

## Historical Highlight

The following excerpt was "written Exclusively for *The Times* in 1915 by Pastor W. S. Hottel, of the Mennonite Brethren in Christ Church (MBC), Bethlehem, PA". After giving a brief history of the Mennonite Church, furnished by the Rev. C. H. Brunner, he defined the MBC. The MBC is the former name of the Bible Fellowship Church.

"What The Mennonite Brethren in Christ Church Stands For"

"In 1856 Rev. William Gehman, who is still preaching, a number of others were ex-communicated from one of the older branches [of Mennonites] for holding public prayer meetings. They organized themselves into a congregation calling themselves the Evangelical Mennonites and two years later built their first church near Zionsville, PA. From here other churches soon sprang up throughout eastern Pennsylvania, until in 1879 they united with the United Mennonites of the Western States and Canada, and changed the name to Evangelical United Mennonites. In 1883 this body united with the Brethren in Christ and adopted the present name."

"So then, it is at once discernible that the name 'Mennonite' has been adopted, and is held to merely for the sake of distinction and historical continuance. With the MBC, it is no barrier to prevent the incoming of a new light from God, by way of advance knowledge, because of a deeper and clearer insight into Divine revelation. The Mennonite Brethren are not a church bound down to the traditions handed down from their forefathers, other than those which are in full and strict accordance with the Scriptures. They always welcome new light from God, upon His word, gladly following and obeying it. Their apparent narrowness is not Godward but manward; they holding with a firm and tenacious grip of faith to the divine Authorship and Authenticity of the Scriptures. To them the Scriptures are the ground of faith, their creed, and also the rule of life. Whatever in word, principle and spirit the Scriptures enjoin, they hold it to be carried out and obeyed in every day life and practice. In short, they stand for the spiritual illumination of the mind, its transformation by the power of the Holy Spirit, through the truth, so that the principles of God's word are inwrought into the mind, will and character of man, so that those who really and heartily, accept the divine 'form of doctrine', become living epistles 'known and read of all men.'

"From this very fact the MBC stand for a complete separation from the world, its ways, habits, maxims, principles and customs. Whatever does not agree and harmonize with the principles of the doctrine of Christ and His Apostles, is to be shunned, to be turned away from as being at once Christ dishonoring and harmful. "The Church" they maintain is not an organization but a living organism, formed by the Holy Spirit. Its present character is best described by a pilgrim life, its present sphere is heavenly, being not of this world, but being heavenly in birth, citizenship, calling and nature.

"The preaching of the MBC pre-eminently and absolutely centers in Christ. Christianity, they hold, is no religion, no creed and no certain dogma of belief, but a life, the life of Christ, received by receiving Christ. The only hope of salvation,

immorality and eternal life they hold is Christ. As a consequence of this, they maintain that all mere outward reformation, culture, religiousness and human goodness will utterly fail in bringing salvation. God's supreme and only test for mankind during this age is then acceptance or rejection of Jesus Christ as their Saviour and Lord. The only principle upon which God does anything for man, during this entire period of time is the principle of grace. So then, what God does for man, must be on the principle of unmerited favor. Salvation then, is all of grace, while future rewards are determined by present service and the believers position in the coming kingdom is determined by his faithfulness here.

"Again, the MBC Church stands for the super-natural in salvation. They maintain that the work of the Holy Spirit is to make experimentally real in the heart and life of the one who really accepts Christ, all that God in Christ has provided for man. The Spirit Himself indwelling the believer, brings the "earnest" and first fruits" of his future inheritance and possession. They therefore hold that salvation is not a mere matter of a cold intellectual belief, a mere matter of hope so, but a blessed, present, conscious possession.

"The Holy Spirit, they maintain, is the power for service, walk, warfare, worship. The Holy Spirit, they hold, calls, qualifies and sends into the ministry of the Gospel, those whom the ascended Lord chooses as such. The ascended Christ bestows Spirit-gifted men, as a gift upon His body, the Church of Christ. There the Holy Spirit qualifies, uses and directs.

"In conclusion, the MBC Church holds to the Personal, Literal, Imminent and Pre-Millennial Second Coming of Christ. This hope is the vital energy to separation from the world, and, to personal purification and a holy and godly life. This hope gives impetus and zeal to missionary enterprise and evangelization. The MBC, like the primitive Church, are Pre-Millennial in doctrine and evangelistic in practice. The early church was a witnessing church, an evangelistic church, and were also consistently looking for the return of the Lord. None of the early disciples and apostles believed in the conversion of the world during this period of time but held that the purposes of God in this period of time were selective and elective. Their efforts were Christ governed and directed, being to reach the uttermost parts of the earth witnessing for Christ, to the gathering out of a people for His name, from among all nations of the earth. This also is the underlying principle of the missionary enterprises of the MBC which comprise a strong "Home" and "Foreign" missionary agency. Since the year 1891, when the Church first awoke to her responsibilities in this direction, the strides made in the forward direction are rapid and astonishing. From that date until the annual Conference, held in October, 1911, the offerings of the Pennsylvania Conference alone, for the Foreign mission cause, amounted to \$80,159.37. The Conference supports one missionary abroad to every one hundred members at home. The average contributions for Foreign Missions per member for 1914 was \$4.08."

Pastor W. S. Hottel's description sounds similar to the present-day version of the MBC. The Bible Fellowship Church has remained true to its roots. In fact, concerning missions, this *Yearbook* reveals that we've maintained the missionary ratio of "one missionary abroad to every one hundred members at home" (71 missionary families to 7,149 members). Giving has gone up from \$4.08 to \$170 per member.



An ordained minister who is without a call to a church is eligible to serve in an elective office and on Conference boards and committees as long as he remains on the list of Ordained Ministers Working Under the Direction of the Bible Fellowship Church.

A minister who is granted a leave of absence may serve as a minister in any elected or appointed position only until the next Annual Conference, when a successor will be elected or appointed to fill the unexpired term.

All retired ministers willing to serve are eligible for election to Boards and Committees.

Elders are men who are serving or who have served and remain eligible for service on the Board of Elders of a Bible Fellowship Church.

Laypersons are men or women who are members in good standing of a Bible Fellowship Church. Laypersons are eligible to serve on a board or committee unless the bylaws of the board or committee limit eligibility to ministers and/or elders. Laypersons need not be members of the Annual Conference in order to serve. The Nominating Committee shall seek assistance from the pastors and boards of elders in obtaining capable candidates for these positions.

- 3. Receive communication and be a liaison between the pastor, his staff, and the congregation.
- Annually review with each member of the pastoral staff the adequacy of his compensation and submit a proposed budget for salary and benefits.

[SECOND READING]

Resolved, that the following legislation replace duty 1 in the Faith and Order (1986 edition) p. 140. Subsequent duties will be renumbered.

- The committee's role is to consult and advise churches and pastors in regard to initiating and maintaining the pastoral relationship. The Committee becomes involved in the affairs of a particular church or pastor upon request of:
  - a. the Board of Elders of the Particular Church.
  - individual elder or elders of the Particular Church. b.
  - the Pastoral Relations Committee of the Particular Church.
  - d. the pastor of the Particular Church.
- The committee may initiate involvement and call a 2. meeting with a pastor, Pastoral Relations Committee, or Board of Elders if the Committee concludes that there are matters threatening the health of the pastoral relationship which are not being adequately addressed by the Particular Church.
  - This request for a meeting shall be in writing.
  - Reasons for the meeting shall be given in writing, if requested by the pastor, Pastoral Relations Committee, or Board of Elders.

[SECOND READING]

The following legislation was adopted at second reading:

Faith & Order, §512-1.5 Miscellaneous Regulations, replace paragraph (1) with the following:

(1) Primary place of business- The primary place of business of the Corporation shall be designated by the Board of Directors and listed annually in the *Yearbook*.

[SECOND READING]

The following legislation was adopted at second reading:

Resolved, that Article I: The Officers of the Church of the Bylaws for Particular Churches (Faith & Order, 1986 Update, p.1 and Faith & Order, 1996 Edition, 401-1.7) be revised to read:

The Board of Elders shall be the channel of communication between the particular church and the fellowship of churches and its organizations. The Elders shall nominate from their number and the congregation shall elect the appropriate number of delegates and alternate delegates based on congregational membership as follows:

1-299 members 1 delegate 2 delegates 500-749 members 3 delegates 750-999 members 4 delegates 5 delegates 5 delegates

When congregations have more than one delegate, the Board of Elders shall designate one delegate as "First Delegate" for the purposes of pulpit supply procedures. In the event of death, resignation, or removal of the First Delegate, another First Delegate shall be designated from among the remaining delegates.

And be it further

Resolved, that Article V: Members of Annual Conference (Faith & Order, 1986 Update, p.2 and Faith & Order,

1996 Edition, 505-1(6)) be revised to read:

f. Delegates from every properly-constituted church based on congregational membership as follows:

1-299 members	l delegate
300-499 members	2 delegates
500-749 members	3 delegates
750-999 members	4 delegates
1000 and over members	5 delegates

If a Delegate(s) is unable to attend the Annual Conference or some meetings of Annual Conference, the Alternate Delegate(s), with the permission of the Conference, shall be seated for the Conference or those specified meetings. Unexcused absences shall result in the church forfeiting its representation by an Alternate Delegate during the unexcused absence of the Delegate.

[SECOND READING]

The following legislation was adopted at second reading:

Resolved, that we delete the material in the *Faith & Order* pp. 153 through 157 from "A. Board of Missions — Purpose" through "I. Contributions" and replace with the following (First Reading):

### THE BOARD OF MISSIONS

# A. Purpose

The Board of Missions is delegated by Annual Conference to direct and promote the missions program of the Bible Fellowship Church, and to select, oversee, and care for its missionaries who serve in foreign countries and in the United States of America in ministries other than Bible Fellowship Churches and Agencies, except where cooperative ventures in cross-cultural church planting have been developed with the Board of Church Extension.

## B. Composition

The Board of Missions shall be composed of ten members; namely, the Director, the Financial Secretary, four ordained ministers, and four laypersons.

#### C. Election

The Director, who must be either an ordained minister or elder, shall be elected for a term of three years by the Board of Missions subject to ratification by the Annual Conference.

The Financial Secretary shall be elected for a term of three years by the Board of Missions, but not necessarily from the Board. If he is elected from outside the Board, he is subject to ratification by the Annual Conference and only then becomes a voting member of the Board of Missions.

Four ordained ministers and four laypersons shall be elected by Annual Conference for terms of three years in the following classes:

- I. One minister and one layperson
- II. Two ministers and one layperson
- III. One minister and two laypersons

The Chairman and Vice-Chairman (who both must be either ordained ministers or elders), Secretary, and Treasurer of the Board of Missions shall be elected annually by and from the Board of Missions at its organizational meeting. The Director is not eligible to serve in these offices.

The Officers of the Board and the Director shall comprise the Executive Committee of the Board of Missions.

#### D. Duties of the Board of Missions

1. To formulate objectives and policies for the missions

- program of the Bible Fellowship Church.
- To interview and examine all prospective candidates for missionary service and to make decisions pertaining to approval and support of individuals who are committed to follow the *Faith and Order* of the Bible Fellowship Church.
- 3. To cooperate with the elders of a Particular Church, the Credentials Committee and the Ministerial Candidate Committee (for men holding ordination or license within the Bible Fellowship Church) and sending agency, in the oversight and spiritual care of the missionaries and appointees serving under the direction of the Board of Missions.
- 4. To maintain, within the missions program of the Bible Fellowship Church, standards compatible with the *Faith and Order* of the Bible Fellowship Church.
- To supervise and care for financial and administrative matters pertaining to the Board of Missions. It shall solicit, receive, safeguard, and disburse funds related to its mission program.
- To promote interest and involvement in missions in conjunction with the Particular Churches (e.g., assisting Missions Committees and missionary organizations within the local church).
- 7. To submit a written report to Annual Conference.
- 8. To appoint committees as needed for regional and Conference-Wide missionary meetings and/or events.

#### E. Duties of the Chairman of the Board of Missions

He shall be responsible to convene and preside over meetings and to initiate implementation of policies and decisions made by the Board of Missions and to carry out the responsibilities as outlined in the Policy Handbook of this Board.

## F. Duties of the Vice-Chairman of the Board of Missions

He shall fulfill the duties of the Chairman in the absence of the Chairman.

#### G. Duties of the Director of the Board of Missions

He shall be responsible under the supervision of the Board of Missions for the development of vision, strategy and mobilization for world evangelization among Bible Fellowship Churches and to carry out the responsibilities as outlined in the Policy Handbook of this Board.

### H. Duties of the Financial Secretary of the Board of Missions

Under the Director and the Board of Missions, he shall be responsible for overseeing monies received, disbursed, and invested, and to circulate appropriate statements and other reports as directed by the Board of Missions.

#### I. Contributions

All financial contributions shall be made payable to "BFC Board of Missions" and sent to the Board of Missions.

# Report of the Study Committee on Inter-Cultural Ministries (see page 144)

Whereas, monies are needed to plant ethnic Bible Fellowship Churches, and

<u>Whereas</u>, the Committee believes that God has provided opportunities and desires the church to reach the differing people groups in our land, therefore be it

Resolved, that each Pastor and Delegate of Annual Conference, if they have not established a line item in their budgets for ethnic church planting, work with their churches to budget monies for ethnic church planting in this year, which may be forwarded to the Board of Missions.

- <u>Whereas</u>, the work of the Inter-Cultural Ministries Study Committee is not yet complete,
- Resolved, that the 114th Annual Conference direct the Inter-Cultural Ministries Study Committee to continue its work.
- <u>Whereas</u>, the prospects for planting Hispanic Bible Fellowship churches are becoming a reality and,
- <u>Whereas</u>, a number of Bible Fellowship Churches are ministering in areas where Hispanic communities exist,
- Resolved, that the Board of Publication and Printing be prepared to publish the "Articles of Faith" in Spanish in 1997.
- Whereas, we believe the "Biblical Principles for Living" represent God's intended principles by which we should live, and
- <u>Whereas</u>, we believe that the "Biblical Principles for Living" should be urgently and diligently taught to our congregations,
- <u>Resolved</u>, each pastor and delegate seek ways to implement the teaching of the "Biblical Principles for Living" to their congregations and further,
- Resolved, that as "Biblical Principles for Living" are studied and taught, any discovery of problem areas, suggestions for additions, or clarifications of text, should be communicated to this Committee for consideration prior to Second Reading. These communications should be addressed to David E. Gundrum, Secretary of the Committee.

The following was adopted at First Reading:

## The Family

The family was divinely ordained by God at creation and is basic in God's dealings with man. God's revealed pattern for the family is the marriage of one man and one woman and includes their children and others who may reside with them. Each marriage establishes a new family<sup>1</sup>.

The foundation for right relationships in the family is submission one to another out of reverence for Christ<sup>2</sup>. The husband is the head of the family as Christ is the head of the church. As such, he should fear the Lord; love, nurture, and encourage his family; provide materially for them; take the lead in burden bearing and problem solving; and through godly living and prayer give them wise and effective spiritual leadership<sup>3</sup>. He is to love his wife and live with her in a compassionate and understanding way<sup>4</sup>. The wife should fear the Lord<sup>5</sup>, submit to and respect her husband as the church is to submit to Christ<sup>6</sup>, and demonstrate loving and diligent concern for her household<sup>7</sup>.

The biblical pattern for a married couple is to have children and to manage the home<sup>8</sup>. Some may elect not to have children for valid reasons. Other couples may be providentially prevented from having children. In either case the church must not be judgmental<sup>9</sup>. Where married couples choose to use artificial birth control, great care must be exercised to use only those forms which clearly do not cause an abortion<sup>10</sup>.

When more than one income seems necessary and added employment is considered, the couple must carefully evaluate the impact on their relationship and children<sup>11</sup>. The decision should be made only after prayer, interaction<sup>12</sup>, and mutual consent<sup>13</sup>.

Within the church there exist family units that require special attention and mercy from the church. With prayer, loving support, wise counsel, and God's abundant grace these families can be nurtured<sup>14</sup>. The church must gladly and unwaveringly supply comfort, encouragement, affirmation, and deep fellowship for all family units.

Children are gifts and blessings from God<sup>15</sup>. The family is the primary setting in which to nurture children in the faith. Great care is to be exercised by parents, and by fathers in particular, to build Christian families and lead them in worship<sup>16</sup>. The father is not to exasperate his children<sup>17</sup>, but to bring them up in the training and instruction of the Lord<sup>18</sup>.

The instruction and guidance of children is the duty of parents<sup>19</sup>. Fathers are primarily responsible for exercising leadership in the maturing of children<sup>20</sup>, and preparing them for service in the church and for living all of life for the glory of God<sup>21</sup>. Mothers share with husbands the raising of children<sup>22</sup>. The Scriptures also encourage

grandparents to assist in the training and instruction of their grandchildren<sup>23</sup>.

Children are to obey their parents in respect and love<sup>24</sup>. As long as they live, sons and daughters are to honor their parents with loving concern and material care<sup>25</sup>.

Christian homes are manifestations of the kingdom of God and each believing family member is an ambassador of the King, to call lost men, women, and children to reconciliation<sup>26</sup>. We should open our homes in vigorous and sustained hospitality to the unsaved as well as to the saved<sup>27</sup>. Genuine compassion and Christian service will involve taking carefully measured risks<sup>28</sup>, but such risks are never a legitimate excuse for cold-heartedness.

The following was adopted at first reading:

#### Civil Government

God, the King of Kings, has established civil government to be under His authority, over people for the public good, and to carry out His sovereign will<sup>1</sup>. He has revealed in His Word how this government should function in order to provide for a peaceful, orderly society in which the Gospel might spread<sup>2</sup>; protect the law-abiding people from the law-breakers by punishing the evildoers<sup>3</sup>; and bring justice and help to the defenseless, poor, and needy of society<sup>4</sup>.

God requires all people to submit to the civil government. People must pay taxes for the support of government functions<sup>5</sup>; they must give respect and honor to government officials<sup>6</sup>; and they must be obedient and helpful citizens of society<sup>7</sup>.

Christians have special responsibilities toward the civil government, including praying for those in authority over them<sup>8</sup>, exposing corruption and wickedness in government<sup>9</sup>, and bringing a godly influence to bear upon the government<sup>10</sup>. This means setting a godly example as a citizen, raising a biblical voice on issues, accepting positions of leadership when appropriate, and, under a democratic government, voting wisely. The exercise of these responsibilities should demonstrate a Christian's sensitive consideration of the views of others in love without violence and without forsaking biblical principles or the priority of glorifying God.

A Christian's ultimate allegiance must be to God, for the government's authority over the believer is limited by God's prescribed boundaries<sup>11</sup>. Therefore, a believer may find it necessary at times to disobey human authority in order to heed God's higher laws, bearing the cost or sacrifice involved<sup>12</sup>.

All Christians have dual citizenship; they are citizens of an earthly nation, and of the kingdom of God<sup>13</sup>. Both of these citizenships have their privileges and responsibilities, and it is possible to cooperate with civil government without compromising biblical principles<sup>14</sup>. Yet, when the believer is forced to choose between the two, he must submit to Jesus as Lord. For one day, every knee will bow to Him, and even today, he rules sovereignly over the affairs of civil government<sup>15</sup>.

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[FIRST READING]

The following was adopted at first reading:

#### **Shared Life**

Each believer belongs to Jesus Christ and to every other believer<sup>1</sup>. This belonging is a relationship to God the Father<sup>2</sup>, God the Son<sup>3</sup>, God the Holy Spirit<sup>4</sup> and to all who belong to God<sup>5</sup>. This relationship is not the result of human effort, but begins with being born from above<sup>6</sup> and is the living out of the divine nature<sup>7</sup> under the Lordship of Christ and the authority of His revealed Word<sup>8</sup>. It unites all believers to one another and causes them to be different from their world<sup>9</sup>.

The union with the Lord and with one another is spiritual. The relationship of each believer with the Lord is the basis for the relationship between believers<sup>10</sup> in sharing truth<sup>11</sup>, love<sup>12</sup>, and possessions<sup>13</sup>. It is dependence not self-sufficiency and interdependence not independence<sup>14</sup>. Participation in this life affects every believer and church<sup>15</sup> and impacts their ministry in the world and to the world<sup>16</sup>.

Shared life is a privilege and a responsibility<sup>17</sup>. The life of the church, therefore, must be a renewing, God-glorifying celebration of life in Christ and a spiritual participation with other believers<sup>18</sup>. Sharing this life in the presence of God is worship<sup>19</sup> and demands the loving exercise of spiritual gifts<sup>20</sup> as well as realization that we are responsible to one another before God<sup>21</sup>. The exercise of these gifts builds up one another and equips the saints for the Lord's work<sup>22</sup>. Because this responsibility and accountability are necessary for the church to grow in godliness<sup>23</sup>, discipline must be practiced in every community of believers<sup>24</sup>. Not to do so brings the very name of Christ into dishonor<sup>25</sup>.

Responding in mercy, carrying each other's burdens<sup>26</sup>, is also a responsibility and privilege of all believers to one another, and causes them to love, care, share, and be involved with one another<sup>27</sup>. All believers, and the church as a body, must recognize, accept, and practice the spiritual responsibilities of being one in Christ, no matter how deeply a fellow believer has fallen into sin or the miseries of this world<sup>28</sup>.

Every believer is a member of the body of Christ and must be joyfully and personally responsible to live a life of loyalty to the Lord of the church<sup>29</sup>, to His Word<sup>30</sup> and involvement in its minstry<sup>31</sup> and purpose<sup>32</sup>. This responsibility, although primarily focused on the local body, extends beyond the particular church to other bodies of believers<sup>33</sup>. Because this is true, the shared life of the church breaks down the barriers of race, class, culture, ethnicity, gender, and geography, for all believers are one in Christ<sup>34</sup>.

- (2) He shall, as requested by the committee, represent the Ministerial Relations Committee in its dealings with pastors and churches.
- (3) He shall be a pastor to the pastors in order to encourage the men and to maintain a harmonious relationship between each church and pastor.
- (4) He shall meet with boards of elders and pastoral search

- committees to aid them in their search for a pastor. He shall:
  - (4.1) Be knowledgeable of men available as potential candidates, including men newly licensed by the Ministerial Candidate Committee.
  - (4.2) Communicate to potential candidates information on open churches.
  - (4.3) Keep pastoral search information current.
- (5) He shall encourage ongoing ministry training for pastors, including regional ministeriums for pastors and wives.
- (6) He shall be available as a resource to local pastoral relations committees in the fulfillment of their duties.
- (7) He shall be available to meet with boards of elders for consultation, evaluation, and advice.

(Yes-88, No-22)



## Report of the Committee on Nominations

The Committee on Nominations has identified the elections that are to be conducted at this Annual Conference and presents the attached list of nominations for office in the Bible Fellowship Church.

#### **OBSERVATION:**

Boards and Committees are requested to give careful consideration to planning their meetings at times that accommodate the employment schedules of capable laypersons. There are competent nominees who decline nomination or are hampered from serving by daytime meetings scheduled during the work week.

### REQUEST:

The Nominating Committee requests Pastors and Delegates and Boards and Committees to submit to the Committee for consideration, names of capable men and women who might be potential nominees. Information concerning the areas of interest and expertise of these individuals and the Boards and Committees on which they might competently serve would be helpful. The Committee is especially interested in learning of women who might effectively serve.

### RECOMMENDATIONS:

The Committee identified some discrepancies in the legislation presented by the Study Committee to Clarify the Use of "Laymen" and "Laypersons" which is being considered for Second Reading at this Annual Conference. The Committee makes these recommendations:

- Whereas, both ordained ministers and laymen are eligible to serve on the Historical Committee by current legislation (Faith and Order 512-12), and
  - Whereas, the proposed legislation inadvertently limits eligibility to serve on the Historical Committee to laypersons, (1996 *Yearbook*, p. 31, #7), therefore be it

# Report of the Board of Church Extension

The Board of Church Extension considers it a great privilege and responsibility to be a part of God's work of establishing churches in obedience to Christ's Great Commission. Though we do not directly reach to the "uttermost part of the earth", the need is great within our "Judea and Samaria" as well. The planting of new churches locally is essential if we are to continue to grow in our worldwide outreach. Mission America, the five year plan of goals and strategies presented to Conference last year, continues to be implemented. The Board urges each church to review the goals of Mission America that we as a denomination might pray, give, and work more effectively toward the implementation of the plan. As a part of Mission America's goal of working toward a smooth transition of leadership within the Department, the Board has established a search committee to seek a new Executive Director. This becomes necessary with Daniel Ziegler's present term expiring at the 115th Annual Conference in 1998 and plans for retirement on the horizon. We ask that you pray with us for God's direction in filling this strategic position of leadership to carry on the work of church planting.

The Board gratefully acknowledges the support of churches. We are encouraged by those churches which utilize "The Extension Call", the Church Extension Department's monthly prayer calendar. These are available in quantity for your church or for copying and distribution on your own. We are also grateful for the financial support of churches. During the past year, church giving increased. We thank the Lord for this encouraging note and express our appreciation to all those churches which stand with us in this work. Support for the work of church planting is more than prayers and finances. Several churches have provided people, supplies, and hours of labor to fulfill local projects of churches within the Department. The Harleysville, Ephrata, and Coopersburg congregations have worked closely with the Staten Island, New York Mission. The Harleysville Church has also helped with the Scranton Mission. Churches have provided people to work on property, to serve through VBS and other ministries, and to introduce the church to people in the community. These efforts are significant in their benefits - to the Mission, the church planting pastor, and to the supporting church. We urge all churches to consider such an endeavor. A new mission was established at Brooklyn, New York. A new mission was also started at Beacon, New York, with a small core from the former Wappinger Bible Fellowship Church. A call was issued to David Way to serve as its organizing pastor. Also, Jonathan Tait accepted a call to serve as organizing

pastor of the Walnutport, Pennsylvania Mission.

Presently, two missions are without organizing pastors - Upper Pocono (presently dormant) and Brooklyn, New York. The Board has received the request from the Gilbertsville leadership to presently discontinue the pursuit of affiliation with the Bible Fellowship Church. The Board has acceded to their request.

Assessment Committees, made up of representatives from the Board of Elders from interested congregations, are appointed to evaluate the progress of developing missions. This year an Assessment Committee was established for the Scranton Mission. The Scranton Mission, along with the Aberdeen (Bayshore), New Jersey Mission, are being presented at the 114th Annual Conference to be received as Particular Churches.

The Board continues to work with the Board of Missions for the purpose of planting ethnic churches. We have varying degrees of relationship with several ethnic congregations. Also, the Board has joined with the Board of Missions in establishing the position of "Missions Project Coordinator." This individual would promote and coordinate work and service projects for missionaries and church planters.

During the past year, it was disclosed by the Executive Directive to the Board that he had not issued payment due the Internal Revenue Service for taxes which were withheld. The board carefully reviewed the accounting and determined that at no point were monies misappropriated nor did the Executive Director profit in any way from the failure to pay these taxes. In its review, the Board became aware of several deficiencies within the Department's financial procedures specifically due to the present division of responsibilities within the Department in overseeing various accounts. Because of our desire to administer board resources in a way which honors the Lord, the Board has taken steps to review and revise its financial bookkeeping and accounting procedures within the Department to insure a more effective handling of all financial responsibilities. We have endeavored to keep our brothers of Annual Conference abreast of such changes and have appreciated the responses we have received, we covet your prayers and seek your ongoing partnership in the work of church planting in these days of strategic opportunities.

The Board works closely with missions under its care to oversee the work. Personnel issues, ministry strategies, financial concerns, property matters, and congregational issues present significant challenges and opportunities for guidance. We are grateful to the Lord for the men who diligently serve in the Department and for their families as well. They have a unique commitment to this work which demands a level of personal and family sacrifice. We urge you to uphold them in prayer. I have reviewed the records of the Board of Missions of the Bible Fellowship Church, a religious organization, and the accompanying Balance Sheet as of December 31, 1996 and the Statements of Income and Expenses for the year January 1 to December 31, 1996 in accordance with standards established by the American Institute of Certified Public Accountants and adopted by the Pennsylvania Board of Accountancy. All information included in these statements is the representation of the management of the Board of Missions.

A review consists principally of inquiries of board personnel and analytical procedures applied to financial data. It is substantially less in scope than an examination in accordance with generally accepted auditing standards, the objective of which is the expression of an opinion regarding the financial statements taken as a whole. # Report of the Board of Directors of Bible Fellowship Church

The Board of Directors of the Bible Fellowship Church held four regular meetings to attend to corporate business related to Annual Conference, to agencies, and to the churches.

The Board provided oversight and advice in respect to fiscal, legal, and property acquisition in the following areas:

Annual Conference: medical insurance, administrative budget. Pinebrook Junior College property.

Agencies: Victory Valley Camp

Once again this year the Board of Directors changed medical insurance companies. This was due tot eh changes in coverage and a proposed 30% increase in premiums growing out of the acquisition of US HealthCare by Aetna Insurance Company. A plan offered by Inter-County Hospitalization-Health Plan was adopted and became the medical insurance plan offered to employees of Bible Fellowship Church and agencies as of January 1, 1997. The new plan brings significant financial savings when compared with terms offered the Bible Fellowship Church by Aetna Insurance Company for 1997. Higher life insurance benefits and dental coverage are also now included in the plan. Bible Fellowship churches and agencies now using other plans might be wise to take a close look at this plan.

The Board of Directors assisted the Board of Victory Valley in the acquisition of property consisting of acreage which enhances the integrity of present holdings, as well as a house dedicated to the use of the director.

During the 113th Annual Conference a faxed proposal to purchase part of the property formerly occupied by Pinebrook Junior College was received from Seniorcare Service Group, Incorporated, Lansdale, PA. Although the informal offer was good, and this group continued to express interest in purchasing the property for several months, no agreement of sale was ever received from that corporation. On December 3, 1996 the Board of Directors received a fourteen page proposed agreement of sale for the 5.711 acre parcel of the property containing the buildings for \$330,000. Discussions which followed led to that agreement, as amended, being signed on December 20, 1996. Matters which must be resolved before sale is consummated are: removal of asbestos and certification thereof; approvals relating to zoning and sewer from the municipality of Coopersburg, and State and Federal approval to use the property for assisted housing. Closing is proposed to be no later than June 30, 1997, but there is provision in the agreement for the purchaser to extend that date for two additional 30 day periods with prior notification of 10 days.

Sale of the parcels previously used as soccer field and park is made difficult because there is now a moratorium on sewer connections due to a dispute between Borough of Coopersburg and Upper Saucon Township. Until this issue is resolved, interest in, and value of, the property is seriously diminished.

The final chapter on the sale of the Coopersburg property remains to be written, but it is clear that the best that can be hoped for from proceeds of the sale is payment of loans made from banks and partial payment of loans by individuals. Decisions will need to be made by Annual Conference concerning the repayment of remaining debt to individuals, to the Trexler Foundation, to the Fund to Promote Church Extension, and to funds supervised by the Pinebrook Educational Foundation.

Last year when the Board of Directors issued its report to the 113th Annual Conference it was not clear that brother Jansen E. Hartman's years of service to the Board of Directors would come to an end. We now express our appreciation for his 45 years of faithful and fruitful service and wish him God's blessing as he continues to serve our conference in less formal ways.

During the year Jay H. Fasnacht resigned from the Board of Directors after over 19 years of service due to relocation to Florida. His contribution to the board has been significant and he will be missed.

The Board of Directors wishes to inform the 114th Annual Conference that at a properly-called meeting of the congregation of Salem Bible Fellowship Church, Allentown, PA the congregation voted to cease public meetings on February 28, 1997 and close its books as of March 31, 1997.

All funds are deposited in the Farmers First Bank, Lititz. Accounts were audited by Charles Albert.

We recommend that 114 Annual Conference adopt the following:

- <u>Resolved</u>, that the rate of mileage reimbursement remain at 22¢ per mile.
- <u>Resolved</u>, that the Administrative Budget for January 1, 1997 to December 31, 1997 be adopted.
- Resolved, that the proposed Administrative Budget for January 1, 1998 to December 31, 1998 be approved for submission to the churches for their pledges.

Pledges for the 1998 Administrative Budget shall be received by the Financial Secretary by September 1, 1997

# Report of the Board of Higher Education

Since the 113th Annual Conference, the Board of Higher Education (BHE) has met three times, for a total of ten times since its inception in the fall of 1994. It has continued to take action to oversee the work of the Pinebrook Educational Foundation (PEF), and to establish a cordial working relationship with Biblical Theological Seminary (BTS) on several fronts.

#### The Pinebrook Educational Foundation

The Board of Directors of the PEF for the past year has consisted of the following members:

Term expiring in 1999: Olivia Barnes, Stephen C. Cassel Term expiring in 1998: Raymond R. Dotts, Jay H. Fasnacht Term expiring in 1997: Keith W. Johnson, Robert C. Newman

In September 1996, Valeria S. Boyer resigned from the Foundation Board because of her health. Since the PEF legislation does not address Foundation Board vacancies, the PEF adopted at its December 5th meeting the same policy authorized for the BHE, as found in Article II, Section 3. Then, at that same meeting, they selected Olivia Barnes to fill the vacancy until the next Annual Conference. Subsequently the BHE elected, subject to ratification by the 114th Annual Conference, Keith W. Johnson and Robert C. Newman for terms expiring in 2000, and Olivia Barnes to complete the term of Valeria Boyer in 1999.

The report of the Pinebrook Educational Foundation is appended to the report of the Board of Higher Education.

#### Denominational Involvement in Biblical Theological Seminary

The Board completed work on two of its three activities that will create a closer affiliation with BTS:

- 1. The newly designed course, THS-560 "Bible Fellowship Church Polity", was scheduled for two hours of credit during the 1997 spring semester at 11:30 to 1:20 on Tuesdays. The Ministerial Candidate Committee had selected Richard E. Taylor and Calvin Reed as both instructors and syllabus writers. Unfortunately the course had to be cancelled due to low enrollment. The BHE intends to try again in the Spring semester of 1998, offering the same course in the evening and seeking to develop better promotion in advance of the course offering.
  - 2. Final copy of the "Pastoral Intern Partnership" brochure was

approved, and many of these brochures were later distributed. The first official intern under this new program, Peter Gunderson, has been accepted and approved to begin his work under the supervision of Carl T. Martin.

3. The Board has remained in contact with William W. Mull as its chief candidate to be the BFC Chaplain at the Seminary. The slow recovery of Bill, and of Addy in particular, has necessarily delayed the onset of this endeavor. In the meanwhile, both Newton Conant, former chaplain at BTS, and Al Oldham who was instrumental in bringing him to the Seminary, have contributed many valuable ideas for a job description for this position.

#### **Further Work**

The Lord's blessed call to glory of our dearly beloved and sorely missed brother, George K. Monroe, Jr., on Friday, August 23rd, was a great loss to this Board. Efforts have been made to find suitable and willing candidates to replace him, and these names have been submitted to the Committee on Nominations. Meanwhile, John Studenroth was elected to serve as secretary of the BHE in George's place. Since George was a faithful and charter member of the BHE, the PEF has urged all members of the BHE to make gifts in his memory for the Foundation's Memorial Scholarship Endowment Fund. The BHE in turn would like to extend the same invitation to all the friends and members of this 114th Annual Conference.

Under the direction of the PEF, efforts continue to transfer endowment and scholarship funds remaining from both Berean Bible School and Pinebrook Junior College in order to promote higher education within the BFC and offer financial aid to its members. The Board has also solicited participation of the particular churches in these efforts. Partially due to the unresolved matters related to the sale of former PJC properties, sufficient funds are not yet available to support applications for financial aid.

The BHE has been actively discussing ways in which we can promote Christian higher education in the Bible Fellowship Church. Opinions from others on this subject are always welcome.

**RESOLVED**; that the Annual Conference ratify the election to the Pinebrook Educational Foundation of Keith W. Johnson, Robert C. Newman, and Olivia Barnes, for terms expiring in 2000, 2000, and 1999, respectively.

### Pinebrook Educational Foundation Annual Report 1996

#### Approved January 14, 1997

The Board of Directors of the Pinebrook Educational Foundation met five times in 1996. The Board dealt with a number of matters which are described below.

- 1. An investment policy for the Foundation's funds was finalized.
- A letter was sent to pastors and treasurers of Bible Fellowship Churches for the purpose
  of raising funds for the General Scholarship Fund. To date, \$400 has been received for
  the General Scholarship Fund.
- A Pinebrook Educational Foundation brochure was finalized and prepared for distribution.
- An activity account was established for funding expenses of the Board of Higher Education.
- 5. The formal transfer of the Rev. and Mrs. R. C. Reichenbach Scholarship Fund from Pinebrook Junior College to Pinebrook Educational Foundation has been completed. The formal transfer of other endowment funds has not been completed, although the funds are in the custody of the Foundation.
- The Memorial Scholarship Endowment Fund was established for the purpose of honoring the life and memory of loved ones.
- The Berean Bible School Scholarship Endowment Fund was established to perpetuate the memory of Berean Bible School and its significant impact on the lives and Christian development of its graduates.
- 8. The Board adopted the calendar year for reporting the finances of the Foundation.
- 9. Forms for application for scholarships were finalized.
- A scholarship grant of \$500 was made to Miss Ruth Geer from the Rev. and Mrs. R. C. Reichenbach Scholarship Fund. Miss Geer is a member of the Harrisburg congregation and attends Columbia International University.
- 11. The Board approved a loan of up to \$25,000 from endowment funds to Pinebrook Junior College at 8% per annum. The loan and interest are to be repaid from the proceeds of the sale of College properties.

# Report of the Bible Fellowship Church Homes, Inc.

Time is a gift from God given to every person in equal increments. The one variable in the gift of time is when the end for each one will occur.

As time moves incessantly, we each face significant periods in our individual personal lives as well as in our various corporate "lives". Ecclesiastes 3:1 informs us that, *There is a time for every thing, and a season for every activity under heaven*. The writer continues with a series of oxymorons. These sharp contrasts do sum up the activities which consume our time.

However, life is more than a monotonous round of seeming contradictions. Certainly we experience times of testing and even darkness, but we can declare, whether boldly or weakly, that *our times are in His hands* (Psa. 31:15). God wants us to *redeem the time* or use every opportunity that he places before us. (Eph. 5:15 & 16; Col. 4:5).

God, who created time and controls time, is moving towards the final end of history. We do not know when that final end will be, but we can move with God toward that end. Let us endeavor to buy up every opportunity to use this ministry of Bible Fellowship Church Homes to further God's kingdom and to serve others in His name.

#### **Fellowship Community**

As an advertising program is developed a concerted effort will be made to develop a consistent use of the name Fellowship Community.

Also, with the name Fellowship Community, we must formulate development plans for the entire Community. Fellowship Courts can continue to be expanded. We must plan for this by developing a financial plan and the time framework. On the Whitehall campus, two levels of assisted living should be considered for development, which would be Personal Care and Assisted Living, sometimes referred to as Aging in Place. May God grant to us His wisdom and perseverance to accomplish a full offering of care options.

#### Fellowship Courts

Construction of the two buildings which will complete Musselman Court is on schedule. Inclement weather has not been a significant factor in causing delays.

The construction schedule, barring unforeseen delays, calls for an

occupancy date of the 5-unit building on May 18, 1997 and an occupancy date of June 29, 1997 for the 8-unit building.

Because our marketing programs allow prospective residents the opportunity of choosing among several no-cost or low-cost options, there is some intensive coordination required from time to time. Equipment for the "community" kitchen will soon be ordered, which includes tableware, dishware, appliances, and tables and chairs for the dining room.

The residential appliances have been ordered.

The utility building is completed on the exterior. Since this will have a workshop area, donations of tools, work tables, used kitchen floor and wall cabinets and other such items would be accepted.

Ten of the twelve units under construction presently have deposit moneys placed on them. There is significant interest in the remaining units to cause us to feel confident that they will be occupied. One of the twelve new units is being reserved for occupancy by an administrator/manager of the Courts.

The community spirit of the residents continues to develop by means of holiday dinners, teas and luncheons. Weekly shopping trips are provided. We are grateful to Ralph Cole for volunteering to drive for most of these trips as well as to a monthly Seniors' luncheon at Emmaus and one special shopping trip to the Poconos. Perhaps he will soon commit himself to becoming a resident. We could use his volunteer assistance, but such commitments are difficult for one to make. The residents continue to provide volunteer services to Fellowship Manor in the activities program, the record keeping department and the central supply program.

On October 31, a get acquainted reception was held for the prospective residents. It was encouraging to see how quickly they "bonded." From time to time newsletters are mailed to these folks.

#### Fellowship Manor

The past year for Fellowship Manor has been a very busy one. The census has remained well above the budgeted number of 96.6%. There has been an increase in the number of times when we had to turn applicants away because all the beds were filled.

Fellowship Manor is seeking accreditation by the Joint Commission for Accreditation of Health Organizations. Times have been busy because in order to be approved by JCAHO, our policy and procedure manuals must be revised and rewritten so as to fit the JCAHO model.

Robert Zentz has been filling his position as Administrator in a very fine and commendable manner.

#### Fellowship Home

This year was most satisfactory at Fellowship Home. Census was at or near 100% until the last 2 months. Four vacancies occurred within days of each other, and because full occupancy for a period of time caused the waiting list to fade to zero, all the beds have not been filled yet. The beds are being filled and applications are being processed.

There is a strong desire by administration and staff to have the patio built in the yard outside the dining room.

James Ernst as Administrator is again to be commended for his faithful, concerned, and persistent work ethic and performance.

#### Miscellaneous

An agreement with the Township of Whitehall has been signed relieving Fellowship Manor of any obligation to pay the business privilege tax. Fellowship Manor has agreed not to proceed with action to obtain refunds on the taxes paid on the previous three years.

An agreement has been signed allowing PennDOT the right-of-way to widen Mauch Chunk Road from Schadt Avenue to Rural Road. Construction has been slated to begin in Spring of 1997, and should be completed by early Fall 1997.

All of our staff members at every level of service are to be commended for their faithful service. The Board members serve well to oversee this important ministry. The greatest praise must go to our gracious God and Saviour who enables all to serve in this ministry.


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# Report of the Pinebrook Bible Conference

Pinebrook Bible Conference held its first official convocation as an agency of the BFC on Labor Day, Monday, September 2, 1968. There have been many difficulties, discouragements, challenges and tough situations since that day but there has also been many tremendous blessings, spiritual victories and life-changing experiences won in the lives of hundreds if not thousands of children, young people and adults on these holy grounds.

We continue to strive for excellence in providing for the physical, material and spiritual needs of our guests. Our staff is committed to the task of making Pinebrook a true "Pinnacle" facility and to this end we have finished the second year of our five-year development plan, PINNACLE PROJECT.

The Long-Range Planning Committee and the Pinebrook administration in particular is also working on a Master Plan of development. It was our hope to present this plan to this Annual Conference with final approval of our board. We are seeking to evaluate and project the future ministry potential that can be provided to the BFC and the Church universal on the present grounds which we own as we face the tremendous opportunities of the 21st Century. There are three main areas that we are studying:

- Estate Program need for staff housing
- 2. Provincial Program New administration facilities, book store, recreational and lounge facilities.
- Charter Program New deluxe motel facilities which could also accommodate families that may choose deluxe accommodations. This will also include different configuration of some of our present motels.

The administration is also committed to financial integrity and responsibility. We continue to operate this ministry in the black and are making great strides to remove our indebtedness. However, it is obvious to us that if we are to adopt a Master Plan of Development and seek to aggressively develop it, it will be necessary for us to make a substantial loan. It is our hope that we will eliminate all other debts before we launch into an expanded development. We believe that it is possible that all or nearly all debt will be paid by Dec.31, 1997. Our 1997 budget is carrying a debt service of \$44,000 and this can be applied to debt service for 1998, and is sufficient to make a loan which could be used to fund the expense of developing the "Provincial Program" of the Master Plan presented by the Long-Range Planning Committee. This is contingent on the preliminary approval of the Pinebrook Board of Directors meeting on June 12, 1997 and

the final approval of the plans and financial package to be given to the Pinebrook Board of Directors at their meeting on December 11, 1997. We are also committed to maintain rates which are very reasonable for both the retreats and the summer program. Slight increases have been made and will continue, but a survey has showed us that our retreat rates are very competitive and our summer rates are well below all others. It is also our opinion that we offer facilities above the average as it relates to our rates. We have also been told by many that the improved menu which we began in the beginning of 1996 has placed Pinebrook well above almost all other similar Bible Conferences in the selection, quality and quantity of food served.

Our staff continues to serve with great dedication. Some of the new staff has brought an excitement and positive influence which has helped to inspire others who have been here a longer time. A special recognition is to be given to two couples, John and Edna Moran and David and Polly Thoman who both have resigned as staff members in the past but have continued on a part-time basis and have now found it necessary to retire from these part-time activities because of health reasons. We thank God for the faithful and loyal ministry of these dear folks in the years gone by.

### Report of the Board of Victory Valley Camp

"Do not fear, for I am with you; Do not anxiously look about you; for I am your God. I will strengthen you, surely I will help you, Surely I will uphold you with My righteous right hand." Isa. 41:10 (NASB)

I am reminded as I prepare this report that there really are only two ways to look at life-- through the eyes of man or through the eyes of our Sovereign, mighty God. God allows circumstances to change and brings both good and calamity, and yet the promise that we need not fear or be anxious about anything because God is God is still truer than ever. Praise the Lord!

As we look at the year in review for Victory Valley Camp, we continue to be reminded and encouraged that we need not fear or be anxious about anything-- the loss of a building, the lack of funds for a property purchase, or the awesome responsibility of almost 900 campers on our grounds for the summer. God is still God and His promises can still be counted on!

God is still faithfully ministering to summer staff, children and teens, and retreat groups through our most capable full-time staff members, Phil Atkins and Donna Bauer, and their families. The fall of 1996 brought a change in housing for Phil and his family as they moved into the house on the property (7572 Sigmund Rd.) which God provided this year. God has been faithfully working through many in our denomination from the Board of Directors to the Board of Fellowship Homes to many individuals who gave to make this purchase happen! We especially want to thank God for His provision through the gifts given through the matching fund drive for the new property purchase and want to thank those of you who sacrificially gave to make this possible. Also, we praise God for those who gave to make beginning repairs and ending purchase costs possible too! God has seen fit to allow the re-building of Victory Hall this year as well and one exciting note to make is that it was first used by the youth of our church for the November Thanksgiving Rally!

To go along with the many improvements made to our physical plant, God's hand was evident in the lives of staff and campers this past summer. Our 61-member summer staff ministered to 853 campers. 72 of these campers come to us from the "Jews for Jesus" group which has been bringing children for the past 6 years. Throughout the summer, we keep track of those children who have professed faith in Christ for the first time. 21 children trusted Christ as Savior and Lord of their lives this summer! Praise God! Also, 15 children expressed a commitment to profess Christ to

others through their lifestyle today and future vocation! These are the kinds of things that we count when looking to see that the summer was a success. One other special program note is that our Outpost Camping ministry was 93% full this summer with 183 children and teens attending.

The "Victory Interested Person" program continues to be a vital part of camp ministry and support throughout the year. We once again want to thank those who continue to give of their time and money to help keep Victory Valley operating.

Camper fees will increase this year from \$169 to \$175. These fees still do not cover the actual cost of a week per camper; therefore, we cordially request each church to prayerfully evaluate its giving to the camp again this year. We want to remind the churches that those who contribute 1% of their total budget are eligible to receive a \$17.50 discount for all summer campers and a 10% discount for all retreat groups from that church who come to Victory Valley.

The 1996 financial report reviewed by Ellis L. Hostetter will follow this report.

The Board of Victory Valley Camp held four regularly-scheduled meetings since the 113th Annual Conference. # Report of the Stewardship Council

The Council met twice during the period January 1, 1996 through December 31, 1996 to conduct Bible Fellowship Church Stewardship business.

The Council continues to oversee the Deferred Gift Annuity Fund managed by Mennonite Foundation. These programs were created to financially assist Fellowship Manor and some of our local churches. The combined market value of the funds as of December 31, 1996 was \$70,104.97

The Council was able to meet its financial obligations during this past fiscal year, and has ended the year with a strong cash reserve of \$3,366.58. During that period, no contributions were needed from the Administrative Budget or the agencies. The financial reports are included with this report.

Pastors and treasurers are encouraged to review the educational resource packet for BFC agencies and local churches titled, "BFC Planned Giving Programs". These informational packets were designed to encourage donors to directly contact a BFC agency or their local church for assistance. A three-ring binder with copies of these packets was distributed to pastors at the 112th Annual Conference in April, 1995. Copies can be reproduced for distribution within the congregations on an as-needed basis.

As approved at the 112th Annual Confernce, beginning in 1996 and annually thereafter, the first Sunday in February has been designated as Stewardship Sunday. Pastors are encouraged to present a stewardship message during the morning worship service. A listing of Scripture verses pertaining to stewardship can be found in the three-ring binder mentioned above.

During the year, Jay H. Fasnacht submitted his resignation as Director of Stewardship Services due to his retirement out of state. Council is currently searching for a replacement.

# Report of the Strategic Planning Committee

The Strategic Planning Committee met five times this year to move toward integrating the specific goals and objectives of the particular churches and agencies of the Bible Fellowship Church.

As a result of the Strategic Planning Committee's presentation to the 1996 Annual Conference, the committee specifically noted the following:

- 1. Denominational assistance and counsel is needed for local pastors.
- The relationship between elders and pastors can have tremendous impact on the ministry of the local church and, hence, on the denomination.
- A serious need exists for leadership development for both local churches and the denomination.
- 4. Regionalization would strengthen local fellowships as it extends the ministry of the denomination overall.
- 5. Some "regions" already exist in the denomination.

Much consideration has been given by the Committee regarding the regionalization of the denomination. Studies have been completed of three other denominations with similarities to the Bible Fellowship Church to determine how they function with regions. Our findings show a positive impact in all three denominations as a result of regionalization.

Without desiring to reinvent the wheel, the committee reviewed the ministry already taking place in the Bible Fellowship Church by "regions" or groups of churches. Though activity and focus varies from group to group, a significant amount of work is already being done by these groups of churches.

For example: The pastors of the Lehigh Valley Bible Fellowship Churches meet monthly for prayer and discussion as well as quarterly for a pastor/pastor's wife luncheon. The churches share resource materials, ideas, and prayer concerns. Together they provide a corporate Good Friday service and Praise Celebration.

The pastors of the New York churches meet monthly as the "Mid-Hudson Team" with the goal of ministering to the needs of their brothers, corporately promoting the Bible Fellowship Church in the Mid-Hudson region, and being a matrix by praying, promoting, and planning for areas of church planting in that area. Promotion includes such corporate events as baptismal services, retreats, and missions conferences.

The Capital Region Consortium (eight churches from mid-Pennsylvania to Delaware) have joined together not only for fellowship and encouragement, but also specifically for the purpose of mutually supporting missionaries. A monthly prayer and interaction time has proven to be of great value to this fellowship of pastors. Plans for church planting, regional activities, and shared efforts to approve and send missionaries with primary funding from these eight churches have all proven to be of great success. The Consortium is by far the most developed region in the denomination.

Other groupings of churches exist as well. The purpose of these groupings and the extent of each group's structure and affiliation varies, but our findings show that some regionalization is already taking place within the denomination with positive results.

After prayerfully considering our findings, we believe that regionalization of the Bible Fellowship Church would strengthen the local church, our pastors, the fellowship between churches in a given area, and the denomination as a whole. Such regionalization could promote a greater sense of belonging to a part of the Body of Christ beyond one's own congregation, a strong base for missions outreach and church planting, a nurturing atmosphere for younger and struggling churches in a region, and a forum for greater fellowship between sister churches.

With this in mind, we submit the following resolution to the Annual Conference for its consideration:

- <u>Whereas</u>, it is God's will that the ministry of the Bible Fellowship Church be strengthened to more effectively minister to our nation and our world, and
- <u>Whereas</u>, numerical growth as well as the expansion of the geographical perimeters of the Bible Fellowship Church require change in leadership structures to carry out such ministry, and
- <u>Whereas</u>, growth and leadership potential can be enhanced by the joining of mutually-connected churches within our larger fellowship of churches, therefore, be it
- Resolved, that the 114th Annual Conference of the Bible Fellowship Church direct the Strategic Planning Committee to prepare legislation for regionalization in the Bible Fellowship Church at first reading for the 115th Annual Conference.

# An Addition to the Report of the Strategic Planning Committee

In response to the mandate given by this Annual Conference to study the administrative structure of the Bible Fellowship Church and bring recommendations back to the 115<sup>th</sup> Annual Conference, the Strategic Planning has developed the following three stage approach:

#### Stage One: Leadership Summit

The Strategic Planning Committee will meet with past and present key leaders of the denomination including some of our agency heads to discuss pertinent issues related to evaluating, streamlining, and possible restructuring of the Bible Fellowship Church administrative structure. The Strategic Planning Committee will provide participants with questions for consideration prior to the Summit and will take the input from that meeting into consideration for future planning.

#### Stage Two: Leadership Forum

After reviewing the findings gained in the Leadership Summit, the Strategic Planning Committee will conduct an Open Forum with all Bible Fellowship Church leaders during the 1997 Ministerial Convention, September 30 and October 1 to gain further input and to present models of possible restructuring.

#### Stage Three: Committee Work

During the coming church year, the committee will study and synthesize their findings and will prepare proposals relating to the possible restructuring of the administration of the Bible Fellowship Church for presentation to the 115<sup>th</sup> Annual Conference. This may include development of a model of cooperative efforts between agencies and will include the concept of regionalization.

We value the input of the members of Annual Conference as we continue our work and ask that your ideas be forwarded in writing to the committee secretary.

As the Board of Publication and Printing passed through the year 1996 we took a look at our past. The December, 1996 issue of *Fellowship News* reviewed the thirty-five years of publishing history. An interview with the original editor, Pastor David E. Thomann, and other former editors, gave us an historical perspective. Our present editor, Carol Z. Snyder, is coming to a first-anniversary mark with a year of solid progress for *Fellowship News*. We have been most grateful and humbled by many of you who have taken the time to tell us of the fine job she is doing. Thank you for the encouragement. Your suggestions are always welcome.

"Go ahead and hit us" is what we want you to do. We trust you will do that on your computer and not with it. The Internet web site of the Bible Fellowship Church was started this year. Our "Web Servant", Eric Clontz, of our Wallingford Church, has invested much time in establishing this new medium. We want to especially thank Byron Barnshaw and Jerry Moyer for all their work in this project as well. Like most of our projects, it is ongoing and will continue to be "under construction". We will need the input of the Agencies and Churches to make this truly effective. We are finding the e-mail section to be of growing interest. If we do not have your e-mail address please be sure to give it to us. Our address is www.bfc.org. The Board will be giving more attention to the development of the web page this year. A special presentation will be made at this Annual Conference on the possibilities for your church's involvement on the BFC website.

The new *Faith & Order* is proving to be quite popular. The inserts containing some corrections and new material passed by the 113th Annual Conference will be made available at this conference. If you have not seen the most recent *Faith & Order* be sure to obtain a copy at the Board of Publication and Printing table.

While you are at the table, check out our newest booklet - *Advanced Directives*. This material is from the 1996 *Yearbook* and should prove most helpful for those who are making critical end-of-life decisions from a Christian perspective.

Last year, the Board experimented with receiving payment for the

Fellowship News at Annual Conference. This seemed to strike a receptive note with many of you and we will be doing it again this year. You should be prepared to pay for not only this, but any material you purchase, and the 1997 Yearbooks you order.

The publishing work of the Bible Fellowship Church has historically been done with financing from a kind of patchwork quilt of sources subsidies from the BFC Board of Directors; contributions from conference agencies, boards, committees, and churches; and sales of printed materials. In order to keep expenses to the churches down, the Board has never charged the full cost of production of materials and some have been provided at no expense. An example is last year's *Yearbook* - we charged \$6.25, but the actual cost of producing was \$8.33. The source of our dilemma is not difficult to see. A commercial venture operating on this standard would have soon gone out of business.

To ease this problem and to be more responsible, the Board is planning to do the following: (1) Obtain sponsorships for each issue of the *Fellowship News* and the *Yearbook*. This option will be pursued under strict guidelines outlined in our Policy Handbook. (2) For the first time in four years, request a contribution increase for *Fellowship News* (25¢ per member increase). (3) There will also be an increase in the *Yearbook* price.

Finally, if you have any thoughts or suggestions as to how the Board of Publication and Printing can serve our agencies and churches better, please call anyone on the Board. We value your input.

# Report of the Board of Christian Education

The Board of Christian Education met four times during the past year to give oversight to the Christian Education ministries of the denomination. In addition to the meetings of the entire board, four sub-committees met as needed to plan, develop, and implement specific Christian Education ministries for the denomination.

#### Audio-Visual Library

Video resources continue to be a valuable asset to the local churches. Among the additions to the Library this year are Patrick Morley's "The Man in the Mirror," Henry Blackaby's "Experiencing God" and Bruce Wilkinson's two series, "The Testing of Your Faith," and "The Three Chairs." We once again encourage local churches to take advantage of this invaluable resource provided by the denomination. The library is housed in Bethel Bible Fellowship Church in Emmaus.

#### **Christian Education Training**

The 1996 Christian Education Seminar was held March 2, 1996 in Nazareth with Dr. Robert Choun of Dallas Seminary. Choun addressed the Christian Education leaders from the denomination concerning evaluation and effective ministry in the next millennium.

In an exciting, unprecedented move, the Board of Christian Education provided the resources necessary to train one of our pastors, David N. Schoen, to be an approved instructor with "Walk Thru the Bible Ministries" in Atlanta. Through an agreement with Walk Thru the Bible, David is now trained and available to present the Old Testament Walk Thru seminar at Bible Fellowship Churches, regardless of size. In addition, the children's program entitled, "Kids In the Book" is being offered as well. Several churches have already taken advantage of this excellent ministry. We encourage interested churches to contact David Schoen for further details.

#### Pastor - Elder - Deacon Retreat

This year's retreat was held November 8-9 at Pinebrook Bible Conference. In an attempt to return to basic biblical teaching regarding the ministries of pastors, elders, and deacons in the Bible Fellowship Church, speakers for this year's retreat were gifted pastors and laymen from within our denomination. This weekend of practical, Bible teaching provided an excellent training tool for 185 aspiring, new, and experienced leaders in the church.

The 1997 retreat will be held November 7-8 at Pinebrook. "Mentoring" will be the focus of the weekend.

#### Youth

Another exciting year of ministry to teens has been led by the Youth Subcommittee of the Board. Tremendous response has been seen in the increased participation of our churches at all youth events. Thank you for your support.

#### Thanksgiving Youth Rally

After an afternoon of sports and activity, 333 teens and leaders met at the new all purpose building at Victory Valley for pizza, music, and interaction. Daryl Cox, a young man who is HIV+ due to blood transfusions received more than 15 years ago, shared his testimony with the young people. Response to the entire day was excellent. It is a joy to work cooperatively with other Bible Fellowship Boards to bring events like these to our people.

#### Sno-Glo

More than 900 teens and leaders participated in Sno-Glo the first three weekends of 1997. We were pleased to have exclusive booking of Pinebrook Bible Conference so that the focus of all three weekends could be entirely on Bible Fellowship young people. Rod Arters, Randy Hunt, and Todd Henley taught the teens and response was very positive. We look forward to working with Pinebrook again in 1998 to provide three invaluable weekends of ministry for the young people of the denomination.

#### Youth Leadership Seminar

The September 14 Youth Leadership Seminar was presented at Blandon Bible Fellowship Church with Dr. Paul Tripp as the keynote speaker. More than 50 youth and adult leaders participated in this training event. Plans are now underway for a September 13, 1997 seminar. Please watch for details.

## Report of the Historical Committee

The archive collection of the Bible Fellowship Church continues to grow. Our archive contains over 2000 catalogued items and almost 1500 photographs. We are grateful to those who have shared with us their valued treasures knowing that we will maintain and preserve them for our children. We do not know when the Lord will return. If He tarries, our children and grandchildren will appreciate knowing our rich heritage. If your parents and grandparents were part of the Mennonite Brethren In Christ / Bible Fellowship Church, you may have historical treasures of old records, letters, books, photographs and the like. Don't throw them away but share them with others who can appreciate the wonderful story attached to such items.

The Historical Society of the Bible Fellowship Church (not to be confused with this committee, The Historical Committee) is a group of people who are interested in the history of our church. The Society circulates a newsletter with matters of historical interest and meets once a year to hear presentations on subjects relating to our history. The Society is in its 14th year and has a valuable collection of presentations which are adding immeasurably to our knowledge of our past. If you or someone you know would like to be part of this society, you can contact Loretta Heist, PO Box 67, Zionsville, PA 18092. Cost of the yearly membership is \$16.00 per individual and \$22.00 per married couple.

During the past year, the Historical Committee published the diary of a young preacher named Levi Young who worked with our church in its earliest days. His diary of 1863 is filled with insight into the issues and concerns that were present at our beginning. His diary is entitled, "Today I Felt Serious". Copies are available from Richard Taylor at a cost of \$4.00.

The Historical Committee has chosen to purchase microfilm records of the Gospel Banner covering issues from 1878 to 1952. The Gospel Banner was the denominational magazine of the Mennonite Brethren in Christ and will be a great source of information about churches and individuals from our past. Through the help of the Mennonite Historians of Eastern Pennsylvania of Harleysville, these records were purchased at a greatly reduced rate.



# Report of the Director of Church Extension

### Shoulder to Shoulder

Then will I purify the lips of the people, that all of them may call on the name of the Lord and serve him shoulder to shoulder.

Zephaniah 3:9

In 1996, Bible Fellowship Churches substantially increased their support for the Church Extension Department. The churches' offerings were up over \$30,000 beyond 1995 offerings—an 18.6 percent increase. This surge in giving pushed the total income for the Department to more than \$20,000 over the 1996 budget. We are profoundly grateful to the Lord and His churches for this outpouring of support for MISSION AMERICA. It is a beautiful example of serving the Lord "shoulder to shoulder."

### **Zephaniah**

Zephaniah is considered one of the minor prophets of the Old Testament Scriptures. He is called "minor" because the book of his prophecy is small, not because he lacked anything when it came to courage, boldness or the call of God to declare His revealed truth. In the seventh century B.C., Zephaniah was directed to proclaim the Lord's judgment on various nations of the world and then on Judah and Jerusalem because of apostasy, idolatry and corruption.

In contrast to the wicked officials, false prophets and priests in Jerusalem, Zechariah sees that, "The Lord within her [the city] is righteous; he does no wrong. Morning by morning he dispenses his justice, and every new day he does not fail, yet the unrighteous have no shame" (3:5).

After the wrath of the Lord will have been poured out, Zephaniah declares good news of God's love and grace for a righteous remnant who will inhabit the chastened city, "the meek and humble, who trust in the name of the LORD" (3.12). The prophet may look into the era of the new covenant, as he sees "the peoples" of the earth in the City of God. "Then will I purify the lips of the peoples," the Lord says, "that all of them may call on the name of the LORD and serve him shoulder to shoulder" (3:9).

## Philip and Alexander

About three centuries after Zephaniah's time, a young man around age thirty reportedly sat down and wept because there were not more worlds left to conquer. He is called Alexander the Great. His empire, stretching from the Danube River in Europe south to Africa and east through the fertile

crescent, Assyria, Persia and to India, was the greatest known domain of that time. Alexander, and his father, Philip of Macedonia, before him perfected and used an ancient military formation, the *phalanx* to capture the world.

The Encyclopedia Britannica describes the phalanx as "an unbroken linear array of heavily armed infantry standing shoulder to shoulder in files that were normally 8 men deep but sometimes deeper" (they could go up to 16). Each soldier carried a round shield, an eight-foot long pike for thrusting and a two-foot sword for hand-to-hand conflict. Four phalanxes (256 men each) comprised a *chiliarchin* or division of one thousand. Philip added light infantry and cavalry to the phalanx and Alexander originated the supply system that enabled universal victory.

### The Church at Philippi

About three centuries after Alexander the Great, the Apostle Paul writing to a young Macedonian church in the city Philippi—named by and for Philip of Macedonia—said "Whatever happens, conduct yourselves in a manner worthy of the gospel of Christ. Then... I will know that you stand firm in one spirit, contending as one man for the faith of the gospel without being frightened in any way by those who oppose you" (Phil. 1:27,28). The church in Philip's city was "A Phalanx of God."

#### A Contemporary Phalanx

The church planting program of the Bible Fellowship Church is also an example of the Lord's people serving Him "shoulder to shoulder." The work is led by a Board of men from ten of the churches, who are chosen by representatives of all of the congregations. All of the pastors and organizing pastors who serve in the Department hold credentials in the BFC, and have been called according to our rules of pulpit supply. Each man is part of a ministry team.

Each mission congregation is governed by a board of surrogate elders who come from other Bible Fellowship Churches. The development of each congregation, in moving from unorganized mission to organized mission and from that category to particular church, is monitored and measured by an assessment committee comprised of elders from several of the churches.

Most of the young congregations are blessed by the service of work and ministry teams that come to them from their "older sister" churches. In their early lives, some of these young congregations are also fortunate to have the ministry of Priscilla and Aquila couples. Often well-established churches will take a special interest in a new mission and there will be frequent contact through letters, phone calls, informal visits, and pulpit exchanges.

Almost all of the churches, and many individuals, provide financial support for new church formation. They receive information through prayer

letters, "It Happened Like This," and articles in *Fellowship News*. They are helped in praying for the department congregations through prayer letters, "The Extension Call" and the Board of Missions Prayer Bulletin

When a mission is recognized as a particular church there is a stirring ceremony at Annual Conference, and the new church takes its place "shoulder to shoulder" with the rest of the churches.

#### Scranton and Bayshore

Two of the missions, Scranton, Pennsylvania, and Aberdeen, New Jersey, come for recognition as particular churches by this 114th Annual Conference. After a "near death" experience, the eighty-year-old Calvary Church of Scranton has truly had a revival or resuscitation, under the pastoral leadership of Roger L. Reitz. Every area of the congregation's life has grown and solidified. John Moran and Larry Kellerman have been elected elders and the church is ready to be re-chartered by this Conference.

Bayshore Church, on the south shore of Raritan Bay, has been meeting for public worship for less than two-and-one-half years. David DeRonde and Gene Russell were recently elected elders. Worship attendance averages around seventy, many of whom have been brought to faith in Christ through the mission. John C. Vandegriff, Jr. is the founding/organizing pastor.

### Two New Missions

The church at Wappingers Falls, New York, has been relocated and reborn as the Beacon Mission in that small city on the east bank of the Hudson River in Dutchess County, immediately south of the Town of Wappinger. David R. Way accepted the call to serve as organizing pastor. The congregation began meeting at the Howland Cultural Center, 477 Main Street in Beacon on September 1, 1996. Four committed families from Wappinger comprise the present congregation; worship attendance has averaged about twenty. An office on Main Street has been rented, and aggressive outreach efforts are being planned for spring, summer and fall, 1997.

Our newest mission is located in Flatbush, Brooklyn, New York. Meeting since November 1994, the congregation is known as New Community Church. It is a warmly-spirited group of twenty-five to thirty persons, with a very active outreach program. We are diligently seeking a pastor to serve this young congregation.

### Thompson, Connecticut

The mission in Thompson, Connecticut, our eastern-most congregation, experienced testing during 1996. Several families became very critical of the pastor and made unreasonable and unfounded charges against some of their

fellow believers. When the surrogate elders, after investigation, would not allow unsubstantiated allegations to stand, the dissenters withdrew, leaving a void. Those who remained rallied to the work, and growth has slowly returned. Eight persons were baptized during the year, offerings were down less than \$1,200 from the previous year. Good growth has been occurring through an early worship service. Christopher Morrison and the Executive Director serve with Pastor Dennis Spinney as a Board of Surrogate Elders.

#### Two New Pastors

Two department churches received new pastors during the year. In August, Jonathan P. Tait became pastor of Calvary Church in Walnutport, Pennsylvania. Average attendance at morning worship has increased 30 percent and the church has recently added two new elders, Daniel Graver and Timothy Weaber, to serve along with Stanley Stahler, Jonathan Weaber and the pastor as overseers of the church.

David N. Heineman has succeeded David R. Way as pastor of the church at Pleasant Valley, New York. Brother Heineman has been a member of Grace Church, Wallingford, and Berean Church, Terre Hill, before studying at Dallas Theological Seminary. He came to Pleasant Valley from a pastorate in Emlenton, Pennsylvania, after being approved as a probationer in the BFC. He was installed January 26.

## Newark, New Jersey, and Staten Island, New York

We have two well-established missions in the metropolitan New York-New Jersey area. The congregation in Newark continues to mature and progress towards full organization as a particular church. Its social fabric and koinonia are exceptionally strong. There continues to be a strong flow of new believers, converted through our Newark ministry. As the congregation has matured, it has taken on greater diversity in a variety of ethnic backgrounds. We solicit earnest prayer that the Lord will provide an access property so that the lot acquired over a year ago may soon be developed to provide room for the growing congregation.

Pastor Ralph E. Ritter continues to serve as a shepherd to the flock in West Brighton, Staten Island, New York. The AWANA program remains very fruitful, as evidenced by a recent attendance of eighty-six at a parents' night. Some significant outreach efforts the past year included a seminar on the Jehovah's Witness Cult, with distribution of thousands of fliers throughout the neighborhood, a video series and an outreach Bible study. An ad-hoc committee comprised of Pastor Ritter and the other surrogate elders: Delbert R. Baker, II, Ralph E. Cole, David R. Way and the Executive Director, and Clyde W. Snyder, formulated specific goals for the coming years.

#### Egg Harbor Township, New Jersey

This mission in southern New Jersey is refocusing. Pastor Richard A. Moyer serves full-time as chaplain of the Atlantic County Correctional Facility in Mays Landing. He has seen a number of inmates profess faith in Christ. The surrogate elders are considering plans to relocate the mission with the goal of providing a congregation in which inmates who confess Christ and their families can be taught and nurtured. Pray with us for the Lord's direction and provision.

#### Four More Churches

The churches in Edison, New Jersey; Holmes, New York; Ocean County, New Jersey; and Red Hill, continue to grow and mature.

Faith Church of Holmes has supported itself without budgeted appropriations for two years. God willing, it will graduate from the Department in April 1998. Robert S. Commerford serves as pastor.

Community Church, Red Hill, is pastored by Ronald W. Denlinger and D. Thomas Phillips. The church has supported itself fully through the first of its three-year emergence from the Department.

Christ Community Church in Edison, New Jersey, begins its three year phase-out at this time. Dennis M. Cahill and Richard P. Ravis constitute the pastoral staff. Five Christmas week presentations of "Meet Me at the Manger" in a heated barn on the campus of Cook College, Rutgers University, reached nearly eight hundred persons.

Finally the church in Toms River, Ocean County, New Jersey, continues to serve and develop. Dean A. Stortz is the pastor.

### **Opportunities**

We ask for the prayers of the BFC family that we be able to start two or three new churches in 1997. The demise of Salem Church, Allentown, after nearly ninety years in its south side neighborhood prompts us to make an assessment of the prospect of planting a new congregation in that area. We shall work with the City Concerns pastors in a survey that will be completed by June 1.

We have identified a city of seventeen thousand near Albany, New York, that is much in need of an evangelical church. We shall be working with our Mid-Hudson team in a study of the feasibility of a new church plant in that location.

There are several reasonable target communities for a new church start in the tri-state (Connecticut-Massachusetts-Rhode Island) area. It would be beneficial to our Thompson, Connecticut, mission and to the future of the BFC in New England to have one or more new missions in that vicinity.

There is a community in Southern New Jersey that is growing rapidly

and could use a new church. We have a core group in the area interested in starting a church and a possible organizing pastor.

There is a key family and a needy area in the Coatesville-Downingtown vicinity of Pennsylvania that would be a good, strategic place for a new BFC.

We have a ministerial candidate who would like to plant a BFC in Virginia. I have advised him to pray for and seek a teammate as a first step in that direction.

We are working with the Board of Missions and the Intercultural Ministries Study Committee through the Joint Committee for Ethnic Church Planting to seek to start the first Hispanic BFC. We also hope to see Beraca Church (Haitian) in Philadelphia and New Life Church (Chinese) in Sunset Park, Brooklyn, become Bible Fellowship Churches.

Several of the churches indicate definite interest in planting daughter churches. One church has formed a committee to study this option and one region is organizing to plant new churches cooperatively.

We need prayers for wisdom and the direction of the Holy Spirit through opening and closing doors so that we may know when and where to plan new church plantings. Let's work together, shoulder to shoulder, to put forth our very best efforts, for Jesus' sake, to reach out with His Gospel to evangelize and church our needy nation.

### Why Should We Plant More Bible Fellowship Churches?

By God's grace, we are stewards of the Bible Fellowship Church for this time. What does our Lord desire of us during our stewardship? What kind of church starting program will really please Him?

I call on three men whom I respect to help answer this question. Peter Wagner, in a Church Growth class, set forth a focused goal: Ten churches should be able to start one new church each year. Wagner is talking about average sized churches. Some do much more. Under Rick Warren's leadership, Saddleback Community Church in California set a goal at its beginning to plant a daughter church each year, and this sixteen year old congregation has done just that. Others plant more than one a year. We have forty-five self-supporting churches. According to Wagner's formula, we should plan to start 4.5 churches per year, and thus boldly commit ourselves to "the most effective evangelistic methodology under heaven"—planting new churches.

<u>Lyle Schaller</u> is arguably the most knowledgeable person about the churches of North America. Years ago, Schaller published his observation that **invariably and only it is by planting new congregations that any denominations grow** (see Schaller: "What Are the Alternatives", pp. 344-357 in *Understanding Church Growth and Decline*, ed. by Hoge and

Roozen, 1979). In a recent book, I am told, Schaller has quantified this: Unless a denomination is planting a number of new churches equal to 3 percent of its existing congregations, it is in decline.

The Southern Baptist Convention is the only old (pre-Civil War) mainline denomination in the US that has grown over the last three decades. The SBC church planting program is aggressive and exemplary. <u>Charles Chaney</u> is vice president for new church development of the Home Missions Board of the SBC. Citing Schaller's 3 percent rule, Chaney says he crunched the numbers for the past fifteen years and found that the Southern Baptists have, indeed, been starting 3 percent (three new congregations per one hundred churches). He also stated that two-thirds of their church plants die before becoming fully established churches. With fifty-eight congregations, the 3 percent rule for the BFC would be two new starts each year.

The <u>Mission America</u> five-year strategic plan sets forth new church planting goals for the BFC that fall between the Schaller and Wagner targets—a minimum of 2.2 per year and a maximum of 4.4 (see <u>Mission America</u> plan, pp. 15-16). The Board of Church Extension believes that this is the Lord's desire for us. What do you think?

A goal of two to five new church starts a year would be a dramatic increase over our pace in the past seven years—doubling, tripling, quadrupling that rate of 1.2 per year.

If it's the Lord's desire to give us many more new churches, what will be our response? Will we say a fervent "YES, Lord?" Or will we say, "No thanks, Lord. You'll have to use someone else to win, disciple and enfold Your chosen ones. We're just not into it. We're doing about all we care to do."

The Scriptures give many poignant examples of people who professed faith in the Lord who missed great blessing because they turned it down. It was written of Nazareth—a town inhabited by Jews, not pagans or infidels—"[Jesus] did not do many miracles there because of their lack of faith" (Matt. 13:58). The biblical principle is, "According to your faith will it be done to you" (Matt. 9:29). It was to the City of God, Jerusalem, that Jesus said, as He wept, "... how often I have longed to... but you were not willing!" (Luke 13:34). In a church planting passage, the Holy Spirit reveals that our labors in building the church will be assessed on God's great Day, and some of the Lord's own will fail the test, suffer loss and be saved "only as one escaping the flames" (1 Cor. 3:15). There will be others whose stewardship will be commended, "Well done good and faithful servant!... Come and share your Master's happiness" (Matt. 25:21).

If you say, "our church just doesn't have the heart to do more for starting new Bible Fellowship Churches," there is a biblical answer—give more of your money and your heart will follow it. Our Lord's principle is **not** where your heart is, there will be your treasure. No! It is "Where your treasure is, there your heart will be also" (Matt.6:21). The order is not

heart → will → treasure but rather will → treasure → heart

So, the love of Christ compels us, His death for sinners drives us, His desire that His lost sheep be found and brought into His fold focuses our purpose, His love for His Church draws forth our love for the church and His desire that many new churches be established sparks our desire to do just that in America. That is the over arching answer to the question, "Why should we plant more Bible Fellowship Churches?"

There are many other good reasons why we should plant new churches:

- New churches make and baptize many more disciples of Jesus than do older ones. A recent study of the BFC showed that our small young churches baptized five times as many disciples per one hundred members as did our older churches. This is confirmed in the experience of other denominations. Why is this so? I'm not sure I know the answer. Part of it may be due to the larger number of close unsaved friends that young disciples in new churches have, some of whom come to Christ. Maybe it's just that the Lord chooses graciously to bring larger numbers of His own into those new churches through conversion in order to get them off to a successful start.
- Young churches grow faster. In the last two years, our twenty youngest churches—all less than thirty-four years of age, with just 19 percent of our total membership produced 82 percent of our membership growth.
- The spiritual need and decline in our land is desperate and cries out for the establishment of many new churches.
- The people groups from all over the earth who migrate to America need to be reached with the Gospel. They will be most effectively evangelized and discipled by new churches that allow them to hear the Gospel, worship and learn in their own languages and culture. We need to do our part in forming such churches. This, too, is part of our Mission America Plan (pp. 16-26). The inclusion of ethnically and culturally diverse congregations into our Bible Fellowship Church will broaden, bless and strengthen our whole fellowship of churches.
- Increased support for the Church Extension Department from the churches will be seed money, like "matching gifts," to stimulate gift

income from other sources for starting new Bible Fellowship Churches. In 1996, \$75,186 was given by individuals and other (non-BFC) churches to support the formation of new BFC missions and churches—nearly one-third of the total gift income of the Department. If our churches will continue to raise their support so that more church planting missionaries may be deployed, more "other source" giving will flow to their personal support and to help fund projects on their fields. If the ratio holds, every two dollars in new support from a church will garner about one dollar in gift income from individuals and other churches.

● If we want our thriving world mission program to continue to be vigorous and growing, we must build our base by forming more new churches. Those twenty youngest congregations, with 19 percent of our membership, including our newest, tiniest and poorest, last year gave 19 percent of the support from the churches to the Board of Missions (and 21 percent of the churches' support for the Church Extension Department). As they grow, they will do more.

Dana E. Weller, Director of the Board of Missions, wrote, "A strong missions program among us is impossible without a strong emphasis on church growth. Without the success of Mission America, we will never be able to sustain the growth God has granted to us in the Board of Missions" (letter, 4/2/96). Those new churches also create new and larger constituencies for all the ministries of the BFC.

- There are tens of thousands of cities, towns, neighborhoods and villages in the US that are without a credible evangelical church or far short of enough of them. We should be planting new churches in as many of them as we can. The North Jersey metro area has scores of such communities. The large cities of America desperately need new churches. In many of the western states only 3-5 percent of the population attends church on any regular basis.
- When a church is well established, it should perpetually be "holding forth the word of life" in its community for generations—till Jesus comes again. Some of our churches have been doing just that for as much as 130 years and more—and continue faithfully to do so. A community with such a church is blessed by its presence there.
- We cherish our Articles of Faith, form of government and the distinctives of the Bible Fellowship Church as true and biblical. What a shame if we should consign neighborhoods and communities to being served by less faithful and biblical "churches" because of our indifference, indolence or irresponsibility to our Lord's Commission!
  - Only churches offer complete obedience to the Great

**Commission.** They alone baptize disciples. Only churches "teach them to obey everything" that Jesus has commanded—the whole counsel of God. Parachurch organizations always "water down" their statements of faith to accommodate varied constituencies. How irresponsible to leave evangelism and disciple-making in any community to such entities when it is in our power to plant a church there.

- Only when a disciple is involved in the life and koinonia of a particular church can he or she become fully mature and developed. Only in a church can one become all that God wants her or him to be (Eph. 4:11-16; 1 Cor. 12:24-26; Heb. 10:23-25). Before the Lord, a sound, healthy, church purposes to "present everyone perfect (mature) in Christ" (Col. 2:26). Every disciple of Jesus in America should have opportunity to be a part of that kind of church; we should make every effort and every sacrifice to present that opportunity everywhere we can by starting churches.
- Your Church Extension Department, by the Holy Spirit's enabling, has demonstrated that it has the know-how and ability effectively to establish churches. In the last twelve years, our Annual Conference has recognized and received into membership twelve new particular churches. If two more particular churches are recognized and received by this conference, that total will become fourteen in thirteen years. We could establish more churches if we had greater resources. We should provide the means.
- When we pray the Lord of the harvest, "send out workers into the harvest field," and the Lord answers our prayer, will we employ and support them in the harvest? Presently, our Ministerial Candidate Committee has thirty-six probationers, candidates and applicants under its care (see 1996 Yearbook, pp. 65, 66). Fourteen of these are not now serving in the BFC. Of the ordained ministers, not including retired men and men serving under the Board of Missions or in the military chaplaincy, there are 21 that are not serving in pastoral ministry in the BFC.

Now, having prayed for reapers, are we going to answer the Lord of the harvest, "No thanks, Lord; we have no intention of using these men in the work to which You have called them!" Will we say to these thirty-five and others who will follow them, "Sorry fellows, but we have nowhere for you to serve!" and send them off to minister in other churches?

We have a delightful new trend underway in the BFC. Churches are calling as pastoral staffers, men in the later stages of their lives, tapping their mature gifts and skills and, thus extending their years in the ministry. The continuation of the trend will constitute good stewardship of the lives and work of our seasoned pastors; it should be encouraged. But the positions they fill would likely otherwise be available for young men in the ministry.

Will we have places for those young men to serve with us?

It is within our grasp to use the harvesters the Lord sends us to plant many new congregations and thus to create new pastorates for other of our ministers and candidates to fill. Will we do it?

● The only organization on earth that Jesus Christ founded is the church. It is the only one that He said He would build (Matt. 16:18). The church is the only entity in the world of which Jesus said, "the gates of Hades will not be able to overcome it."

The USA may or may not need more Christian radio stations and TV programs, more Christian books and magazines, book stores, publishing houses, counseling centers, record producers, musical artists and agents, rescue missions and other social service agencies. It may or may not need more Christian political action groups, Christian dating services, Christian yellow pages, Christian elementary and high schools and Christian colleges, campus ministries, camps, conferences, retreat centers, ocean cruises, retirement centers, and various other Christian enterprises and organizations. We do know that our Lord did not say He would build any of these. We know their existence is not necessarily proof that He founded them; He did not guarantee that the gates of Hades would not be able to overcome any or all of them.

The United States, no doubt desperately needs **many more** sound, vital, wholesome Gospel-proclaiming churches. We should give top priority to building what He promised to build and participating in His victory through His Church. We *must* do all we can to plant our share of those churches in America which will please and glorify Him.

On January 31, 1997, as I traveled toward Thompson, Connecticut, for a New England Church Planting Team meeting, I had the pleasure of listening, on National Public Radio Stations, to the beautiful music of Franz Schubert on his two-hundredth birthday. At a break in the music, I heard Garrison Keillor make a pitch for continuing and increased charitable giving by his listeners. Keillor noted that without coercion by United States laws, persons in our country gave more than thirty billion dollars in the past year for charitable causes. I borrow his closing sentence to end this my 29th annual report to the Bible Fellowship Churches:

"Thanks for all you're doing; imagine what more could do!"

## Report of the Committee to Examine the Minutes of Particular Churches

This should include all congregational meetings held by each particular church since the previous meeting of the Committee to Examine the Minutes of Particular Churches.

This year, the Committee sent out a check sheet for the use of the church. Many returned the list and its use greatly facilitated the work of the Committee. The Committee would like to express appreciation for the care with which minutes were prepared for our examination.

## Report of the Ministerial Convention Committee

## Report of the Committee to Study the Role of the Ministerial Relations Committee

The committee met three times during the year to study the role of the Ministerial Relations Committee. Through consultation with men who served on the MRC the committee sought to assess the effectiveness of the MRC. Other denominations were researched to discover how they serve the needs of their pastors and churches.

The denominations investigated were Christian and Missionary Alliance, Christian Reformed Church, Conservative Baptist Church, Presbyterian Church in America, and United Presbyterian Church USA. All of these groups provided a higher level of service to pastors and churches than the Bible Fellowship Church does. In each case adequate care of pastors and churches is the purpose, though the role and title of the ministry varies.

Discussion with men who have served on the MRC since its inception revealed that the MRC has been able to provide a high level of service to pastors and churches in times of crisis. Each man was concerned about the MRC's ability to keep sufficient contact with pastors and churches to promote the kind of relationships that help to avoid pastor-church crises. When crisis intervention has taken place, pastors on the Committee were able to step in because their churches allowed them to serve the denomination at the expense of their church ministry. Such sacrifices are to be lauded, but pastors and boards of elders may not always be expected to subsidize our collective work.

We conclude the Bible Fellowship Church should enhance its ministry to pastors and churches. This could best be accomplished through creation of the position of Conference Pastor.

Enhanced ministry to the churches would consist of offering greater service when churches seek pastors, assessing needs related to pastoral staff expansion, or consulting in how to strengthen the ministry of the church. Enhanced ministry to pastors could include provision for regional pastor meetings, periodic visits with every pastor, and meetings as requested by pastors, pastoral relations committees, or boards of elders who desire to consult with the Conference Pastor.

It is our opinion that a Conference Pastor would provide valuable service even as a part-time position in the beginning. We believe this man could be found among retired BFC pastors or pastors engaged part-time with a church or ministry.

Study Committee: Role of MRC

Funding for this position would be supplied through the Conference

Administrative Budget and would be recommended by the MRC.

It is our recommendation that the following changes be made in the by-laws:

**Resolved**, that the following legislation be placed in the *Faith & Order* (First Reading):

#### 512-14.3 Conference Pastor

The Conference Pastor shall be an ordained minister of the Bible Fellowship Church. He may, at the discretion of the Ministerial Relations Committee, serve either full-time or part-time.

He shall be elected for a three-year term by the Ministerial Relations Committee and his election shall be ratified by the Annual Conference. He shall not be a member of the Ministerial Relations Committee but shall serve under the direction of the committee, where full authority shall reside.

#### Duties

- (1) He shall, in the performance of his duties, work according to policies and directives of the Ministerial Relations Committee.
- (2) He shall, as requested by the committee, represent the Ministerial Relations Committee in its dealings with pastors and churches.
- (3) He shall be a pastor to the pastors in order to encourage the men and to maintain a harmonious relationship between each church and pastor.
- (4) He shall meet with boards of elders and pastoral search committees to aid them in their search for a pastor. He shall:
  - (4.1) Be knowledgeable of men available as potential candidates, including men newly licensed by the Ministerial Candidate Committee.
  - (4.2) Communicate to potential candidates information on open churches.
  - (4.3) Keep pastoral search information current.
- (5) He shall encourage ongoing ministry training for pastors, including regional ministeriums for pastors and wives.
- (6) He shall be available as a resource to local pastoral relations committees in the fulfillment of their duties.
- (7) He shall be available to meet with boards of elders for consultation, evaluation, and advice.

## Report of the Inter-Cultural Ministries Study Committee

The Inter-Cultural Ministries Study Committee continued its work of completing the Biblical Principles For Living. The Committee worked at finalizing the following Biblical Principles For Living: *Marriage, Singleness, and Divorce, Civil Government, The Family, and Shared Life.* These principles have been approved by the Committee and are being presented for first reading by Annual Conference and are to be included in the *Faith & Order*, Appendix, "*Biblical Principles for Living*," (see attached Appendix).

The Board of Missions and Board of Church Extension are working together through, The Joint Committee on Ethnic Church Planting. The Committee meets to monitor and assist ethnic church planting ministries such as: The Chinese in Brooklyn NY, and the Haitian work in Philadelphia. The Joint Committee is now in the process of partnering with an Hispanic church planter, Rev. Luis Philip Martinez, ministering under the direction of Impact International, in hope of establishing Hispanic BFC churches. The Committee also approves funds to be disbursed for ethnic church planting from the monies given by the churches. This past year, the Committee approved financial assistance for the Chinese church in New York and the Haitian church in Philadelphia, as well as paying for the expenses incurred from its meeting with Rev. Martinez. Giving from the churches for ethnic church planting increased this past year. The Joint Committee thanks the churches for their continued interest and support. This support along with additional monies will be needed for the future efforts of planting Hispanic churches. The Joint Committee looks forward to working with Rev. Martinez and those BFC churches in those areas where Hispanic communities are located. Please be in prayer for this outreach among Hispanics.

Praise God for those churches who have responded with monies for ethnic church planting. The Inter-Cultural Committee continues to encourage more churches to create a line item in their budgets for ethnic church planting. These designated monies for ethnic church planting should be considered an ongoing yearly commitment and be forwarded to the Board of Missions.

#### Conclusion

The Inter-Cultural Committee continues its efforts to complete the work on the Biblical Principles for Living and seeks to assist the churches in becoming more aware and involved in cross-cultural ministry. We covet your prayers for the Committee as it faces the unique and challenging opportunities for ethnic church planting.

The Inter-Cultural Ministries Study Committee recommends:

- Whereas, monies are needed to plant ethnic Bible Fellowship Churches, and Whereas, the Committee believes that God has provided opportunities and desires the church to reach the differing people groups in our land, therefore be it
- Resolved, that each Pastor and Delegate of Annual Conference, if they have not established a line item in their budgets for ethnic church planting, work with their churches to budget monies for ethnic church planting in this year.
- Resolved, that the 114th Annual Conference approve for first reading and inclusion in Appendix, "Biblical Principles for Living" of the Faith & Order, the following Biblical Principles for Living: Marriage, Singleness and Divorce; Civil Government; The Family; Shared Life.
- Whereas, the work of the Inter-Cultural Ministries Study Committee is not yet complete,
- Resolved, that the 114th Annual Conference direct the Inter-Cultural Ministries Study Committee to continue its work.
- <u>Whereas</u>, the prospects for planting Hispanic Bible Fellowship churches are becoming a reality and,
- <u>Whereas</u>, a number of Bible Fellowship Churches are ministering in areas where Hispanic communities exist,
- Resolved, that the Board of Publication and Printing be prepared to publish the "Articles of Faith" in Spanish in 1997.
- Whereas, we believe the "Biblical Principles for Living" represent God's intended principles by which we should live, and
- Whereas, we believe that the "Biblical Principles for Living" should be urgently and diligently taught to our congregations,
- Resolved, each pastor and delegate seek ways to implement the teaching of the "Biblical Principles for Living" to their congregations and further,
- <u>Resolved</u>, that as "Biblical Principles for Living" are studied and taught, any discovery of problem areas, suggestions for additions, or clarifications of text, should be communicated to this Committee for consideration prior to Second Reading. ## **Appendix - Biblical Principles for Living**

### Marriage, Singleness, and Divorce

Marriage is the joining together of one man and one woman in a covenant union instituted and ordained of God<sup>1</sup>. The purpose of this union is to glorify God, provide companionship, and perpetuate the human race<sup>2</sup>. It is holy in God's sight and is to be a bond until the death of one partner to the union<sup>3</sup>. For this reason, marriage partners are commanded to be committed to each other physically, emotionally, and sexually, and to have no other than their marriage partner<sup>4</sup>. Although God did not specifically condemn polygamy in every instance and sometimes blessed the individuals involved in polygamous relationships in the Old Testament, the Biblical standard is one man married to one woman<sup>5</sup>. This standard is reinforced by the teaching of our Lord during His earthly ministry and the New Testament writers6. The intimacy of marriage includes mutual rights and mutual obligations of each partner to the other<sup>7</sup>. Sexual activity outside of the marriage bond by either of the marriage partners is adultery and is an attack on the oneness and permanence of marrage<sup>8</sup>. For a Christian to marry a non-Christian is a violation of the Word of God9.

God has revealed in Scripture that His will is for some people to remain single; in such cases singleness fulfills the plan of God<sup>10</sup>. In fact, the single believer may have undivided loyalty and may be more free to serve the Lord and his church<sup>11</sup>. Abstinence from impure sexual activity prior to marriage and outside the marriage union is the Biblical standard<sup>12</sup>. Sexual intercourse is to be experienced only in the marriage union; all sexual intercourse outside the marriage union, including homosexuality, is sin in God's eyes and degrades the spiritual and physical oneness He reserved for marriage<sup>13</sup>. Those who can control their sexual desires may remain unmarried to the glory of God<sup>14</sup>.

Divorce is the breaking of the union and the bond of marriage. It is hated by God and should be avoided and counseled against<sup>15</sup>. The biblical basis for divorce is adultery. Scripture permits, but never demands that a person divorce a marriage partner who has committed adultery<sup>16</sup>. People divorced for reasons other than that allowed by Scripture, ought to be reconciled, not marry another, and seek God's resolution of the breakdown of this union<sup>17</sup>. The divorced people must submit themselves to the Word of God in their present situation. Divorced persons must seek forgiveness and the grace of God for any sin that led to, or is associated, with their divorce. The church is responsible to evaluate divorces in which people under its authority have been involved in order to determine whether or not there were

Biblical grounds for divorce. The careful exercise of this responsibility is to preserve the church's purity and guard a believer's integrity<sup>18</sup>.

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#### The Family

The family was divinely ordained by God at creation and is basic in God's dealings with man. God's revealed pattern for the family is the marriage of one man and one woman and includes their children and others who may reside with them. Each marriage establishes a new family<sup>1</sup>.

The foundation for right relationships in the family is submission one to another out of reverence for Christ<sup>2</sup>. The husband is the head of the family as Christ is the head of the church. As such, he should fear the Lord; love, nurture, and encourage his family; provide materially for them; take the lead in burden bearing and problem solving; and through godly living and prayer give them wise and effective spiritual leadership<sup>3</sup>. He is to love his wife and live with her in a compassionate and understanding way<sup>4</sup>. The wife should fear the Lord<sup>5</sup>, submit to and respect her husband as the church is to submit to Christ<sup>6</sup>, and demonstrate loving and diligent concern for her household<sup>7</sup>.

The biblical pattern for a married couple is to have children and to manage the home<sup>8</sup>. Some may elect not to have children for valid reasons. Other couples may be providentially prevented from having children. In either case the church must not be judgmental<sup>9</sup>. Where married couples choose to use artificial birth control, great care must be exercised to use only those forms which clearly do not cause an abortion<sup>10</sup>.

When more than one income seems necessary and added employment is considered, the couple must carefully evaluate the impact on their relationship and children<sup>11</sup>. The decision should be made only after prayer, interaction<sup>12</sup>, and mutual consent<sup>13</sup>.

Within the church there exist family units that require special attention and mercy from the church. With prayer, loving support, wise counsel, and God's abundant grace these families can be nurtured<sup>14</sup>. The church must gladly and unwaveringly support comfort, encouragement, affirmation, and deep fellowship for all family units.

Children are gifts and blessings from God<sup>15</sup>. The family is the primary setting in which to nurture children in the faith. Great care is to be exercised by parents, and by fathers in particular, to build Christian families and lead them in worship<sup>16</sup>. The father is not to exasperate his children<sup>17</sup>, but to bring them up in the training and instruction of the Lord<sup>18</sup>.

The instruction and guidance of children is the duty of parents<sup>19</sup>. Fathers are primarily responsible for exercising leadership in the maturing of children<sup>20</sup>, and preparing them for ministry in the church<sup>21</sup>. Mothers share with their husbands the raising of their children<sup>22</sup>. The Scriptures also encourage grandparents to assist in the training and instruction of their grandchildren<sup>23</sup>.

Children are to obey their parents in respect and love<sup>24</sup>. As long as they live, sons and daughters are to honor their parents with loving concern and material care<sup>25</sup>.

Christian homes are manifestations of the kingdom of God and each believing family member is an ambassador of the King, to call lost men, women, and children to reconciliation<sup>26</sup>. We should open our homes in vigorous and sustained hospitality to the unsaved as well as to the saved<sup>27</sup>. Genuine compassion and Christian service will involve taking carefully measured risks<sup>28</sup>, but such risks are never a legitimate excuse for cold-heartedness.

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#### **Civil Government**

God, the King of Kings, has established civil government to be under His authority, over people for the public good, and to carry out His sovereign will<sup>1</sup>. He has revealed in His Word how this government should function in order to provide for a peaceful, orderly society in which the Gospel might spread<sup>2</sup>; protect the law-abiding people from the law-breakers by punishing the evildoers<sup>3</sup>; and bring justice and help to the defenseless, poor, and needy of society<sup>4</sup>.

God requires all people to submit to the civil government. People must pay taxes for the support of government functions<sup>5</sup>; they must give respect and honor to government officials<sup>6</sup>; and they must be obedient and helpful citizens of society<sup>7</sup>.

Christians have special responsibilities toward the civil government, including praying for those in authority over them<sup>8</sup>, exposing corruption and wickedness in government<sup>9</sup>, and bringing a godly influence to bear upon the government<sup>10</sup>. This means setting a godly example as a citizen, raising a biblical voice on issues, accepting positions of leadership when appropriate, and under a democratic government voting wisely. The exercise of these responsibilities should demonstrate a Christian's sensitive consideration of the views of others in love without violence and without forsaking biblical principles or the priority of glorifying God.

A Christian's ultimate allegiance must be to God, for the government's authority over the believer is limited by God's prescribed boundaries<sup>11</sup>. Therefore, a believer may find it necessary at times to disobey human authority in order to heed God's higher laws, bearing the cost or sacrifice involved<sup>12</sup>.

All Christians have dual citizenship; they are citizens of an earthly nation, and of the kingdom of God<sup>13</sup>. Both of these citizenships have their privileges and responsibilities, and it is possible to cooperate with civil government without compromising biblical principles<sup>14</sup>. Yet, when the believer is forced to choose between the two, he must submit to Jesus as Lord. For one day, every knee will bow to Him, and even today, he rules sovereignly over the affairs of civil government<sup>15</sup>.

#### **Shared Life**

Each believer belongs to Jesus Christ and to every other believer<sup>1</sup>. This belonging is a relationship to God the Father<sup>2</sup>, God the Son<sup>3</sup>, God the Holy Spirit<sup>4</sup> and to all who belong to God<sup>5</sup>. This relationship is not the result of human effort, but begins with being born from above<sup>6</sup> and is the living out of the divine nature<sup>7</sup> under the Lordship of Christ and the authority of His revealed Word<sup>8</sup>. It unites all believers to one another and causes them to be different from their world<sup>9</sup>

The union with the Lord and with one another is spiritual. The relationship of each believer with the Lord is the basis for the relationship between believers<sup>10</sup> in sharing truth<sup>11</sup>, love<sup>12</sup>, and possessions<sup>13</sup>. It is dependence not self-sufficiency and interdependence not independence<sup>14</sup>. Participation in this life affects every believer and church<sup>15</sup> and impacts their ministry in the world and to the world<sup>16</sup>.

Shared life is a privilege and a responsibility<sup>17</sup>. The life of the church, therefore, must be a renewing, God-glorifying celebration of life in Christ and a spiritual participation with other believers<sup>18</sup>. Sharing this life in the presence of God is worship<sup>19</sup> and demands the loving exercise of spiritual gifts<sup>20</sup> as well as realization that we are responsible to one another before God<sup>21</sup>. The exercise of these gifts builds up one another and equips the saints for the Lord's work<sup>22</sup>. Because this responsibility and accountability are necessary for the church to grow in godliness<sup>23</sup>, discipline must be practiced in every community of believers<sup>24</sup>. Not to do so brings the very nature of Christ into dishonor<sup>25</sup>.

Responding in mercy, carrying each other's burdens<sup>26</sup>, is also a responsibility and privilege of all believers to one another, and causes them to love, care, share, and be involved with one another<sup>27</sup>. All believers, and the church as a body, must recognize, accept, and practice the spiritual responsibilities of being one in Christ, no matter how deeply a fellow believer has fallen into sin or the miseries of this world<sup>28</sup>.

Every believer is a member of the body of Christ and must be joyfully and personally responsible to live a life of loyalty to the Lord of the church<sup>29</sup>, to His Word<sup>30</sup> and involvement in its minstry<sup>31</sup> and purpose<sup>32</sup>. This responsibility, although primarily focused on the local body, extends beyond

the particular church to other bodies of believers<sup>33</sup>. Because this is true, the shared life of the church breaks down the barriers of race, class, culture, ethnicity, and geography, for all believers are one in Christ<sup>34</sup>.

## Supplemental Reports

## Sale of Pinebrook Jr. College Property

The following report was given by the Board of Directors of the Bible Fellowship Church:

A December, 1996, Agreement of Sale between Bible Fellowship church and The Basile Corporation for the sale of the 5.711 acre parcel of land containing the buildings on the Pinebrook Junior College campus for \$330,000 remains in force, and progress has been made in meeting and removing contingencies in that agreement. Should this agreement reach settlement, \$165,000 of the proceeds will be held in escrow to pay for asbestos removal. Any funds remaining after certification by an environmental engineer that all asbestos has been removed and disposed of in accordance with all governmental laws, rules and regulations will be received by the Bible Fellowship Church.

Parcels remaining to be sold are the park (7.959 acres), the soccer field (3.066 acres) and a 12,000 square foot lot split off of the parcel sold to The Basile Corporation. It is not likely that a reasonable offer for the purchase of any of these parcels will be received until a moratorium on sewer connections which has been in force for over a year is lifted.

It is not possible to predict with certainty either the net proceeds from the sale to The Basile Corporation, or what money might be received from sale of the other parcels, but remaining debt could well be in the range of \$500,000. Debt as of April 25, 1997 is:

In addition there is a contract requiring payment of \$333.33 per month (\$4,000 per year) over the life of an annuitant.

Since it is clear that receipt of sales will not be sufficient to repay total debt, Annual Conference needs to make decisions regarding the priority and means of debt repayment. Concerning priority, it is clear that the bank mortgages have legal priority over all other debt. In addition, an agreement has been entered into with the Trexler Foundation to repay money owed at the rate of \$1,000 per year. Remaining debt is to individuals and accounts administered by the BFC. Since loans to individuals represent commitments made by an agency of the BFC, a strong case can be made that repayment of debt owed to individuals should precede repayment of debt owed to ourselves.

The Annual Conference must decide now how remaining debt will be paid. Should it be decided that all debts to individuals and Funds administered by the Board of Directors and other Conference boards must be paid immediately, this would necessitate borrowing from a lending institution, or from individuals willing to lend unsecured money to the BFC. If the Annual Conference were to instruct the Board of Directors to borrow money from a lending institution this could only be accomplished by using property titled to the BFC as collateral. Since property held by our ministries to the aging are no longer the property of the BFC and since the value of Victory Valley Camp is not sufficient to cover such a loan the only option remaining to the Annual Conference would be to authorize encumbrance of the Pinebrook Bible Conference property.

Since the Board of Pinebrook Bible Conference is presently discussing expansion plans that would require use of the property they administer as equity, it would seem best if we seek, insomuch as is possible, to avoid encumbering the property administered by that Agency, and adopt a plan to repay funds owed individuals and BFC accounts over a period of years (15 or 20 years if possible) by other means. This recommendation is based on the principle that every effort should be made to repay money owed with as little negative impact as possible on the churches and the ministries we collectively sponsor. Should loans by individuals be called during the time of scheduled repayment, or, if it became clear an infusion of money of cash is needed to expedite opening new churches, efforts could be made to provide money to the Fund to Promote Church Extension by borrowing from individuals. Repayment schedules for such loans could be crafted in such a way that the repayment schedule in effect would not be significantly altered.

The alternative to repaying money owed over an extended period would be to conduct a fund raising drive in the churches. That does not seem to be a feasible approach to raising the money, and even were we able to get our people to invest in such a venture it would likely make it more difficult to gain funds for the forward-looking projects that ought to be claiming our attention. Repayment of this debt over 15 or 20 years through the Conference Administrative Budget is an approach that commends itself because by adopting and implementing this plan we would honor the Lord by repaying our debts; repay the debt by sharing the burden, and adopt a schedule of repayment that is long enough to minimize the burden on churches and have the flexibility to seize expansion opportunities as they arise.

Assuming obligations to individuals are to be paid as agreed upon, and interest accrued on debt to Funds administered by the Board of directors and the Pinebrook Educational Foundation paid as booked to the present, with future interest to be 6% per year, the funds needed for repayment annually would be approximately as follows:

Amount owed \$500,000 15 year repay = \$53,928 per year 20 year repay = \$46,572 per year

If it was decided to waive past and future interest payments on money owed to ourselves the amount owed would drop approximately \$58,000 and annual payments with interest to private notes remaining at 8% would approximate:

15 year repay = \$39,200 20 year repay = \$30,060

During recent years the Miscellaneous line in the Conference Administrative Budget has increased in response to expenses associated with carrying the PJC property. Consequently, additional subscriptions to the Conference Administrative Budget needed to meet the above repayment schedules are about \$10,000 less than the annual repayment figure. That leaves a high figure of \$43,928 per year for a 15 year payback with interest accruing at 6% on loans from BFC Funds (approximately \$900 per church). Under the second set of assumptions a fifteen year payback would require \$29,200 of new money per year (\$608 per church), with 20 years requiring \$20,060 per year (\$410 per church). Other changes would, of course, result in different needs.

Annual Conference is left with the need to adopt some form of this plan, or devise an alternative plan, to meet the need. The Board of Directors has not endorsed a specific form of this plan, nor do we discount the potential of others coming up with plans worthy of consideration. We do urge the annual Conference to take action that will enable the BFC to put this matter behind us in such a way that God will be glorified and His ministry through our Conference will be enhanced.

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
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#### **Minister's Retirement Fund**

[The following information and table (on the next page) was a part of the Board of Pensions' Report (see page 1080]

As of December 31, 1996, the Minister's Retirement Fund had a balance of \$364,466. The MRF has 25 current beneficiaries receiving a total of \$11,876.30/mo (\$142,515.60/yr). For 1997, it is estimated that the MRF will receive approximately \$75,000 from the churches, \$29,000 from the Administrative Budget, and \$25,000 investment returns, for a total of \$129,000. Therefore, it is expected that the MRF balance will decline during 1996. According to the original plan, similar outcomes are expected for the next 10 years, with the balance reaching a low of approximately \$93,000 in the year 2007. At that point, total contributions will help the fund recover sharply, allowing for the elimination of Church Contributions after the year 2014, and ultimately for the elimination of Conference Contributions after the year 2024. This is the objective of the Board of Pensions. Annual adjustments will be made according to actual rates of inflation and investment return, as well as the actual mortality experience of the participants in the fund (which is the most critical factor).



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
