

- 2. Ensure that teachers are in sympathy with and teach in agreement with the Articles of Faith and Standards of Worship and Life of the Bible Fellowship Church.
- Provide curriculum that is in compliance with the Articles of Faith and Standards of Worship and Life of the Bible Fellowship Church.
- 4. Provide teaching aids, equipment and other resources for the staff that will assist them in their ministry.
- 5. Evaluate the total ministry of the Sunday Bible School periodically in order to encourage the staff and make improvements.
- 6. Provide a program of teacher training and enrichment.
- 7. Keep records as requested by the Board of Elders.

Mercy

Mercy, the unmerited response to human need¹, finds its source and highest expression in God, in Whom justice and mercy meet in perfect harmony². Rather than overlook sin, God showed His mercy most clearly and fully by giving His beloved Son to die in our place³.

God the Father demonstrated His mercy in providing salvation⁴. God the Son became the supreme example of that mercy in offering Himself for our sins⁵. Jesus offered forgiveness to the sinner⁶, acceptance to the rejected⁷, healing to the afflicted⁸, food to the hungry⁹, comfort to the bereaved¹⁰, and life to the dead¹¹.

God's intention is that mercy characterize His people¹². In extending mercy, we should pattern ourselves after our Head, Jesus Christ¹³. The church and its individual members are called to a ministry of mercy-giving¹⁴, which aids in our growth and assurance of salvation¹⁵.

Our ministry of mercy may be limited by our resources, our discernment, and the Word of God¹⁶, but it must never be limited by our bias against any group or individual¹⁷. In all humility, each congregation ought to search itself for the presence of any cultural arrogance, of social or racial prejudice, or of ungodly complacency, all of which will hinder the offering

of mercy. In some cases a congregation will need to repent of its sinful attitudes.

<u>WHEREAS</u>, monies are needed to plant ethnic Bible Fellowship Churches, and

<u>WHEREAS</u>, the Committee believes that God has provided opportunities and desires the church to reach the differing people groups in our land, therefore be it

RESOLVED, that each Pastor and Delegate of Annual Conference work with their church to budget monies for ethnic church planting in this year.

The following legislation was adopted at first reading for placement in the *Faith & Order* in the Appendix entitled "Biblical Principles for Living":

<u>Worship</u>

Worship is response to God, whereby, in love, adoration, confession, thanksgiving, praise, and service God's worth is declared¹. Worship is rooted in reverence for and awe of the Lord and deepens as knowledge of God increases². Worship is the privilege and responsibility of each individual, family, and congregation. For the believer, worship is a life style not limited by location or circumstance.

Worship is the ultimate goal of the church. The mission of the church is to declare God's glory and His salvation to all ethnic groups so that some from all the families of nations shall worship Him³. Corporate worship is the assembled church celebrating the glory of God and ascribing to Him praise and honor. Christ, the head of the church, meets with and strengthens His people, called out from the world by the Holy Spirit⁴.

God declares that He alone is to be worshiped⁵ and tells how He is to be worshiped. For disobeying these instructions and substituting their own form of worship⁶, Israel was severely punished. We therefore seek to learn from the Bible what kinds of worship please the Lord.

Worship in the Old Testament was a celebration of the mighty acts of the Lord, the covenant God of Israel. Corporate worship was highlighted through prescribed ritual: a priesthood, a sacrificial system looking forward to Christ's atonement⁷, and particular times and places when and where worship should occur⁸. This ritual was not made valuable by its repetition⁹. Its value came through heartfelt, thoughtful response to God, uniting the worshipers. Ritual is unacceptable as true worship unless it comes from the heart¹⁰.

Worship in the New Testament is a celebration of the finished work of Christ, His victory over Satan, sin, and death through His own incarnation, death, and resurrection. Jesus claims for Himself authority over temple, Sabbath, sacrifice, and service¹¹. The former place, priesthood, and ritual were set aside¹². The Lord gives His blessing to a new liberty as believers observe a new day, the Lord's Day¹³, and a new ordinance, the Lord's Supper¹⁴.

The descriptions of corporate worship in the New Testament reveal prayer, praise, confession, singing, giving, thanksgiving, teaching, and the ordinances¹⁵. The expression of these may be shaped by the cultural setting of a particular church but must be "orderly" and "decent"¹⁶.

The goal of corporate worship is not entertainment, but rather the glory of God. Worshipers are not to think of themselves as spectators, but rather as active participants in a celebration.

Work And Rest

Human work and rest find their origin in the work and rest, or sabbath, of God¹. The original cycle of God's work and rest at creation sets the pattern for human work and rest². Work and rest are therefore an essential part of God's design for the human race³. Humanity's fall into sin brought a curse upon work and rest, resulting in pain, difficulty, and futility⁴.

Redemption lays the groundwork for the restoration of human work and rest to their place in the original creation⁵. Christians are therefore to engage in work with honesty⁶, diligence⁷, and excellence⁸, seeing their labor as an aspect of worship⁹, service¹⁰, and witness¹¹. Laziness is condemned in Scripture¹², as is poor and dishonest work¹³ and unjust treatment of workers¹⁴.

Christians should do their work both as a service to the Lord¹⁵ and as a calling from God¹⁶, undertake it with dependance on Him¹⁷, and enjoy its fruit as His blessing on their labors¹⁸. Christians who supervise the work of others are responsible to treat them justly and pay them fairly, without threat or intimidation, realizing that they will answer to God for any injustice to those under them¹⁹. Work is given both to supply the worker's needs, and to allow the worker to provide for the needs of others²⁰.

Christians should also observe the sabbath principle in reverence for God²¹, Who mercifully provides a weekly rest for weary workers. The law of Moses also required rest during the three annual feasts, and during the sabbatical and jubilee years²². These establish a precedent for occasional opportunities of extended rest as the Lord provides²³. The sabbath principle is violated when people fail to take proper physical and emotional rest.

Human work and rest will be consummated at the return of Jesus Christ, when He rewards Christians for their labor and invites them into His rest²⁴. In heaven, where the Christian will be

completely free from sin's curse, meaningful work for the Lord and glorious rest in His presence will continue forever²⁵.

Justice

By His nature God is morally perfect and universally righteous. To say that God is just is to affirm the rightness of His law and His faithful and consistent adherence to that law in His judgments¹. Justice is the perfect application of His law in the lives of human beings. Both human law and the application of that law can distort God's justice and therefore be sinful and produce sin. Sin causes human beings to enact and apply laws in ways that are unjust². Because God is just, He abhors the distortions of His law.

In a world of sinful people, injustice results when human beings are judged by such things as color of skin, ethnicity, gender, age, social, economic and occupational status. To place value in such external characteristics is inconsistent with faith in Jesus Christ³. Those who value people in this way are acting out of ungodly cultural biases and sinful pride⁴. In Jesus Christ such wicked and false distinctions are abolished⁵.

Those who value justice will recognize that God's love for humankind knows no racial, national, economic, age, or gender boundaries⁶. The proclamation of the gospel to every person regardless of location or status will be a matter of great priority among those who love justice.⁷.

Those who value justice will seek consistent and upright applications of human law so that no one is denied due process because of sinful distinctions⁸. Those who love justice will seek truth and act with integrity in all relationships.

The quest for justice in a world distorted by sin will often yield imperfect and incomplete results. The people of God who love justice will repent when they recognize their failure to do justice and will renew their efforts to bring justice to those who have been denied it.

Humility

Humility is an attitude of heart and mind perfectly exemplified in the person and life of Christ¹. It characterizes the children of the kingdom², activates the grace of God³, and shapes both the life of the community of faith⁴ and the ministry of the Lord's servants⁵. The opposite of humility is pride which meets divine resistance and anger⁶.

Humility is an acceptance of one's true position in relationship to God⁷, authorities, other believers⁸, society⁹, and the remainder of creation. Its reality is demonstrated in joyful service and appropriate submission such as was seen most clearly in the willing self-sacrifice of Christ.

In the individual Christian, humility recognizes the grace of God which has made each believer to be accepted in Christ. This viewpoint becomes a source of forgiveness and patience within the Christian community¹⁰. The Christian love for others is greatly aided by the development of godly humility.

The unique servant quality of Christian leadership is a direct result of godly humility. Elders of the church do not dominate the congregation but are servants to the whole body¹¹. They do not desire to control, rather they promote the development and enrichment of every member. As heirs of grace together with their brothers and sisters, Christian leaders must renounce the pride which creates divisions and factions¹² based on secondary theological issues¹³, on areas of Christian liberty¹⁴, or merely on personalities¹⁵.

Humility encourages each church to cooperate with others in gospel outreach¹⁶, compels us to seek to meet needs within the local community¹⁷, and causes us to be advocates for those who have none¹⁸. Concern shown for the disadvantaged in our world must be expressed in the church through efforts to promote the growth of the congregation among all kinds of people as well as through the ministry of mercy¹⁹.

Faith & Order Appendix Suggested Bylaws for Mission Organizations in a Particular Church

I. Name -- The name of this organization shall be the __(Name of Organization) of _(Name of Church) __(City, State) __.

- II. Purpose -- The purpose of this Mission Organization shall be to
 - 1. Give diligence to intercessory prayer in behalf of missions
 - 2. Encourage sacrificial giving in behalf of missions
 - 3. Support missionary projects, both domestic and foreign
 - 4. Correspond with missionaries
 - 5. Assist BFC missionaries and missionary appointees
 - 6. Promote spiritual growth among the members of the organization
 - 7. Seek to provide spiritual growth to missionaries in remote areas of the world (e.g. tapes of good messages and music, Christian magazines, etc.)
 - 8. Provide prayer letter reproduction, address maintenance, and mailing services to missionaries where possible
 - 9. (Other purposes can be added or deleted to fit the organization's purposes.)
- III. <u>Membership</u> -- Membership shall be open to Christians of like faith who are interested in missionary work and desire to share in this fellowship.
- IV. Officers -- The suggested officers of the local Mission Organization shall be a President, Vice-President, Secretary, Treasurer, and Corresponding Secretary. Officers that are deemed necessary shall be elected by and from the membership of the organization. No one shall serve as President or Vice President who is not a member of the Bible Fellowship Church.
 - 1. It is suggested that officers be elected annually.
 - 2. The Executive Committee shall be comprised of the elected officers. The pastor should be invited to be an advisory member of the Executive Committee.
 - 3. A vacancy occurring in any office shall be filled by election.

V. Meetings -- The organization shall meet as arranged by the Executive Committee.

VI. Duties of Officers

President

- 1. To bear the responsibility of leadership of the organization.
- 2. To preside at the meetings of the organization and of the Executive Committee.
- 3. To present reports at congregational meetings, if required.

Vice-President



Report of the Credentials Committee

The Credentials Committee held two meetings during the year in the performance of its duties.

During the year the Credentials Committee met with the Elders of Grace Bible Fellowship Church, Nazareth, PA, in fulfillment of their requirement to answer their questions concerning the implementation of the new Article X of the Faith & Order and Annual Conference's denial of their request of the 111th Annual Conference. LeRoy S. Heller and Keith E. Plows attended the NCMAF conference in Washington, D.C., in December.

The Faith & Order questionnaire was sent to each of the ministers holding Ordination Credentials with the Bible Fellowship Church. All of the brethren returned their questionnaire except Ronald C. Hagy. The committee is following up on some reservations that were noted. Because some men had questions concerning their status with the Bible Fellowship Church, a question was added to the Annual Questionnaire that would indicate to the Credentials Committee such concerns by some of the men.

Report of the Board of Directors of the Bible Fellowship Church

The Board of Directors of the Bible Fellowship Church met at two regular meetings to attend to the corporate business related to Annual Conference Agencies and Churches.

The Board provided oversight and advice in areas of fiscal, legal, property acquisition and disposition in the following areas:

Annual Conference: Blue Cross/Blue Shield Medical Plan, Administrative Budget and Board of Pensions.

Agencies: Church Extension, Bible Fellowship Church Homes, Inc., Pinebrook Junior College Property.

Churches: Bayshore, NJ; Emmanuel, Philadelphia; Thompson, CT.

The Directors assisted the Board of Church Extension in acquisition of a parsonage for Bible Fellowship Church, Bayshore, NJ and a loan for Thompson, CT, Church.

The Emmanuel Bible Fellowship Church, Philadelphia, had become incapable of electing Elders and decided that they were unable to continue to function as a Church, October 30, 1994. They requested the Board of Directors to assume responsibility for the properties according to the Miscellaneous Bylaws, #1, para.2.

The sale of Pinebrook Junior College continues to be an urgent matter of prayer. The Board met with a member of the Southern Lehigh Community Housing and Development Corporation at its February meeting. They have discontinued negotiations on an Agreement of Sale because of inability to secure financial backing.

All funds are deposited in the Farmers First Bank, Lititz. Accounts were audited by David T. Allen.

We recommend that the 112th Annual Conference adopt the following:

 That the rate of mileage reimbursement remain at \$.22 per mile.

- 2. That the Administrative Budget for January 1, 1995 to December 31, 1995 be adopted.
- 3. <u>WHEREAS</u>, the "Present Value of Church Property" as stated in the Statistical Report has no standard of calculation and no beneficial purpose; and
 - WHEREAS, the presentation of such values may provide a misleading impression of the worth of the Bible Fellowship Church; therefore be it
 - RESOLVED, that Annual Conference instruct the Statistical
 Committee to delete from its report "Present Value of
 Church Property."

Addendum to the Board of Directors Report Pinebrook Junior College

The program of Pinebrook Junior College closed in 1992, and closure of all matters has taken place except the sale of property used by the College. All student records are available at Office of the Registrar, Nyack College, Nyack, NY 10960.

The 111th Annual Conference established the Board of Higher Education; this Board has supervision of Endowment and Loan Funds formerly held by Pinebrook Junior College.

Because the remaining matters relate only to real estate title to which is held by Bible Fellowship Church, the other funds held by the College have been turned over effective June 30, 1994, to the Board of Directors of Bible Fellowship Church. A statement of accounts as of that date is included with this report.

The college property has been on the market since February, 1992, with Lee E. Boyles of William A. Emmerick, Lansdale, serving as realtor. As of April 18, there have been 123 inquiries, who received information, and showings to 51 different potential purchasers.

Meridian Bank and Quakertown National Bank have allowed payment of interest only on mortgage loans until the end of 1994; at that time some payment on principle was initiated again. There is question about how much longer the banks will be willing for these arrangements. Pray that our Lord will direct and provide in the disposition of the property.

Notes to Financial Statements

1. Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

Accrual Basis

The financial statements of Pinebrook Junior College have been prepared on the accrual basis. The statement of current funds revenues, expenditures and other changes is a statement of financial activities of current funds related to the current reporting period. It does not purport to present the results of operations or the net income or loss for the period as would a statement of income or a statement of revenues and expenses.

To the extent that current funds are used to finance plant assets, the amounts of so provided are accounted for as (1) expenditures, in the case of normal replacement of movable equipmnet nad library books; (2) mandatory transfers, in the case of required provisions for debt amortization and interest and equipment renewal and replacement; and (3) transfers of a non-mandatory nature in all other cases.

Fund Accounting

In order to ensure observance of limitations and restrictions placedon the use of the resources available to the College, the accounts of the College are maintained in accordance with the principles of "fund accounting". This is the procedure by which resources for variou purposes are classified for accounting and reporting purposes into funds that are in accordance with activities or objectives specificed. Separate accounts are maintained for each fund; however, in the accompnaying financial statements, funds that have similar characteristics have been combined into fund groups. Accordingly, all financial transactions have been recorded and reported by fund gourp.

Within each fund group, fund balances restricted by outside sources are so indicated and are distinguished from unrestricted funds allocated to

specific purposes by action of the governing board. Externally restricted funds may only be utilized in accordance with the purposes established by the source of such funds and are in contrast with unrestricted funds over which the governing board retains full control to use in achieving any of its institutional purposes.

Endowment funds are subject to the restrictions of gift instruments requiring in perpeturity that the principal be invested and the income only be utilized. While quasi-endowment funds have been established by the governing board for the same purposes as endowment funds, any portion of quasi-endowment funds may be expended.

Investments

Investments are presented in the financial statements in the aggregate at the lower of cost (amortized, in the case of bonds) or fair market value.

Land, Buildings and Equipment

Land, buildings and equipment are stated at cost or market value at the date of donation in the case of gifts. Depreciation is computed by use of the straight-line method based on estimated useful lives.

Contributions

All contributions, legacies and bequests are considered to be available for unrestricted use unless specifically restricted by the donor.

Other Matters

All gains and losses arising from the sale, collection, or other disposition of investments and other non-cash assets are accounted for in the fund which owned such assets. Ordinary income derived from investments, receivables, and the like, is accounted for in the fund owning such assets, except for income derived from investments of endowment and similar funds, which income is accounted for in the fund to which it is restricted, or, if unrestricted, as revenues in unrestricted current funds.

All other unrestricted revenue is accounted for in the unrestricted current fund. Restricted gifts, grants, appropriations, endowment income, and other restricted resources are accounted for in the appropriate restricted funds. Restricted current funds are reported as revenues and expenditures when expended for current operating purposes.

2. Cash and Investments

The College's cash accounts are maintained by Quakertown National Bank and its investments are maintained by Meridian Bank and Prudential Securities, Inc.

In October 1992, the College negotiated the restructuring of its bank debt as listed above under plant fund. The 9% mortgage payable originally called for fixed monthly intallments of principal and interest through August 1996. This mortgage currently calls for monthly interest-only payments until the College Campus is sold. At that point, all outstanding principal and interest will be due and payable.

The 8.5% note payable originally called for monthly installments of principal and interest that varied due to a floating rate of interest based on the bank's base lending rate plus 1-1/2%. This note was negotiated to reflect an 8.5% fixed rate of interest and currently calls for monthly interest-only payments until the College Campus is sold. At that point, all outstanding principal and interest will be due and payable.

5. Discontinued Operations

In the Fall of 1991, the Board of Directors of the College and the Board of Directors of the Bible Fellowship Church elected to close the College effective June 30, 1992. The College is currently in the process of disposing of all property and equipment. At present, there are still several assets to be sold including the main campus land, buildings and equipment. Management believes that no loss will be sustained upon disposal of the remaining assets of the College.

6. Contingencies

In December 1992, a Joint Committee consisting of selected board members of the College and the Bible Fellowship Church recommended that certain post-terminating payments be made to former employees of the College. The actual payment of these benefits will only be made when the College Campus (owned by the Bible Fellowship Church) is sold and only in the event that proceeds remain after the satisifaction of all outstanding obligations of the College.

The College Campus has not yet been sold and there is substantial uncertainty as to when this will occur and what selling price will be secured.

7. Audit

The accounts of the College were audited by Mary P. Tucker.

Report of the Board of Church Extension

The Board of Church Extension continues to be actively engaged in the ministry of planting and overseeing new Bible Fellowship Churches to the glory of God. The Board met two times since the 111th Annual Conference. We are deeply aware of our dependence upon the Lord for His gracious provision and for His sufficient power. Indeed, Jesus said, "Apart from Me, you can do nothing." Our confidence is that the Lord is the "Builder" of His Church, and He produces fruit that will last for eternity.

We are grateful to God for the men whom He has raised up to be church planters within the Bible Fellowship Church. These men are committed to fulfilling the Great Commission. They have demonstrated great measure of faithfulness and endurance in carrying out their responsibilities. It is easy to overlook the unique challenges they often face in meeting the demands of starting a new ministry, providing for their financial needs, and fulfilling their family responsibilities. Some men continue to work in bi-vocational situations and some wives work as well in order to lessen the burden. These men and their families are worthy of our support, both in prayer and resources. Presently, two of our missions are without organizing pastors - Upper Pocono, PA, (presently dormant) and Walnutport, PA. Two others, Gilbertsville, PA, and Somers Point, NJ, are being served by men who are in the process of becoming licensed by the Bible Fellowship Church.

The Assessment Committee for the Pleasant Valley, NY, Mission has completed its evaluation and the Board is pleased to recommend that the Pleasant Valley, NY, Mission be recognized as a Particular Church at the 112th Annual Conference. Other Assessment Committees continue to work with various missions in evaluation and development.

The Board continues to move forward with "Mission America," a plan adopted to expand our vision of planting new churches, confronting the challenges, and embracing the opportunities of the next five years, (1995-1999). A video is being produced in order to share the vision with pastors and congregations in the year ahead. "Mission America" is a goal-oriented plan, the result of much prayer and planning.

The Board accepted the resignation of Chairman, Dana E. Weller. Dana has served on the Board for twelve years. He resigned in order to become the Assistant Director of the Board of Missions, effective January 2, 1995. The Board expresses deep gratitude to Dana for his valuable service during his tenure. We look forward to working together in the days ahead as the Lord continues to open doors for "ethnic church planting" in cooperation with the Board of Missions.

The Board acknowledges the diligence and leadership of the Executive Director, Daniel G. Ziegler. His vision for the work of church planting, encouragement of the men in the Department, and his consistent oversight of the affairs of this ministry are a great asset. Carol Z. Snyder, Director of Development, continues to do a commendable job of keeping people informed with quality and up-to-date materials.

Report of the Executive Director of the Church Extension Department

JUST THE FACTS, MA'AM

Once upon a time there was a weekly TV program called "Dragnet" (dum-de-dum-dum). It was about two police detectives, Sergeant Joe Friday and his sidekick, who would investigate and solve homicides and other felonies.

In the course of their work, the officers would hunt out people who could provide information that might lead them toward solutions of the crimes. In every episode, they would engage in a conversation with a woman who would begin to tell them what she had seen. Invariably, she would go off on a tangent of hearsay, gossip or opinion. Friday would always stop her with, "Just the facts, ma'am!"

In this opening of my twenty-seventh report to Annual Conference, I want to cite some facts. I shall give "just the facts," but the documentation is available to anyone who will ask for it.

FACT: By any criteria and in most people's estimations, the spiritual climate in the United States is at its lowest ebb in the memory and life of all of us now living.

Strong united commitment to the MISSION AMERICA plan will enable the Bible Fellowship Church to do its share in reaching a pagan nation - one of the world's neediest mission fields.

FACT: In the United States there are multitudes of communities that are under-churched, many totally without a gospel witness.

The MISSION AMERICA plan will direct and enable the Bible Fellowship Church to reach many needy neighborhoods.

FACT: We are seeing an incredible flow of diverse peoples into the US. Within 20-30 years, caucasian English speakers will be a minority of US population.

MISSION AMERICA sets bold goals for planting new ethnic and multi-cultural churches in North America.

FACT: The proportion of people in the US population who identify themselves as born again Christians was the same in 1994 as it was 20 years earlier. Vigorous pursuit of the MISSION AMERICA goals will, by God's grace, enable the BFC to evangelize in a way that will raise that proportion.

FACT: In 30 years (1960-1990) BFC growth (39.2%) was just about exactly the same as total population growth of the US (38.7%). Our efforts at evangelism/church growth did almost nothing to raise the Christian population of our nation.

A serious corporate commitment to MISSION AMERICA will, through faith, allow the BFC to accelerate our growth and do our part to advance the greater Body of Christ in the USA.

FACT: In the US, denominations that are netting new church plants are growing, while those who are not forming new congregations are declining.

MISSION AMERICA sets bold faith goals for new church starts that should, in the providence of God, lead the BFC into wholesome, vigorous growth.

FACT: Regional leaders of the Christian and Missionary Alliance, Conservative Baptist Churches and the Evangelical Free Church state that their denominations have made deliberate decisions to grow by new church planting. The Bible Fellowship Church has not yet come to such a decision.

Wholehearted ownership of the MISSION AMERICA plan will be our commitment to grow by new church formation.

FACT: A survey of over 20,000 churches documents that young and small churches make and baptize up to four times as many disciples of Christ, per capita, as do older and larger churches.

Achievement of MISSION AMERICA goals will give the BFC many little young churches to fuel its growth in future years.

FACT: With few exceptions, churches stop growing or grow more slowly after their first 12 to 15 years of existence than they did earlier.

Through MISSION AMERICA we may have many new, rapidly growing churches between now and the year 2015, should our Lord tarry.

FACT: In the last five years, the BFC has seen five congregations die and only four be born.

If we vigorously reach for our MISSION AMERICA goals, we shall probably still see some congregations die, but the new baby churches will far outnumber them.

FACT: In 21 years (1974-1995) Annual Conference will have recognized that 17 missions have become fully formed and received as particular churches into conference membership - nearly one per year.

The accomplishment by 1999 of the MISSION AMERICA goals should lead to doubling or tripling the rate of new church receptions in the first decade of the twenty-first century.

FACT: In the twelve months of 1994, the churches gave \$4,528 less for church extension than they did in the 1992-93 fiscal year.

If most of the churches take part in seeking to meet the five-year financial support goals, such a decline in support will not happen in the MISSION AMERICA years.

FACT: Gift income for church extension in the last quarter of 1994 was \$84,778 - the highest quarter in our history.

There is a lot of interest in, and excitement about, MISSION AMERICA, which may, at least in part, account for this upsurge in giving. May it be a harbinger of what is to come!

FACT: Bible Fellowship Churches give about three times the financial support for missions that are not part of the BFC ("other missions") than they give for extending our Church by church-planting evangelism.

Proactive five-year financial plans for their church extension offerings will go a long way toward enabling the churches to correct this inequity by 1999.

FACT: The vigorous growing world mission thrust of the BFC will run out of steam and grind to a halt without a growing Church to support it.

MISSION AMERICA will establish those new churches that will create the giving constituency that will support world mission growth.

FACT: The various ministries of the BFC cannot grow and flourish without an enlarging constituency in the denomination.

If we wholeheartedly and faithfully embrace the MISSION AMERICA plan, we should, in the power of the Holy Spirit, bring a host of new believers into the Bible Fellowship Church who will become a giving constituency for our ministries.

FACT: "Two are better than one . . . a cord of three strands is not quickly broken" (Ecclesiastes 4:9, 12).

The MISSION AMERICA plan will launch many more teams of able evangelists and church planters to form clusters of new Bible Fellowship Churches for the glory of God.

This collection of the facts underscores the timeliness and urgency of MISSION AMERICA. It focuses for us what we can accomplish by faith if we set our hearts on it. Now it's time for MISSION AMERICA.

A PRAYER

Sovereign Lord, we have labored hard and long on this plan that we call MISSION AMERICA. We have prayed much for Your mind and have asked for the fullness and guidance of the Holy Spirit. Now we present it to our and Your churches and people.

We recognize that this plan is bold. It will not be easy to achieve. It will take faith and sacrifice and hard work on our part. And we shall need Your grace and power to reach these goals for without You we can do nothing. We confess our utter need of You. We don't want to go through these coming years producing little when You desire to do much through us. May we not lack because we do not ask or do not believe.

We are a needy people in the midst of a needy nation. Father, unite us in mind, purpose, will and work to attempt and accomplish great things for Your sake, O Lord, for You are worthy! Amen

THE WORK GOES ON

This report is being written less than four months after the 111th Annual Conference, as we move from a fall to a spring Conference. There have been, however, some significant developments in the Department since October, which ought to be recounted to the brotherhood.

Pleasant Valley

It is with great satisfaction and delight that we present to this Conference the Pleasant Valley, NY, Bible Fellowship Church for recognition as a particular church and reception into Conference membership.

The mission at Pleasant Valley began public worship in April 1988 as a daughter of Valley Church, Poughquag, NY. In 1990, it came under care of the Board of Church Extension. Pleasant Valley is a textbook example of a successful bivocational church plant. After serving bivocationally for four years, pastor David Way had the opportunity early in 1993 to devote his full time and energy to the Pleasant Valley pastorate. A retrospective look indicates that that was a strategic time, for the development of the congregation progressed rapidly from then on. The timing was providential, precipitated by a downsizing of Brother Way's employer that, through a buy-out, has provided a modest continuing stipend.

A "double assessment" was held at Pleasant Valley on October 29, 30, 1994. The assessors were Robert W. Smock and Robert Zentz of the Board of Church Extension and elders Robert Davies of Bethel Church, Emmaus, PA, and Thomas Ward of Valley Church, Poughquag, NY. Assessments were made of both the committed families and the candidates for eldership.

Assessments are inspiring. The Assessors hear and see how God has worked in and through the young congregation. The members learn new things about the spiritual lives of their brothers and sisters.

The positive impact of an assessment on the new church is demonstrated in an unsolicited letter from two members of Pleasant Valley a few days after the assessment:

Dear Dan:

This "thank you" is extended to you and the Zentz', Smocks and Davies for the encouragement and support you gave us as a fledgling church this past weekend.

Thank you for helping us to take a good look at ourselves and see where we stand, where we're headed and what potentially lies ahead for us in Pleasant Valley BFC. Yes, we're excited about God's work here and how He faithfully supplies every need.

We weren't sure what to expect from this meeting of minds, but the friendship and common bond in Christ removed all fears and blessed our hearts. And thank you for the added singing support during our worship service - even the young people commented on how they liked it.

Thank you all; perhaps we'll meet again - here or there.

P.S. Thank you for what you do, we <u>do</u> pray for you and your work in the Lord.

On Sunday, February 12, Wayne Chadwell and Mark Peterson were installed as elders at Pleasant Valley.

Now, on its seventh birthday, the Pleasant Valley Bible Fellowship Church takes its place among us, fully formed and fully self-supporting. We believe the denomination should expect to contribute \$117,000 in appropriations to establish a church with a bivocational pastor (see MISSION AMERICA plan, Appendix C, page 39). In Pleasant Valley's early stages of development, Valley Church of Poughquag may have contributed a modest amount to the daughter church. In addition, Pleasant Valley received \$1,270 in designated contributions through Church Extension Department - all of this came from sources other than Bible Fellowship Churches. Since this church start cost at least \$117,000, we know then that most of that came from the faithful giving of the members of the young congregations and through the dedication and sacrifice of a committed bivocational church planter.

Thompson

The mission at Thompson, CT, enjoyed a double celebration on Saturday, November 19, 1994, when it dedicated its building, a former bar and restaurant, to the Lord and received its first 26 members.

After twelve years of bivocational ministry, Dennis Spinney began giving his full time to shepherding and organizing the congregation in Thompson as of January 1, 1995. The Board of Church Extension believes that because of the workload at Thompson, and the substantial recent progress of the work and the prospects for future growth and development, now is the strategic time for full-time ministry.

The Thompson congregation carries heavy financial responsibility for the mortgage payments on its building plus heat, utilities and maintenance and the cost of operating its program. It has committed \$100.00 per month to pastor's support in its 1995 budget. We have appealed to the churches to provide support now for the Spinney family and there has been response of about \$600.00 per month in new giving. To provide the full support package, there is still need for \$1800-1900 per month for 1995 and 1996. At the end of these two years, we shall assess the situation as to whether full-time support can continue on, whether a return to part-time, bivocational support will be needed. I beg the churches to join together to meet this strategic need now!

Gilbertsville and Bayshore

Our newest congregations have made good starts. The mission in Gilbertsville (Hope Community Church) is reaching and gathering many into the body. Worship attendance is averaging near 200. A board of surrogate elders for Gilbertsville has been appointed to work with the pastoral staff and the congregation.

In the Aberdeen-Keyport area of New Jersey, Bayshore Bible Fellowship Church had its grand opening on Sunday, November 6, 1994, with 125 in attendance. As seems to be usual with a start through a phone campaign, attendance generally drifts downward from opening day through several months and then settles down. At Bayshore, attendance has "bottomed out" at about 40 and recently begun to climb slowly. It seems as if there is a good basic core group. The mission has an active mailing list of nearly 800 and some interesting outreach plans for spring and early summer. Several adults professed faith in Christ in early February.

Walnutport and Somers Point, Scranton and Staten Island, Edison

The missions at Walnutport and Somers Point are in need of organizing pastors. One of our ministerial candidates, who is nearing the end of his testing program, may fill the need at Somers Point.

The missions at Scranton and Staten Island are progressing. Last year's emphasis on growing the Sunday School produced a 25% increase in average attendance in Scranton. This year, Pastor Roger Reitz is leading an emphasis on evangelism outside the walls of the church building. Last year offerings at Staten Island surpassed budget; there has been a recent encouraging increase in numbers involved in the Awana program.

Christ Community Church in Edison has done some redistributing of leadership work to free Associate Pastor Rick Ravis for more time in evangelism and discipleship. Small groups are doing well and worship attendance has increased recently.

Mission America

We are pleased to introduce our MISSION AMERICA video at this Conference. We are giving a copy to each church requesting that it be shown to all of your people if possible. We have revised the MISSION AMERICA plan, taking into consideration the comments and suggestions that we received in response to the earlier draft. The five-year plan has been moved back one year, covering 1995-1999. Copies are available at the MISSION AMERICA display table here at Conference.

During 1995 and 1996 I hope to meet with the key and/or final decision makers in the budget processes of most of the churches. I hope each church will give me an opportunity to talk about support needs for MISSION AMERICA. I shall plan to come with a specific proposal for a five-year financial plan for each church's support for the Department - specifically tailored for each congregation. I believe it is possible for a church in a relatively painless way, over a five to ten year span, to bring its support up to or near the five percent of total offerings that are needed for a credible church extension program in our needy nation. I am eager to show this to each church.

I doubt that I could get to all the churches in 1995. I should like, therefore, to met this year with folks from churches that are open to consider ways to increase support. Please contact me if your church is open - or I'll call you to seek an appointment. I'll try to get to the less open or later opening churches next year.

Exciting new churches, expanding Gospel impact on needy pagan America, endearing ethnic congregations, encouraging growth can be ours if we can believe it, if we will ask God for it, if we will plan for it. That's what MISSION AMERICA is all about. And now it's time for MISSION AMERICA.

Report of the Board of Missions

"Do you not know? Have you not heard? The everlasting God, the Lord, the creator of the ends of the earth does not become weary or tired. His understanding is inscrutable. He gives strength to the weary, and to him who lacks might He increases power. Though youth grow weary and tired, and vigorous young men stumble badly, yet those who wait for the Lord will gain new strength; they will mount up with wings like eagles, they will run and not get tired, they will walk and not become weary." Is.40:28-31

Again and again our missionaries are reminding us that we are in a spiritual warfare. The attack of the enemy has been unabating. The attacks indeed are severe. Circumstances are trying. Immediate support and encouragement from those around us are many times lacking. Victory is humanly impossible. The way out of our dark tunnel is sometimes very obscure. Financial pressures are on every hand. Physical health and strength is sometimes lacking. Doesn't the Lord see our dilemma? Sometimes the human element of discouragement and even despondency sets in.

We have sensed all of these elements in the lives of our missionary family and we are reminded again of our responsibility to uphold our missionaries in prayer and to encourage them in the Lord. The everlasting God, the creator of the ends of the earth, is OUR God and Savior and He knows our circumstances. He DOES see. He HAS heard. We again take courage in the Word from our Lord, "...yet those who wait for the Lord will gain new strength; they will mount up with wings like eagles, they will run and not get tired, they will walk and not become weary."

During this short year from September 1 through December 31, 1994 the Board met two times to carry out its responsibilities. We are thankful and praise the Lord that even during this short year period four family units of five adults were able to leave for their field of ministry (Getter, Nicely, Sears, John Zimmerman). In addition to these, Donn and Julie Stengele who are already working in India, changed status from applicants to Professional Associates. They are employed by Kodaikanal International School where they are also involved in ministry opportunities.

During this time span, we have four singles who have begun the application process. Olive Rawn has also changed her status from

active to retired. We are grateful for the additional years that the Lord has enabled her to serve in Zaire.

At the beginning of 1994, this Board contacted pastors to invite them to one of the small group meetings to be held in 9 different geographical locations on 11 different dates. Sixty-seven pastors attended representing 45 churches and about 95% of our BFC membership. The major emphasis of the small group meetings was to share a proposed strategy to deal with the tremendous growth that the BFC has experienced in recent years in the area of world evangelization - for which we give glory to God. The basic strategy was to increase the Board administration from two full-time positions to three with the assistance of some part-time workers. A job description for each full-time and part-time position was presented. Input was sought from our pastors regarding this step of faith. The response from our pastors to the concept was overwhelmingly in favor with a concern as to the financing of this position.

After further discussion by the Board, it was decided to proceed with the strategy, in faith believing that this was the will of the Lord and with His guidance He would also give His provision. Names were submitted by pastors for the job description presented. Other names were brought to our attention. A search committee was formed and the search began. Various persons were contacted, resumes submitted, and several interviews followed. Dana E. Weller was selected and called by this Board to serve as Assistant Director beginning January 1, 1995. We thank the Lord for His guidance throughout this search process.

We would appreciate it very much if each pastor and delegate would present the need to fund this position to the appropriate committee or Board and prayerfully consider supporting this position or increasing undesignated giving.

Recommendations to the 112th Annual Conference

Recommendation Number 1

RESOLVED, that we delete the material in the Faith & Order pp. 153 through 157:

From - A. <u>Board of Missions</u> — Purpose through I. Contributions

Recommendation Number 2

RESOLVED, that the following be approved as FIRST READING and replace the present materials on the Board of Missions in the *Faith & Order*, pp. 153 - 157:

THE BOARD OF MISSIONS

A. Purpose

The Board of Missions is delegated by Annual Conference to direct and promote the missions program of the Bible Fellowship Church, and to select, oversee, and care for its missionaries who serve in foreign countries and in the United States of America in ministries other than Bible Fellowship Churches and Agencies, except where cooperative ventures in cross-cultural church planting have been developed with the Board of Church Extension.

B. Composition

The Board of Missions shall be composed of eleven men; namely, the Director, the Business Manager, the Financial Secretary, four ordained ministers and four laymen.

C. Election

The Director, the Business Manager, and the Financial Secretary shall each be elected for a term of three years by the Board of Missions subject to ratification by the Annual Conference. The election of these officers shall be in such a manner that their respective terms shall not expire at the same time.

Four ordained ministers and four laymen shall be elected by Annual Conference for terms of three years in the following classes:

- I. One minister and one layman
- II. Two ministers and one layman
- III. One minister and two laymen

The Chairman and Vice-Chairman of the Board of Missions shall be elected annually by and from the Board of Missions at its organizational meeting. The Chairman, the Director, the Business Manager, and the Financial Secretary shall comprise the Executive Committee of the Board of Missions.

D. Duties of the Board of Missions

- 1. To formulate objectives and policies for the missions program of the Bible Fellowship Church.
- 2. To interview and examine all prospective candidates for

- missionary service and to make decisions pertaining to approval and support of individuals who are committed to, and endeavor to obey, the *Faith & Order* of the Bible Fellowship Church.
- To exercise oversight and spiritual care of the missionaries and appointees serving under the direction of the Board of Missions in cooperation with the particular church and sending agency.
- 4. To maintain, within the missions program of the Bible Fellowship Church, standards compatible with the *Faith & Order* of the Bible Fellowship Church.
- 5. To supervise and care for financial and administrative matters pertaining to the Board of Missions.
- 6. To promote interest and involvement in missions in conjunction with the particular churches (e.g., assisting missionary committees and missionary organizations within the local church).
- 7. To submit a written report to Annual Conference.
- 8. To appoint committees as needed for Regional and Conference-Wide missionary meetings and/or events.

E. Duties of the Chairman of the Board of Missions

He shall be responsible to convene and preside over meetings and to initiate implementation of policies and decisions made by the Board of Missions and to carry out the responsibilities as outlined in the Policy Handbook of this Board.

F. Duties of the Vice-Chairman of the Board of Missions

He shall fulfill the duties of the Chairman in the absence of the Chairman.

G. Duties of the Director of the Board of Missions

He shall be responsible under the supervision of the Board of Missions for the development of vision, strategy and mobilization for world evangelization among Bible Fellowship Churches and their constituencies and to carry out the responsibilities as outlined in the Policy Handbook of this Board.

H. Duties of the Business Manager of the Board of Missions

Under the Director, he shall be responsible for the administrative details involved in carrying out the responsibilities of the Board of Missions as outlined in the Policy Handbook of this Board.

I. Duties of the Financial Secretary of the Board of Missions

Under the Director, he shall be responsible for overseeing monies received, disbursed, and invested, and to circulate appropriate statements and other reports as directed by the Board of Missions.

J. Contributions

All financial contributions shall be made payable to "BFC Board of Missions" and sent to the Board of Missions.

Recommendation Number 3

RESOLVED, that the material in the Faith & Order, pages 96 to 99 under the sections entitled, "Constitution of the Women's Missionary Society", "Regional Programs", and "Conference-Wide Programs", be deleted and replaced by the following statements (FIRST READING):

Mission Organizations

Each Particular Church is encouraged to establish organizations that will promote, and assist in the carrying out its task of world evangelization. Organizations so established are encouraged to inform the Board of Missions of their officers in order that information can be circulated to and coordinated with similar organizations from other Particular Churches. Suggested by-laws for such organizations are available in the appendices.

Regional Mission Organization Programs

The Board of Missions shall coordinate regional programs as deemed advisable. (This sentence was approved at SECOND READING at the 111th Annual Conference.)

Conference-Wide Mission Organization Programs

The Board of Missions shall coordinate Conference-Wide mission meetings and events as deemed advisable. Committees to promote such programs shall be appointed by the Board of Missions.

Recommendation Number 4

RESOLVED, that the following "Suggested Bylaws for Mission Organizations in a Particular Church" be approved for placement in the Appendices of the Faith & Order.

Faith & Order Appendix

Suggested Bylaws for Mission Organizations in a Particular Church

- I. Name -- The name of this organization shall be the (Name of Organization) of (Name of Church) (City, State)
- II. Purpose -- The purpose of this Mission Organization shall be to
 - 1. Give diligence to intercessory prayer in behalf of missions
 - 2. Encourage sacrificial giving in behalf of missions
 - 3. Support missionary projects, both domestic and foreign
 - 4. Correspond with missionaries
 - 5. Assist BFC missionaries and missionary appointees
 - 6. Promote spiritual growth among the members of the organization
 - 7. Seek to provide spiritual growth to missionaries in remote areas of the world (e.g. tapes of good messages and music, Christian magazines, etc.)
 - 8. Provide prayer letter reproduction, address maintenance, and

- mailing services to missionaries where possible
- 9. (Other purposes can be added or deleted to fit the organization's purposes.)
- III. <u>Membership</u> -- Membership shall be open to Christians of like faith who are interested in missionary work and desire to share in this fellowship.
- IV. Officers -- The suggested officers of the local Mission Organization shall be a President, Vice-President, Secretary, Treasurer, and Corresponding Secretary. Officers that are deemed necessary shall be elected by and from the membership of the organization. No one shall serve as President or Vice President who is not a member of the Bible Fellowship Church.
 - 1. It is suggested that officers be elected annually.
 - The Executive Committee shall be comprised of the elected officers. The pastor should be invited to be an advisory member of the Executive Committee.
 - 3. A vacancy occurring in any office shall be filled by election.
- V. <u>Meetings</u> -- The organization shall meet as arranged by the Executive Committee.

VI. Duties of Officers

President

- 1. To bear the responsibility of leadership of the organization.
- 2. To preside at the meetings of the organization and of the Executive Committee.
- 3. To present reports at congregational meetings, if required. <u>Vice-President</u>
- 1. To preside in the absence of the President or when the President so directs.
- 2. To assume all duties of the President in the absence or incapacity of the President.

Secretary

- 1. To record all minutes of the meetings of the organization and of the Executive Committee.
- 2. To record attendance and to keep a membership roll, if desired.

- 3. To supply the President with statistical reports for the congregational meetings, if required.
- 4. To carry on all correspondence relative to the organization and to promote correspondence with missionaries if there is no Corresponding Secretary.

Corresponding Secretary

- 1. To be a liaison between the organization and missionaries.
- 2. To promote correspondence between the members of the organization and missionaries.

<u>Treasurer</u>

- 1. To receive and disburse funds and keep accurate records.
- 2. To provide the President with financial reports for the congregational meetings, if required.

Report of the Board of Higher Education

Legislation establishing the Board of Higher Education of the Bible Fellowship Church was enacted at second reading during the 111th Annual Conference on October 18, 1994. Since the election of its members, the Board has met three times, has organized itself, and has taken steps to carry out two of its founding mandates.

The Pinebrook Educational Foundation

Concerning the establishment of the Pinebrook Educational Foundation, the Board has contacted six prospective Directors of the Foundation, secured their willingness to serve, and elected them as follows:

Term expiring in 1998: Raymond R. Dotts, Jay H. Fasnacht Term expiring in 1997: Robert C. Newman, Keith W. Johnson Term expiring in 1996: Stephen C. Cassel, Valeria Boyer

The election of these six to the Foundation Board requires the ratification of the Annual Conference.

BFC Involvement in Biblical Theological Seminary

The 111th Annual Conference, after establishing the BHE, also passed legislation authorizing continued efforts to create an affiliation with Biblical Theological Seminary or some other sort of arrangement which would allow for at least three types of activity:

- 1. It shall include a course on the distinctives and history of the Bible Fellowship Church (BFC) which will be offered at mutually acceptable intervals. Biblical Theological Seminary (BTS) will provide the facility, will offer the course, and will administer it. The Board of Higher Education (BHE) will bear the financial responsibility for the staffing.
- 2. It shall include a BFC chaplaincy. The BFC will provide a mutually acceptable chaplain, as available. BTS will provide an adequate site for meeting with students. Other details will be

resolved by the BHE and BTS.

3. It shall include an internship program in which the BFC would make churches, agencies, and pastors available to enter into formal (and informal) internship arrangements of many types. BTS will encourage and recommend students for the program. In addition, the Seminary will be responsible for the administration of the course. Any attendant financial arrangements will be negotiated between the church/agency, BTS, and the student.

It was the judgment of the Board that these types of activity could proceed without any formal action on the part of BTS. It therefore began work on the course in BFC history by making an initial inquiry of the Ministerial Candidate Committee. Concerning the chaplaincy, preliminary contacts are being made about taking on the work. Discussions will continue until all details are worked out. Finally, we have begun discussions with BTS concerning the internship program.

Further Work

Efforts are underway to transfer endowment and scholarship funds remaining from both Berean Bible School and Pinebrook Junior College. Each transfer to the PEF will be preceded by contact with those who had established the involved fund.

It is our hope that, by the time of the 113th Annual Conference, the Foundation can be in full operation and that grants and loans can be available to qualified students. We hope, as well, that our work with Biblical Theological Seminary can be underway by that time.

RESOLVED, that the Annual Conference ratify the election to the Pinebrook Educational Foundation of those individuals listed in the Report of the Board of Higher Education.

Paul, when writing to the Galatians, stated, "But when the fullness of the time was come, God sent forth His Son made of a woman, made under the law, to redeem them that were under the law, that we might receive the adoption of sons."

The question is often posed, "What if Christ had not come?". A simply stated answer would be, "If Christ had not come, we would still be in our sins;" and, by extension, we would not have the Church, nor the Bible Fellowship Church. We probably would not have any hospitals anywhere in the world, and we certainly would not have homes for the infirm and elderly such as Fellowship Home and Fellowship Manor. But, happily we can say "Christ has come." He has come and given Himself in atonement for our sins making us the sons of God. Because of His resurrection and His promise to return, we know that our labor is not in vain in the Lord.

Fellowship Community

The first phase of the construction of Fellowship Courts is virtually complete and occupancy of the units has begun. If demand for these units continues, we have plans in place to continue construction.

House & Farm Property

The 13 acres of land located west of Mauch Chunk Road in Whitehall Township, along with the house and all the buildings, were sold to Grace Evangelical Congregational Church of Allentown. The net proceeds of the sale will be used to construct a much-needed garage and maintenance building. The building will be large enough to garage the present vehicles and grounds equipment as well as a medium sized bus if one were to be needed in the future. The building will also house a new gas fired hot water heater which will replace a large electric water heater which is very costly to operate and maintain.

Fellowship Manor

The state highway department (PENNDOT) and Whitehall Township are preparing plans for roadway improvements to Rural Road and Mauch Chunk Road and Schadt Avenue. Two intersections will be upgraded with turning lanes and signalization. A small strip of our property along the east side of Mauch Chunk Road will have to be acquired. This acquisition by PENNDOT will in no way effect the future development of Fellowship Community. The road improvements will most likely improve the appearance of our property, and cause the removal of an old garage which is an eyesore, and greatly improve safety at the two intersections, as well as that of access to Fellowship Manor.

The private entrance road (Fellowship Drive) and the parking lots have been repaved. The building is well-maintained and constantly upgraded as needed or required. Plans are in the early stages of development to complete the partially developed area on the ground level for a multipurpose chapel area.

The staff at Fellowship Manor is to be commended for the excellent care given to residents. All members of the staff, from Department heads to professional employees, to each staff member, all share in the excellent care and we thank the Lord for providing us with a very good staff.

Fellowship Home

The staff at Fellowship Home must also be commended for the caring attitude and cooperative spirit. James Ernst, the Administrator, is working diligently to insure excellent care of residents and for the Home to be an integral part of Bible Fellowship Church Homes, Inc.

In conclusion of this report, praise and gratitude are given to our gracious, merciful, and saving God. His faithfulness has never failed; His presence and companionship are a constant consolation.

Recommendation of the Board of Directors of the Bible Fellowship Church Homes, Inc.

Report of the Board of Directors, Pinebrook Bible Conference

The Bible Fellowship Church took title to Pinebrook Bible Conference on September 1, 1968, and has been charged with the responsibility of this dynamic ministry for the past 26 1/2 years.

This ministry has offered much to the growth and development of the Bible Fellowship Church. In the beginning years, it was the campus for our school, Pinebrook Junior College. It has been the center of many of our denominational programs; Annual Conference, Pastor-Elder-Deacon Advance, Ministerial Convention, and in recent years has been a tremendous blessing to hundreds of our youth at the Annual Sno-Glo Retreats. The eight weeks of summer conference are a base for the gathering of our denominational people in united worship and teaching. In recent years it has been a source for the uniting of the agencies of our church for promotion, fund raising, and personal fellowship at our annual Freedom Festival. Truly, Pinebrook is a PINNACLE of spiritual experiences for the Bible Fellowship Church. We thank God that He has enabled the board, administration and staff of Pinebrook to accomplish to a great extent the purpose as stated in their Bylaws:

Pinebrook Bible Conference exists as a ministry of and to the Bible Fellowship Church, while serving the greater Christian community.

Pinebrook's ministry to the greater Christian community continues to be an instrument of evangelism and discipleship to over 12,000 non-Bible Fellowship people of many different cultures, ethnic, racial, and denominational backgrounds. Many of these people are teens and young couples which come from inner-city and under-privileged backgrounds. Only God truly knows the spiritual victories and conversions which take place on these grounds each week. However, beginning on January 1, 1995, we have asked retreat leaders to fill out a questionnaire in which they report their assessments of the spiritual effects, results and decisions from their retreat. These results have been thrilling and exciting.

It is the desire of the present administration and staff to challenge the Bible Fellowship Church to the tremendous opportunity and responsibility to support this ministry with its prayers and money as a vital part of its responsibility to fulfill the great commission. There is no arm of the Bible Fellowship Church that is as effective in reaching "Judea and Samaria" as Pinebrook.

The Committee on Resolutions reporting to the 111th Annual Conference on October 18, 1994 stated:

- WHEREAS, Pinebrook Bible Conference is continuing to accomplish a vital ministry of evangelism and discipleship for the Lord as part of the Bible Fellowship Church and,
- WHEREAS, Pinebrook Bible Conference's leadership is launching a long-range plan to expand and improve the conference's facilities for more effective ministry and,
- <u>WHEREAS</u>, a deep concern regarding the real estate taxes incurred by the Conference on its properties continues to be expressed by Pinebrook's Director, therefore be it,
- RESOLVED, that the members of Annual Conference pray diligently to God for His gracious provision in meeting Pinebrook's needs and that all our local churches be encouraged to give generously towards Pinebrook Bible Conference and its ministry.

We wish to thank those churches and individuals who have taken this recommendation seriously. We urge all of you to get involved in the PINNACLE PROJECT. All can commit themselves to at least one of the following:

- 1. Pray daily for this ministry.
- 2. Volunteer time to help in a work project. (Something to do each weekend).
- 3. Give money toward the projects. This is what we need:
 - a. 200 people to give \$5 per month
 - b. 75 people to give \$10 per month
 - c. 30 people to give \$15 per month
 - d. 20 people to give \$20 per month
 - e. 15 people to give \$25 per month
 - f. Some of you can give a one-time large gift.

Pinebrook Bible Conference provides many benefits to the Bible Fellowship Church in discounts. During three weeks of Sno-Glo in January of 1995, Pinebrook hosted a total of 877 guests at a 25% discount which amounted to a total discount of \$15,397. This amount is more than the total giving of all Bible Fellowship Churches through their budgets in the 1993 *Yearbook*, page 220. We offer discounts of nearly 50% to host Annual Conference. The Ministerial Convention, Pastor-Elder-Deacon Advance all receive from 10% to 15% discount. Our summer conference is greatly discounted to all Bible Fellowship

members, to missionaries and pastors from 10% to as high as 47%. Our retired pastors and missionaries are given a free week. All of this is done even though our rates are lower than any other Bible Conference offering the facilities and services available at Pinebrook. Therefore, in order for us to accomplish the projected improvements in the next five years, we need your support.

The PINNACLE PROJECT has the following as its objective during the next five years: It will be possible only through raising revenues beyond those of registrations and present level of gifts and offerings.

New furniture, 55 remodeled bathrooms, 200 new mattresses, 4 remodeled chapels, remodeled kitchen, dining room rest rooms, new book and gift store, new roofs, 15,000 square feet of paving, new tennis courts, two new vehicles, summer staff housing, and more permanent staff housing

Most of the above improvements relate directly to the comfort of our guests. This is the ministry of the Bible Fellowship Church. God has entrusted it to us. The Bible Fellowship Church needs to supply us with the \$242,000 needed in the next five years to meet these goals. We need you to supply us with volunteer help so that the costs will not exceed what we have projected. Pinebrook needs all of you to pray so that God will use these present and the new facilities to continue a work of evangelism and discipleship on these holy grounds.

Report of the Board of Victory Valley Camp

We continue to praise the Lord for His goodness to the ministry at Victory Valley Camp! As we mentioned in our report to the previous Annual Conference, we saw God working this past summer as record numbers of campers came to Victory Valley and there were many who made decisions to follow Jesus or to get "back on track" and follow Him once again. Phil Atkins, Director, and Donna Bauer, Assistant Director, have continued to lead the ministry throughout the fall and winter months. Be in prayer for the Atkins family as Jill has recently experienced some setbacks in her physical health. We, the Board of Victory Valley, covet your prayers for both Phil and Donna and their families as they continue to minister.

What are some of the things which have been happening at VVC this winter? The camp sponsored its Annual VIP Christmas Dinner on December 3, 1994. Along with the excellent food prepared by Dana Weller and Gerald Schlonecker, Phil also unveiled a plan to raise funds for the "All-Purpose For God's Purpose" campaign. We thank God that we can say that \$12,000 of the \$80,000 needed for the completion of the capital fund drive has come in. Total cost of the "All-Purpose for God's Purpose" project is \$180,000. We continue to pray and ask you to continue to pray that God's Will be done. Work on the building of the All-purpose facility is scheduled to begin by April 1. Along with the other retreat groups who have used our facilities over the fall and winter months, we have been excited to see 205 campers come to the Sno-Valley and Ski-Spree weekends throughout January and February. As many of you know, we are still looking for a maintenance person who will be taking on most of the light maintenance/housekeeping responsibilities so that Phil and Donna can focus more in the development and administrative areas of ministry.

Now is the time that we are looking for the 1995 Summer staff. Again, be in prayer that God will guide Donna as she looks for staff members who desire to follow Jesus and teach children and teens to do so as well.

The "Valley Interested Person" program continues to be a vital part of camp ministry and support throughout the year. There are many who give of their time and money to help keep "the Valley" operating. We thank all those who faithfully continue to give of their

time and talents for the glory of the Lord.

Realizing that costs to run camp continue to increase, the Board decided to increase the 1991-based cost of \$160 per camper per week at VVC to \$169 for the 1995 summer camping season. Also, in light of the fact that this increase still does not cover the actual cost of a week per camper, we cordially request each church to prayerfully evaluate its giving to the camp again this year. We want to remind the churches that those who contribute 1% of their total budget are eligible to receive a 10% discount for all campers/groups which come to Victory Valley.

We would also like to ask each church to prayerfully consider what it can do to help its camp meet its goal of payment for the new All-Purpose facility. As was mentioned above, the capital fund drive for the "All-Purpose for God's Purpose" facility is progressing slowly. We respectfully request each church to conduct a campaign for the "All-Purpose for God's Purpose" drive and to send its monies collected from this campaign to Victory Valley Camp as soon as possible. We say "thank you" to those churches who have already conducted their campaign and contributed towards the capital fund drive.

The Board of Victory Valley Camp held two regularly scheduled meetings since the 111th Annual Conference. In addition to the meetings of the full Board, many additional hours were spent by individuals of the Board in service on committees and in fulfillment of other camp-related responsibilities. The Board continues to be divided into three sub-committees: Program and Staff, Buildings and Grounds, and Development and Finance.

Report of the Stewardship Council

The Council met four times during the period September 1, 1993 through December 31, 1994 to conduct Bible Fellowship Church Stewardship business. The focus of the Council will continue to be on Stewardship Education at the Local Church level.

As a result of the presentation made by Mennonite Mutual Aid at the 1992 Annual Conference, regional seminars were conducted to acquaint our pastors with the services available through MMA. Additional follow-up by our pastors was at their individual discretion.

STEWARDSHIP SUNDAY was observed on January 23, 1994 by many churches in our fellowship. Psalm 24:1 was the recommended theme.

The Council continues to oversee the Deferred Gift Annuity Fund managed by Mennonite Foundation. These programs were created to financially assist Fellowship Manor and some of our local churches. The combined market value of the funds as of December 31, 1994 was \$71,311.35. To increase operating efficiencies and improve diversification and returns, the Council authorized Mennonite Foundation to manage the BFC accounts as part of their Jointly Managed Funds program.

The Council was able to meet its financial obligations during this past fiscal year, and has ended the year with a strong cash reserve of \$3,659.67. During the period, no contributions were needed from the Administrative Budget, or the agencies, and the same is anticipated for the 1995 calendar year. The financial reports are included with this report.

The Director prepared an educational resource packet for BFC agencies and local churches titled, "BFC Planned Giving Programs." These informational packets are designed to encourage donors to directly contact a BFC agency or their local church for assistance. Copies of these packets are being distributed to pastors at the 112th Annual Conference in April, 1995. Pastors are encouraged to review this information with their stewardship committees, and to reproduce copies for distribution within their congregations on an as - needed basis. Copies were also distributed to the BFC Board of Directors prior to Conference.

The following is recommended by the Stewardship Council to Annual Conference:

Beginning in 1996 and annually thereafter, Council recommends that the first Sunday in February be designated as Stewardship Sunday. In 1996, Stewardship Sunday would be February 4, and Council encourages our pastors to present a message based on Proverbs 13:22: "A good man leaves an inheritance for his children's children, But a sinner's wealth is stored up for the righteous." (NIV)



It seems as though everyone everywhere is trying to gain the ability to enter, approach, and/or communicate with important people. Why? They want to get something! Christians have access to God through Jesus Christ and the Holy Spirit. Do we want something? Yes we do. We want to know the peace of God in Christ. What a wonderful experience it is to have access to the Most High God!

But access to God is not the only access we gain in Christ, we also gain access to a spiritual sibling relationship to millions of other people who share a common faith with us. In the Bible Fellowship Church we used to commonly call each other "brother" and "sister." As the only child of my parents the concept of gaining millions of brothers and sisters worldwide through an act of faith resulting in my own new birth was especially fascinating to me. The committee plans to incorporate the new legislation of the 112th Annual Conference and then publish the new edition of the Faith & Order before the end of 1995.

William H. Bartron and Daniel P. Allen have attended meetings of the committee representing the Board of Publication and Printing. R.C.Reichenbach has been assisting the committee in subcommittee assignments.

RECOMMENDATIONS

Report of the Inter-Cultural Ministries Study Committee

The work of the Inter-Cultural Ministries Study Committee continued these past months since the 111th Annual Conference, with the primary purpose being that of completing several more Biblical Principles For Living. The Committee worked at finalizing the following Biblical Principles For Living: Worship, Work and Rest, Justice, Singleness and Marriage, and Humility. These principles are being presented for first reading by Annual Conference and to be included in the Faith & Order, Appendix, "Biblical Principles For Living." We are also presenting the Mercy Principle for Second Reading. The Committee has reviewed these principles, made revisions and some additions, referred them back to the Cell Task Groups for their final consideration, and gained the input of some interested pastors in the conference. We are now presenting them to Annual Conference (see Appendix A).

The Committee continues to move toward completing a partnership with The Center of Urban Theological Studies (C.U.T.S.). We are hoping that within the year, churches will begin to be planted under the association we will have with C.U.T.S., as necessary funding is received.

The idea of joining with mission boards and planting ethnic churches is now a reality. The Board of Missions and Board of Church Extension are working with International Missions Inc. in establishing ethnic Bible Fellowship Churches. Wayne Pauley's work among the Chinese in Brooklyn, NY, is the model for this joint venture. There may also be another possibility in Edison, NJ, among Asian Indians. In order to facilitate this effort of working with outside mission boards, the Board of Missions and the Board of Church Extension has formed a "Joint Committee on Ethnic Church Planting". This Committee is comprised of several members of both boards. The purpose and duties of this Committee are being developed. It is also likely that the partnership with C.U.T.S. will become a concern for the Ethnic Church Planting Committee.

The Committee is again encouraged by those churches who have responded with monies for ethnic church planting, but still more funding is needed. The Committee continues to encourage and request that churches create a line item on their budgets for ethnic church planting. The committee in the past suggested that each church have a line item on their budget and that amount be at least a minimum of \$4.00 per member. It should again be emphasized that these designated monies for ethnic church planting be considered an ongoing yearly commitment and be forwarded to the Board of Missions.

Conclusion

With the Board of Missions and Board of Church Extension taking control of the Bible Fellowship Church's ethnic church planting efforts, our churches becoming more interested and supportive, and other organizations joining with us, we as a Committee have realized many of our goals and see much of our work completed. We now see, as our primary task, the need for the Committee to complete its work on the Biblical Principles For Living and continue to assist the churches in becoming more aware and involved in cross-cultural ministry. We again covet your cooperation, encouragement, trust and support and may the God of all Grace give us His wisdom.

The Inter-Cultural Ministries Study Committee recommends:

- WHEREAS, monies are needed to plant ethnic Bible Fellowship Churches, and
- <u>WHEREAS</u>, the Committee believes that God has provided opportunities and desires the church to reach the differing people groups in our land, therefore be it
- RESOLVED, that each Pastor and Delegate of Annual Conference work with their church to budget monies for ethnic church planting in this year.
- WHEREAS, because two readings are required for material to be included in the *Faith & Order* and,
- <u>WHEREAS</u>, the Biblical Principles For Living should be included in the *Faith & Order* and,
- <u>WHEREAS</u>, time will be needed to develop and complete these Principles and,
- WHEREAS, Second Readings of amendments to the Principles Of Order are to be within three consecutive Annual

Conference (Faith & Order, p. 182),

RESOLVED, that by rule of exception, the time of the Second Readings for the Biblical Principles For Living be extended beyond the three consecutive Annual Conferences and be given as much time as necessary between readings.

RESOLVED, that the 112th Annual Conference approve for first reading and inclusion in Appendix, "Biblical Principles for Living," of the Faith & Order, the following Biblical Principles for Living: Worship, Work and Rest, Justice, Singleness & Marriage, and Humility.

<u>WHEREAS</u>, the work of the Inter-Cultural Ministries Study Committee is not yet complete,

RESOLVED, that the 112th Annual Conference direct the Inter-Cultural Ministries Study Committee to continue its work.

Appendix A - Biblical Principles for Living

Worship

Worship is response to God, whereby, in love, adoration, confession, thanksgiving, and praise, God's worth is declared¹. Worship is rooted in reverence for and awe of the Lord and deepens as knowledge of God increases. Worship is the privilege and responsibility of each individual, family, and congregation. For the believer, worship is a life style not limited by location or circumstance.

Worship is the ultimate goal of the church. The mission of the church is to declare God's glory and His salvation to all ethnic groups so that some from all the families of nations shall worship Him². Corporate worship is the assembled church celebrating the glory of God and ascribing to Him praise and honor. Christ, the head of the church, meets with and strengthens His people, called out from the world by the Holy Spirit³.

God declares that He alone is to be worshiped⁴ and tells how He is to be worshiped. For disobeying these instructions and substituting their own form of worship⁵, Israel was severely punished. We therefore seek to learn from the Bible what kinds of worship please the Lord.

Worship in the Old Testament was a celebration of the might acts of the Lord, the covenant God of Israel. Corporate worship was highlighted through prescribed ritual: a priesthood, a sacrificial system looking forward to Christ's atonement⁶, and particular times and places when and where worship should occur⁷. This ritual was not made valuable by its repetition⁸. Its value came through heartfelt, thoughtful response to God, uniting the worshipers. Ritual is unacceptable as true worship unless it comes from the heart⁹.

Worship in the New Testament is a celebration of the finished work of Christ, His victory over Satan, sin, and death through His own incarnation, death, and resurrection. Jesus claims for Himself authority over temple, Sabbath, sacrifice, and service¹⁰. The former place, priesthood, and ritual were set aside¹¹. The Lord gives His blessing to a new liberty as believers observe a new day, the Lord's Day¹², and a new ordinance, the Lord's Supper¹³.

The descriptions of corporate worship in the New Testament reveal prayer, praise, confession, singing, giving, thanksgiving, and teaching¹⁴. The expression of these may be shaped by the cultural setting of a particular church but must be "orderly" and "decent" ¹⁵.

The goal of corporate worship is not entertainment, but rather the glory of God. Worshipers are not to think of themselves as spectators, but rather as active participants in a celebration.

Work And Rest

Human work and rest find their origin in the work and rest, or sabbath, of God¹. The original cycle of God's work and rest at creation sets the pattern for human work and rest². Work and rest are therefore an essential part of God's design for the human race³. Humanity's fall into sin brought a curse upon work and rest, resulting in pain, difficulty, and futility⁴.

Redemption lays the groundwork for the restoration of human work and rest to their place in the original creation⁵. Christians are therefore to engage in work with honesty⁶, diligence⁷, and excellence⁸, seeing their labor as an aspect of worship⁹, service¹⁰, and witness¹¹. Laziness is condemned in Scripture¹², as is poor and dishonest work¹³ and unjust treatment of workers¹⁴.

Christians should do their work both as a service to the Lord¹⁵ and as a calling from God¹⁶, undertake it with dependance on Him¹⁷, and enjoy its fruit as His blessing on their labors¹⁸. Christians who supervise the work of others are responsible to treat them justly and pay them fairly, without threat or intimidation, realizing that they will answer to God for any injustice to those under them¹⁹. Work is given both to supply the worker's needs, and to allow the worker to provide for the needs of others²⁰.

Christians should also observe the sabbath principle in reverence for God²¹, Who mercifully provides a weekly rest for weary workers. The law of Moses also required rest during the three annual feasts, and during the sabbatical and jubilee years²². These establish a precedent for occasional opportunities of extended rest as the Lord provides²³. The sabbath principle is violated when people fail to take proper physical and emotional rest.

Human work and rest will be consummated at the return of Jesus Christ, when He rewards Christians for their labor and invites them into His rest²⁴. In heaven, where the Christian will be completely free from sin's curse, meaningful work for the Lord and glorious rest in His presence will continue forever²⁵.

Justice

By His nature God is morally perfect and universally righteous. To say that God is just is to affirm the rightness of His law and His faithful and consistent adherence to that law in His judgments¹. Justice is the perfect application of His law in the lives of human beings. Both human law and the application of that law can distort God's justice and therefore be sinful and produce sin. Sin causes human begins to enact and apply laws in ways that are unjust². Because God is just, He abhors the distortions of His law.

In a world of sinful people, injustice results when human beings are judged by such things as color of skin, ethnicity, gender, social, economic and occupational status. To place value in such external characteristics is inconsistent with faith in Jesus Christ³. Those who value people in this way are acting out of ungodly cultural biases and sinful pride⁴. In Jesus Christ such wicked and false distinctions are abolished⁵.

Those who value justice will recognize that God's love for humankind knows no racial, national, economic, or gender boundaries⁶. The proclamation of the gospel to every person regardless of location or status will be a matter of great priority among those who love justice.⁷.

Those who value justice will seek consistent and upright applications of human law so that no one is denied due process because of sinful distinctions⁸. Those who love justice will seek truth

and act with integrity in all relationships.

The quest for justice in a world distorted by sin will often yield imperfect and incomplete results. The people of God who love justice will repent when they recognize their failure to do justice and will renew their efforts to bring justice to those who have been denied it.

Singleness and Marriage

Marriage is the joining together of one man and one woman in a union instituted and ordained of God¹. This union is established by God to meet people's deepest physical and emotional needs. It is holy in God's sight and is to be a bond until death of one partner to the union². For this reason, marriage partners are commanded to be committed to each other physically, emotionally, and sexually and to have no other than their marriage partner³. Although God did not specifically condemn polygamy in every instance and sometimes blessed the individuals involved in polygamous relationships in the Old Testament, the Biblical standard is one man married to one woman⁴. This standard is reinforced by the teaching of our Lord during His earthly ministry and the New Testament writers⁵. The intimacy of marriage includes mutual rights and mutual obligations of each partner to the other⁶. Sexual activity outside the marriage bond by either of the marriage partners is adultery and is an attack on the oneness and permanence of marriage⁷. Because of this, it is a violation of the Word of God for a Christian to marry a non-Christian⁸.

God has not commanded that every person must marry. The decision not to marry is not a sin, and the one who makes such a decision has not, in that decision, fallen short of God's standard⁹. In fact, the single believer may have undivided loyalty and may be more free to serve the Lord and his church¹⁰. Abstinence from impure sexual activity prior to marriage and outside the marriage union is the Biblical standard¹¹. Sexual intercourse is to be experienced only in the marriage union; all sexual intercourse outside the marriage union is sin in God's eyes and degrades the spiritual and physical oneness He reserved for marriage¹². Those who can control their sexual desires may remain unmarried to the glory of God¹³.

Divorce is the breaking of the union and the bond of marriage. It is hated by God and should be avoided and counseled against 14. The Biblical basis for divorce is adultery, although a believer is not commanded to divorce a marriage partner who has committed adultery 15. People divorced for reasons other than that allowed by Scripture, ought to be reconciled, not marry another, and seek God's resolution of the breakdown of this union 16. Divorced persons must submit themselves to the Word of God in their present situation. Divorced persons must seek forgiveness and the grace of God for any sin that led to, or is associated with their divorce. If remarriage is considered, the church is responsible to evaluate divorces in which the people under its authority have been involved. The careful exercise of this responsibility is to preserve the church's purity and guard a believer's integrity 17.

Humility

Humility is an attitude of heart and mind perfectly exemplified in the person and life of Christ¹. It characterizes the children of the kingdom², activates the grace of God³, and shapes both the life of the community of faith⁴ and the ministry of the Lord's servants⁵. The opposite of humility is pride which meets divine resistance and anger⁶.

Humility is an acceptance of one's true position in relationship to God⁷, authorities, other believers⁸, society⁹, and the remainder of creation. Its reality is demonstrated in joyful service and appropriate submission such as was seen most clearly in the willing self-sacrifice of Christ.

In the individual Christian, humility recognizes the grace of God which has made each believer to be accepted in Christ. This viewpoint becomes a source of forgiveness and tolerance within the Christian community¹⁰. The Christian love for others is greatly aided

by the development of godly humility.

The unique servant quality of Christian leadership is a direct result of godly humility. Elders of the church do not dominate the congregation but are servants to the whole body¹¹. They do not desire to control, rather they promote the development and enrichment of every member. As heirs of grace together with their brothers and sisters, Christian leaders must renounce the pride which creates divisions and factions¹² based on secondary theological issues¹³, areas of Christian liberty¹⁴, or merely personalities¹⁵.

Humility encourages each church to cooperate with others in gospel outreach¹⁶, compels us to seek to meet needs within the local community¹⁷, and causes us to be advocates for those who have no voice¹⁸. Concern shown for the disadvantaged in our world must be expressed in the church through efforts to promote the growth of the congregation among all kinds of people as well as through the ministry of mercy¹⁹.
