Extension Department.

During the twenty years, the denomination has seen the start of 28 new congregations, more than any other score in our history, more than the total new starts in the preceding 58 years. 11 of the 28 have been completely formed as churches and received into Annual Conference membership, along with Finesville, which started during the previous score, for a total of 12 new Annual Conference member churches —more than any comparable period since 1907. Six of the 28 have died, two are presently dormant (Mays Landing and Eastern Union County, both in New Jersey), 20 continue to the present.

While only 19% of our total membership is in the 19 organized congregations that have started in the last 40 years, these vital young bodies have accounted for 67% of the denomination's growth over the last 20 years. Young churches usually grow more rapidly than older ones.

Atable of statistics for the six score should lead us to gratitude and praise for what God has done among us in the recent decades:




Some interpretation of these statistics may be instructive:

- The vigor and effectiveness of our young movement in its first half-century was truly remarkable. Few in number, with limited resources, our forefathers started 43 congregations, 28 of which became fully organized as Conference member churches. And 82% of those, or 23 churches, still continue today.
- We may be deliberate and somewhat slow in bringing mission congregations to full organization as churches, but when we do, they endure. Of the 58 churches constituted in our 130 years, 50 of them, 86%, continue to the present. 7 have died and the eighth was lost through a merger.
- 3. Throughout its history, although the denomination has started 105 congregations, only 58 of them have been brought to full formation as churches. Adjusted for the presently continuing missions that have not yet become churches, those 58 churches represent 62%, which means that 36, or 38% of them, failed. You have to take risks; there is no guarantee of 100% success in church planting. Of the 28 starts in the past score, 11 have come to full formation as churches, that is 39%. We hope all of the remaining 11 arrive at full maturity. But it will take only 6 more of the 11 to achieve our historic average.


4. A graph will show more clearly than the table the relationship between new church starts and overall growth. Our church planting fell off drastically in the fourth and fifth score of our history, starting only 9 in each. Membership growth in the wake of that decrease in forming new congregations slowed and nearly ground to a halt.



A graph of percentage increase shows how early growth was stimulated by the new and young congregations through the first 70-80 years. When new church planting decreased, membership decline soon followed.



Agraph of the fourth score shows how as the established churches aged and few new ones were started, the growth impetus "ran out of gas". First half growth, 1927-37 was 1075; second half, 270. Then the fifth score produced only 6.5% growth, 324 net membership increase -- over 20 years!



- In the sixth score, just concluded, growth momentum has been regained as we began
 again seriously to plant churches. Net membership growth climbed from 274 to 1756,
 more than six fold.
- We may expect that the years ahead will be growth years for the denomination because of the impact of these recently formed congregations that will stimulate and gather that growth.
- 7. If we want to sustain growth and accelerate toward achievement of our WIDER HORIZONS growth goals (to 14,293 total members by the end of the year 2000) we must continue and step up the formation of new churches.

In comparing the just concluded score with the one immediately before it (1947 through 67-8), we observe that of the 6 new starts that achieved full organization as churches during the earlier score, 3 were started as daughter churches (50%). In 1967 through 87-8, 3 of 11 (27%) began as daughter churches. Our experience shows us that daughter churches develop and mature much more rapidly than "cold starts". The churches ought to take seriously the WIDERHORIZONS goal of at least one daughter church per year. Grace Church of Nazareth, PA has birthed Cornerstone Church of Bangor; Valley Church of Poughquag, NY is in process of giving birth to a church in Pleasant Valley. Who will be next?

Gains Despite Handicaps

The church planting gains of the past twenty years have been achieved in the face of some handicaps.

Umavailability of Veteran Pastors

While we have tried incessantly to recruit as church planters experienced pastors with demonstrated success in church growth, few have responded positively. Had more done so we might have been able to plant more churches and bring same more rapidly to maturity.

2. Foreign Mission Drain

Two of our effective church planters, Robert L. Draper and Herbert K. Lea, who between them planted 3 churches in an aggregate of 18 years of service (average 6 years per church) were called away from us to go forth as foreign missionaries. In that we rejoice, but we believe that had they remained in the Department they would by now have planted more new Bible Fellowship Churches.

3. A Legalistic Membership Rule

Our church planters are forced to labor while shackled by a culturally formed membership bar that lacks biblical basis, is embodied in an ambiguous rule, robs the Church and her church planters of credibility, contradicts her own assertion that the Scriptures are "our only rule of faith and life" and that is the conviction of but a small minority of our people. We cannot accurately assess the harmful effects of this rule. We do know that it has destroyed young congregations, hampered the development of others, turned away young believers from commitment to our churches and otherwise bled us of young blood and vitality. The impact of this is hardest on the new churches. It is just a matter of time until this restrictive rule will be changed. By God's grace and the Holy Spirit's direction may it be sooner rather than later.

4. Financial Constraints

In 1967 the churches gave \$44,196 out of total offerings of \$968,387 to extend the Church. That was 4.56% of total offerings, down somewhat from the standard during the previous 60 years of 5-6%.

In 1967 the Church Extension Department consisted of 6 missions and in addition 4 churches, which were not yet able to support themselves, were assisted with financial

appropriations. This was a total of 10 congregations.

The federal government maintains what is called the consumer price index. Its application allows us to measure today's dollars by those of a previous year. Conveniently, the c.p.i. for 1967 was 100. In November, 1987, the index stood at 345.8. Using the index, one may conclude that if the churches would wish to provide funding at today's dollar values for maintaining the same 10 congregations as we had in 1967, they would have given \$152,830 in this last year, which is almost precisely what they gave. But rather than 10 congregations we have maintained 13 through the year, a 30% larger roster, and added 3 more, not including the two dormant missions that are not now manned. And if the \$152,830 were corrected to reflect the 39.4% membership growth since 1967, the total would be \$213,045 --\$61,540 more than the churches gave in 1987-88.

Had the churches given of their total offerings of \$ 5,459,908 in 1987 the same 4.56% that they gave to extend the church in 1967, we would have received \$248,972 from the churches for church planting, nearly \$100,000 more than we actually had to work with.

We have gratefully received and shall carefully use the \$151,509 entrusted to us by the churches. We dedicate it to the Lord and mean to manage it for all it's worth to produce church growth. But it is sometimes hard to understand why the churches would give \$151,509 to extend our own Church, but \$341,788, more than twice as much, last year for local missions, most of which is used to finance Christian enterprises that are outside of the Bible Fellowship Church.

How Do We Do It?

The answer to how the past 20 years have been so much more effective for church planting and the growth of the denomination is solely in the sovereign grace of our God, Who has been pleased to bless the proclamation of His Gospel and to build His Church. All praise and glory belong to Him alone.

Some factors and means which the Lord has used to accomplish this work may include:

1. Age and Training of Church Planters

Though we have had to use mostly inexperienced men as organizing pastors, these men have come to us with more maturity and better formal training than their counterparts of earlier years had.

2. Tenure of Church Planting Service

Our men are loyal and tenacious in their work. They are not looking for "promotion" elsewhere. The pastors in the Department have served an average of nearly 7 years with us. Lyle E. Schaller, one of the most knowledgeable experts in North American church growth, believes that a man's most effective years of ministry with a congregation begin with his sixth year.

3. Church Growth Eyes

After years of stagnation of membership growth, the ministers chose as the theme for their 77th Annual Ministerial Convention in 1968 "Evangelism and Church Growth". Papers were read followed by discussion of a great many phases of the Church's growth and non-growth. The convention concluded with a period of prayer for the spiritual and numerical growth of the Bible Fellowship Church.

The Lord began to answer those prayers. Springtime of 1972 found the ministers again convening around the theme of Church Growth. Professor C. Peter Wagner was with us to lead us through the first Church Growth Seminar on the North American continent (there have been thousands since). The brethren grappled with church growth prisciples and concepts, worked at growth graphing and projections and came away with what Dr. Donald A.McGavran, originator of the modern Church Growth Movement, calls "church growth eyes" — a consciousness of whether or not the church is growing, why or why not, how churches grow and that churches ought to grow.

Many of the men have continued to read, study, and attend courses and seminars in Church Growth. It seems those two Ministerial Conventions helped to create a turn around from stagnation to growth. In the 13 years prior to 1968, nine had produced membership decreases; following 1968 we enjoyed 16 consecutive years of membership increase.

4. Changes in Principles and Methods

Much of the early years of my service in this office were occupied with redefining, restructuring and sharpening our concepts, organization and methodologies. Again in the past two years, the Board and its committees have worked to rethink our ways of doing so that we can be more efficient and effective in managing a larger and growing ministry.

5. Care in Site Selection

We work hard in making surveys and doing our demographic work in preparation for selecting target areas for new missions. This work is paying off.

The Mid-Hudson region, by way of example, has proved to be fertile soil for Bible Fellowship Church planting. During the score, we have been able to establish four congregations. Three of them are completely formed churches, two of which have fully supported themselves in the past year. The fourth is about to become an organized mission. These accomplishments encourage us to anticipate good success at Pleasant Valley and may auger well for our work in New England, which is culturally and historically close to New York State east of the Hudson River.

6. Goal Setting and Drive

We have defined our task as <u>church planting</u> evangelism and we hold ourselves to that. We measure our work by that "bottom line"; are we planting churches? And we are willing

to have others use that criterion in assessing our work.

Our "Design for Enlargement" (1975-85) goals were very demanding. We did not achieve them, but came within 80% of them. The WIDER HORIZONS goals are even more demanding, and we shall do our best, in dependence on the Lord, to achieve them.

The power of goal setting and drive is demonstrated in our history by the work of W. G. Gehman. He became president of the Gospel Herald Society in 1905 and was the driving force of our Church's evangelism and church planting thrust till his sudden death in 1941. During those 36 years, 27 missions were started, which eventuated in 13 fully formed churches, 9 of which continue today. For 8 years immediately after his death, not one new congregation was started, and in twenty years, only 5 new missions were begun. It seems someone must be calling, agitating, plotting, pleading, pushing and pulling (even if it seems obnoxious), ever seeking to be a catalyst, to keep church planting in view and on track.

Our church planting evangelists are visionaries, goal setters, purposive workers, evaluators and achievers. Together we push ourselves and each other to keep driving and doing. Nothing less will do. It takes all we've got plus more, which the Lord will provide.

7. Bivocational Pastors

Perhaps this is the most significant human factor in accomplishing what we have. Of the 11 congregations that began and became fully organized in the 1968-88 era, 7 were started and/or maintained by bivocational pastors, who made up by labor outside of the pastorate what was lacking in the Church's support for them.

Of course, the bivocational pastor has been part of the Bible Fellowship Church from its beginning. All of its pastors in the first years were farmer-preachers. And these "tent makers" opened up 43 new congregations in their first 50 years, 28 of which became fully formed. 23 of them still continue today.

Our great pioneer evangelist and first foreign missionary, Eusebius Hershey, in 1888, at age 65, wrote about a preaching tour in Ontario during harvest season. "Iworked in the afternoon and in the evening I preached to quite a number of attentive hearers, who could sit and rest while I had to stand and do the work of preaching after I had left the harvest field." Then, addressing his colleagues in the Ministry, he wrote, "... it is a good plan to encourage the people to come and hear us preach if we spend some time with them in the field working with our hands. I have found it a good plan these 42 years I am traveling."

In our middle years, many men served bivocationally by pastoring more than one church. In 1946, for example, seven men were pastors of circuits serving 15 congregations, 39% of the total number of churches.

In that same era, our church planters in the Gospel Herald Society were bivocational pastors, who earned most of their livelihood by selling literature.

In 1983 the Annual Conference adopted as one of its WIDER HORIZONS goals, "in order to enable the Church Extension Department to step up its formation of new churches, to double the churches' offerings for church extension as soon as possible" (1983 Yearbook, p.2l). 1982-83 offerings from the churches were \$99,438. Double that figure in 1982-83 would have been \$198,876. Adjusted by the consumer price index to 1987 dollars, the amount should have grown to \$230,467. To date the churches have not been able to reach that goal. In fact this year they came short of it by \$78,958. Until that goal has been achieved, we are likely to continue to be heavily dependent on bivocationals if we take our goal of planting 49 more churches by the end of 2000 seriously.

Clearly, the biblical norm is that since "the worker deserves his wages" (Luke 10:7), so "the Lord has commanded that those who preach the gospel should receive their living from the gospel" (I Corinthians 9:14). Indeed, the Scriptures indicate that the minister of the Gospel has a right to such support (I Corinthians 9:5-13).

But in our day, as in New Testament times, there are some like the prototype church planters, Paul and Barnabas, who conclude, "we put up with anything rather than hinder the gospel of Christ" (v. 12), and give up their right in order to proclaim the Gospel and build the Church. Bless God for such men! They are blessed indeed, and our Church is blessed to have them.

These "tent makers", walking in the footsteps of those great apostles, are worthy of double honor. The Church should appreciate and cherish them. We must understand that because of their "second job" they have less time and energy to give to the church planting

task. So if it takes longer for them to accomplish their goal than men who are fully supported we must understand and not find fault with them. Rather, we should pray fervently for them, do all we can to encourage them and consider whether we ought to accept some responsibility to give dollars so that they may receive more support in the ministry and have more time freed for their "priority job", to proclaim the Gospel.

It is thrilling to realize what we can accomplish, with the Lord's help and by His grace, in church planting evangelism as we work diligently and unitedly for maximum results, so that as the grace of God through us "is reaching more and more people (it) may cause

thanksgiving to overflow to the glory of God" (IICorinthians 4:15).

A Hopeful Preview

During the past few years the Bible Fellowship Church has hit a plateau after a strong period of steady growth. 1987 membership was up 66 from 1983 but down 19 from the 1985 high of 6235. Since our church planting program has continued to produce, we may, by faith, confidently anticipate that growth will resume and accelerate. At the same time, the stagnation of many of the older churches should be of concern to us. The churches must address the WIDER HORIZONS goals with integrity and energy. ourselves and each other to renewed commitments and action in evangelism of the lost.

The lesson of our history matches what successful corporations know -to grow you have to add new units. Retailers who cease to open new stores have begun to die, for existing properties alone cannot hold market share, let alone increase it. And


some of their outlets will fail. You've got to start new units.

For a denomination, that means plant new churches. For a local church, that means form new classes, new Bible study groups, new choirs, special interest and age-based fellowship groups, caring groups, alternate worship services (at 8 AM or on Friday or Saturday evening, for example), extension Sunday Schools, etc.

New units, new groups can assimilate large numbers of people at start-up and in the first year or two. Then their ability to incorporate new people diminishes so that they can only take on replacements for people who leave and a few more each year. Psychologically and in terms of group dynamics, they cannot grow rapidly.

Let's not forget or give up on our WIDER HORIZONS goals. Let's storm Heaven in prayer for that total of 106 congregations and 14,293 members by the end of the year 2000.

Agraphic projection of the WIDERHORIZONS goals for membership in the next five years demonstrates the challenge before us and focuses our prayers and labors. We



shall be praying, and we need to plan our work, for increase of about 30% by 1993. The graph shows an upward curve. The goals anticipate a gradual acceleration of growth.

By years, from 1988 through 1993, the percentage growth goals are:

Remember these goals were set by consensus, preliminarily by vote of Annual Conference, with finalization through direct input from most of the churches. They are ours! We must own them. We must allow them to focus, our prayers, fire our zeal, fix our vision, frame our planning, and fan our labors, so that whether or not we fully reach the goals, we may confidently and truthfullysay to our Lord, "We have done our best!" By this time next year the Church Extension Department should have at least 4 more new congregations underway; there should be two more daughter churches going than we have now, and our membership should total 6,742. Can we do it? Not in our own strength or by our own designs. But by grace through faith and with determination and hard work it can be done. Is it worth it? Certainly it is!

I can see a vibrant fellowship of wonderful congregations -- many in new areas. There are black churches, Hispanic churches, Asian churches, Islander churches, Portuguese churches, Indian churches, deaf churches and others there -- all belonging to Christ and to each other, enthusiastically committed to the Faith and Order of the Bible Fellowship Church, bringing a host of new ones to Jesus, supporting a growing outreach to the whole world, praising, glorifying and delighting our wonderful Lord. Can you see that great movement? Will you let God use you to help bring it to pass?

"May the favor of the Lord our God rest upon us; establish the work of our hands for us -- yes, establish the work of our hands" (Psalm 90:17). Amen!

Report of the Bible Fellowship Church Board of Missions

The greatest challenge to the Church of Jesus Christ can be found in the seven last words of our Lord-"...to the remotest part of the earth." The task of world evangelization humanly seems to be impossible. Many churches believe that they themselves are struggling just to remain in existence. As a result, priorities and emphasis is put on the local ministry to the exclusion of outreach or to severely cutting back in outreach. Andrew Murray in his book entitled, Key To The Missionary Problem, tells us "personal consecration and the evangelization of the world ought to go together. Missionary advance depends upon the spiritual life of believers."

"...the nations shall know that I am the Lord, declares the Lord God, When I shall be sanctified in you before their eyes." Ezekiel 36:23b

He goes on to say, "In the long run the spiritual tone of the missionaries and the mission congregation abroad cannot be higher than that of the home church out of which it was born." Each fellowship of believers bears a unique responsibility first of all for their own personal relationship, commitment, and devotion to Jesus Christ that in turn will conform them into His image, bearing the fruit of His Spirit, and doing His work. The logical result of spiritual maturity is obedience to the Lord's last command to the remotest part of the earth—to "every tribe and tongue and people and nation."

"With men it is impossible"

"With God all things are possible"

"Allthings are possible to him that believes"

God is building His Church, qualitatively, numerically, and geographically; but He uses you and me, His Body, to accomplish the task. To what extent is God's life our life, God's work our work, and God's purpose our purpose?

We want to thank the many Pastors, Missions Committees, Women's Missionary Societies, and others who have demonstrated their commitment and cooperation with the Board of Missions in so many ways. We also want to thank each one who has given so generously to the missionary outreach of your church through the Board of Missions. Many have done so sacrificially.

The Board of Missions met seven times this year and the following update indicates some of the highlights of the year.

Herb & Betty Dyke returned to the U.S. to retire after serving many years in India. They

will have a year of furlough and deputation before retiring.

Missionaries on Leave of Absence

Change of Ministry

URBANA Financial Aid

Thirty three applicants from fifteen Bible Fellowship Churches received scholarships.

Summer Missionary Financial Aid

Financial assistance was given to nine applicants from eight Bible Fellowship Churches to serve with recognized organizations in nine different areas of the world.

Missions Emphasis Events of the Board of Missions

The Board of Missions conducted its Twelfth Missions Seminar for Pastors, Missionaries, and Key Lay Missions Leaders on March 15, 1988 at our Bethlehem Church. The theme was: What in the World is God Doing? -- Are WE Doing? Dr. Ralph D. Winter, of the U.S. Center for World Mission, was the speaker.

World Missions Week at Pinebrook Bible Conference was held from August 6 - 13, 1988. The theme was: TIME -- Total Involvement in Missionary Endeavor. Each week day morning a special workshop was provided to develop the theme among all age groups. The evening speaker was Dr.E. Eugene Williams, General Director of American Missionary Fellowship.

Proposal For a Missionary Retirement Fund

At our September 20, 1988 meeting the following resolution was passed:

RESOLVED, that we approve the concept of a Missionary Retirement Fund with the following as partial guidelines for consideration:

- Retirement age 65 years of age. No annuities will be paid until attainment of age 65. No annuities will be paid if retirement is prior to age 65 unless he/she had at least 25 years of service. Annuities for missionaries to be based on same level as the Ministers' Retirement Fund annuities.
- We recommend that each mission board and each missionary be dealt with separately due to the varied policies of various mission boards. Missionaries covered by retirement plans of their mission board will not be covered unless the annuity is less than the current annuity approved by Annual Conference for the Ministers' Retirement Fund.
- We recommend that any church which continues to support a missionary's need after retirement do it directly with the missionary in consultation with the Board of Missions.

Recommendations of the Board of Missions to the Annual Conference

 WHEREAS, the Board of Missions is very concerned about the lack of retirement provisions of certain sending mission boards; and

WHEREAS, this Board has approved the development of a Missionary Retirement Fund; and

<u>WHEREAS</u>, this Board is deeply appreciative of undesignated funds provided by a number of churches for various ministries conducted by the Board (i.e., temporary subsidies for missionary support, Executive Secretary support, missionary specials,

summer missionary financial aid, Urbana, Pastors' Missions Seminar, World Missions Week, administrative expenses, etc.); therefore be it

RESOLVED, that, in order to establish this Missionary Retirement Fund and to continue the other Board ministries, each church should consider giving an additional 5% in undesignated funds to the Board of Missions for this ministry as well as the ongoing ministries of the Board.

 WHEREAS, the three year term of Roy A. Hertzog as Executive Secretary of the Board of Missions is completed; and

WHEREAS, the Board of Missions has re-elected him to his second term at the March 8, 1988 Board meeting; therefore be it

RESOLVED, that we ratify the election of Roy A. Hertzog as Executive Secretary of the Board of Missions.

Report of the Board of Directors of Pinebrook Junior College

Pinebrook means developing the commitment of students to our Lord and to learning. Arecent informal study showed that 127 were graduated from 1981-1985. These graduates are now involved in the following ways:

Still enrolled in schools	3
Employed in church or Christian organization (or spouse)	28
Employed in other types of organizations	56
Nature of employment unknown	40
Significant "lay leadership" in churches	28

We thank God for the privilege of participating in their preparation.

Graduates and Students

Thirty-fourwere graduated in May, 1988. E. Margaret Clarkson, the hymn writer, spoke and conducted a church music seminar on the following Tuesday.

As classes began in September, 1988, there were 142.6 full-time equivalent students; 137 are full-time students and 12 part-time. Ninety-two are new, and 57 returning.

Personnel

Three new administrators began to serve the College in summer, 1988. Gilbert P. Kitchen became Dean of Students as of June 1; he has taught history and economics for three years at Pinebrook and has served as an administrator at Phil Mont Academy and at another school in Maine. Kirk W. House assumed the responsibility of being Academic Dean on July 1; he was Headmaster of Lehigh Christian Academy before coming to Pinebrook. T. Robert Wilcox became Director of Development on August 1; he served Philadelphia College of Bible and Northeastern Bible College in development work for nine years.

Renee Younger has begun to teach English and Public Speaking; Claudia Bloom is now Librarian; Margaret Bossard is now a full-time teacher in Business and Computer Science after three years of part-time teaching at Pinebrook.

These new people are similar in ability and commitment to the faithful faculty and staff which have been serving the College. The faculty is a group of people well trained in their fields of teaching. Both faculty and staff are deeply committed to our Lord and His truth.

Accreditation

The Middle States Association denied the College's request to become a candidate for accreditation. The visiting team acknowledged progress has been made, but decided not enough had been realized, particularly in the area of financial stability, to warrant candidacy. While this decision was disappointing, the Lord has opened another door.

In the last year the American Association of Bible Colleges (AABC) changed its Bible requirements for two-year colleges. This change allows Pinebrook to apply to become a candidate for accreditation. On October 25, the Accrediting Commission of AABC will consider reinstating Pinebrook Junior College as a candidate for accreditation on the basis of Berean Bible School having been a candidate for accreditation until 1971. Acceptance to candidacy by AABC will open new doors of opportunity for Pinebrook. The visit of Dr. Gilbert Peterson, President of Lancaster Eible College, representing AABC and work with other representatives of the Association in preparing the application has produced new emphasis in the way the College presents itself. Although the concern to see students sense a call to ministry is present as demonstrated by the alumni study mentioned earlier, little evidence of this emphasis is in the publicity. The College seeks a new clarity in its way of presenting itself, greater precision in showing how the curricultum can be used in church-related service and more emphasis given to vocational clarification and the call to ministry.

Finance

Contributions increased again this year to \$183,888. These contributions helped, but they were below the expectations of the College. Lower enrollment and unexpected expenses produced an operating deficit. Action has been taken to avoid repetition and to eliminate the deficit in the next two years.

Despite the commitment of the Bible Fellowship Churches to contribute at least \$45,000 annually, and the actual contribution of \$48,893, in the year closed June 30, 1988, the Middle States visitors called for increased contributions from the Bible Fellowship Churches. Without significant increases in contributions from churches, Middle States Association questions the seriousness of the desire of the denomination to have a college. Pinebrook continues to seek more students from our churches. It is a joy to have young people from four pastors' families in this year's freshman class.

Trexler Trust, Allentown, Pennsylvania, has made another grant of \$15,000 to Pinebrook for library resources and the fine arts program. Efforts are underway to secure help from additional foundations in this year.

Board Activity

The Board met four times for business and once in a workshop during the year. Quakertown National Bank was approved as the primary depository for College funds, but Meridian Bank is also a depository. The Board urges approval at second reading of changes in the Faith and Order allowing women to be elected to the Board and increasing the size of the Board. See pages 39-40 of the 1987 Yearbook for this material.

Notes to Financial Statements

1. Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

(a) Accrual Basis - The financial statements of Pinebrook Junior College have been prepared on the accrual basis except for depreciation accounting as explained in Note 3 to the financial statements. The statement of current funds revenues, expenditures and other changes is a statement of financial activities of current funds related to the current reporting period. Itdoes not purport to present the results of operations or the net income or loss for the period as would a statement of income or a statement of revenues and expenses.

To the extent that current funds are used to finance plant assets, the amounts so provided are accounted for as (1) expenditures, in the case of normal replacement of movable equipment and library books; (2) mandatory transfers, in the case of required provisions for debt amortization and interest and equipment renewal and replacement; and (3) transfers of a non-mandatory nature in all other cases.

(b) Fund Accounting - The accounts of the College are maintained in accordance with the principles of fund accounting in conformity with the requirements of the Industry Audit Guide for Colleges and Universities, as promulgated by the American Institute of Certified Public Accountants. Allincome, gains and losses, and other cash and non-cash transactions are accounted for in the applicable fund from which such earnings were derived, except the income from the endowment fund investments, which income is accounted for in the fund to which it is restricted, or if unrestricted, as revenues in the unrestricted current funds. The Fund Balances have been segregated under the following principles:

Unrestricted: Funds available for any purpose.

Restricted: Funds received through contributions, grants or other sources and available only for the specific purpose for which received.

Loan Fund: Funds received from federal loan programs and gifts available only for loans to students.

<u>Endowment:</u> Funds with respect to which donors have stipulated that the principal is to be maintained inviolate and in perpetuity and invested for the purpose of producing present and future income.

<u>Plant Funds</u>: The Plant Fund group consists of (1) funds to be used for the acquisition of physical properties for College purposes but unexpended at the date of reporting; (2) funds set aside for the retirement of indebtedness on College properties; and (3) funds expended for and thus invested in College properties.

Agency Funds: Funds held by the College as custodian for others such as student organizations, etc.

Report of the Board of Directors of the Bible Fellowship Home

The Board of Directors of the Bible Fellowship Church Home held four regular business meetings, two special meetings and numerous committee meetings during the year. Bert N. Brosius served as Chairman. Robert Smock as Vice-Chairman, Robert Zentz as Secretary and Charles Hersh as Treasurer. The Board membership is divided into five committees: Building, Finance, Public Relations/Marketing, Personnel and Long Range Planning.

This past year has been an exciting year for the Bible Fellowship Church. Fellowship Manor, an approximate \$6,500,000 project was completed and opened as a Skilled Nursing Home facility in August, 1988 and David Smock was employed as the Administrator. James Beil, President of the Bible Fellowship Church Home and all its facilities expressed his enthusiasm by emphasizing the words of encouragement found in Hebrews 6: 9-11 "But, beloved, we are convinced of better things concerning you, and things that accompany salvation, though we are speaking in this way. For God is not unjust so as to forget your work and the love which you have shown toward his name, in having ministered and in still ministering to the Saints and we desire that each one of you show the same diligence so as to realize the full assurance of hope until the end."

We can claim these promises in our work for Christ that there are "better things" in store for us. We can now claim these better things as they apply to the work of Fellowship Manor and the Bible Fellowship Home. Verse 12 further states that we are "not to be sluggish, but imitators of those who through faith and patience inherit the promises. Therefore, we vigorously pursue faith and patience in order to see the fulfillment of God's promises in this work he has given to us.

The Lord has provided us with a fine, lovely building which is extremely functional. The Lord has also provided us with a Christ-centered administrative staff which is striving to provide a program which will be pleasing to our Lord.

The Nazareth Bible Fellowship Home is also experiencing much change. On September 2, 1988 the Church Home officially opened those doors as a Personal Care Facility under the direction of Craig Porterfeld whose title is Director of Personal Care. The new name of the Nazareth Facility is Fellowship Home.

In obtaining the necessary approvals to develop Fellowship Manor, a commitment was established with the Whitehall Township Board of Supervisors requiring us to begin with Fellowship Community within two years following licensure of Fellowship Manor. The Board of Directors is presently exploring various marketing, financial and construction options to build at least a Personal Care Unit, an apartment complex and "plex type" units for independent living at the Whitehall site which will become Fellowship Community.

The dedication and open house for Fellowship Manor is scheduled for November 5th and November 6th, 1988. The dedication and open house for Fellowship Home is scheduled for October 29th, 1988.

The Board of Directors is extremely gratified with the present community response toward development of Fellowship Community. The established heritage of the Bible Fellowship Church and the Bible Fellowship Church Home has made an impact on the Lehigh Valley and surrounding areas. It is the desire of the Board of Directors that Fellowship Community will continue as a "Beacon" of Christ's love and compassion.

The Board of Directors wish to express their appreciation to James Beil, President; David Smock, Administrator; Craig Porterfield, Director of Personal Care; Thomas Heimer, Administrator of the Bible Fellowship Church Home; James Roth, Marketing and Research Director; and all of the many dedicated persons who assisted the Board in accomplishing the reality of Fellowship Manor and Fellowship Home. We praise God for their steadfast determination and wisdom and request your faithful and earnest prayers as the staff begins to develop new programs, seeks new patients and residents and achieves financial stability.

Note 2 - Fund Accounting Concept

To observe limitations and restrictions placed on the use of the Home's resources, the accounts are maintained in accordance with the principles of "Fund Accounting". This is the procedure by which resources for various purposes are classified for accounting and reporting purposes into funds that are in accordance with the activities or objectives specified by the board.

Note 3 - Exempt Status

The Bible Fellowship Church Home, Inc. is exempt from federal income taxes under Section 501(c)3 of the Internal Revenue Code.

Note 4 - Note Receivable

The note receivable represents an unsecured line of credit with Pinebrook Junior College with interest payable at a rate of 9 .75%.

Note 5 - Inventory

Inventory consists of food, nursing supplies, office supplies and janitorial items, recorded at cost.

Note 6 - Investments

Investments are carried at market value. Unrealized gains and losses from changes in market value are reported in the statement of support, revenue, expenses and changes in fund balance.

Note 7 - Property, Plant and Equipment

Property, plant and equipment are recorded in the plant fund at acquisition cost. Exhaustible property and equipment are depreciated on a straight line basis over their economic useful lives as follows:

Note 8 - Retirement Benefits

Bible Fellowship Church Home, Inc. has a simplified employee pension plan for substantially all of its employees, the cost of which is determined as a percentage of salaries and wages earned. The general policy is to fund costs accrued.

Note 9 - Deposits

The Bible Fellowship Church as of June 30, 1988 is in the process of constructing a 120 bed skilled nursing facility (to be known as Fellowship Manor) which, along with the 28 bed Nazareth facility, will be operated by the Bible Fellowship Church Home, Inc. in accordance with the terms of an operating agreement.

Deposits of \$588,990, as shown on the balance sheet dated June 30, 1988, represents a deposit in the amount of the initial operating payment in accordance with the operating agreement between Bible Fellowship Church and Bible Fellowship Church Home, Inc.

The operating agreement calls for an initial payment of \$588,990 and subsequent monthly payments from the Bible Fellowship Church Home, Inc. to the Bible Fellowship Church. Under the terms of the agreement, the Church Home will pay to the Church, from the revenues of operating the facilities, or other revenues and resources, an amount equal to the debt service on the mortgages and any other debt incurred to construct and operate the subject facilities.

Note 10 - Contingent Liability

Bible Fellowship Church Home, Inc., under a Contract of Suretyship, is a guarantor of the mortgage indebtedness incurred by the Bible Fellowship Church for the construction of Fellowship Manor. The mortgage indebtedness outstanding at June 30, 1988 was \$4,710,333. In addition, Bible Fellowship Church Home, Inc., under a Contract of Suretyship, is a guarantor of the Bible Fellowship Church's line of credit available in the amount of \$500,000 which is secured by the 28 bed Nazareth facility. The balance outstanding on the line of credit at June 30, 1988 was -0-.

Note 11 - Project Costs

Project costs of \$155,568, as shown on the statement of support, revenue, expenses and changes in fund balance, primarily represents costs of an unsuccessful attempt in negotiating a proposed bond issue for the financing of the Fellowship Manor project.

Note 12 - Subsequent Events

Total Certificates of Deposit & Money Markets

Fellowship Manor has been completed as of August 1, 1988, at which time the operating agreement between Bible Fellowship Church Home, Inc. and Bible Fellowship Church has commenced. The first residents have been placed as of August 15, 1988. Subsequent to the opening of Fellowship Manor, the 28 bed Nazareth facility has been converted to a personal care facility.

Report of Pinebrook Bible Conference

This first year as director has been both challenging and encouraging. I am humbled by the confidence our board has placed in my ability to direct this ministry, but also believe that God has placed me here, and am excited about the future.

Thank God for a dedicated staff which serves in a selfless and devoted manner. Our guests (both summer Bible conference, and retreat groups) continually express their appreciation for the attitude and spirit of these servants.

Pinebrook's computer-supported financial system is based upon an accrual method of accounting. This has provided us the ability to obtain a much more accurate picture of the cyclical nature of our revenue, and will aid in our preparation of a budget for the coming fiscal year. Our peak revenue period continues to be the mid-winter months with its large established retreats (made up predominantly of young people). On the other hand, the largest financial drain has been the summer season. This is due to the very attractive rating structure for Bible Fellowship people, and at the same time the expenditures for the high level of services. Offerings taken during the summer meetings fail to meet the additional costs of this ministry, and contributions from our church family virtually stop during the summer.

The Spring and Fall retreat seasons carry themselves, but suffer from the inability to saturate our facilities (as we do in the winter) due to the larger number of couples, families, and adults, resulting in less persons per room.

The fiscal year 1987-88 nonetheless has been financially successful. We entered the year with a significant deficit as a result of the transition from a cash accounting basis to the accrual method. We have realized a reduction of the deficit, and have reduced our liabilities by approximately \$7,000. At the same time some rather significant physical improvements were accomplished as follows;

- two new furnaces installed in Honeybrook
- reconfiguration of the Snack Shop area and it's equipment
- installation of a major new underground electrical circuit between the kitchen and Honeybrook to eliminate overload
- replaced a failed water line between Honeybrook and the administration building
- Upgraded Honeybrook with;
 - 1) repairs, paint, bathroom tile, carpeting; as needed
 - 2) new and brighter lighting
 - 3) air conditioning
 - 4) double bed in every room
- new dropped ceiling and improved lighting in the kitchen
- barricaded both ends of Pinebrook Road
- completely renovated cabin #1
- constructed a new wooden walkway to the campground
- completed cleaning, repairing, and repainting of the outdoor pool
- administration building was connected to our sewage treatment plant. This was probably the most major project ever tackled by our in-house maintenance staff, involving trenching through a significant amount of solid shale

These things, as well as others, have been accomplished by a lean staff which has operated as efficiently as possible.

We have formulated some aggressive plans for the future;

- 1) New summer staff and retreat housing to be provided by a new dormitory-style building, similar to the design of our Pine Lodge building. This facility will accommodate an estimated forty persons and be situated across from our Overbrook unit. The estimated cost of sixty to seventy thousand dollars will be funded by a matching gift donation. For every \$1,000 contributed, the donor will match \$2,000 up to a limit of \$50,000, thus yielding up to \$75,000 for this project.
- 2) A new housing complex for permanent staff will be proposed later this calendar year. Our objective is to have the first two units available for occupancy by summer '89. These initial two units are estimated to cost \$125,000.

3) Other areas needing attention are the outdoor tennis and volleyball courts, road surfaces, repairs or reconstruction to the dam, and some furnace replacement.

Finally, my heartfelt thanks to a board of directors whose love of God and of this ministry is reflected in their active concern and support.

Report of the Board of Victory Valley Camp

The Board of Victory Valley Camp held four regularly scheduled business meetings during the year. In addition to the meetings of the full board many additional hours were spent by individuals of the board in service on committees and in the fulfillment of other camp related responsibilities. The board membership is divided into four standing committees: Building & Grounds, Development, Program & Staff, and Finance.

We as a board continue to rejoice in God's provision for His work at Victory Valley. The Lord's provision can be seen in the following: provision of a director, provision of an assistant director, provision of summer staff, provision of volunteer help, provision of ministry opportunities, provision for growth, provision of finances. We never cease to be amazed at His goodness to us. He is able to supply all our need ". . .according to His riches in glory by Christ Jesus."

Provision of a Director: Phil Atkins has once again served the camp well in providing general oversight and direction to its ministry. We commend him for his hard work and dedication. His expertise in many areas especially that of maintenance has contributed immeasurably to the overall well being of the camp. We appreciate his servant attitude in the exercise of leadership.

Provision of an Assistant Director: Donna Bauer has just completed her lOth year of service to the camp. Donna has many responsibilities including Program Director. Donna continues to bring fresh ideas to the camp's program as well as an indefatigable spirit to all her responsibilities. We are thankful for her willing persistence in the work. During the past year, the camp assisted in providing new housing for Donna and her husband.

Provision of a Summer Staff: This year's summer staff was outstanding. The staff totalled 48. A whopping 70% were returning staff from the previous year. 50% of the summer staff was composed of Bible Fellowship young people.

Provision of Volunteer Help: Much was accomplished during the year by the efforts of many volunteers who are friends of the camp. The most notable project was the replacing of the Dining Hall roof by volunteer labor at the savings of over \$2,500 to the camp.

Provision of Ministry Opportunities: Victory Valley conducts a year round program. Rental groups supply the bulk of the winter months camp usage as evidenced by more than 32 rentals this past year. Interspersed are programs completely operated by the Valley staff such as Jr. High Fall Weekend, Sr. High Ski Weekend, 2 weekends of Sno Valley for 7-12 year old's and Junior High Sno Valley.

The Summer Program which is conducted by Victory Valley ministered to 528 campers in regular camp and 99 campers in outpost. This is more than 80 additional campers over last year. We have rejoiced to hear of 9 professions of faith as well as many renewed commitments to the Lord.

Provision for Growth: There are many opportunities for improvement as Victory Valley continues to increase its ministry. The recently established Second Wind Project has an initial goal of \$30,000.00. We praise God for the first \$4,000.00 already given. We continue to look for individuals and churches that are willing to contribute to this vision.

Provision of Finances: While the Lord continues to provide for us financially, there is still much that is needed in terms of facilities to make the camp even better. By God's provision through faithful churches and individuals we believe these facilities will be realized. Despite the winter rentals, winter is still the most difficult part of the year for the camp financially. It is a time in which much of the physical repair to the camp is done, materials are ordered for the Summer Program and registrations have not yet been received for Summer Camp. Therefore, it is of great help to the camp to receive the donations from the churches earlier in the year as opposed to the present March 1st deadline. We appreciate the churches' gracious spirit in giving to Victory Valley. It is in that spirit that we encourage each church to send their contribution as early as is feasible.

Report of the Board of Christian Education

The members of the Board of Christian Education met four times this church year. The primary ministry of this Board is carried out through four sub-committees. The following are reports from those sub-committees:

Audio-Visual Materials

During the past year this sub-committee gave oversight to the reviewing, purchasing, promoting, and distributing of three additional video series, bringing our current library to include eight video series. The videos have had extensive use this year and some are booked for use through March of 1989. Consideration is being made for new purchases and further promotion of the videos. The input of the local churches is greatly appreciated.

In addition, the filmstrip library has been updated and a revised catalog of these resources has been computerized by Pastor Richard Harris. Copies of this updated catalog are available for your church.

Christian Education Training (formerly Sunday Bible School)

The Christian Education Seminar for 1988 was held April 9 at Grace Bible Fellowship Church in Quakertown. The speaker was Dr. Robert Hicks. Bob spoke on the theme, "Need Oriented Teaching." There were 66 participants from 14 Bible Fellowship Churches. Comments from those in attendance indicated that the day was worthwhile. Efforts are being made to boost attendance for next year's event.

An "Idea and Inspiration Fair" is planned for March 18, 1989 at Ebenezer Bible Fellowship Church in Bethlehem. The Fair will feature fifty different learning centers and resource tables. It will be a full day of "hands on" training. The day will be led by Joyce Lamb, a Christian Education consultant who has led these seminars throughout the United States and who brings with her a wealth of knowledge and experience to challenge all of our teachers.

In the future we hope to offer the services of a Christian Education Resource Team to help local churches in training their teachers and increasing their Christian Education effectiveness. Members of the team will be available to hold training workshops ranging in length from one hour to a Friday through Saturday program, helping CE Committees with ideas and evaluation, generally being available to assist where we are needed.

The Board of Christian Education will also be co-sponsoring a Senior Citizen's Ministry with Bethel Church in Emmaus in 1989. A special speaker will be sharing creative ideas with Senior Citizen leaders. Aluncheon will be served. Further information will be circulated as plans are finalized.

Pastors, Elders, Deacons Advance (P.E.D.)

The November 13-14, 1987 PED Advance held at Pinebrook Bible Conference was well recieved with 225 men in attendance. The theme was "Assimilating New People in the Local Church", with Dr. Jim Stevens, pastor of Christ Community Church of West Chester, PA, as guest speaker.

The 1988 PED Advance of November 18-19 will be held at Pinebrook again. Our speaker will be Dr. Joe Aldrich, President of Multnomah School of the Bible. He will be

sharing on the theme of "Lifestyle Evangelism".

The Committee is working on plans for a financial seminar for 1989 with Mr. James Rickard of Ambassador's Ministries, Newhall, California. Rickard is a former associate of Dr. John MacArthur.

The speaker for the 1990 Advance is Dr. Gene Getz.

Youth

The Youth Sub-conmittee gave oversight to three important Bible Fellowship Church ministries this past year.

A Youth Leadership Retreat was held September 25-26 at Victory Valley Camp. There were 56 student and adult leaders in attendance. The focus of the sessions was "Developing Leadership In the Youth Group."

Over 250 young people and adults from 18 Bible Fellowship Churches attended a Thanksgiving Youth Rally November 27, 1987 at Grace Bible Fellowship Church in Quakertown, PA. It was a day full of activity, ranging from volleyball, films, teaching with Mike Cook and music with "The Gospel Team". The rally was well received by all.

Finally the Youth Committee gave excellent leadership to Sno-Glo 1988 at Pinebrook Bible Conference. There were 454 young people in attendance. Sandy Outlar spoke on the theme, "Who's the Boss?"

The work of the committee necessitates great input from a number of men not presently serving on the Board of Christian Education. Their participation is greatly appreciated.

Report of the Historical Committee of the Bible Fellowship Church

The Historical Committee met twice during this conference year. The projects on which it is working are proceeding at a steady but slow pace. Much of the work of the Historical Committee requires a great deal of time. Because the work is done by those who have full time responsibilities in ministry, the work proceeds at a gradual pace.

Harold Shelly continues work on the history that will be a complete telling of the story of the Bible Fellowship Church. He has full time responsibilities at teaching and is limited in what he can do. We continue to work toward the completion of this project though at this time there is no foreseeable conclusion.

Richard Taylor has been working on the final editing of the unpublished minutes of our church from 1858 to 1896. This project has been in the work for about 8 years. It is expected that the manuscript will be sent to a printer in January or February of next year.

The Historical Committee purchased a new fire resistant cabinet to increase the capacity for storing records that are being received into the archives. This cabinet allows us to store more of the irreplaceable records which we possess.

The Historical Committee is encouraged by the interest shown by other historical groups. The Bible Fellowship Church was represented by Richard Taylor and Daniel Ziegler at a Mennonite Conference in November of 1987. As a result, the Lancaster Mennonite Historical Society has published Taylor's paper on William Gehman and anticipates publishing Ziegler's paper on Eusebius Hershey, our first missionary.

The Historical Committee continues to collect the documents that are so important to understanding the development of our church. Each church and each board or committee should place its past records and minutes in the archives for storage and future reference. If you wish to place materials in the archives, contact archivist Richard Taylor.

and be it further:

<u>RESOLVED</u>: that we recommend to the 105th Annual Conference that the duty listed above be a replacement for the present duties 9 and 10.

- "9. To co-ordinate and review with sensitivity the stewardship programs of various Bible Fellowship Church agencies so as to guard against duplication, competition, over-exposure, and undue aggressiveness."
- "10. To approve all major capital campaigns and deferred giving programs of all agencies of the Bible Fellowship Church."

RESOLVED: that we recommend to the 105th Annual Conference that the present duty "11" become duty "10", and the present duty "12" become duty "11".

<u>RESOLVED</u>: that we recommend to the 105th Annual Conference that duty "9" under Article IIIbe implemented in the following manner.

"The Director of Stewardship Services will contact periodically each agency of the Bible Fellowship Church to discuss with them their fund raising plans. The Director of Stewardship Services will then report his findings and progress to the Stewardship Council to evaluate, and, in turn, offer any helpful assistance if necessary.

We are most grateful as well for the prayers and other helps of God's people from all corners of the Bible Fellowship Church. Report of the Committee to Examine of Minutes of Particular Churches

The Committee on the Examination of the Minutes of Particular Churches met on Tuesday, October 18, 1988, at Pinebrook Bible Conference Center.

MINUTES

The minutes of all congregations of the Bible Fellowship Church were examined by the committee on the basis of the suggested format for congregational meetings as stated in the By-Laws for Particular Churches found in the 1986 Faith and Order, pages 88 - 90.

The committee communicates each September with every church reminding them of the standing rule that "The Pastor shall send a copy of the minutes of all congregational meetings, which shall include the Board of Elders' Report of the Membership and Annual Financial Report and the Valuation of church properties and the Pastor's Statistical Report (PS-3) to:

to arrive by Monday of the week prior to Annual Conference week... The Committee on Examination of Minutes of Particular Churches will forward the material received to the Committee on Statistics" (1987 Yearbook page 194).

The minutes of the following churches were not on hand to be examined by the committee on its meeting date, the Tuesday prior to Annual Conference: Harrisburg; Howell; Lehighton; Newark, DE; New Fairfield, CT; Philadelphia- Emmanuel; Sinking Spring and Stroudsburg. These minutes have been examined at Annual Conference.

The Committee on the Examination of Minutes of Particular Churches respectfully requests the churches to assure that their minutes are delivered to the location of Annual Conference no later than the Monday prior to Annual Conference thus enabling the committee to complete its work and make its report to Annual Conference.

After the approval of a first reading of the proposed change, the pastor and delegate of each particular church shall be responsible to inform their Board of Elders of the proposed change. The Board of Elders of each church shall vote on the proposed change, and an affirmative vote by a majority of the total number of elders shall be required for approval. Before the Annual Conference can consider a second reading of the proposed amendment of change in this Standard of Worship and Life, approval of the proposed change must be reported within 24 months to the Secretary of Annual Conference by the Board of Elders of at least two-thirds of the churches.


