

WHEREAS, it is the desire of the congregation of Calvary Bible Fellowship Church, Finesville, NJ, that the unity of the body be maintained and that the truth of the Word of God be upheld as the church carries out the purpose for which God established her, and

<u>WHEREAS</u>, the Bible teaches that the purpose of the church is to edify the saints (1), to evangelize the world (2), and to worship the Lord in Spirit and in truth (3), therefore be it

<u>RESOLVED</u>, that Section III, Paragraph A, Article X: Harmful Indulgences of the <u>Faith and Order</u>, be replaced with the following:

Alcoholic Drinks

The use of alcoholic beverages is one of the most serious social problems in the United States. Its abuse has led to personal and family suffering, serious physical and mental health problems, and increased rates of accidental and criminal injury and death. The financial cost of such beverages and their consequences is a tremendous and unnecessary burden on all of society.

Therefore, no member who uses alcohol, or makes such drinks, or deals in them, shall hold office or serve in a teaching capacity in any part of the church program (4). The Pastors of the Bible Fellowship Church need to strongly and persistently warn their people of the dangers of alcoholic beverages and urge all of their members and attenders to abstain totally from the use, manufacture and distribution of them.

- (1) "It was he who gave some to be apostles, some to be prophets, some to be evangelists, and some to be pastors and teachers, to prepare God's people for works of service, so that the body of Christ may be built up..." (NIV, Eph.4:11,12).
- (2) "Therefore go and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit, teaching them to obey everything I have commanded you. And surely I will be with you always, to the very end of the age." (NIV, Matthew 28:19,20).
- (3) "God is spirit, and His worshipers must worship in spirit and in truth." (NIV, John 4:24)
- (4) "Everything is permissible but not everything is beneficial. Everything is permissible but not everything is constructive." (NIV, I Corinthians 10:23).

RESOLVED, that we petition [sic] the One Hundred Seventh Annual Conference to place the Staten Island congregation under the care of the Board of Church Extension as a mission, effective November 1, 1990, and further be it

RESOLVED, that should the Annual Conference grant our request, we dissolve our Board of Elders as of the effective date established, receive an organizing pastor at the call of the Board of Church Extension and earnestly seek the Lord's help at reorganizing as a church.

<u>RESOLVED</u>, that we place the Staten Island congregation under the care of the Board of Church Extension as a Mission effective November 1, 1990.

RESOLVED, that this be the answer of the 107th Annual Conference to the petition of Grace Bible Fellowship Church of Reading.

"All call forms shall be approved by the Ministerial Relations Committee."

(1) Call for Bible Fellowship Church Agencies

"The (agency name) being on sufficient grounds, well satisfied of the qualifications of you, (name of candidate), and having good hopes from our knowledge of you that your training, experience, and ministrations in the gospel will be profitable to this work, do earnestly call and desire you to undertake the office of (position title) in this Bible Fellowship Church ministry, promising you in the discharge of your duties, all proper support, and encouragement.

"And that you may be free from other employment, we, on our part, promise and oblige ourselves to pay you the sum of \$(salary) yearly in regular payments during the time of your service as the (position title) of this ministry and (number of weeks) vacation each year.

"And we agree to pay or continue to pay semi-annually into the Ministers' Retirement Fund that requisite percentage of your salary that Annual Conference may require you to pay.

(The following paragraph is optional)

"And we agree to pay, or continue to pay annually a sum equivalent to that self-employment tax as may be levied on you by the Congress of the United States under the Federal Insurance Contribution Act.

"And we agree to pay, or continue to pay, for the Health and Welfare benefits offered by Annual Conference."

(An optional paragraph may be inserted at this location relative to housing arrangements/allowance).

"And we promise and oblige ourselves to review with you the adequacy of this compensation annually.

"In testimony whereof we have respectively subscribed our names this (date) day of (month) A.D. (year)."

(2) Call to a Minister to Serve Bivocationally

The Scriptures indicate that it is normal for ministers of the Gospel to be fully supported in the work of the ministry to be able to give their full time and energy to the ministry. According to the Bible such support is their right and is the obligation of the church, the Lord's people.

From biblical times to the present, in some circumstances and at certain times, ministers have been willing to serve bivocationally--to provide part or all of their and their families' support through supplemental employment other than the ministry.

While the Bible Fellowship Church approves of calls to ministers to serve bivocationally, it counsels churches, agencies and ministers that such calls should be regarded as the exception rather than the rule, that no man ought to be coerced or pressured into accepting a bivocational call, that any man who serves in the ministry "at his own expense" should be regarded with great appreciation and full respect, that churches and

agencies that are able to provide full support ought to do so, that the minimum salary recommendation adopted by the Annual Conference be taken seriously, that a careful and candid review of the adequacy of compensation provided under a bivocational call be scrupulously held annually between the parties at the initiative of the church or agency and that the church or agency make every effort to increase the amount of support it provides and to diminish the amount of his support provided by the minister and to provide full support just as soon as it is able to do so.

The Call

"The (particular church or agency) of the Bible Fellowship Church, being on sufficient grounds, well satisfied of the ministerial qualifications of you, (name of candidate), and having good hopes that your ministrations in the Gospel will be profitable to our spiritual interests (to the growth and spiritual interests of _____mission), do earnestly call and desire you to undertake the office of (organizing) pastor of said congregation, promising you that in the discharge of your duties we shall extend to you our prayers, respect, encouragement, partnership and obedience (oversight) in the Lord.

"This is a call to you to serve bivocationally, that is, with understanding that you will provide part of your family's support through other employment than the ministerial position to which we are calling you. In each of the areas of compensation listed below we obligate ourselves to provide what we promise and we also promise to establish goals for higher compensation when the Lord's blessing and provision allow us to do so. We propose that we shall through negotiation, subsequent to your acceptance of the call, agree with you upon explicit limits of your service as (organizing) pastor in keeping in the demands placed on you by your supplemental employment.

"We promise and oblige ourselves to pay you the sum of \$(salary) yearly in regular payments during the time of your being and continuing as the (organizing) pastor of this church (mission).

"We obligate ourselves to provide you free use of the parsonage or a housing allowance of \$(dollars) yearly in monthly payments and (number of weeks) vacation each year.

"And we agree to pay or continue to pay semi-annually into the Ministers' Retirement Fund that requisite percent of said salary which Annual Conference may require you to pay into said fund.

"And we agree to pay you \$(salary) annually, in four payments prior to the dates on which you must make your payments, for you to pay toward that self-employment tax levied upon you by the Congress of the United States under the Federal Insurance Contribution Act or, should you have elected not to participate in FICA, for you to use toward an alternate retirement and disablement plan.

"And we agree to pay, or continue to pay, for health insurance benefits offered by Annual Conference. Should you have or obtain adequate health insurance coverage through your supplemental employment, we pledge ourselves to supplement your salary or benefits in an appropriate manner."

(At this point may be inserted any other allowances as may be mutually agreeable as part of the salary package).

"We are grateful that you are willing to consider a call to bivocational service. We promise and oblige ourselves to review with you annually the adequacy of this call, to increase our provision for your support as we are able and to provide full support for you in the ministry as soon as it is possible for us to do so.

"In testimony whereof we have respectively subscribed our names this (date) day of (month) A.D. (year)."

<u>WHEREAS</u>, Pastor Raymond G. Burnett requested to be excused from the 107th Annual Conference due to the deteriorating situation of the Englishtown, NJ, Church; and

<u>WHEREAS</u>, the Annual Conference directed the Credentials Committee to inquire of Pastor Burnett as to the nature of his absence; and

<u>WHEREAS</u>, the Chairman of the Credentials Committee has contacted Pastor Burnett expressing concern about his request to be excused from Annual Conference; and

<u>WHEREAS</u>, it is the judgment of the Credentials Committee that a serious situation exists in the congregation of Englishtown, NJ, which requires prayer and counsel; and

<u>WHEREAS</u>, it is considered that the problem in that church though serious does not provide a satisfactory basis for Pastor Burnett to absent himself from Annual Conference, therefore; be it

<u>RESOLVED</u>, that the absence of Raymond G. Burnett from Annual Conference be viewed as an unexcused absence; and further

RESOLVED, that the Credentials Committee and Ministerial Relations Committee make a special point to seek to provide guidance and encouragement to Pastor Burnett and the Englishtown Church during this difficult time.

<u>RESOLVED</u>, that the 108th Annual Conference of Bible Fellowship Church be convened at Pinebrook Bible Conference on Tuesday, October 22, 1991, at 9:00 AM.

WHEREAS, a lack of consensus concerning the purpose and direction of Annual Conference seems to exist, and

WHEREAS, spiritual stimulation, strengthening of local

churches, deepening of relationships, and unity of vision and function should be enhanced by the meetings of Annual Conference and are important to the life and ministry of the members, congregations, and agencies of Annual Conference, therefore be it

RESOLVED, that a Study Committee of five be appointed by the Chairman to study the philosophy and purpose of the meetings of Annual Conference, to prepare a purpose statement for the meetings of Annual Conference and to make recommendations regarding the format of Annual Conference.

<u>WHEREAS</u>, we strongly believe it is the Scriptural responsibility of the church to adequately meet the needs of its pastors, (Matt. 10:10; 1 Cor. 9:7-15; Gal. 6:6; Phil. 4:10-19; 1 Tim. 5:17-18), therefore be it

RESOLVED, that we encourage each church to increase its pastor's salary at least 5% above the previous year's salary, and further

RESOLVED, that the recommended minimum salary for a pastor serving a Bible Fellowship Church including benefits is \$19,950 for the 1990-91 year.

<u>RESOLVED</u>, that the Board of Directors of Bible Fellowship Church Homes, Inc., be authorized to formulate new Bylaws reflecting the new name and to restate the purpose, and further **RESOLVED**, that the Bylaws of Bible Fellowship Church Homes, Inc. shall state that the corporation is formed on a non-membership basis.

RESOLVED, that Bible Fellowship Church Homes, Inc. obtain necessary legal counsel in order to restate the Articles of Incorporation and submit such restatement to the proper Commonwealth authorities.

RESOLVED, that the Board of Directors of the Bible Fellowship Church is hereby authorized to make a title transfer of the property in the name of Bible Fellowship Church Homes, Inc. and, further

RESOLVED, that the Bylaws shall contain an article declaring that upon dissolution or termination of the Bible Fellowship Church Homes, Inc., the proceeds of all assets insofar as feasible shall go to the Bible Fellowship Church, and further

RESOLVED, that the above action shall be subject to final approval by the Board of Directors of the Bible Fellowship Church upon advice of legal counsel.

Duties.

- 1. The Board of Directors of the Bible Fellowship Church Homes, Inc. shall be responsible to establish and maintain a ministry of care for the aging and infirm and to engage in such other forms of ministry of care and charitable work as determined by the Directors of the Corporation.
- 2. The general business and affairs of the Bible Fellowship Church Homes, Inc. shall be managed and conducted by its Board of Directors acting as a Board, or through its properly authorized officers in accordance with the Bylaws of the Bible Fellowship Church Homes, Inc. Management of its corporate business and affairs shall be in accordance with and subject to the Faith and Order of the Bible Fellowship Church.

- The general conduct of the Bible Fellowship Church Homes, Inc. shall be under the immediate supervision and control of a President elected to serve at the pleasure of the Board. The President shall be reviewed annually by this Board of Directors.
- 4. The Board of Directors of the Bible Fellowship Church Homes, Inc. shall make a written report of its activities to the Annual Conference of the Bible Fellowship Church.
- 5. The following shall be placed in the Bylaws of the Bible Fellowship Church Homes, Inc. as an article of said Bylaws:

ARTICLE

Assets

Notwithstanding any other provisions of the Bylaws:

Section 1

The sale or transfer of any of the real property of Bible Fellowship Church Homes, Inc., whether now owned or hereafter acquired, shall not be permitted without the prior approval of the Bible Fellowship Church Annual Conference or the Board of Directors of the Bible Fellowship Church.

Section 2

This entire Article and any subsequent amendments must be placed in the Bible Fellowship Church <u>Faith and Order</u>, subject to the Bible Fellowship Church's rules governing amendments to the <u>Faith and Order</u> of the Bible Fellowship Church.

(FIRST READING)

<u>WHEREAS</u>, the 107th Annual Conference has approved increasing the size of the Board of Directors of Bible Fellowship Church Homes, Inc. at first reading, and

The Board of Directors of the Bible Fellowship Church endorses the request by the Board of Directors of the Bible Fellowship Church Home to seek a restatement of their Articles of Incorporation, revision of By-Laws and transfer title of properties and assets to the Board of Directors of the Bible Fellowship Church Home.

Report of the Board of Christian Education

The members of the Board of Christian Education met four times this church year. The primary ministry of this Board is carried out through four sub-committees. The following are reports from those sub-committees.

Audio-Visual Materials

During the past year the Board has purchased additional video series for our lending library, bringing the total of available videos to 30. Video usage increased by over 50% this year. Plans are underway to update the Audio-Visual Materials Catalog, including a listing of materials presently available from sister churches. Church leaders are again encouraged to take advantage of this excellent resource which provides thousands of dollars of teaching materials for their congregations.

Christian Education Training

156 people from 29 churches (one not a BFC Church) attended the "7 Laws of the Teacher" CE Convention on March 31. Response was very positive and the video series that was used for the convention has been included in the Audio-Visual Library. Numerous churches are using the material for training their own teachers. An evaluation and response form that was completed by registrants that day indicated a desire to have a workshop format for a future convention. The 1991 convention scheduled for April 13, 1991 will incorporate such a format.

One of the desires of the committee for the coming year is to develop a team of people from Bible Fellowship Churches who have skill and expertise in the field of Christian Education that would be available to present teacher training sessions, provide evaluations and serve as a resource team for the local church. This would be provided for the cost of transportation and materials. Information will be forthcoming as the team is organized.

The Board is pleased to present plaques each year in recognition of increases in Sunday School attendance. This year the Emmanuel Bible Fellowship Church in Philadelphia was awarded a plaque for the greatest percentage increase. The New Life Bible Fellowship in Oley, PA and the Bethel Bible Fellowship Church in Emmaus, PA were presented with plaques in recognition of the greatest actual increase in Sunday School attendance.

Pastor, Elder, Deacon Advance (PED)

James Rickard of the Master's Fellowship was the speaker for the PED Advance held November 10-11 at Pinebrook Bible Conference. 182 Laymen and 33 pastors participated in the event. Practical help was given in the area of church finances. The attenders expressed appreciation for the weekend.

The 1990 Advance will be held November 9-10 at Pinebrook. We are pleased to have as our guest, speaker, professor, pastor, and author, Dr. Gene Getz.

Youth

The Youth Sub-committee is responsible for the edification and evangelism of the young people of the Bible Fellowship Church. To this end, the sub-committee is responsible for the Thanksgiving Rally, Sno-Glo, and the Leadership Training Seminar for teens and their leaders.

This year the Thanksgiving Rally was again held jointly at Pinebrook Junior College and the Quakertown Bible Fellowship Church. 233 teens and leaders joined in the recreation and heard Dave Scheerer, Director of Youth for Christ for Metropolitan New York as he challenged those present to committed Christian living. Two teens made commitments to Christ and approximately 40 teens committed themselves to daily Christian living.

The Committees's goal for this year's Rally is to increase the involvement of teen leaders and see more than 22 of our churches participating. To accomplish this, more activities are being added this year. The November 23 program will be held at Pinebrook and Quakertown Church and the speaker will be Jack Crabtree.

The two Sno-Glo weekends ministered to 637 participants. Keith Walker of Lancaster Bible College was the speaker and challenged everyone present to deal with the "giants" in their lives that hinder spiritual growth and Christian living. Evaluations by the teens indicated that the speaker and the workshops were valuable.

Sno-Glo will be held January 4-6 and 18-20, 1991. Pastor Randall A. Grossman will speak on the theme, "Things to Come." Discussion groups will address the questions teens may have on this issue.

College and Career Sno-Glo will be held January 4-6 with Pastor Wayne Clapier as the speaker.

Work is being done on the Youth Leadership Training Seminar to make it a more effective teaching tool for our teens and their leaders.

The Youth Sub-committee sees a disturbing trend in our churches. The number of Youth Pastors is dwindling. If our teens are the next generation of church leaders, should we not give them the benefit of full time Youth Workers to minister directly to them? We encourage each church to take a hard look at this need in our denomination.

Report of the Board of Church Extension

The Board of Church of Extension has met four times during the past year to supervise the carrying out of its assigned task.

Two men were called to ministries under the Board of Church Extension. David R. Way was called to pastor the Pleasant Valley, New York, Mission. This new ministry is an outgrowth of the church at Poughquag. Pastor Way was asked to serve as the organizing pastor of the mission. Richard B. Ravis was called to serve as associate organizing pastor of the Edison, New Jersey, Mission. The Edison Mission drew up a plan at its inception which called for an associate pastor to serve with Pastor Cahill. The calling of Pastor Ravis is an indication that the Edison Mission is proceeding according to the proposed plan.

There were several developments concerning property. The Holmes, New York, Mission has completed negotiations to merge with the congregation of Second Kent Baptist Church. This merger will mean the sharing of a very spacious and adequate facility. The Mt. Pocono, Pennsylvania, Church acquired possession of the Kirk in the Wood. We are thankful to God for this development. The Board of Church Extension has made an attempt to compile information about the finances and insurance coverage of each of the churches under its jurisdiction. This is a complex task.

The Walnutport Mission has requested that an assessment committee be appointed to evaluate its readiness to re-form as a church recognized by Annual Conference. The evaluation has taken place and we are pleased to recommend the Walnutport Mission for membership to this Annual Conference.

During the year, we voted to close two of our missions which have been dormant for several years due to lack of personnel and finances. These missions are Eastern Union County, New Jersey, and Mays Landing, New Jersey.

The Board of Church Extension has hired Carol Z. Snyder to serve as Director of Development and Communications. One of the great problems facing the Board of Church Extension is lack of resources, both in finances and in personnel. The decision to hire Mrs. Snyder is based on a recognition of those needs. Her task is to provide help for the Executive Director and to more effectively communicate the work of the Board of Church Extension to the Bible Fellowship Church. Mrs. Snyder has established an office in her home and will work from it.

The Board of Church Extension has been working through a study and planning procedure in order to evaluate its ministry and lay plans for the future of the ministry. The Board hopes to complete this study in the next year.

Report of the Executive Director, Church Extension

"My Father is always at his work to this very day, and I, too,am working." (John 5:17)

"As long as it is day, I must work the works of him who sent me." (John 9:4)

". . .each with his assigned task." (Mark 13:34)

". . . and the Lord worked with them." (Mark 16:20)

"For we are God's fellow workers. . . . " (I Corinthians 3:9)

"[God] has empowered[man] to . . . rejoice in his labor." (Ecclesiastes 3:22)

God the Father is at work in the world today, choosing and calling people to Himself — to be His people, to become His Church. God the Son, Jesus Christ, after working redemption is at work in the world, building His Church. God the Holy Spirit is at work in the world convicting people, turning their hearts, imparting spiritual life to them and calling and gifting missionaries, evangelists and pastor-teachers to be His workers in planting churches and building disciples toward maturity.

We are privileged to be workers in the worldwide project of evangelism and church building. And it is hard work. The first century church planter, Paul, documents the difficulty and fatigue of this work in repeated statements: "To this end I labor, struggling with all his energy which so powerfully works in me" (Colossians 1:29). "Surely you remember, brothers, our toil and hardship..." (I Thessalonians 2:9). "... we worked night and day, laboring and toiling . ." (II Thessalonians 3:8). "I have worked much harder" (II Corinthians 11:23). "I worked harder than all of them; yet not I but the grace of God that was with me" (I Corinthians 15:10).

Late twentieth century church planters, including those who serve on our behalf, likewise labor arduously to make disciples and establish churches. All too often, that effort is mixed with disappointment and discouragement, as people fail, plans and hopes die unfulfilled, hearts prove hard and commitments come up short. But the heroic, indefatigable and sometimes lonely laborers press on to "do the work of an evangelist", (II Timothy 4:5). They do not lose sight of the goal — to make and baptize disciples (Matthew 28:19) and to "present everyone perfect in Christ", (Colossians 1:28). They know that perfection or maturity can happen only in a body that is "joined and held together by every supporting ligament", (Ephesians 4:16); their goal must include the establishment of the church. "Evangelism" without the church is incomplete, truncated, unbiblical and unthinkable.

By obedience, through faith, these men of God storm "the gates of Hades" (Matthew 16:18), bind and loose on earth (v. 19), "demolish strongholds" (II Corinthians 10:4), conquer kingdoms, gain what was promised (Hebrews 11:33) and plant the church where it did not exist before. And they are helped by fellow workers (Romans 16:21) who stand with them and toil beside them. Some "labor earnestly for them in their prayers" (Colossians 4:12). Many give generously, even sacrificially, of the remuneration of their daily work to provide support for the church planters. In these and other ways, we "have entered into their labor" (John 4:38).

By the gift of His grace and goodness, God, who "has empowered [man] to receive his reward and rejoice in his labor" (Ecclesiastes 5:19), allows His fellow workers to savor success. And this is such a time, when a previously unorganized congregation is chartered as a church and three churches who have fully supported themselves for three years are "graduated" from the Church Extension Department. These "bottom line" achievements of our goal are sweet occasions for rejoicing and thanksgiving.

The congregation at Walnutport first began with tent meetings in 1893. After rather recently suffering some tough blows and a season of decline, the believers at Walnutport in 1984 requested that the Board of Church Extension take the congregation under care as a mission and help it to reorganize as a church. David W. Chappell served first as organizing pastor. After his untimely death in 1988, Larry M. Smith accepted a call to Walnutport. Now, in its 97th year, the Walnutport congregation is "reborn" as a church. On September 12, three elders from among the membership were elected. This Conference is asked to recognize this church and receive it once again into Conference membership.

A number of brothers from outside Walnutport have assisted the congregation in its development. William H. Bartron and Laird F. Stengele have, together with the organizing pastor and Stanley H. Stahler from Walnutport and the Director, comprised the Board of Surrogate Elders. Clair A. Greenzweig, Randall A. Grossman, Philip E. Morrison have also served as "borrowed" elders in the past. The assessment committee for Walnutport has been Robert W. Smock, John W. Trauch, John C. Vandegriff, Jr., and Robert H. Zentz.

The three churches which are graduating are: Mt. Pocono PA, Poughquag NY and Wappingers Falls, NY. It took the three an average of five years to become fully organized as churches and eight years to attain full self-support. All three were started by bi-vocational organizing pastors. The great advantage of beginning as a daughter church is demonstrated by Mt. Pocono, which was able to gain recognition as a church just two years after it began and to achieve full self-support one year later.

Two of our newer missions in New Jersey, at Edison and in Ocean County, having begun public worship through mass telemarketing campaigns, are making outstanding progress. Edison, which launched public worship in April, 1989, is averaging in the 80's at morning worship. Recently Richard B. Ravis joined Pastor Dennis M. Cahill as associate pastor, fully supported by the Edison mission, which is known locally as Christ Community Church — a Bible Fellowship Church. Brother Ravis bears primary responsibility for outreach, discipleship and small group ministries. During the year, the Sunday school and the congregation's three evening house-churches have blossomed and grown steadily, as has the mission's financial base. J. Richard Vroman, who has found employment and moved his family to Edison, serves bi-vocationally as Director of Christian Education. In its first 16 months, the congregation has baptized 16 believers.

In northern Ocean County NJ, after the largest yet of our phone campaigns, public worship was begun at the beautiful Ocean County Boy Scout Council building on April 1, 1990, with over 140 present. Worship attendance is now averaging in the 60's and there are already nine declared committed families on line. Dean A. Stortz is the organizing pastor. Many people from many places helped in the exciting phone campaign. Special participation by three churches should be noted. Community Church of Howell freely opened its facilities as a base for the 15-line phone room and provided hundreds of person-hours on those lines. Faith Church of York PA and

Calvary Church, Sinking Spring PA, have adopted the Ocean County work as a daughter church. This has entailed not only prayer and financial support but also personal involvement. Examples of the latter occurred during the successful summer evening children's Bible school. A crew from York came to help to distribute advance publicity materials and a group of youths from Sinking Spring helped to staff the school. This adoptive daughter church concept provides a fruitful model for abetting the development of new missions in the future.

A wonderful happening during the year has been the merger of Second Kent Baptist Church in New York State with our eight year old Holmes mission to form Faith Bible Fellowship Church. Pastor Robert S. Commerford's willingness to help a struggling church without a pastor was a key to the merger. Our mission at Whaley Lake provided a young congregation of mostly rather new believers with lots of children, without an adequate meeting place. Second Kent brought a somewhat smaller group, mostly older people more mature in the faith, with a spacious building just four miles from Whaley Lake, in a strategic location right at an interchange off Interstate 84, with a larger and denser population. The newly merged group worshipped together for the first time on July 1 and publicly celebrated their union on September 9. Average attendance at worship has climbed from the 40's at the Lake, to the 70's now.

A rich and delightful aspect of this new congregation is that it continues the ministry of two faithful ancient Baptist Churches - First Pawling Baptist, begun in 1754 and Second Kent Baptist, 1844.

Also this year, the Pleasant Valley NY mission, which began as a daughter of Valley Church in Poughquag, has come into the Department, by transfer at the initiative of the Elders at Valley Church. It is located 20 miles north of the Faith BFC building in Holmes. This affiliation was formally acknowledged on January 7, the first Sunday of 1990, when David R. Way was installed as organizing pastor under a call from the Board of Church Extension. Brother Way serves bi-vocationally. Attendances at worship and Sunday school are running nearly double what they were a year ago.

More modest growth is occurring at Somers Point NJ, which appears to be a somewhat more difficult or resistant field. Several new families have begun to attend worship regularly since the springtime. A Bible study group meets weekly in nearby Brigantine, which could become the nucleus for another new mission in the future. Roger L. Reitz serves as pastor at Somers Point and leader of the Brigantine study.

The church at Mt. Pocono was awarded full and clear title to the Kirk-in-the-Woods during the year, by order of the Orphans' Court in Philadelphia. The church also was able to purchase a contiguous lot of about an acre. These acquisitions were celebrated in an inspiring and well attended public service and fellowship luncheon on Sunday, May 6. This vibrant congregation continues its solid growth.

The church at Newark DE has kept on growing and solidifying, despite the outmigration of some key people from the area. William G. Schlonecker is the pastor. If all goes well, the church will "graduate" from the Department a year from now.

Our most distant mission, in Spencer MA, got off to a good start in its public worship last October 22, when over 50 persons assembled. Christopher J. Morrison and Dennis W. Spinney serve bi-vocationally and jointly as organizing pastors at Spencer. Each works a full-time secular job to support his family in a very high cost-of-living area. Brother Morrison was freed in the early weeks to devote his full-time to the work of the ministry, during which time good progress was occurring. When the financial support reserves dwindled and a job opportunity opened, he accepted.

While I do not claim a prophetic gift of foretelling, I think I may have some common sense insight about church planting. A year ago I wrote, "If additional giving is not forthcoming, Chris will need to return to the longer work schedule and have nothing more to give to raising up the baby church in Spencer. This could doom it to failure. The Morrison family urgently needs one or more churches that will adopt them as missionaries, build and maintain close personal communications with them and accept responsibility to help to support them."

For the most part, this support did not develop, though two churches did make some financial commitments as they were able. The budget anticipated \$12,000 for Morrison support; less than half of that was contributed (\$5,737). Brother Morrison has had to take entry level employment, which requires him to put in 55-60 hours per week at work and commuting. The result is that he has very little discretionary time to put into the ministry -- virtually none for outreach -- and so the group has declined significantly. The dire results of which I spoke a year ago may be coming to pass.

Further, Pastor Morrison's position is a temporary one, which could terminate at any time. Should that happen, it is quite likely that the Morrisons' would have to leave Massachusetts, where cost are very high and adequate employment very hard to find.

From the start in Spencer, our plan was to free half of Brother Morrison's time for the work of the ministry. For 1990-91, that will require at least \$13,000 in designated giving. We believe that could provide for a turn-around. We ask the brotherhood to pray earnestly about and for Spencer — that the Lord and His people will provide for this need and/or that a better paying, permanent job closer to home will open up.

Should the Morrisons' have to leave Spencer, it could very likely end the Spencer mission. With that, could perish our hopes for a second mission start in that central New England area and for an eventual cluster of a least three or four congregations in that tri-state region, as we now have in the Mid-Hudson Valley.

Our remaining two missions are in two of the three largest cities within present Bible Fellowship Church territory. In Newark NJ, there was disappointment when our proposal to purchase a larger building, which had been many months in the making, came apart at the hands of the seller.

By virtually every measure, the Newark congregation is stronger than it has ever been. It maintains and expands a vital and credible witness and impact in its needy city. Its members continue to look to the Lord for direction to, and provision of an adequate building suited to its growth.

Our most difficult and distanced cross-cultural church planting ministry ever has focused on Philadelphia and has targeted Southeast Asian peoples in that great metropolitan area. David H. C. Sng has labored diligently and intensively in this work. It has been far from easy. Several young adults from Buddhist backgrounds, who have professed faith in Jesus, have gone out of the city to school, three of them to Pinebrook Junior College. When that happened, their families did not sustain their involvement in the worshiping community, so Lord's Day worship was discontinued. At present, the approach, direction and form of the mission to Southeast Asians are being reassessed.

My service on the Committee to Study Intercultural Ministry has intensified my interest in, and concern for, church planting evangelism among the many distinct people groups who are coming to live in the United States of America. We cannot decline to reach out with the Gospel to these peoples and remain credible disciples of Jesus Christ.

The Lord has been working, and so have we — at His behest and by His power. The Scriptures direct us to "always give yourselves fully to the work of the Lord" (1 Cor.15:58), "bearing fruit in every good work" (Col. 1:10). As we do that in the field of church extension, we are able to say, as we rejoice in our labors, to our new believers and congregations, "Are not you the result of our work in the Lord?" (1 Cor. 9:1).

At this Annual Conference, we have had a wonderful opportunity to rejoice in our labor and to reflect on the results of our work in the Lord. In the next year or two, we may expect similar times of refreshment as the eight missions in the Department and one daughter mission (Pocono, West End) grow and develop. But then, the rejoicing may diminish and the results decrease. This is probable because in the last three years, the Church Extension Department has been able to open only two new missions; and a mere two daughter missions have been started.

We need to recall our WIDER HORIZONS goals that were overwhelmingly adopted in 1983. Have we forgotten them? Are we praying and planning and providing for their accomplishment?

The churches asked the Church Extension Department to start 39 new congregations between the end of 1985 and the end of 2000. With 34 yet to go, we'll need to open over three per year on average. Three of the goal of 16 daughter churches have been begun, leaving 13 more remaining within the next decade.

With these goals before us and a number of our pulpits presently vacant, we can see our need to "ask the Lord of the harvest, therefore, to send out workers into his harvest field" (Matt. 9:38).

To provide for the start of new missions, the Conference agreed on a goal "to double the churches' offerings for church extension as soon as possible" (1983 Yearbook, p. 21). Surely we did not mean then that it take eight years or more to achieve that goal!

During the 1989-90 fiscal year, our churches gave \$21,675 more for extending the church than they did in the previous year. This 16% increase is very encouraging; we are truly grateful.

The \$158,311 that the churches gave this year was still \$40,567, or over 40%, short of that 1983 goal of doubling our offerings. In our first "current" budget, income fell short of maintenance costs by \$22,974 -- a deficit that will have to repaid with interest from future operating budgets.

Last year our organizing pastors received salary increases of merely \$240.00 each -- way below our Annual Conference recommendation. This year they <u>must</u> receive 7% increments, and some need more because they have been so far below the recommended minimum salary package.

We have earnestly asked the churches to consider increasing their church extension contributions at least 10% this year to help to meet these raises. Many of the churches have indicated that they intend to do so.

Meeting these support needs, as part of the cost of maintaining our present ministries, will involve several designated lines in our 1990-91 budget, which are marked with an asterisk. In addition to the need for the Morrison family, noted earlier, these include needs for the Spinney, Stortz and Smith families. Further, the financial report shows that designated support for the Cahill, Commerford and Reitz families fell considerably short of expenses last year. We ask the churches to bear these needs in their minds, hearts and prayers as we work through the coming year.

Then our New Missions Start-Up budgets for this year and next indicate added need for \$56,000 to \$59,000 to start-up to three new missions each year. And those

new congregations, if started this year, will need at least \$34,000 to sustain them in their second year.

To help to tell the story of what our Lord and our church planters are doing and to help in developing more support, we have engaged Carol Z. Snyder as our director of development and communication. In addition to these portfolios, her office will also relieve me of some of the routine business such as mailing, bookkeeping, etc., which will allow me more time for personnel matters (recruitment, staff development, etc.) and strategy and survey work. I believe these will stimulate new church formation and present congregations' growth.

Mrs. Snyder has served for many years at Pinebrook Junior College, most recently as director of admissions. She is presently serving half-time with the development office of the college and will devote her full-time to our Department after Jan. 1, 1991. Her experience at P.J.C. will prove invaluable to her work with us.

Carol is not only my sister in the Lord, but also in our earthly family. Of all living persons, she is my longest standing friend. I look forward to working with her; I know she will make a tremendous impact for good on our work.

Peter F. Drucker has written that efficiency is doing things right and effectiveness is doing the right things. Over the past few years, the Board of Church Extension, particularly in its use of committees, has become more efficient. We are presently involved in an in-depth strategic planning process, which we hope to conclude within 1990 that should make us more effective.

We continue to believe that there are great things for us to do in extending Christ's Church in North America. We have been made aware, for example, of a city of over 40,000 in northern New Jersey that is, as far as we can discern, without a credible evangelical church. And we think that may be more typical than exceptional in the metropolitan area.

We still anticipate planting a church in Beacon, NY and we have many other potential targets in view. Within the past year we have done survey work in Orange and Rensselaer Counties NY, Waterbury CT and Berkshire County MA.

"Commit to the Lord whatever you do, and your plans will succeed" (Prov. 16:3). "May the favor of the Lord our God rest upon us; establish the work of our hands for us -yes, establish the work of our hands", (Psalm 90:17). Amen!

Report of the Board of Directors, BFC Homes, Inc.

The Board of Directors of the Bible Fellowship Church Home Inc., held four regular business meetings, one special meeting and numerous committee meetings during the year. Bert N. Brosius served as Chairman, Robert W. Smock as Vice-Chairman, Robert H. Zentz as Secretary and Charles Hersh as Treasurer.

The Board membership is divided into five committees: Building, Finance, Public Relations, Personnel and Long-Range. James A. Beil served as President of the Bible Fellowship Church Homes, Inc., David J. Smock as Administrator of Fellowship Manor, Craig Porterfield as the Director of Fellowship Home and James Roth as Director of Research and Public Relations.

This past year has been a year of stabilization at Fellowship Manor and Fellowship Home. The financial situation is slowly improving and the employee turnover has also decreased which has resulted in improved employee behavior and positive patient care outcomes. The patient occupancy has been excellent and at times has produced a slight waiting list.

The Board of Directors and the Administration addressed the following major concerns and issues this past year:

- 1. Resolved the property tax exemption issue with the Whitehall Township officials and the Lehigh County solicitors. This issue was settled out of court in our favor and will provide an annual savings of approximately \$45,000.
- 2. Developed preliminary architectural plans to begin the process of implementing the Fellowship Court apartment project. It is the desire of the Board of Directors to begin marketing the Court Apartments in early 1991.
- 3. Developed and implemented various fund raising activities to help maintain the financial viability of Fellowship Community. The results of these activities did not meet goal projections, however the contributions that did materialize helped prevent the need to draw additional monies from our line of credit and assisted in minimizing a negative financial statement.
- 4. The Board of Directors and Administration also studied various management systems to more adequately address the complexity of administering and financing a multiple agency corporation. The Board of Directors unanimously approved to recommend to the 107th Annual Conference a corporate name change, various by-law changes and a transfer of property. These changes will enhance the Bible Fellowship Church Home, Inc. position to negotiate financial issues, and more adequately identify the various ministries of the Church Home. This will provide more efficiencies in managing a growing complex corporation and minimize the legal implication of managing a health care institution to the Bible Fellowship Church.

The Board of Directors and Administration request your support and prayer as we address the following goals for the next year:

- 1. Maintain financial viability
- 2. Initiate fund raising activities to repay our line of credit and to obtain startup money for the Court Apartment project.
 - 3. Complete construction of the Chapel/Convocation area in the Manor.
 - 4. Begin marketing and construction of the Court Apartments.
- 5. Continue to provide a caring, well trained staff to assure that the Bible Fellowship Church tradition is exemplified throughout Fellowship Community.

The Board of Directors wish to express its appreciation to James A. Beil, David

J. Smock, Craig Porterfield and James Roth for their leadership and dedication. We praise God for their steadfast determination and wisdom. The Board of Directors request your faithful and earnest prayers as we seek His guidance in developing strategies to provide new programs, seek new patients and residents and to achieve financial stability. We also request your cooperation and support as we seek financial assistance from the members and friends of the BFC.

This coming year will be a challenging year for Fellowship Community as we begin expanding our services and looking to Him for wisdom and guidance.

The Board of Directors of the Bible Fellowship Church Home recommends the following to be adopted by the 107th Annual Conference:

<u>RESOLVED</u>, that the name be changed from Board of Directors of the Bible Fellowship Church Home to <u>Board of Directors of the Bible Fellowship</u> Church Social Ministries Inc., and further

<u>RESOLVED</u>, that by the rule of exception, this Board be allowed to use this new name effective immediately.

 <u>RESOLVED</u>, that the Board of Directors of Bible Fellowship Church Social Ministries, Inc. be authorized to formulate new By-laws reflecting the new name and to restate the purpose, and, further,

RESOLVED, that the by-laws shall state that the corporation is formed on a non-membership basis.

- RESOLVED, that the Board of Bible Fellowship Church Social Ministries,
 Inc. obtain necessary legal counsel in order to restate the Articles of Incorporation and submit such restatement to the proper Commonwealth authorities.
- WHEREAS, the Board of Directors of Bible Fellowship Church Social Ministries, Inc. (formerly Board of Directors of Bible Fellowship Church Home) has operated and maintained property for many years in order to carry out its purpose(s) and ministry, and

WHEREAS, said Board has never held title to the property, and

<u>WHEREAS</u>, said Board is now engaged in a ministry of care with a 121 bed Skilled Nursing Facility and a 30 bed Personal Care Facility which present the possibility of severe liability suits which can be instituted against the Church as title is now construed, and

WHEREAS, said Board encounters difficulties when arranging financing agreements; therefore be it

<u>RESOLVED</u>, that the Board of Directors of the Bible Fellowship Church is hereby authorized to make a title transfer of the property in the name of Board of Bible Fellowship Church Social Ministries Inc. and, further

<u>RESOLVED</u>, that the By-laws shall contain an article declaring that upon dissolution or termination of the Bible Fellowship Church Social Ministries Corporation, the proceeds of all assets insofar as feasible shall go to the Bible Fellowship Church, and further

RESOLVED, that the <u>Faith & Order</u> be amended at first reading: <u>Board of Directors of the Bible Fellowship Church Social Ministries, Inc.</u>

Election. The Board shall be composed of 13 persons, consisting of the President, a member by virtue of his office, and 12 other persons elected for a term of three years in the following classes:

Class II: Two ministers and two lay persons Class III: Two ministers and two lay persons Class III: Two ministers and two lay persons

Duties.

Independent Auditor's Report

To: Board of Directors, Bible Fellowship Church Home, Inc.

We have audited the accompanying balance sheet of the Bible Fellowship Church Home, Inc. as of June 30, 1990, and the related statement of support, revenue, expenses, and changes in fund balance and statement of cash flows for the year then ended. These financial statements are the responsibility of the Organization's management. Our responsibility is to express an opinion on these financial statements based on our audit.

Except as discussed in the following paragraph, we conducted our audit in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards. Those standards require that we plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements are free of material misstatement. An audit also includes assessing the accounting principles used and significant estimates made by management, as well as evaluating the overall financial statement presentation. We believe that our audit provides a reasonable basis for our opinion.

We were not able to confirm accounts receivable as of June 30, 1990 stated at \$266,612. The receivables were principally due from agencies of the Federal Government and the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania. In addition, we were not able to determine the validity of the accounts through the use of the alternative procedures and we were unable to extend our examination of such receivables beyond the amounts recorded.

In our opinion, except for the effects of such adjustments, if any, as might have been determined to be necessary had we been able to obtain confirmation of accounts receivable, the financial statements referred to in the first paragraphs above present fairly, in all material respects, the financial position of Bible Fellowship Church Home, Inc, as of June 30, 1990 and the results of its operations and its cash flows for the year then ended in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles.

The aforementioned financial statements have been prepared on a going-concern basis which contemplates continuity of operating and realization of assets and liquidation of liabilities in the ordinary course of business. Because of significant operating losses, the Company's ability to continue in existence is dependent upon the attainment of profitable operations and the availability of the necessary funding as may be required in the future. The financial statements do not include any adjustments relating to the recoverability and classification of recorded asset amounts or the amounts and classification of liabilities that might be necessary should the Organization be unable to continue in existence.

Notes to the Financial Statements June 30, 1990

Significant accounting policies followed by Bible Fellowship Church Home, Inc. are described below to enhance the usefulness of the financial statements to the reader:

Note 1 - Accrual Basis

The accompanying financial statements of Bible Fellowship Church Home, Inc. have been prepared on the accrual basis of accounting. The statement of support, revenue, expenses and changes in fund balance presents the results of its activities; it does not purport to present the net income or loss for the period.

To the extent that the general and board funds are used to finance plant assets, the amounts so provided are shown as transfers to the plant fund.

Note 2 - Fund Accounting Concept

To observe limitations and restrictions placed on the use of resources, the accounts are maintained in accordance with the principles of "Fund Accounting". This is the procedure by which resources for various purposes are classified for accounting and reporting purposes into funds that are in accordance with the activities or objectives specified by the Board.

Note 3 - Exempt Status

The Bible Fellowship Church Home, Inc. is exempt from federal income taxes under Section 501(c)3 of the Internal Revenue Code.

Note 4 - Accounts Receivable

Accounts receivable as of June 30, 1990 are shown net of an allowance for doubtful accounts of \$2,658.

Note 5 - Inventory

Inventory consists of food, nursing supplies, office supplies and janitorial items, recorded at cost.

Note 6 - Investments

Investments are carried at market value. Unrealized gains and losses from changes in market value are reported in the statement of support, revenue, expenses and changes in fund balance.

Note 7 - Construction in Progress

Construction in progress as of June 30, 1990 represents amounts expended for development of the land surrounding Fellowship Manor which is the planned site of independent living units, an apartment complex and a personal care facility to be known as Fellowship Community.

Note 8 - Property, Plant and Equipment

Property, plant and equipment are recorded in the plant fund at acquisition cost. Exhaustible property and equipment are depreciated on a straight line basis over their useful lives as follows:

Note 10 - Lease Deposit

The lease deposit figure of \$375,622, as shown on the balance sheet dated June 30, 1990, represents a deposit of the initial operating payment in accordance with the operating agreement between Bible Fellowship Church Home, Inc. and the Bible Fellowship Church, Inc. in the amount of \$588,990 less various adjustments approved by the Boards of the Home and the Church.

Note 11 - Obligation Under Capital Lease

The lease obligation payable represents the present value of the remaining lease payments to Fidelcor Services. The original amount of the liability was \$384,024. The monthly payments of \$6,816 are being amortized at 12.18% over the lease term of seven years.

Note 12 - Due To Bible Fellowship Church, Inc.

The Bible Fellowship Church established credit lines for \$500,000 and \$300,000 with principal balances as of June 30, 1990 of \$488,097 and \$125,000, respectively. These funds were advanced to the Bible Fellowship Church Home, Inc. Accordingly, the Church Home is reporting these as a liability to the Church. In addition, the Church Home has entered into a contract of Suretyship and is a guarantor of the Church's credit lines as discussed in Note 13.

Note 13 - Contingent Liability

Bible Fellowship Church Home, Inc., under a Contract of Suretyship, is a guarantor of the mortgage indebtedness incurred by the Bible Fellowship Church for the construction of Fellowship Manor and development of the surrounding land. The mortgage indebtedness outstanding at June 30, 1990 was \$5,606,006.

In addition, Bible Fellowship Church Home, Inc., under a Contract of Suretyship, is a guarantor of the credit lines of the Bible Fellowship Church which are available in the amount of \$500,000 and \$300,000. The balance outstanding on the credit lines at June 30, 1990 was \$488,097 and \$125,000, respectively.

Note 14 - Restricted Grants

The general fund's restricted grants of \$71,075 is comprised predominantly of the unexpended balance of contributions earmarked for repayment of the credit line.

The Bible Fellowship Church Home, Inc. plans to convert the unfinished area in the basement of Fellowship Manor to a Chapel. Grants restricted for this purpose represent \$21,701 of the plant fund's restricted fund balance. The remainder of \$2,285 is designated for patio improvements.

Note 15 - Prior Period Adjustments

A prior period adjustment was made in the amount of \$81,318 to recognize additional medicare accounts receivable as of June 30, 1989. In addition, a prior period adjustment in the amount of \$17,834 was made to recognize Restrictive Grants as of June 30, 1989. The result is a net prior period adjustment of \$63,484.

Note 16 - Operating Agreement and Rent Expense

The Bible Fellowship Church Home, Inc., has entered into an operating agreement with the Bible Fellowship Church, Inc. dated June 9, 1988, the term of which is from June 1, 1988 to May 31, 1993 and is renewable for any additional length of time, with the consent of both parties. The agreement provides for the Church Home to operate the 120 bed skilled nursing facility (Fellowship Manor) and the 30 bed personal care facility (Fellowship Home). Under the terms of the agreement, the Church Home will pay to the Church, from the revenues of operating the facilities, or other revenues and resources, an amount equal to the debt services on the mortgages and any other debt incurred to construct and operate the subject facilities.

These payments, classified as rent, totaled \$674,967 for the year ended June 30, 1990. Note 17 - Retirement Benefits

Bible Fellowship Church Home, Inc. has a simplified employee pension plan for substantially all of its employees, the cost of which is determined as a percentage of salaries and wages earned. The general policy is to fund costs currently.

Independent Auditor's Report on Other Financial Information

Our audit was conducted for the purpose of forming an opinion on the basic financial statements taken as a whole. The statements of support, revenue and expenses for the Fellowship Manor and Fellowship Home divisions are presented for purposes of additional analysis and are not a required part of the basic financial statements. Such information has been subjected to the auditing procedures applied in the audit of the basic financial statements and, in our opinion, is fairly stated in all material respects in relation to the basic financial statements taken as a whole.

Report of the Board of Directors, Pinebrook Bible Conference

God has entrusted the Bible Fellowship Church with the responsibility of the ministry of the Pinebrook Bible Conference. The Bible Fellowship Church has entrusted me with the privilege and opportunity of making Pinebrook Bible Conference a place of evangelism, discipleship training and Christian fellowship. I have learned in my first year as director that many exciting, thrilling and life-changing experiences take place here during our summer conference and also during the retreat season. Over 12,000 children, teens and adults have been ministered to during this past year.

This has been a year of major improvements to our facilities. Nearly every guest who came on our grounds this spring, summer and fall, voiced appreciation of the beauty of the grounds and buildings. A new modular 24' x 44' home has been constructed to house the permanent staff. Presently, I am living there with my wife. All of this was accomplished through the diligent work and labor of our staff and the help of many hundred hours of donated labor. A special event was our Work Week when many folks came and gave us a great help in some major projects.

A special thank you to those who have committed itself to be a "Friend of Pinebrook." We appreciate and need your prayers. We are also grateful to those who made special gifts and to those who have pledged monthly support.

The Pinebrook Bible Conference board has committed themselves to fiscal responsibility. We are operating under a budget and have hired an experienced bookkeeper to both set-up and maintain an accurate accounting of our finances. These six months cover a period of low income and were administered by three different directors.

Report of the Board of Directors, Pinebrook Junior College

Pinebrook Junior College invites all Bible Fellowship Church members and friends to celebrate its 40 years of service to God and our church. We thank our Lord for those serving Him around the world with training from Berean and Pinebrook. We look forward to growth in effectiveness and in numbers in this educational program to develop the ability of men and women to serve God in ministry and in many other vocations.

During those forty years, the College has caught the attention and rallied the support of some of our people. We have served many students from our churches in these years. We are extremely thankful for the contributions from churches and from the many individuals who are members of our churches. We must find ways of attracting and serving more of our young people; we need increased contributions. We pray that the Joshua's Army Campaign for our 40th Anniversary will promote this. We believe this is possible because of the evident growth and satisfaction of the graduates of the College.

Notes to Financial Statements June 30, 1990

1. Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

Accrual Basis: The financial statements of Pinebrook Junior College have been prepared on the accrual basis except for depreciation accounting as explained in Note 3 to the financial statements. The statement of current funds revenues, expenditures and other changes is a statement of financial activities of current funds related to the current reporting period. It does not support to present, the results of operations or the net income or loss for the period as would a statement of income or a statement of revenues and expenses.

To the extent that current funds are used to finance plant assets, the amount so provided are accounted for as (1) expenditures, in the case of normal replacement of movable equipment and library books: (2) mandatory transfers, in the case of required provisions for debt amortization and interest and equipment renewal and replacement; and (3) transfers of a non-mandatory nature in all other cases.

Fund Accounting: In order to ensure observance of limitations and restrictions placed on the use of the resources available to the College, the accounts of the College are maintained in accordance with the principles of "fund accounting." This is the procedure by which resources for various purposes are classified for accounting and reporting purposes into funds that are in accordance with activities or objectives specified. Separate accounts are maintained for each fund; however, in the accompanying financial statements, funds that have similar characteristics have been

combined into fund groups. Accordingly, all financial transactions have been recorded and reported by fund group.

Within each fund group, fund balances restricted by outside sources are so indicated and are distinguished from unrestricted funds allocated to specific purposes by action of the governing board. Externally restricted funds may only be utilized in accordance with the purposes established by the source of such funds and are in contrast with unrestricted funds over which the governing board retains full control to use in achieving any of its institutional purposes.

Endowment funds are subject to the restrictions of gift instruments requiring in perpetuity that the principal be invested and the income only be utilized. While quasi-endowment funds have been established by the governing board for the same purposes as endowment funds, any portion of quasi-endowment funds may be expended.

All gains and losses arising from the sale, collection, or other disposition of investments and other non-cash assets are accounted for in the fund which owned such assets. Ordinary income derived from investments, receivables, and the like, is accounted for in the fund owning such assets, except for income derived from investments of endowment and similar funds, which income is accounted for in the fund to which it is restricted or, if unrestricted, as revenues in unrestricted current funds.

All other unrestricted revenue is accounted for in the unrestricted current fund. Restricted gifts, grants, appropriations, endowment income, and other restricted resources are accounted for in the appropriate restricted funds. Restricted current funds are reported as revenues and expenditures when expended for current operating purposes.

3. Plant Funds

Physical plant and equipment are stated at cost at date of acquisition or at market value at date of donation in the case of gifts. Depreciation on physical plant and equipment is not recorded. Legal title to all real properties acquired prior to 1987, is in the name of Bible Fellowship Church. Properties acquired after 1986 are in the name of the College.

Going Concern Considerations

The college is currently experiencing low enrollment and operating deficits. If these factors were to continue, the college might not be able to meet its financial obligations when they become due.

Management of the college has initiated a significant fund raising campaign to reduce debt and to fund accumulated deficits. In addition, the college has put in place an admissions program which it believes will increase enrollment to acceptable levels.

Report of the Board of Missions

"Great is the Lord, and highly to be praised; and His greatnessis unsearchable. One generationshall praise Thy works to another, and shall declare Thy mightyacts. On the glorious splendoof Thy majesty and on Thy wonderful works, I will meditate... All Thy works shall give thanks to Thee, O Lord, and Thy godly ones shall bless Thee." Ps. 145:3-5, 10.

In just a few days, we will be celebrating the 100th anniversary of the sending of our first missionary to a country remote from North America. It all started approximately six years after our fellowship of churches began, at the Eleventh Semi-Annual Conference, November 3, 1864. A Committee was formed to formulate a constitution that was to be called "The Home and Heathen Missionary Society of the Evangelical Mennonites." This seems to mark the beginning of the foreign mission endeavor. They carefully drafted a statement of their desires.

"We, as a small branch of the Christian Church, feel in duty bound to render obedience to the precepts of our Lord and Savior, who offered up His life out of love towards us, in order to redeem us from eternal death; since He has commanded His Apostles, as well as all who love Him, to go into all the world, to preach the Gospel to every creature, and to preach repentance and remission of sins among all nations, we, as a small division of the Mennonite Society feel it also our duty to organize a Missionary Society to contribute our mite to the great work of our Lord. May the Lord grant willing hearts and open hands, besides His rich blessing."

About 26 years later, at Annual Conference in 1890, Eusebius Hershey requested and received authorization to go to India. On November 1, 1890, Eusebius Hershey sailed from New York for Liberia. Exactly what transpired to change that commitment from India to Africa we do not know. His daughter wrote, "He had a great desire for Africa all his life." He said, "God is calling, I must go." C. H. Brunner said of Hershey's death in the 1911 Yearbook, "This stirred up the church and the seed commenced to grow and the offerings about doubled each year, for several years until today the Conference supports seventeen missionaries on the field."

In the 1914 Yearbook of the 31 Annual Conference Rev.C.H.Brunner wrote:

" The Conference supports sixteen missionaries in the foreign field, or one missionary abroad to every hundred members at home (1:100). The average contributions for Foreign Missions per member for 1914 was \$4.08."

One hundred years after the sending of our first missionary, we have 91 active missionaries (52 family units), 9 appointees, and 41 applicants. Today we have one active missionary to about every sixty nine members (1:69) and the average contribution to the Board of Missions per member for 1989-90 is approximately \$152.

It might be interesting to note what Ruth A. Tucker in her book <u>From Jerusalem To Irian Jaya</u> published by Academie in 1983, says about the zeal of the Moravians: "Their all-consuming objective was to spread the Gospel to the ends of the earth, a passion that was clearly evident to their proportion of missionaries to lay people. The ratio was 1:60, a noteworthy attainment in comparison to the ratio of 1:5000 in Protestantism as a whole." We have not yet matched this ratio but it is interesting to note that we would need only about 5 more active missionaries to have a ratio of 1:60 and there are appointees who are ready and waiting to be sent in excess of that number.

We want to thank Pastors, Missions Committees, Women's Missionary Societies, and others who have demonstrated their commitment to God's priority of world evangelization and their active involvement. We want to thank you for the privilege of working with you in this noble endeavor and your cooperation with the Board of Missions in so many ways. We also want to thank each one who has given so generously to the missionary outreach of your church through the Board of Missions. Many have done so sacrificially. We continue to make ourselves available to each church to assist them in any way that we can that together we may excel in the work of the Lord.

The Board of Missions met seven times this year and the following update indicates some of the highlights of the year primarily between September 1, 1989 and August 31, 1990.

Missionary Candidates

At our last Annual Conference we reported that we worked with what might have been a record number of applicants, that number being 21 family units representing 35 adults. This past year we have worked with 31 family units representing 53 adults! They progressed through the process as follows (number of adults):

She left for her field of service on August 13, 1990 for a period of about one year.

Short-Terms Completed

John & Judy Nicely completed a one year short term with TEAM at the Christiansen Academy in Rubio, Venezuela where they both taught. They were on active status until September 1, 1990. Joel Bigley completed 3 years as a short term missionary with AIM in Kenya. During this time he married a German nurse name Ingrid. They have returned home to complete their Bible training at John Brown University and then plan to resume a cross-cultural ministry of God's choosing at that time. They will be considered missionaries on furlough until the end of February 1991. In that our statistical report is taken as of August 31, both Nicelys and Bigleys are considered active missionaries in our report.

Report of the Board of Publication and Printing

"My son, keep my words and store up My commandments within you. Keep My commandments and you will live;...Bind them on your fingers; write them on the tablet of your heart."

Since Johannes Gutenberg's invention of printing with moveable type and the printing of the Gutenberg Bible which soon followed, Christianity has been advancing by printing.

The Board of Publication and Printing takes seriously its purpose as being the printing arm of the Bible Fellowship Church.

This past year it resumed the publication of the Fellowship News. Seven issues under the new formate were distributed. The goal for this coming year is one a month. Because of this, the Board is recommending that a \$1 per BFC member be given to offset the cost of the Fellowship News.

The Board also oversaw the production of the 1989 Yearbook. It apologizes for the lateness of the Yearbook and is making some corrective steps for this year. The Thomson-Shore Company from Dexter, Michigan, which specializes in small book, small quantity production will be contracted. Four to six weeks is their turn-around time after receiving the camera-ready copy. They also have submitted to this Board an unbeatable bid. Thus, the Board is recommending that the 1990 Yearbooks cost per copy be \$5.25.

The publishing of the AIDS report will be completed by Annual Conference. The Board is committed to producing new reports and some of the old ones. Churches will be notified of their availability.

The Board recommends the adoption of the following:

<u>RESOLVED</u>, that a contribution of \$250.00 be given to the Board of Publication and Printing from each of the following Boards and Committees: Victory Valley, Missions, Christian Education, Church Extension, Pinebrook Junior College, Pinebrook Bible Conference and BFC Home.

<u>RESOLVED</u>,that \$1.00 per member be given to the Board of Publication and Printing from each church to help underwrite the cost of printing the Fellowship News. Payments to be made to the Business Manager by December 31, 1990.

RESOLVED, that the cost of the 1990 Yearbook be \$5.25 per copy.

<u>WHEREAS</u>, the Board of Publication & Printing believes it should elect a Fellowship News Editor and a Business Manager, therefore be it

The Editor of <u>Fellowship News</u> and the Business Manager of <u>Fellowship News</u> shall be elected by the Board of Publication and Printing for a three year term subject to ratification by Annual Conference. Report of the Board of Victory Valley Camp

The Board of Victory Valley Camp held four regularly scheduled business meetings during the year. In addition to the meetings of the full board many additional hours were spent by individuals of the board in service on committees and in the fulfillment of other camp related responsibilities. The board membership is divided into four standing committees: Program & Staff, Building & Grounds, Development and Finance.

PROGRAM& STAFF

The camp functions under the leadership of Phil Atkins, director, and Donna Bauer as assistant director. Their expertise in oversight of the camp grounds, program and staff, facilitated a camping experience that was Christ centered and fun for hundreds of boys and girls. We rejoice with the many young people who have come into a saving relationship with the Lord Jesus Christ through the ministry of Victory Valley this year. There were 26 professions of faith throughout the summer season. This year inaugurated a follow-up program that will send devotional sheets to be done by all the campers during the off season.

The summer staff was tremendous. This year's staff totaled 51, 32% of which were Bible Fellowship young people. Of the 51 staff members, 30 were returnees from previous years. This provided the camp with a qualified and experienced group of dedicated workers. The wonderful influence of the camp upon the lives of campers can be seen in that 35 of the 51 staff members were former Victory Valley Campers. They ministered to 565 campers with the camp operating at 93% of capacity for the summer.

BUILDING & GROUNDS

This year continued the concentrated effort to restore the beauty and soundness of the camp's facilities. Cabins were painted and refurbished. A new foundation was completed on one cabin with an additional foundation scheduled for another. More bathrooms were remodeled along with exterior beautifications. A concentrated effort is being made to bring the existing facilities up to par. We are grateful that a large portion of budgeted expenditures this year will be for the maintenance of the properties.

DEVELOPMENT

The "Second Wind" project was concluded this year with a total giving of \$19,159. The "Valley Interested People" program continues to grow as more people become committed to the ministry. A "Cans for Camp" program allowed various churches, individuals and youth groups to contribute in a very tangible way. An exciting new plan was implemented which provided an opportunity for family and friends of the staff to become involved in their summer support. The Board is grateful for the continued support of churches and individuals.

FINANCE

A detailed financial statement accompanies this report. Although Victory Valley is operated very frugally, cash flow continues to be a concern. Desiring to provide youngsters with an affordable Christian Camping experience, we will be

raising prices minimally this year by increasing the camper fee \$5.00. We cordially request the churches to evaluate their giving to the camp each year. Any increase in support will be gratefully received and put to good use. Just a reminder that church contributions given in the winter months help the cash flow tremendously. Most of the camp income is generated in the summer months. We appreciate all those churches who can contribute earlier than the March deadline.

Report of the Historical Committee

The Historical Committee meets two times each year to conduct its business.

The Committee continues to pursue projects that will allow us to maintain and appreciate our heritage.

Dr. Harold Shelly continues work on a history that will be published. This project has stretched out over a number of years because of limited time, energy and finances. He continues to make progress though it is impossible to predict a completion to the project.

Work is being done to prepare the minutes of the General Conferences prior to 1990 for publication. These minutes are printed in a periodical known as <u>The Gospel Banner</u>. To our knowledge, they have never been compiled under one cover.

The Committee would like to prepare and publish a series of Sunday School lessons which would introduce members of our church to our history and the issues which have helped to shape us. Report of the Stewardship Council

The Council met four times this past conference year to conduct the business of BFC Stewardship Services.

We give praise and thanks to the Lord for His help in providing the following services to the Bible Fellowship Church.

Stewardship Sunday - was observed on May 20, 1990, by twenty Bible Fellowship Churches. Bulletin inserts were produced for those who ordered them. A new wills brochure, "Willing For Those You Love", was produced and distributed as well. The council has the following recommendation: "That January 27, 1991, be designated by the Annual Conference as Stewardship Sunday."

Mennonite Foundation - the Council has signed a memorandum of understanding with the Mennonite Foundation to use their expertise for management and investment of funds. All monies will be managed as a separate Bible Fellowship Fund. This arrangement will be in effect until such time as our own Bible Fellowship Foundation can become a reality.

Fellowship Manor - the Council helped the Manor to introduce a Deferred Gift Annuity program for its friends and supporters. A brochure was produced and the program was presented to those who attended the Manor's banquets. To date around \$50,000 in D.G.A. income has been received.

Living Stones Newsletter - is being sent to the pastor of each church and to the Living Stone Associates.

DIRECTOR'S REPORT

Deuteronomy 8:11-18, "Be careful that you do not forget the Lord your God...Otherwise, when you eat and are satisfied, when you build fine houses and settle down, and when your herds and flocks grow large and your silver and gold increase and all that you have is multiplied...You may say to yourself, 'My power and the strength of my hands have produced this wealth for me.' But remember the Lord your God, for it is he who gives you the ability to produce wealth."

We are living in an era of unprecedented abundance. We are citizens of a land where overweight people are one tiny indication that we have overindulged ourselves on that abundance. Stewardship education from the perspective that all is the Lord's and must be used wisely for His glory must have top billing in our "flowery beds of ease" culture.

What has the Stewardship Council been doing about this during 1989-90? We have, because of the lack of funding, been using volunteers to do as much as possible.

Rick Volpe has been an invaluable asset to the Council. As a certified financial planning professional, he has helped to set up the Deferred Payment Gift Annuities program for Fellowship Manor. The Council has been using the investment services of the Mennonite Foundation to manage the income from this annuity program.

My services as Director of Stewardship Services have been voluntary as well.

Council indebtedness has been reduced from last year. We praise the Lord for helping us to make the necessary adjustments to do that.

We look forward to doing greater things to promote good Christian stewardship during this next year.

Report of the Committee on Arrangements for 107th Annual Conference

While Moses and the Children of Israel were encamped near the "mountain of God" before their mountain-top experience which resulted in the commandments, Moses' family and father-in-law finally caught up and joined the party. According to the eighteenth chapter of Exodus, Moses and his father-in-law, Jethro, greeted each other in typical mid-eastern fashion at which time Jethro expressed his delight "to hear about all the good things the Lord had done for Israel" in bringing them out of their bondage.

The Scriptures also inform us that Jethro made a major impact on the life of his son-in-law. Jethro observed a flaw in Moses' daily routine and his leadership. Moses was attempting to "do it all", including judging the people from "morning till evening".

Jethro's simple suggestion was to spread the work out by giving some to assistants who would ease Moses' responsibilities and prevent him from burnout.

Apparently, Jethro had a spiritual gift or ability in the area of administration. He observed a deficiency and was capable of producing a positive solution.

The individuals on the Committee on Arrangements, while not all may possess the spiritual gift of administration, have been actively working toward enhancing the efficiency of Annual Conference. Since the Committee's inception four years ago, it has produced an atmosphere in which the chores of Annual Conference can be completed on time and in good fashion.

While this is still being accomplished the Committee recommends that we reevaluate the purpose of Annual Conference in light of its original intent. The Committee is under the conviction that one purpose ought to be the spiritual uplifting of each participant, church and agency. A recommendation appears at the end of this report.

Procedures for Annual Conference

- 1. <u>Purpose of Committee</u> (a reminder): During the 103rd Annual Conference of the Bible Fellowship Church the Chairman of Annual Conference established the Committee on Arrangements for Annual Conference. Our purpose is to oversee the mechanics of Annual Conference, to promote the efficiency of Annual Conference and to assist in the provision of hospitality of Annual Conference.
- 2. <u>Pages</u>: Again this year the Page System will be employed. Mr. Cliff Boone, the 'Head Page' has a team of six or seven individuals who will do their best to assist you. If you need a report, minutes, or would like something distributed to the members of the bar, or need their assistance, signal them by raising your name plaque.
- 3. <u>Lapel Tags & Name Plaques</u>: Both the Lapel Tags and Name Plaques are essential for the operation of Annual Conference. The Lapel Tags will be needed for entrance to meals. The Name Plaques not only are used to call Pages, but also used by the Registrars in keeping attendance.

All members of Annual Conference, Missionaries and those under the care of either the Committee on Ministerial Candidates or Board of Missions are guest of Annual Conference and are entitled to all meals. Others, including wives and children

(except approved kitchen-dining room workers), may purchase meal tickets at the Registrar's Table. The cost of the meals is established by Pinebrook Bible Conference.

- 4. <u>Priority Seating</u>: The Chairman of Annual Conference has the right to establish Priority Seating. If there is a special reason for a Member of Annual Conference to sit at a specific location talk first with the Registrar. He will convey this to the Chairman.
- 5. Reserving Tables: Dining Room tables may be reserved by a representative of any Agency, Board or Committee. This request must be submitted, in writing, to the Registrar no later than the coffee break before the meal. Display Tables, for Fellowship Hall, are at a premium. Contact the Registrar prior to Annual Conference to reserve one. Because of the lack of tables, only Agencies, Boards or Committees may use tables in Fellowship Hall.
- 6. Addressing Annual Conference: Members of the Bar wishing to address the Conference should do so as mandated in the Faith & Order [By-Laws for Annual Conference, Article VI Business Rules of Annual Conference, #3 6]. In summary this states that to speak on an issue one is to rise and respectfully address the Chair. A maximum of ten minutes is given for speaking on any issue. One is not to speak the second time until all others who desire have spoken, then only after asking permission. Please wait until the microphone is brought to you before speaking.
- 7. Show 'n Tell: During most sessions of Annual Conference members of the bar have had either people to introduce (i.e. Missionaries, Delegates, etc.) or items to show. Both have been labeled "Show 'n Tell". There are also many announcements which need to be made. Since it is time consuming and awkward for these requests to be presented and screened by the Chairman of Annual Conference, therefore the Committee of Arrangements is suggesting that all such "Show 'n Tell" and announcements be presented to the Registrar. He will work with the Chairman for their presentation.

Recommendation #1

WHEREAS, the Chairman of Annual Conference has appointed a Committee on Arrangements annually since the 103rd Annual Conference in 1986, and

<u>WHEREAS</u>,the purpose and duties of the Committee on Arrangements are vital to the function of Annual Conference, therefore be it

<u>RESOLVED</u>, that the By-Laws for Annual Conference, Article XI: Annual Conference Boards and Committees (Faith and Order, p. 133ff) include the following under "Committees Appointed by the Chairman:"

<u>Committee on Arrangements</u>. Appointment: The Chairman of Annual Conference shall, prior to the adjournment of Annual Conference, appoint the Committee on Arrangements for the succeeding Annual Conference. Duties.

- The Committee on Arrangements shall oversee the mechanics of Annual Conference.
- 2. It shall promote the efficiency of Annual Conference.

- 3. It shall assist in the provision of hospitality of Annual Conference.
- It shall recommend to Annual Conference the place and time of the next Annual Conference. (SECOND READING)

Recommendation #2

RESOLVED, that the phrase "and of establishment of the place and time of the next Annual Conference." be deleted from Duty #1 of the Committee on Resolutions (Faith and Order, p. 136). (SECOND READING)

Recommendation #3

<u>WHEREAS</u>,it is important that each official delegate and Pastor receive all the reports from the Study Committees, Committees and Agencies and

<u>WHEREAS</u>,in order to coordinate this procedure one distribution point should be employed, therefore be it

<u>RESOLVED</u>, that all Study Committees have their reports to the designated distribution point by August 31st and further,

RESOLVED, that all Committee and Agencies have their reports to the designated distribution point by September 30th

Report of the Committee to Examine the Minutes for 106th Annual Conference

The Committee on Examination of Annual Conference Minutes met on 10 July 1990 at Pinebrook Bible Conference with several assistant secretaries from Annual Conference and on 14 August 1990 at Grace Bible Fellowship Church, Reading, with the Secretary of Annual Conference and one of his assistants to deal with the 106th Annual Conference directive that the Secretary of the 106th Annual Conference and his assistants consult with the Committee on the Examination of Annual Conference Minutes to clarify the following issues: (1) what constitutes the final edition of "the official minutes of the Secretary of Annual Conference"? and (2) what is the responsibility of this committee where the official minutes of the Secretary of Annual Conference may be inaccurate.

The following is a synopsis of our discussion:

- Since the minutes of the Secretary of Annual Conference were handed out in printed form and corrected and approved by the Annual Conference, it is the conclusion, therefore, that these should be considered the official minutes of Annual Conference.
- 2) For the Committee on the Examination of Annual Conference Minutes to correct inaccuracies of the official minutes would fall outside the scope of the purpose of our existence (see page 137, 138 of the <u>Faith and Order</u>, 1986 edition). Inaccuracies in the official minutes can be corrected by the body of Annual Conference but that is not the responsibility of this committee.
- 3) Originally, the approved hand-written minutes of the Secretary of Annual Conference were proof-read and submitted to the printer who would typeset them. After publication, our job was to compare the Secretary's minutes with the Yearbook to find any errors due to the work of the printer. With the advent of our utilization of computer technology at Annual Conference, the Secretary's hand-written minutes are able to be placed into the computer. A printed copy (#1) is given to the Assistant Secretary who examines them and makes any necessary corrections. This corrected copy (#2) is given to the Committee to Monitor Annual Conference Minutes for their examination to see that all motions are properly represented, that all the material is correct, and that the grammar is proper. All changes are entered into the computer and a new copy (#3) is again proof-read not only by the Assistant Secretary but also by the Secretary of Annual Conference. This proofread copy (#4) is then photocopied and given to the body of Annual Conference to be corrected and approved. Those corrections are made and placed into the computer (#5). That same material is then transferred from the computer to the printer by computer disk making for an extremely remote possibility of error so that the corrected minutes and what appears in the Yearbook are essentially identical. The only real possibility for error is if the corrected material at Annual Conference fails to be entered into the computer.

The Committee on Examination of Annual Conference Minutes met on 10 July 1990 and examined the "Official Minutes of the Secretary of Annual Conference" with the Bible Fellowship Yearbook. We found no discrepancies between the two records.

The following resolutions are presented to the 107th Annual Conference:

<u>WHEREAS</u>, the utilization of computer technology at Annual Conference has enabled Annual Conference to have a printed copy of the minutes distributed during Conference proceedings, and

<u>WHEREAS</u>, the printed copy distributed at Annual Conference is corrected and approved on the Conference floor, therefore, be it

RESOLVED, that the corrected and approved printed copy as contained in the Secretary of Annual Conference's notebook be the "Official Minutes of the Secretary of Annual Conference".

WHEREAS, the 106th Annual Conference approved the Conference's proceedings in its entirety and,

<u>WHEREAS</u>, the continued use of computer technology should enable Annual Conference to continue the same procedure, and,

<u>WHEREAS</u>, the use of computer technology makes remote the possibility of error between the official minutes of the Secretary of Annual Conference and the printed <u>Yearbook</u>, and,

<u>WHEREAS</u>, the first two duties of the Committee on Examination of Annual Conference Minutes are therefore no longer necessary (page 137 and 138 Faith and Order, 1986 edition), therefore, be it;

<u>RESOLVED</u>, that the Committee on Examination of Annual Conference Minutes be dissolved and that the related material on page 137 and 138 of the <u>Faith and Order</u>, 1986 edition be deleted (first reading), and be it further;

RESOLVED, that the following be added to Secretary of Annual Conference's duties, page 129 of the Faith and Order, 1986 edition:

He shall compare the Annual Conference proceedings as printed in the BIBLE FELLOWSHIP YEARBOOK with the official minutes of the Secretary of Annual Conference and report in writing to the next Annual Conference any and all discrepancies between these two records. He shall submit to Annual Conference two copies of the BIBLE FELLOWSHIP YEARBOOK certified to contain true and correct copies of the proceedings of the previous Annual Conference. These copies shall be placed in the archives. (First reading)

Report of the Committee to Examine the Minutes of Particular Churches

The Committee on the Examination of the Minutes of Particular Churches met on Tuesday, October 16, 1990, at Pinebrook Bible Conference.

Minutes

The minutes of all congregations of the Bible Fellowship Church were examined by the Committee on the basis of the suggested format for congregational meetings as stated in the By-Laws for Particular Churches found in the 1986 <u>Faith and Order</u>, pages 88-90.

The Committee communicates each September with every church reminding them of the standing rule that "The Pastor shall send a copy of the minutes of all Congregational Meetings, which shall include the Board of Elder's Report, the Membership and Annual Financial Reports and the Valuation of church properties and the Pastor's Statistical Report (PS-3) to:

to arrive by Monday of the week prior to Annual Conference week. The Committee on Examination of Minutes of Particular Churches will forward the material received to the Committee on Statistics" (1989 Yearbook, page 153).

The minutes of the Allentown, PA, Salem Church and the Bangor, PA Church were not on hand to be examined by the Committee on its meeting date. These minutes have been examined at Annual Conference.

The Committee has found the minutes of the churches to be in good order and commends the secretaries and pastors for giving attention to the quality of the recording of the proceedings of Congregational Meetings in the churches. Their fine efforts help facilitate the work of this committee. Omissions and deficiencies in the minutes have been noted in writing and attached to the minutes being returned to the Churches.

Verification of Delegates

Several churches did not supply a separate list of Elders who are serving at the time of Annual Conference. Therefore, it was difficult to verify all the Delegates and Alternate Delegates for this year's Conference.

Petitions

The Committee found the following petitions to the 107th Annual Conference: From the Grace Bible Fellowship Church, Reading, PA:

<u>WHEREAS</u>, the <u>Faith and Order</u> specifically bars men who are divorced and men married to women who are divorced from serving as elders (<u>Faith and</u> Order, pg.45), and

<u>WHEREAS</u>, the <u>Faith and Order</u> does not address the issue of men who are divorced and men married to women who are divorced serving as deacons, and

<u>WHEREAS</u>, the two offices are set forth in Scripture with similar qualifications (I Timothy 3:1-13), and

<u>WHEREAS</u>, Grace Bible Fellowship Church of Reading, PA, faces confusion over this issue in the nomination process for deacons, and does not desire to exceed the intent of the <u>Faith and Order</u> but rather be in submission to our brethren, and

<u>WHEREAS</u>,we want unity in the body of Christ and a biblical practice of church government, therefore, be it

RESOLVED that this congregation appeals to the 1990 Annual Conference to clarify its position on this issue and provide guidelines for its implementation in the particular churches.

From the Calvary Bible Fellowship Church, Finesville, NJ:

<u>WHEREAS</u>, the commitment to a firm stand against the use of alcoholic beverages is a desirable position for the Bible Fellowship Church to maintain, and

WHEREAS, the subject of abstention from the use of alcoholic drinks as a requirement for membership in the Bible Fellowship Church, Section III, Paragraph A, Article X: Harmful Indulgences of the Faith and Order, has been discussed at many sessions of Annual Conference and has proven to be a source of contention among our sister churches of the denomination, and

<u>WHEREAS</u>, the debate on this article has had a polarizing effect on the unity of the body to such a degree that several of the churches would feel it necessary to withdraw from the denomination if this requirement for church membership were removed, and

WHEREAS, it is the desire of the congregation of Calvary Bible Fellowship Church, Finesville, NJ, that the unity of the body be maintained and that the truth of the Word of God be upheld as the church carries out the purpose for which God established her, and

<u>WHEREAS</u>, the Bible teaches that the purpose of the church is to edify the saints (1), to evangelize the world (2), and to worship the Lord in Spirit and in truth (3), therefore be it

RESOLVED that Section III. Paragraph A, Article X: Harmful Indulgences of the Faith and Order, be replaced with the following:

Alcoholic Drinks

The use of alcoholic beverages is one of the most serious social problems in the United States. Its abuse has led to personal and family suffering, serious physical and mental health problems, and increased rates of accidental and criminal injury and death. The financial cost of such beverages and their consequences is a tremendous and unnecessary burden on all of society.

Therefore, no member who uses alcohol, or makes such drinks, or deals in them, shall hold office or serve in a teaching capacity in any part of the church program (4). The Pastors of the Bible Fellowship Church need to strongly and persistently warn

their people of the dangers of alcoholic beverages and urge all of their members and attenders to abstain totally from the use, manufacture and the distribution of them.

- (1) "It was he who gave some to be apostles, some to be prophets, some to be evangelists, and some to be pastors and teachers, to prepare God's people for works of service, so that the body of Christ may be build up..." (NIV, Eph.4:11,12).
- (2) "Therefore go and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit, teaching them to obey everything I have commanded you. And surely I will be with you always, to the very end of the age." (NIV, Matthew 28:19,20).
- (3) "God is spirit, and His worshipers must worship in spirit and in truth." (NIV, John 4:24)
- (4) "Everything is permissible but not everything is beneficial. Everything is permissible but not everything is constructive." (NIV, I Corinthians 10:23).

From the Bible Fellowship Church of Staten Island, Staten Island, NY:

<u>RESOLVED</u>, that the petition to Annual Conference requesting that the Staten Island congregation be placed under the care of the Board of Church Extension be approved. The motion was passed unanimously. (See Resolution)

<u>RESOLVED</u>: That each church pay for their Pastor (s) and wife to attend the 1991 Ministerial Convention of the Bible Fellowship Church.

Study Committee Report - Mandatory Retirement

The 106th Annual Conference of the Bible Fellowship Church, finding no clear mandate in the <u>Faith and Order</u> concerning the eligibility of retired ministers for service on Boards and Committees of Annual Conference, passed legislation establishing a committee to study the question of the retirement of ministers and the place that retired ministers may take in Conference committees. This was accomplished by the following resolution:

<u>WHEREAS</u>there is a mandatory retirement age for ministers serving as pastor of a particular church but there is no clarification of the application of mandatory retirement for either ministers or laymen serving on Annual Conference Boards or Committees.

<u>RESOLVED</u> that the Chairman appoint a Committee of 3 ministers and 3 laymen to study the legitimacy of the mandatory retirement age for ministers, and further

RESOLVED that the committee formulate rules regarding elections based on the results of this study.

The Committee has met and deliberated prayerfully. It now presents the following study to the 107th Annual Conference.

In this paper, we have undertaken to study the Bible's provisions for retirement as well as examples within other churches and in business and industry. It becomes clear in all aspects of our study that Annual Conference needs to reconsider its rules for the retirement of its pastors and for their election to boards and committees.

The Bible and Mandatory Retirement Age

The Bible offers little information about the concept of retirement. In American culture, it is thought to be the golden goal to which all ought to aspire. Those who work hard and invest their money well, can, if all goes well, rest from their labors. In a nutshell, the desire of retirement is to be free from the necessity of working.

In a general way, we can see that God made man to work (Gen. 2: 15). Work is not something to be escaped (2 Thess. 3:10) and is not in itself the result of the curse. It is part of the way in which men and women find joy and satisfaction in life (Ecc. 2:24). Even though work is disagreeable at times because of the curse (Gen 3:17-19), still man finds fulfillment in achieving a living by the sweat of his brow.

The Bible's Attitude About the Aged

Throughout the Bible, it is clear that the aged are held in high regard. The accumulated experience of a person who has lived many years is to be valued and respected. Several passages indicate this quite clearly:

Lev. 19:32 - You shall rise up before the grayheaded, and honor the aged, and you shall revere your God; I am the LORD.

Prov. 16:31 -- A gray head is a crown of glory; it is found in the way of righteousness.

Prov. 20: 29 -- The glory of young men is their strength, and the honor of old men is their gray hair.

The New Testament church called its leaders elders. This terminology was carried into the church from the synagogue. Although the word came to signify spiritual stature rather than age, the word elder implies someone who is older.

Retirement Age in the Bible

The only clear reference to a mandatory retirement age is found in connection with Levitical priests. Num. 8:24-26 states, "This is what applies to the Levites: from twenty-five years old and upward they shall enter to perform service in the work of the tent of meeting. But at the age of fifty years they shall retire from service in the work and not work any more. They may, however, assist their brothers in the tent of meeting, to keep an obligation; but they themselves shall do no work. Thus you shall deal with the Levites concerning their obligations." This mandated retirement at fifty years is mentioned several times in the book of Numbers (4:3, 23, 30, 35, 39, 43). Note, however, that while the retirement age remained constant, the starting age changed (Num 4 -- 30; Num 8 -- 25; 1 Chron. 23:24 -- 20). The reference in 1 Chron. may indicate that the initial age is based on the demands of the work (1 Chron. 23: 25-27 -- For David said, "The LORD God of Israel has given rest to His people, and He dwells in Jerusalem forever. And also, the Levites will no longer need to carry the tabernacle and all its utensils for its service." For by the last words of David the sons of Levi were numbered from twenty years old and upward.). The increase in the overall age span from 20 to 30 years may possibly be an indication of what a strenuous task carrying the Tent of Meeting and its equipment had been. There is no satisfying explanation for the mandatory retirement at fifty years of age, but it appears to be associated with the demands of the work.

Biblical Examples of Service in Old Age

Moses lived to be 120 years old. According to the Scriptures, he was still vigorous and capable of going on (Deut. 34:7). There is no evidence that his capacity for leadership had diminished in any way.

Joshua lived to the age of 110 (Josh. 24:29). His final communications with the people show that his energy levels had not decreased much. The final chapters of Joshua may indicate that he was preparing to retire, but if that is so, it was not for health reasons, but rather because he had finished his task.

Eli, who lived to the age of 98, is presented as a man whose advanced years were a detriment to him (1 Sam. 2:22, 3:2, 4:15, 18). Although his experience and wisdom were helpful to Samuel when the Lord spoke to him in the night, he was unable to do what was needed in his family or in his nation.

Even in Samuel's case, age was a factor. When the people came requesting a king, they cited the old prophet's age as part of the problem (1 Sam. 8:5). Still, the real cause for their request was the incapability of younger men, Samuel's sons, to assume their father's responsibility.

There is also evidence that King David's age became a problem (1 Kings 1:1). The early chapters of 1 Kings describe a paralysis of leadership and the maneuverings of the court to appoint a successor to the aged king. The scheming came to an end only when David decisively appointed Solomon as the king and relinquished his leadership.

Summary

From this Scriptural evidence, we can draw the following conclusions:

- 1. Work is good for man and is to be a significant part of his experience on the earth. The one instance of mandatory retirement appears to be required because of the physical demands of the work. This appears to show us that some types of employment may be unsuitable for older workers. Nevertheless, there is insufficient Biblical evidence to support mandatory retirement at some predetermined age.
- 2. We ought to view people of age as people who can make a valuable contribution because of their wealth of experience. Not only is it foolish to ignore that experience, but removing older people from our work solely on the basis of their age denies us the benefits of their wisdom.
- 3. Each person needs to be considered individually. The undiminished strengths of some are counterbalanced by the decline of others.

Retirement Practices in Other Denominations

The retirement practices of eight other Protestant denominations have been determined.

Of the eight, only two have a mandatory retirement age. Ministers in the United Methodist Church must retire at the age of 70. This is also the mandatory retirement age in the American Lutheran Church, but congregations vote annually on the retention of pastors 65 or older.

The remaining six denominations (American Baptist Church, Church of the Brethren, Evangelical Free Church, General Conference Mennonites, Presbyterian Church in America, United Church of Christ) have no mandatory retirement age. The only differences lie in the treatment of pensions.

Retirement Practices in Business and Industry

For more than a decade, it has become increasingly evident that the application of mandatory retirement, whether at 65, 70, or another arbitrary age, is diminishing. It is neither a real goal of most employees nor a benefit to our economy.

No matter what the retirement age, many of those forced out of work find it necessary to find substitute employment. Whether to fill a void in their daytime schedules or provide additional income in the face of insufficient pensions, these retired but working individuals refuse to give in to a bureaucratic mandate. Most of them end up working for a much smaller income than they would have earned in their former positions.

Even in this situation, though, these workers are the beneficiaries of pension plans and Social Security annuities. Certainly in the latter, and often in the former, they are dependent upon the contributions of younger workers still in an active status. News reports show vividly the effect of the increase in the number of recipients of Social Security benefits. Soon every retired worker in the United States will be supported by two active workers.

For these two reasons, as well as others, Congress passed the Age Discrimination in Employment Amendment of 1986, which eliminated mandatory retirement age provisions in employment regulations. What few exceptions were included in that legislation have been effectively eliminated in the meantime.

This has left employers with a real human resource management problem: confronting and dealing with performance problems. This is because the only valid reason for requiring an employee to retire now is that individual's inability to carry out the job properly.

Thus, the retirement situation in business and industry now is such that employers who abide by the federal standards will need to formulate clear policies concerning performance standards which will apply to all active employees, regardless of age. Employees who are in their advanced years, on the other hand, will need to be conscious of their own performance and be willing to measure it against a realistic standard.

Provision for Committee Membership in Previous Versions of the "Faith and Order"

The current edition of the Faith and Order contains no provision for committee membership on the part of retired ministers. Yet, as recently as 1977, the Faith and Order contained this paragraph:

All retired ministers willing to serve are eligible for election to Boards and Committees (p. 65).

The current form of what is now Article X (p. 132) was introduced at Annual Conference in 1977 and passed on first reading. It was adopted on second reading in 1978. A new paragraph was introduced in 1981, however, and passed on first reading. Constituting an inserted paragraph 4 in the six-paragraph article, it read:

A minister who retires may serve as a minister in any elective or appointed position only until his current term of office is completed. A retired minister may serve in an advisory capacity on any conference board or committee at the request of the particular board or committee (Yearbook, p. 35).

This additional paragraph was never approved on second reading.

Conclusions

Our charge consists of two distinct questions: Is the current mandate of retirement of ministers at age 72 legitimate? Should retired ministers serve on boards and committees of Annual Conference?

The committee does not find sufficient Biblical support for a mandatory retirement age. It does find, however, that an unwillingness of some aging pastors to recognize a decrease in capability and an unwillingness of some churches to call this to the attention of those to whom it applies are the primary justification of such a rule. But, as it was noted in the study of the situation in business and industry, abolishment of an absolute retirement age requires methods by which performance can be monitored, evaluated, and confronted when it is in decline. Our answer to that need is recommendation 1 below.

Similar reasoning leads to the conclusion that it is not necessary to preclude the membership of all retired ministers on committees and boards. Certainly this is not the case with laymen. We therefore offer recommendation 2 concerning this situation, noting that the nomination process offers ample provision for evaluation of the work of any member, lay or clerical, retired or not.

Recommendations

1. The general form of our first recommendation is that mandatory retirement, as expressed in the <u>Faith and Order</u>, be rescinded and replaced by a procedure in which pastors who have reached a specified age must submit to an annual congregational vote on their calls. These changes should be considered together and will be moved as legislation on <u>First Reading</u>. (In the following, material to be deleted is enclosed in brackets ([]) and material to be inserted is printed in boldface.)

Article III (p. 123), para.2 and 4:

Article III: Retirement from the Ministry

Any minister of the Bible Fellowship Church who has attained the age of 65 years or who has completed at least 40 years of eligible service with the Bible Fellowship Church may retire from active service and receive retirement benefits.

[Any minister of the Bible Fellowship Church who has attained the age of 72 years must retire from active service by the end of the month in which he becomes 72 years of age.]

Any minister of the Bible Fellowship Church who has rendered at least 30 years of eligible service to the Bible Fellowship Church, and who has not attained 65 years of age, may retire early from active service, but shall not receive retirement benefits until he has attained 65 years of age.

Any minister of the Bible Fellowship Church who has attained the age of 68 may continue in active service at his current charge if he receives a two-thirds majority of votes on a question of whether to retain him or not. This vote shall be taken by ballot at the next regular congregational meeting following his 68th birthday and each year thereafter. At this meeting, the following question shall be put to the congregation: "Shall we retain our pastor?" When a minister fails to receive a two-thirds majority in this vote, the Board of Elders shall promptly review his status with them.

Years of eligible service shall be calculated beginning with the date of licensing and ending with the effective date of retirement set by the Credentials Committee [, or in the case of mandatory retirement, at the end of the month in which the retiree becomes 72 years of age]. Any years of active service for which the minister has failed to make required payments into the fund shall not be considered eligible service.

Para.5 is unchanged.

Under Legislation Concerning the Retirement Fund (p. 148, amended in 1987: addendum page 6):

VI. Retirement Age.

- A. A minister of the Bible Fellowship Church who has attained the age of sixty-five (65) years may retire from active service.
- [B. A minister must retire at the end of the month in which he attains the age of 72 years.]
- B[C]. A minister who has given 25 years of eligible service to the Bible Fellowship Church may retire from the active ministry prior to age sixty-five (65) but shall not begin to receive an annuity until age sixty-five (65).

Page 170, under Categories of Ministry

- IV. Ordained Ministers in Retirement
- [A. These men draw retirement benefits from the Bible Fellowship Church.
- 1. A minister of the Bible Fellowship Church who has attained the age of 65 years may retire from active service.
- 2. A minister must retire at the end of the month in which he attains the age of 72 years.
- 3. A minister who has given 30 years or more of service to the Bible Fellowship Church may retire from active ministry prior to age 65 and be eligible for an annuity at age 65.]

These are men who have retired under the provisions of Article III: Retirement from the Ministry (pp. 123-24). (FIRST READING)

2. Our second recommendation is that the paragraph concerning board and committee membership by retired ministers which was deleted from the 1977 Faith and Order be reinstated as the fourth paragraph of Article X: General Rules of Elections and Resignations (pp. 132-33):

All retired ministers willing to serve are eligible for election to Boards and Committees. (FIRST READING)

Study Committee Report Inter-Cultural Ministries

I. Introduction

The task committed to the Inter-Cultural Ministries Study committee was to report to the 107th Annual Conference with "observations" and "recommendations" concerning what "positive steps" could be taken "to reach out to the unreached within the target areas of Bible Fellowship Churches to further a ministry of establishing ethnic Bible Fellowship Churches."

After several meetings of confronting the tasks which faced the committee, a Seven Point Outline of Purpose was established to guide our efforts and structure a game plan to accomplish the multi-faceted work involved in dealing with ethnic church planting.

Seven Point Outline of Purpose

- 1. To establish the theological basis for ethnic church planting.
- 2. To study the saturation of America by ethnic and cultural diversity.
- 3. To study the obstacles to ethnic church planting.
- 4. To establish definitions of terms being used by the Committee, in order to better clarify and inform the reader.
- To prepare a brief historical view of the Bible Fellowship Church in regard to its past work in ethnic and cultural ministry.
- To produce a manual to assist the Bible Fellowship Church in ethnic church planting.
- 7. To present a model for ethnic church planting to the Bible Fellowship Churches.

Assignments were given to the committee members in the following areas; the biblical basis for ethnic church planting, the obstacles which confront ethnic church planting, the listing of a "Values List" involved with ethnic church planting and a historical and statistical review of data relevant to ethnic church planting.

During the discussion surrounding the review of the "Historical Paper", there were discovered limitations rising out of seven elements from the cultural development of the Bible Fellowship Church. These elements revealed to the Committee some areas which contributed to the present cultural impoverishment of the Bible Fellowship Church. These seven areas resulted from the ecclesiastical formation of the Church, with its Anabaptist-Mennonite world view being counter to and resistant toward the larger cultural context of the churches.

The Leadership Configuration of the early Bible Fellowship Church fostered a restrictive type of parochialism. The Linguistic Antecedent being the German language and The "Pennsylvania Dutch" Characteristics of the early church limited the desire of the church to reach out to and accept into our churches people from other cultures that differed from ours.

The Early Anti-Education Bias of the church has allowed the Bible Fellowship Church, even today, to suffer from cultural deprivation because of almost a century of "anti-intellectualism."

The Geographic Containment of the Bible Fellowship Church, being limited during the first fifty years of ministry to the agricultural Germanic people of eastern Pennsylvania, laid a foundation for a cultural narrowness.

The Mission Policy of the Bible Fellowship Church throughout the years has been to remain a supporting Board and not the planter of Bible Fellowship Churches in other lands and cultures. While the policy was reasonable and responsible in terms of the economics of mission involvement, it short-circuited the ability of the church and its people to relate to Christian brothers and sisters, and churches among other racial, ethnic, and cultural groups.

In considering these seven points, the committee realized that the Bible Fellowship Church could not go back and undo what has been done, but that it must give itself to the hard work and the "second-mile" effort that will enable the Bible Fellowship Church to transcend these historical limitations.

The work of the Committee continued and after each discussion an ever increasing awareness of the immensity and responsibility of the task involved in ethnic church planting was being sensed by each Committee member. Each discussion opened up new areas of cultural and ethnic nuances which needed to be considered. Statistics had revealed to the Committee that America is a vast mission field. More than 23 million Blacks, 25 million Hispanics, millions of Asians, Eastern European groups and a wide variety of other ethnic people groups are filling up the urban centers of our country and pouring into the newly urbanized suburban areas.

With more than 60 million ethnics in America, speaking over 157 distinct languages, our country is truly a multi-cultural mosaic of opportunity for evangelism and church planting.

The Committee also discussed at length the need to review the <u>Faith and Order</u> in the light of this cultural diversity and the transcendence necessary in order to reach ethnic people groups. A "Values List" was prepared and an example from the list was formulated in order to show the cultural implications to the Standards of Life and Worship. The example chosen was "Marriage."

Another discussion focused on the viability of the Board of Missions and the Board of Church Extension working cooperatively in completing the task of ethnic church planting.

In the following two sections of this report, The Obligations/Opportunities/ and Obstacles involved with ethnic church planting are discussed along with The Conclusions and Solutions Offered to the 107th Annual Conference.

Can the Bible Fellowship Church take up the responsibility to plant churches among ethnic people in America? This is the question which pricked at the minds of the Committee and the question which is yet to be adequately answered either by this report or by the Committee. The Committee, as a whole, believes that the Bible Fellowship Church must attempt the work of ethnic church planting and yet the Committee also realizes that the past year of work was only the genesis of a greater and more specific work which needs to be accomplished in order to begin church planting works among ethnics in our target areas of ministry.

The vision now for ethnic church planting will one day be realistically fulfilled as we will see the fruit of this work so beautifully portrayed in the picture drawn for us by Christ and recorded by the beloved apostle John,

"... I looked, and behold, a great multitude, which no one could count, from every nation and all tribes and peoples and tongues, standing before the

throne and before the Lamb, clothed in white robes, and palm branches were in their hands; and they cry out with a loud voice, saying, "Salvation to our God who sits on the throne, and to the Lamb." (Rev. 7:9-10)

II. The Obligations/ Opportunities/ Obstacles

A. The Obligation to the Task of Ethnic Church Planting.

There is no greater impetus to do ministry than when we reflect upon the Scriptures and hear God challenge us to fulfill his commands and desires. James admonishes the church to be "doers" of the word we have been entrusted with (James 1:22) and Christ labeled the person who carries out the work in action, a "house upon a rock" (Mt. 7:24). If it is true, and we believe it to be that God is pleased and man is blessed when the Biblical mandates are carried out and the examples of righteousness and justice expressed in His word are modeled, then we must say that reaching out to ethnic people from all tribes, tongues, and nations, is pleasing to our God. It is pleasing to Him because Scripture is replete with references and examples of God's desire and command to take the Gospel to all people and establish churches among them, especially those ethnics in our own Jerusalems and Judeas.

The Biblical challenge and responsibility to evangelize people from other cultures begin with God's very first statements about His intention to provide salvation to all the families of the earth.

He said to Abraham and Jacob:

"And I shall bless those who bless you, and the one who curses you I will curse. And in you all the families of the earth shall be blessed" (Gen. 12:3).

"Your descendants shall also be like the dust of the earth, and you shall spread out to the north and to the south; and in you and in your descendants shall all the families of the earth will be blessed: (Gen. 28:14).

In the genealogy of our Lord and His earthly ministry, the inclusion of all people in the plan of salvation is evident.

In Christ's Genealogy, it states:

"and to Salmon was born Boaz by Rahab (Canaanite), and to Boaz was born Obed by Ruth (Moabite); and to Obed, Jesse..." (Mt. 1:5).

To the Syro-Phoenician woman He said:

"And He answered and said, "It is not good to take the children's bread and throw it to the dogs." But she said, "Yes, Lord; but even the dogs feed on the crumbs which fall from the master's table." Then Jesus answered and said to her, "O woman, your faith is great; be it done for you as you wish." And her daughter was healed at once." (Mt. 15:26-28)

The Great Commission to make disciples of all nations and the explosion of the Holy Spirit on the scene at the day of Pentecost, bringing together diverse people from all nations, witnesses to the intention of God's plan including every ethnic group on earth.

"And Jesus came up and spoke to them, saying, "All authority has been given to me in heaven and on earth, Go therefore and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and the Son and the Holy Spirit, teaching them to observe all that I commanded you; and lo, I am with you always, even to the end of the age." (Mt. 28:18-20)

"And how is it that we hear them in our own language to which we were born. Parthians and Medes and Elamites, and residents of Mesopotamia, Judea and Cappadocia, Pontus and Asia, Phyrgia and Pamphylia, Egypt and the districts of Libya around Cyrene, and visitors from Rome, both Jew and Proselytes, Cretans and Arabs...we hear them in our own tongues speaking of the mighty deeds of God." (Acts 2:8-11).

The earliest church at Jerusalem accepted Peter's testimony that the salvation of Cornelius was evidence that God is not partial to one race.

"And as I began to speak, the Holy Spirit fell upon them, just as He did upon us at the beginning. And I remembered the word of the Lord, how He used to say, "John baptized with water, but you shall be baptized with the Holy Spirit." If God therefore gave to them the same gift as He gave to us also after believing in the Lord Jesus Christ, who was I that I could stand in God's way? (Acts 11:15-18)

Further evidence of our Biblical obligation to do ethnic church planting is given in the scriptural model of the Abrahamic Covenant of Promise, the model of the Incarnate Christ, and the model of Paul's Priority of Missions and Church Planting.

With Abram, God did not merely suggest to Abram the idea of leaving his home and family and traveling to another place and people. He commanded Abram to "Go, get thee out of thy country and from thy kindred..." (Gen. 12:1). This movement from Ur to Haran, and then to Canaan, established the most significant cultural trek in all of human history. The following promise in Gen. 12:2-3, "...all peoples on the earth will be blessed through you," hones in on God's desire to save a people from out of all the ethnic groups He has created.

The model of Christ's Incarnation and His earthly ministry is fundamental to a theology of ethnic church planting. The Scriptures tell us that, "the word became flesh and dwelt among us," (Jn. 1:14). The cultural implications of the incarnation demonstrate to us Christ's divine desire to go beyond cultural barriers and take upon Himself the Jewish-Aramaic race, the ethnic habits (eating, dress, language), and a total obedience to the Law given to the culture. In this greatest of all enculturational models, we see the precedent for the church to seek to establish churches among ethnic people groups.

Christ worked out this incarnational model during the course of His earthly ministry. He intentionally set up His pulpit in Galilee, where the area was known for the traveling caravans of Gentile foreigners and where the Galilean people were considered to be outcasts from their Judean brothers because of their dealings with foreigners.

In Capernaum, He ministered to a Roman centurion and his family (Mt. 8:5). In Tyre, He ministered to a Syro-Phoenician woman (Mk. 7:26). In Sidon, He healed a deaf man (Mt. 7:32). It was the Samaritan ministry which became the setting for His tremendous dialogue with the woman by the well and later to her people in Sychar (Jn. 4). John Perkins, noted urban missiologist, at a seminar observed that Christ's ministry in Samaria was the greatest example of entering an ethnic (racial) context. Christ's commitment to go to Samaria ended in the establishment of a core of believers (Jn. 4:41.42).

In the Pauline Model of Missionary-Church Planter, we see the apostle who never lost sight that the progression of the Gospel and the fulfillment of the Great Commission was centered in reaching the masses of the Gentile world. From his first missionary journey, Paul set forth the priority of establishing churches among the Gentile ethnic world. This emphasis was declared in his writing to Timothy,

"but the Lord stood with me, and strengthened me, in order that through me the proclamation might be fully accomplished, and that all the gentiles might hear..." (2 Tim. 4:17).

The planting of churches in the first century gentile world provided a foundation for growth in the new church and for edification in the church as a whole. In the book of Acts and some of the Pauline Epistles, we read of the joyous reaction by the corporate body as Paul would tell of the Gentiles receiving Christ and forming churches (Acts 14:27,28; 15:1-31; Gal. 1:23-24).

In the early days, Bible Fellowship Church people sang,

"Out of every kindred and tongue, Redeemed, redeemed this shall be the glad new song, Redeemed, redeemed."

We sang it and meant it. What a joy to anticipate meeting at Jesus' coming men and women from many lands and cultures who are blood bought through His death.

It is easy to apply this only to people from other countries to whom we sent missionaries. The same joy will flow from reaching those whom God brings near us from those lands and cultures.

Although our country has many problems, it has also many opportunities. Those opportunities are the reasons many have moved from their native lands to this land. Despite the opportunities offered in America, there also exist many injustices. There is racism, greed, materialism, and pride. Believers must identify and acknowledge these problems. God calls His people to demonstrate love for people of other backgrounds by sharing in their needs and in undertaking for the oppressed as His people practice justice and mercy (Deut. 10;17-19; Gen. 18:19; James 2:14-17).

We must acknowledge that injustice and oppression exist. We must admit that we have professed faith in Christ, but have not consistently practiced justice and mercy.

These responsibilities and obligations to serve the needy and oppressed are not optional, but are necessary for the people of God (Micah 6:8).

These words from our past give expression to what can come from taking seriously God's Word to us and our circumstances:

"We're pilgrims and strangers below, We've left this vain world with its show; With our Lord by our side, as our Comfort and Guide, Our hearts are contented, our souls all aglow.

"We've entered the great harvest field, Our lives to His service we yield; We have counted the cost, we are seeking the lost, Depending on Jesus, our Strength and our Shield.

With patience we're running the race, And trusting His nev'er failing grace; For Jesus, our Friend, will sustain to the end, And bring us to glory to see His blest face.

O! What a glad meeting 'twill be, When Jesus, our Lord, we shall see; We will praise Him for aye, in that bright fadeless day For what He has done for poor sinners like we.

Out of every kindred and tongue, Redeemed, Redeemed. This shall be the glad new song, Redeemed, Redeemed."

The Biblical statements depicting God's desire to minister among ethnics and the Biblical models demonstrating the recurring work among ethnic groups are sufficient evidence to present the obligation we have, as the church of Jesus Christ, to seek out the ethnic people groups amid our sphere of ministry and form Bible Fellowship churches.

B. The Opportunities in America To Work Among Ethnics!

There is a great movement of the world to the United States. America has the second largest Black population of any country in the world. It has the fourth largest Hispanic population in the world. Chicago is the second largest Polish city in the world and the U.S. has the largest Jewish population in the world.

The Los Angles area is the second largest Spanish center, next to Mexico City (L.A. is now 72% non-anglo American). It is predicted that by the year 2,000, there will be 50 major cities in the U.S. with predominantly ethnic populations.

In America, there are over 1.2 million Native Americans (American Indians) living in over 500 clans and tribes. There are 69,700 Native Americans who live in the six states among which the Bible Fellowship Church is presently distributed. The percentage of Native Americans not active in churches is 92%.

African Americans are a resilient people who have survived many injustices which have been inflicted upon them by different societies during the course of history. Two of the four largest urban concentrations of African Americans in the U.S. lie within the present borders of Bible Fellowship Church territory, the New York-New Jersey Metroplex, with its close to 3 million African Americans and the greater Philadelphia area with close to 1.5 million. Just beyond are Washington D.C. with 1 million and Baltimore with close to 600,000.

Hispanic Americans are comprised of many ethnic sub-groups. The largest is Mexican, then Puerto Rican. Other groups include: Cubans, Central & South Americans, Filipinos and five or six other Hispanic ethnic sub-groups.

Statistics from the 1980 Census reveal that five of the top 10 and 13 of the highest 25 metropolitan statistical area concentrations of Puerto Ricans, outside of Puerto Rico, are in the States in which Bible Fellowship Churches are located. The U.S. is becoming the greatest and most needy Spanish mission field in the world.

Asian Americans from both the Far East and Middle East are making America metropolitan areas their homes. Three of the largest concentrations of Chinese Americans in metropolitan statistical areas are within states served by the Bible Fellowship Church.

The number of Koreans coming to America quadrupled during the seventies. Large numbers of Vietnamese, Laotians, Thais and Cambodians are evident within Bible Fellowship target areas.

Concentrations of Asian Indians are located around New York and New Jersey. Many of these Indians are Hindu. In and around Philadelphia, there are also many Asian Indians.

There are at least 500,000 Iranians in the U.S. and a number of Palestinians live in the eastern U.S.

Euro-Americans have always been prevalent in the U.S. before and after the days of Ellis Island. One of the newest Bible Fellowship Churches in Spencer Ma., is surrounded by many people of French background. In Brooklyn, the French language influence is evident in the 400,000 Haitians living there.

In the Ironbound section of Newark N.J., there is a huge and growing concentration of Portuguese residents. Brother Toto Baran, a member of the Newark Bible Fellowship Church, senses a desire to plant a church among these Portuguese people, but lacks the language skills and finances to do so at this time.

All of these snapshots of the multi-cultural makeup of our country have highlighted the hundreds of ethnic groups in the U.S., most of them represented within the current territory served by the Bible Fellowship Church and most likely some, if not many, present in each community or municipality where our churches are located. The churches are under "obligation" (Rom. 1:14) to identify these groups and see that these peoples are being evangelized.

Our churches now have the "opportunity" to reach the nations of the world right in their own backyards. This is a ripe time in history and the church must respond. In contrast to foreign missions and church planting in other counties, evangelizing the ethnic people within our target areas costs less money and involves less travel and traveling requirements.

The presence of so many differing ethnic groups in America affords the church the added opportunities of edifying its people and re-examining its Standards of Worship and Life and their application in light of Biblical revelation. The Bible Fellowship Church would be edified by the establishment of ethnic works and challenged to take a closer look at how the church's principles of worship and life impact ethnic church planting.

The churches at Antioch and Jerusalem rejoiced in hearing how the Gospel was reaching many different Gentile people and how churches were being planted among them (Acts 14:21). The testimony of God saving a people unto Himself from within the nations of the world stimulates the church's fervor to evangelize and strengthens its walk with the Lord. Paul writes that Christians throughout Macedonia and Achaia "sounded forth" their joy of hearing how many of the Thessalonians were turning from their pagan idols and receiving Christ (1 Thes. 1:7-9). The testimony of a church which seeks out the lost from every tribe and tongue is a tremendous encouragement to its people. Reaching ethnic people in our midst gives the church the opportunity to have its people edified and experience the wonderful joy of meeting exciting people along with the practical understanding of how our Lord can "make the two into one man, thus establishing peace" (Eph. 2:14-15).

This opportunity for the church to evaluate its standards and principles in light of ethnic and cultural differences, is extremely profitable. What values should be part of the life of every believer regardless of his ethnic origin or cultural context? Should our standards be changed in light of these differences? Are there standards we hold that reflect more of a historic culturally shaped tradition rather than a biblical directive? How do we keep from compromising doctrine yet appreciate the culture of our ethnic brothers and sisters? In light of these questions, we develop "value statements" which are culturally transferable in the following areas: Worship, Holiness, Stewardship, Justice, Mercy, Love, Humility, Marriage, Family, Christian Liberty and Servanthood, Materialism and Work, Civil Government. An example of evaluating the standard of "Marriage" was prepared in order to give Annual Conference a model of what may be entailed in reviewing the Standards of Life and Worship. (see Appendix A).

The opportunities involved in ethnic church planting are numerous. The opportunity of reaching ethnics who are well within our ministry target areas confronts us dramatically. The opportunity to expedite our mission thrust in terms of economics and logistics cannot be overlooked. The opportunity to build up our churches through the witness of a church that desires to reach ALL the lost provides practical edification for our people. Finally, the opportunity to evaluate ourselves in light of culture and biblical directives provides the church with the means of developing a clearer view of the absolutes of God's Word.

C. The Obstacles In Inter-Cultural Church Planting

<u>Preliminary Presuppositions</u> God has given "culture" to mankind to demonstrate His power, provide opportunities to bring glory to Himself, and give means for the Gospel to reach culture effectively.

Each culture has areas of beauty, reflecting God's work in the world and also of sin ingrained in its life.

<u>Introductory Statements to the Obstacles!</u> A person's own culture limits his ability to be open and accepting of other cultures. One's own culture becomes the standard for right and wrong, acceptable and unacceptable. It also provides the basis for judging another culture.

"Values" are what one has accepted to be "true or right." It is in this area where cultures clash. Because a person usually lives in a "homogeneous cultural unit," he rarely, if ever, has his values challenged, and is therefore threatened and defensive when another culture calls into question his value. A person usually thinks that the other culture is wrong. In Sherwood Lingenfelter and Marvin Mayer's book, Ministering Cross-Culturally, they list tensions which can arise concerning the basic values of each culture; time orientation / event orientation, dichotomistic thinking/holistic thinking, crisis orientation / non-crisis orientation, task orientation / person orientation, status focus / achievement focus, concealment of vulnerability / willingness to expose vulnerability. An example of one of these tensions is given by the authors in regard to time orientation versus event orientation. They give the example from their experience with the Yap Evangelical Church.

On one particular Sunday, the Senior Pastor and head of the churches of Palua had come to Yap to speak to the local Palauan congregation. Because of the special nature of the service, he was not finished when it came time for the

Yapese service at 11:00. A dear German sister, veteran of 30 years in Yap and Palua, bustled around impatiently at the bottom of the hill until she could contain herself no longer. Abruptly she ordered a Yapese girl to go up and ring the bell... When the Yapese pastor realized what had happened, he was mortified and apologized to the Palauan pastor... saying, "We Yapese don't care when the service begins; we are happy to wait until our Palauan brothers are finished" (Lingenfelter/Mayers, p. 37).

A person feels comfortable with people most like himself. Therefore, the differences posed by other cultures make him feel uncomfortable. The end result is that he usually retreats more defensively and is more closed to the differences.

The cultural context in which a person is raised and lives tends to hinder his ability to look at God's Word in an unbiased way. Because this is true, a less than objective value system and declarations of right and wrong are developed. Obviously, this provides areas of great cultural tension because Christians in each culture believe they are biblically correct.

Color and physical difference heighten cultural close-mindedness and develop a superiority or inferiority approach to other cultures. Sometimes "whys" asked about the differences of other cultures are expressions of superiority and not an attempt at understanding.

Stereotypes and generalizations given to cultural groups thwart honest, objective openness to that cultural group and prevent viewing the people in that cultural group as individuals made in the image of God.

The economic level of a particular person in a cultural group makes the obstacles even harder to overcome.

<u>Looking specifically at Obstacles!</u> We could note that some obstacles fall into perceived and methodological categories.

Since most ethnics live in the city and the city is perceived as a place of evil, many ethnic groups are distrusted and looked upon as inferior.

Another false perception is that America is a "melting pot" where people who come to America eventually become the same. The truth is many ethnics; Black, Hispanic, Asians, etc., desire to retain their cultural uniqueness. Unless one understands that cultural diversity is God-given and that it is through an understanding of diversity that unity is achieved, these unique cultural groups will be viewed as wrong and inferior. It is from this misperception that the ugly head of racism rises.

A final common perception views overseas missions as more important than U.S. based ministry, even if both are ministering to the same people group. This attitude is reflected in the proportion of money and personnel committed to church planting in America.

In the area of methodological obstacles, there is a lack of men and money committed to the task of ethnic church planting here in our target areas. Most efforts in this work are long term and need significant investments by the church and its people.

Developing ethnic leaders is difficult, especially male leadership. They need role models and disciplers from our churches. Some of our requirements for ordination are also problematic. For example, the Bible Fellowship Church policy of requiring a man to serve six months full-time in order to qualify for ordination, could discourage the ethnic leader who must work and minister at the same time. It could

disqualify a man who is called of God, knowledgeable in God's Word, skilled in the culture and trained in effective cultural ministry. His valuable leadership and ministry skills are needed within the Bible Fellowship Church.

Every culture has to wrestle with how it applies the principles of Scripture to its cultural context. We must look at each other's culture and understand the application of Biblical principles as they are practiced within each believer's culture. Therefore, a church's application of a Biblical principle to its own cultural setting does not become the standard for another church's application of that same principle to its differing cultural setting.

Even though the obstacles listed are significant and demand an enormous amount of work in order to overcome, the obligations to do ethnic church planting and the opportunities which God has brought here and now, far outweigh the load of barriers this work faces. The same encouragement which was given in the Great Commission is presented to the church today. We can go in the midst of tremendous obstacles because Christ said,

"Go...and lo I am with you always, even to the end of the age" (Mt. 28:19,20).

III. Offered Solutions and Conclusions

Before offering some solutions which the Committee brings to Annual Conference, the Committee would like to commit itself to a willingness to assist any Bible Fellowship Church who would be willing to attempt to work on an inter-cultural church planting project, or to reach out to ethnics in its area of ministry. The whole-hearted desire and prayer of this Committee is that all Bible Fellowship Churches, and their people, become the World Christians God has called them to be and have a profound commitment to the Great Commission of our Lord and Savior.

Offered Solutions!

- 1. If you are anticipating an ethnic ministry or have contacts with people from a different culture, these following practical helps may assist in your relating to the ethnic person God has led by your way:
- <u>Be Genuine!</u> Be open and honest and respect each other's cultural distinctiveness.
- <u>Understand The Culture Of Another Person!</u> Learn about the current events from the ethnic's country of origin (magazines, news releases, etc.). Ask the ethnic to teach you about his culture. Listen and observe the small nuances of culture (food, dress, schedules, etc.).
- Know The Individual As A Friend! Make a friend, not an acquaintance, or worse, a "target" for evangelism. Establish the right to share your value system by befriending him.
- <u>Understand Possible Sources of Cultural Conflict!</u> Most ethnics have a totally different way of thinking than an anglo-american (non-crisis vs. crisis, event oriented vs. time oriented, person oriented vs. task oriented). The apparent insensitivity of Americans is a problem. In America we say, "You must come over to my house for dinner," and in many cases this even does not take place, it is only a social gesture. But the ethnic looks upon this invitation as the beginning of a relationship and is disappointed if the invitation is not followed through. Time is viewed by the ethnic in a different way. For him time is flexible and long term, especially in forming

relationships. The emphasis is upon events not time. Also, ethnics may be apprehensive to engage in intellectual or theological dialogues because of their lack of communicational skills.

- <u>Terminology!</u> Each culture has "code" words and actions which may mean something different to each person. A careful usage of terms is necessary when dealing with an ethnic person along with a wise use of actions.
- 2. In order for our churches to realize the opportunity each has in the area of ethnic church planting, the Committee suggest that each Bible Fellowship Church do a demographic study of its community, in terms of finding out how many ethnics live in their community and who they are. This could be accomplished through the church's Mission Committee, a Sunday School Class, a Youth Project, etc. The Committee could provide the needed assistance for producing this evaluation. When the surveys are completed, a copy should be submitted to the committee for further considerations and study.
- 3. A review of the Bible Fellowship Church's "Standards of Worship & Life" and its Faith and Order as a whole, as to their cultural relativity and ethnic transcendence would be a positive step toward evangelizing ethnics and including them in the body of Christ without any unnecessary yokes. This work could be accomplished by the Inter-Cultural Committee and sub-committees it would establish throughout the Conference to assist in the review, along with the Board of Missions and the Board of Church Extension in order to complete such an enormous and intricate undertaking.
- 4. If Conference were to allow the Inter-Cultural Committee to continue its work into the next year, the Committee would work toward the formulation of an ethnic church planting "Model." In conjunction with the Board of Missions and the Board of Church Extension, the Committee would seek to establish a model which could become a practical example to our churches of how to go about attempting an ethnic work in their ministry area.
- 5. From this Model and the vast amount of helpful information which has been gathered during this past year's work and that which will come from future work, a "Manual" for ethnic church planting could be produced. Our churches and others could refer to this Manual as they consider and work at ethnic ministry. THEREFORE,

<u>WHEREAS</u>, it has been documented by the Inter-Cultural Ministries Study Committee, as to the Biblical obligation the church has to seek out ethnic groups and establish churches among them; and

<u>WHEREAS</u>, the opportunities for ethnic church planting are well within the target areas of the Bible Fellowship churches, and God has sovereignly brought the nations of the world to our churches; and

WHEREAS, it is the shared opinion of the Inter-Cultural Committee that we must move ahead to develop a model and manual for ethnic church planting, along with a review of the "Standards of Worship and Life" of the Bible Fellowship Church as they compare with the cultural demands involved in ethnic church planting; therefore be it

RESOLVED, that the 107th Annual Conference allow the Inter-Cultural Ministries Study Committee to continue its work on ethnic church planting and report back to the 108th Annual Conference of the Bible Fellowship Church with a report of its progress toward the development of a "Model" and "Manual" for ethnic church planting and its review of the "Standards of Life and Worship" in light of cultural demands; and further

RESOLVED, that each Bible Fellowship Church be encouraged to complete a demographic study of their ministry target area and its opportunity for ethnic ministry among the community into which God has placed it and that the Inter-Cultural Committee assist the churches in accomplishing this task.

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MARRIAGE (AN EXAMPLE OF A VALUES STATEMENT)

Marriage is the joining together of one man and one woman in a union instituted and ordained of God. This state, established by God to meet mankind's deepest and most personal, physical and emotional needs, is holy in God's sight and is to be a permanent bond until death of one partner to the union. For this reason, each marriage partner is commanded to be committed to the other physically, emotionally and sexually and to have no other than their marriage partner. Although God did not specifically condemn polygamy in every instance and sometimes blessed the individuals involved in polygamous relationships in the Old Testament, the biblical norm is one man married to one woman. This is reinforced by the teaching of the New Testament writers and our Lord during His earthly ministry.(1) This intimacy involves mutual rights and mutual obligations in the meeting of each partner's needs. Sexual activity outside the marriage bond by either of the marriage partners is adultery and is an attack on the oneness and permanence of marriage. Because the Bible clearly teaches oneness and permanence of marriage, for a Christian to marry a non-Christian is a clear violation of the Word of God.

However, marriage is not a state commanded by God for every person. One who is unmarried has not sinned or fallen short of God's standard. In fact, the unmarried do not have divided loyalties and may whole-heartedly serve the Lord and His church. The unmarried person must refrain from sexual activity which is given to man and to be expressed only in the marriage union. To be innocent of all sexual activity before marriage is the Biblical standard and those who can control their sexual desires are free to remain unmarried to the glory of God. All sexual activity outside of marriage union is sin in God's eyes and is the only sin people can commit against their own bodies. (2)

Divorce is the breaking of the union and bond of marriage. It is a hated thing in God's eyes and should be avoided and counseled against. The only Biblical ground for divorce is adultery, although a believer is not commanded to divorce a marriage partner who has committed adultery. Divorced persons who were not divorced on biblical grounds must remain in their present state; and, if neither partner has remarried, each must seek reconciliation with the former marriage partner and remain unmarried until God Himself resolves the breakdown of this God-ordained union.(3)

Divorced persons must seek forgiveness and the grace of God for any sin that led to, or is associated with their divorce. It is the church's responsibility to validate the grounds for divorce to preserve the church's purity and guard a believer's integrity.

Footnotes:

- (1) The Committee seeks to avoid giving approval to polygamy; but it also seeks to each people from cultures practicing polygamy how to respond to biblical data which appear to approve polygamy. God appears to make cultural allowances in the unfolding of His truth. Now that we have the entire revealed will of God, God's standards for marriage is one man and one woman. We must work within a culture to bring people to God's truth.
- (2) The Committee inserts this sentence because of Paul's statement in 1 Corinthians 6:18: "All other sins a man commits are outside his body, but he who sins against his own body." Study is still to be done to identify more precisely Paul's meaning in this statement. Because Paul presents marriage as a comprehensive and permanent oneness, a oneness which exits in the believer's relationship to Christ and in marriage, Paul then teaches that the uniqueness of this relationship makes sexual sin the only sin one can commit against one's body. This verse is so significant it must be included in a statement on marriage despite the difficulty in interpretation.
- (3) It is clear to the Committee that God may resolve this breakdown of the marriage union by the death of one partner or the remarriage of one partner. There may be other ways God will resolve broken marriages, but the Committee has not yet identified them.

Note: This "Marriage Values Statement" is merely an example and should not be viewed as a statement for discussion and adoption.
