

#### In Memory of



Robert F. Johnson August 4, 1934 - June 20, 2000

Robert F. Johnson was born in Shamokin, PA, the son of Ira and Eva Johnson. He graduated from Coal Township High School and Berean Bible School. He was married to Sara B. Gehman in 1956. They had three children: Rod L., Cindy Dare, and Tammy Gehman.

He was ordained to the Christian ministry in 1961. As pastor, he served in the Scranton, Royersford, Bethlehem, and Cedar Crest BF Churches. He was very involved in a number of BFC Boards and Committees including: Board of Directors, of the BFC; Ministerial Candidate Committee, Ministerial Relations Committee, Church Extension Board, Christian Education Committee, Nominating Committee, and Board of Directors of Pinebrook Bible Conference.

Pastor Johnson was greatly loved by his congregations for his pastor's heart, warmth for his people, his preaching with

excellence, and especially his passion for souls. He was well-known as a man of integrity and a champion of the truth. He knew the truth, spoke the truth, and lived the truth.

During a memorial service attended by several hundred, held on June 26, 2000, members of his family paid him this tribute: "Our father was a giant among men. Not because he was big in stature, but because he was big in his beliefs. Anyone who really knew dad knew him as a loving husband, father, grandfather, and pastor. He loved God and all His people. He was at peace with his life and his 'new address in Heaven' as he called it. Our dad was a very competitive man as those who competed with him can attest, whether it was shooting clay birds, hunting and fishing, or racing go-carts. In that competitive nature our dad ran the good race, fought the good fight, won the last lap, and stood a giant when he was called Home."

A verse of Scripture which he often quoted and lived convincingly is, "For to me, to live is Christ, and to die is gain." (Philippians 1:21).

## In Memory of Henry A. Schell

Died: June 19, 2000


Henry A. Schell was in his sixty-ninth year when he went to his eternal reward.

Pastor Schell's Bible Fellowship Church ministry consisted of his work as the founding pastor of the New Life BFC, Oley, PA. He served there from 1978 until 1982. He then served at an independent church in Deptford, NJ, and churches with the Evangelical Congregational denomination in Shamokin and Tamaqua.

He retired in 1997 to Whiting, NJ. Schell is survived by his wife, Virginia, and four children: Mark, Karen, Jennifer, and Dwight.

Henry was known as a faithful and concerned pastor always asking about one's spiritual progress. He was a good promoter of missions and served many years on the Board of Directors of the Ramabai Mukti Mission. In later years, he also was heavily involved with the ministry of Keswick Bible Conference.

**Bernard N. Coble** August 30, 1940 - May 4, 2000

Bernard N. Coble was born to Neil and Rudy (Newkirk) Coble on August 30, 1940 in Newton, KA. As one of three sons, Bernie and his family moved to Colorado when he was still a child and he grew up in Brighton, east of Denver. While growing up, he began to attend Camp Id Ra Ha Je ("I'd Rather Have Jesus") in the mountains of Colorado. It was at this camp that Bernie responded to God's call to salvation when he was just 12 years old. He worked and served at this camp each summer until 1960, growing in the Lord and learning much about serving Him through the ministry of the camp.

Sensing God's call on his life, Bernie attended Bob Jones University where he was graduated with a B.S. in Bible. While at Bob Jones, he met his life-partner, Marilyn (nee Miller) of Falls, PA. On June 9, 1962, Bernie and Marilyn were united in marriage and began their life of service to the Lord together. After their marriage, they returned to the camp where he had been saved as a child and served the Lord there for a brief time.

God led Bernie and Marilyn into the pastoral ministry shortly after their marriage. Bernie served as assistant pastor at the Osterhout Bible Church near Tunkhannock, PA, for a number of years. He also pastored at Lake Sherident Union Chapel just north of Clarks Summit, PA.

In 1971 Bernie became associated with the BFC when he became the pastor of the Calvary BFC in Scranton, PA. While in Scranton, he felt God's direction toward further training in ministry and he took graduate work at Baptist Bible Seminary in Clarks Summit, PA. From Scranton, Bernie was called to the Salem BFC in Lehighton, PA, were he served as pastor for a number of years.

During these years, Bernie and Marilyn were blessed with three children: Barbara (Chodan), Tim, and Evie (Brown). At the time of his death, they also enjoyed the blessing of five grandchildren.

After serving in pastoral ministry for over 20 years, Bernie felt God's call to Pinebrook Bible Conference and Retreat Center to serve in a ministry similar to that which God used to bring Bernie to salvation many years earlier. He served faithfully at Pinebrook for about 10 years. While at Pinebrook, Bernie and Marilyn were led to become a part of the Berean BFC in Stroudsburg, PA, where they remained active until his death.

After Pinebrook, Bernie worked at Adventis Pasteur in Swiftwater, PA. He was diagnosed with cancer in July of 1995 but continued to work and serve until his death.

Many testimonies have been spoken concerning his life and witness by those from his church family as well as co-workers. Someone put it well when they said, "The way he faced cancer and impending death was instructive and challenging to God's people and his family. His attitude was concern for his wife and family coupled with eagerness for the presence of his Savior."

Bernie longed that Christ be exalted both in his life and death. He entered the presence of the Lord on May 4, 2000, moving from his home in Saylorsburg, PA to his eternal home in Heaven. At his memorial service, his favorite hymn, It Is Well With My Soul, gave clear testimony concerning his life and ministry. Perhaps, the words of his loving wife bring this to a fitting close - "Although he is missed so much, he is with the Lord and we will be reunited one day."

#### A Look Back:

### From the Minutes of the 18th Annual Conference October 4-7, 1901

One hundred years ago, our spiritual fathers met for the 18th Annual Conference for many of the same reasons that we gathered at Pinebrook Bible Conference for the 118th Annual Conference. They reviewed the work of the denomination and made decisions concerning the ministry of the various committees. Some things have changed since that meeting. Some things have not.

The brethren of 1901 met at Ebenezer Mennonite Brethren in Christ Church in Bethlehem on Friday morning, October 4. The pastors and delegates entered the meeting place, greeted each other and took their places. The meeting began promptly at 8:00 a.m. They were all ready. None of them wanted to be late.

Singing, praying and preaching were first on the agenda. W. B. Musselman was elected chairman and went right to it. He gave a "very practical and encouraging address on Psalm 133." A prayer time followed "for the blessing of God and the guidance of the Holy Ghost during this conference session."

Sixteen ordained men answered the roll call. Only two ordained men were absent. They were joined by seven probationers. Sixteen delegates from the churches were present to represent their congregations. Only one delegate was absent. The bar was set at two pews and the two amen corners. Tables, microphones and pages were not needed.

The business of the 18th Annual Conference was pretty routine. They met from 8 until 11:30 in the morning and left for the hospitality of the folks of Bethlehem. After lunch, promptly at 1 p.m., they began again and continued until 5 p.m.. They were off to the homes of their hosts where good food and spiritual conversation waited. No meetings were to be held in the evening. That was the routine schedule. The by-laws made no provision for evening meetings. However, they did meet on Saturday night. They had to be

careful not to go too long because of the big day ahead.

A feature of Annual Conference 100 years ago which is not part now was the Sunday Services. On Sunday, a spiritual feast was available. It was full day. W. G. Gehman taught the Sunday School at 9:30 a.m. At 10 a.m., H. B. Musselman preached what was called the Conference Sermon on 1 Corinthians 4:1-2 in which he detailed the duties and responsibilities of the pastor. After lunch, at 2:30 p.m., C. H. Brunner preached an ordination sermon from Romans 1:14, 16. He focused on the life of Paul. After his message, E. T. Shick and W. W. Zimmerman were ordained. It was reported, "This part of the service was very touching. The Lord melted their hearts as well as many others." After supper, all returned for a praise service and another sermon, this time from W. B. Musselman, on the new commandment of John 13:34. "The church was crowded all day and the Lord's presence was manifested in power and glory."

The Annual Conference ended on Monday afternoon with a flurry of resolutions and a desire to get back home. A few of their number would go home and pack their belongings and move to a new field. Most would go back and take up where they left off.

The Conference made provision to print 200 Yearbooks. They would be eagerly read by the people who wanted to know what happened. They would allow us to know what they did during those days.

The secretary records the familiar sounds of the end: "As a token of the appreciation of the services and wise counsel of our beloved Chairman during this Conference a rising vote of thanks was tendered him."

"A rising vote of thanks was tendered the brothers and sisters of Bethlehem for their kindness and the hospitable entertainment the Conference received during its session. Truly we must confess that the Lord led the Conference. Many precious lessons were learned. The officers, pastors and workers were more united than ever, and in the name of the Lord we will go to our field of labor, suffering, testing, as well as victory and blessing with better courage than ever, endeavoring to stand true to each other, lift up the standard until He that shall come, will come. Amen."



# Article 302 - Original and Appellate Jurisdiction

**302-1** Individual Members. Original jurisdiction over an individual belongs to the congregation of which the individual is a member. All of the elders or a portion of the elders designated by the Board of Elders shall be the judicatory for a trial in a Particular Church. Those serving as a judicatory shall choose one of their number to serve as moderator of the trial. Any elder who has personal involvement in the issue being tried shall be disqualified from participation in the judicatory.

**302-2** Ministers. Original jurisdiction over ministers belongs to the Credentials Committee. All of the members or a portion designated by the Committee shall be the judicatory for a trial

involving a minister. Those serving as a judicatory shall choose one of their number to serve as moderator of the trial. Any member of the Committee who has personal involvement in the issue being tried shall be disqualified from participation in the judicatory.

- **302-3.1** Particular Churches. Original jurisdiction over Particular Churches belongs to the Ministerial Relations Committee. All of the members or a portion designated by the Committee shall be the judicatory for a trial involving a Particular Church. Those serving as a judicatory shall choose one of their number to serve as moderator of the trial. Any member of the Committee who has personal involvement in the issue being tried shall be disqualified from participation in the judicatory.
- **302-3.2** Agencies of the BFC. Original jurisdiction over agencies of the BFC belongs to a judicatory elected by Annual Conference, called the Conference Judicatory. Agencies of the BFC shall consist of any boards, committees, or offices temporary or permanent, incorporated or unincorporated, established by Annual Conference.
- 302-4.1 Appeals to the Conference Judicatory. If a judicatory in a Particular Church, the Credentials Committee, or the Ministerial Relations Committee is unable to resolve an issue, or if the defendant or plaintiff in a case desires to appeal the decision of the original judicatory, the appeal shall be made to the Conference Judicatory. (Charges brought against an agency of the BFC shall be made directly to the Conference Judicatory.) The Conference Judicatory shall be composed of five ordained ministers who are voting members of Annual Conference and five laymen who are voting members of Annual Conference at the time of their election. Laymen on the Conference Judicatory who are no longer voting members of Annual Conference may continue to serve their term of office as long as they remain members in good standing of a Particular Church, Annual Conference shall elect the members of the Conference Judicatory for three-year terms in three

classes as follows:

Class I Two pastors and two elders
Class II Two pastors and two elders
Class III One pastor and one elder

When a case is presented to the Conference Judicatory, all ten members shall designate which five shall hear the case and shall designate which one of the five shall serve as moderator. The chairman and the secretary shall be chosen by the ten members from among their number. All charges or appeals shall be presented to the secretary. The name of the secretary shall be announced at Annual Conference and included in its minutes.

302-4.2 Appeals to the Special Appellate Judicatory. If the Conference Judicatory is unable to resolve an issue, or if the defendant or plaintiff in a case desires to appeal the decision of the Conference Judicatory, subsequent appeal shall be made to the Special Appellate Judicatory. The Special Appellate Judicatory shall be composed of four ordained pastors who are voting members of Annual Conference and four laymen who are voting members of Annual Conference at the time of their election. Laymen on the Special Appellate Judicatory who are no longer voting members of Annual Conference may continue to serve their term of office as long as they remain members in good standing of a Particular Church. Annual Conference shall elect the members of the Special Appellate Judicatory for three-year terms in three classes as follows:

Class I Two pastors and two elders
Class II One pastor and one elder
Class III One pastor and one elder

When a case is presented to the Special Appellate Judicatory, all eight members shall designate which five shall hear the case and shall designate which of the five shall serve as moderator. The chairman and the secretary shall be chosen by the eight members from among their number. All appeals shall be presented to the Secretary. The name of the secretary shall be announced at Annual Conference and included in its minutes. The Special Appellate Judicatory shall conduct a hearing and their decision shall be final and shall be reported to Annual

Conference. The Special Appellate Judicatory shall be the only place of appeal for issues which have had the Conference Judicatory as the place of original jurisdiction.

# Article 303 - Steps in Institution of Judicial Process

- 303-1 A charge of an offense must be instituted at the place of original jurisdiction; it may be brought by an individual, Particular Church or Agency of the BFC. The one who brings a charge shall be designated as the plaintiff. The one who is charged shall be designated as the defendant.
- 303-2 A charge of offense must describe the alleged offense and state the facts which support the charge. The charge shall include, as far as possible, the time, place, circumstances of the alleged offense, the names of witnesses and titles of relevant documents. A charge shall be deemed to have been filed when it is presented in writing to the chairman or secretary of the Board of Elders of the Particular Church or the chairman or secretary of any other place of original jurisdiction.
- 303-3 No charge shall be received if it is filed more than two years after the time the alleged offense was committed unless good cause prevented an earlier filing.
- 303-4 When an individual, Particular Church or Agency of the BFC is ready to present a charge, the judicial body receiving the charge shall warn the plaintiff that he may be censured if the accused is found to be innocent of the alleged offense. If the judicial body receiving the charge determines that the charge is frivolous, it may dismiss the charge and censure the plaintiff.
- 303-5 When a charge is filed, the Board of Elders of the Particular Church, the Credentials Committee, the Ministerial Relations Committee, or the Conference Judicatory shall establish the time and place for the trial, and shall cite the accused to appear at the trial and shall constitute the judicial body to conduct the trial.

### Article 307 - Appeals

307-1 An appeal is a petition asking that the final judgment of one judicatory be reversed or modified by another judicatory.

307-2 Notice of intention to appeal must be filed in writing within ten days after the judgment of the original judicatory has been announced. This notice must be filed with the moderator of the original judicatory.

307-3 To perfect an appeal, the appellant must in writing file within thirty days of the notice of appeal his appeal and specifications of error by the original judicatory. This shall be filed with the secretary of the judicatory to which the appeal is made; a copy of the appeal and specifications of error shall also be filed with the moderator of the original judicatory.

307-4 If the judicatory to which appeal is made does not sustain any of the specifications of error, the judgment of the original judicatory is affirmed. If the appellate judicatory sustains any specifications of error, it shall determine whether the error is of such importance as to require a reversal, or modification of the original judgment. A judicatory to which appeal is made may remand the case to the original judicatory, may modify the original judgment or may reverse the original judgment.

**Resolved**, that the following terms be adopted for inclusion in a glossary to be included in the *Faith and Order*:

Credentialed - an official recognition of the rights, privileges and responsibilities of ministry as defined within the F&O. This includes men who are probationers licensed by the Ministerial Candidate Committee and/or men ordained through the BFC as well as those who have their previous ordinations recognized by the BFC.

Ordained - a man who has completed the credentialing process of the BFC or has had his prior ordination by a non-BFC church recognized by the BFC.

We recognize that the term *ordained* is often used to designate those who have been ordained through other denominations but are not yet credentialed with the BFC. We respect the authority of other Christian churches to ordain men to serve in the Gospel ministry of their fellowships, and we rejoice that God often moves these men to desire to serve in the BFC. While not wishing to disparage the work of other Christian churches nor diminish the recognition of our brothers, for the sake of clarity, when the term *ordained* is used in the F&O, it is referring to a

man who has completed the ordination process of the BFC or had his prior ordination by a non-BFC church recognized by the BFC (Article 502-4).

Pastor - those called to the Gospel ministry (see Article 204.1). A pastor is a credentialed man who is a voting member of Annual Conference. This only includes those staff positions called according to the rules of pulpit supply. This is for denominational reference and Particular Churches may use the term pastor in a broader sense.

Senior Pastor - the Lead Pastor of a church, called under the rules of the pulpit supply of the BFC. The Senior Pastor or his designee shall serve as Chairman of the Board of Elders and shall assume other pastoral responsibilities as assigned to him by that Board.

Pastoral Staff - men recognized by a Particular Church who have attained credentialed, probationer, or candidate status and who serve in various pastoral functions.

# Report of the Committee to Study the Process of Recognizing Pastors With Prior Ordination (see page: 157)

Resolved, that the report be accepted

**Resolved**, that the following be adopted at first reading for inclusion in the *Faith and Order* as §409-1.8:

409-1.8 - Procedure to expedite the calling of a previously-ordained minister who has not been licensed by the BFC.

On certain exceptional occasions it may be necessary to expedite the procedure for issuing a call to a previously-ordained minister for service in a BF church.

Under the following circumstances, the call of a previouslyordained minister may follow the expedited procedure:

- (1) When geographical distance allows limited personal contact:
- (2) When the demands of current ministry in another church may not allow for the time required in the normal process;
- (3) When the BFC seeking a pastor applies for special consideration because of urgent circumstances.

#### The following shall be the expedited procedure:

- (1) The church which is considering the previously-ordained minister shall make request to the chairman of the Ministerial Relations Committee who shall in consultation with the chairman of the Ministerial Candidate Committee approve or deny the request for the expedited process.
- (2) If the request is approved, the Ministerial Candidate Committee shall meet as soon as possible with the minister for an interview. If he is approved as a candidate, he shall be given the Open Book Examination.
- (3) Upon the satisfactory completion of the interview and the Open Book Examination, the church may seek permission from the Ministerial Relations Committee to issue a provisional call. The church shall follow the applicable steps outlined in § 409.
- (4) Following the issue of a provisional call, the minister shall complete the further exams required by the Ministerial Candidate Committee. A man will not be permitted to begin his new ministry or move into church-provided housing until all the required examinations are satisfactorily completed.
- (5) When all examinations are satisfactorily completed, the Ministerial Candidate Committee will approve the minister as a licensed probationer effective on the date of approval of his final examination. The Ministerial Candidate Committee shall notify the Ministerial Relations Committee who shall recognize the provisional call of the church as the formal call on the effective date assigned by the Ministerial Candidate Committee. [FIRST READING]

<u>Resolved</u>, that §502 of the *Faith and Order* be revised for First Reading as follows:

### Article 502 - Procedure for the Recognition of a Minister

All men who desire to have ministerial credentials with the BFC shall apply to the Ministerial Candidate Committee. Initial application should be made in writing to the chairman of the committee.

Every man who is called to serve through the pulpit supply system as a pastor of a BFC must have credentials with the denomination. Men who serve as supply pastors for an extended period may be required to meet with and establish an accountability relationship with the Ministerial Candidate Committee. A supply pastor is a man who has been called to serve as pastor of a BFC for an interim period. Under normal circumstances, a supply pastor is not under consideration to serve as the senior pastor.

#### 502-1 Men Entering the Ministry of the BFC

The Ministerial Candidate Committee divides those under its care into three groups: Applicants, Candidates, and Probationers.

Applicant. An applicant is a man who offers himself to this committee for service in the BFC. Young men are encouraged to seek this recognition as early in their educational program as they sense the call of God to the ministry.

Candidate. A candidate is a man whose application is accepted and who remains under the guidance of this committee. A man becomes a candidate when he is ready to begin ministry with the BFC and has completed a satisfactory interview with the Ministerial Candidate Committee.

Probationer. A probationer is a man who has been approved by this committee and has passed the required examinations. Upon completion of his required exams, he will be classified as a probationer eligible to receive a call. When a probationer receives a call from the BFC (a Particular Church or agency) or other ministry (chaplaincy, etc.) approved by the Ministerial Candidate Committee in consultation with the Credentials Committee, he shall become a licensed probationer. Such other ministry does not include service on the pastoral staff of a church other than a BFC.

### 502-2 Probationary Service

502-2.1 Full-time Probationary Service in a Particular Church or Mission. Normally a probationer serves in a full-time capacity. After a probationer has served at least two years, or one year if previously ordained, he may be recommended to the Credentials Committee for ordination examination or recognition of previous ordination. The minimum period of probationary service may be extended; having served as a probationer does not guarantee ordination or recognition of previous ordination.

502-2.2 Part-time Probationary Service in a Particular Church or Mission

A man serving his probationary period on a part-time basis may do so with the following requirements:

- (1) He shall serve the equivalent of at least two years full-time service, or one year of full time service if previously ordained, as determined by the Ministerial Candidate Committee in consultation with the Credentials Committee.
- (2) He shall serve at least one year under the supervision of a Board of Elders and/or another evaluating body approved by the Ministerial Candidate Committee and the Credentials Committee.

# 502-2.3 Probationary Service in Other Ministry

If a man seeks ordination or recognition of previous ordination in the BFC and is not serving as the pastor of a Particular Church or mission, he may do so with the following requirements:

- (1) He shall be a member of a BFC
- (2) Hc shall follow the same procedure for ordination as other probationers
- (3) He shall comply with the F&O in the course of his service
- (4) He shall be supervised by the Board of Elders of the church in which he holds membership, the governing board of the ministry under which he serves, and any other evaluating agencies the Ministerial Candidate Committee may require during the probationary period of service. The time of the probationary service may be in full or part-time capacity.

#### 502-3 Ordained Ministers Received From Other Churches

- 502-3.1 When an ordained minister from another church seeks ministerial credentials in the BFC, he shall apply to the Ministerial Candidate Committee.
- 502-3.2 The following matters shall be considered when determining whether to recognize a previous ordination:
  - (1) the doctrinal position of the ordaining church body;
  - (2) the minister's standing with the ordaining church body;
  - (3) whether his ordination was intended to be within and to the ministry of the church universal;
  - (4) whether his ordination was performed by the authority charged with the exercise of this specific church power within the ordaining community and accompanied by the laying on of hands by such as have themselves been similarly ordained.
- 502-3.3 Under certain exceptional circumstances, a previouslyordained minister may be licensed through an expedited process (see section 409-1.8)
- 502-3.4 Having complied with these provisions, the minister shall be under the authority and discipline of the BFC.
  - 502-3.5 After serving at least one year as a probationer, he may be examined by the Credentials Committee. The Credentials

Whereas, we once did not approve "oaths" as acceptable in the behavior of believers, and

Whereas, we rejected that position at the 79th Annual Conference (1962 Yearbook, pp.\$4,55); and

Whereas, Article 112 - Secret Oath-Bound Societies in the Standards of Worship and Life includes a prohibition in the use of oaths and does not define "secret societies", and

Whereas, the Inter-Cultural Study Committee has committed itself to the Annual Conference not to change existing

standards in developing Biblical Principles For Living, therefore be it

Resolved, that we recommend to the 118th Annual Conference the appointment of a committee of five ordained ministers to study in the light of the Scripture our position on Secret Oath-Bound Societies and bring its report to the 119th Annual Conference.

**Resolved,** that the following legislation be adopted at First Reading:

#### 130-1 Dedication of Children

- 130-1.1 Child dedication is a voluntary act in which believing parents publicly present their child to the Lord as an outward expression of their gratitude to Him for the child and as a formal appeal to God for divine assistance in the bringing up of the child. It is not to be confused with baptism, or to be considered as imparting salvation, or viewed as an ordinance of the church.
- 130-1.2 The child is a gift from God and therefore the parents promise, as God's stewards, to bring up the child in the discipline and instruction of the Lord.<sup>2</sup>
- 130-1.3 In dedicating their child in the presence of fellow believers, parents are publicly dedicating themselves to the faithful fulfillment of their parental responsibilities<sup>3</sup> and are acknowledging their need of the prayerful support and encouragement of those fellows believers.<sup>4</sup>
- **130-1.4** Child dedication becomes meaningful as the parents explain to the child the meaning of this act and consistently carry out the promises made before God and the church at the time of dedication. When one of the parents is an unbeliever, only the believing parent shall make the public presentation.

#### 130-3.1 Alcoholic Drinks

- 130-3.1.1 The use of alcoholic beverages is one of the most serious problems in many parts of the world. Its abuse has led to personal and family suffering, serious physical and mental health problems, and increased rates of accidental and criminal injury and death. The financial cost, use of such alcoholic beverages, and the consequences are a tremendous and unnecessary burden on all of society.
- 130-3.1.2 The Scriptures teach that drunkenness is sinful. Due to the addictive quality of alcohol, even the moderate use of alcoholic beverages may lead to serious consequences. This is especially true because the alcoholic content of some beverages has been tremendously increased since the biblical era. Furthermore, moderate use may be a stumbling block for believer and unbeliever alike.
- **130-3.1.3** Therefore, the BFC strongly and persistently warns its people of the dangers of alcoholic beverages and urges all members of the BFC to abstain totally from the use, manufacture and distribution of them.

**Resolved** that the article on tobacco (130-3.2) be referred back to the committee with the mandate to make whatever changes necessary to make all three articles on Harmful Indulgences consistent with one another.

### 130-3.3 Drugs and Other Substances

130-3.3.1 The misuse of, and over-indulgence in, drugs and other substances, including prescribed and non-prescribed, are sin and are not of faith. Such abuse controls the believer and gratifies the sinful nature. Both misuse and over indulgence cause the believer to live by feelings, not by faith in God's revealed Word. The continued abuse of drugs and all other substances destroys self-control, leads to addiction and makes it impossible for the believer to live for the will of God.

130-3.3.2 Sinning in this way affects the thinking, attitudes, and passions of the believer. This results in the believer falling deeper and deeper into sin, and can damage the body and the mind. The Church must warn against the dangers of the misuse of, and over indulgence in, drugs and all other substances, provide counsel to those enslaved, direct them to places of treatment and then help them to re-build their lives.

130-3.3.3 Encouraging or aiding others to misuse or overindulge in drugs or all other substances is sin. Selling drugs or other substances to a person for the purpose of gratification of the sinful nature is sin against God and may be against the law. The Lord Himself holds those who do this responsible. He has many ways to exercise His justice. 10

- Whereas, pensions paid to retired and disabled ordained or licensed ministers of The Bible Fellowship Church are considered as deferred compensation and are paid to said retired and disabled ordained or licensed ministers in consideration of previous active service, and
- Whereas, the Internal Revenue Service has recognized that The Bible Fellowship Church is the appropriate organization to designate a housing/rental allowance for retired and disabled or licensed ministers who are members of this Conference, therefore be it

#### Resolved, that:

- 1. An amount equal to 100% of the pension payments received during the year of 2001 be and is hereby designated as a rental/housing allowance for each retired and disabled ordained or licensed minister of The Bible Fellowship Church who is or was a member of the Bible Fellowship Church Minister's Retirement Fund.
- 2. This rental/housing allowance shall apply to each retired and disabled ordained or licensed minister who has been granted the retired relationship or placed on disability leave by the Bible Fellowship Annual Conference and

whose name and relationship to the conference is recorded in the Yearbook of The Bible Fellowship Annual Conference and in other appropriate records maintained by the conference.

3. The pension payment to which this rental/housing allowance applies shall be the pension payment resulting from all service of such retired or disabled ordained or licensed ministers from all employment by any local church, Annual Conference or institution of The Bible Fellowship, or from any other employer who employed the minister to perform services related to the ministry and who elected to make contribution to the pension funds of the Bible Fellowship Church for such retired minister's pension.

Note: The rental/housing allowance which may be excluded from a minister's gross income is limited to the less of (1) the amount of the rental/housing allowance designated by the minister's employer or other appropriate body, (2) the amount actually expended by the minister to provide his or her housing, or (3) the legally-determined fair rental value of the parsonage or other housing provided. As specified in Rev. Rul. 71-290 C.B. 92, "the only amount that will qualify for exclusion under section 107 (2) of the Code as a 'rental allowance' is an amount equal to the fair rental value of the home, including furnishings and appurtenances such as a garage, plus the cost of utilities."

- <u>Whereas</u>, the Internet has been found to be an excellent method of communication for pastors, churches, and denominational boards, committees, and agencies of the BFC, and
- Whereas, the BFC E-group now includes 133 participants who have instant written access to one another, and
- Whereas, we believe that every pastor and/or church either has or can have access to Internet services and computerization at little or no cost, and





# Report of the Committee on Arrangements

It is a real blessing to have Victory Valley and Pinebrook as dynamic ministries in the BFC to provide a retreat to nature with a solid Bible-based program. Our commitment to the use of God's creation and its preservation, is a spiritually profitable endeavor.

Praise the Lord for answering "YES" to our prayers. The year-round staff has increased this spring as John Masters from the Fleetwood BFC has joined the effort as the Facilities Manager. His love for the Lord and God-given talent is a great asset to the Valley and to our mission. Phil Atkins has served as the Director for sixteen years, Donna Bauer has served as Assistant Director for more than sixteen years, and Sandy Mitchell has been with the Valley for more than three years as the Bookkeeper Registrar. Victory Valley has nearly doubled in summer attendance, and over triple the amount of groups rent Victory Valley each year since 1986. As the workload increased, we have met the challenge but more staff is needed to continue meeting the demands of this dynamic ministry. Please continue to pray for Victory Valley Camp, the Board, and the Staff.

The facilities will begin to increase again this year as we renovate the exterior of the Office Building, and work toward expanding the Dining Hall facility by 2003. Our growth has developed a need to meet certain space considerations. In addition to this expansion we plan to replace the mobile home, housing the Assistant Director, with a modular home by 2005. A BFC

businessman, who builds modular homes, is selling one to us at cost. A fund raising campaign is underway to meet the financial needs involved with these projects. In the year 2005, Victory Valley will celebrate its Golden Anniversary commemorating 50 years of ministry.

The Victory Interested Person program (VIP) is growing as well. Over 130 individuals and families are involved as VIP members. This program provides almost 10% of our budget. The monies are used for program materials, scholarships, and general camp needs. It is a great way to invest in the lives of our young people at a place where they make life decisions for God. We thank the Volunteers who make a great impact on our ability to meet the growing needs at camp. Call the camp to find out how to be a part of this great work. Youth groups, individuals, service groups and more already volunteer.

We thank the churches for continually praying and financially supporting the camp. Please remember that churches which support Victory Valley with 1% of their budget can receive a 10% discount for all their campers and groups that use the camp.





# Report of the Executive Director of Church Extension

...but you shall receive power when the Holy Spirit has come upon you; you shall be my witnesses both in JERUSALEM, AND IN ALL JUDEA... Acts 1:8

On May 1, 2000, I embarked on my new calling as Executive Director of Church Extension. I stepped into this new ministry not unaware of the workings of the Department of Church Extension, nor unfamiliar with the dynamics of church planting, having served on the Board of Church Extension for six years and having earned a degree in Missiology, with a focus on church planting. Yet, neither the Board experience nor the degree could fully prepare me for the adjustments and magnitude of this mission of church planting.

For the first several months of my directorship, priority had to be given to the establishment of a new office and a new staff. Director Ziegler, along with Development Director Snyder, as well as the office secretary, Rachel Kistler, had all retired and along with their retirements came the closing of the Church Extension offices which were located in the Ziegler's and Snyder's homes. I also had to prioritize the search for a new residence for my family. We established a new office location in Allentown and we found a home in the Adamstown area of Northern Berks and Southern Lancaster Counties. I would like to thank Elder Mike Werley from the Cedar Crest Bible Fellowship Church, the landlord for our office, for all the assistance he offered in helping us settle into the new office. I would also like to thank the Board Of Church Extension Property Committee, particularly Robert Buckwalter, and the Board Of Directors for their help in securing a home.

At the same time that the office and my home were being arranged we were training a new Administrative Assistant, Mrs. Linnette Smith. Linnette did a very commendable job in setting up the office and getting us started on a new computer system as well

as transitioning all the items necessary in caring for our church planting missionaries. I assume that many in the BFC are not aware of the extent of responsibility the Department has with regard to its missionaries. You might say we care for our men from birth to graduation. Unlike our foreign missionaries who usually have their care provided by their "sending" boards and our Board Of Missions, Church Extension has a comprehensive responsibility. We are concerned with the calling of a church planter, the establishment of his salary package, provisions for housing and hospitalization, and assist him in raising funds for his support and the needs of the mission. We also provide all the administrative record keeping, mailings, tax recording, retirement assistance, and the bookkeeping which goes along with all this. I am amazed at how all this comes together with only one person in the office and working approximately twenty-five hours a week. I thank Linnette for getting us started. Due to some personal concerns, Linnette had to leave her position, but the Lord had the right individual in the wings to take her place. Ruth Richards came on board as our Administrative Assistant and picked up where Linnette left off. Ruth has taken the efficiency of the office to the next level and has proved to be God's person for this valuable ministry.

With the office and our home, moving in a reasonably good direction, the Lord placed some very serious matters at the forefront of my attention. Decisions had to be made concerning the Staten Island Mission. The Brooklyn Mission had called a new man to be their organizing pastor and was in need of housing, the Beacon Mission was going through some difficulty, and several property matters had to be addressed. All of these matters took significant time and energy. I praise God for the work of our Board in these matters and the support of the churches as we dealt with each situation. I also praise God for the encouragement I personally received from so many brothers and sisters in the BFC.

God had given me a vision for this work, at least a vision for these genesis years of my ministry in Church Extension. In light of all the initial organizing work and the attention which had to be given to issues needing decisions, I was able to fulfill some significant elements of that vision. I set as a goal to be in all the BFC churches and Missions by the end of the summer of 2001. I

am right on target. I have been in or will be in by the time of Conference, thirty-seven churches with twenty-two churches still to visit. In thirty-five of the churches I have been in, I was able to present my vision and preach in the Sunday morning worship services. This has exposed this vital mission of church planting to the majority of the people in the BFC. My vision, as many of you have heard, is summed up with an acronym, titled, B.U.R.S.T.

Bridging - The work of Church Extension must be seen as missions and our church planters as God's called missionaries to our Jerusalem and Judea. In last year's report of the Board of Missions, our Director stated that the BFC has a passion for missions(foreign). I know that he will agree with my saying that when it comes to fulfilling the Great Commission in our Jerusalem and Judea through evangelism to make converts and church planting to make disciples, our corporate passion is lacking. A denomination might be able to do without its para agencies and survive. The closing of Pinebrook Jr. College is an example of this, but if a denomination loses its fervor and passion for church planting in its ministry target areas and beyond, it will corporately deteriorate. In every church I have visited, I have waved the banner of the vital importance of the mission of Church Extension and church planting. A number of our churches know this truth and have significantly supported our mission. But if we are going to bring glory to God through fulfilling that which was the last command on the lips of His Son, ...make disciples, then not just a number but all the churches must have their hands firmly gripping the banner of church planting.

Uniting - Maybe a better word for this point in my vision statement might be Creating. The Missions Task Force, made up of three members of the Board Of Missions (Dana Weller, Ralph Soper, David Way), and three members of the Board Of Church Extension (David Gundrum, David Armstrong, Richard Taylor) has been meeting for the past two years and has come to the point where we are convinced, along with our Boards, that God's

mission plan for the BFC would best be carried out by the creation of a new BFC mission's entity, namely The Great Commission Ministries - BFC. This new Board will have as its focus the comprehensive fulfillment of Acts 1:8, Jerusalem to the Uttermost parts of the world. Church planting will be the crucible of this new Missions entity. A Report is being distributed from the Task Force to Conference and the Task Force will be available to answer questions or clarify its vision.

Recruiting - At the recent national church planting forum I attended, it was stated that the most significant ingredient to successful church planting is to establish intercessors who will pray for the targeted church planting effort. The second most important ingredient noted was the proper and assessment of church planting recruitment missionaries. My vision is to see the men, whom God is raising up in the BFC for ministry, consider church planting as one of the options to consider when evaluating their call. Church Planting is Pauline in every aspect of its nature. To enter into church planting is to walk in the footsteps of the Apostle Paul. It will take men who are ready for a challenge, with visionary skills, an evangelistic heartbeat and a personality and desire to be incarnational with the community in which they will minister. I hope to have someone, maybe a retired pastor, assist me in recruitment and go out to Bible Schools and Seminaries to share our vision and the opportunities which exist for church planting in the BFC. I also hope to encourage each BFC Pastor to speak to those men from their churches, whom God is calling to ministry, and encourage them to prayerfully consider becoming a church planter. God has raised up from our ranks overseas missionaries and pastors for our churches. I trust He will raise up gifted church planters.

Strategy - A visionary strategy to do church planting is necessary.

But, policies and strategies have been difficult to formulate because of the anticipation of a new missions entity and the probability that a new Board for The Great Commission Ministries-BFC will need the freedom to

create a new structure as well as new policies and strategies. Yet, I and our Policy and Strategy Committee believe that until this new missions entity is in position, a bridge strategy is necessary.

Training - Rounding out my vision is the need to institute the training necessary for our men to be equipped to plant churches. First, I believe a BFC Church Planters Manual is necessary in order for the church planter to know how to handle situations on the field and where to turn when questions arise. It will equip the planter with helpful tools and give him a clear understanding of what is expected of him. I have gathered a number of helpful contacts who are committed to training and Coaching/Mentoring church planters. I have also gathered some very good training materials. What I need now is the time to coordinate all these valuable training elements into a training manual and set up the right forum for putting the training into practice. I value your prayers with regard to this endeavor.

If you are not familiar with my weekly Antiochan Reports, please see me and allow me to add your E-mail to my list. I have had many good comments on how much our people appreciate receiving this weekly news on Church Extension. Finally, I would like to give some brief reports on the Churches and Missions in the Department. This past year the Personnel Committee from the Board of Church Extension held its bi-annual meetings with our men. Each of our men stated that they were encouraged in their ministry and looking forward to the Lord blessing them with reaching their goals and objectives for this coming year. This year, the Pleasant Valley Church was graduated from the Department and is now seeking to purchase its own meeting place. In this past year we also followed the Lord's leading to close two of our works, the Staten Island and Beacon missions. These were very difficult decisions for the Board. We are praying for new church starts this year to compensate for these losses. Here is a listing of the Churches and Missions in the Department.

<u>Aberdeen</u>, <u>NJ - Pastor John C. Vandegriff</u> - John and this wonderful group of people work hard each week to hold their time of worship in the school where they are meeting. Recently, the

listing of the church in the local Yellow Pages has been bringing visitors in on a regular basis. John and the church are on target with the church becoming fully self-supporting. This year, once again, the church was able to receive less in appropriations from the Department.

<u>South Allentown, PA - Pastor Elliott H. Ramos</u> - This year, the mission has taken some steps toward becoming a particular church. We assessed ten committed families for the mission and at this time Pastor Ramos is working with several men to be potential elders. The mission has also reduced its appropriation need from the Department and is setting aside money for the support of both foreign and home missions. At this Conference Pastor Ramos will be ordained into the gospel ministry.

<u>Brooklyn, NY - Pastor Ralph E. Ritter</u> - After six years of praying and seeking the Lord to call a pastor for this faithful and committed group of Christians in New York, the Department called Ralph Ritter to be the organizing pastor for the Brooklyn Mission. Ralph concluded his ministry at Staten Island and answered the call to Brooklyn. He and Carolyn and the children moved into a new parsonage in Brooklyn. At the time of the writing of this Report, an Assessment Committee was being approved to meet with ten committed families from the mission and the potential elders of the church.

Chesapeake VA - Pastor Willis I. Dowling - This mission is now two years old and after much evaluation and discussion with Pastor Dowling the Board decided to commit to Willis' full support. As of Jan.1,2001, Willis is now full-time church planting in the Tidewater area. He will be securing a new meeting place for Sunday worship and starting up a new Bible Study in the Suffolk area where several key families in the church live. Pray that with these changes and modifications God will bless the work with growth this year.

<u>Las Cruces, NM - Pastor Jack Becker</u> - This year, the mission in New Mexico has grown from twenty to as high as in the forties. We have identified several men who are willing to serve as elders for the mission and it is now a matter of coordinating their schedules and have them begin their meetings with Jack. Jack is still very committed to the mission, but has a vision for reaching another area. Please pray the Lord would lead a man to come alongside Jack and become the Pastor of the church in the future.

<u>Newark, NJ - Pastor Delbert R. Baker</u> - Newark continues to be a strategic ministry in this vast metropolitan city. Its work of mercy and outreach with the Gospel are so valuable to the Lord's plan for this city. Pastor Baker remains committed to the people of his congregation and the goal of reaching out with the Gospel. Plans for the new church building are still being held up by the need for an access property to the new church site. Please pray for two things: that the Lord would open up an access property and that God would raise up elders for the church.

Scranton, PA - Pastor Roger L. Reitz - This year Pastor Reitz and his Board, along with the members of the church, are seeking the Lord's blessing upon this ministry and the goals they have set for the growth and development of the church. Brother Reitz will begin a Bible Study in the Pittston area, west of Scranton. A new family, formerly active participants in our Stroudsburg Church, moved into the Pittston area and are praying for God to reach this area with the Gospel. Pray for Pastor Reitz and the Church as they seek to reach their ministry goals and begin this outreach to Pittston.

<u>Thompson, CT - Pastor Dennis W. Spinney</u> - Pastor Spinney has a real heart for church planting and has been seeking the Lord's leading for planting a sister church in one of his neighboring areas. He has also been meeting with potential elders for the mission. Pray that this year elders would be assessed. Dennis reported that this past year, the mission experienced its highest giving year since its inception. This will allow the church to move ahead in its goal to be self-supporting.

<u>Toms River</u>, NJ - Pastor Dean A. Stortz - This past summer Chris Merrick led a work team to Toms River and renovated the parsonage. This was a great encouragement to Dean and Donna, the church, and the community. The church is moving ahead and like

a number of other works in the Department, the church is taking on more of the support for their Pastor. The opportunity to purchase a vacant church has surfaced. Pray for God's leading in this purchase and that the church will continue to grow.

<u>Walnutport, PA - Pastor Jonathan P. Tait</u> - The church is in its last year of being fully self-supporting and Lord willing, by this time next year, the Walnutport Church will be graduated from the Department. Pastor Tait and the Elders of the Church have done a great job in developing the church and establishing a vision for growth. They have a burden to reach the greater community of the Northern Lehigh Valley and are now seeking a property to be located in a more strategic location. Pray that all goes well in reaching their goals for ministry.

<u>Hellertown</u>, <u>PA</u> - I praise God for the vision and work the Coopersburg Church has accomplished in laying the foundation for a church to be planted in Hellertown. A leadership group has been meeting and I have been working with the group to complete some necessary work before we launch worship services in the community. Stephen Mann, former WorldTeam missionary to Guadeloupe, is completing his credentials with the BFC in order to receive a call to Hellertown. Pray all goes well with the launching of this mission.

<u>DELMARVA</u> - In the next few weeks I will be meeting with a core group of people from the Sussex County DE, area and seeking to work with them in planting a church in or around Rehoboth, DE. Pastor Ken Barber will be helping where he can and Pastor Ray Dotts, Camden DE, BFC, and Pastor Bill Schlonecker, Newark, DE, BFC, will also be supporting this Delaware sister church project. Pray for a good start to this plant.

<u>Hispanic Church Plant</u> - The Joint Committee on Ethnic Church planting had successfully facilitated the planting of an Hispanic Church in South Allentown and is now looking to do the same among the Hispanic Community in Lancaster. This year the joint Committee will be pursuing this project along with the assistance of Pastor Ramos and the support of the Capital Region Churches.

I praise God for the notes, E-mails and personal conversations of encouragement. But most of all I thank the Lord for the Churches of the BFC and the many individuals who support this work in prayer and financial giving. Please pray for me in this new year. Pray that I will be a servant to the BFC, the men of our Department, and the Board Of Church Extension. Pray that God will give me wisdom to assist our churches and missions develop into particular churches. Pray for Ruth Richards and the vast amount of work she has the responsibility of overseeing. Finally, pray that God will use me to encourage our Churches to see the importance of planting churches in our Jerusalem and Judea.

# Report of the Board of Church Extension

The Board of Church Extension has the distinct privilege and responsibility of promoting and helping the Bible Fellowship Church to carry out the Great Commission by planting churches to the glory of God. The Lord has demonstrated His perfect faithfulness through another year of ministry within the Department. This was a year of transition. David E. Gundrum became the Executive Director on May 1st, 2000. He has brought his own unique and excellent gifts and personality to the tasks of leadership. David has been enthusiastically representing the work of church planting to churches and visiting with each church planter for evaluation and encouragement. The Board is grateful to God for Daniel G. Ziegler's leadership of the Department for thirty-two years. It was a great joy to host a "Retirement Dinner" for Daniel and his wife, Jaquelene, at Fellowship Manor, Many enjoyed the evening of remembering God's faithfulness over the years. Recognition and appreciation were also extended to Carol Snyder, who has retired as the Director of Development. A highlight of the evening was the announcement of the "Daniel G. Ziegler Legacy Fund" to be designated for planting new churches. The Board is pleased to establish this fund as an ongoing tribute to Dan's untiring devotion to church planting and encourages each church to consider a contribution. The office personnel also changed. In light of Rachel Kistler's retirement, Linette Smith and more recently, Ruth Richards, have continued to provide excellent administrative support in the office.

The work of church planting has its joys and sorrows. With joy, this year the Board appointed an Assessment Committee for the Lighthouse Bible Fellowship Church in South Allentown, PA, and the Brooklyn, NY, Mission. Each has steadily progressed and is rapidly moving toward recognition as a Particular Church. The Pleasant Valley, NY, Bible Fellowship Church has "graduated" from the oversight of the Department. Many of the missions are showing steady, if not rapid, development and growth. The Board is grateful for those elders in the Bible Fellowship Church who, though not members of the Board, are willing to serve on Surrogate

Boards of Elders for missions and churches of the Department, providing essential leadership and guidance in their formative years.

With sadness, this year the Board made the difficult decision to close the Staten Island and Beacon, NY, Missions. The Board remains committed to inner city church planting and remains open to a future work in Staten Island as the Lord may direct. We thank the Lord for each man that has served in this place over many years and for the eternal fruit that God has brought forth over the years. W. Robert Buckwalter will not seek re-election to the Board after years of faithful and dedicated service to the Lord. His work on the Property Committee has been invaluable. Also, the Board remains encouraged with the progress made in plans for a joint effort with the Board of Missions to more effectively carry out Christ's Great Commission.

We enter another year of ministry with great expectations regarding the potential of new church plants. The Board has assumed oversight of the Hellertown, PA, church plant, which was birthed out of Calvary Bible Fellowship Church, Coopersburg, PA, along with interest and support from our Quakertown and Bethlehem churches. The time appears ripe for a church plant in the Delmarva Peninsula region. These expectations are sourced in a great God Whose desire is to build His church. However, they are at times tempered by the reality of limited financial resources available for these new church planting efforts. New church plants are absolutely essential to the future health and growth of our denomination to God's glory.

A special word of thanks is extended to all of those who faithfully support the ministry of planting Bible Fellowship churches through their prayers, gifts, and participation in work projects. These are true partners in the ministry. The Board communicates its sincere appreciation and gratitude for the commitment of those churches that gave one percent of their offerings to the Fund to Promote Church Extension as recommended by the Board of Directors. This has been a source of great encouragement. Also, the Board thanks the Lord for the fine men who are serving "in the trenches." Church planting is not an easy task. There are times of great loneliness, frustration, and discouragement mixed with the times of great joy. Please continue

to pray for and support each of these men and their families. We invite you to visit the missions and churches of the Church Extension Department to encourage them and to see firsthand the results of your partnership. The Board continues to pray that God would work in such a way that it is unmistakably a work of His.

# Report of the Board of Missions

### "This is the day the LORD has made; let us rejoice and be glad in it".

How shortsighted we must be to quote Psalm 118:24 as some type of pep talk for a bad day. Recently I heard a woman in a parking lot say as she looked at the crumpled fender of her new SUV, "Oh well, this is the day..."

The Psalmist is very clear, as is our Lord in the Gospels that the day of rejoicing is the day that God made the rejected stone by man the Chief Cornerstone. "The stone the builders rejected has become the capstone; the LORD has done this, and it is marvelous in our eyes."

As God continues to build His church on the foundation of His Son Jesus Christ, it still is a marvelous sight in our eyes.

We live in unprecedented times! The outpouring of the Spirit on this world and the ingathering of believers in the past few years are unparalleled in church history. The church of Jesus Christ around the world has heeded His call to go and make disciples.

The statistics that follow this report only tell a portion of the story. God continues to call out of our tiny denomination men and women for careers in missionary service. (We now have 1 out of every 42 members of the BFC involved with the BOM!) Out of our missionary family God has called some to take the mantle of leadership, for others they are part of the great army on the front lines of evangelism and church planting. Still others carry on the support ministries that are so vitally needed.

The BFC missionary family proclaims the Good News of the Gospel in over 35 nations of the world.

They touch the students and professors on the campuses of our universities.

They build the next generation of church leaders in Africa, Europe, and Central and South America.

They assist nationals in establishing churches.

They show the love of Christ by assisting those who are physically suffering.

They find creative ways to be salt and light in limitedaccess areas.

From the Indian reservation, to the inter-city, from the jungle to the remote parts of Mongolia they serve the cause of Christ.

Beyond the statistics that account for our career missionary family is the movement within the BFC toward short-term missionary projects. Both adults and students are heeding the call to join forces with our missionary family and assist in a wide variety of ways. We have no way of accurately counting those who have heeded the call. Entire work teams and small groups have transversed the globe over the past year. At least a third of our churches have participated in some type of a project. (Besides work teams, many ministry teams used sports, puppets, VBS, magic, and mime.) What was once a youth movement now includes all ages. Retired couples, singles groups, even entire families have joined the ranks.

This year the BOM continues to serve our churches by:

Helping churches bring those who show an interest in missions through the application process to career status with the BFC.

- Offering the services of Global Focus to our BFC Churches.
- Joining ranks with the newly formed Board of Youth and Young Adults in promoting missionary service projects for our youth.
- Offering our young people a missions vision though a RWR retreat.
- Taking a group of young adults to URBANA Missions Conference in Illinois.
- Establishing the BFC-letsfish egroup for the purpose of sharing ideas.

Conducting our first Short-Term Missions Symposium for teens and young adults being held this year at Quakertown on May 5.

The Board of Missions remains committed to the creation of the new BFC missions entity approved by Annual Conference namely, **The Great Commission Ministries - BFC**. This new Board will have as its focus the comprehensive fulfillment of Acts 1:8



### Report of the Board of Higher Education

During the 2000 calendar year, the Board of Higher Education (BHE) has met three times, for a total of twenty-two times since its inception in the fall of 1994. It continues to oversee the work of the Pinebrook Educational Foundation (PEF), to develop working relationships with Biblical Theological Seminary, and to consider how else it might foster higher education in the BFC.

#### The Pinebrook Educational Foundation

The Board of Directors of the PEF for the past year was as follows:

#### Working Relationships with Biblical Theological Seminary

The BHE has been working on three projects involving Biblical: (1) a BFC chaplain who would visit Biblical regularly to counsel students and encourage some of them to consider service with the BFC; (2) a course on the history, doctrine and polity of the BFC to be offered at regular intervals at Biblical; and (3) an internship program in which BF churches would take pastoral interns from Biblical.

1. Since the fall of 1999, retired BFC missionary Ed Moyer, has served under the auspices of the BHE as BFC chaplain to students at Biblical Seminary. He has typically visited the school weekly or twice monthly during the school year and has had interaction with students. Due to the changing demographic

circumstances at Biblical – which now has nearly all of its students part-time and commuting, with a block-scheduling system having classes only three days per week and meeting from morning to late evening – it is impossible to be at school any one time (or even one day) and expect to be able to have access to a majority of the students. Ed has been doing a fine job under the circumstances, but we need to consider how we can give him more exposure to the students. We appreciate Ed's enthusiasm and willing spirit.

- 2. Due to insufficient registration, the two times we have tried to offer this course (1997, 1998), we have shelved this project for the time being.
- 3. The pastoral internship machinery for BF churches at Biblical Seminary is up and running and can be used by interested churches at any time. Since the internship program was instituted at Biblical, several BF churches have availed themselves of this opportunity. Internship brochures were printed and handed out at Annual Conference in 1998, 1999 and again in 2000, as well as at the BFC Ministerial Convention in September 1999. It would be good to see more BF churches avail themselves of this opportunity.

#### Other Ways of Promoting Higher Education in the BFC

The BHE has taken some time at the end of each meeting for wide-ranging discussions on how we might promote higher education in the BFC. These discussions have included a number of topics: (1) how to get the BHE and PEF better known in the BFC; (2) how to encourage talented Christian young people in our churches to seek higher education in order to serve the Lord more effectively in whatever vocation He has called them to; (3) how to encourage BF pastors to get advanced education to strengthen their ministry; (4) how to reach out to students and faculty at colleges and universities that are in the vicinity of our BF churches; and especially (5) how to reach out to foreign students in these schools who will return to their own countries, so that they may be even more effective missionaries than those who must learn a foreign culture.

Some suggestions for implementing the above. (1)Use brochures and personal contacts with pastors and BF churches. (2) Encourage some sort of "college fair" that would be denomination

wide, perhaps in conjunction with a youth activity; or encourage a "college trip" organized by one or more BF churches to take senior high students around to prospective schools. (3) We have asked the PEF to devote one of its endowment funds to helping pastors get advanced or continuing education. (4) One of our members, John Studenroth, has started Collegiate Outreach, a ministry to faculty and grad students at colleges and universities in Berks and Lehigh Counties. John Quigley, a member of Ebenezer BFC, has started Winsome Media, an outreach to seekers who may be attracted to a friendly, yet persuasive presentation of Christian evidences. We should try to promote these ministries, as well as the Interdisciplinary Biblical Research Institute associated with Biblical Seminary, among our BF churches, perhaps by having some sort of outreach meetings sponsored by one or more of our churches, such as a Skeptics Night that IBRI recently held at the invitation of a local PCA church.

We want to thank Dave Watkins for his faithful service on our Board since its inception as he is in the process of retiring from a number of his current activities.

Brothers, thank you for praying for us this past year. We are seeing the Lord begin to move among us. Please pray that we will desire His agenda above our own, and that He may use us powerfully to strengthen the BFC in understanding the times in which we live and becoming more effective in reaching the lost.

#### Pinebrook Educational Foundation

The Board of Directors of the Pinebrook Educational Foundation met four times in 2000. The Board dealt with a number of matters which are described below.

- The Board met with Asset Planning Services in Harleysville to hear a presentation on investment management. The Board continues to consider engagement of an investment manager for the Foundation's Funds.
- 2. The Board approved certain revisions to the Foundation Investment Policy.
- Repayment of all loans including accrued interest was received from Pinebrook Junior College. Substantially all of the repayment, which totaled \$57,030.91 was invested shortterm in Federated Investment Money Market.
- 4. Conversion of the Andrew W. Ungerer Memorial Work Fund from Pinebrook Junior College to Pinebrook Educational Foundation is nearing completion. Earnings from this Endowment Fund will be used for General Scholarships.
- 5. Scholarship grants were made as follows:
  - \$500 to April Shambough from the Rev. and Mrs. R. C. Reichenbach Scholarship Fund. April is from Faith BFC in York, PA and attends Columbia International University.
  - b. \$500 to Deborah Cates from the Berean Bible School Endowment Scholarship Fund. Deborah attends Judson College and is daughter of Linda Mae (Reed) Cates, a 1968 graduate of Berean Bible School.
  - c. \$500 to Lauren Smith from the General Scholarship Fund. Lauren is from Bethany BFC, Hatfield, PA and attends Messiah College.

The Board praises the Lord that it has been able to contribute to these individuals' educational expenses. Additional gifts to the Foundation will allow increased support to individuals in higher education.

# Report of the Pinebrook Bible Conference

Entering the year 2000 was an exciting time for everyone as we patiently, and with mild uncertainty, anticipated the entrance of Y2K. Uneventful as it may have been, Pinebrook's ministry flourished in outreach to over 13,000 registered guests throughout the year.

Exciting programs and events which included our Spring Ladies Retreat, Summer Conference 2000, "In God We Trust, A Patriot Tribute" on July 5<sup>th</sup>, Senior Saints and dozens of effective retreat programs rendered hundreds of conversions, recommitments and life-changing decisions to our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ. 2000 also came with some unexpected challenges. By His Sovereign Grace He has reminded us that His work will continue and will succeed if we only focus on and follow Him.

This year another one of our long-time Directors, Robert F. Johnson, went to be with the Lord. Brother Johnson's ministry with us, especially working with the leaders and some of the staff as a pastor and mentor, will be greatly missed. The Senior Pastor of our Bethlehem Church, Brian H. Cooper, was asked to serve in Brother Johnson's place until Annual Conference.

We appreciate your continued prayers and support as we serve our Lord together. We are thankful for the many who financially support this ministry of the BFC. We are grateful for the financial support of the church as well. May He find favor upon our

After several years of preparation the first gathering of its kind, "BFC2000" was held on April 30 at Stabler Arena in Bethlehem, PA. An estimated 3,500 worshipers of all ages and from many of our churches gathered for an amazing afternoon of celebration, fellowship, and challenge. The speakers, musicians including guest, Michael Card, and video presentations were used by the Spirit to lead us as a denomination to say, "We will serve the Lord!" After all expenses were covered, an offering of \$5,500 was given to the Board of Church Extension for the expanded outreach of the BFC.

In seeking to plan for future gatherings of this nature, the Strategic Planning Committee has asked the Board of Christian Education's Family Ministries Committee to plan a denomination-wide family gathering at Knoebels Grove in Elysburg, PA for the Fall of 2002. A committee is being appointed as well to make preparations for BFC2005 for the Spring of 2005 as another denomination-wide gathering.

Regionalization of the denomination continues to progress. An increased number of regions are meeting regularly for prayer and shared ministry. Those not yet participating are asked to do so in agreement with legislation agreed upon in last year's Annual Conference. In addition, all regions are reminded of the necessity for pastors and delegates to meet at least once annually and of the written report of regional activity that should be submitted to the Strategic Planning Committee on an annual basis.

In response to the directive of Annual Conference to have the Strategic Planning Committee function as a committee to oversee a feasibility study regarding potential consolidation of offices, resources, and personnel for several BFC agencies, the Committee met with representatives from BFC agencies and boards on October 5. As a result of that session, the following resolutions were agreed upon:

- Resolved, that there be an office of the Bible Fellowship Church for Boards and Committees of Annual Conference and that it initially include: Board of Church Extension, Board of Missions, Board of Directors, Board of Publications and Printing, and further
- **Resolved**, that the office be located on the grounds of Fellowship Homes, Inc. and further
- Resolved, that Robert Zentz and Ray Dotts along with representatives of the Board of Church Extension, Board of Missions, and Board of Publications and Printing serve as an ad hoc committee to implement such consolidation.

In response to some of the input gained from BFC2000 as well as the gathering of department leaders on October 5, the Strategic Planning Committee has come to believe that the input of a consultant would give valuable insight that would aid in comprehensive planning and decision making for the denomination.

During this year a Pastors E-group has actively served to communicate important information to all pastors and to provide a cohesive denominational calendar. Any pastors not currently using e-mail and taking advantage of this valuable communication group are asked to do so. The E-group currently has 133 participants.

The following resolutions are submitted to the 118th Annual Conference for their approval:

- Whereas, the Internet has been found to be an excellent method of communication for pastors, churches, and denominational boards, committees, and agencies of the BFC, and
  - Whereas, the BFC E-group now includes 133 participants who have instant written access to one another, and
  - <u>Whereas</u>, we believe that every pastor and/or church either has or can have access to Internet services and computerization at little or no cost, and
  - Whereas, presently, the need for a comprehensive, accurate denominational calendar is being met by the

- BFC E-group Calendar, therefore, be it
- **Resolved**, that the BFC E-group Calendar serve as the official denominational calendar, and
- Resolved, that each agency, board, committee, church and/or pastor establish Internet access by May 15, 2001 in order to take advantage of the BFC E-group Calendar as well as other inter-church communication and further
- Resolved, that each agency, board, committee, church and/or pastor submit an Internet accessible e-mail address to Daniel P. Allen, publisher of the 2001 *Yearbook*. by May 15, 2001.
- 2. Whereas, the Strategic Planning Committee believes that the continuity of the Committee's work could be hampered by the mandatory term limits that are currently in place, therefore, be it
  - **Resolved**, that the Bylaws for Annual Conference, Article 512-17.2 entitled: Composition and Election, number 2 be rescinded.
- 3. <u>Whereas</u>, the Strategic Planning Committee is at a critical point in our planning process and
  - Whereas, plans for the coming year will include input from a consultant that will help us to establish a corporate vision, evaluate our purpose and structure, develop a strategic plan to implement that vision, and assist us in taking steps to act on the plan, and
  - <u>Whereas</u>, the current term limits will hinder us from doing this effectively, therefore, be it
  - **Resolved**, that, by Rule of Exception, the above changes to Article 512-17.2 be effective this year.

# Report of the Board of Christian Education

The Board of Christian Education met quarterly this year to give oversight to denomination-wide Christian Education ministries and to provide support and resources for our local churches. Much of the work is done by sub-committees of the Board.

#### **Christian Education Training**

Wayne Clapier served as chairman for this committee in 2000. The committee worked with Dave Schoen to provide Walk Thru the Bible ministries for the local churches of the BFC. In addition, the Committee updated its list of resource people so that local churches, regardless of size, could have training and input from experienced leaders from other churches for their CE Staff. Please contact Wayne Clapier for further information.

A denomination-wide Teacher Training Seminar will be held March 10, 2001 at Calvary BFC in Coopersburg, PA. Representatives of the Evangelical Training Association will give leadership to the day of encouragement and training for our CE staff.

The 2002 Seminar will be held on Saturday, March 9.

#### WalkThru The Bible Seminars

A "Kids In the Book" New Testament seminar was hosted by the Staten Island BFC this year. Trinity BFC hosted an adult Old Testament Walk. New Testament seminars for adults were presented at the Wissinoming, PA, Thompson, CT and Nazareth, PA, churches.

The price per attendee at a seminar has increased \$1 for the year 2001. Adult seminar registrations are now \$13 and children's seminar registrations are \$9. Prior to 2001, only churches with an average attendance of 250 or less for their Sunday morning service could host a seminar with the reduced pricing structure of our special contract with *Walk Thru The Bible*. A new policy was instituted which allows BF Churches averaging up to 300 to also participate at a savings over the normal rate structure.

Please see Dave Schoen [Emmaus BFC] with any questions you might have about bringing a *Walk Thru The Bible* seminar to your church.

#### **Family Life**

The Board of Christian Education added a new sub-committee this year to aid in its work. The Family Life Committee will seek to strengthen both inter-church and local family ministries for our BF Churches. Please direct your ideas, issues, and concerns in this area to Dave Schoen who will chair this committee.

The first of our plans is already underway. We are seeking to host a "Bible Fellowship Day" at Knobels Grove Amusement Park during the summer of 2002. Discount tickets for rides as well as hotdogs and sodas will make this a fun and affordable day for the entire family. Information will be sent to all churches in the Fall of 2001.

#### Pastor, Elder, Deacon Retreat

The 2000 Retreat was held November 3-4 at Pinebrook Bible Conference. We welcomed Mr. Charles Anderson of Littleton Bible Chapel, Littleton, Colorado as our speaker. Charles is an associate of Alexander Strauch who has authored books on the subjects of Biblical Eldership and the Role of the New Testament Deacon. He spoke on themes related to principles for leadership formation with the local church, instituting a leader development plan for our fellowship, and key issues for mentorees with activities and evaluation tools to cultivate leadership skills. There were 160 participants from eight regions of the BFC.

The 2001 PED Retreat will be held at Pinebrook Bible Conference on November 2-3.

#### Video Library

Volume Five, "The Early Church", from the popular "That The World May Know" series, was added to the library this year and contains five sessions between 25-30 minutes in length. Locations visited are: Ephesus, Laodicea, Caesarea Philippi, Sardis and Pergamum. The "faith lessons" are practical and powerful.

Presently there are 97 video titles available. Library use increased from 52 in 1999 to 61 in the year 2000. A wealth of good teaching material for all ages is available through this library. For a current catalog and to order materials contact Bethel BFC in Emmaus.

#### **Other Business**

This was a significant year of restructuring as the Board of Youth and Young Adult Ministries was established independent of the Board of Christian Education. The Board designated \$7,000 of our budgeted funds to the Board of Youth and Young Adults to help establish its initial budget. In addition, \$8,697.60 that had been set aside for the potential hiring of a Youth Coordinator for the Conference was transferred to the Board of Youth and Young Adults account. We support them in their work and pray God's blessing on their efforts.

# Report of the Board of Youth and Young Adults

Praise the Lord! Looking back at the first year that the Board of Youth and Young Adults has been in existence, it is obvious that God was and is at work!

During the board's first organized year of service we have planned, organized, and implemented many events to bring glory and honor to God as we minister to the adult youth leaders, teenagers, and young adults of the BFC. On the weekend of July 28-30, 2000, forty-nine participants from six different BF Churches attended the Shore Retreat in Ocean City, NJ. # Report of the Board of Pensions

As illustrated on the Balance Sheet, the Ministers' Retirement Fund (MRF) declined to \$246,426.91 as of December 31, 2000 (compared to \$291,426.09 in 1999). MRF annuity payments to pastors and beneficiaries rose to \$173,365.11 in 2000 (from \$153,290.76 in 1999). Projected annual distributions will rise from \$186,582 for 2001 to almost \$224,000 in 2006, as several more pastors reach the retirement age of 65. Approximately one-half of the current payments to retirees comes from the contributions of the churches, as can be seen on the Income Statement.

Based on the mortality assumptions, the MRF valance will continue to decline sharply and be exhausted by 2007. By 2009, the MRF would again have a positive balance, depending on actual mortality experience. This is illustrated on the accompanying graph, "MRF Long-Term Projection of Account Balances". The graph also includes a table of projected annual beneficiary payments through the year 2034. Total payments over this period are projected to be almost \$3.6 million.

In the near-term, mortality assumptions continue to be the most critical component of the projected solvency of the MRF. The objective of the Board of Pensions is to strike a reasonable balance between the mortality assumptions and the funding requirement from the churches and from Conference. The Board will continue to monitor the projections, and make periodic recommendations to Annual Conference to maintain the integrity of the MRF. The projection graph incorporates recommendations that will need to be considered over the next several years: Conference contribution of \$40,000 in 2001, increasing by \$5,000 annually until reaching \$55,000 in 2004, then increasing by inflation. The graph also includes the next increase in support from the churches beginning in 2003: \$800 per church, plus \$8.00 per capita. The Board will be analyzing other possible funding alternatives during 2001, and will present recommendations to Conference in 2002.

The Board of Pensions recommends the following resolutions to be adopted by the 118th Annual Conference for the BFC:

Whereas, the MRF annuity rate for 2001 is \$203 per year of service, and

Whereas, partial cost-of-living adjustments are part of the

long-term phaseout strategy of the MRF, therefore be it

**Resolved**, that the MRF annuity rate for calendar year 2002 be \$206 per year of service.

<u>Whereas</u>, the demands on the MRF are exceeding previous projections due to increased longevity, and

Whereas, the sooner we address the anticipated shortfalls the better, therefore be it

**Resolved**, that the Board of Pensions request that the contribution from the Conference Administrative Budget be revised from \$36,000 to \$40,000 for 2001 and be it further

**Resolved**, that the contribution for 2002 be \$45,000.

Resolution relating to Rental/Housing Allowances for retired or disabled ministers of this conference:

- Whereas, the religious denomination known as The Bible Fellowship Church has and functions through Ministers of the Gospel who are duly ordained or licensed, and
- Whereas, the practice of The Bible Fellowship Church is to provide a parsonage or a rental allowance as part of the gross compensation for each of its active ordained or licensed ministers, and
- Whereas, pensions paid to retired and disabled ordained or licensed ministers of The Bible Fellowship Church are considered as deferred compensation and are paid to said retired and disabled ordained or licensed ministers in consideration of previous, active service, and
- Whereas, the Internal Revenue Service has recognized that The Bible Fellowship Church is the appropriate organization to designate a housing/rental allowance for retired and disabled or licensed ministers who are members of this Conference, therefore be it

#### Resolved, that:

1. An amount equal to 100% of the pension payments received during the year of 2001 be and is hereby designated as a rental/housing allowance for each retired and disabled ordained or licensed minister of The Bible Fellowship Church who is or was a member

of the Bible Fellowship Church Minister's Retirement Fund.

- 2. This rental/housing allowance shall apply to each retired and disabled ordained or licensed minister who has been granted the retired relationship or placed on disability leave by the Bible Fellowship Annual Conference and whose name and relationship to the conference is recorded in the Journal of The Bible Fellowship Annual Conference and in other appropriate records maintained by the conference.
- 3. The pension payment to which this rental/housing allowance applies shall be the pension payment resulting from all service of such retired or disabled ordained or licensed ministers from all employment by any local church, Annual Conference or institution of The Bible Fellowship, or from any other employer who employed the minister to perform services related to the ministry and who elected to make contribution to the pension funds of the Bible Fellowship Church for such retired minister's pension.

Note: The rental/housing allowance which may be excluded from a minister's gross income is limited to the less of (1) the amount of the rental/housing allowance designated by the minister's employer or other appropriate body, (2) the amount actually expended by the minister to provide his or her housing, or (3) the legally-determined fair rental value of the parsonage or other housing provided. As specified in Rev. Rul. 71-290 C.B. 92, "the only amount that will qualify for exclusion under section 107 (2) of the Code as a 'rental allowance' is an amount equal to the fair rental value of the home, including furnishings and appurtenances such as a garage, plus the cost of utilities."

# Report of the Bible Fellowship Church Homes, Inc.

By 2050, the population of seniors 65 and older will double and those 85 and over will quadruple. By 2020, the ratio of those over 65 to working adults will be one-to-four. This grouping of the world's citizens will dramatically affect each generation and the church. Forecasts for an aging society assert "sweeping change for the swelling population", include growth in elder-care options. The impact will be felt in shifting life-styles, health needs, social policy, family responsibilities and services provided by the Church.

In regard to life style, increasing independence for elders is predicted as seniors reinvent themselves rather than retire, employers benefit from a wise, experienced workforce, and seniors benefit from financial gain and a sense of worth and contribution. Senior independence is further promoted through elder-friendly technology that enhances communication with family and friends and improved access to health-care information and providers.

Health care needs for seniors will also shift. While chronic and terminal illness will remain a major issue for this population, those over 65 will continue to be very health conscious. As avid consumers of fitness and nutrition services, seniors are invested in staying well and maintaining their quality of life.

As health needs increase, seniors will look for and demand alternative, cost-effective elder-care environments that promote maximum productivity and contributory life styles. A full-service facility may include a business center, computer rooms and classes in exercise and nutrition, in addition to social clubs, transportation and a health-care facility. Fellowship Community must continue as an innovative community, which constantly changes to meet the growing needs of the elder population.

Seniors can also be expected to significantly influence social and health policy, long-term, hospice and respite care; prescriptions, vision and dental coverage; and employee benefits for elder-care. All are concerns of seniors and their succeeding generations.

Elder-care responsibilities will place increasing demands on families, friends and the church. From making decisions about services and facilities, to monitoring an elder's health-care needs, to directly providing the care, caregivers will potentially be faced with threats to finances, employment and personal relationships. Their needs and interests present a secondary set of issues that require attention.

All these forecasts will promote increased demands on the church, and will provide many new opportunities for service. The government cannot solve or finance all the issues presented by this new population shift.

Who better than the Christian community to design and implement alternative, cost-effective elder-care environments or direct in-home and facility services? Who better than the church to provide counseling and support services to our elder citizens? No secular organization is available to provide the continuity of service necessary in maintaining a high quality of life for our elder citizens. The Christian community will be confronted with these issues and be expected to respond.

Fellowship Community will be developing a program, which will begin to address some of these issues. The plan will include methodologies for the churches to provide extended services to their elder citizens. Each BFC will be visited this year to determine interest and to share information about how Fellowship Community can assist the churches in providing extended services for their elder citizens.

This past year has been a busy year at Fellowship Community. Construction has begun on building 21 new independent-living-single-story townhouses. We expect occupancy to occur in September/October 2001. All 21 units have been presold and we are beginning a waiting list for the next section of courts, identified as Gehman Court.

The Bond Issue to construct an Assisted Living wing to Fellowship Manor has been progressing very slowly due to the lack of interest by investors to invest in Health Care Non-rated Bonds. A marketing and financial feasibility study was completed which demonstrated that the program presented was marketable and financially sound.

Fellowship Manor achieved a maximum 3 year accreditation by the Joint Commission on Accreditation of Healthcare Organization for Long Term Care and also achieved

accreditation by the same organization for our Dementia Special Care units. We also achieved a favorable survey by both the Pennsylvania Department of Health and the Pennsylvania Department of Public Welfare.

Fellowship manor resident and resident family satisfactory surveys demonstrate that 95% of the resident/residents families rated care rendered at Fellowship Manor as either very good or excellent.

The occupancy rate for each of the facilities from 7/1/00 to 12/30/00 is as follows:

Manor - 97% Home - 87% Courts - 100%

Fellowship Community has conducted its first capital fund drive to purchase 2 busses for the residents of Fellowship Manor, Home and Courts. The drive officially began on 2/10/01. As of 2/22/01, 44% of the \$100,000 has been raised.

John and Katherine Reiss were awarded the Pennsylvania Association of Non-Profit Homes for the Aging 2000 Distinguished Service Award for Volunteers of the year at its Annual Banquet. John and Katherine are members of the Cedar Crest BFC.

The staff and volunteers at Fellowship Community (Manor, Home and Courts) are to be commended for their caring attitude and cooperative spirit. We thank the Lord of providing us with a very dedicated and loyal staff.

In conclusion of the report, the Board of Directors appreciates all the contributions from the churches and individuals. It is with praise and thanksgiving to our God and Savior for His wonderful provision for this ministry.

## Report of the Committee to Examine the Minutes of Particular Churches

The Committee to Examine the Minutes of Particular Churches met on Tuesday, March 20, 2001 at Bethel BFC.

The minutes of Particular Churches were examined on the basis of the suggested format for congregational meetings as stated in the Bylaws of Particular Churches and found in the *Faith & Order*, 403-3 and 403-4.

The Committee communicated with every church reminding the pastor to "send a copy of the minutes of all congregational meetings, which shall include the Board of Elders' Report of the Membership and Annual Financial Report to: Committee on the Examination of Minutes of Particular Churches, c/o Ralph M. Soper, 418 Elm Street, Emmaus, PA, 18049, to arrive no later than March 1, 2001."

The Committee appreciates the use of the checklist that was sent with the letter to the churches. The committee also appreciates those churches that mailed back all of the requested documentation in *exactly* the precise order found on the checklist. We would remind each of the churches *again* this year of the need to verify evidence of audit of the finances and also a record of church members being made aware of the designation of the Pastoral Relations Committee. 25% of the churches failed to report these items. There were no petitions this year from the churches.

- <u>Whereas</u>, the Credentials Committee and the Ministerial Candidate committee verify that ministers are qualified to be members of Annual Conference based on their response to the annual F&O questionnaire, and
- <u>Whereas</u>, there is no similar indication to Annual Conference that elder delegates have affirmed their agreement with the F&O, and
- <u>Whereas</u>, the "Bylaws for Particular Churches" require that, "each elder shall annually declare in writing his agreement with the *Articles of Faith* (401-1.9), and
- Whereas, the annual report of the Board of Elders presented at

the congregational meeting, "shall be the source of the information for the report of the congregation to the Annual Conference" (403-1.4), and

Whereas, the "Committee on Examination of Minutes of Particular Churches shall report the confirmation of delegates and alternate delegates and any discrepancies to the Registrar prior to Annual Conference (506-03), therefore be it

**Resolved,** that we present the following recommendations for amendments to the F&O for the second reading at the 118<sup>th</sup> Annual Conference: (Amendments are in *bold italics*, deletions in brackets)

401-1.9 The Board of Elders in each Particular Church shall determine which men are in agreement with the Articles of Faith and who will endeavor to follow the Principles of Order of the BFC. # Report of the Study Committee: Multiple-Staff Churches

Established by a resolution passed at the 115th Annual Conference, the Committee met during the year in fulfillment of its duties. We have worked in conjunction with the Committee on Credentials, the Ministerial Candidate Committee, and the Ministerial Relations Committee to bring a unified approach in addressing the presence of multiple-staff churches and issues related thereto with regard to the *Faith and Order*.

The Committee recommends:

1. **Resolved**, that the following terms be adopted for inclusion in a glossary to be included in the *Faith and Order*:

**Credentialed** - an official recognition of the rights, privileges and responsibilities of ministry as defined within the F&O. This includes men who are probationers licensed by the Ministerial Candidate Committee and/or men ordained through the BFC as well as those who have their previous ordinations recognized by the BFC.

**Ordained** - a man who has completed the credentialing process of the BFC or has had his prior ordination by a non-BFC church recognized by the BFC.

We recognize that the term *ordained* is often used to designate those who have been ordained through other denominations but are not yet credentialed with the BFC. We respect the authority of other Christian churches to ordain men to serve in the Gospel ministry of their fellowships, and we rejoice that God often moves these men to desire to serve in the BFC. While not wishing to disparage the work of other Christian churches nor diminish the recognition of our brothers, for the sake of clarity, when the term *ordained* is used in the F&O, it is referring to a man who has completed the ordination process of the BFC or had his prior ordination by a non-BFC church recognized by the BFC (Article 502-4).

**Pastor** - those called to the Gospel ministry (see Article 204-1). A pastor is a credentialed man who is a voting member of Annual Conference. This only includes those staff positions called according to the Rules of Pulpit Supply. This is for denominational reference and Particular Churches may use the term pastor in a broader sense.

**Senior Pastor** - the Lead Pastor of a church, called under the rules of the pulpit supply of the BFC. He shall serve as Chairman of the Board of Elders and shall assume other pastoral responsibilities as assigned to him by that Board.

**Pastoral Staff** - men recognized by a Particular Church who have attained credentialed, probationer, or candidate status and who serve in various pastoral functions.

Our Committee recommends that the aforementioned Glossary be placed at the conclusion of Article 409, (Pulpit Supply Procedure). Said Glossary could be delineated 409-4

# Report of the Study Committee on Baptism and Church Membership

This study committee has met six times since the 117th Annual Conference, and has continued its study of the biblical doctrines of the church, the ordinance of believers' baptism, and the proper relationship of the two.

Since the decision by Annual Conference to retain our current positions on the relation of water baptism to church membership (see pp. 31-33 of the Yearbook 2000), the entire committee has turned its attention to matters relating to mode, the infirmed, and those coming to us from other fellowships who have received what they perceived to be believers' baptism by a mode other than immersion. We have spent considerable time reading the works of other men (e.g. the voluminous writings of James W. Dale). We have continued to wrestle with lexical, exegetical, historical, and theological data from many sources.

It is our conviction that we need more time to pursue our studies. We desperately need the prayers and input of our brethren as we continue our labors.

# Report of the Committee to Study Recognition of Previous Ordination

The 117<sup>th</sup> Annual Conference received the following petition from New Life Bible Fellowship Church, Oley, Pennsylvania:

- Whereas, Faith and Order, Article 502-3, provides for the acceptance of "Ministers Received From Other Churches," and
- <u>Whereas</u>, all candidates are now required to follow the procedures of Article 502-1 for "Men Entering the Ministry," whether or not they are already ordained, and
- <u>Whereas</u>, New Life Bible Fellowship Church in Oley found it extremely difficult and time-consuming to locate ordained pastors with extensive experience who were willing to invest considerable time and effort in what is essentially a re-ordination process, without any assurance of acceptance by the local church at completion,
- **Resolved**, that the Chairman of the 117<sup>th</sup> Annual Conference appoint a committee of five to study the process of recognizing pastors with prior ordinations (2000 *Yearbook*, pages 34-35).

The designated committee met four times during the year and makes the recommendations that follow.

- Resolved, that the following be adopted at first reading for inclusion in the *Faith and Order* as §409-1.8:
- 409-1.8 Procedure to expedite the calling of a previously-ordained minister who has not been licensed by the BFC.

On certain exceptional occasions it may be necessary to expedite the procedure for issuing a call to a previouslyordained minister for service in a BF church.

Under the following circumstances, the call of a

previously-ordained minister may follow the expedited procedure:

- (1) When geographical distance allows limited personal contact;
- (2) When the demands of current ministry in another church may not allow for the time required in the normal process;
- (3) When the BFC seeking a pastor applies for special consideration because of urgent circumstances.

The following shall be the expedited procedure:

- (1) The church which is considering the previouslyordained minister shall make request to the chairman of the Ministerial Relations Committee who shall in consultation with the chairman of the Ministerial Candidate Committee approve or deny the request for the expedited process.
- (2) If the request is approved, the Ministerial Candidate Committee shall meet as soon as possible with the minister for an interview. If he is approved as a candidate, he shall be given the Open Book Examination.
- (3) Upon the satisfactory completion of the interview and the Open Book Examination, the church may seek permission from the Ministerial Relations Committee to issue a provisional call. The church shall follow the applicable steps outlined in Section 409.
- (4) Following the issue of a provisional call, the minister shall complete the further exams required by the Ministerial Candidate Committee. A man will not be permitted to begin his new ministry or move into church-provided housing until all the required examinations are satisfactorily completed.
- (5) When all examinations are satisfactorily completed, the Ministerial Candidate Committee will approve the minister as a licensed probationer effective on the date of approval of his final examination. The Ministerial Candidate Committee shall notify the Ministerial Relations Committee who shall recognize the provisional call of the church as the formal call on the effective date assigned by the Ministerial Candidate Committee.

Candidate. A candidate is a man whose application is accepted and who remains under the guidance of this committee. Men move to this group when they near the completion of their educational preparation for the ministry.

Probationer. A probationer is a man who has been approved by this committee, has passed examinations on the F&O, and is working in the BFC (a Particular Church or agency) or other ministry approved by the Ministerial Candidate Committee in consultation with the Credentials Committee. Such other ministry does not include service on the pastoral staff of a church other than a BFC. Men who meet all stated requirements for probationers are eligible to be licensed as probationers by the Ministerial Candidate Committee.

#### 502-2. Probationary Service

502-2.1 Full-time Probationary Service in a Particular Church Or Mission. Normally a probationer serves in a full-time capacity. After a probationer has served at least two years, he may be recommended to the Credentials Committee for ordination examination. The minimum period of probationary service may be extended; having served as a probationer does not guarantee ordination.

502-2.2 Part-time Probationary Service in a Particular Church Or Mission.

A man serving his probationary period on a part-time basis may do so with the following requirements:

(1) He shall serve the equivalent of at least two years full-time service as

Such other ministry does not include service on the pastoral staff of a church other than a BFC.

After a probationer has served at least two years, or one year if previously ordained, he may be recommended to the Credentials Committee for ordination examination or recognition of previous ordination. # Report of the Study Committee on The Role of Women in the Church

#### Introduction

The role of women in the church is rich and varied. As Eve was God's gift to Adam, so is each woman to the local church. Each believing man or woman is part of "a chosen people, a royal priesthood, a holy nation, a people belonging to God" (1 Pet 2:9). Believers – both men and women – have "put on Christ" (Gal 3:27) in order to reflect His glory, to make His name famous, and to be His ambassadors as we reach out to others and implore them to be reconciled to God (2 Cor 5:20).

We as men and women have been given gifts that enable us to represent Christ to others. To each, the indwelling Spirit has been given, and He manifests Himself through these gifts. We are all commanded to use our gifts, since the Holy Spirit has given them for the good of all. All of us have been called to love, witness, pray, teach, exhort, help, share and otherwise do the work which God has entrusted to us. Some have been given the message of wisdom, others the message of knowledge, still others faith, gifts of healing, prophecy, discernment, and so forth. "All of these are the work of one and the same Spirit, and he gives them to each one, just as he determines" (2 Cor 12:11). Though the list Paul gives here is not exhaustive, the message is the same, whatever the gift. Each of us is called to be an active part of the body of believers.

In studying the role of women in the church, this committee is seeking to affirm the clear teaching of Scripture. As a previous study committee in 1977 noted, "Although the Scriptures teach that there is creative equality and dignity of man and woman in terms of having been created in the image of God, it is also clear from the Scripture that there is a divinely ordained order in terms of authority and function." We believe this is a fair representation of the Biblical teaching. In this paper we seek to address these issues and unpack their implications in the following pages.

#### Galatians 3:26-29 and the Nature of Sexual Distinctions

One passage in the New Testament has often been used to argue that, although God gave a certain authority structure in Old Testament times, He has replaced it with another since the coming of Christ.

26. You are all sons of God through faith in Christ Jesus, 27. for all of you who were baptized into Christ have clothed yourselves with Christ. 28. There is neither Jew nor Greek, slave nor free, male nor female, for you are all one in Christ Jesus. 29. If you belong to Christ, then you are Abraham's seed, and heirs according to the promise.

In recent years, this passage has often been used to tell us that Christ has done away with the distinction between male and female that existed under the old covenant, and that women are therefore now free to fill any office in the church. Is this the proper understanding of Paul's teaching here?

The passage, taken in its context, *does* indicate that some sort of change has taken place with Jesus' coming, but what sort of change? The three-paired distinctions – Jew/Greek, slave/free, male/female – seem to have been chosen so that each pair covers all of humanity. Taking Greek to mean "non-Jew" (as often in the New Testament), everyone is either Jew or non-Jew. In a society where slavery was common, all were either slave or free. And of course, each of us is either male or female. It thus appears that Jesus has done something that affects all sorts of people.

But what has He done? Has He abolished certain authority relations? This is not the subject Paul is discussing. He begins this passage with the statement, "You are all sons of God through faith in Christ Jesus." Apparently God has made all sorts of people – Jew or Gentile, slave or free, male or female – into "sons of God" if only they are trusting in Christ. What does that mean? And why does Paul say "sons" of God rather than "sons and daughters" of God?

Paul ends this passage by saying that, if we belong to Christ, we are heirs. In the preceding verses (Gal 3:23-25), Paul says that before faith came, we were held prisoners by the law, that the law was our pedagogue to lead us to Christ – the pedagogue being a slave who made sure the child got to his lessons and stayed

out of trouble. In the following verses (4:1-5), believers under the old covenant are again seen as children – heirs, but under age – subject to guardians. With the coming of Christ, these children "come of age" and receive the full rights of adult sons, including the inheritance.

It appears that Paul's point in this passage relates to inheritance. Under the old covenant, only Jews shared in the inheritance; Gentiles were outside (Ex 12:43; Deut 23:1-8). Slaves would typically inherit only if there were no children (Gen 15:2-3; 21:10), and Jewish people who got into debt might lose their inheritance as well as their freedom (Lev 25:25-29; 39-43). Daughters would inherit only if there were no sons (Num 27:1-11; 36:1-12). Thus typically only Jews, and they non-slave and male, would inherit the land into which God had brought His people. But under the new covenant, all believers – whether Jew or Greek, slave or free, male or female – are considered "sons" and thus have the same status as full heirs in the inheritance God will give. The passage is thus not speaking about office in the church, but about our heavenly inheritance – eternal life – pictured under the figure of Israel's earthly inheritance.

But might this inheritance *include* office in the church, so that women – like those Gentiles and slaves who were men – are now allowed to hold any office in the church? Well, it would be a mistake to take the passage as claiming that there is no longer any difference between these three pairs of groups. Clearly biological differences continue between men and women. And Paul and other New Testament authors will on occasion address one of these groups as distinguished from the other – males as distinct from females, Jews rather than Gentiles, and slaves in particular rather than those who are free. The question of authority in the church is just such a matter which several passages in the New Testament seem to address, so it is these passages which we must eventually consider.

Some Practical Applications. Women are co-heirs with men in the promises of God. This passage relates to inheritance rather than to church office. Women are "fellow workers." – Unless otherwise specifically restricted in Scripture, women should be encouraged to share in all the work of the ministry.

#### Women and Authority

In Genesis one, at creation, God made mankind, both male and female, both in His image, and both to have authority (1:26-28). Yet, the following chapter is a closeup of the former, and it gives us further details. It shows us that God did not make man and woman simultaneously, but made Adam first and charged him with certain responsibilities, later making Eve to be a suitable helper for him. The term "helper" used here need not indicate a subordinate authority position, as God is sometimes spoken of as our helper (e.g., Ex 19:4, Deut 33:29). Likewise, the order of creation need not indicate subordinate authority, as though Adam is superior in authority merely because he was created first; after all, mankind is made after the plants and the animals. But the fact that Adam names his wife (Gen 2:23, 3:20), just as he had named the animals (2:19-20), and that naming is a regular prerogative of authority, points us to an authority relation between them. So does the fact that God commissioned Adam rather than Eve (2:15-17), and did so before Eve was created (2:22)...

In the family, the universal testimony of Scripture is that the husband is the head of the wife, but that mothers and fathers share parental authority over the children. These authority relations, like all others, have been distorted by the fall, so that in each authority relationship one in an upper position may sometimes abuse authority by oppression, and one in a lower position may likewise subvert authority by rebellion. This is a prominent and appropriate feature of the curse that we humans have earned for ourselves by rebelling against God.

Throughout the pages of Old Testament salvation history, authority outside the home is mainly in the hands of men. Only men are priests. The only queen regent in Israel is an usurper. There is only one female judge. There are just a few female prophets. The exceptions are of interest, though we will not follow them up here. They certainly show that God does not put the question of male and female authority on the level of the weightiest matters of the law. These passages suggest it is sometimes better for women to lead if men will not.

Coming into the New Testament, there are some changes for women, but not to the point of canceling the distinction among the sexes with regard to authority. Jesus has a number of female

disciples, but none among the twelve apostles. The apostles have the right to take their wives around with them in their traveling ministries, but we don't have any indication what the wives were doing. Phillip has four unmarried daughters who prophesy, but we don't know who their audience is. Priscilla is mentioned (with her husband Aquila) as teaching Apollos, but this is a private situation. Since this goes no further than Deborah's instructions to Barak in the book of Judges, it indicates no advancement in the authority of women in the New Testament.. Besides the women disciples who accompanied Jesus on some of His journeys, we have the example of Paul's associates. He mentions Priscilla (Rom 16:3), Phoebe (16:1), Mary (16:6), Tryphena and Tryphosa (16:12), all of whom are clearly Christian workers of some sort. We will return to Phoebe when we discuss the question of deacons.

*Practical Applications*. Women are fellow workers with men in the body of Christ, yet they do not appear to exercise an equal role in leadership.

There are three passages in particular that need to be examined in connection with authority. These are Eph 5:21-33 on authority in the home; 1 Cor 11:2-16 on authority in the church; and 1 Tim 2:8-15 on women exercising authority and teaching.

## Ephesians 5:21-33 and Authority in the Marriage Relation

This passage occurs in the application section of Paul's letter to the Ephesians. Chapters 1-3 have detailed the theology of our new relationship with God. Chapters 4-6 build upon this foundation a set of practical life-centered applications. Chapter 4 addresses our walk with Christ and our relation to fellow Christians in unity, use of gifts and maturity, contrasting our old lifestyle before Christ with our new lifestyle in Him. The key to living this new life, and the power to do so, come from the Holy Spirit, and our continual yielding to His authority in our lives (5:18). A life so controlled by the Spirit will show itself outwardly in spiritual speech, thanksgiving to God and submission to one another in the body of Christ (5:19-21).

21. Submit to one another out of reverence for Christ. 22. Wives, submit to your husbands as to the Lord. 23. For the

husband is the head of the wife as Christ is the head of the church, his body, of which he is the Savior. 24. Now as the church submits to Christ, so also wives should submit to their husbands in everything. 25. Husbands, love your wives, just as Christ loved the church and gave himself up for her 26. to make her holy, cleansing her by the washing with water through the word, 27, and to present her to himself as a radiant church, without stain or wrinkle or any other blemish, but holy and blameless. 28. In this same way, husbands ought to love their wives as their own bodies. He who loves his wife loves himself. 29 After all. no one ever hated his own body, but he feeds and cares for it, just as Christ does the church. 30, for we are members of his body. 31. For this reason a man will leave his father and mother and be united to his wife, and the two will become one flesh. 32. This is a profound mystery – but I am talking about Christ and the church. 33. However, each one of you also must love his wife as he loves himself, and the wife must respect her husband.

This command to "submit to one another" (5:21) seems to function as a heading introducing what follows. It is not an egalitarian command that everybody should submit to everybody else – husbands to wives, parents to children, and masters to slaves! Rather, we are instructed in proper submission and exercise of authority. This is worked out for us in three common examples – wives and husbands (5:22-33); children and parents (6:1-4); slaves and masters (6:5-9). Each begins with an injunction to the parties under authority to subject themselves to that authority. Each continues with commands to prevent the one in authority from abusing the position.

The wife is to "submit" to her husband (22) – to subordinate herself to one who is worthy of respect (by his position, even if he is not doing a good job; compare 1 Pet 2:18 for the duty of slaves to masters who are harsh rather than considerate). Her motivation is "as to the Lord"; her submission pictures that of the believer to Christ, and is counted by Christ as submission to Himself. The extent of the command is "in everything," though this must be qualified (as in all human authority relations) by the

principle that we must obey God rather than man (Acts 4:19; 5:29).

The husband must love his wife as Christ loved the church (25). How is that? He gave his very life for her, that she might be holy (26-27). The purpose of the husband's leadership of sacrificial love is apparently parallel to this, to aid in his wife's sanctification. Paul does not spell out for us how this will work when the wife is more mature than her husband, but there are certainly plenty of examples even in secular society where a less-talented person can aid in the success of one who is more-talented. The marriage relation is a good opportunity for the husband to put into practice the command to love his neighbor as himself (28-29). Finally, the marriage relationship is a "profound mystery" (32), an acted parable of the relationship between Christ and the church.

Practical Applications. Men and women as fellow-heirs should conduct themselves toward one another as befits this relationship. Married couples are to depict in their marriage the relationship between Christ and His church. Husbands need to be thinking how Christ would act in each situation, and wives how they would behave if Christ were their husband.

## 1 Corinthians 11:2-16 and Headship in the Church

This passage is a section on propriety in worship. From the beginning of chapter 7 through the end of chapter 15, the letter is apparently responding to a series of questions which the church at Corinth had directed to Paul. Unfortunately we have only Paul's side of the exchange, so we are rather in the position of listening to one-half of a telephone conversation! Chapters 8 through 10 start out with the matter of stronger Christians eating food sacrificed to idols which is sold in the market place (This is permitted with some cautions urging respect for the scruples of the weaker brethren). This section ends with Paul's rebuke of those who would presume to take part in pagan feasts in the idol temples. Paul ends with a recap, and with exhortations to do all for God's glory, to avoid being a stumbling block, and to follow his own example.

This passage involves the matter of head-covering in worship, and apparently relates to its symbolic significance in that culture. Paul speaks of the teachings or traditions which he has passed on to them (11:2), and of his practice and that of the other

churches (11:16). From the placement of these remarks, Paul's teachings here may be partly cultural, yet his argumentation seems to be more deeply founded than that.

2. I praise you for remembering me in everything and for holding to the teachings, just as I passed them on to you. 3. Now I want you to realize that the head of every man is Christ, and the head of the woman is man, and the head of Christ is God. 4. Every man who prays or prophesies with his head covered dishonors his head. 5 And every woman who prays or prophesies with her head uncovered dishonors her head - it is just as though her head were shaved. 6. If a woman does not cover her head, she should have her hair cut off; and if it is a disgrace for a woman to have her hair cut or shaved off, she should cover her head. 7. A man ought not to cover his head, since he is the image and glory of God; but the woman is the glory of man. 8. For man did not come from woman, but woman from man: 9. neither was man created for woman, but woman for man. 10. For this reason, and because of the angels, the woman ought to have a sign of authority on her head. 11. In the Lord, however, woman is not independent of man, nor is man independent of woman. 12. For as woman came from man, so also man is born of woman. But everything comes from God. 13. Judge for yourselves: Is it proper for a woman to pray to God with her head uncovered? 14. Does not the very nature of things teach you that if a man has long hair, it is a disgrace to him, 15. but that if a woman has long hair, it is her glory? For long hair is given to her as a covering. 16. If anyone wants to be contentious about this, we have no other practice – nor do the churches of God.

Paul says (4-5) that men who pray or prophesy with head *covered* dishonor their head, but women who pray or prophesy with head *uncovered* dishonor their head. This is somewhat puzzling, as Jewish men in Paul's day (and even today) pray with head covered. Apparently some distinction has already by Paul's time developed between Jewish and Christian worship.

Paul introduces all this with a series of headship relations (3) – God is the head of Christ; Christ is the head of man; man is

the head of woman. As Wayne Grudem has effectively shown, the claim that "head" never means headship or authority in ancient Greek usage is contradicted by the linguistic evidence.<sup>3</sup> Paul is apparently making some point on authority relationships and how they are depicted in the culture.

God the Father is in authority over Christ, as we can see from all Jesus' statements in John about His obedience to the Father. Christ is in authority over every man at His second coming, as He is the Son of Man who will receive the eternal, universal kingdom over mankind. Meanwhile He is in authority over all believing men. The man is in authority over the woman. "Man" is probably here to be translated "husband," though possibly the woman's father is to be included. Scripture nowhere pictures all men as in authority over all women.

This authority need not imply any inferiority in essence, person, or the like. Just as Christ is not intrinsically inferior to the Father, but has voluntarily placed Himself under Him (Php 2:5-8), so women are not intrinsically inferior to men, but have been placed under them by God (Eph 5:22-24).

As Thomas Schreiner notes, a woman who failed to wear a head-covering in public in the first century sent a signal that she was not under the authority of a husband or father, and this was often the practice of prostitutes. By extension, he suggests that for a woman to do this while praying or prophesying in a worship service would be to send a signal that she was rejecting the authority of the church's male leadership.<sup>4</sup> The reference to shaved head (5-6) apparently refers to a punishment (or practice) of prostitutes in the first century, which it would be a shame for respectable women to imitate.

Verse 7 is puzzling. "A man ought not to cover his head, since he is the image and glory of God; but the woman is the glory of man." Since Gen 1:27 explicitly tells us that both man and woman are made in the image of God, Paul must have something else in mind here. It seems that he is looking at the marriage relationship in particular as a picture of the relationship between God and man (see Eph 5:32). In that relationship, the husband images God and the wife images (believing) man(kind). So for the man to have his head covered while praying would be to picture the submission of God, whereas for the woman to have her head

uncovered would be to picture the rebellion of mankind.

Verses 8 and 9 expand on this, noting that man was not originally created *from* woman, but woman was created *from* the man; that man was not created *for* woman but woman was created *for* man. For these reasons, says Paul (v 10), the woman ought to have a sign of authority on her head. Apparently the head-covering reflects the creational order and purpose of man and woman, and may be intended to reflect the order and purpose of God and mankind, as suggested in our comment on verse 7, above.

The phrase "because of the angels" in verse 10 is also puzzling. It may relate to the cryptic events of Genesis 6, or may reflect the concept of angels being present with Christians when they worship, who would be offended by acts of rebellion.

The remainder of the passage reminds us: (1) that God has made man and woman inter-dependent since creation, and all dependent on Him (11-12); (2) that God has naturally given woman a head-covering in her hair, that He has not given to man (13-15); and (3) that head-covering for women in worship services is the practice of the church (16).

There is a functional difference between the sexes in the human race that reflects the voluntary functional differences within the Godhead between Father and Son. This difference refers primarily to an authority structure. This functional authority structure is to be reflected in the customs and practices of the people of God. It in no way indicates superiority or inferiority of essence, personhood, or worth in the Body of Christ. There are specific functions (prophecy and prayer are here mentioned) which women may assume in the worship of the local church, provided that they conduct themselves therein with a decorum that reflects this authority structure.

*Practical Applications.* Since the worship service is under the spiritual authority of the pastor and elders, there are no specific prohibitions for the participation of women in leading corporate or choral singing.

## 1 Timothy 2:8-15, Teaching and Exercising Authority

Paul, in writing to his spiritual son Timothy, provides him with instructions on "how people ought to conduct themselves" in the church (3:15). In chapter one, he warns about false teaching, especially in regard to misuse of the law, and tells how God had rescued Paul himself from this. He provides instruction on proper worship in chapter two, on qualifications for elders and deacons in chapter three, how Timothy should conduct himself as a leader in chapter four, the enrollment of widows and treatment of elders in chapter five, proper attitudes that slaves should have and how we should view money in chapter six, before closing the letter with a personal charge to Timothy. Paul's instruction on proper worship in chapter two includes:

8. I want men everywhere to lift up holy hands in prayer, without anger or disputing. 9. I also want women to dress modestly, with decency and propriety, not with braided hair or gold or pearls or expensive clothes, 10. but with good deeds, appropriate for women who profess to worship God. 11. A woman should learn in quietness and full submission. 12. I do not permit a woman to teach or to have authority over a man; she must be silent. 13. For Adam was formed first, then Eve. 14. And Adam was not the one deceived; it was the woman who was deceived and became a sinner. 15. But women will be saved through childbearing – if they continue in faith, love and holiness with propriety.

In chapter two, Paul urges that, in our praying, we ought to include prayer for government authorities and remember that God wants all sorts of people to be saved. He then mentions the prayer of men in particular (v 8), perhaps because they are especially prone to anger and disputing even in prayer. The behavior of women should be modest, decent and proper, with their adornment coming from their good deeds rather than their dress or jewelry (9-10).

Paul continues (11-12) by instructing Timothy that women should learn in quietness and full submission, indicating that he does "not permit a woman to teach or to have authority over a man." This passage has been the center of considerable controversy, but several points should be made here.

"I do not permit" is not to be understood merely as Paul's advice or preference. Much of the letter is constructed this way: "I urged" (1:3), "I give you this instruction" (1:18), "I urge" (2:1), "I want" (2:8), "I do not permit" (2:12), "I am writing these instructions" (3:14). These and Paul's use of imperatives are his way of exercising his apostolic authority in this letter to his associate Timothy, who has himself some considerable authority over the functioning of the church at Ephesus (1:3; 3:14-15), one of the largest cities in the Roman empire.

The remark about not permitting a woman to teach is not to be taken absolutely, but as qualified by the object "a man," which it shares with the following verb. Elsewhere, older women are clearly instructed to teach younger women (Titus 2:3-5), and mothers to teach children (Prov 1:8; 31:1; 2 Tim 1:5; 3:15). There will be differences of opinion among Christians about when a boy becomes a man, and this will probably vary from culture to culture.

"I do not permit a woman ... to have authority over a man" (12). Again, this does not apply to male children. The word translated "authority" here (authentein) is a rare one, occurring nowhere else in the New Testament and only rarely in the surviving Greek literature outside Scripture. Its meaning has been a focus of the debate on women and authority. Some give it the emphasis "to control in a domineering manner" and deny that this passage restricts women from having authority over men. Yet the word can clearly have a more neutral meaning than "domineer," so that various lexicons also mention "have authority over," "have full power over," "act on one's own authority" and such. Given that the word is used in tandem with the neutral verb "to teach" in our context, there is no reason to think that it should be limited to the negative idea of "domineer" here. Particularly when the Scripture teaches that Christian leaders are not to domineer over their followers, but they are certainly to teach. The whole point of Paul's context here is some contrast between men and women, as the following verses indicate. The command should obviously not be understood to prohibit such activity as Priscilla and Aquila teaching Apollos in private, nor wives their husbands. Only a fool refuses to consider advice from others (Prov 12:15; 13:10; 15:22; 19:20), and that surely includes husbands getting advice from wives (e.g., Abigail and Nabal, 1 Sam 25).

Paul's reasons are given in verses 13-14. "Adam was formed first, then Eve" is probably not intended to argue that the order of creation by itself proves Paul's point. As we noted above, Paul may have the whole context of the creation account in mind. Adam is created and God commissions him with his responsibilities before He makes Eve, and she is made to assist him in this work. Even the references to God as our helper may be understood to refer to God's work assisting us in jobs where He has given the decision-making to us.

Eve was deceived and Adam was not (14). Paul is here picking up on Eve's remark in Gen 3:13, "The serpent deceived me, and I ate." This hardly alleviates Adam's guilt over against Eve's! It may, however, indicate that Eve usurped an authority that was not given to her. Notice God's remark to Adam (Gen 3:17): "Because you *listened* to your wife..." which in Hebrew parlance probably means "because you obeyed her." Perhaps there is some hint here that women are wired to be more trusting than men are, and this can be dangerous for leaders in a fallen world. Paul doesn't tell us.

"But women will be saved through childbearing – if they continue in faith, love and holiness with propriety" (16). This verse is another puzzler, but does not appear to have any bearing on the basic teaching of this passage. The following suggestion could be made: Throughout most of human history, the main life-threatening hazard for women has been giving birth. Every time a woman becomes pregnant, there is the possibility she might die in childbirth. As a result, she may want to resist her husband's authority over her in the matter of sexual intimacy. But Paul says she does not have to worry about this. Because she is really a Christian, she will be safe. Either God will protect her through the childbirth, or God will take her home to be with Him, which is far better.

The differences between men and women extend into the areas of teaching and authority. Women may teach and have authority over children and over other women. They are not to have this authority over adult men. The exact boundaries of this restriction are not spelled out. When does a boy become a man? Does the prohibition extend to team-teaching a mixed Sunday School class? Serving on a committee? Clearly a wife can minister

salvation to her unsaved husband (1 Pet 3:1-2, but notice the suggested tactics), and so presumably to a male boss or coworker. And the biblical criteria for anyone teaching or exercising authority are different from worldly standards. There is to be no lording it over another. Even the apostles were to be tested to see whether their teaching accords with the Scripture.

Practical Applications. Women may teach and have authority over children and other women, but not over adult men. Recognizing that the issue of when a boy becomes a man may be affected by both culture and tradition, this determination should be reserved for the local church.

#### Women as Deacons

If women are not to teach or exercise authority over adult men, then they are not to be elders, since teaching and ruling are the essence of that office (e.g., 1 Tim 5:17). But is the same true for the office of deacon? This will depend on how the office of deacon actually functions in a given local church. In many churches today, deacons exercise the sort of authority the New Testament assigns to elders. But our question is, what is the biblical role of deacons, and is it the sort of office that women may not fill according to 1 Timothy 2?

There are two passages in particular that suggest that women may serve as deacons, though there are none that definitely command this. Consider first of all Rom 16:1-2, where Paul says, "I commend to you our sister Phoebe, a *servant* of the church in Cenchrea. I ask you to receive her in the Lord in a way worthy of the saints and to give her any help she may need from you, for she has been a great help to many people, including me."

The word which the NIV translates "servant" is diakonos, the standard NT word for "deacon." Yet this word is not limited to the NT office of deacon; it is rather a generic word for servant. The word occurs some eight times in the Gospels and is translated "servant" or (once) "attendant." In Paul's letters, it occurs nineteen or twenty times, mostly translated "servant" or "minister." It is definitely "deacon" in Paul's greeting to the Philippian church (Php 1:1) and in its two occurrences in the qualifications for deacon that Paul gives in 1 Tim 3:8, 12. Given the predominance of the

translation "servant" in the NT, it is not surprising that the NIV only put the alternative "deacon" in a footnote at Rom 16:1. But if the early church had women deacons, it is certainly possible that Phoebe was one such, and that Paul is referring to her office here. Two other occurrences of the term in Paul's writings may refer to deacons, though the NIV has not so translated them, references to Tychicus in Eph 6:21 and Col 4:7.

The second passage which may point to women deacons involves a peculiar phenomenon which we see in Paul's list of qualifications for deacon in 1 Tim 3:8-12:

8. Deacons, likewise, are to be men worthy of respect, sincere, not indulging in much wine, and not pursuing dishonest gain. 9. They must keep hold of the deep truths of the faith with a clear conscience. 10. they must first be tested; and then if there is nothing against them, let them serve as deacons. 11. In the same way, their wives are to be women worthy of respect, not malicious talkers but temperate and trustworthy in everything. 12. A deacon must be the husband of but one wife and must manage his children and his household well. 13. Those who have served well gain an excellent standing and great assurance in their faith in Christ Jesus.

In verse 12 the deacons are clearly men. But verse 11 seems to allow for women in the office, too. Though the passage has traditionally been translated as though referring to the deacons' wives, it may perfectly well be translated "in the same way, women [deacons] are to be worthy of respect," since the Greek word gune is used both as the generic word for woman and the specific word for wife. The peculiar feature here is that there is no parallel passage in Paul's list of qualifications for elders which he has just given in verses 1-7. From what we know about the responsibilities of elders and deacons in the NT, it would seem even more important that elders' wives have certain qualifications than it would that deacons' wives have them. But if this is a reference to women deacons, the lack of such a passage in the elder section is understandable, given Paul's remarks in 1 Tim 2:12. It is thus not unreasonable to suggest that Paul's early churches had women deacons as well as men

That there were women deacons in the early church seems undeniable from extra-biblical sources. See the articles entitled "Deaconess" in the Oxford Dictionary of the Christian Church and the New International Dictionary of the Christian Church (see Appendix). The earliest such reference goes back to about AD 110, when the Roman governor Pliny the Younger is conducting trials of Christians in Bithynia. He has two women called deaconesses tortured to find out what is really behind the Christian movement, but finds no spectacular crimes such as opponents charged.

But is the office of deacon a position of authority? The fact that there were early churches having women deacons is no guarantee the practice is biblical, since many early churches were known to have been engaged in questionable activities. Paul's first letter to the Corinthians deals with a number of such problems.

What constitutes the office of deacon?

The NT does not give us much information on this subject. The passage in 1 Timothy 3 deals with qualifications but not with duties. Traditionally, the account in Acts 6, where the apostles appoint seven men to oversee the distribution of food to widows, has been seen as the origin of the office of deacon, though the word diakonos does not occur there. Two words from the same wordgroup do appear, however. The apostles' reference to "waiting on tables" (6:2) uses the related verb diakoneo, and the phrase "distribution of food" (6:1) is the noun diakonia. Thus the earliest evidence for deaconal work is a sort of benevolence ministry of providing food to destitute widows. Oversight of church property shows up in later centuries, when the churches had some property to be cared for.

In fact, the basic terms for church offices in the early church were not invented words, but were borrowed and specialized from existing terms. Thus "deacon" is our English transliteration of the Greek word *diakonos*, a generalized word for servant which was distinguished from *doulos*, a slave. *Diakonos* sometimes was used to refer to a table waiter, as in the verb in Acts 6:2 and probably in the noun in Matt 22:13, where the king orders his "attendants" to bind the improperly-dressed wedding guest and throw him outside. In general, the word is used for a personal servant, and in the NT letters, for servants of Christ. The word "deacon," then, is not an authority word, but a service word.

By contrast, the terms for the office of elder imply authority. Our English term "elder" itself is a translation of the Greek word *presbuteros*, from which we get "presbytery," board of elders. It refers to a more mature person and was used for synagogue officers and for one class of leaders in both Jewish and Gentile government. The Latin term was *senator*. The other NT term which appears to refer to elders is *episkopos*, which is sometimes transliterated "bishop" or translated "overseer." It explicitly refers to the authority of the office of elder, to have the oversight of the local congregation of believers.

Thus from both the name given to the office and its responsibilities (as best we can make them out), it does not appear that the office of deacon was intended to be one of exercising authority over others or teaching them. It would appear, then, that there is no biblical objection to women functioning as deacons, so long as elder-like responsibilities are not given to this office.

Practical Applications. Churches in which the leadership is satisfied the Bible permits women deacons should consider instituting such if they don't have them already. The job description should be adapted, if necessary, to avoid conflict with 1 Tim 2:12. Some such churches may wish to appoint wives of deacons to these positions. Such woman deacons could well handle various matters which would be more problematic for men, such as helping widows, or counseling women.

#### **Appendix**

Article "Deaconess" in *The New International Dictionary of the Christian Church* (1974):

DEACONESS. In the early church, a woman involved in the pastoral ministry of the church. Exactly what her function or official status may have been is a matter of dispute. Paul mentions Phoebe, "deaconess" (ousan diakonon) of the church at Cenchrea (Rom 16:1) and there is also an ambiguous reference in 1 Timothy 3:11. The "widows" mentioned in 1 Timothy 5:3-10 may also be connected with the role. Not until the end of the fourth century is much known about the office of deaconess (Gr. diakonissa). The "Didascalia" and the "Apostolic Constitutions" describe their functions as assistants to the clergy in the baptizing of women, ministers to the poor and sick among women, instructors of women catechumens, and in general intermediaries between the clergy and women of the congregation. Fears of the usurping of priestly functions and other considerations led to the extinction of the office in the church at large by the eleventh century.

The modern deaconess movement began clearly in 1836 when the Lutheran pastor T. Fliedner founded a Protestant community at Kaiserwerth, near Dusseldorf, devoted chiefly to nursing. The movement spread rapidly through the Protestant world. In the second half of the nineteenth century, deaconesses were established in the Church of England, the Methodist Church, and the Church of Scotland. They act as pastoral assistants to the minister.

Article "Deaconess" in *The Oxford Dictionary of the Christian Church*, 3<sup>rd</sup> ed. (1997):

deaconess. A woman officially charged with certain functions in the Church. The practice of a woman fulfilling the office of deacon goes back to the Apostolic age. St Paul's mention of Phoebe 'deaconess (ou=san dia,konon) of the Church that is at Cenchrea' (Rom 16:1) as well as 1 Tim 3:11 are usually held to refer to a special office; and Pliny, in his letter to Trajan, speaks of two 'ancillae quare ministrae dicebantur.' However, the term

diako,nissa (Lat. *Diaconissa*) did not come into use until the 4<sup>th</sup> cent. Earlier documents use 'diocona,' 'vidua,' or 'virgo canonica,' and the distinction between widows and deaconesses is rather obscure.

The office, which developed greatly in the 3<sup>rd</sup> and 4<sup>th</sup> cents.. is described in the 'Didascalia' and the 'Apostolic Constitutions.' The age of entry, fixed at 50 by the 'Didascalia,' was reduced to 40 by the Council of Chalcedon. The deaconess devoted herself to the care of the sick and the poor of her sex; she was present at interviews of women with bishops, priests, or deacons; instructed women catechumens, and kept order in the women's part of the church. Her most important function was the assistance at the baptism of women, at which, for reasons of propriety, many of the ceremonies could not be performed by the deacons. therefore, adult baptisms became rare, the office of deaconess declined in importance. This process was helped by abuses which had crept in, when deaconesses undertook ministerial functions, e.g., in the Oriental Orthodox Churches and the Church of the East, where they administered Holy Communion to women. Councils of Epaon (517) and of Orleans (533) abrogated the office, but it is found in other places till the 11<sup>th</sup> cent. In the E., where the prerogatives of deaconesses were much more marked, including the investiture with the stole and the distribution of the chalice, the process was somewhat slower. The reception of stole and maniple by the Carthusian nuns at the profession would seem to be a survival of the ancient office.

## **Proposed Legislative Changes**

#### 204-3. Deacons

**204-3.1** The office of deacon is presented in the Scriptures as an office not of ruling, but of service. A deacon should be a **person** (replaces man) of deep spiritual life, exemplary conduct, and sound judgment (1 Tim. 3; Acts 6:1-8). **This** (replaces His) office is one of sympathetic service to the church and to the distressed, friendless, or sick, after the example of our Lord Jesus Christ.

#### 401-2. The Board of Deacons

**401-2.1** The Board of Deacons shall be composed of all deacons duly elected by and from the congregation who meet the qualifications of the Scriptures. They shall be mature **believers** (replaces men) who demonstrate a spiritual wisdom and compassion so that they might serve the needy in a Christlike, merciful way.

**401-2.5** Election and Installation of Deacons. Each congregation may elect deacons in keeping with the qualifications set forth in Scripture. Deacons must be (delete male) members in full communion in the church in which they are to exercise their office.

The term of office shall be determined by the Particular Church by congregational vote, but shall not be less than three years, except when a Particular Church desires a probationary term of service for newly-chosen deacons. When possible the Board of Deacons shall be divided into not fewer than three classes as determined by congregational vote in each of the Particular Churches.

In the event of a vacancy by death, resignation, or removal, a **member** (replaces man) may be elected to fill the unexpired term of office....

Questions to the congregation - end of 401-2.5

- (1) Do you, the members of this church, acknowledge and receive this brother (or sister) as a deacon?
- (2) Do you promise to give him (or her) all the honor, encouragement, and support in the Lord to which this

(replaces his) office entitles him (or her)?

After the members of the church have answered these questions in the affirmative by holding up their right hands, the minister shall proceed to set apart the candidate by prayer to the office of deacon and shall give to him (or her) and to the congregation an exhortation suited to the occasion.

#### 702-2 Suggested Bylaws for Sunday Bible Schools

#### 702-2.3 Duties of teachers

Add

(6) Women may teach and have authority over children and other women (Titus 2:3-5), but not over adult men (1 Tim 2:12). Recognizing that the issue of when a boy becomes a man may be affected by both culture and tradition, this determination should be reserved for the Particular Church.

# Report of the Inter-Cultural Ministries Study Committee

The Inter-Cultural Ministries Study Committee continued its work on completing The Biblical Principles For Living. This year we present several Biblical Principles For Living for your consideration. The following Biblical Principles For Living are being presented for First Reading: #109-Repentance And Restitution, #112-Divorce, and #114-Stewardship. The Biblical Principles For Living presented for First Reading have been edited, reviewed, approved by the Committee, and are presented to the Annual Conference for approval and inclusion in the *Faith & Order*.

The Committee reviewed the present Articles on Dedication of Children, Abortion, Harmful Indulgences, Homosexuality, and Secret Oath-Bound Societies. A number of corrections were made and we are presenting a recommendation with regard to the Article on Secret Oath-Bound Societies. These Articles are being retained and placed into a section of The Biblical Principles For Living titled, Declarations On Particular Issues - 130-1 to 130-5. In our investigation of the statement on Tobacco, the Committee found inconsistencies regarding its restriction to teaching, and this restriction not applying to the use of drugs and other substances.

In the course of our committee meeting with the Committee to Study Divorce as it relates to Eldership, questions were raised as to whether or not 1 Cor. 7 has been studied adequately as it relates to desertion as an additional ground for divorce. This question has come to us on various occasions by members of Annual Conference.

Since this committee is doing its work without changing positions previously established by the Annual Conference, we do not propose changes, but call to the attention of the Annual Conference the concerns expressed on the issues of divorce, secret oath-bound societies and consistency of our position on the use of tobacco and drugs by teachers and leaders.

Several members of Annual Conference gave the Committee their suggestions and insights with regard to The

Biblical Principles For Living. We thank these men for their suggestions and have considered the suggestions and in some cases made corrections or additions to the particular Biblical Principles For Living.

## Joint Committee On Ethnic Church Planting

The Report of The Joint Committee On Ethnic Church Planting has been, in the past, included with the Report of the Inter-Cultural Committee. The Joint Committee has been considering a number of ethnic groups, in order to pursue the possibilities of ethnic church planting in the BFC. The Joint Committee only met once this past year and considered the planting of a church in a predominantly Hispanic community in downtown Lancaster. [Note: The *Articles Of Faith* have been produced in Spanish and if you have any Spanish people in your church, these would be helpful for them. You may acquire a copy by contacting the Office Of Church Extension or The Board Of Publication and Printing]

The Joint Committee decided that it should concentrate on planting an Hispanic Church in Lancaster and will be working at the Project in this new year. We will be seeking the advice of Elliot Ramos and the support of the Capitol Region Churches, who have shown interest in the Project. Please pray for this Hispanic Church Planting Project in Lancaster. The Joint Committee is made up of David Gundrum, Dana Weller, Dr. Donald Faust and John Elias.

We remain concerned for other ethnic communities near to our churches and prayerfully the Lord will lead us to pursue the development of a church among other groups in the days ahead. We urge the Annual Conference to continue its support of ethnic church planting and to give to this work through the Fund For Ethnic Church Planting. Continue to send your contributions to The Board Of Missions, designated for Ethnic Church Planting.

#### Conclusion

For those members of Annual Conference who are not aware of the work of The Inter-Cultural Ministries Study Committee, a history of the Committee's work was prepared and titled, "His Glory And Deeds Among All Peoples." This historical

sketch is available by contacting David E. Gundrum, Secretary of the Committee.

The Committee still needs time to complete its work on the Biblical Principles For Living. The Committee requests your prayers and input regarding this work. We also ask you to pray for the Joint Committee on Ethnic Church Planting as it seeks to reach the various ethnic people groups in the target areas of the Bible Fellowship Church.

A "Biblical Principles For Living - Revised for 118th Annual Conference," booklet has been prepared and distributed with the Annual Conference Report Book. Please reference the Booklet with regard to the Biblical Principles For Living.

The Inter-Cultural Ministries Study Committee recommends:

- Whereas, the Inter-Cultural Ministries Study Committee has reviewed, edited and approved certain Biblical Principles For Living, therefore be it
  - Resolved, that the 118th Annual Conference approve for first reading and inclusion in the Appendix, Biblical Principles For Living, of the *Faith & Order*, the following Biblical Principles For Living: Repentance And Restitution-#109, Divorce-#112, and Stewardship-#114.
- Whereas, Whereas, certain Articles in the Standards Of Worship And Life are valuable statements on particular issues and not necessarily addressed in the Biblical Principles For Living, and
  - Whereas, the Committee believes that these Articles should be retained; therefore be it
  - Resolved, that Dedication Of Children-#130-1, and Harmful Indulgences-#130-3, be approved for First Reading and placed in the Biblical Principles For Living -- Declarations On Particular Issues; and further
  - Resolved, that Abortion #130-2, Homosexuality #130-4, and Secret Oath-Bound Societies 130-5 be re-located to Biblical Principles For Living -- Declarations On Particular Issues.

- 3. Whereas, we once did not approve "oaths" as acceptable in the behavior of believers, and
  - Whereas, we rejected that position at the 79th Annual Conference (1962 Yearbook, pp.54,55); and
  - Whereas, Article 112 Secret Oath-Bound Societies in the Standards of Worship and Life includes a prohibition in the use of oaths and does not define "secret societies", and
  - Whereas, this Committee has committed itself to the Annual Conference not to change existing standards in developing Biblical Principles For Living, therefore be it
  - **Resolved**, that we recommend to the 118th Annual Conference the appointment of a committee of five ordained ministers to study in the light of the Scripture our position on Secret Oath-Bound Societies and bring its report to the 119th Annual Conference.
- 4. <u>Whereas</u>, The Biblical Principles For Living cover more issues than the Standards of Worship and Life; and
  - <u>Whereas</u>, The Biblical Principles For Living give more complete statements, more explicit Biblical substantiation, and broader statements of the subjects than the *Standards* of Worship & Life, and
  - Whereas, The Biblical Principles For Living also state things in language which is more clear to this generation and transferable across cultures, therefore be it
  - Resolved, that The Biblical Principles For Living collectively replace *The Standards Of Worship & Life* in the *Faith & Order* after their Second Reading and further,
  - **Resolved**, that the section in the *Faith & Order* which will contain The Biblical Principles For Living, be titled Biblical Principles For Living, and further,
  - **Resolved**, that the listing of The Biblical Principles For Living in the *Faith & Order* be as follows:

# Report of the Bible Fellowship Board of Directors

The Board of Directors of the BFC held four regular meetings to attend to corporate business related to Annual Conference, to agencies, and to the churches.

The Board provided oversight, advice and assistance in respect to fiscal, legal and property acquisition and disposal as follows: Annual Conference, medical insurance, administrative budget, Board of Church Extension, and Board of the Homes, Inc.

During the year, the building which formerly housed Philadelphia Emmanuel Church was sold to Baraca Church and the parsonage was sold to the pastor of that congregation.

The Board of Directors also represented the Board of Church Extension in the following transactions: sale of the parsonage of the Director of Church Extension in Plainfield, NJ, purchase of a parsonage for the new Director of Church Extension in Adamstown, PA, and purchase of a parsonage for the Brooklyn Mission. The request of the Board of Church Extension to sell property in Egg Harbor, NJ, was also granted. This property is now listed with a realtor.

Mr. Robert H. Carr, Jr., continues to represent the BFC in medical insurance matters, and is available to advise churches in regard to what options are open to them, and how best they might meet their medical insurance needs at the most reasonable cost. Rev. James A. Beil still represents the Board of Directors as liaison with Mr. Carr and is available to you should you need him.

Work on updated bylaws for the Fund to Promote Church Extension continues and should be ready for presentation to Annual Conference in 2002.

The financial report of the Board of Directors for the 117th Annual Conference (2000 Yearbook, page 230) indicates that giving by the churches toward PJC Debt reduction in 1999 was \$88,933. During that Annual Conference, the following resolution was adopted: "Resolved, that each church for the year 2001 continue to pledge 1% of its offerings (based on 1997 offerings), to replenish the Fund to Promote Church Extension. The financial report of the Board of Directors for the 118th Annual Conference

shows that \$85,509 was given to replenish the Fund to Promote Church Extension during fiscal year 2000. It is very important that the churches fulfill the mutual commitment we made during the 117th Annual Conference (by a vote of 117-13) to once again give 1% of 1997 offerings to replenish the Fund to Promote Church Extension in 2001.

All funds are deposited in the First Union Bank. Accounts were audited by Charles Albert.

We recommend the 118th Annual Conference adopt the following:

**Resolved**, that the rate of mileage reimbursement for conference business be 24¢ per mile.

Resolved, that the Administrative Budget for January 1, 2001 to December 31, 2001 be adopted.

**Resolved**, that the Administrative Budget for January 1, 2002 to December 31, 2002 be approved for submission to the churches for their pledges.

Pledges for the 2002 Administrative Budget shall be received by the financial secretary by September 1, 2001.

- Whereas, the Board of Directors reported in previous years that the funds to repay the amount taken from the FTPCE would not be realized from the sale of the PJC property and,
- Whereas, the Board of Directors so informed the Annual Conference of this condition and the 117th Annual Conference remove the obligation of repaying the amount of \$310,000 and rather, work toward providing monies to fund the work of the Board of Church Extension through contributions from the particular churches, and
- Whereas, the accounting of funds of the Board of Directors should reflect the decision of the 117th Annual Conference, therefore be it
- Resolved, that the report of the Board of Directors referencing the "Fund to Promote Church Extension Balance Sheet" be amended to include the line item "Note Pinebrook Junior College \$0" and further,
- <u>Resolved</u>, that all subsequent reports from the Board of Directors will delete this line entry.


