For this reason, marriage partners are commanded to be committed to each other physically, emotionally, and sexually, and to have no other than their marriage partner⁵. Although God did not specifically condemn polygamy in every instance and sometimes blessed the individuals involved in polygamous relationships in the Old Testament, the Old Testament standard is always one man married to one woman⁶. This standard is reinforced by the teaching of

our Lord during His earthly ministry and the New Testament writers⁷. The intimacy of marriage includes mutual rights and mutual obligations of each partner to the other⁸. Sexual relations outside of the marriage bond by either of the marriage partners is adultery and degrades the spiritual and physical oneness and permanence God reserved for marriage⁹. For a Christian to marry a non-Christian is a violation of the Word of God¹⁰.

God has revealed in Scripture that His will is for some people to remain single; in such cases singleness fulfills the plan of God¹¹. Those who can control their sexual desires may remain unmarried to the glory of God¹². In fact, the single believer may have undivided loyalty and may be more free to serve the Lord and His church¹³. Abstinence from impure sexual activity prior to marriage and outside of the marriage union is the Biblical standard¹⁴. Sexual intercourse is to be experienced only in the marriage union; all sexual intercourse outside that union, including homosexual relations, is sin in God's eyes¹⁵.

Humanity in God's Image

The human race exists as a result of an instantaneous creative act of God¹. Humanity shares many characteristics with other creatures, but is unique in that each individual bears the image or likeness of God². This image makes possible the worship of God³, relationships between persons⁴, and responsibility to rule over God's creation. Only God confers this image, and it cannot be removed by any created being. Originally God's image in humanity included true righteousness and holiness; but by the entrance of sin into humanity these have been lost⁶ and the image distorted yet not destroyed¹.

Because human beings are made in God's image, every person has an unique identity, individual worth, and purpose to live for God's glory⁸. The image of God is also the basis for the dignity of every person. All human life should be cherished and protected, not neglected, despised or abused. God forbids the unlawful destruction of human life, both murder and suicide, and provides the strongest of sanctions, including capital punishment, to protect it⁹. The killing of the weak and defenseless by means of abortion, infanticide, and euthanasia is a crime against both those persons and the God whose image they bear. Christians should exert every effort to oppose these evils in our society, and other evils as defined and condemned by Scripture such as: racism; cultural bias; gender discrimination; ignoring the poor, disabled, aged; and every other form of injustice against human beings¹⁰. They should recognize the image of God in any person despite the sins of that person or the consequences of those sins¹¹. They should also work to protect the dignity of every human being¹².



Report of the Board of Church Extension

The Board is grateful for the opportunity to serve the Lord in overseeing the church planting ministry of the BFC. As our country becomes increasingly secularized, the need for new church plants becomes heightened. Opportunities present themselves in the form of church plants into areas which would extend the denominational boundaries, daughter churches of established congregations, ethnic and urban church plants, as well as regional cooperative efforts at establishing new churches. The Board has invested a significant amount of time during the year in reviewing and reassessing the role of the Church Extension Department as it relates to the denomination. The Board has reshaped the job description of the Executive Director and has added the position of Field Director to meet the growing and changing demands of church planting in the 21st century. These recommendations have been presented to pastors and elders in regional forums to solicit their feedback in an effort to build unity for the challenges ahead. The Board envisions a greater partnership with local churches as essential if the BFC is to remain vibrant and growing.

The search begins for a new Executive Director to lead the Department into the 21st century. Because of the importance of this leadership transition in light of future changes in the functioning of the Department and the time needed to seek the appropriate man, the Board has recommended that Daniel G. Ziegler be ratified for a one year extension as Executive Director of the Church Extension Department. He has served in this position since 1968 and during that time has overseen the greatest increase in establishing new churches in the history of the denomination. Numerous churches that began under Dan's ministry are today healthy congregations committed to outreach and multiplication. Dan's retirement will become effective upon the presentation of a new Executive Director to the 116th Annual Conference for ratification. We are grateful to God for the favorable resolution to the situation which had developed with the Internal Revenue Service. We give thanks to God that all penalties were abated in full because there had been no intent to avoid paying

the taxes and all monies had been set aside in a special account. All interest owed as a result of late payments was paid in full by a personal gift from the Executive Director.

The Board has been pleased to partner with the Board of Missions in the establishment of a "Missions Project Coordinator." Chris Merrick has taken this responsibility and has overseen work on the property at Staten Island, NY. The partnership continues with the Joint Committe on Ethnic Church Planting. An Hispanic mission in South Allentown is about to be launched during 1998 with the securing of at least sixty five percent of the first year budget and an organizing pastor. The Lord has placed Richard A. Moyer in a strategic position as chaplain of the Atlantic County, NJ prison. This strategic position of ministry, along with Pastor Moyer's heart for prison ministry, has led to an exciting venture. The "Philemon Project" is a church planting effort directed toward ex-offenders and their families. Pastor Mover is presently developing a team of workers, counselors, and supporters from BF churches to help with the follow up of the many who are professing faith in Jesus Christ and being released with nowhere to go for growth and discipleship.

The year has not been without its disappointments. Beraca Mission, a Haitian congregation meeting in the former Emmanuel property in Southwest Philadelphia, continues to grow under the leadership of Ebrane Cadet. Because of Ebrane Cadet's doctrinal differences with the "Articles of Faith," however, he is no longer pursuing credentials with the BFC. Beraca Mission is, therefore, no longer a BF mission. The Brooklyn, New York Mission is still in need of an organizing pastor. This strong core of believers continues to meet while waiting upon the Lord for the provision of a man.

One needs only to read a sampling of the prayer letters of the Department men, the informative updates, and "It Happened Like This" reports to know that the Lord continues to build His church through the labors of these faithful men and their families. Please continue to pray for them as many of them serve as bivocational church planters. These men and their families are in many ways on the "front line" and are worthy of our faithful support and prayers. Report of the Executive Director of Church Extension

THIRTY YEARS OF CHURCH PLANTING

"For when David had served God's purpose in his own generation, he fell asleep " (Acts 13:36)

How long is a generation? King David reigned over Judah and Israel for forty years. My fortieth anniversary of ministry in my denomination will occur in April 1999, the Lord willing. In our American culture, many pastors' careers will be somewhat less than forty years (with the exception of college and seminary education and our custom of retirement). Thirty years comprise most of a person's life work. God willing, in the late summer of this year, I will complete my thirtieth year of directing the church planting ministry of the BFC.

My own family's history might help to define the generation. We have a series of six Ziegler men, fathers and sons, who have been named Daniel. My great-grandfather, Daniel P. Ziegler, was born in 1823, as was our own Eusebius Hershey. My grandfather, Daniel C. Ziegler, was born in 1863, during the Civil War. My father, Daniel K. Ziegler, born in 1907, was the first of the Ziegler family to be a member of the BFC, which he joined in 1932, soon after I was born in the depth of the Great Depression. Son, Daniel A. Ziegler, was born in 1962, the year in which I turned thirty. His son, Daniel R. Ziegler, was born in 1986, while his father was on staff at Pinebrook Bible Conference.

If you take the birth date of my great-grandfather, 1823, and subtract it from 1986, the date of my grandson's birth, you have a lapse of 162 years. Dividing 162 by five (the number of generations) leaves an average of thirty-two year years for each generation. I believe thirty-two years is generally considered a generation in the life of any people—family, nation or church.

David "served God's purposes in his own generation". The Lord judges us as individuals. But God also judges nations, families, and churches corporately. Indeed, He judges various generations of those entities. There are generations that fear and please Him and others who fail and provoke Him. In the context of the Ten Commandments, the Lord refers to the generation of "those who hate me" and "those who love me and keep my commandments" (Exodus 20:5,6). God speaks about how our beliefs and obedience affect the generations that follow us—for good or evil. And that should concern us greatly.

In the Song of Moses, that prophet speaks of the people of Israel during the wilderness wanderings: "For the Lord's portion is his people" (Deu. 32:9), but "to their shame they are no longer his children" (v. 5). They had become "a warped and crooked generation" (v. 5). They are "a perverse generation", and an "evil generation" (Deu. 1:35). "The Lord's anger burned against Israel and he made them wander in the desert forty years, until the whole generation of those who had done evil in his sight was gone" (Num. 32:13). To the next generation, Moses says, "And here you are, a brood of sinners, standing in the place of your fathers and making the Lord even more angry with Israel" (v. 14). Likewise, the people who were in Israel when Jesus walked among them were a generation of snakes (Luke 3:7), an "adulterous and sinful generation".

Surely, as the BFC, we have desired to be a generation who has served well our Lord, our Church, our nation and our world, to the glory of the triune God.

Generations

We may make some assessment of our work by comparing it with the previous generations. Since we have no published statistics from before 1881, we may, for the purpose of comparison, use that date as the start of our second generation, counting the 23 years before as the first generation. Twenty-six years, 1881-1907, comprise the second generation; 1907-1937, the third; 1937-1967 the fourth and 1967 through 1997 form the fifth. The following table summarizes a number of comparisons.

The Good News

By the power and providence of God, Generation V has been blessed in forming churches and abetting the growth of the denomination. Note the following:

- (1) More new congregations were started during Generation V than in any previous generation.
- (2) Net membership growth by Generation V has been the greatest of any thirty-year period. Surely that would not have happened without the large number of new church starts.
- (3) Percentage growth of the BFC in Generation V was more than four times that of the previous generation.
- (4) Generation II (1881-1907) was astonishing in that 20 congregations were recognized as particular churches during that era. Generation V was second with 17.

- (5) Of the 20 particular churches recognized during Generation II, 18 (90%), amazingly, have continued to the present. Generation V tied with Generation IV for runner-up at 77% (13 of 17).
- (6) Eight particular churches died during Generation V, which is four times as many as in all of our previous history. This is a serious problem. It points out the need for some entity of the denomination to come along side of struggling and declining churches to try to help them turn around before their situations become fatal. If there is no one else to do it, perhaps the Board of Church Extension should explicitly add to its portfolio assisting declining churches to reorganize so that more of them may survive and thrive. Under the management of the Church Extension Department, two declining congregations have been turned about and restored to their places as particular churches. It is encouraging that, despite the demise of eight churches, Generation V saw a net increase of 10 particular churches—more than either of the previous two generations.
- (7) The death rate of missions (congregations that have not yet become particular churches) during Generation V was 47%—lower than either of the previous generations. However, a 47% failure rate is distressing and we should expect to better that percentage in the future. Our success in bringing a majority of new missions (53%) to full establishment is probably higher than that of most other denominations. For example, two-thirds of the Southern Baptists church plants fail to become fully formed churches. Church planting involves risk-taking. There will always be some failures; even the great Apostle Paul did not establish all the churches he attempted to plant.
- (8) The net gain of total congregations (churches and missions), which was 13, equaled the total of the two previous generations.

During the thirty years of Generation V, the BFC entered three new states—more than in any preceding generation. Presently we have more congregations than ever before in each of the five states where there are Bible Fellowship Churches.

The Bad News

While there are numerous ways to measure the considerable successes in denominational growth and church-planting evangelism during Generation V, there is some bad news. For more than a century prior to 1967, our churches gave 5-6% of their total offerings for extending the Church. Average giving through the Generation IV years (1937 through 1966), which included a number of the years of the Great Depression, was 4.95% of total offerings. That proportion has steadily declined through the Generation V years till it was 1.93% in 1996—61% lower than the 1937-66 average. And it appears that church giving in 1997 for Church Extension dropped even lower.

This precipitous decline has been the major factor in a slowdown of the number of new missions started in the last few years.

Let me relate this scenario to your local church. If all the tithing people in your church would decrease their giving to just 3.9% of their salaries, would your church thrive? Might the future survival of your church be in jeopardy? Yet this is precisely what is happening to Church Extension giving! And that really is BAD NEWS!

If this demoralizing decline in Church Extension support is not reversed, we cannot call ourselves a Great Commission Church. "If any church sees its nation in desperate moral and spiritual decline with many of its citizens and communities without the light of the Gospel and without access to, or influence by a sound biblical church and withholds the support that it ought to be giving for spreading the Gospel and planting sound churches in that needy nation, how can that church say it really loves the God of all grace and is seeking to obey His great commission?" (I John 3:17, loosely, but I believe credibly, applied to the issue under discussion).

THE GREAT NEWS

The true fifth generation of the BFC still has ten years to run. Should the Lord tarry, we shall celebrate our 150th anniversary in the year 2008. The real Generation V will have run from 1978 through 2008. It is within our power to make a good Generation V of the BFC a really great Generation V!

If we are to step up our pace of planting new congregations and growing our Church in the coming ten years, two critical factors are needed:

- (1) more sowers and reapers to go into the American harvest field. We must pray for laborers for the Lord's harvest (Matthew 9:36-38). This could not be clearer!
- (2) more dollars to support the enterprise. We must sustain these sowers and reapers and fund the overall enterprise of extending the BFC.

As soon as possible—certainly by 2008, our sesquicentennial—every church (with the exception of the few who are already giving 5% of their offerings for extending the church, and possibly a few very small or very poor congregations) ought to come up with a financial plan that will provide at least 5% of its total offerings for Church Extension. Once that proportion has been reached, it must be indexed at 5% and carefully provided each year.

Opportunities abound in North America. Our Church Extension Department has demonstrated that it has the know-how and experience effectively to plant churches and help the churches start daughter churches. We can do far more than we have been doing. As we do this, we shall receive the blessing and benefit of being part of a vibrant, growing denomination that will please and glorify God. And that is really GREAT NEWS!

The Status of our Work

I am pleased to report that our work is in good condition. Most of the congregations under our care are making good progress. I am happy that I may continue on in this good work in the year ahead.

Churches

Having supported themselves fully without budgeted appropriations for the past three years, Community Church of Red Hill, PA and Faith Church of Holmes, NY graduate from the Department at this 116th Annual Conference.

The Red Hill Church is a textbook case study, having started in a Bible study and prayer group, being recognized as a particular church two years from its start, achieving self-support by its fifth birthday and now continuing to grow and display wholesome and exemplary shared life. Our sister church planting organization, RHMA played an important part in the planting of the Red Hill church, which was a joint venture by the two organizations.

Faith Church, Holmes, NY began as a cold start at Whaley Lake in 1983. Development of the congregation was slow, but steady and glorious in its small community and building, with a number of outstanding conversions of adults and families. A merger of our Whaley Lake mission and Second Kent Baptist Church in 1990 provided an enlarged group and commodious facility for the merged congregation. Two years later, Faith Church was recognized as a particular church and in another three years it began full self-support. We shall need to continue to work with the church to seek to effect resolution of the title to the church property on Horsepound Road, Town of Kent.

The church at Edison, NJ continues strong and growing. It is pressing its search for permanent facilities, with an existing church edifice in New Brunswick seeming to have the inside track at present. Edison will be slated for graduation next April (1999). This may turn on its ability to support itself in a new home without assistance. If the congregation is able, the Board of Church Extension may need to assist the church in gathering a down payment from within the BFC in order for it to induce a lending institution to extend it a mortgage.

Pleasant Valley, NY continues to progress slowly. It has fully supported itself through its first full year with a full-time pastor. This support has entailed a deliberate draw down of the church's financial resources. If it is able to continue full self-support for two more years, it may graduate in April, 2000. The need for more suitable permanent facilities may necessitate some extended financial assistance.

Aberdeen (Bayshore), NJ continues to move forward. It is completing its first full year as a particular church, led by local elders. The church is growing in numbers, spiritual development and finances.

Starting from a smaller base, Scranton and Walnutport, PA have both done well in the past year, adding new constituents and members. These congregations have demonstrated that old, declining churches can be turned around, again to survive and thrive.

At Ocean County, NJ, Pastor Dean Stortz and his people have been greatly encouraged as some solid new growth has occurred in the last year. We rejoice with them.

Missions

The mission in Newark, NJ is an outstanding urban congregation that is on the verge of becoming recognized as a particular church. Two to four men appear to this observer to be nearing readiness to serve as elders. The election and installation of elders is a goal for 1998.

There is an urgent need for the property in Newark that will provide public access to our projected site for a worship center. We are working with the city government to obtain title to the property without having to go to auction. I believe the next auction is scheduled for May. Our men in Newark will be prepared to bid if that becomes necessary.

At Staten Island, NY, the mission is making some excellent progress. Its circle of ministry is ever increasing as new constituent families are added. Translation of these families into larger worship attendance is slow. The installation of a completely new bathroom and laundry by workers under the direction of our mission project coordinator, Chris Merrick, has been dramatic. A new ceiling and new lighting in the sanctuary have been added as well as a new exterior door and several new replacement windows.

The mission at **Beacon**, **NY** has added several new people in recent months for some solid percentage growth. Pastor and Mrs. David Way have moved during the year to a townhouse in Fishkill, close to the City of Beacon.

Our only New England congregation, the mission in Thompson, CT, is doing well. Dennis Spinney is very eager to see a new mission begin in the tri-state area. He is considering starting a second congregation in Danielson and forming a circuit. It is important that we have a close sister church for the Thompson congregation. If there is no other way for us to get the second congregation underway, it may be expedient to do it via the circuit route.

Our newest missions are New Community in Flatbush, Brooklyn, NY and Philemon in Atlantic County, NJ. The congregation of New Community BFC continues to be vibrant and vital. It is growing in the quality of its shared life, its outreach and in attendance. Paul Virr, a Canadian who recently emigrated to Brooklyn to become Director of Message to Israel, has been serving the congregation as interim pastor. He is sincerely and deeply appreciated

and loved by the people of New Community. The search for a fulltime organizing pastor for this mission, thus far fruitless, has been disappointing and frustrating to me. I am continuing to press the search with persistence and diligence.

During the year, our mission at Somers Point/Egg Harbor was discontinued. A new mission in Atlantic County has been opened, which will be designed to reach released inmates and their families—perhaps the people group that is most unreached and neglected by the churches in America. This new mission is called the **Philemon Bible Fellowship Church**. The organizing pastor, Richard A. Moyer, is the chaplain at the Atlantic County Correctional Institution. Programs and meetings are just getting underway. We should continue to pray much for this new ministry to a very needy group of people.

A large work crew from several of the churches converged on South Allentown on Saturday, February 21, to work on the former Salem Church building and parsonage. This work day was significant because it was a step toward the formation of a new Spanish language mission of the BFC in that neighborhood, and it was one of several major projects by volunteers under the direction of Chris Merrick, our new missions project coordinator.

Four surveys of South Allentown, each independent of the others, confirmed the need and opportunity for planting an Hispanic church there where Latino population is large and growing. At least 80% of the resident families in the Cumberland Gardens City housing project are Hispanic. A majority of the students at the neighborhood public school are Latino. Our building there is perfectly suited to housing a new, growing congregation. Two Sunday afternoon luncheons featuring Spanish food, singing and prayers were well attended. Their purpose was informational-inspirational to raise up awareness and prayer support.

The South Allentown mission is a cooperative venture of the Board of Missions and the Board of Church Extension. The latter board has established a first year's operating budget for the mission of \$65,000 and required that 65%—\$42,250—be in hand or pledged to be given in that first year before the work on the field could officially begin. The bulk of that sum is already there in cash or promises, with the major portion coming from the Lehigh Valley area

churches. There is still a need for a portion of the first-year costs, and the need for funding assistance for the next few years will be sizable. Churches and individuals who desire to help this mission may give through either board, designated for "S. Allentown" or "Hispanic Mission".

We have identified a potential organizing pastor for South Allentown who is fluently bilingual. He is presently a candidate under care of the Ministerial Candidate Committee and is right now taking his exams in process of obtaining his probationer's license.

This Allentown church plant may well be the first project in our history to enjoy the active participation of so many entities within the Bible Fellowship Church, including the Joint Committee for Ethnic Church Planting, the Intercultural Ministries Study Committee, the Board of Directors of the BFC, the Ministerial Candidate Committee, City Concerns, volunteer work crews under the direction of Chris Merrick, many concerned churches and individuals who are, or will be, praying for this new mission, along with, of course, the Boards of Missions and Church Extension.

The Mission Project Coordinator is a joint project of the Board of Missions and the Board of Church Extension. It is another of the ways the two mission boards are working together. Chris Merrick is one of the missionaries supported through the Board of Missions. He recruits and directs volunteer work crews, available to serve any of the churches and missions in the Church Extension Department, as well as the other agencies of the Bible Fellowship Church, projects on mission fields abroad and smaller Bible Fellowship Churches with limited means and personnel to do projects on their properties. In addition to the work in Allentown, major projects were accomplished at Staten Island and Newark during the Conference year. Others are in prospect. Chris works through the Board of Missions and may be reached there. Additional support for the Merrick family is needed. It may be given through the Board of Missions.

Many of the church planting missionaries who serve in the Church Extension Department are in need of support, and it will take new giving to fund the formation of more new churches. Money for support of our missionaries or designated for future church starts may be forwarded to the Office of Development, Board of Church Extension, PO Box 98, Zionhill, PA 18981.

In the next year I hope to be involved in at least one more church start, preferably several. I suggest that the following guidelines apply to new starts:

- (1) We seek to plant new churches in places of greatest spiritual need, whether they are in or outside of present denominational boundaries.
- (2) We look for communities with no or few evangelical churches.
- (3) If we contemplate several locations that meet the first two guidelines, we give priority to target areas where churches with our theological understanding are non-existent or scarce.
- (4) We seek to plant new BFC congregations in clusters of at least two or three for mutual fellowship, help and encouragement. We shall give high priority to opening a second mission in an area where only one congregation exists which is far from other Bible Fellowship Churches.
- (5) We give precedence to working with established churches, consortiums and regions who desire to plant churches and seek help from the Department.
- (6) We intend to continue to push out the perimeters of the BFC into outlying territory and states in our needy nation as our obedience to the "all Judea and Samaria" part of our Lord's Great Commission.

When I reflect on a generation of planting new Bible Fellowship Churches and as I anticipate my last year as Executive Director, I have thought of the words of the three hymns: "Great is Thy faithfulness, Lord, unto me", "To God be the glory, great things He has done" and "The Church's one Foundation is Jesus Christ her Lord". I say "Amen, amen and amen".

Report of the Board of Missions

Luke 13:1 There were present at that season some that told him of the thirty-eight Algerians, whose blood the Armed Islamic Group had mingled with their sacrifices. 2 And Jesus answering said unto them: "Suppose ye that these Algerians were sinners above all the world because they suffered such things? 3 I tell you, Nay: but, except ye repent, ye shall all likewise perish. 4 Or those thirty-four upon whom the twister in Florida fell, and slew them, think ye that they were sinners above all men that dwelt in all the world? 5 I tell you, Nay: but, except ye repent, ye shall all likewise perish." (February 25,1998 news translation)

Perhaps some of you who read the above account may protest my changing of Scripture, but when I updated the history I was impacted with the very strong words of Jesus: "you shall all likewise perish!" All of my smugness disappeared when I realized how much I was dependent upon the word <u>"except"</u>. Every believer who reads this must be reminded over and over again that we are all saved by His matchless grace. We were all doomed to perish <u>except</u>....

Remember what our Lord told Nicodemus? "I tell you the truth, no one can see the kingdom of God". By His marvelous grace I will see the Kingdom because He added "except he is born again."

For the past 101 years our missionary family have been proclaiming this exception around the world. That passion for World Evangelization has never waned. Today the 7,150⁺ members of the BFC provide much of the funds to keep 126 missionaries proclaiming that Good News story.

The Bible Fellowship Church has not only had a financial commitment to the missionary, but has declared ownership of their call. This can be seen in the following areas:

- ⇒ Many local churches are becoming increasingly involved in the overall welfare of their missionaries.
- ⇒ More churches are developing pro-active missions committees, and other groups to monitor the care of the missionary family.
- ⇒ Individual members are becoming increasingly involved in needs of missionaries and are committing themselves to

prayer and giving.

- ⇒ Work groups organized by local churches to assist our missionary family with hands on projects are increasing.
- ⇒ The local church continues to produce world bound missionaries. This year the Board of Missions processed a number of new applications, approved 7 candidates (Gary and Karen Shogren, Craig and Mary Tress, Trudy Peale, and Tom and Nancy Maurer), and commissioned 5 missionaries (Jenny Bechtel on June 29, Jim and Lynne Head on Aug. 3, and Jim and Diane Bowling on Sept. 21).

The Board of Missions met 7 times this year. Some highlights include:

- ⇒ The assignment of Chris Merrick as Project Coordinator. In cooperation with the Board of Church Extension Chris has been called to develop work teams and projects within the BFC. Chris and Becky are now part time, and look for the financial support necessary to become full-time.
- ⇒ The development of the Collegium, a group of supporters of the BOM.
- ⇒ The approval of the Director's visit to Venezuela and Bonaire.
- ⇒ The approval of the Director and Business Manager's attendance at the Stewardship Summit in Kansas City.
- ⇒ The Board of Missions Policy Manual is now available for computer use in Acrobat Reader Format. An interactive missionary information program is also available in an Acrobat Reader Format. In the future, a multi-media presentation of our missionary family will be available in CD.
- ⇒ The approval of participation in denominational events including:

Freedom Festival; World Missions Week;

Missions Celebration Banquet;

Retreat within a Retreat for mission minded young people.

- ⇒ The approval to work with the denomination to investigate the possibility of streamlining office space with other BF agencies, and the use of our resources to consolidate loan obligations at Pinebrook Junior College.
- ⇒ The addition of board member David R. Way, and

secretary Annette Kuhns.

⇒ The acknowledgment of R.C. Reichenbach's 26 years of service to the Board of Missions at the Fall Banquet.

Report of the Board of Higher Education

Since the 114th Annual Conference, the Board of Higher Education (BHE) has met three times, for a total of thirteen times since its inception in the fall of 1994. It has continued to oversee the work of the Pinebrook Educational Foundation (PEF) and has sought to establish working relationships with Biblical Theological Seminary (BTS) on several fronts.

The membership of the BHE has varied somewhat this year, with Alan H. Russell being elected by the Annual Conference to complete the term of George Monroe, and Donald T. Kirkwood being appointed by the BHE to fill out the year 1997-98 until Annual Conference following the resignation of Carl Martin to take a non-BF church in Western Pennsylvania.

The Pinebrook Educational Foundation

The Board of Directors of the PEF for the past year was as follows:

Term expiring in 2000: Keith W. Johnson, Robert C. Newman Term expiring in 1999: Olivia Barnes, Stephen C. Cassel

Term expiring in 1998: Raymond R. Dotts, Jay H. Fasnacht The report of the PEF is appended to the report of the BHE.

Working Relationships with Biblical Theological Seminary

The BHE has been working on putting together three projects involving BTS: (1) a BFC chaplain that would visit BTS regularly to counsel students and encourage some of them to consider service with the BFC; (2) a course in the history and doctrine of the BFC to be offered at regular intervals at BTS; and (3) an internship program in which BF churches would take pastoral interns from BTS.

- 1. The BHE has approached a number of current or retired BFC pastors to see if they would be willing to function as a chaplain at BTS, coming to school as often as once a week or as rarely as once a month. Just recently, retired BFC missionary Ronald W. Hoyle has agreed to serve in this capacity.
- 2. A course THS560 The Bible Fellowship Church was offered for two hours credit at BTS during the spring semester of 1997, but withdrawn when registration was insufficient. Richard E. Taylor and

- Calvin T. Reed were to have been the instructors. A part of the problem was lack of publicity in the BFC (from which it is anticipated most of the enrollment would come, we have postponed offering the course again until the fall of 1998. Both instructors would like to teach the course next time it is offered.
- 3. The machinery for BF churches getting interns from BTS is already set up, and can be used by interested churches at any time. Brochures were printed and handed out at the PED Retreat two years ago. They have now been undated with changes in the membership of the BHE and contact person for the internships and are to be handed out at this Annual Conference.

Other Ways of Promoting Higher Education in the BFC

The BHE has spent some time at each of its meetings this year trying to do some brainstorming on this subject. Can we interface with the BFC Board of Christian Education and local CE committees to encourage BFC young people to attend college? Can we help prospective college students prepare for the challenges they will face, particularly if they attend secular colleges? Can we help BFC people who are college students or graduates to think through how they can use their education to best serve God? Could we develop some seminars along these lines that might be presented at BF churches with large youth groups, at regional BFC youth activities, at Sno-Glo? Could we encourage the development of theology courses for our lay people? Seminars for seekers or skeptics? Train local church resource people for responding to various cults? Could we inspire and assist BFC pastors and churches to minister to college students and international students in their areas?

Brothers, pray for us, that the Lord might help us to use our desires and gifts to strengthen the BFC in outreach to the many intellectuals in our society who have never heard a clear and convincing presentation of the good news about Jesus.

Resolved, that the Annual Conference ratify the election to the Pinebrook Educational Foundation of Raymond R. Dotts and Jay H. Fasnacht for terms expiring in 2001.

Pinebrook Educational Foundation Annual Report To The Board Of Higher Education

The Board of Directors of the Pinebrook Educational Foundation met four times in 1997. The Board dealt with a number of matters which are described below.

- 1. An official mailing address was established for the Foundation. It appears in the 1997 BFC *Yearbook* as follows: Pinebrook Educational Foundation, Raymond R. Dotts, Chairman, 211 Weeks Drive, Camden, DE 19934
- 2. The form of a letter was approved to acknowledge and thank donors for contributions to the Foundation.
- 3. The Board authorized the Secretary/Treasurer to open an investment account through Sun America Securities. Initial investments were made in Federated Cash Management II and Davis New York Venture Funds (B).
- 4. A Scholarship Grant of \$500 was made to Mr. David Schlonecker, Jr. from the Rev. and Mrs. R.C.Reichenbach Scholarship Fund. Mr. Schlonecker attends Messiah College.
- 5. The Board approved a reduction of the interest rate from 8% to 6% per annum for the \$45,000 loaned to the Bible Fellowship Board of Directors for Pinebrook Junior College expenses. The new rate is effective for one year beginning on January 1, 1998.
- 6. The Walker Student Aid Fund was converted into an endowment fund for scholarship aid to international students. The formal transition of certain other endowment funds from Pinebrook Junior College to Pinebrook Educational Foundation has not been completed; however, the transition is progressing and the funds are in the custody of the Foundation.

Report of the Bible Fellowship Church Homes, Inc.

The Board of Directors of Bible Fellowship Church Homes, Inc. met four times at regularly scheduled meetings. The responsi-bility of providing housing and care for older persons is a challenging one. Regulations continue unabated and their underlying philosophy is one of pure secularism. The modern political approach often appears to be separation of Religion and State, going way beyond the constitutional position of separation of Church and State.

Therefore, the struggle is for BFC Homes to maintain a strong Biblical based Christian position in the midst of a secular philosophy in a fallen world. We need faithful prayer partners so that we can maintain a God-honoring program of compassionate care.

The construction of Musselman Court is complete. One house is yet to be filled. The construction of the buildings is very good. The houses are warm, draft free, and quiet. The needs of each resident are being met. With the staff of Fellowship Manor serving as consultants the residents are better able to monitor their own health needs.

We have acquired the assistance of a consulting firm known as <u>Third Age</u>. They will be assisting this Board in determining the most needful and practical way to expand our program so as to meet our mission or purpose.

Fellowship Manor continues to have a fine reputation and is maintaining a high occupancy rate. Upgrades on the building environment have been made by purchasing new beds and mattresses, hanging pictures on walls, installing new drapes and matching wall borders, and new furniture in lounge areas.

The Administrator, Robert Zentz, and his staff provide incomparable service and care for the residents. Fellowship Manor was able to gain full accreditation by the Joint Commission on Accreditation of Healthcare Organizations (JCAHO). This was done in less than one year and the usual time to accomplish this is about two years. As a result of this accreditation, Fellowship Manor has obtained two managed care contracts and efforts are underway to obtain several more with various insurance companies.

Fellowship Home continues under the fine leadership of James Ernst. The building is 30 years old and some of the systems are showing definite signs of wearing. Extensive repairs have been made to the plumbing system with much of the work having been done by James Ernst and the part-time maintenance man.

The program is most satisfying to the residents. Their care ranks among the finest for personal care homes in the Lehigh Valley. The staff performs an excellent service having quality rapport with the residents.

Bible Fellowship Church Homes, Inc., is constantly facing new challenges. Constant adjustments must be made in the programs and buildings in order to meet the changes and additions to myriads of regulations. At the same time, an effective witness to the Gospel is our Biblical mandate. The care of our residents is foremost and consideration of our staff is essential.

Thankfulness is expressed for each employee in the various staffs. The Board members continue to serve well in the oversight of this ministry. The Lord of Glory must be the supreme recipient of our praise.

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Report of the Pinebrook Bible Conference

This is the ninth and final annual report of the Pinebrook Bible Conference that I have had the privilege to submit to the Annual Conference of the Bible Fellowship Church. On October 1, 1989 I accepted the call of the Conference Board to become the Director and that tenure will end when I officially resign that position and become Director in Retirement on May 1, 1998.

During these eight years and seven months I have had 70 different persons working with me on the full-time staff and 25 of them are presently employed at Pinebrook. Several hundred other adults and teens have helped us during the summer conference and the retreat season. Under the hand of God we were able to greatly improve the facilities and the program to meet the growing demands of the BFC and the greater Christian community. Joan and I have created many cherished and lasting friendships with the members of our staff, summer staff and the thousands of guests that we have met.

Major improvements to the facilities have been accomplished during the time of my directorship including the building of Meadowbrook, Stoneybrook, two staff houses, several staff apartments and a new garage. All the roads have been surfaced and a few new parking areas and roads were built and blacktopped. The lake was dredged and a new dam was built. In recent years there has been major development of the facility through the Pinnacle Project to the chapels, meeting rooms, restrooms and motel bathrooms. Our kitchen was greatly upgraded and much new equipment installed.

The Pinebrook Conference Board has placed a temporary halt on all major capital improvements until it is determined whether or not we will be able to purchase the adjoining property. Several offers have been made in line with the appraised value but as of this date it appears that the property will go to foreclosure because of liens against the property.

The greatest thrill of my years of ministry here at Pinebrook, second only to the many souls that were saved and lives that were changed, is the fact that on October 1, 1997, Pinebrook became debtfree for the first time since it was purchased back in 1968. The

mortgage of \$150,000, which was used to pay Pinebrook Junior College when it moved to Coopersburg in 1976 and the private loans which were made to build staff housing, were paid in full with four checks cut on October 1, 1997. The Finance Committee and the congregation gathered at Pinebrook for the Annual Christmas Concert/Banquet on December 13, 1997 joined in celebration and praise to God in a formal mortgage-burning ceremony. Mr. Lee Boyles, Chairman of the Finance Committee, Mr. John Moran, Board Treasurer and Bert N. Brosius, Director of Pinebrook all participated in leading the congregation in this celebration of praise and thanks.

We ask for your continued support in prayer and finances for this great ministry entrusted to the BFC. Nathan B. Brosius, son of Bert and Joan has been appointed to serve as Interim Director for a period of one year, beginning May 1, 1998. Nate has been a member of the Pinebrook staff for nearly eleven years. Nate will work with the Board and the help of his dad during this time of transition to determine and establish a format of leadership and administration to meet the exciting opportunities of the spiritual ministry here at Pinebrook as we approach the 21st Century.

God is the person who is leading Victory Valley Camp - He is the One who is causing us to prosper. he is the One who was and is and is to come! For who He is and for what He has done in our lives and the ministry at Victory Valley Camp we give Him praise! And, there is much for which to thank Him this year!

1997 was a year of change by way of improvements to the existing program and facilities at VVC. Phil Atkins, camp director, and his family continue to improve 7572 Sigmund Road and update it, making the house and property suitable for Jill's special needs. Phil also continues to serve faithfully in helping to direct the work of the Lord at VVC. Donna Bauer and her family continue to live on the grounds and Donna serves faithfully as the Assistant Director, putting a lot of time into programming and follow-up of summer staff and campers. We would also invite any church or church group who desires to do a service project this year at VV to contact Phil Atkins at the camp as soon as possible. May the Lord continue to bless as we all work together to please Him at VVC.

The Board of VVC held four regularly scheduled meetings since the 114th Annual Conference. In addition to the meetings of the full Board many additional hours were spent by individuals of the Board in service on committees and in fulfillment of other camp related responsibilities. 

Report of the Board of Pensions

The Board of Pensions recommends the following resolutions to be adopted by the 115th Annual Conference of the Bible Fellowship Church:

- Whereas, the Minister's Retirement Fund (MRF) annuity rate for 1998 was \$194 per year of service, and
- Whereas, partial cost of living adjustments are part of the longterm phaseout strategy of the MRF, therefore be it
- Resolved, that the MRF annuity rate for calendar year 1999 be \$197 per year of service.
- Whereas, Willard E. Cassel has served as Pension Secretary since the inception of the Board of Pensions, and
- Whereas, Willard E. Cassel has resigned from the Board of Pensions due to his impending move to Florida, therefore be it
- <u>Resolved</u>, that we express our appreciation to Willard E. Cassel for his faithful service and assure him of our prayers for him as he enters a new phase of his retirement.

As of December 31, 1997, the MRF had a balance of \$342,303.55. For 1998, the MRF will have 26 current beneficiaries receiving a total of \$12,234/mo (\$146,808/yr). Within the next 3 years, 7 additional pastors become eligible for benefits. At that point, the MRF is projected to be making distributions of over \$200,000 per year, which will cause the fund balance to decline sharply, as shown on the accompanying graph. By way of perspective, total payments to retirees in 1991 were just over \$88,000.

Of even greater concern to the Board of Pensions has been the mortality assumptions used for the long term projection. An average mortality age of 83 was assumed, with a 5 year life expectancy for anyone currently over that age. On the whole, our retirees are enjoying better health and longer lives than these assumptions. From a financial standpoint, this has a very negative impact on the MRF

projected balances. Possible solutions would include reducing benefits and / or increasing contributions. This will be a major area of review by the Board of Pensions during 1998.

On the positive side, investment returns have been greater than projected, while inflation has been lower. The Board of Pensions will continue to manage the MRF investment portfolio with the combined objectives of income and growth. Growth of church membership has also been positive, averaging 1.5% per year for the past 10 years. Therefore, the current projection does assume future growth of 1% per year, which was a change from the "no growth" assumption used in the past.



Report of the Stewardship Council

The Council met three times during the period January 1, 1997 through December 31, 1997 to conduct Bible Fellowship Church Stewardship business. The focus of Council's efforts this past year was in two areas: the September issue of *Fellowship News*, and the proper establishment and management of Deferred Gift Annuities.

As a result of the efforts of Council member Carol Snyder, Editor of Fellowship News, the September issue was devoted solely to Stewardship issues. The lead article related the story of Sarah Dengler, a member of our Harleysville church, who made a bequest in her will to the Missions outreach of her church. The story clearly illustrated the benefits of planned giving, and has resulted in a memorial to this generous woman. The impact of the Fellowship News issue was far reaching, and was an encouragement to Council members.

Council also discussed the potential problems that could result if deferred gift annuities are not structured properly. A sub-committee was formed to prepare recommendations for legislation to be presented to the 115th Annual Conference. The Council continues to oversee the Deferred Gift Annuity Fund managed by Mennonite Foundation. These programs were created to financially assist Fellowship Manor and some of our local churches. The combined market value of the funds as of December 31, 1997 was \$73,450.92.

Roy Hertzog, retired Board of Missions Director, was appointed "Coordinator of Stewardship Services." In September, Roy attended the 1997 Christian Stewardship Association National Conference in Kansas City. During the next two years, with Roy's energy and assistance, Council will be organizing "whole - life stewardship" seminars for pastors, conducing regional wills clinics, and adding a stewardship section to the BFC Web page.

The Council was able to meet its financial obligations during this past fiscal year. During the period, Council requested contributions from each of the five agencies, but none from the Administrative Budget. The financial reports are included with this report.

The first Sunday in February continues to be Stewardship Sunday. Pastors are encouraged to present a stewardship message during the morning worship service. A listing of Scripture verses pertaining to stewardship can be found

in the three-ring Stewardship Notes binder.

Resolutions: The Stewardship Council submits the following Resolutions to the 115th Annual Conference:

- Whereas, there is a potential liability to Bible Fellowship Church in the establishment of gift annuities by agencies and particular churches of Bible Fellowship Church, and
- Whereas, the Stewardship Council of Bible Fellowship Church is able to provide advice and assistance in the prudent structuring of these contracts, and
- <u>Whereas</u>, this advice and assistance should help to avoid any future, unplanned liabilities of Bible Fellowship Church, therefore be it
- <u>Resolved</u>, that all agencies and particular churches of Bible Fellowship Church must consult with the Stewardship Council prior to the establishment of any gift annuities.
- Whereas, there are presently gift annuity obligations contracted by agencies and particular churches of Bible Fellowship Church, be it
- Resolved, that details of all such gift annuities be disclosed annually to the Stewardship Council to help provide early warning of any potential problems with the payment of such obligations, and be it further
- Resolved, that the particular churches list these obligations on their balance sheets for annual reporting to their congregations, and be it further
- <u>Resolved</u>, that the agencies list these obligations on their financial report to Annual Conference.
- Resolved, that Article 407 Miscellaneous Bylaws include the following addition:
 - 407-5 Congregations shall consult with the Stewardship Council prior to establishing any gift annuities and shall list all annuity obligations annually in their financial report to the congregation.

 FIRST READING

Resolved, that Article 509 - Agencies of Annual Conference include the

following addition:

- 509-7 Agencies shall consult with the Stewardship Council prior to establishing any gift annuities and shall list all gift annuity obligations annually in their financial report to Annual Conference.

 FIRST READING
- Whereas, there have been problems with gift annuity contracts within Bible Fellowship Church and other denominations, and
- <u>Whereas</u>, agencies and particular churches of Bible Fellowship Church have entered into these contacts in the past, and are presently soliciting and entering into this type of contract, and
- <u>Whereas</u>, decisions made by agencies and particular churches of Bible Fellowship Church have the potential to affect the overall financial health and ministry of Bible Fellowship Church, be it further
- <u>Resolved</u>, that by the rule of exception, implementation of this legislation shall begin in 1998, before a second reading takes place.

Report of the Historical Committee

The Historical Committee has seen several significant developments since the last meeting of the Annual Conference.

Microfilm records of the *Gospel Banner* were purchased and received. Our archives now have a complete set of the *Gospel Banners* from 1878 until 1952. The Gospel Banner was our denominational magazine during this period and is a rich source of information about our past.

Computer equipment was purchased to allow greater use of our archives. A scanner was purchased to allow us to have a computerized image of our pictures. This will allow for sharing our photographs without needing to lend them out for use. Along with the scanner, a zip drive was purchased to allow for the backup storage of the computerized images.

The computerization of the text of the General Conferences from 1873-1916 has been accomplished. These minutes are now under one cover and have accompanying indexes. These minutes and indexes will be helpful to those who are researching our past. They are particularly helpful in showing the development of our doctrinal positions.

Perhaps most exciting to us is the project to prepare a video for use in our churches. The purpose of this video will be to tell our story to those who do not know of our past. We are hopeful that churches will be able to use this video in new-member classes to acquaint those who join us with our history. Branch Valley Productions has been contacted to begin this work. Mr. Jay Ruth who directs Branch Valley has had experience making such historical presentations.

We note with sadness the relocation to Florida of committee member, Willard E. Cassel, and his decision not to be renominated. Brother Willard's input and participation in the life and work of the Historical Committee has been invaluable.

Report of the Board of Publication and Printing

"Publish or perish" is an important phrase on many university campuses across the nation. For a professor to become tenured or remain tenured he or she must write books, chapters in books, journal and magazine articles in order to demonstrate an awareness of the latest research in his or her field. The awesome sounding "perish" means that the professor can be left behind in his field, seem irrelevant, and be passed over for promotions and perhaps even dismissed. There is also a public image advantage that accrues to the university in that such articles indicate solid research is being done at this particular institution.

"Publish or perish" would almost seem like the standard by which the early church operated. There was a fervor to "publish" the gospel unmatched in church history. It is almost as though they believed in "publish or perish." Indeed, today that seems to be the story for particular congregations of God's people: that church which freely and laboriously gives out the gospel usually is the church that grows. Conversely, the church that does not take seriously publication of the gospel often perishes.

The Board of Publication and Printing works on the principle, that which connects us gives us vitality. The stronger that connection is, the greater that vitality. The weaker that connection, is the lesser vitality there is. Staying connected with each other drives us on.

One of the newer, cutting edge, ways of connecting is via the Internet. Our web site receives regularly an encouraging number of "hits" (visits). We have changed our server for the web site and are in the process of adding a partner for Eric Clontz to assist in further development of it. Because of the international nature of the Internet there are some serious issues of what we can place on our web site.

We want to once again acknowledge our *Fellowship News* production staff for an outstanding job: Carol Snyder as editor, Clyde Snyder on graphics, and Pastor Dan Allen on printing and distribution.

If you have any thoughts or suggestions as to how the Board of Publication and Printing can serve our agencies and churches better please call anyone on the board. We value your input.

Three Old Testament "Kids In the Book" presentations were provided as well. Nine presentations are already scheduled for 1998. We are pleased to see how well this ministry to our churches and communities is working. Pastor Schoen is now trained to present both Old and New Testament Walk Thru programs for adults or children and is accepting a limited number of additional sessions for this church year. We deeply appreciate his willingness to serve in this way.

A resource packet of materials from various publishers was distributed at last year's Annual Conference. At the same time, a brochure listing a variety of training seminars provided by the Board of Christian Education was circulated.

A new project has been undertaken to develop curriculum based on the Articles of Faith. Diana Vroman from Edison has been commissioned by the Board of Christian Education to begin this work. Our goal is to have sample children's curriculum available by next Annual Conference. Consideration is

being given to providing this material computer-formatted.

A "Day of Interaction" for key persons in the area of summer ministry planning is scheduled for March 28, 1998 at Ebenezer Bible Fellowship Church, Bethlehem. Details and promotional materials have been sent to pastors and Christian Education personnel.

Pastor-Elder-Deacon Retreat

The 1997 PED Retreat was held November 7-8 with Dr. Ed Gross as speaker. The 131 men who participated were challenged and ministered to by the biblical exposition and caring teaching of Dr. Gross.

Youth

The youth ministry of the BFC is exciting! God is at work in the hearts of His people even at the ages of 12 to 18. To see God changing people, making them into new creations and helping them die to sin and live to Christ gives us cause to praise Him for who He is and what He is doing!

The Thanksgiving Youth Rally provided an exciting day of ministry for 324 teens and leaders with 23 BFC churches represented. Foster Christy spoke at the end of an action-packed day at Victory Valley Camp and challenged us to count the cost of following Christ by reaching our friends in school and work for Jesus.

Sno-Glo 1998 was an outstanding success. Three weekends of ministry at Pinebrook provided challenge and teaching for 989 teens and leaders from 38 churches. Mark Fodale, Jack Crabtree, and Michael Herb (from our Lebanon church) did an excellent job of ministering to these young people.

Plans for 1998 include a two-track Youth Leadership Seminar on April 25 with sessions for both teen and adult leaders. The Annual BFC Track Meet will be held in Lebanon on June 6. Our Thanksgiving Youth Outreach will be held November 27 and Sno-Glo 1999 is already being planned.

God is moving in our young people; His Church for today as well as tomorrow. The committee is considering the need for a denominational Youth Advisor who would coordinate some of these conference- wide ministries as well as provide assistance for local churches. Pray for us as we continue to seek God's will for the future youth ministries of the Bible Fellowship Church.

Family Ministries

In an effort to move toward expanding denominational ministries to men, women, singles, and families, the Board has taken first steps in developing a

Opening Checking Ralance

Report of the Board of Directors of the Bible Fellowship Church

The Board of Directors of the Bible Fellowship Church held four regular meetings to attend to corporate business related to Annual Conference, to agencies, and to the churches.

The Board provided oversight and advice in respect to fiscal, legal, and property acquisition in the following areas:

Annual Conference: medical insurance, administrative budget, Pinebrook Junior College property.

Churches: Newark, NJ

It is anticipated the Church Extension Department will begin to use the facilities which formerly housed Salem Bible Fellowship Church, Allentown, to establish a Hispanic church. Also, the Board of Directors has begun discussions to determine whether the Haitian congregation now using property formerly known as Emmanuel Bible Fellowship Church, Philadelphia, will be able to purchase that property.

In response to a large premium increase contained in the proposal of Inter-County Hospitalization-Health Plan to provide medical insurance for Bible Fellowship churches and agencies, the Board of Directors engaged Capital Blue Cross and Blue Shield to provide comparable services at far lower prices beginning December 15, 1997.

The report of the Board of Directors to the 114th Annual Conference envisioned that sale of the 5.711-acre parcel of the property containing the buildings of the Pinebrook Junior College would be consummated by the end of the summer of 1997. Though the Basile Corporation remains committed to purchasing the property, and has recently agreed to an extension of an agreement of sale through June 1998, it has not been possible to complete the sale of the property. A decision by the Upper Saucon Sewer Authority to place a moratorium on new hookups into the system along with a ruling that a new owner would not have the right to use the system at the level maintained by the Pinebrook Junior College when it was in existence is the single remaining issue blocking the sale. During the year there has been frequent contact by mail and telephone between representatives of the Board of Directors and Attorney Joseph A. Fitzpatrick, Jr. In addition, meetings were held with Mr. Fitzpatrick and representatives of Basile Corporation. There was also a meeting with State Representative T. J. Rooney and several contacts with State

Representative Merle Phillips, a member of Sunbury Bible Fellowship Church. Members of the Board of Directors also petitioned the Upper Saucon Sewer Authority for relief in person in July and November of 1997. Despite an ongoing dispute between the Borough of Coopersburg and Upper Saucon Sewer Authority as to who is to blame for hydraulic overload of the system during heavy rainfall, only recently have informal face-to-face meetings begun between representatives of the two parties. Accordingly, the Board of Directors and the Basile Corporation are anticipating joint legal action aimed at speeding a resolution of the problem.

The Basile Corporation has recently expressed a desire to purchase the three additional parcels of the Pinebrook Junior College property. It is not likely that serious talks on this will take place until it is clear the buyer can use the sewer system.

In carrying out the directive of the 114th Annual Conference that the Board of Directors obtain funds to pay operating costs of the Pinebrook Junior College property through loans or assessments from Bible Fellowship Church agencies, representatives of the Board of Directors met with representatives of the agencies and obtained their agreement to lend funds to the Board of Directors. Under this agreement, agencies have loaned enough money to the Board of Directors to cover carrying costs, pay off a loan in the amount of \$96,750 held by Core States Bank, and reduce the principal of a loan held by Quakertown National Bank by \$50,000. Although this has reduced the amount of interest being paid on money borrowed, it is urgent that the Annual Conference adopt a plan to liquidate the substantial indebtedness that will undoubtedly remain after sale of the property. It should also be noted that since money loaned by agencies is being used to replace money borrowed from banks, the Board of Directors has declared that these loans be placed immediately behind bank loans in order of payment.

All funds are deposited in the Farmers First Bank, Lititz. Accounts were audited by Charles Albert.

Recommendations: We recommend the 115th Annual Conference adopt the following:

- 1. Resolved, that the rate of mileage reimbursement for conference business be 22¢ per mile.
- 2. Resolved, that the administrative budget for January 1, 1998 to

December 31, 1998 be adopted.

3. <u>Resolved</u>, that the administrative budget for January 1, 1999 to December 31, 1999 be approved for submission to the churches for their pledges.

Pledges for the 1999 administrative budget shall be received by the financial secretary by September 1, 1998.

ADDENDUM TO THE REPORT

Proposal to Retire Debt Associated with the Closing of Pinebrook Junior College

A. Introduction

The issues surrounding the sale of the former Pinebrook Bible Conference had not been fully resolved at the time of this proposal. But the general outcome is now anticipated and the need to address the debt warrants the preparation of this proposal. Only time will reveal the exact outcome, and we encourage the members of Annual Conference to continue to pray for the Lord's will in this matter. Those assumptions which are most likely to vary will be identified, but on the whole the numbers are conservative, and of a "worst-case-scenario" nature. It is anticipated that the exact numbers will be calculated and made public when the final sale of Pinebrook's properties are completed.

B. Summary of Proposal

The proposed method of retiring the debt is in two forms: 1) each church is urged to enter into a faith covenant with the other BFC churches to contribute 1% of its annual offerings for up to 4 years, and 2) each church is urged to contribute the entire offering of one Sunday of its choosing in the year 2000 (there are 53 Sundays in 2000).

C. Details of Proposal

Annual Conference (1997 Yearbook p. 36) has determined that debt to banks and other individuals and organizations from which money has been borrowed are to be repaid before money borrowed from the funds controlled by the Board of Directors. Money spent from funds controlled by the Board of Directors, namely the Fund to Promote Church Extension, is thus last in priority to be replenished. Yet the desire to support the extension of the church should not be delayed for several years. For this reason the proposed repayment is in two forms: 1) the retirement of debt and 2) the replenishing of funds to extend the BFC.

Method of repayment - churches contribute 1% of annual offerings for up to 4 years. Total offerings in 1997 were \$10,023,975 (1997 Yearbook, p. 164). Each church is urged to contribute 1% of its offerings (through budget or other means) to apply \$100,000 to the debt in 1999, 2000, 2001, and 2002 until the debt is retired.

2. The Replenishing of Funds to Extend the BFC

The Fund to Promote Church Extension is largely the result of the sale of abandoned church properties, which the conference has chosen to designate of the extension of the church (Faith & Order 512-1,3[6]). Annual Conference had the power to use it in that way, or to use it otherwise. During the Pinebrook crisis, the Board of Directors reluctantly use the Fund to pay actual debts. Now it is time to seek to build up the Fund again so that the work of church extension may not be hindered. The Board of Directors believes the Faith & Order should also be revised in order to anticipate any future contingency of a similar nature.

In order to more quickly rebuild a fund to extend the BFC, each church is encouraged to designate one Sunday in the year 2000 to contribute its entire offering to the Fund to Promote Church Extension. (There are 53 Sundays in the year 2000, so the impact on other budget priorities should be minimal). The average total Sunday offering in our churches in 1997 was almost \$200,000, so that the concept, if vigorously promoted, should raise a large amount of money to rebuild the Fund to Promote Church Extension. In this one-time fashion we can enter the new millennium with a fresh impetus to extend the church.

Should this method fail to raise a satisfactory amount of money, Annual Conference could adopt other means at a later date to increase the size of the Fund to Promote Church Extension.

D. Implementing Resolutions

- Whereas, the projected debt in the sale of the Pinebrook Bible Conference property is over \$300,000 to agencies outside of the Board of Directors of BFC, and
 - Whereas, we have a moral obligation to repay our debts, therefore be it
 - Resolved, that we commit ourselves to one another and to the Lord to contribute 1% of the offerings of the particular churches and organized missions for a period of up to 4 years beginning in 1999 to retire this debt.
- 2. Whereas, the Board of Directors used \$310,000 from the Fund to Promote Church Extension in order to meet obligations concerning the closing of Pinebrook Junior College (which has accumulated \$71,243.69 in interest as of 12/31/97), and
 - Whereas, the Faith & Order says of the Fund to promote Church Extension "It shall use the net proceeds of the sale of such property for the extension of the BFC" (512-1.3[6]), and
 - Whereas, the Annual Conference has ruled that money owed to ourselves is lower in order of priority for repayment than debts to others (1997 Yearbook p. 36) and such debts may exceed \$300,000 and
 - Whereas, having a larger Fund to Promote Church Extension is

- greatly desirable to further the extension of the BFC, therefore be it
- <u>Resolved</u>, that we remove the obligation to repay the \$310,000 plus interest to the Fund to Promote Church Extension, and further
- Resolved, that each particular church and organized mission dedicate the entire offering from October 29, 2000 (the year 2000 has 53 Sundays) as a gift to the Fund to Promote Church Extension.
- 3. Whereas, delay in the sale of the Pinebrook Bible Conference property has resulted in significant financial obligations for which the Annual Conference has made no provision, and
 - Whereas, there is the potential for similar circumstances to arise in the future, and
 - Whereas, the Annual Conference has limited the use of proceeds of the sale of properties deeded to particular churches which have closed to "the extension of the BFC" (Faith & Order 512-1.3[6]), therefore be it
 - Resolved, that the final sentence of the Faith & Order 512-1.3[6]) be replaced with "Proceeds of the sale of such property shall be for the extension of the BFC except when otherwise mandated by Annual Conference upon the recommendation of the Board of Directors of the BFC."

Report of the Strategic Planning Committee

Responding to the mandate of the One Hundredth and Fourteenth Annual Conference to study the administrative structure of the BFC and to prepare legislation for regionalization in the BFC, the Strategic Planning Committee took significant steps forward in its work in monthly planning sessions, two Summit Meetings, and the 1997 Ministerial Convention.

Two Summit Meetings were held on June 26 and August 19, 1997 with 23 pastors and past and present agency heads to address the issues related to our current status, the perceived problems in the BFC, and the possible solutions that would move the denomination forward. On September 30 - October 1 similar discussion and study where the focus of the Ministerial Convention led by the Strategic Planning Committee. A synopsis of the finds from these gatherings were distributed to all pastors.

Primary areas of study under consideration as a result of these gatherings include:

- the streamlining of Annual Conference for effectiveness and growth
- a unified system of audit and financial responsibility for agencies and boards
- the provision of a conference administrator or administration team
- the establishment of denominational headquarters
- the development of regionalization for expanded ministries
- providing methods for expanded communication to strengthen our unity

As steps toward the development of these concepts, the Committee is currently planning the following:

1. A Bible Fellowship Night of Prayer.

All BF Churches have been asked to set aside the evening of April 26, 1998 as a night of prayer. This date is especially appropriate because it is the day before Annual Conference convenes. The focus of the evening will be corporate prayers of praise and thanks-giving for the grace and blessings of our God, recognition of God's working in and through the BFC past and present, and seeking God's wisdom and direction for the next stages of development within the denomination.

Materials will be distributed to each pastor to aid in presenting this evening of prayer.

2. The Ongoing Development of Regionalization Ministry

At the Ministerial Convention as well as during the last convening of the Annual Conference, pastors met with others from their "regions" for prayer and interaction. Since the Ministerial Convention, most of these "regions" of pastors have continued to meet regularly for prayer and fellowship. Several have taken steps forward to develop corporate ministries ranging from corporate worship services and fellowships to the shared establishment of daughter churches and shared missions support.

See the Addendum at the end of this report for guidelines toward regionalization.

3. BFC 2000

With a desire to strengthen our corporate identity, fellowship, and unity as the BFC, the Committee is planning a denomination-wide gathering tentatively planned to be held in the Stabler Arena, Bethlehem, PA on April 30, 2000. It is hoped that 5,000 men, women, teens, and children from our denomination will gather for an afternoon and evening of worship, praise, encouragement, and fellowship. Presentations from each of the BFC arms of ministry will be included as will times of dynamic singing, structured prayer, encouragement from speakers from within and without the Conference, and the ministry of gifted musicians.

A planning committee is being formed for this endeavor. People who might be interested in serving on this committee should contact the Secretary of the Strategic Planning Committee.

4. Reorganization

The bulk of this committee's time has been in evaluating the status of the BFC and making a plan for the future. The redefinition and clarification of the duties of a Conference officer and committee, as well as the establishment of a new committee are being proposed.

4.1 The Chairman of Annual Conference.

The present duties of the Chairman [507-1] are limited to conducting the business of Annual Conference. The Committee recommends that the Chairman, along with the Conference Executive Committee, develop and promote a shared vision for the future ministry of the BFC.

To do this, the following added responsibilities would be given to him:

- Spokesman for the Bible Fellowship Church during year(s) of office.
- #2. Member of the Conference Executive Committee. Have the privilege of attending the meetings of Conference Agencies, Boards and Committees in an advisory capacity.
- #3. Member of Strategic Planning Committee

4.2 Board of Directors

The Board of Directors, in accordance with the *Faith & Order*, has functioned as a board of trustees [see 512-1.3 Duties of the Board]. The Committee recommends that they continue in this capacity with the added responsibility of having the authority to review the financial affairs of all Agencies, Boards and Committees.

We suggest that the Conference Auditing Committee, with expanded duties, act as an arm of the Board of Directors, receiving full financial reports of each Agency, Board and Committee prior to Annual Conference, and receiving a summary financial report to be presented to Annual Conference and published in the *Yearbook*.

We also recommend the hiring of an accountant or financial secretary when and if the need arises.

4.3 Conference Executive Committee

To cast a vision for the future, the Committee recommends the establishment of a Conference Executive Committee. This Committee, in cooperation with the Chairman of Annual Conference, would endeavor to sense the "pulse" or "heartbeat" of the Conference. Its primary function would be to coordinate, communicate, facilitate and monitor the activities of Annual Conference, the Regions and the Agencies, Boards and Committees (ABC).

The Executive Committee would be composed of the Chairman of Annual Conference, one representative chosen by and from each Region of churches (chairman or other representative), one representative chosen by and from each Agency (Church Extension, Homes, Missions, Pinebrook, Victory Valley), from Board of Directors, from Strategic Planning Committee [until dissolved], and the Conference Pastor (if appointed).

Further functions of the Conference Executive Committee are as follows:

- 1. coordinating programs and planning among the Regions and ABC's;
- 2. communicating Annual Conference directives, *Faith & Order* matters and other helpful information, including innovative church work concepts, among the Regions and ABC's;
- 3. facilitate denominational activities of the Regions and ABC's. This shall include encouraging cooperation and support of denominational projects.
- 4. monitor denominational activities for compliance with Annual Conference regulations and shall notify the appropriate entity of non-compliance. It shall monitor denominational activities to promote cooperation among the Regions and ABC's. It may request minutes or reports of all Region administrative meetings and all ABC meetings;
- 5. have advisory capacity with the Regions and ABC's except when given specific authority by the Annual Conference;
- 6. it shall be accountable and report annually to the Annual Conference.

Resolutions

- 1. **Resolved**, that a denomination-wide gathering be scheduled for April 30, 2000 with the goal of strengthening the corporate identity, fellowship and unity of the Bible Fellowship Church.
- Whereas, relative proximity and affinity with other churches is the most logical alignment of Regions, therefore be it

Resolved, that the initial configuration of the Regions of the BFC be as follows:

The purpose of this committee will be to develop the legislation necessary for the implementation of the following: (a) Formation of Regions; (b) Additional duties for Chairman of Annual Conference; (c) Additional duties for Board of Directors of the BFC; (d) Conference Executive Committee; (e) Any other related issues, and further
 - Resolved, that it present legislation for First Reading to the 116th Annual Conference (April 1999).

Guidelines for Regionalization in the Bible Fellowship Church Steps Towards Regionalization

1. The initial configuration of the regions of the Bible Fellowship Church will be:

<u>Lehigh Valley</u>: Bethlehem, Cedar Crest, Coopersburg, Emmaus, Finesville, Nazareth, Walnutport, Whitehall, Zionsville

New York/New England: Beacon, Holmes, Pleasant Valley, Poughquag, Thompson

Berks County: Blandon, Fleetwood, Kutztown, Oley, Reading, Sinking Spring

<u>Pocono District</u>: Brodheadsville, Lehighton, Pocono Mountain, Scranton, Stroudsburg

North-West: Mt. Carmel, Shamokin, Sunbury

South Central: Graterford, Harleysville, Hatfield, Quakertown, Red Hill, Royersford, Spring City

<u>Capital</u>: Ephrata, Harrisburg, Lancaster, Lebanon, Paradise, Terre Hill, York

New Jersey: Aberdeen, Denville, Edison, Howell, Newark, NJ, Staten Island, Tom's River,

Southeast: Camden, DE, Maple Glen, Newark, DE, Wallingford, Wissinoming

- 2. Notify pastors and delegates of these regions at the beginning of the 115th Annual Conference on April 27, 1998. Such notification shall be in writing.
- Schedule a prayer time for Monday evening of Annual Conference where
 pastors and delegates from each region will meet together for interaction
 and prayer. A leader for each group will be appointed by the Strategic
 Planning Committee in advance.
- 4. The Prayer Group Leader will be responsible to:
 - introduce the pastors from the region.
 - have the pastors introduce their delegates.
 - invite the sharing of prayer concerns and praises from the various churches.
 - lead in a time of prayer.

- 5. After a time of sharing and prayer lasting approximately 15 minutes, each Prayer Group Leader should lead in a discussion regarding ongoing and potential shared ministries that could take place in the region. This discussion should include:
 - the selection from within the group of a regional coordinator to serve until the next Annual Conference.
 - the selection of a recording secretary.
 - reflection on the current needs of local churches that could be addressed by the help of other churches in the region.
 - consideration of shared ministries for churches within the region, such as
 - *corporate worship services for special events.
 - *missionary and church extension support.
 - *Christian education training events.
 - *affinity group events (youth, singles, women, leadership, children, etc.).
 - planning to gather as pastors and delegates at least twice during the coming year.
 - the selection of a date for pastors to gather for prayer and interaction on at least a bi-monthly basis.
- 6. The recording secretary should submit a brief written report of plans to the Strategic Planning Committee prior to the close of Annual Conference. In addition, the secretary shall report significant regional issues and events to the Strategic Planning Committee following each meeting throughout the year.
- After Annual Conference, pastors in each region should meet at least bi-monthly for prayer, interchange of ideas, and fellowship at the call of the regional coordinator.
- 8. After Annual Conference, pastors and delegates in each region should meet at least twice annually for prayer, interchange of ideas, and fellowship at the call of the regional coordinator.

<u>Purpose of Regionalization</u>: To provide corporate ministry of churches within a given region, support and encouragement for pastors and leaders in those churches, fellowship and training opportunities with other local churches, and strengthened impact of the denomination through regions of churches.

Report of the Committee to Examine Annual Conference Minutes

This committee is directed by the Faith & Order to assist the Secretary of Annual Conference in producing accurate minutes of Annual Conference, to compare the minutes as they appear in the Yearbook with the Official Minutes of the Secretary, to receive suggested corrections to the Yearbook during the year, and to report to Annual Conference any discrepancies between the Yearbook and the Official Minutes. (Legislation assigning these duties took effect in October 1992.)

The following discrepancies were found between the Official Minutes and the *Yearbook*:

Official Minutes page 28, line 16: "Scranton churches" Yearbook page 46, line 10: "Scranton, PA churches""

During the year the following corrections to the *Yearbook* were received by the committee:

Yearbook page iv: The 1997-98 Calendar should begin with June 1997 instead of June 1996.

Yearbook page xx: First word of first sentence should be "immortality" instead of "immortality."

Yearbook page 79: In the Report of the Board of Directors, third paragraph, second line, the words "tot eh" should be "to the."

Yearbook page 154: In the Report of the Committee on Communications, second paragraph, at the end of the first line, eliminate "by."

Yearbook page 161: In the Church Extension Budget under Office Operations, second item, Secretary, the figure 7,766 should be moved into line with the others.

Two certified copies of the *Yearbook* will be submitted by this committee to the Bible Fellowship Church Archives after adoption of this report by Annual Conference.

Report of the Committee to Examine the Minutes of Particular Churches

The Committee to Examine the Minutes of Particular Churches met on Tuesday, March 10, 1998, at Bethel Bible Fellowship Church.

The minutes of particular churches were examined on the basis of the suggested format for congregational meetings as stated in the Bylaws of Particular Churches and found in the *Faith & Order*, § 403-3 and § 403-4.

The Committee communicated with every church reminding the Pastors to "send a copy of the minutes of all Congregational meetings, which shall include the Board of Elders' Report of the Membership and Annual Financial Report to: Committee on Examination of Minutes of Particular Churches, c/o Ralph Soper, 418 Elm Street, Emmaus, PA 18049 to arrive no later than March 1, 1998." This should include all congregational meetings held by each particular church since the previous meeting of the Committee to Examine the Minutes of Particular Churches.

The Committee sent out a check list for the use of the church. Many returned the list and its use greatly facilitated the work of the Committee. We would like to express our appreciation for the care with which most minutes were prepared for our examination.

Several churches' minutes were not available to be examined by the Committee on March 10. The Committee will seek to examine the minutes of these churches at Annual Conference.

The Committee frequently found no evidence of a financial audit nor of a Pastoral Relations Committee meeting.

Several churches did not provide verification that their delegate and alternate delegate are currently serving Elders. The matter has been referred to the Registrar.

The Committee found that the Elders of our church in Royersford have requested that 115th Annual Conference appoint a study committee to address the issue of inconsistencies regarding the qualifications for elders and deacons. The Committee found no petitions in the minutes of the Particular Churches.

Report of the Committee to Study Baptism and Church Membership

The Committee met six times during the year to study the issues related to baptism and church membership. In fulfilling its responsibilities, the committee has exegeted scripture, read books, compiled research and written papers.

The Committee is not yet ready to present a paper to Annual Conference in stating and defending its conclusions. However, we do want Annual Conference to be aware of the committee's progress.

The Committee began its study by re-examining baptism itself. Three areas were of primary concern for the Committee - authority, mode, and recipient. The present status of our Committee is that in our discussions we are unanimously reaffirming Article 20-1 *Baptism*, of the *Faith & Order* and indeed might consider strengthening it.

The Committee is now wrestling with the proper application of Article 20-1. The Committee has two areas specifically which it seeks to address. The first area to be addressed is the relationship of baptism to those who are infirmed. The second area to be addressed is the relationship of baptism to church membership. The committee welcomes written input from any members of Annual Conference in the consideration of these matters.

The Committee anticipates that it will make a full report to the One Hundred Sixteenth Annual Conference including recommendations with accompanying exegetical support.

In partial fulfillment of the assignment made to this Committee by the One Hundred Fourteenth Annual Conference we unanimously recommend the adoption of the following resolution:

- Whereas, the determination of the 113th Annual Conference, sitting as a committee of the whole, was that the New Life Church in Oley, PA did not have the freedom to separate baptism from church membership unless the Faith & Order be amended and
- Whereas, the 114th Annual Conference formed the Committee to Study Baptism and Church Membership to answer the Oley BFC, therefore be it
- Resolved, that the New Life Bible Fellowship Church of Oley, PA, and all other particular churches of the Bible Fellowship Church, be instructed to continue to refrain from admitting new members into their fellowship who have not submitted to believers' baptism by immersion in water until the issue of whether or not to amend § 202 3.1 of the form of Government of the Faith & Order be resolved by the Annual Conference.

Report of the Inter-Cultural Ministries Study Committee

The work of the Inter-Cultural Ministries Study Committee continued this past year, with the primary purpose being that of completing the Biblical Principles For Living. The Committee worked at finalizing the following Biblical Principles For Living: Marriage And Singleness, Divorce, and Humanity in God's Image. These principles are being presented for first reading by Annual Conference and to be included in the Faith & Order, Appendix, "Biblical Principles For Living." The Committee has reviewed the principles for first reading, gained input from interested pastors and allowed the task groups who formulated them to review them. The Committee has approved them for presentation to Annual Conference (See Attached Appendix).

The Board of Missions and Board of Church Extension are working together through what has been named, The Joint Committee on Ethnic Church Planting which is comprised of four men, two from the Board of Missions and two from the Board of Church Extension. The Joint Committee meets to monitor and assist ethnic church planting ministries. The Joint Committee approves funds for ethnic church planting which are given by the churches. This past year the Joint Committee approved financial assistance for Wayne Pauley in New York and Ebrane Cadet in Philadelphia. In all, twenty churches gave to ethnic church planting this past year in the amount of \$27,000. The Joint Committee established within the Fund, designated giving for the proposed Hispanic church plant in South Allentown and also designated the monies in the General portion of the Fund for the Hispanic work. This Fund is accounted for through the Board of Missions. The Joint Committee continues to encourage and request that more churches create a line item on their budgets for ethnic church planting. The Joint Committee suggests that the line item amount be at least a minimum of \$4.00 per member. These designated monies for ethnic church planting should be considered an ongoing yearly commitment and be forwarded to the Board of Missions.

The Haitian work in Philadelphia is no longer under the supervision of the Joint Committee on Ethnic Church Planting. At the beginning of our association with the organizing pastor of this work, the Committee believed that, based upon our interview, the pastor would be able to receive credentials with the Bible Fellowship Church, but as the process for credentialing

continued it was apparent that the organizing pastor could not come to agreement with the Faith & Order. Therefore, he could not complete his credentialing process with the BFC. The Joint Committee believed that it was in the best interest of the Haitian Church to continue under the leadership of this Pastor and that looking for another man would be disruptive to this small body of believers. The Joint Committee informed Church Extension and the Board of Directors of the BFC of the decision to disengage from the Haitian work and the Board of Directors is now seeking the Lord's leading for the property in Philadelphia. We grieve the loss of this Haitian group from the BFC family, but continue to pray for God's blessings upon them.

The exciting news is that in this past year, the prospects for an Hispanic Bible Fellowship Church have become a reality. The Board of Church Extension set a budget for the proposed church and designated that sixty-five percent of the budget had to be met before calling an organizing pastor to begin the work. Thus far, eighty-five percent of the start-up money has been pledged, and we expect that through the General monies given we will have enough to begin.

The second part of this exciting news is that God has led to us a young Hispanic man to be the organizing pastor. He is presently attending the Center For Urban Theological Studies in Philadelphia and working with the Lebanon County Intermediate Unit. He has formerly planted churches with his father who is a church planter for the PCA church. He has submitted his first test in the credentialing process and thus far has declared himself to be in agreement with the Faith & Order. He is very excited about getting started with this work in South Allentown. Dana Weller is holding meetings in the former Salem church with interested people who will be a part of this work. Chris Merrick, the Board of Missions project coordinator, has held a work day with several teams of individuals getting the church and parsonage in shape. It is a blessing to see the assistance being given to this prospective church plant, especially from the Lehigh Valley churches. If a church would like to assist with funds or in other areas, please contact any member of the Joint Committee on Ethnic Church Planting (David Gundrum, Dana Weller, Dan Ziegler, William Mull). Also, pray for this church to begin meeting this Spring and that the organizing pastor will complete his credentialing work.

Last year, Annual Conference approved the publication of the *Articles of Faith* to be printed in Spanish. After several edits and final consideration, the Articles have been forwarded to the Board of Publication and Printing and are being printed. Please acquire a copy for your church and order copies for

any Spanish Speaking people in your congregation.

Conclusion

Very encouraging things are happening in the area of reaching ethnic peoples with the Gospel and planting churches among them. It is a Scriptural imperative to reach out to these various people groups and the BFC must follow the Lord's desire to preach the Gospel and plant churches among these ethnic groups. Therefore, it is also important that we are not divided, as a Conference, on this issue of ethnic church planting, but rather be united in our efforts and be one in our prayers for the world on our doorstep to be reached with the Gospel.

The Committee still needs to complete its work on the Biblical Principles For Living and continue to assist the churches in becoming more aware and involved in cross-cultural ministry.

When the Biblical Principles For Living are completed, Annual Conference will determine where they will be placed to be of most value to the churches. The Committee is committed to the completion of these principles.

We again ask you to pray for the Committee as it continues its work on the Biblical Principles For Living and faces the unique and challenging opportunities of ethnic church planting.

For those members of Annual Conference who are not familiar with the Inter-Cultural Ministries Study Committee and its work, there is attached to this Report a chronological history of the Committee's beginnings and the process of its work. The paper is entitled "His Glory and Deeds Among All Peoples."

Recommendations:

- monies for ethnic church planting in this year.
- Resolved, that the 115th Annual Conference approve for first reading and inclusion in Appendix, Biblical Principles For Living, of the Faith & Order, the following Biblical Principles For Living: "Marriage and Singleness;" "Divorce;" and "Humanity In God's Image."
- Whereas, we believe the "Biblical Principles for Living" represent God's intended principles by which we should live, and
- Whereas, we believe that the "Biblical Principles For Living" should be urgently and diligently taught to our congregations,
- Resolved, each pastor and delegate seek ways to implement the teaching of the "Biblical Principles For Living" to their congregations and further,
- Resolved, that as "Biblical Principles For Living" are studied and taught, any discovery of problem areas, suggestions for additions, or clarifications of text, should be communicated to this Committee for consideration prior to Second Reading. These communications should be addressed to David E. Gundrum, Secretary of the Committee and further,
- <u>Resolved</u>, that we encourage lesson plans be developed and submitted to David E. Gundrum for ideas in the development of Teacher guides for teens and adults.
- Whereas, the work of the Inter-Cultural Ministries Study Committee is not yet complete,
- Resolved, that the 115th Annual Conference direct the Inter-Cultural Ministries Study Committee to continue its work.

Marriage & Singleness

Marriage is the joining together of one man and one woman in a covenant union instituted and ordained by God¹. The purpose of this union is to glorify God, demonstrate the relationship between Christ and the Church², provide companionship, and perpetuate the human race³. It is holy in God's sight and is to be a bond until the death of one partner⁴. For this reason, marriage partners are commanded to be committed to each other physically, emotionally, and sexually, and to have no other than their marriage partner⁵. Although God did not specifically condemn polygamy in every instance and sometimes blessed the individuals involved in polygamous relationships in the Old Testament, the Old Testament standard is one man married to one woman⁶. This standard is reinforced by the teaching of our Lord during His earthly ministry and the New Testament writers⁷. The intimacy of marriage includes mutual rights and mutual obligations of each partner to the other8. Sexual activity outside of the marriage bond by either of the marriage partners is adultery and degrades the spiritual and physical oneness and permanence God reserved for marriage⁹. For a Christian to marry a non-Christian is a violation of the Word of God10

God has revealed in Scripture that His will is for some people to remain single; in such cases singleness fulfills the plan of God¹¹. Those who can control their sexual desires may remain unmarried to the glory of God¹². In fact, the single believer may have undivided loyalty and may be more free to serve the Lord and His church¹³. Abstinence from impure sexual activity prior to marriage and outside of marriage union is the Biblical standard¹⁴. Sexual intercourse is to be experienced only in the marriage union; all sexual intercourse outside that union, including homosexual relations, is sin in God's eyes¹⁵.

Divorce

Divorce is the breaking of the union and the bond of marriage. It is hated by God and should be avoided and counseled against¹. The biblical basis for divorce is adultery. Scripture permits, but never demands, that a person divorce a marriage partner who has committed adultery². People divorced for reasons other than that allowed by Scripture, ought to be reconciled, not marry another, and seek God's resolution of the breakdown of this union³. The divorced people must submit themselves to the Word of God in their present situation. Divorced persons must seek forgiveness and the grace of God for any sin that led to, or is associated with, their divorce. The particular church may need to evaluate the circumstances surrounding a divorce to preserve the purity of the Church, clear the reputation of a person, or establish the legitimacy of a re-marriage⁴.

Humanity in God's Image

The human race exists as a result of an immediate creative act of God¹. Humanity shares many characteristics with other creatures, but is unique in that each individual bears the image or likeness of God². This image makes possible the worship of God³, relationships between persons, and responsibility to rule over God's creation⁵. Only God confers this image, and it cannot be removed by any created being. Originally God's image in humanity included true righteousness and holiness; but by the entrance of sin into humanity these have been lost⁶ and the image distorted yet not destroyed¹.

Because human beings are made in God's image, every person has an unique identity, individual worth, and purpose to live for God's glory⁸. The image of God is also the basis for the dignity of every person. All human life should be cherished and protected, not neglected, despised or abused. God forbids the unlawful destruction of human life, both murder and suicide, and provides the strongest of sanctions, including capital punishment, to protect it⁹. The killing of the weak and defenseless by means of abortion, infanticide, and euthanasia is a crime against both those persons and the God whose image

they bear. Christians should exert every effort to oppose these evils in our society, and other such evils as racism, cultural bias, gender discrimination, ignoring the poor, disabled, aged, and every other form of injustice against human beings¹⁰. They should resist the disregarding of the image of God in any person despite the sins of that person or the consequences of those sins¹¹. They should also work to protect the dignity of every human being¹².

Requests to 115th Annual Conference

Red Hill, PA

- Whereas, Community Bible Fellowship Church of Red Hill (CBFC) has led a man who is disabled to Christ, and
- Whereas, the man desired to be baptized and sought permission from those caring for him, and
- <u>Whereas</u>, permission was denied by his doctors and other health care workers because a stroke had made him a paraplegic, and because this stroke was followed by additional strokes in the course of a year, this condition made immersion life-threatening and
- Whereas, the elders of the CBFC believed there was an issue of timeliness, i.e., a need to act with some degree of urgency given this man's health, age, and his expressed desire to follow Church through baptism, and
- Whereas, the elders of CBFC took note of the Great Commission and the command to baptize believers and their duty to fulfill Christ's command to baptize if they could find a means to do so and
- Whereas, since the elders believed that baptism by immersion was out of the question, they baptized this disabled man by the pouring of water. Furthermore,
- Whereas, CBFC, while carefully thinking through the baptism issue, did not deeply consider the ramifications of making this man a member of the church, but naturally assumed that if they were doing the baptizing as a board of elders of a BFC their own baptism should adequately fulfill the membership requirements, and therefore formally made him a member upon being baptized. (This baptism and membership recognition took place on October 26, 1997.) Further,
- Whereas, CBFC had informed the study committee of their actions as a means of adding perspective to their study, not thinking they had done something inappropriate and,
- Whereas, the study committee viewed the action of CBFC to be in violation of the *Faith & Order* and asked them to notify the Credentials Committee of their actions, which they did, and
- <u>Whereas</u>, Pastor Ron Denlinger and Pastor Tom Phillips met with the Credentials Committee on March 11, 1998 and listened carefully to their concerns and
- Whereas, the actions of CBFC have created concerns and controversies they

- did not intend, their primary focus and concerning having been on the pastoral care of a new believer, and
- Whereas, CBFC has considered its action in light of concerns raised and has decided it could have been made the decision to have withheld formal membership from this man, since CBFC withholds formal membership from others they consider to be believers when those individuals have not been baptized by immersion, and since CBFC acknowledges that the relationship between baptism and church membership is being studied. Further,
- Whereas, CBFC does feel that in matters of exceptional situations such as this it is appropriate for the elders of a particular church to have the responsibility of decision making, therefore CBFC does not regard itself as having made a wrong decision, even though in retrospect with greater deliberation they may have made a different decision. Further,
- Whereas, CBFC does not consider themselves to be in violation of the *Faith & Order* nor do they wish to be viewed in that way and rather are desirous of maintaining the unity of the Spirit in the bonds of peace, and
- Whereas, CBFC has been and continue to be open about their actions, such as by presenting their perspective to the study committee and by explaining the situation in this resolution and further,
- Whereas, the elders of CBFC, having already extended membership to this man, do not believe they could take it away from him for the following reasons: 1) It is important that he in his poor health not be burdened with the upset of being "dropped" from membership and of knowing that he was a subject of controversy. 2) It is important for the unity of CBFC because this man's conversion and testimony has been a very special blessing to the congregation. he is much loved and there was a very special time of rejoicing in the congregation when he was received as a member. There are many that would find his removal from membership very offensive. 3) It is important for the continued good will and respect the CBFC congregation has felt toward the denomination. 4) It is important for the witness CBFC has with this man's relatives and many unsaved people who are aware of his relationship to CBFC. And further,
- Whereas, the elders of CBFC wish to remain in the good graces of the BFC and
- Whereas, the elders of CBFC feel this might be accomplished, at least in part, by asking the denomination to consider their predicament and to be so kind as to help them to keep this particular man's membership status from

- being made an issue, and
- Whereas, the elders of CBFC agree that in similar circumstances in the future they would not formally recognize such a one to be a member of the BFC, at least until the Study Committee has done its work and the Annual Conference has responded to it, therefore be it
- Resolved, that Annual Conference, by Rule of Special Exception (in reference to section 202-3.1), would recognize the membership of this man (who was not immersed) at the Community Bible Fellowship Church of Red Hill.
- Whereas, the elders of Community Bible Fellowship Church of Red Hill (CBFC) would wish to be in full harmony with the BFC and would desire to have any issues taking away from that harmony resolved, and
- Whereas, the elders of CBFC are concerned that the way in which these issues are resolved would be in accordance with the Faith & Order and
- Whereas, the elders do not believe it would be fair to them nor would it be in accordance with the *Faith & Order* for them to be placed in the position of defending their actions on the floor of Annual Conference at this time as though they were on trial, and
- <u>Whereas</u>, the only proper original jurisdiction for changes involving a church would be the Conference Judicatory,
- Therefore, the elders of CBFC would request that if there are specific charges that CBFC is in violation of the *Faith & Order*, and if Annual Conference agrees those charges are valid and merit investigation, Annual Conference would, under those circumstances and only under those circumstances, turn this matter over to the Conference Judicatory, with which CBFC will agree to fully cooperate to the best of their ability.

Royersford, PA

- Whereas, the Bible Fellowship Church acknowledges as its sole Head, Jesus Christ, the Son of God and Savior of man, and submits to the written Word of God and to the Holy Spirit as its only sources of guidance and power in maintaining its redemptive life and work in the world, and
- Whereas, the Elders of the Royersford Bible Fellowship Church want to avoid the pitfalls of permissiveness (allowing what God forbids in relation to who is able to serve as Elder) and legalism (forbidding what God allows in relation to who is able to serve as Elder), and
- Whereas, it appears to us that there are inconsistencies in Article 108-4 and

its subsequent defense as found in the majority report of the 1987 *Yearbook* (pages 132-157) as it relates to the possibility of a divorced man, or one married to a divorced woman, from ever being able to be above reproach, while implying that a divorced deacon, or one married to a divorced woman, is able to be above reproach, and

Whereas, it appears to us that there are statements in Article 108-4 and in its subsequent defense that are not objective judgments, but subjective and possibly prejudicial judgments such as the one found on page 150 of the 1987 Yearbook that declares that the "sin of divorce disqualifies a man from serving as an elder . . . (because) . . . a divorced man or a man married to a divorced woman does not meet the Scriptural qualifications of 'above reproach'", and

Whereas, it appears to us that there are no explicit passages of Scripture that clearly state that a divorced man, or one married to a divorced woman, should by that criteria alone, disqualify him from ever serving as an Elder, therefore be it

Resolved, that the Board of Elders request that Annual Conference elect a study commission of five ordained ministers presently serving Bible Fellowship Churches to study the serious lack of exegetical support from forbidding divorced men, and those who marry a divorced woman, from serving as Elders in our churches based on the criteria alone, and be it further

<u>Resolved</u> that we also request that this study commission report back to the 116th Annual Conference with their recommendations.

Nazareth, PA

Whereas, the Faith & Order, Section 401-1.2 provides only for the pastor to chair the meetings of the Board of Elders, and

Whereas, a particular Board of Elders may have one or several gifted men who are well able to chair these meetings, and

Whereas, other churches have found this model profitable for leadership of their governing bodies, therefore be it

Resolved, that Section 401-1.2 shall be revised to read as follows (First Reading):

The Board of Elders shall elect by and from its members a chairman and a recording secretary. The chairman may be, but does not have to be, the Senior Pastor or the President of the Board of Elders.
