

A Look Back:

Report of the Twentieth Annual Conference October 16, 1903

They came, many of them, on Thursday afternoon. They arrived by train and made their way to their bountiful accommodations graciously provided by loving brothers and sisters. The others arrived on Friday morning after which they all made their way to the chapel at the intersection of 4th Street and Grape Alley. The twentieth Annual Conference of the Mennonite Brethren in Christ/Bible Fellowship Church was about to begin in Mt. Carmel, Pennsylvania.

The chapel was new, only about two years old. The congregation which met there was the fruit of evangelistic efforts in upstate-coal-producing regions of Pennsylvania. The ladies of the Gospel Workers had spearheaded the move going to people whose eastern European names were hard to pronounce and harder to spell. In this town, men came home at night with lungs full of the fine black dust of the coal mines and pits in which they worked. The women mothered their children and did endless laundry. The Gospel was not always welcomed by these hard-working, religious people.

At 8am on Friday, the Chairman, H. B. Musselman, banged the gavel. The meeting was underway. They did their usual singing and listened as Pastor Musselman preached "a very instructive and heart-searching address on 'Kindly Affection With Brotherly Love," Rom. 12:10. They prayed and were off to their business.

These Mennonites had suddenly become a youth movement.

The Chairman was a 34 years mere Nearly half of all the pastors present had been in the ministry for less than two years. The denomination exploding, producing a need for pastors. God had provided committed; and zealous young men. The names of the new pastors included some who later sat in many Annual Conference

sessions: E. N. Cassel, J. C. Roth, E. E. Kublic, and J. F. Barrall. These new comers joined the experienced veterans like William Gehman, Lewis Taylor, and George Campbell.

Young men need accountability. Accountability has always been an issue at Annual Conference. Some welcome accountability while others resent it. Accountability creates expectations. These men who made up the Annual Conference were part of a church which had a high and holy view of the ministry and high expectations for those who served. When men failed to live up to the expectations, the Conference took note. Their reports and resolutions reveal high expectations.

Committee on Examination of Traveling Elders: We have examined all the Traveling Elders through their respective delegates, and found no charge against any except E.R. Heywood, who failed to read the Discipline on his charge.

Committee on Statistics: We have examined the Schedules and found them all incorrect, except those of W.G. Gehman, E.N. Cassel, J.C. Roth, J.G. Shireman and that of the Reading charge.

Committee on Examination of Presiding Elders, Local Preachers, and Missionaries: We examined the Presiding Elders, Local Preachers and Missionaries and found them all satisfactory except A. Strawn who is charged with disloyalty to the church and Pastor, circulating untruthful reports about the work and Pastor, and sowing dissension among the classes.

WHEREAS, Bro. E.W. Martin has failed to make his percentage, we recommend that he take up the same studies for the ensuing year.

WHEREAS, W.W. Zimmerman has proven himself incapable financially showing a lack of ability to do pastoral work, therefore,

Resolved, That this committee recommend the conference not to give him a charge for the present.

WHEREAS, A. Strawn is charged with disloyalty to church and pastor, circulating untruthful reports about the work and pastor, sowing dissension among the classes, which charges have been sustained against him, therefore

Resolved, That we expel him.

It was not pleasant to hear your name called in rebuke and to feel the concern of the brothers. The expectations were high and the men responded and the church grew. The growing church faced new issues. They had never given thought to when a church should be considered a church and part of the Conference. In earlier days, it was easy. A group of people were formed who sent their pastor and one of their men to the Annual Conference. It was just understood that they were a church when the representatives showed up. But now, the Gospel Workers and the Gospel Heralds were starting mission churches and new questions arose. They asked W. G. Gehman to think through these issues. He read an essay which he had prepared for the Ministerial Convention entitled, "The Relation of Our Church to the Home Missionary Society." hen he finished, they appointed a committee to write "articles of mutual agreement, between the Gospel Herald Society and the church proper..." They worked it out.

Resolved, That the Treasurer be authorized to loan money without interest out of the Conference funds, to the Missionary Presiding Elder of the Gospel Worker Society, according to the judgment of the Treasurer, Presiding Elder and Missionary Presiding Elder of the Gospel Herald Society.

Resolved, That whenever the Gospel Worker Society or the Gospel Herald Society turn one or more of their Missions over to the church, a committee consisting of the Presiding Elder, Treasurer and Missionary Presiding Elder of the Society in question, shall appraise the personal property belonging to said Mission, in case the church chooses to buy the same, such property to be paid for out of the Home Missionary Treasury.

On Sunday, they met for worship. It was a day free from business and filled with spiritual delights.

E.N. Cassel had charge of the praise meeting at 9:30 a. m. At 10 o'clock H.B. Musselman preached the Conference sermon from Col. 4-17 and Acts 20-27. In his discourse he said this was an age of "New Things." "It is not new things we want but old. God's word is old and yet ever new. The character of true apostleship was presented in power, and God's presence melted the hearts of many."

M.P. Zook addressed the Sunday School at 1:30 p. m. At 2:00 p. m. W.G. Gehman preached the Ordination sermon and based his remarks on Amos 3-7 and 1 Tim.4:13-16. J.C. Roth and W.S. Hottel were ordained. God's power was again manifested. The evening meeting opened with a song service and glowing testimonies from many. At 7:30, E.T. Shick delivered a practical address, followed with an invitation by Mrs. C.H. Brunner.

On Monday morning, they were back at their places, ready to finish up the work. It was the time to work. Some knotty issues remained.

Committee on Appeals to General Conference:

WHEREAS, We, as a Conference, see the inconsistency of denying young converts the privilege of becoming members of the church as long as they are not fully enlightened in reference to the evils of Secret Societies and life insurance, yet acknowledging their conversion, therefore

Resolved, That we recommend the General Conference to modify these rules.

Resolved, That we recommend our Ministers not to officiate at Sunday Funerals, and use their influence strongly against the same.


There was a final matter to think about. It went to a committee.

Resolved, That we elect a committee of five men, to look after the matter of buying an Orphanage and Home, investing them with power to buy the same, if they see fit to do so. They shall also have the power to appoint one of their number to collect the necessary funds if they purchase the same.

And then it was over. They gave a rising vote of thanks for the wonderful hospitality. They shook hands and turned to leave. They were glad for the fellowship and ready to return to the work.

Conference Reporter 120th Annual Conference Clyde W. Snyder

The 120th Annual Conference of the BFC was convened by Chairman, William G. Schlonecker, at 10 a.m. on April 28, 2003 on the grounds of Pinebrook Bible Conference in Stroudsburg, Pennsylvania. Personnel from BFC churches, missions and agencies, along with BFC missionaries, met for the three-day conference to worship together and carry out the work of the BFC.

Worship leader, Pastor Richard Paashaus from Calvary BFC in Coopersburg, Pennsylvania, led the group in times of corporate worship focused on the conference theme, "Wisdom from Above." Various men assisted him as instrumentalists, vocalists and readers. During the time of worship, Chairman Schlonecker, pastor of Newark BFC in Newark, Delaware, delivered the keynote message, "Wisdom Proclaimed Through the Spirit." (See summaries of conference messages in the June issue of *Fellowship News*.)

At the first business session, conference appointments were made and the conference bar (voting members of Annual Conference) was established. Additionally, David E. Gundrum was ratified as Director of Church Extension Department for the next three years, and Dana E. Weller was ratified as Director of the Board of Missions for another three years. The conference also received reports from various boards and committees.

The Ministerial Candidate Committee recommended that David T. Allen be ordained to the Christian ministry of the BFC. Currently he is serving on the pastoral staff of Cedar Crest in Allentown, PA. Three prior ordinations will be recognized, including those of C. Larry Bennett (Zionsville, PA), Arthur J. Simpson, Jr., (New Life, Oley, PA) and John R. Stover, (Berean, Stroudsburg, PA). A Service of Ordination was held Monday, May 19, 2003 at 7:30 p.m., Cedar Crest BFC in Allentown.

On Monday afternoon, at a joyful ceremony of recognition, the mission at Thompson, Connecticut, was named a Particular Church, fully organized with its own elders. New delegate, Thomas W. Krams, was seated at the conference bar beside Thompson BFC's organizing pastor, Dennis Spinney. Members of the congregation were present to address the conference and receive its well wishes.

As a highlight of the Monday evening session, all those present who serve under the auspices of the Board of Missions were introduced to the conference. Throughout the conference a number of videos were used to highlight ministries and opportunities. Tuesday morning, the time of corporate worship included a message by Pastor Carl K. Spackman, of Grace BFC in Harrisburg, "Wisdom Revealed by the Spirit."

As part of his report, Conference Pastor, Ronald C. Mahurin, introduced four men who retired from positions of active ministry in the last year: Pastor Alva Cassel (Bethany BFC, Mt. Carmel), Richard Gehman (missionary to Kenya), David J. Watkins (Graterford BFC, Graterford), and Thomas Phillips (Community BFC, Red Hill). Their combined years of service total 150.

At the beginning of the afternoon session, BFC Army Chaplain, Kenneth Hurst, showed a video about the work of a chaplain which detailed the rewards of this ministry. He highlighted the opportunity the BFC has to offer this kind of service.

Other afternoon business related to a name change from Board of Publication and Printing to Board of Communications to reflect the use of electronic communications. Additionally there was lengthy consideration and deliberation relating to Biblical Principles for Living with the following being approved at second reading: Preamble, Worship, Spirit World, Holiness, Justice, Humility, Trust and Integrity, Humanity in God's Image, Repentance and Restitution.

On the morning of the third day of Annual Conference, the Pastor of Cedar Crest BFC in Allentown, Clifford B. Boone, spoke on the subject, "Wisdom Imparted Through the Spirit."

Elections were completed, reports received and debated and recommendations of boards and committees were approved. The report of the Study Committee on Secret Societies was debated extensively, resulting in the approval of the report at first reading (see page 47-49). Throughout the three days, much prayer was offered on behalf of the BFC and its ministries, and for individuals in need of spiritual help and physical healing.

- <u>Whereas</u>, the practice of The Bible Fellowship Church is to provide a parsonage or a rental allowance as part of the gross compensation for each of its active ordained or licensed ministers; and
- Whereas, pensions paid to retired and disabled ordained or licensed ministers of The Bible Fellowship Church are considered as deferred compensation and are paid to said retired and disabled ordained or licensed ministers in consideration of previous, active service; and
- Whereas, the Internal Revenue Service has recognized that The Bible Fellowship Church is the appropriate organization to designate a housing/rental allowance for retired and disabled ordained or licensed ministers who are members of this Conference;

Resolved.

1. An amount equal to 100% of the pension payments

received during the year of 2003 be and is hereby designated as a rental/housing allowance for each retired and disabled ordained or licensed minister of The Bible Fellowship Church who is or was a member of the Bible Fellowship Church Minister's Retirement Fund.

- 2. This rental/housing allowance shall apply to each retired and disabled ordained or licensed minister who has been granted the retired relationship or placed on disability leave by the Bible Fellowship Annual Conference and whose name and relationship to the conference is recorded in the Journal of The Bible Fellowship Annual Conference and in other appropriate records maintained by the conference.
- 3. The pension payment to which this rental/housing allowance applies shall be the pension payment resulting from all service of such retired or disabled ordained or licensed ministers from all employment by any local church, Annual Conference or institution of The Bible Fellowship Church or of any former denomination that is now a part of The Bible Fellowship Church, or from any other employer who employed the minister to perform services related to the ministry and who elected to make contributions to the pension funds of The Bible Fellowship Church for such a retired minister's pension.

Note: The rental/housing allowance which may be excluded from a minister's gross income is limited to the lesser of (1) the amount of the rental/housing allowance designated by the minister's employer or other appropriate body, (2) the amount actually expended by the minister to provide his or her housing, or (3) the legally-determined fair rental value of the parsonage or other housing provided. As specified in Rev. Rul. 71-290 C.B. 92, "the only amount that will qualify for exclusion under section 107(2) of the Code as a 'rental allowance' is an amount equal to the fair rental value of the home, including furnishings and appurtenances such as a garage, plus the cost of utilities."

This rental/housing allowance shall apply to each retired and disabled ordained or licensed minister who has been granted the retired relationship or placed on disability leave by the Bible Fellowship Annual Conference and whose name and relationship to the conference is recorded in the Journal of The Bible Fellowship Annual Conference and in other appropriate records maintained by the conference.
- 3. The pension payment to which this rental/housing allowance applies shall be the pension payment resulting from all service of such retired or disabled ordained or licensed ministers from all employment by any local church, Annual Conference or institution of The Bible Fellowship Church or of any former denomination that is now a part of The Bible Fellowship

Church, or from any other employer who employed the minister to perform services related to the ministry and who elected to make contributions to the pension funds of The Bible Fellowship Church for such a retired minister's pension.

Note: The rental/housing allowance which may be excluded from a minister's gross income is limited to the lesser of (1) the amount of the rental/housing allowance designated by the minister's employer or other appropriate body, (2) the amount actually expended by the minister to provide his or her housing, or (3) the legally-determined fair rental value of the parsonage or other housing provided. As specified in Rev. Whereas, the Committee believes that God has provided the people and opportunities and desires His church to reach the alien in the land and plant churches, therefore be it

Resolved, that each Pastor and Delegate to Annual Conference, if they have not already established a line item in their budgets for ethnic church planting, be encouraged to work with their churches to budget monies for ethnic church planting.

Resolved, that the following be approved at Second Reading:

Article 100-1 - PREAMBLE

- **100-1.1** The Bible Fellowship Church sets forth these Biblical Principles for Living to inform and guide disciples of Jesus Christ in making moral decisions and living lives of obedience.
- **100-1.2** The BFC acknowledges the Scriptures as the supreme and final authority of faith and conduct and the Holy Spirit as the source of power and guidance for the believer. These principles are summaries of the biblical truth that reveals the Lord's directives in various aspects of life.
- 100-1.3 Increasing ethnic and cultural diversity in many of the churches and the prospect of new congregations being formed among various people groups have prompted the BFC to seek to state the principles so that they may be understood and applied by believers in any cultural context.
- 100-1.4 These principles are not exhaustive in that they do not cite all that the Bible says in any of the aspects included and that they do not cover all areas of life that the Scriptures address. In the future it may become apparent that additional aspects of life need to be addressed and that the current principles may need to be reconsidered with a view to amending them after further reflection on the biblical truth.
- **100-1.5** Every believer is accountable to God for all that the Bible says. Moral choices and actions should be based on the whole counsel of God. Each believer must faithfully read, study and review all parts of the Scriptures (2 Tim. 3:16, 17).
- **100-1.6** In seeking moral guidance, the believer should study the Old Testament books of the Law with special focus on the Ten Commandments (Exo. 20:1-17). The implications of the Law are explained and applied in the rest of the Old Testament.
- 100-1.7 The Lord Jesus summarized the Law in the Great Commandments (Mat. 22:34-40; Mark 12:30, 31) and explained the spiritual depth of the Law in the Sermon on the Mount (Mat. 5-7). The application of the Law in the individual life of the believer and the corporate life of the church is set forth in the New Testament letters.

100-1.8 Since each believer is indwelled and empowered by the Holy Spirit, there is an enabling to obey God's requirements (Rom. 8:3, 4). The Spirit controlled person will demonstrate the fruit of the Spirit (Gal. 5:22, 23). He or she will receive and employ the gifts of the Spirit (1 Pe. 4:10, 11; Rom. 12:4-8; 1 Cor. 12:1-11). Where the life and power of the Holy Spirit are present in an individual or church, the three abiding qualities, faith, hope and love, will be evident (1 Cor. 13:13; 1 Thes. 1:3, Rom. 5:1, 2). The greatest of these is love, and "love is the fulfillment of the law" (Rom. 13:10).

[SECOND READING]

Yes - 122; No- 8

Resolved, that the following be approved at Second Reading:

Article 101-1 - Worship

- 101-1.1 Worship is response to God in all of life, whereby, in love, adoration, confession, thanksgiving, praise, and service God's worth is declared. Worship is rooted in reverence for and awe of the Lord and deepens as knowledge of God increases. Worship is the privilege and responsibility of each individual, family, and congregation. For the believer, worship is a life style not limited by location or circumstance.
- 101-1.2 Worship is the ultimate purpose of the church. The mission of the church is to declare God's glory and His salvation to all ethnic groups so that some from all the families of nations shall worship Him.³ Corporate worship is the assembled church celebrating the glory of God and ascribing to Him praise and honor. Christ, the head of the church, meets with and strengthens His people, who are called out from the world by the Holy Spirit.⁴ 101-1.3 God declares that He alone is to be worshiped³ and this worship must be in spirit and truth.⁶ Such worship engages both mind and emotion, listening and responding to God in joyful obedience not simply in routine activity.⁷ For disobeying God's instructions and substituting their own form of worship, ⁸ Israel was severely punished. We therefore seek to learn from the Bible what kinds of worship please the Lord.

- **101-1.4** Worship in the Old Testament was a celebration of the mighty acts of the Lord, the covenant God of Israel. Corporate worship was highlighted through prescribed ritual: a priesthood, a sacrificial system looking forward to Christ's atonement, and particular times and places when and where worship should occur. This ritual was not made valuable by its repetition. Its value came through heartfelt, thoughtful response to God, uniting the worshipers.
- 101-1.5 Worship in the New Testament is a celebration of the finished work of Christ, His victory over Satan, sin, and death through His own incarnation, death, resurrection, and ascension. Jesus claims for Himself authority over temple, Sabbath, sacrifice, and service. The former place, priesthood, and ritual were set aside a believers now observe a new day, the Lord's Day, and new ordinances: Baptism and the Lord's Supper.
- 101-1.6 Examples of corporate worship in the New Testament include: the reading of Scripture, prayer, praise, confession, singing, giving, thanksgiving, preaching and teaching, and the ordinances. The expression of these may be shaped by the cultural setting of a particular church and must be done in a fitting and orderly way. 19

Resolved, that the following be approved at Second Reading:

Article 101-2 - Spirit World

101-2.1 God is spirit¹ and has created everything, including the visible and the invisible. The invisible includes a great number ³ of spirit beings. Among these are angels who are without flesh ⁴ and

remain invisible except when supernaturally revealed.⁵ Angels surround God's throne to worship and serve Him.⁶ They are powerful ⁷ and are sent as God pleases ⁸ to provide and care for,⁹ to protect and deliver,¹⁰ to instruct and guide,¹¹ to discipline and punish.¹² They long to comprehend fully the grace of salvation and rejoice over each sinner who repents.¹³ God also created human beings who are spirit ¹⁴ and flesh to worship and serve Him as God alone.¹⁵

- 101-2.2 A created angelic being, later known as the devil or Satan, rebelled against God. Within limits allowed by the sovereign God, Satan leads a powerful world system of wickedness which is hostile toward God and His purposes. Satan may inflict pain, suffering, emotional problems and may cause death. He can control people to oppose the work of God, blind their minds to prevent their understanding the Gospel, and oppress the servants of God. Anyone not led by the Holy Spirit is open to Satan's influence. He seeks to influence nations and governments. Satan is a masterful deceiver appearing at times as an angel of light and called the father of lies. False prophets, false religions, and cults are instruments of deception. Those blinded and deceived by Satan live a life-style that is opposed to God.
- 101-2.3 Other angels followed Satan in his rebellion against God. These fallen angels, also known as evil spirits or demons, serve Satan, the god of this evil world system. Satan and evil spirits can influence the believer and possess unregenerate people and animals. God has enabled believers to cast out demons by His Spirit. God may continue to give this enablement, however, the casting out of demons is not in itself reason for boasting and not necessarily an evidence of an individual's relationship with Christ.
- 101-2.4 Believers are commanded to stand against the evil spirit world ³¹ and are warned against such detestable things as divination, witchcraft, sorcery, interpreting of omens, casting of spells, and consulting the dead. These things are devices that Satan uses to lure people toward destruction. People who practice these things are under the condemnation of God.³² Because of Satan's power, victory is possible only through our Lord Jesus Christ.³³ Through the blood of Christ that was shed on the cross, God has provided victory over this world system for those born of God.³⁴ In prayerful dependence upon God, they are protected from and victorious over the powers of darkness as they use all the armor God provides,

submissively draw near to Him, and resist the devil.35

101-2.5 The sovereign God is in control of the entire social, political, and spiritual realm.³⁶ God will cast Satan and all his followers into the lake of fire which has been prepared for them where they will remain forever.³⁷ The kingdom of this world will one day become the kingdom of our Lord and He will reign forever and ever.³⁸

- (2) Possible use of the Fund may be initiated by a referral by an individual or church, or by a request by a Particular Church, or by an inquiry by the Board of Directors. All actual use of the Fund shall be by formal request.
- (3) A formal request for use of the Fund shall be made in writing to the Board of Directors from the Board of Elders of a Particular Church. This request shall include the circumstances causing the present need, the proposed use of the money, and the amount requested.
- (4) The Board of Directors shall consider the formal request for use of the Fund. It shall reserve the right to examine the latest financial statement of the Particular Church requesting assistance. Assistance is granted by a majority vote of the full Board of Directors.
- (5) If a situation arises which the Board of Directors deems to be an economic emergency requiring the extraordinary use of the Fund, the Board is authorized to use the necessary monies for this purpose and shall attempt to repay any money used from the Fund.

Ministers' Assistance Fund

- The Board of Directors shall administer and maintain the Ministers' Assistance Fund by allotment from the Administrative Budget or by direct appeals to the Churches.
- (2) Possible use of the Fund may be initiated by a referral by an individual or church, by a request by a pastor, or by an inquiry by the Board of Directors. All actual use of the Fund shall be by formal request.

- (3) A formal request for use of the Fund shall be made in writing to the Board of Directors from the Board of Elders of a Particular Church. This request shall include the circumstances causing the present need, the proposed use of the money, and the amount requested.
- (4) The Board of Directors shall consider the formal request for use of the Fund. Assistance is granted by a majority vote of the full Board of Directors.
- (5) If a situation arises which the Board of Directors deems to be an economic emergency requiring the extraordinary use of the Fund, the Board is authorized to use the necessary monies for this purpose and shall attempt to repay any money used from the Fund.

Pastoral Intern Fund

- (1) The Board of Directors shall administer and maintain the Pastoral Intern Fund by an allotment from the Administrative Budget or by direct appeals to the churches.
- (2) The Fund shall be used to assist men serving as interns who are under the care of the Ministerial Candidate Committee.
- (3) Upon the recommendation of the Ministerial Candidate Committee, the Board of Directors shall issue grants from the Fund by a majority vote of the entire Board.
- (4) If a situation arises which the Board of Directors deems to be an economic emergency requiring the extraordinary use of the Fund, the Board is authorized to use the necessary monies for this purpose and shall attempt to repay any money used from the Fund.

Bible Fellowship Church Special Project Fund

- (1) The Board of Directors shall administer and maintain the Bible Fellowship Church Special Project Fund by donations designated to it, by allotments from the Administrative Budget, or by transfers from the General Fund.
- (2) The Fund shall be used for the general welfare and advancement of the BFC. This may include the purchase of real estate or other capital expenditures which will

- strengthen the church as a whole. Such expenditures may be made on behalf of an existing agency, board, or committee, or may involve the creation of a new agency, board, or committee.
- (3) If a situation arises which the Board of Directors deems to be an economic emergency requiring the extraordinary use of the Fund, the Board is authorized to use the necessary monies for this purpose and shall attempt to repay any money used from the Fund.

[SECOND READING]

The following was adopted at Second Reading:

Section 512-5.7: Pinebrook Educational Foundation

Section 1 -- Establishment and Purpose

The Pinebrook Educational Foundation was established as a division of the Bible Fellowship Church ("Church") on October 18, 1994. The purpose of the Pinebrook Educational Foundation is to continue the ministry of Pinebrook Junior College (formerly Berean Bible School) to aid Christian individuals involved in higher education and Christian post-secondary institutions ("Purpose"). Said Purpose will be construed broadly enough to include a wide spectrum of aid projects involving Christian post-secondary education, including but not limited to scholarship aid to students and grants to Christian post-secondary institutions.

Section 2 -- Overview

The Pinebrook Educational Foundation shall receive, invest, and administer funds ("Funds") in accordance with its stated Purpose, and such funds shall be designated for such Purpose, segregated from the general funds of the Church, and administered and distributed by the Pinebrook Educational Foundation's Board of Directors ("Foundation Board") in conformity with said Purpose. Emphasis and priority will be given to individuals attending Christian institutions and to

higher education endeavors closely related to the Bible Fellowship Church. Special consideration shall be given to educational organizations with which the Board of Higher Education has affiliations (as referenced in §512-5.4(3) of the Faith & Order).

A. Election and Composition of the Foundation Board.

The Pinebrook Educational Foundation shall be directed by the Foundation Board composed of six (6) members ("Board Members") elected by the Board of Higher Education and subject to ratification by the Annual Conference. Board Members shall be elected in three (3) classes and shall serve three-year terms of service. The three (3) classes shall be composed of two (2) Board Members each. Each Board Member shall serve until a successor is duly elected.

B. Accountability.

The Foundation Board shall be accountable to the Board of Higher Education. The Foundation Board shall administer all activities and investments of Pinebrook Educational Foundation to ensure that all such activities and investments are financially and legally appropriate with respect to the status of Pinebrook Educational Foundation.

The Foundation Board shall report at least annually to the Board of Higher Education and shall report annually to the Annual Conference through the report of the Board of Higher Education.

C. Officers of the Foundation Board.

The Foundation Board shall elect annually from its number: a Chairperson, a Vice-Chairperson, and a Secretary-Treasurer.

Section 4 - Administration

A. Executive Director/Chairperson of the Pinebrook Educational Foundation.

- 1. An Executive Director of Pinebrook Educational Foundation ("Executive Director") may be selected by the Foundation Board and ratified by the Board of Higher Education. The position may be paid or unpaid as determined by the Board of Higher Education.
- 2. The Executive Director shall not be required to be a member of the Foundation Board or the Board of Higher Education. Membership on one of these boards will not, however, disqualify an individual from serving as Executive Director. The Executive Director shall not be an officer of the Pinebrook Educational Foundation.
- 3. The Executive Director shall be responsible for the orderly conduct of the business of the Pinebrook Educational Foundation. Such duties as administration of the grant and scholarship application process, oversight of all financial activities, investments, administrative procedures, and communication shall be the responsibility of the Executive Director. The Executive Director shall consult with the Foundation Board's Chairperson regarding general administration matters and with both the Chairperson and Secretary-Treasurer of the Foundation Board regarding financial matters.
- 4. If an Executive Director has not been selected by the Foundation Board, the Foundation Board's Chairperson shall be responsible for the conduct of the business of the Pinebrook Educational Foundation and shall perform the duties identified in paragraph 3 above.

B. Foundation Secretary.

- The Secretary of the Pinebrook Educational Foundation shall be selected by the Foundation Board subject to approval by the Board of Higher Education.
- The Secretary shall report to and assist the Executive Director (or Chairperson of the Foundation Board if an Executive Director has not been selected by the Foundation Board).
- The Secretary shall be a volunteer or a part-time employee until Pinebrook Educational Foundation activity requires more assistance and additional funding is available for fulltime compensation, as shall be determined by the Foundation Board.

4. The compensation (if any) of the Secretary shall be determined by the Foundation Board and shall be subject to approval by the Board of Higher Education.

C. Auxiliary Groups.

Support groups previously affiliated with Pinebrook Junior College such as the Alumni Association may be encouraged to continue in existence or to be reactivated. The assistance of such support groups may be sought in raising funds and in providing other assistance to the Pinebrook Educational Foundation.

D. Administration of Funds.

- 1. Pinebrook Educational Foundation Funds shall: (a) be segregated from the general funds of the Church; (b) be separately invested and administered by the Foundation Board; and (c) not be disbursed for any purpose other than the Purpose of the Pinebrook Educational Foundation.
- A professional investment firm or counselor may be chosen by the Foundation Board to carry out the investment of Pinebrook Educational Foundation Funds. Risk levels and investment criteria shall be determined by the Foundation Board and approved by the Board of Higher Education.
- 3. The Pinebrook Educational Foundation may be the transferee of funds: (a) existing Pinebrook Junior College endowment funds; (b) donations or bequests to, and annuity arrangements made for the benefit of Pinebrook Junior College (or the Berean Bible School); (c) grants from foundations; (d) proceeds from general and endowment investments; and (e) other sources acceptable with respect to the tax-exempt status of the Church.
- 4. Funds shall be used to disburse grants, scholarships and/or loans in accordance with the Purpose of Pinebrook Educational Foundation and to pay administrative costs of the Pinebrook Educational Foundation.
 - a. The Foundation Board shall formulate rules for the administration of all Funds. These shall be subject to

- review by the Board of Higher Education.
- b. Administrative costs shall be paid from the General Fund (as defined in Section 5 herein) subject to the approval of the Foundation Board and review by the Board of Higher Education.

Section 5 - Aid Projects/Designated Accounts.

- A. The Pinebrook Educational Foundation shall be structured to include many types of aid to Christian higher education in accordance with its purpose. Specific programs of aid shall be designated by the Foundation Board as separately administered endowment or current gift "funds" or "accounts" ("Designated Accounts") within the Foundation.
- B. A donation identified by a donor for the support of a specific Designated Account shall be used to fund such Designated Account. Designated Account Funds shall be expended by the Foundation Board in furtherance of the specific aid project(s) for which the Designated Account has been established.
- C. Undesignated donations shall go to a General Fund from which administrative costs shall be paid and Board-directed grants, loans and scholarships shall be made.
- D. Donors shall be encouraged to contribute to Designated Accounts set up as endowments in order to insure a continuous stream of proceeds for the future. However, donations to Designated Accounts which expend nonendowment restricted ("current gift") funds are also encouraged.
- E. Additionally, sizable initial gifts may be used to establish a Designated Account (as an endowment or current gift fund) of the donor's choosing, subject to Foundation Board approval.
- F. There shall be compliance with donor limitations and/or restrictions on Funds received from (or donated, bequeathed, etc. to or for the benefit of) Pinebrook Junior College.

Section 6 - Miscellaneous Regulations.

A. Bylaws.

The Bylaws of the Foundation Board may be amended by majority vote of the total membership of the Foundation Board at a regular or special meeting.

B. General.

The Foundation Board shall be empowered to adopt policies and regulations in addition to its Bylaws. Such policies and regulations must be in conformity with the *Faith and Order* of the Bible Fellowship Church and within the rules, decisions, and directives of the Annual Conference.

C. Quorum.

Four Board Members attending a duly announced meeting of the Foundation Board shall constitute a quorum. Unless otherwise specified, a majority vote shall mean a simple majority of those attending any meeting of the Foundation Board in which there is a quorum.

The following was adopted at Second Reading:

Article 102-1 - Holiness

102-1.1 God is holy. He is separate from and superior to all creation. He is absolutely pure and good. He cannot sin and hates sin. Because He is holy, He calls people to holiness.

102-1.2 Holiness involves a setting apart, a dedicating or devoting,

of someone or something for a special purpose. Believers are set apart for God and called saints, or holy ones. The Bible reveals the holiness of God and declares His standard for a holy life. God's law teaches all people are sinners and His Spirit convicts of sin. All those who belong to God are, through the work of Christ, declared holy and are responsible to live holy lives. God's purpose is that every believer through the experiences of this life be changed into the likeness of His Son.

102-1.3 Sanctification, or holy living, is progressively realized by the power of the Holy Spirit.¹² For Christians, there is to be a separation from all forms of evil, and a full surrender to the Lord.¹³ Believers should not participate in any group which demands behavior or an affirmation of beliefs that are opposed to our allegiance to Christ.¹⁴ They are not to continue any longer in the sinful ways of the world but should rather seek to have all thoughts and actions conformed to the revealed will of God.¹⁵ Sin's control and its continued practice must cease.¹⁶

102-1.4 The church is also called to holiness.¹⁷ Believers are to encourage one another to live righteously,¹⁸ warn against the dangers of all sin,¹⁹ confess and repent of all individual and corporate sin,²⁰ and submit to discipline as taught by the Lord.²¹ Christian leaders have a particular responsibility to set proper examples of holy living.²²

The following was adopted at Second Reading:

Article 102-2 - Justice

- 102-2.1 By nature God is morally perfect and righteous in every way. To say that God is just is to affirm the rightness of His law and His faithful and consistent adherence to that law in His judgments. Justice is the perfect application of His law in the lives of human beings. Both human law and the application of that law can distort God's justice and therefore be sinful and produce sin. Sin causes human beings to enact and apply laws in ways that are unjust. Because God is just, He abhors the distortions of His law.
- 102-2.2 In a world of sinful people, injustice results when human beings are judged by such things as color of skin, ethnicity, gender, age, social, economic and occupational status. To evaluate people based on such external characteristics is inconsistent with faith in Jesus Christ.⁴ Those who value people in this way are acting out of ungodly cultural biases and sinful pride.⁵ Injustice also results when persons allow their own sinful motivations, such as greed,⁶ jealousy,⁷ and envy,⁸ to shape their relationships with other people. In Jesus Christ such wicked and false distinctions or motivations are abolished.⁹
- **102-2.3** God's love for humankind knows no racial, national, economic, age, or gender boundaries and God's people must demonstrate this same impartial love. The proclamation of the gospel to every person regardless of location or status will be a matter of great priority among those who love justice.
- **102-2.4** Those who value justice will seek consistent and upright applications of human law so that no one is denied due process because of sinful distinctions.¹² Those who love justice will seek truth and act with integrity in all relationships.
- 102-2.5 The quest for justice in a world distorted by sin will often yield imperfect and incomplete results. The people of God who love justice will repent when they recognize their failure to do justice and will renew their efforts to bring justice to those who

have been denied it.13

The following was adopted at Second Reading:

Article 102-4 - Humility

- 102-4.1 Humility is an attitude of heart and mind perfectly exemplified in the person and life of Christ. 1 It characterizes those united with Christ,² pleases God,³ and shapes both the life of the community of faith⁴ and the ministry of the Lord's servants.⁵ The opposite of humility is pride which meets divine resistance and anger.6
- 102-4.2 Humility is an acceptance of one's true position in relationship to God, authorities, other believers, society, and all of creation. 10 Its reality is demonstrated in joyful service and appropriate submission seen most clearly in the willing selfsacrifice of Christ.
- 102-4.3 In the individual Christian, humility recognizes the grace of God which has made each believer to be accepted in Christ. This viewpoint becomes a source of forgiveness and patience within the Christian community. 11 The Christian's love for others is greatly aided by the development of godly humility.
- **102-4.4** The unique servant quality of Christian leadership is a direct result of godly humility. Elders of the church do not dominate the congregation but are servants to the whole body. 12 They do not desire to control, but rather to promote the development and enrichment of every member. As heirs of grace together with their brothers and sisters. Christian leaders must renounce the pride which creates divisions and factions¹³ based on secondary theological issues, 14 on areas of Christian liberty, 15 or merely on personalities.16
- 102-4.5 Humility encourages each church to cooperate with believers in gospel outreach, 17 compels us to seek to meet needs of others, 18 and causes us to be advocates for those who have none. 19 Concern shown for the disadvantaged in our world must be expressed through ministries of mercy²⁰ and efforts to promote the growth of the congregation among all kinds of people.²¹

The following was adopted at Second Reading:

Article 102-5 - Truth and Integrity

102-5.1 The Triune God — God the Father, God the Son and God the Holy Spirit — is the only true God.¹ God the Father is the God of truth,² who has never lied,³ and never will. He is absolutely truthful.⁴ Jesus, who is God the Son, is the truth.⁵ He is full of grace and truth.⁶ He always tells the truth.ⁿ God the Holy Spirit is the Spirit of Truth.⁶ He is the truth and He guides believers into all truth.¹0

102-5.2 The Word of God is truth¹¹ and is the standard for truth. Truth does not change¹² and the opposite of truth is falsehood. God desires¹³ and requires¹⁴ that all people speak the truth. His directives for truthfulness are found in the third¹⁵ and ninth¹⁶ commandments. Truth is truth even if it is not understood or fully disclosed.¹⁷ The failure to be truthful, including deceitfulness, is sin.¹⁸ Lying is among the sins of unbelievers that will be judged in hell.¹⁹ Believers who lie are disciplined by the Lord, possibly even to the point of death.²⁰

102-5.3 The believer and the believing community are commanded to be truthful.²¹ This includes keeping promises and honoring contracts, whether written or oral. In speaking the truth believers may formally call God to witness with an oath or simply affirm the truth of their statements. ²² The Christian and the church must keep their promises even when it is costly to do so. ²³

102-5.4 In the Scriptures, truth and integrity stand together.²⁴ Integrity is soundness, wholeness, consistency of character.

Without truth there is no integrity. ²⁵ God is pleased with integrity²⁶ and judges accordingly. ²⁷ Integrity protects believers²⁸ and upholds them through difficult times in life. ²⁹ It provides security and guidance for a believer's life. ³⁰ All teaching of God's truth must show integrity. ³¹ Truth and integrity must be lived out in love so that the body of Christ might mature. ³²

102-5.5 To fail to keep one's word is a lack of integrity betraying the trust of others and dishonoring the God of truth.³³

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The following was adopted at Second Reading:

Article 103-2 Repentance and Restitution

- **103-2.1** God commands every person to repent.¹ Without repentance there is no salvation.² Repentance is a work of the Holy Spirit producing change of mind and heart that leads to a changed life.
- **103-2.2** For the believer, repentance is a daily obligation to live according to the Word of God. When believers sin, they should repent and confess their sins. When they do this, the Lord promises forgiveness and cleansing.³
- 103-2.3 People who repent are to produce fruit of repentance in

their lives.⁴ One fruit of repentance for the believer who has sinned is to make restitution for any loss the sin caused other people. Restitution is a demonstration of repentance. Believers should make restitution⁵ in accordance with the Word of God to satisfy the righteousness of God.

103-2.4 Restitution involves restoration to the offended party that which was lost through injury to reputation, life, limb or property which has been destroyed, lost, stolen, or damaged due to one's sin, negligence or carelessness. Restitution was commanded by the Lord God in the Law.⁶ It is reiterated in the Proverbs⁷ and the prophets.⁸ It was advocated by John the Baptist⁹ and practiced by Zacchaeus the chief tax collector.¹⁰ Jesus directed His followers to settle any claims that anyone had against them even before going to the Lord in worship.¹¹ Such settlement would include restitution of any loss suffered by others. Restitution is taught by the Apostle Paul in his letter to Philemon¹² and implied in his letter to the Ephesians.¹³

Whereas, the Secret Society Study Committee believes that the present article on Secret Oath-Bound Societies (Article 112 of the Standards of Worship and Life) is not transcultural, and

Whereas, the committee believes the present article on Secret Oath-Bound Societies, as traditionally understood in the BFC, is not appropriate for formulation as a separate BPL, and

<u>Whereas</u>, it seems most appropriate to deal with the legitimate concerns raised in the present Article 112 with the adoption of a new <u>Declaration on Particular Issues</u>, entitled, "Affiliations", therefore, be it

Resolved, that the 120th Annual Conference approve for First Reading, Declaration on Particular Issues: "Affiliations".

Article 1005 - Affiliations

1005-1. It is highly inconsistent and anti-Scriptural for Christians to be members of organizations or societies that bind their members with oaths or affirmations that require involvement in practices or with philosophies which are contrary to our allegiance to Christ. We urge believers to refrain from joining and to withdraw their membership from any such organization or society. In addition,

believers must look with grave concern upon organizations or societies which require secrecy for their basic tenets and practices.

- **1005-2.** The Scriptures teach about both proper and improper taking of oaths. While oaths are not forbidden, the kinds of oaths taken by members of such associations are clearly against the teaching of Christ. The secrecy and higher allegiance required by such associations are not in keeping with the believers' call to be light-bearers in the world. This violates Christ's example of openness that rejects secret hidden agenda.
- **1005-3.** Often, being a member of such an organization or society violates the commands of the Scriptures not to be yoked together with unbelievers⁴ nor to have fellowship with the unfruitful works of darkness.⁵ Of supreme importance is that membership in any organization or society must not supercede our brotherhood with believers⁶ and must not violate our allegiance to Christ.⁷ We cannot serve God and any other master.⁸
- **1005-4.** Therefore, elders are encouraged to consider most seriously the affiliations maintained by persons who are seeking membership or hold membership in a BFC, giving godly counsel whenever necessary. Elders may choose to withhold membership or exercise church discipline in certain circumstances based on an individual's affiliations.

Order.

- Whereas, having individuals who serve on pastoral staffs occupying lay positions at the Conference level may be a deterrent from their seeking credentials with the BFC, therefore be it
- **Resolved**, That the material in bold italics be added to the *Faith and Order*, Article 510 General Rules of Elections and Resignations:

Article 510 - General Rules of Elections and Resignations

510 - 1 Categories

- (1) There are three categories of nominees for election to board, and committees. They are ministers, elders, and laypersons.
- (2) Pastoral Staff members are not eligible to serve in the categories of elders or laypersons.

Article 103-1 - Humanity in God's Image

103-1.1 The human race exists as a result of an instantaneous creative act of God.¹ Humanity shares many characteristics with other creatures, but is unique in that each individual bears the image or likeness of God.² This image makes possible the worship of God,³ relationships between persons,⁴ and responsibility to rule over God's creation.⁵ Only God confers this image, and it cannot be removed by any created being. Originally God's image in humanity included true righteousness and holiness; but by the entrance of sin into humanity these have been lost⁶ and the image distorted yet not destroyed.⁷

103-1.2 Because human beings are made in God's image, every person has an unique identity, individual worth, and purpose to live for God's glory.8 The image of God is also the basis for the dignity of every person. All human life should be cherished and protected, not neglected, despised or abused. God forbids the unlawful destruction of human life, both murder and suicide, and provides the strongest of sanctions, including capital punishment, to protect it. The killing of the weak and defenseless by means of abortion, infanticide, and euthanasia is a crime against both those persons and the God whose image they bear. Christians should exert every effort to oppose these evils in society, and other evils as defined and condemned by Scripture, including racism;11 cultural bias;12 gender discrimination;¹³ ignoring the poor,¹⁴ disabled¹⁵ and aged;¹⁶ and every other form of injustice against human beings.¹⁷ They should respect the image of God in every person despite the sins of that person or the consequences of those sins. 18 They should also work to protect the dignity of every human being. 19

For an amount necessary to meet the emergency which cannot be repaid within one year, the Board of Directors must present a plan to repay the Fund and gain the approval of Annual Conference prior to making the expenditure.

Report of the Committee on Arrangements

The Committee on Arrangements for the 120th Annual Conference met three times during the course of the conference year. The purpose of the committee includes reviewing the mechanics and efficiency of each conference as well as assisting in providing hospitality. Any suggestions on what we can do to accomplish the above are welcome.

The Committee solicited assistance from Carl C. Cassel, Roy A. Hertzog and Robert A. Sloan, Jr. to determine the need and then recommend implementation of a "Rule of Special Consideration." Attached to this report is a brief description of this rule and all documentation for its implementation.

One assignment given to the Committee was to define what the term "handle" means in regards to the Registrar's new duty for communications with those who cannot attend Annual Conference. A job description for the Assistant Registrar is being recommended. This too is listed in our recommendations.

In order to remember the many positive changes made for Annual Conference by the Arrangements Committee and so as not to add undo legislation with the *Faith & Order* a Policy Handbook is maintained by the committee. Several of the additions for this year include the material that follows:

Legislation for the Committee on Resolutions

- 1. The Chairman of Annual Conference appoints the Committee on Resolutions at the first meeting of Annual Conference. He designates one member as chairman.
- 2. The chairman of the Committee on Resolutions should call for an organizing meeting at the next meal or break.
- A secretary should be selected at the organizing meeting, who will be responsible for compiling the report and presenting it to the Annual Conference.
- Proposed resolutions should be assigned to each member of the committee. These should include, but are not limited to:
 - a. Resolutions concerning significant events and

- milestones at the Annual Conference (e.g. a new church, a retirement, etc.)
- b. Resolutions concerning prayer requests (e.g. guidance for a new venture, sickness of a pastor, etc.)
 - c. Resolutions expressing gratitude (e.g. for the Pages, kitchen workers, etc.)
 - d. Resolutions concerning any other matters deemed appropriate.
- 5. A review of previous *Yearbooks* can be a helpful reminder of appropriate resolutions. Care should be taken to present resolutions for adoption by Annual Conference which demonstrate an even-handed treatment of all.

Distribution Guidelines

The delegates attending Annual Conference are here for the purpose of conducting the business of the Bible Fellowship Church. Materials directly related to this business are distributed to each delegate via the Page-system. Venders are permitted to make one pass through the bar per Annual Conference to distribute material. The Head Page will coordinate this distribution.

Oversight of Space at Annual Conference

- K. The Committee on Arrangements shall oversee space at Annual Conference. This includes the table and seating arrangements as well as display space.
 - 1. The Annual Conference Bar shall be so designated by colored table clothes.
 - 2. The arrangements of the tables shall be in a horseshoe-fashion with the Chairman at the front-center and the secretaries on one side of the Chairman. On the opposite side shall be room for a podium, microphone stand, and various chairs for full-committee presentations.
 - 3. Space for BFC Missions and Agencies shall be provided at one table each, or its equivalency, at no charge.
 - Space to set up displays for outside mission organizations, church-related venders, and other

church-related organizations will be provided on a first-come-first-serve basis. A suggested donation to the Board of Publication and Printing, for an Ad in the annual *Yearbook*, shall be considered the lease.

4. The Registrar will oversee the usage of space.

Incidently, an "Annual Conference Space Request" form is being implemented at this year's Annual Conference.

The Committee seeks to continue to streamline the proceedings at Annual Conference so that we can give and do our best for the Lord. Any suggestions are happily accepted.

Orientation material has been placed in the beginning of the Report Book. This material should be read by each member of Annual Conference.

The Overseer of the Pages for the 120th Annual Conference is Clyde D. Bomgardner, Pastor of Youth and Discipleship at the Reading Church, and the Head Page is Louis Curcio, Assistant Pastor, Hatfield, PA.

- (3) He shall verify that the Annual Conference delegate(s) and alternate delegate(s) are elders in their congregation and have been duly-elected. This shall be accomplished by comparing the information supplied on the Annual Conference Registration Form with the official list of Annual Conference delegate(s) and alternate delegate(s) supplied to him from the Committee on Examination of Minutes of Particular Churches. Any discrepancies should be resolved prior to a delegate or alternate delegate being seated at Annual Conference.

Change the present 506-3 to:

506-4 The Committee on Examination of Minutes of Particular Churches shall, prior to Annual Conference, furnish to the Registrar a list of duly-elected Annual Conference delegates and alternate delegates as they appear in the minutes of the particular churches.

Change 511-1.3 Duties (3)

(3) It shall, prior to Annual Conference, furnish to the Registrar a list of duly-elected Annual Conference delegates and alternate delegates as they appear in the minutes of the particular churches.

Change 407-4

Each pastor shall inform the Registrar of Annual Conference of the names of the duly-elected Annual Conference delegate(s) and alternate delegate(s) by way of the Annual Conference Registration Form.

4. The Rule of Special Consideration

- <u>Whereas</u>, many issues come to Annual Conference that need more time for review and response; and
- Whereas, there are urgent issues that should be being discussed at the Annual Conference level that never make it to the Annual Conference floor due to time restraints; and
- Whereas, many matters brought to Annual Conference take years for approval when it would be desirable to work through the issues and approve them more quickly than we are presently doing; and
- <u>Whereas</u>, technology is available to assist in rapid communication and responding to circulated materials through the means of the internet and e-mail; and
- Whereas, it is now encouraged that each Bible Fellowship Church, pastor, and delegate have an e-mail address for rapid communications among the pastors and within the BFC; and
- <u>Whereas</u>, it is possible to circulate materials almost instantaneously for review and response throughout the year; therefore be it
- <u>Resolved</u>, that we approve the following paragraph as First Reading for the *Faith & Order*.

508-9 Advance Notification for Review and Response

Every Board or Committee of Annual Conference is encouraged to communicate between Annual Conferences with all the members of the Annual Conference to promote discussion of new ideas, proposals and legislation prior to formal consideration at Annual Conference. Receiving responses both positive and negative to the philosophy, content and language of proposals prior to Annual Conference by mail,

by internet and by hearings will enable presenters to bring material to Annual Conference requiring less time for consideration of details at Conference. Less time used for details means more time for major considerations. The earlier in the year dissemination of material begins the greater the benefits the process can bring.

and further,

Resolved, that we approve the "Rule of Special Consideration" for First Reading as a parliamentary procedure of the Bible Fellowship Church and the following statement placed in the *Faith & Order*:

Proposed 508-10 The Rule of Special Consideration

The Rule of Special Consideration is an action taken by the Annual Conference to expand the opportunity for review and response between presenters and Annual Conference members throughout the year. Annual Conference may require by majority vote the use of this rule by the Board or Committee to which it gives an assignment, or any Board or Committee of the Annual Conference making a proposal may seek to use this rule by implementing the guidelines for this rule in circulating its proposed material and soliciting response prior to its being published in the Report to Annual Conference.

Any proposal may be circulated and response sought prior to Annual Conference, but the use of the Rule of Special Consideration requires timely circulation and response and allows the imposition of limits on debate and amendments at Annual Conference. The Rule of Special Consideration is a subsidiary motion that may be applied to any main motion when specific guidelines have been substantially followed. This subsidiary motion is debatable. An affirmative vote on the Rule of Special Consideration means that the guidelines have been adequately followed. Approval by a 2/3 majority would limit debate and amendments as described in the "Guide to Parliamentary Procedure." Even after The Rule of Special Consideration is

approved, it may be rescinded by 2/3 vote of Annual Conference. The Rule of Exception can never be used with the Rule of Special Consideration.

Guidelines for the use of this Rule of Special Consideration are available in the "Guide to Parliamentary Procedure."

and further,

Resolved, that the following material be placed in the Bible Fellowship Church publication entitled "Guide to Parliamentary Procedure":

The Rule of Special Consideration.

The Rule of Special Consideration is an action taken by the Annual Conference to expand the opportunity for review and response between presenters and Annual Conference members throughout the year. Annual Conference may require by majority vote the use of this rule by the Board or Committee to which it gives an assignment, or any Board or Committee of the Annual Conference making a proposal may seek to use this rule by implementing the guidelines for this rule in circulating its proposed material and soliciting response prior to its being published in the Report to Annual Conference.

Any proposal may be circulated and response sought prior to Annual Conference, but the use of the Rule of Special Consideration requires timely circulation and response and allows the imposition of limits on debate and amendments at Annual Conference. The Rule of Special Consideration is a subsidiary motion that may be applied to any main motion when specific guidelines have been substantially followed. This subsidiary motion is debatable. An affirmative vote on the Rule of Special Consideration means that the guidelines have been adequately followed. Approval by a 2/3 majority would limit debate and amendments as described in the "Guide to Parliamentary Procedure." Even after The Rule of Special Consideration is approved, it may be rescinded by 2/3 vote of Annual Conference. The Rule of Exception can never be used with the Rule of Special

Consideration.

Characteristics of the Rule of Special Consideration.

- 1. It extends the opportunity for deliberation and feedback apart from Annual Conference.
- 2. Because of the expanded opportunity for deliberation and feedback, each person is allotted 3 minutes on the floor instead of the usual 10 min.
- 3. Since ample time is given to make amendments and substitutions in advance of Annual Conference, no amendments or substitutions are allowed from the floor.
- 4. Suggestions are allowed from the floor. If the presenters see the suggestion as an improvement, they may alter their statement. This may be done immediately on the floor or revised and brought back later at the same Annual Conference.
- 5. Since much more time is given for review and response apart from Annual Conference, it is reasonable to set a limit of time for debate on the floor. The time allotted for debate on the floor will be set by the presenters and shall be part of the motion.
- 6. It requires a 2/3 majority only when it immediately limits debate on the floor.
- 7. It is a rule that can be used by a board or committee of Annual Conference and may also be used by Annual Conference to direct a board or committee to use this rule of special consideration in carrying out its responsibilities.

The form of the motion and who may use it.

The Rule of Special Consideration may be used by Annual Conference to require that a board or committee use this rule for an assignment or it may be voluntarily used by a board or committee presenting proposed material to Annual Conference.

 This rule may be used by Annual Conference in making assignments. The following suggested wording would be used.

Resolved, . . . (Main Motion) and further.

Resolved, that the "Rule of Special Consideration" be employed.

When used in this way, only a simple majority is required in that debate is not limited at this time. It is not necessary to divide the question.

2. This rule may be used by boards or committees of Annual Conference presenting materials for consideration. The following suggested wording would be used.

Resolved, . . . (Main Motion) and further,

Resolved, that we use the "Rule of Special Consideration" with a time limit for debate of <u>(e.g.</u> 30) minutes.

The question must be divided. The "Rule of Special Consideration" is voted on before the Main Motion. An affirmative vote is agreement that the recommended guidelines have been substantially and adequately followed. Because this limits debate on the floor, a 2/3 majority is required to approve the "Rule of Special Consideration." The Main Motion is voted on separately and the type of motion determines the majority that is required.

Recommended Guidelines for the use of the Rule of Special Consideration.

- 1. An Annual Conference Board or Committee should send out a letter to Bible Fellowship Church pastors via the U.S. Postal Service notifying them of the intent to circulate a matter by e-mail with the desire of utilizing the Rule of Special Consideration. This letter should also encourage each pastor to verify the accuracy of the e-mail addresses of pastors and delegates from his church as subscribed to the Bible Fellowship Church e-mail group. This letter should be sent out two weeks before the statements are e-mailed.
- 2. Each church or pastor should then submit any new or change of e-mail addresses for pastors and delegates within the following two weeks.
- 3. Board or Committee disseminates statement(s) as soon as the first draft is prepared. It is preferable if numerous opportunities for exchange and feedback of information can occur prior to Annual Conference. Statements are sent to members of Annual Conference by e-mail.
- 4. The pastor is ultimately responsible to copy and circulate the communicated information to each pastor and delegate within his congregation who did not receive it via e-mail.

- 5. We urge members of Annual Conference to respond to the presenting board or committee concerning the statement(s) under consideration. Positive and negative responses are encouraged with suggestions of possible modifications. One month should be allowed for responses. Suggestions should be submitted with specific wording as an amending or substituting motion.
- 6. The presenting body should then review the feedback and revise the statement if deemed necessary.
- 7. It is advisable to start the process as early as possible so that there can be several rounds of exchange and opportunities for revision. If it is deemed advisable by the presenting body to revise the statement and if there is time to send out a revised statement, the presenting body disseminates a revised statement(s) for further review and feedback.
- 8. It would be well if suggestions submitted in a form of an amendment or substitution would be made available to Annual Conference members so all can see the proposal(s) considered by the presenting body. This may be done via the internet, e-mail, or placed as an addendum to the presenting body's report to Annual Conference which would not be published in the yearbook.
- 9. The presenting body submits final copy of report and statement(s) for publication and circulation to Annual Conference members for their further consideration prior to Annual Conference. If the suggestions submitted in the form of an amendment or substitution have not been circulated to this point, consideration should be given to attach them as an addendum to their report. Such an addendum would not be published in the yearbook. The publication deadline for this report is the date established by Annual Conference.

Report of the Committee on Credentials

The Committee on Credentials held three meetings during the year in the performance of its duties.

As a fulfillment of our requirements concerning our involvement in the military chaplaincy program, Keith E. Plows represented the Committee on Credentials at the NACMAF Convention in Washington, DC in December. It should be noted that David H. Jones, Army Reserve Chaplain, was called up to active duty. Let us remember to pray for him in these unsettling times.

The Faith and Order questionnaire was sent to each of the ministers holding Ordination Credentials with the Bible Fellowship Church. All of the brethren returned their questionnaire except: W. Neil Harding, Jr., Robert N. Gordon and Thomas S. MacMillan. The Committee is well satisfied with the responses of those who handed in their questionnaires. The Committee will communicate with those who have not returned their Questionnaire.

The following changes in status were approved:

Richard J. Gehman was changed from <u>Ordained Ministers</u> <u>Under the Direction of the Board of Missions</u> to <u>Ordained Ministers in Retirement</u>.

Alva C. Cassel was changed from <u>Ordained Ministers Under the Direction of the Bible Fellowship Church</u> to <u>Ordained Ministers in Retirement</u>.

D. Thomas Phillips was changed from <u>Ordained Ministers</u> <u>Under the Direction of the Bible Fellowship Church</u> to <u>Ordained Ministers in Retirement</u>.

Jeffrey L. Ruhl was changed from <u>Ordained Ministers Under</u> the <u>Direction of the Bible Fellowship Church</u> to <u>Ordained Ministers</u> on <u>Leave of Absence</u>.

David J. Watkins was changed from <u>Ordained Ministers Under</u> the <u>Direction of the Bible Fellowship Church</u> to <u>Ordained Ministers</u> in <u>Retirement</u>.

The committee met with W. David Armstrong, Jr. during the year to counsel and direct him through his disobedience to the

Word of God in the area of purity by pursuing a relationship outside his marriage. The committee passed this resolution August 29,2002:

- <u>Whereas</u>, W. David Armstrong, Jr. has confessed to the sin of improper moral conduct, and
- <u>Whereas</u>, he has expressed his sorrow and willingness to be reconciled to his Lord, his wife and his children, and
- Whereas, we sense a repentant attitude, therefore be it
- **Resolved**, that in accordance with the *Faith & Order* (sec. 512.11.2), we suspend the credentials of W. David Armstrong, Jr. for an indefinite period of time, and further
- **Resolved**, that his name be dropped from the list of men eligible to receive a call to pulpit supply in the Bible Fellowship Church, and further
- **Resolved**, that W. David Armstrong, Jr. submit to the restoration process as directed by the Committee on Credentials of the Bible Fellowship Church.

The committee created an accountability team made up of two elders from the Harleysville BFC, one member of the Committee on Credentials and the Conference Pastor. After a period of time, it became evident that our brother was not repentant of his sin and was unwilling to submit to the counsel of the accountability team. It became our sorrowful duty to pass the following resolution January 23, 2003:

- Whereas, the Committee on Credentials is given the responsibility to "have oversight of all men who hold credentials with Annual Conference" in the Bible Fellowship Church, and
- <u>Whereas</u>, W. David Armstrong, Jr. has chosen to be disobedient to the Word of God in the area of purity by pursuing a relationship outside of his marriage, and
- <u>Whereas</u>, the Committee on Credentials has interviewed and counseled W. David Armstrong, Jr. to be reconciled with his Lord and his wife and family, and
- Whereas, he has been assigned to an accountability group

- which consists of two pastors and two elders, and
- <u>Whereas</u>, W. David Armstrong, Jr., has, by his behavior, disregarded the counsel of the Committee on Credentials and the accountability team by continuing to pursue a life contrary to the Biblical mandates of purity and loving his wife as Christ loves the church, therefore be it
- Resolved, that, with great sorrow and anguish of spirit, the Bible Fellowship Church credentials of W. David Armstrong, Jr. be removed, and be it further
- **Resolved**, that we commit ourselves to pray for our brother that he be reconciled to Christ and to his family.

The Committee met with four men for ordination examination. The Credentials Committee gives thanks to our Lord and Savior, Jesus Christ, Who has given these gifted men for the ministry of the Bible Fellowship Church.

- Whereas, the Ministerial Candidate Committee has recommended David T. Allen for ordination; and
- Whereas, the Ministerial Candidate Committee has recommended prior ordination recognition for C. Larry Bennett, Arthur J. Simpson, Jr., and John R. Stover; and
- Whereas, these brethren have served acceptably as ministers of the Bible Fellowship Church for the required period of time or the equivalent thereof; and
- Whereas, after examination, the Credentials Committee believes these men to be called of God to the gospel ministry and to be in accord with the *Faith & Order* of the Bible Fellowship Church: therefore be it
- **Resolved**, that David T. Allen be ordained to the gospel ministry of the Bible Fellowship Church and further;
- Resolved, that the prior ordination of C. Larry Bennett, Arthur J. Simpson, Jr., and John R. Stover to the gospel ministry be recognized by the Bible Fellowship Church and further;
- Resolved, that the service of ordination be held Monday, May 19, 2003 at 7:30 p.m. at Cedar Crest Bible Fellowship Church, Allentown, PA.

Report of the Bible Fellowship Board of Directors

The Board of Directors of the Bible Fellowship Church held four regular meetings to attend to corporate business related to Annual Conference, to agencies, and to churches.

The Board provided oversight, advice, and assistance in respect to fiscal, legal and property acquisition and disposal as follows: Annual Conference, medical insurance, administrative budget, Board of Church Extension, and Board of Directors of Bible Fellowship Church Homes, Inc..

Discussion regarding revision of the relationship between Bible Fellowship Church and Bible Fellowship Church Homes, Inc., continued in 2002 and led to the legislation to be presented to the one hundred twentieth Annual Conference by Bible Fellowship Church Homes, Inc. This legislation has been reviewed by the Board of Directors of Bible Fellowship Church and we recommend the approval of this legislation by the Annual Conference.

The Board is studying issues concerning church employees and will be making recommendations to churches concerning procedures and other employment matters in the coming year. During 2002 American Insuring Group, LTD, was chosen as agent of record for Bible Fellowship Church-sponsored health insurance plans. Policy holders with questions or concerns should contact Mr. David Ross who administers the program for American Insuring Group, LTD. Rev. James A. Beil represents the Board of Directors as liaison with Mr. Ross and is available to pastors and churches as needed.

We recommend that legislation submitted to the 119th Annual Conference by the Board of Directors and approved at first reading (2002 yearbook pages 38-40)) be approved at second reading by the 120th Annual Conference.

All funds are deposited in First Union Bank. Accounts were audited by Allen A. Perry.

We recommend that the 120th Annual Conference adopt the following:

Resolved, that the rate of mileage reimbursement for conference business conducted in 2003 be 24¢ per mile.

Resolved, that the Administrative Budget for January 1, 2003 to December 31, 2003 be adopted.

Resolved, that the Administrative Budget for January 1, 2004 to December 31, 2004 be approved for submission to the churches for their pledges.

Pledges for the 2004 Administrative Budget shall be received by the financial secretary by September 1, 2003.

The Committee makes the following recommendations to the 120th Annual Conference:

Resolved, that the recommended minimum salary for a pastor serving in the BFC, including Social Security, be \$28,200.00. In addition to his salary, housing allowance, health insurance and retirement must be provided, and provision should be made for reimbursements for car and professional expenses.

Resolved, that the salary for the Conference Pastor be \$26,000.00, and in addition we provide \$6,000.00 for car and professional expenses and \$4,320.00 for health insurance.

Resolved, that the following legislation be presented to Annual Conference for 1st Reading:

Replacing Faith and Order 409 - 1.2 (6) with

(6) In the process of the Nominating Committee determining the candidate they believe to be their choice, the candidate shall interview with the Board of Elders in order to gain the approval of the Board of Elders.

Add

(7) Upon approval of the Board of Elders, the Nominating Committee shall be informed that a Congregational meeting may now be called for the purpose of acting on the report of the Nominating Committee. Public notice of the time, place, and purpose of the meeting shall be given at no fewer than three prior regularly-scheduled meetings. (Subsequent paragraph renumbered to 8)

Resolved, that the words "Nominating Committee" be changed to "Pastoral Search Committee" in §409 of the *Faith & Order*.

The committee's work and oversight has been greatly enhanced by the ministry of our Conference Pastor, Ronald C. Mahurin. Brother Mahurin reports to our committee and gives us updates as to his ministry. This past year we have met with the Pastoral Search Committee from the following Pennsylvania churches: Quakertown, Gratersford, Harleysville and Mt. Carmel, as well as Howell, NJ, and Holmes, NY.

- 1. Developing Guidelines for the Pastoral Salary.
- 2. Developing Guidelines for the Pastoral Relations Committee in the local church.
- 3. Developing Guidelines for the relationship of retiring pastors and their churches.

Report of the Board of Church Extension

The Board of Church Extension has continued in 2002 its work of beginning new churches. Our purpose is to proclaim the gospel and start new congregations to the glory of God. "For from him and through him and to him are all things. To Him be the glory forever! Amen" (Romans 11:36).

The Board has met quarterly to oversee this work. In addition, committees of the Board have met as needed to create policy and procedures, to oversee personnel and to oversee the purchase, sale and maintenance of properties. The Board is thankful for the leadership of David Gundrum, our Executive Director, David has shown great initiative and enthusiasm for visiting the established churches to present the work of Church Extension and to oversee the Church Extension Mission Churches and Churches. In addition, Ruth Richards has been of great value in her work in the Church Extension office. Carol Snyder, Special Projects Assistant; John Pello, Outreach Assistant; and Chris Merrick, Ministry and Work Team Coordinator, provided valuable support to the team. Ray Bertolet, former TransWorld Radio Missionary on Guam, has been called to be Assistant Church Planter. He is now serving with the DelMarVa project. The Board is grateful for all those who are partners in this work through prayer, financial support, and volunteer service in the Mission Churches and Churches. Please continue to pray for the work of Church Extension in the Bible Fellowship Church.

This year both the Hellertown, PA and Rehoboth, DE works began public worship services. Pray for these works as they seek to grow and develop as churches.

The church in Newark is raising money and beginning to make plans for construction of a worship center on its property.

The Walnutport Church graduated from the department in 2002.

Partnering teams called "Aquila and Priscilla Teams" were established. Presently we have three couples and several individuals from our Churches who are partnering with our Mission Churches and helping them get established.

The Policy and Strategy Committee of the Board has developed the Team Structure Booklet, which defines the various organizational entities that make up the work of Church Extension. A copy of this booklet can be obtained through the Church Extension Office.

With regret the Board of Church Extension has decided to discontinue its financial support of the Scranton Church after ten years of support and oversight. The Ministerial Relations Committee is working with the Scranton elders in providing care for Pastor Reitz and direction for the future of the church. We are thankful for Roger's years of ministry in the Church Extension Department.

With great sorrow the Board of Church Extension has removed W. David Armstrong from its members. David's term is being filled by Ken Keeler.

The Property Committee of the Board provided oversight for the completion of the sale of the Staten Island property and has initiated proceedings for the purchase of eight acres of land for the Lewes/Rehoboth mission in Delaware. In addition, the Ocean County Church has obtained property during 2002. They have done extensive work in remodeling and renovating the property. We praise God for his provision.

The Task Force, which has explored the opportunity to form one mission board comprising the Board of Church Extension and the Board of Missions, has recommended that we not make this a priority at this time. The Board of Missions has presented a resolution to withdraw the proposals concerning the Great Commission Ministries. We support this resolution and will continue to pursue further cooperative efforts.

Report of the Board of Missions

In one of the final visions of Ezekiel, he watched a trickle of water from under the threshold of the temple become a mighty torrent. This impressive river has healing powers that turns even the Dead Sea into an active and potent fishing source with every kind of fish being caught. (Ez. 47:1ff)

This truly is a vision of what God is doing in this world today. The harvest that is taking place around the world easily compares to the great catch of fish from the Dead Sea! Therefore to write a report of the happenings of last year would be as useless as printing a page from last year's newspaper. It would be like capturing a cup of water from the surging river Ezekiel saw and attempting to explain its Divinely curative properties that heals everything in its path.

Rather than give you old news and information, allow me to give you resources to keep your church abreast of what is happening in missions in order that you may have the most current BFC information for prayer and partnership.

1. Prayer Calendar.

The Prayer Calendar can now provide your congregation prayer information that is current. We have attempted to keep the lag time between receiving requests from missionaries and printing the Calendar to a very few short weeks. This is in contrast to a three month delay that was part of the original prayer calendar. Electronic E-mail has made this possible. Also included in this document are the latest missionary address changes and BOM news.

2. Daily Prayer.

Daily Prayer is a daily e-mail you can receive that allows you to not only view the Prayer Calendar request for the day, but also receive up-to-the-minute news and prayer requests from the field.

3. Friday Prayer

This is an in-depth prayer document produced each Friday and sent by e-mail. This document, meant for missionary-to-missionary communication, is also available to a select group of other prayer partners.

4. Let's Fish.

This is a newsletter, produced each Wednesday intended to keep those interested in short term missionary trips and possible career missionary involvement on the cutting edge. It is a tool for the exchange of ideas as well as prayer and ministry opportunities. This document enjoys a readership from ages 14 years thru adult, and backgrounds that include pastors, missionaries, youth leaders, mission chairpersons, laymen, and students.

5. BFC BOM Website.

Started this year, the website is quickly becoming a focal point of information needed by everyone interested in missions and the BFC. This site continues to grow with information useful for both the church leadership and ones seeking God's direction for possible service through the BOM. You can log on to the site at www:bfcbom.org.

6. Seminars.

The BOM offers to the BFC churches a host of informational resources.

Global Focus seminars provide an intensive weekend course that begins with understanding Biblical principles and God's heart for His world and then gives many cutting edge applications for becoming a world-wise church with balanced outreach ministry from your "Jerusalem" to the uttermost parts of the world.

Knowing God's Will seminars are conducted each year on a denominational level in a Fall RWR held at Pinebrook, but are also useful as a weekend course for a youth group in a local church setting.

P.O.M. (Parents of Missionary) Retreats. This weekend retreat seminar is designed to keep the parents of our missionaries on track with the ministry of their sons and daughters (and grandchildren) overseas.

Culture Link Seminars is a program that prepares your short-term missionary teams to be fully prepared for ministry. This is a necessary seminar for any church serious about getting the most from a cross-cultural experience.

Speaker Resource. The office personnel remain available for mission emphasis in local congregations. This includes all stated public worship services, Sunday School, mission conferences, and special events. The office also provides a complete listing of all missionaries that are available during the times of your missionary event needs.

Mentoring Services are provided to assist a church's board of elders and missions committee in developing a comprehensive, long range and balanced outreach plan that uses every member in God's global cause.

7. Office activities.

The office remains the hub for donor and church information and financial processing. Churches receive the necessary information to kept abreast of the financial needs of the entire missionary family. Addresses and birthdays are keep up to date for missionary committees and societies. Receipting of financial donations are meticulously recorded for both the donor's and the missionary's records.

The members of the board and the home office thank you for your continued sacrificial giving to the needs of our missionary family. We remind you that the operations of the office are completely dependent upon the financial partnership of the BFC.

Found elsewhere in this report are the financial and statistical information that will give you a glimpse of what God is doing. An updated list of all the missionaries and sending boards is also in the Annual Conference Yearbook.

The minutes of the final meeting of the Task Force created by the Board of Missions and the Board of Church Extension are provided in the Addendum. The resolutions have been approved by both of the boards to be offered to the Annual Conference.

Addendum Task Force Report

The Task Force of the Board of Missions and the Board of Church Extension met at the agreed upon time of 10:00am at the office of the Board of Missions on Thursday, January 16, 2003.

Present were Dana E. Weller, Ralph M. Soper, David E. Gundrum and Richard E. Taylor.

The report of the independent committee reviewing the work of the Task Force was discussed. The Task Force agrees that, while the committee has suggested that the plan for Great Commission Ministries not go forward at this time, much positive material for discussion has been generated.

David E. Gundrum submitted a list of positive factors from the issues considered by the Task Force:

- 1. A new level of cooperation between BOM and BCE
- 2. A new focus on helping struggling churches
- 3. A new way to administrate in a combined way
- 4. A new denominational administrative center
- 5. A more comprehensive view of church planting as a BFC focus
- 6. The involvement of more people in BFC missions
- 7. A motivation for greater corporate structure in the BFC
- 8. A positive move beyond "territorialism" and mistrust by the BOM and BCE

The following will be submitted to the two boards for their approval:

- Whereas, An independent committee has reviewed the work of the Task Force comprised of representatives of the Board of Missions and the Board of Church Extension, and
- Whereas, this committee is of the opinion that a merger of the two boards should not be a priority at this time, and
- Whereas, The two boards are in agreement that the consultation of these boards has produced many positive concepts for future development among which are the following:
 - -A new emphasis on cooperation between the Board of Missions and the Board of Church Extension

- -The advantage of sharing denominational facilities and administration
- -The need to provide a support network for struggling churches

Report of the Board of Pensions

Ministers' Retirement Fund (MRF) annuity payments to the 34 current beneficiaries rose to approximately \$196,000 in 2002 (compared to \$186,000 in 2001: see Income Statement). There are 11 future beneficiaries of the MRF, the youngest of which will begin receiving benefits at age 65 in the year 2013. Based on the current mortality assumptions, the final year of MRF payments to beneficiaries is projected to be 2035. Between now and then, it is estimated that the MRF will distribute future benefits totaling nearly \$4,300,000. The Present Value lump sum cost of funding these future annual benefits is \$2,350,000. The present balance in the MRF is just over \$123,000 (see Balance Sheet). Therefore, in round numbers, the present value shortfall is approximately \$2,227,000, which is being funded by contributions from the Administrative Budget and the churches (see discussion below).

Interest-Bearing Notes: The near-term liquidity shortfall illustrated in the Report Book for the 119th Annual Conference (April, 2002) will be funded by the issuance of interest-bearing notes, as approved by the 119th Annual Conference. As illustrated in the accompanying graph, it is anticipated that the Board of Pensions will issue \$40,000 worth of interest-bearing notes on an annual basis for the next 6 years.

These 5-year notes will pay annual interest at a rate that is 2.5% higher than the current rate of a 5-year U.S. Treasury Note at the time of issue. The notes will be issued in face amounts of \$10,000, and can be redeemed or renewed at the end of each 5-year period. The Board of Pensions will offer these notes first to the agencies of the Bible Fellowship Church. In the future, when there would not be adequate agency resources, these notes would be offered to the churches on an annual lottery basis. Notes will not be offered to individuals. It is anticipated that there will be adequate agency participation to cover the years of 2003 and 2004.

As illustrated in the accompanying graph, it is projected that the notes can be paid off between 2015 and 2020. However, as noted over the past several years, future projections are heavily dependent on the mortality assumptions.

Annual Funding: The Board of Pensions is requesting a contribution from the Administrative Budget in the amount of \$55,000 for 2004, and \$57,000 for 2005. As approved at the 119th Annual Conference, the rate for churches is currently \$8.00 per member plus \$800. Projected contributions from the Administrative Budget and the churches are shown in the accompanying tables.

The Board of Pensions recommends the following resolutions to Annual Conference:

- Whereas, the MRF annuity rate for 2003 is \$208 per year of service, and
- <u>Whereas</u>, partial cost-of-living adjustments are part of the long-term phaseout strategy of the MRF, therefore be it
- **Resolved**, that the MRF annuity rate for calendar year 2004 be \$209 per year of service.

Resolution Relating to Rental/Housing Allowances for Retired or Disabled Ministers of this Conference for Calendar Year 2003

- <u>Whereas</u>, the religious denomination known as The Bible Fellowship Church has and functions through Ministers of the Gospel who are duly ordained or licensed; and
- <u>Whereas</u>, the practice of The Bible Fellowship Church is to provide a parsonage or a rental allowance as part of the gross compensation for each of its active ordained or licensed ministers; and
- Whereas, pensions paid to retired and disabled ordained or licensed ministers of The Bible Fellowship Church are considered as deferred compensation and are paid to said retired and disabled ordained or licensed ministers in consideration of previous, active service; and
- Whereas, the Internal Revenue Service has recognized that The Bible Fellowship Church is the appropriate organization to designate a housing/rental allowance for retired and disabled ordained or licensed ministers who are members of this Conference;

Resolved.

1. An amount equal to 100% of the pension payments

received during the year of 2003 be and is hereby designated as a rental/housing allowance for each retired and disabled ordained or licensed minister of The Bible Fellowship Church who is or was a member of the Bible Fellowship Church Minister's Retirement Fund.

- 2. This rental/housing allowance shall apply to each retired and disabled ordained or licensed minister who has been granted the retired relationship or placed on disability leave by the Bible Fellowship Annual Conference and whose name and relationship to the conference is recorded in the Journal of The Bible Fellowship Annual Conference and in other appropriate records maintained by the conference.
- 3. The pension payment to which this rental/housing allowance applies shall be the pension payment resulting from all service of such retired or disabled ordained or licensed ministers from all employment by any local church, Annual Conference or institution of The Bible Fellowship Church or of any former denomination that is now a part of The Bible Fellowship Church, or from any other employer who employed the minister to perform services related to the ministry and who elected to make contributions to the pension funds of The Bible Fellowship Church for such a retired minister's pension.

Note: The rental/housing allowance which may be excluded from a minister's gross income is limited to the lesser of (1) the amount of the rental/housing allowance designated by the minister's employer or other appropriate body, (2) the amount actually expended by the minister to provide his or her housing, or (3) the legally-determined fair rental value of the parsonage or other housing provided. As specified in Rev. Resolution Relating to Rental/Housing Allowances for Retired or Disabled Ministers of this Conference for Calendar Year 2004

- Whereas, the religious denomination known as The Bible Fellowship Church has and functions through Ministers of the Gospel who are duly ordained or licensed; and
- Whereas, the practice of The Bible Fellowship Church is to provide a parsonage or a rental allowance as part of the gross compensation for each of its active ordained or licensed ministers; and
- Whereas, pensions paid to retired and disabled ordained or licensed ministers of The Bible Fellowship Church are considered as deferred compensation and are paid to said retired and disabled ordained or licensed ministers in consideration of previous, active service; and
- Whereas, the Internal Revenue Service has recognized that The Bible Fellowship Church is the appropriate organization to designate a housing/rental allowance for retired and disabled ordained or licensed ministers who are members of this Conference;

Resolved,

- 1. An amount equal to 100% of the pension payments received during the year of 2004 be and is hereby designated as a rental/housing allowance for each retired and disabled ordained or licensed minister of The Bible Fellowship Church who is or was a member of the Bible Fellowship Church Minister's Retirement Fund.
- 2. This rental/housing allowance shall apply to each retired and disabled ordained or licensed minister who has been granted the retired relationship or placed on disability leave by the Bible Fellowship Annual Conference and whose name and relationship to the conference is recorded in the Journal of The Bible Fellowship Annual Conference and in other appropriate records maintained by the conference.
- 3. The pension payment to which this rental/housing allowance applies shall be the pension payment resulting from all service of such retired or disabled ordained or licensed ministers from all employment by any local

church, Annual Conference or institution of The Bible Fellowship Church or of any former denomination that is now a part of The Bible Fellowship Church, or from any other employer who employed the minister to perform services related to the ministry and who elected to make contributions to the pension funds of The Bible Fellowship Church for such a retired minister's pension.

Note: The rental/housing allowance which may be excluded from a minister's gross income is limited to the lesser of (1) the amount of the rental/housing allowance designated by the minister's employer or other appropriate body, (2) the amount actually expended by the minister to provide his or her housing, or (3) the legally-determined fair rental value of the parsonage or other housing provided. As specified in Rev. Rul. 71-290 C.B. 92, "the only amount that will qualify for exclusion under section 107(2) of the Code as a 'rental allowance' is an amount equal to the fair rental value of the home, including furnishings and appurtenances such as a garage, plus the cost of utilities."



The results of these assumptions can be seen on the accompanying graph titled "Long-Term Projection of Account Balances". There is enough long-term cash flow from the churches and from the Administrative Budget to provide all of the benefit payments to the retirees. The liquidity shortage from 2006 to 2015 will be covered by issuing interest bearing notes on a periodic basis, as approved at Annual Conference in 2002. This will "bridge" the near-term liquidity shortfall. Repayments are projected to begin in the year 2015 and be complete by 2020.

The ASSUMPTIONS shown above reflect the current strategy of the Board of Pensions. Annual adjustments will be made according to actual rates of inflation and investment return, as well as

Report of the Executive Director of Church Extension Ministries

...Your God reigns! Listen! Your watchman lift up their voices, they shout joyfully together; for they will see with their own eyes(eye to eye)... Isaiah 52:7,8

News had come to the Jews in Zion of the Persian victory over Babylon. The messenger coming over the mountains gave the shout of victory, but not so much with a focus on the freedom, which the captives would experience from the defeat of Babylon, but rather the declaration that God is the victor, *Your God is God almighty over all things and is King!* One great outcome of God's victory was the redemption of His people, "...he has redeemed Jerusalem" vs. 9. And a second great outcome was that God had accomplished this great victory in "the sight of all the nations; that all the ends of the earth may see the salvation of our God" vs. 10.

Our God is a missionary God with a redemptive purpose of saving His elect from every tongue tribe and nation and from our Jerusalems onto the foreign soils of the world. He displays His sovereign greatness and victorious Kingship through the means of the church's proclamation and church planting. This year, Annual Conference will further discuss a strategic vision of "extending" the Bible Fellowship Church. It would be easy to become caught up in the theory of such a statement, but in reality, if this denomination is going to be a strategic part of building up the kingdom of God by means of extension, then we need to have the vision of God as our victorious redeeming King. His victorious glory is manifested to the nations when sinners are redeemed and churches planted for the purpose of making obedient and committed disciples of His Son.

This past year I took this message to many of our churches, following up on previous visits and reinforcing the need for this denomination to proclaim the Gospel, see people saved, and plant churches where these new believers can be made into disciples. I was blessed in being able to visit with over forty churches this past year and spend some valuable time participating in a number of Missions Conferences. I also organized meetings with our Regions

and was able to present our strategic plan, "The Plan To Plant," to all but one Region. There was good response to the Plan and some good suggestions taken for consideration. There were several goals stated in the Plan and I would like to give you an update on our progress toward accomplishing the goals. The goals were to be accomplished by the end of 2004:

- To hold meetings to present the Plan To Plant in each Region. This is almost accomplished with one Region remaining.
- To facilitate the start of three daughter churches. The Hellertown Mission Church was a cooperative effort with the Coopersburg BFC and has now become a part of Church Extension. Recently I discussed a daughter church plant with Newark, DE BFC, as a part of the DELMARVA Project. Two other churches have shown interest in daughter church planting and I will be working with these churches to see if it is the Lord's will for them.
- To establish three new Mission Churches. We have launched the Hellertown and Rehoboth/Long Neck Mission Churches and will look to open two more Mission Churches as a part of the DELMARVA Project in 2003 and 2004.
- To have six Mission Churches received into Annual Conference. New Community Bible Fellowship Church was taken into Annual Conference and this year the Thompson, CT Mission Church will be received. In 2004 we hope to have the Newark, NJ, Hellertown and South Allentown, PA and Rehoboth/Long Neck Mission Churches received.
- To have two or more Churches in our Mission become self-supporting. This past year the Walnutport BFC was fully self-supporting and graduated from Church Extension. We are working with the Aberdeen Church and will hopefully be able to graduate the church by the end of 2003. We will also be preparing the Ocean County, NJ Church for graduation at the end of 2004.
- To establish an Hispanic Mission Church in Lancaster, PA in conjunction with the Joint Committee on Ethnic Church planting. We have not only assisted the Ethnic

Committee with a possible Hispanic plant in Lancaster, PA but also worked with the Berks County, PA Region and a possible plant in Reading, PA.

As you can determine, we are on track with reaching the goals of the Plan To Plant. This has been accomplished through the prayers and support of our committed partners and the increased interest and participation from the BFC Churches. The support from the churches is vital and necessary. There is a direct correlation between the success of the Mission of Church Extension and the extension of the BFC to the degree of support and interest that the BFC Churches give to our Mission of reaching people with the Gospel and planting new churches. I want to direct your attention to an Addendum to this report titled, *Church Extension Activity Chart.* You will see in this how we have charted our course for the next several years and where my focus and work will be concentrated.

Here is a report of what has been accomplished this past year in Church Extension.

RECAPPING 2002 - "TAKING THE LIGHT TO THE LOST"

- 33 people were saved and 31 baptized in the Mission Churches and Churches.
- Two new Missions were launched: Hellertown, PA under the leadership of Stephen C. Mann, and Rehoboth/Long Neck, DE under the leadership of Kenneth F. Barber.
- Thousands of Gospels and evangelistic literature were distributed during our outreaches, demographic surveys in new communities, and door-to-door.
- We were able to pay all our bills and we are thankful for all those who partnered with us in support of this vital Mission.
- The Ocean County, NJ Church, acquired a new building and work proceeded on the building of a new meeting place in Newark, NJ.
- The BFC Churches and individuals increased their financial support and interest in Church Extension.
- We sent two men to Church Planters Boot Camp training in the summer: Willis I. Dowling and Timothy J. Schmoyer.
- Tom Morrison was our Summer Intern to the Las Cruces Mission Church and is going through evaluation for assisting Pastor Becker at Las Cruces.
- I attended 16 BFC Missions Conferences and Missions gatherings


- and was in 40 churches presenting our work the past year.
- We worked with the Ethnic Church Planting Committee and gained the approval of the Capitol Consortium for an Hispanic Church Planting Project in Lancaster and also helped establish the Berks County Hispanic Task Force.
- Raymond Bertolet, former missionary to Guam with TWR, was called to be our Assistant Church Planter in the DELMARVA PROJECT.
- John Pello continued as Outreach Assistant and worked primarily with Elliot Ramos and Steve Mann. John reached many people this past year with the Gospel and led a number of individuals to the Lord.
- Ruth Richards, our Administrative Assistant, took on many projects and was a tremendous asset to Church Extension.
- Carol Snyder remained active in the Mission and handled the production of our monthly newsletter, "The Extension Call," along with the "It Happened Like This" publication.
- We interviewed six men who are considering church planting.
- Our Policy & Strategy Committee worked at developing a Policy Manual. Work on this continues and may be completed this year.
- The Thompson, CT Mission Church presented two men for elder assessment who were approved by our Board. The Thompson, CT Mission Church will be recognized as a "Particular Church" at this year's Annual Conference.
- The Walnutport Church graduated from Church Extension fully supported and is doing well.
- The Board of Church Extension resolved, after an extensive evaluation process, to disengage from the Scranton Church and turn over the Church to the care of the Ministerial Relations Committee.
- I served on the Ministerial Candidate Committee and had the privilege to attend a number of Regional Meetings of our Pastors.
- I served on the Inter-Cultural Ministries Study Committee and worked on a plan for presenting the Biblical Principles For Living to Annual Conference.
- We completed the sale of the Staten Island, NY and the Somers Point, NJ properties.
- A new "Team Structure" was drafted for new Mission Churches.
 We were able to implement the "Coaching" aspect of TEAM at the Chesapeake Mission Church with Willis I. Dowling being coached by a former successful church planter.

- At the end of the year, we began a plan to purchase property for the Rehoboth Mission Church that will act as a hub for the DELMARVA PROJECT.
- I served on our Personnel Committee and participated in the annual evaluation meetings with our men.
- I continued to work with the Board of Foreign Missions in investigating ways the two Mission Boards can cooperate with each other.
- The "Aquila & Priscilla" partnerships were encouraged and implemented this past year. We currently have four couples involved in these partnerships.

I think that each of us has our own sort of wish list when it comes to ministry or to put it more spiritually, "priority prayer desires." My priority prayer desires are that the Bible Fellowship Church would be unified with a common focus of reaching people with the Gospel and planting new churches to make disciples. There are still churches that give little attention to the vital Mission of Church Extension and supply very little or even no financial support to Church Extension. It will be impossible to reach the denomination's goals for extending the BFC if church planting in our Jerusalems, Judeas and Samarias is neglected. May our God, who reigns over His Church and calls His Church to be one, grant us unity of purpose in the days before He returns.

I praise God for the privilege it is to serve the Sovereign King of the Universe. All glory to Him! Please pray for me in 2003, that I will be a servant to the BFC and the Board of Church Extension. Pray that God will give me wisdom. Pray for our Team: Ruth Richards and the vast amount of work she has the responsibility of overseeing, Carol Snyder and her duties, John Pello as he works along side our Church Planters, and Ray Bertolet as he assists in church planting. Finally, pray for our men and their families who serve in the Church Extension Ministries. They are the true sacrificial servant missionaries on the home front.

Report of the Board of Higher Education

During the 2002 calendar year, the Board of Higher Education (BHE) has met four times, for a total of twenty-nine times since its inception in the Fall of 1994. The BHE continues to oversee the work of the Pinebrook Educational Foundation (PEF), to develop working relationships with Biblical Theological Seminary (Biblical), and to consider how else it might foster higher education in the BFC.

The Pinebrook Educational Foundation

The Board of Directors of the PEF for the past year was as follows:

Term expiring in 2005: Stephen C. Cassel, Jessica Sterner Term expiring in 2004: Raymond R. Dotts, Jay H. Fasnacht Term expiring in 2003: Gary E. Karch, Robert C. Newman

The report of the PEF is appended to the report of the BHE.

Working Relationships with Biblical Theological Seminary

In the past year, the BHE has been working on two projects involving Biblical: (1) a BFC chaplain who would visit Biblical regularly to counsel students and encourage some of them to consider service with the BFC; and (2) an internship program in which BF churches would take pastoral interns from Biblical.

1. Since 1999, retired BFC missionary Ed Moyer has served (under BHE auspices) as BFC chaplain to students at Biblical Seminary. As noted in our previous report, changed demographics at Biblical—commuting, part-time students and block-scheduling—have made it impossible to have access to most of the students with occasional visits to the school. Ed has been doing a fine job under these circumstances, but we have not had much success in solving this problem. We appreciate Ed's enthusiasm and willing spirit. For the spring term of 2003, with a total

enrollment of about 300, Biblical has six students from BF churches.

2. The pastoral internship machinery for BF churches at Biblical Seminary is up and running and can be used by interested churches at any time. Currently, no BF churches are availing themselves of this opportunity.

BFC College Fair

Thanks especially to the hard work of our BHE member Dr. Claude Gates, the BHE was able to sponsor a college fair connecting BFC college-bound students and their parents with various Christian colleges. The fair was held at Cedar Crest BFC on October 4-5. Some 240 parents and their children attended, representing 28 churches (21 BF churches), 2 Christian schools, and 4 home schools. Sixteen Christian colleges were represented (of about 30 contacted). The colleges had tables with representatives and their displays. A couple of other organizations were also represented. Presentations on financing a college education were given by financial aid officers from two of the schools, and on handling the intellectual challenges at both secular and Christian colleges by Mark Potter of Green Tree Ministries. A concert was provided by musical groups from a couple of the schools. The BHE felt the fair went quite well, given it was a first try, and we are planning to have another Oct 3-4, 2003 at Calvary BFC in Coopersburg.

Other Ways of Promoting Higher Education in the BFC

The BHE has often taken time at the end of our meetings for wide-ranging discussions on promoting higher education in the BFC. These discussions have included a number of topics: (1) how to get the BHE and PEF better known in the BFC; (2) how to encourage talented Christian young people in our churches to seek higher education so as to serve the Lord more effectively in whatever vocation He has called them to; (3) how to help Christian students at secular colleges not only survive but thrive as Christians in such an environment; (4) how to encourage BF pastors to get

advanced education to strengthen their ministry; (5) how to reach out to students and faculty at colleges and universities that are in the vicinity of our BF churches; and (6) how to reach out to foreign students in these schools who will return to their own countries, so that they may be even more effective missionaries than those who must learn a foreign culture.

Our main progress this year has been in (2) with the first of our (hopefully annual) college fairs, in (5) encouraging the work of John Studenroth in his Collegiate Outreach ministry, and in (3) having Mark Potter speak at our College Fair.

Brothers, we thank you again for praying for us this past year. The Lord is moving among us. Pray that we will desire His agenda, not ours, and that He may use us to strengthen the BFC in understanding our times and in reaching the lost.

Pinebrook Educational Foundation 2002 Annual Report to the Board of Higher Education

The Board of Directors of the Pinebrook Educational Foundation met three times in 2002.

The Foundation received payment of the previously-reported bequest of \$71,988.72 from the Charles D. Weaver Estate. The Board established the Charles D. Weaver Memorial Scholarship Fund in the amount of \$60,000 as a board-designated endowment. The remainder of the bequest, \$11,988.72, remains in the undesignated operating funds primarily to pay for legal expenses relating to the bequest and revisions to denominational legislation relating to the Foundation.

The Foundation also received other gifts which totaled \$6,255.11, including a final unrestricted payment of \$2,655.11 from the Charles D. Weaver Estate which has tentatively been classified as undesignated operating funds.

Other significant Board actions are described below:

- 1. Approved payment of legal bills relating to the Weaver bequest and revisions to legislation, not to exceed \$12,000. Payment will take place in 2003.
- Added a \$1,000 unrestricted gift received from Royal and Charlotte Kramer to the Charles D. Weaver Memorial Scholarship Fund. Charlotte Kramer is the daughter of Charles D. Weaver.
- 3. Classified the Granda bequest of \$4,070.90 received in 2001 as funds board-designated for general scholarships.
- 4. Reclassified the loan fund as undesignated operating funds.
- 5. Granted scholarships as follows:
 - a. \$500 to Timothy Bertolet from the Rev. and Mrs. R.
 C. Reichenbach Scholarship Fund. Timothy attends Westminster Theological Seminary.
 - b. \$500 to Nathan Shorb from the Berean Bible School Scholarship Endowment Fund. Nathan attends Taylor University.
 - c. \$500 to Timothy Zuck from the temporarily-restricted General Scholarship Fund. Timothy attends Lancaster Bible College.
 - d. \$500 to Luke Brush from the temporarily-restricted General Scholarship Fund. Luke attends Liberty University.
 - e. \$500 to Peter Morrison from the board-designated General Scholarship Fund. Peter attends Asbury College.
 - f. \$500 to Davin Orlowski from the board-designated General Scholarship Fund. Davin attends Philadelphia Biblical University.
- 6. Approved payment of \$250 to cover the costs of the College Fair sponsored by the Board of Higher Education on October 4 and 5, 2002.

Report of the Inter-Cultural Ministries Study Committee

The Inter-Cultural Ministries Study Committee continued its work on completing The Biblical Principles For Living. This year we present the *Preamble* and eight of The Biblical Principles For Living for second reading. You will be receiving, with your Report Book, a separate Booklet containing The Biblical Principles For Living.

The Biblical Principles For Living presented for second reading have been edited, reviewed, approved by the Committee, and are presented to the Annual Conference for approval. They will be included in the *Faith & Order*, replacing the Standards Of Worship And Life, after the remaining Biblical Principles For Living have been presented for second reading at the 121st Annual Conference.

The Committee sent out The Biblical Principles For Living via E-mail on the BFC E-group, and numerous members of Annual Conference gave the Committee their suggestions and insights. The Committee held a hearing on The Biblical Principles For Living at the Coopersburg Bible Fellowship Church on January 28, 2003. About 50 people participated in the Hearing and gave further suggestions for the committee to consider. The Biblical Principles For Living are listed on the BFC Web site and can be reviewed at any time. We thank the members of Conference for their input and have considered their suggestions. When advisable, the Committee made corrections or additions to the particular Biblical Principles For Living. The Committee does not believe the changes it made are substantial and will present the Preamble and eight Biblical Principles For Living for second reading.

Joint Committee On Ethnic Church Planting

The Report of The Joint Committee On Ethnic Church Planting has been included with the Report of the Inter-Cultural Committee.

The Joint Committee met several times this past year and has concentrated its efforts on Hispanic Church Planting. We met this past summer with the Pastors in the Berks County, PA, Region and assisted them in forming an "Hispanic Church Planting Task Force." The Task Force completed a demographic survey of the city of Reading and agreed that they should present their findings and recommendations to the Elders of the Berks churches. The

churches have asked the Task Force to formulate a presentation of the Hispanic Project for Reading, PA, and give a plan for planting an Hispanic Church in Reading. The Task Force is finalizing that presentation and will be going out to the Berks County Churches.

The Committee has also been working on trying to recruit an Hispanic church planter for Lancaster. The Capitol Region has supported an Hispanic church planting project for Lancaster, but the Committee has not been successful yet in recruiting additional Hispanic men to plant churches with the Bible Fellowship Church. We assessed a man from Rio Grande Bible Institute this past summer but he did not qualify. In March of 2003 we interviewed Carlos Rodriquez, a prospective church planter from Guadalajara, Mexico. We are in the process of further assessment with Brother Rodriquez.

America now has a significant Hispanic population and its cities have even greater concentrations of Hispanics. In the target cities of Reading and Lancaster, Hispanics make up nearly fifty percent of the populations and continue to grow. Hispanic church planting will take patience, hard work and long term commitments from those churches in the BFC that become involved with Hispanic church planting. The Lord writes,

"...So show your love for the alien, for you were aliens in the land of Egypt." Deut.10:19

The BFC cannot ignore the hand of the Lord moving the Hispanic people groups of the world to our doorsteps. We are called to love the Hispanic and the best way to love them is to share the Gospel with them and raise up churches where they can be worshipers of God.

We remain concerned for other ethnic communities near our churches and will prayerfully pursue opportunities for ethnic church planting as the Lord leads.

We urge Annual Conference to continue its support of ethnic church planting and to give to this work through the *Fund For Ethnic Church Planting*. Continue to send your contributions to The Board Of Missions, designated for Ethnic Church Planting.

Biblical Principles For Living

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Article 100-1 - PREAMBLE

(Revised 2/25/03)

Societies

First Reading 2000

- **100-1.1** The Bible Fellowship Church sets forth these Biblical Principles for Living to inform and guide disciples of Jesus Christ in making moral decisions and living lives of obedience.
- **100-1.2** The BFC acknowledges the Scriptures as the supreme and final authority of faith and conduct and the Holy Spirit as the source of power and guidance for the believer. These principles are summaries of the biblical truth that reveals the Lord's directives in various aspects of life.
- 100-1.3 Increasing ethnic and cultural diversity in many of the churches and the prospect of new congregations being formed among various people groups have prompted the BFC to seek to

state the principles so that they may be understood and applied by believers in any cultural context.

- 100-1.4 These principles are not exhaustive in that they do not cite all that the Bible says in any of the aspects included and that they do not cover all areas of life that the Scriptures address. In the future it may become apparent that additional aspects of life need to be addressed and that the current principles may need to be reconsidered with a view to amending them after further reflection on the biblical truth.
- **100-1.5** Every believer is accountable to God for all that the Bible says. Moral choices and actions should be based on the whole counsel of God. Each believer must faithfully read, study and review all parts of the Scriptures (2 Tim. 3:16, 17).
- **100-1.6** In seeking moral guidance, the believer should study the Old Testament books of the Law with special focus on the Ten Commandments (Exo. 20:1-17). The implications of the Law are explained and applied in the rest of the Old Testament.
- 100-1.7 The Lord Jesus summarized the Law in the Great Commandments (Mat. 22:34-40; Mark 12:30, 31) and explained the spiritual depth of the Law in the Sermon on the Mount (Mat. 5-7). The application of the Law in the individual life of the believer and the corporate life of the church is set forth in the New Testament letters.
- 100-1.8 Since each believer is indwelled and empowered by the Holy Spirit, there is an enabling to obey God's requirements (Rom. 8:3, 4). The Spirit controlled person will demonstrate the fruit of the Spirit (Gal. 5:22, 23). He or she will receive and employ the gifts of the Spirit (1 Pe. 4:10, 11; Rom. 12:4-8; 1 Cor. 12:1-11). Where the life and power of the Holy Spirit are present in an individual or church, the three abiding qualities, faith, hope and love, will be evident (1 Cor. 13:13; 1 Thes. 1:3, Rom. 5:1, 2). The greatest of these is love, and "love is the fulfillment of the law" (Rom. 13:10).

Article 101-1 - Worship

(Revised 2/25/03)

First Reading 1995

- **101-1.1** Worship is response to God in all of life, whereby, in love, adoration, confession, thanksgiving, praise, and service God's worth is declared. Worship is rooted in reverence for and awe of the Lord and deepens as knowledge of God increases. Worship is the privilege and responsibility of each individual, family, and congregation. For the believer, worship is a life style not limited by location or circumstance.
- 101-1.2 Worship is the ultimate purpose of the church. The mission of the church is to declare God's glory and His salvation to all ethnic groups so that some from all the families of nations shall worship Him.³ Corporate worship is the assembled church celebrating the glory of God and ascribing to Him praise and honor. Christ, the head of the church, meets with and strengthens His people, who are called out from the world by the Holy Spirit.⁴
- 101-1.3 God declares that He alone is to be worshiped⁵ and this worship must be in spirit and truth.⁶ Such worship engages both mind and emotion, listening and responding to God in joyful obedience not simply in routine activity.⁷ For disobeying God's instructions and substituting their own form of worship,⁸ Israel was severely punished. We therefore seek to learn from the Bible what kinds of worship please the Lord.
- 101-1.4 Worship in the Old Testament was a celebration of the mighty acts of the Lord, the covenant God of Israel. Corporate worship was highlighted through prescribed ritual: a priesthood, a sacrificial system looking forward to Christ's atonement, and particular times and places when and where worship should occur. This ritual was not made valuable by its repetition. Its value came through heartfelt, thoughtful response to God, uniting the worshipers.

- 101-1.5 Worship in the New Testament is a celebration of the finished work of Christ, His victory over Satan, sin, and death through His own incarnation, death, resurrection, and ascension. Jesus claims for Himself authority over temple, Sabbath, sacrifice, and service. The former place, priesthood, and ritual were set aside a believers now observe a new day, the Lord's Day, and new ordinances: Baptism and the Lord's Supper.
- 101-1.6 Examples of corporate worship in the New Testament include the reading of Scripture, prayer, praise, confession, singing, giving, thanksgiving, preaching and teaching, and the ordinances. ¹⁸ The expression of these may be shaped by the cultural setting of a particular church and must be done in a fitting and orderly way. ¹⁹

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Article 101-2 - Spirit World

(Revised 2/25/03)

First Reading 1999

101-2.1 God is spirit¹ and has created everything, including The visible and the invisible.² The invisible includes a great number ³ of spirit beings. Among these are angels who are without flesh ⁴ and remain invisible except when supernaturally revealed.⁵ Angels surround God's throne to worship and serve Him.⁶ They are powerful ¹ and are sent as God pleases 8 to provide and care for,9 to protect and deliver,¹⁰ to instruct and guide,¹¹ to discipline and punish.¹² They long to comprehend fully the grace of salvation and rejoice over each sinner who repents.¹³ God also created human beings who are spirit ¹⁴ and flesh to worship and serve Him as God alone.¹⁵

- 101-2.2 A created angelic being, later known as the devil or Satan, rebelled against God.¹⁶ Within limits allowed by the sovereign God,¹⁷ Satan leads a powerful world system of wickedness which is hostile toward God and His purposes.¹⁸ Satan may inflict pain, suffering, emotional problems and may cause death.¹⁹ He can control people to oppose the work of God, blind their minds to prevent their understanding the Gospel, and oppress the servants of God.²⁰ Anyone not led by the Holy Spirit is open to Satan's influence.²¹ He seeks to influence nations and governments.²² Satan is a masterful deceiver appearing at times as an angel of light and called the father of lies.²³ False prophets, false religions, and cults are instruments of deception.²⁴ Those blinded and deceived by Satan live a life-style that is opposed to God.²⁵
- 101-2.3 Other angels followed Satan in his rebellion against God. These fallen angels, evil spirits or demons, serve Satan, the god of this evil world system. ²⁶ Satan and evil spirits can influence the believer ²⁷ and possess unregenerate people and animals. ²⁸ God has enabled believers to cast out demons by His Spirit. ²⁹ God may continue to give this enablement, however, the casting out of demons is not in itself reason for boasting and not necessarily an evidence of an individual's relationship with Christ. ³⁰
- 101-2.4 Believers are commanded to stand against the evil spirit world ³¹ and are warned against such detestable things as divination, witchcraft, sorcery, interpreting of omens, casting of spells, and consulting the dead. These things are devices that Satan uses to lure people toward destruction. People who practice these things are under the condemnation of God.³² Because of Satan's power, victory is possible only through our Lord Jesus Christ.³³ Through the Blood of Christ that was shed on the cross, God has provided victory over this world system for those born of God.³⁴ In prayerful dependence upon God, they are protected from and victorious over the powers of darkness as they use all the armor God provides, submissively draw near to Him, and resist the devil.³⁵

101-2.5 The sovereign God is in control of the entire social, political, and spiritual realm.³⁶ God will cast Satan and all his followers into the lake of fire which has been prepared for them where they will remain forever.³⁷ The kingdom of this world will one day become the kingdom of our Lord and He will reign forever and ever.³⁸

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Article 102-1 - Holiness

(Revised 2/25/03)

First Reading 1999

- **102-1.1** God is holy. He is separate from and superior to all creation. He is absolutely pure and good. He cannot sin and hates sin. Because He is holy, He calls people to holiness.
- **102-1.2** Holiness involves a setting apart, a dedicating or devoting, of someone or something for a special purpose. Believers are set

apart for God and called saints, or holy ones.⁷ The Bible reveals the holiness of God and declares His standard for a holy life.⁸ God's law teaches all people are sinners and His Spirit convicts of sins.⁹ All those who belong to God are, through the work of Christ, declared holy and are responsible to live holy lives.¹⁰ God's purpose is that every believer through the experiences of this life be changed into the likeness of His Son.¹¹

102-1.3 Sanctification, or holy living, is progressively realized by the power of the Holy Spirit.¹² For Christians, there is to be a separation from all forms of evil, and a full surrender to the Lord.¹³ Believers should not participate in any group which demands behavior or an affirmation of beliefs that are opposed to our allegiance to Christ.¹⁴ They are not to continue any longer in the sinful ways of the world but should rather seek to have all thoughts and actions conformed to the revealed will of God.¹⁵ Sin's control and its continued practice must cease.¹⁶

102-1.4 The church is also called to holiness.¹⁷ Believers are to encourage one another to live righteously,¹⁸ warn against the dangers of all sin,¹⁹ confess and repent of all individual and corporate sin,²⁰ and submit to discipline as taught by the Lord.²¹ Christian leaders have a particular responsibility to set proper examples.²²

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Article 102-2 - Justice

(Revised 2/25/03)

First Reading 1995

- 102-2.1 By nature God is morally perfect and righteous in every way. To say that God is just is to affirm the rightness of His law and His faithful and consistent adherence to that law in His judgments. Justice is the perfect application of His law in the lives of human beings. Both human law and the application of that law can distort God's justice and therefore be sinful and produce sin. Sin causes human beings to enact and apply laws in ways that are unjust. Because God is just, He abhors the distortions of His law.
- 102-2.2 In a world of sinful people, injustice results when human beings are judged by such things as color of skin, ethnicity, gender, age, social, economic and occupational status. To evaluate people based on such external characteristics is inconsistent with faith in Jesus Christ.⁴ Those who value people in this way are acting out of ungodly cultural biases and sinful pride.⁵ Injustice also results when persons allow their own sinful motivations, such as greed,⁶ jealousy,⁷ and envy,⁸ to shape their relationships with other people. In Jesus Christ such wicked and false distinctions or motivations are abolished.⁹
- **102-2.3** God's love for humankind knows no racial, national, economic, age, or gender boundaries and God's people must demonstrate this same impartial love. The proclamation of the gospel to every person regardless of location or status will be a matter of great priority among those who love justice.
- **102-2.4** Those who value justice will seek consistent and upright applications of human law so that no one is denied due process because of sinful distinctions. ¹² Those who love justice will seek truth and act with integrity in all relationships.
- 102-2.5 The quest for justice in a world distorted by sin will often yield imperfect and incomplete results. The people of God who love justice will repent when they recognize their failure to do

justice and will renew their efforts to bring justice to those who have been denied it.¹³

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Article 102-3 - Mercy

Second Reading 1995

- **102-3.1** Mercy, the unmerited response to human need, ¹ finds its source and highest expression in God, in Whom justice and mercy meet in perfect harmony. ² Rather than overlook sin, God showed His mercy most clearly and fully by giving His beloved Son to die in our place. ³
- **102-3.2** God the Father, demonstrated His mercy in providing salvation. God the Son, became the supreme example of that mercy in offering Himself for our sins. Jesus offered forgiveness to the sinner, acceptance to the rejected, healing to the afflicted, food to the hungry, comfort to the bereaved, and life to the dead.
- **102-3.3** God's intention is that mercy characterize His people.¹² In extending mercy, we should pattern ourselves after our Head, Jesus Christ.¹³ The church and its individual members are called to a ministry of mercy-giving, ¹⁴ which aids in our growth and assurance of salvation.¹⁵
- 102-3.4 Our ministry of mercy may be limited by our resources, our discernment, and the Word of God, ¹⁶ but it must never be limited by our bias against any group or individual. ¹⁷ In all humility, each congregation ought to search itself for the presence of any cultural arrogance, of social or racial prejudice, or of ungodly complacency, all of which will hinder the offering of

mercy. In some cases a congregation will need to repent of its sinful attitudes.

Article 102-4 - Humility

(Revised 3/20/03)

First Reading 1995

- **102-4.1** Humility is an attitude of heart and mind perfectly exemplified in the person and life of Christ. It characterizes those united with Christ, pleases God, and shapes both the life of the community of faith and the ministry of the Lord's servants. The opposite of humility is pride which meets divine resistance and anger.
- **102-4.2** Humility is an acceptance of one's true position in relationship to God, ⁷ authorities, other believers, ⁸ society, ⁹ and in fact all of creation. ¹⁰ Its reality is demonstrated in joyful service and appropriate submission seen most clearly in the willing self-sacrifice of Christ.
- **102-4.3** In the individual Christian, humility recognizes the grace of God which has made each believer to be accepted in Christ. This viewpoint becomes a source of forgiveness and patience within the Christian community. ¹¹ The Christian's love for others is greatly aided by the development of godly humility.
- **102-4.4** The unique servant quality of Christian leadership is a direct result of godly humility. Elders of the church do not dominate the congregation but are servants to the whole body.¹²

They do not desire to control, rather they promote the development and enrichment of every member. As heirs of grace together with their brothers and sisters, Christian leaders must renounce the pride which creates divisions and factions¹³ based on secondary theological issues,¹⁴ on areas of Christian liberty,¹⁵ or merely on personalities.¹⁶

102-4.5 Humility encourages each church to cooperate with believers in gospel outreach, ¹⁷ compels us to seek to meet needs of others, ¹⁸ and causes us to be advocates for those who have none. ¹⁹ Concern shown for the disadvantaged in our world must be expressed through ministries of mercy²⁰ and efforts to promote the growth of the congregation among all kinds of people. ²¹

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Article 102-5 - Truth and Integrity

(Revised 3/20/03)

First Reading 2002

- 102-5.1 The Triune God God the Father, God the Son and God the Holy Spirit is the only true God. God the Father is the God of truth, ho has never lied, and never will. He is absolutely truthful. Jesus, who is God the Son, is the truth. He is full of grace and truth. He always tells the truth. God the Holy Spirit is the Spirit of Truth. He is the truth and He guides believers into all truth.
- **102-5.2** The Word of God is truth¹¹ and is the standard for truth. Truth does not change¹² and the opposite of truth is falsehood. God desires¹³ and requires¹⁴ that all people speak the truth. His directives for truthfulness are found in the third¹⁵ and ninth¹⁶ commandments. Truth is truth even if it is not understood or fully

disclosed.¹⁷ The failure to be truthful including deceitfulness is sin.¹⁸ Lying is among the sins of unbelievers that will be judged in hell.¹⁹ Believers who lie are disciplined by the Lord, even to the point of death.²⁰

- 102-5.3 The believer and the believing community are commanded to be truthful.²¹ This includes keeping promises and honoring contracts, whether written or oral. In speaking the truth believers may formally call God to witness with an oath or simply affirm the truth of their statements. ²² The Christian and the church must keep their promises even when it is costly to do so.²³
- 102-5.4 In the Scriptures, truth and integrity stand together.²⁴ Integrity is soundness, wholeness, consistency of character. Without truth there is no integrity.²⁵ God is pleased with integrity²⁶ and judges accordingly.²⁷ Integrity protects believers²⁸ and upholds them through difficult times in life.²⁹ It provides security and guidance for a believer's life.³⁰ All teaching of God's truth must show integrity.³¹ Truth and integrity must be lived out in love so that the body of Christ might mature.³²
- **102-5.5** To fail to keep one's word is a lack of integrity betraying the trust of others and dishonoring the God of truth.³³

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Article 103-1 - Humanity in God's Image

(Revised 4/30/03)

First Reading 1998

103-1.1 The human race exists as a result of an instantaneous creative act of God.¹ Humanity shares many characteristics with other creatures, but is unique in that each individual bears the image or likeness of God.² This image makes possible the worship of God,³ relationships between persons,⁴ and responsibility to rule over God's creation.⁵ Only God confers this image, and it cannot be removed by any created being. Originally God's image in humanity included true righteousness and holiness; but by the entrance of sin into humanity these have been lost⁶ and the image distorted yet not destroyed.⁷

103-1.2 Because human beings are made in God's image, every person has an unique identity, individual worth, and purpose to live for God's glory. The image of God is also the basis for the dignity of every person. All human life should be cherished and protected, not neglected, despised or abused. God forbids the unlawful destruction of human life, both murder and suicide, and provides the strongest of sanctions, including capital punishment, to protect it. The killing of the weak and defenseless by means of abortion. infanticide, and euthanasia is a crime against both those persons and the God whose image they bear. Christians should exert every effort to oppose these evils in society, and other evils as defined and condemned by Scripture, including racism;¹¹ cultural bias;¹² gender discrimination; 13 ignoring the poor, 14 disabled 15 and aged; 16 and every other form of injustice against human beings.¹⁷ They should respect the image of God in every person despite the sins of that person or the consequences of those sins. 18 They should also work to protect the dignity of every human being.¹⁹

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Article 103-2 Repentance and Restitution

(Revised 3/20/03)

First Reading 2002

- **103-2.1** God commands every person to repent. Without repentance there is no salvation. Repentance is a work of the Holy Spirit producing change of mind and heart that leads to a changed life.
- **103-2.2** For the believer, repentance is a daily obligation to live according to the Word of God. When believers sin, they should repent and confess their sins. When they do this, the Lord promises forgiveness and cleansing.³
- 103-2.3 People who repent are to produce fruit of repentance in their lives.⁴ One fruit of repentance is for the believer who has sinned to make restitution for any loss the sin caused other people. Restitution is a demonstration of repentance. Believers should make restitution⁵ in accordance with the Word of God to satisfy the righteousness of God.
- 103-2.4 Restitution involves payment to the offended party for injury to life, limb or property which has been destroyed, lost, stolen, or damaged due to one's sin, negligence or carelessness. Restitution was commanded by the Lord God in the Law.⁶ It is reiterated in the Proverbs⁷ and the prophets.⁸ It was advocated by John the Baptist⁹ and practiced by Zacchaeus the chief tax collector.¹⁰ Jesus directed His followers to settle any claims that anyone had against them even before going to the Lord in worship.¹¹ Such settlement would include restitution of any loss suffered by others. Restitution is taught by the Apostle Paul in his letter to Philemon¹² and implied in his letter to the Ephesians.¹³

Report of the Board of Directors, BFC Homes, Inc.

The Bible Fellowship Church Homes, Inc. Board of Directors has continued to serve the Lord and the residents of Fellowship Community by maintaining a commitment to excellence, innovative programs, and quality service. The Board has met regularly to oversee the development of Fellowship Community and to monitor continuous performance improvement activities throughout the organization. The Board is grateful as the construction of PHASE III concludes and construction of PHASE IV has begun.

PHASE III included the building of an Assisted Living building, which includes 101 licensed beds known as Fellowship Terrace. PHASE III also included building Gehman Court which includes 21 units for independent living, construction of a Storage building and renovations to Fellowship Manor. The renovation to Fellowship Manor included construction of a new Hair Care unit, an Auditorium, a Rehabilitation Department, an Exercise room, a Sitting area for residents on the first floor and a new telephone system.

Fellowship Terrace opened for occupancy on January 8, 2003 with the transfer of the twenty-seven residents from Fellowship Home in Nazareth.

Fellowship Home in Nazareth has been sold. Final settlement occurred on January 8, 2003. The property was sold for \$810,000. After realty and legal fees were paid, \$751.806 was transferred to a Bond Redemption and Improvement Fund held by the trustee at the Bank of New York as required by the Bond agreement.

PHASE IV, Construction of Hershey Court, an additional 21 units for independent living, has begun and should be completed and ready for occupancy this Fall. Occupancy agreements have been signed for each of the Hershey Court units and we are beginning a waiting list for the development of the next court, which will be called Brunner Court.

The Park Fund is progressing slowly. The current amount in the Park Fund is \$63,085. Our goal was to reach \$100,000 each year for the next four years. The Park Project is to build a park area around the existing quarry. The park will include pavilions that will

hold up to 100 people. It will also include a kitchen, rest rooms, nature trail, ½ mile walking trail, park benches, etc. The project will take approximately 4 - 5 years to complete.

Fellowship Community continues to maintain a pro-active presence in the community and continues to maintain an excellent reputation. This past year we maintained compliance with all the JCAHO accreditation standards and compliance with the Pennsylvania Department of Health, the Pennsylvania Department of Public Welfare and the Pennsylvania Department of Life Safety regulations. Fellowship Community is meeting the Bond Covenant requirements as outlined by the construction financial feasibility study.

The occupancy of Fellowship Manor remains at over 98% and Fellowship Courts is 100%. The new Fellowship Terrace is being occupied as planned and at the present time the first and second floors are at 76% occupancy.

Fellowship Community remains committed to provide services to senior citizens throughout the Bible Fellowship Church. We offer the following services to the BFC.

- 1. BFC members are admitted on a priority basis to Fellowship Community.
- 2. The staff at Fellowship Community is available to the churches for placement counseling and as a healthcare information resource.
- 3. The staff provides a speakers' bureau with a variety of Healthcare and Management topics.
- 4. The staff is available to provide information about Fellowship Community to church groups.
- 5. Fellowship Community encourages church members to participate as volunteers and members of the Auxiliary.
- 6. Staff members are available to assist churches interested in establishing a Parish Nurse program.
- 7. Fellowship Community encourages churches to participate with a bus tour referred to as "Places to Remember". This tour provides information on the history of the BFC and tours several of the BFC agencies. The tour includes lunch and an orientation to Fellowship Community.

The staff and volunteers at Fellowship Community (Manor, Terrace and Courts) are to be commended for their caring attitude

and cooperative spirit. We thank the Lord for providing us with a very dedicated and loyal staff.

In conclusion, the Board of Directors appreciates all the contributions from churches and individuals. The church contributions are used to assist BFC members who no longer have the resources to be maintained as private-pay residents.

The Board of Directors of the Bible Fellowship Church Homes, Inc. recommends the adoption of the following legislation:

- Whereas, the ministry of the Bible Fellowship Church Homes, Inc. has, over the years, expanded and has become in practicality, an entity of its own, and
- Whereas, the Bible Fellowship Church Homes, Inc. has had full ownership and fiduciary responsibility since 1993, and
- Whereas, the financial commitment of the Bible Fellowship Church has continued in its traditional and most acceptable manner and is appreciated by the Bible Fellowship Church Homes, Inc., those contributions are less than 1% of the total revenues, and
- Whereas, the by-laws of the Bible Fellowship Church Homes, Inc. require all Board Members and the President and CEO of the Corporation to commit to the *Articles of Faith* of the Bible Fellowship Church, and
- Whereas, this commitment assures the continuing spiritual ministry of the Bible Fellowship Church Homes, Inc. on a level equal to the present ministry, and
- Whereas, the legal demands on the operation of the ministry have forced it to take on a greater level of liability thus increasing the number of potential lawsuits, and
- Whereas, Bible Fellowship Church Homes, Inc. is of the opinion that the existing relationship between Bible

Fellowship Church Homes, Inc. and the Bible Fellowship Church is to increase the risk of suits to the denomination, therefore be it

Resolved, that the following legislation be adopted at first reading:

512-2 Bible Fellowship Church Homes, Inc.

- 512-2.1 Bible Fellowship Church Homes, Inc. is an affiliate of the Bible Fellowship Church.
- 512-2.2 Bible Fellowship Church has no ownership or fiduciary responsibility in Bible Fellowship Church Homes, Inc. The Church's sole responsibility is the election of five (5) members to the Board of Directors of Bible Fellowship Church Homes, Inc.
- 512-2.3 Those Board Members elected by Annual Conference shall give a written report annually on the spiritual status of the ministry.
- 512-2.4 A financial report given for information only and not to be adopted by Annual Conference shall be given annually to Annual Conference.
- 512-2.5 Elections: Five (5) members shall be elected in three classes for three (3) year terms:

Class one: one minister, one lay person one minister, one lay person one minister one minister

Upon adoption of the above, the following is presented:

Whereas, the potential of serious liability consequences should not be borne by the Bible Fellowship Church and

Whereas, the action taken in 1993 manifests a desire by the Bible Fellowship Church for Bible Fellowship Church Homes, Inc., to assume such responsibility, and

Whereas, the attorneys for the Bible Fellowship Church Homes, Inc. and the Bible Fellowship Church recommend these changes to be made as soon as possible, and

Whereas, the Bible Fellowship Church hereby relinquishes its control of the Board of Directors of Bible Fellowship Church Homes, Inc.

Whereas, the Board of Directors of the Bible Fellowship Church is in agreement with said action, therefore be it

Resolved, that by Rule of Exception, §512-2.1 - 2.4 shall be immediately implemented and further

Resolved, that the Board of Directors of Bible Fellowship Church Homes, Inc. shall no longer be considered under the control of Annual Conference and assumes full responsibility for constituting a Board of Directors in accordance with its By-laws for the ensuing transition period, and further

Resolved, that Bible Fellowship Homes, Inc. may at its own discretion keep the Board as it is now constituted as the Board of record in order to give time to implement these changes.

Notes to Financial Statements For the Year Ended December 31, 2002

Note 1 Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

<u>General</u>. Victory Valley Camp is a Christian camp, basically for
youth operated as an agency of the Bible Fellowship Church

youth, operated as an agency of the Bible Fellowship Church denomination.

<u>Accounting Method</u>. The cash method of accounting is used for financial statement purposes.

<u>Depreciation</u>. Real Estate and equipment are carried at cost. The organization has elected not to calculate depreciation. This is a departure from generally accepted accounting principles.

Federal Income Taxes. The organization is exempt from income taxes under Section 501 (c) (3) of the Internal Revenue Code as a

religious organization.

Net Assets. Unrestricted net assets are available at the discretion of the Board for use in the organization's program, and those resources invested in land, buildings and equipment. Temporarily restricted net assets are donations given for particular capital projects or debt reduction.

<u>Allocation of Expenses</u>. The organization used the following policy in allocating its expenses:

a. Costs allocated to program costs include costs related to carrying on the program, maintaining the property and food.

 General Administration and Debt Service expenses come from General Revenues.

<u>Use of Estimates</u>. The preparation of financial statements in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities and disclosures of contingent assets and liabilities at the date of the financial statements and the reported amounts of revenues and expenses during the reported period. Actual results could differ from those estimates.

- Note 2. The Cash in Bank Money Market is the monies being held for capital expenditures and Debt Reduction.
- Note 3. The Marketable Securities is invested in American Funds. The market value on December 31, 2001 was \$418.30.

Legislation to revise 512-18.2

- 1. Whereas, the Board of Youth and Young Adults (BYYA) ministers to youth and young adult leaders and students in the Bible Fellowship Church (BFC), and
 - Whereas, the BYYA would typically be comprised of youth leaders and youth pastors, and
 - Whereas, youth leaders and youth pastors are not typically ordained when first coming to a church yet become ordained later thus changing their eligibility to serve on this board, and
 - Whereas, there is a need for stability and continuity in youth and young adult ministry in the BFC,
 - Whereas, this stability and continuity would be found most readily in those who have been ordained as ministers in the BFC, and
 - Whereas, the BYYA now have several youth pastors who are ordained ministers, therefore be it
 - Resolved, that the 120th Annual Conference change the composition of the BYYA to the following:

Composition

1. The Board will be composed of five(5) ordained ministers and four(4) laypersons.

2. They will be elected for a term of three years in classes as follows:

Class I two ordained ministers, one layperson
Class II two ordained ministers, one layperson
Class III one ordained minister, two laypersons

- ** Changes would be from 3 to 5 ordained ministers and from 6 to 4 laypersons, Class I one to two ordained ministers and two to one layperson, and Class II one to two ordained ministers and two to one layperson.
- 2. Whereas, the BYYA sees the benefit of continuity on this newly elected board, and
 - Whereas, the BYYA has a man who was considered a layperson member but has recently been ordained and is up for election this year, and
 - Whereas, there are two ordained ministers who are now up for election this year, therefore be it
 - Resolved, that by rule of exception the above be put into effect at this Annual Conference to be voted on for second reading at the next Annual Conference.
- 3. Whereas, the classes will need to be changed to accommodate the change in the structure of the Board, and
 - Whereas, the BYYA has consulted with the BFC Nominating Committee, therefore be it
 - <u>Resolved</u>, that the following be approved with regard to changing the classes:
 - CLASS 1 (2003) be changed from one ordained minister and two laypersons to two ordained ministers and one layperson.
 - CLASS 2 (2004) be changed from one ordained minister and two laypersons to two ordained ministers and one layperson.
 - CLASS 3 (2005) will remain as one ordained minister and two layperson.
- 4. Resolved, that the election of Class 1 be implemented in 2003 and that the elections of Classes 2 and 3 be implemented at the 121st Annual Conference.

Report of the Historical Committee

Teenagers go through a time when appreciation for their parents fades. They wish to be left alone and fantasize about when they don't have to listen. Then, they grow up. Soon after this growth into full-fledged adulthood, appreciation for their parents is renewed. They now see the family faults but maturity allows them to see the strengths.

As we look back to our spiritual parents, similar thoughts run through our teenage minds. Our spiritual parents had little formal education. They seemed to say no to everything. Their theology focused on human initiative. They were very authoritarian. Those things don't set well with us today. But we have grown. We have moved on. Hopefully, we have matured. While we see lots of faults and issues for disagreement, we look at our parents now and appreciate what we were taught and shown.

What are some of the things we should learn and appreciate about our spiritual parents, Evangelical Mennonites / Mennonite Brethren in Christ / Bible Fellowship Church? They prayed enthusiastically and continued in prayer. They listened to God's Word intently and tried to live it. They preached the Gospel fervently and understood it would cost them. They loved each other dearly and lived as a family of God. These are good things and strong - to be remembered and followed. We can only hope to be what they were and as we stand on their shoulders, having learned from them, to become more of what they hoped to be.

The work of the Historical Committee is to remind us all that we are standing on some pretty good shoulders. In some sense, we will always be standing on the shoulders of those who went before us. When we seek to go beyond what they were, our ministry to the Lord will increase and grow in effectiveness. Our fathers would be very excited to see what is happening in the church they helped to form. We will be excited if our children, standing on our shoulders having learned from us, go even farther.

Remembering and dreaming belong together. Fathers help us remember. We stand on their shoulders. Children help us dream. They stand on our shoulders. And the cycle will start over. Our children will see our faults. Then they will see our strengths. They must remember. The work of the Historical Committee is to

remember the work of the fathers and to give the children a memory, shoulders to stand on.

The Historical Committee met twice in the past year. Several significant projects were accomplished. The list of pastoral assignments begun in 1874 has been computerized allowing us to access which pastors served in what churches and when. Now, this record is up to date and can be maintained yearly. We are rapidly moving toward having a computerized text of all of the minutes of Annual Conference beginning from the first publication in 1896 to the current Annual Conference. Our first essay contest was held to stimulate interest in research and to add to the collection of information we have available to us. A second contest has been announced. We have discarded the collection of old yearbooks which had been stored with the archives for many years. We retain seven full sets for future use.

While we continue to collect materials each year, much of our efforts are now given to the computerized preservation of our texts and pictures. Our goal is to be sure that the information of our past is preserved and available to those who wish to study it. Our work can be seen at the website, www.BFCHistory.org.

A reminder is important for all. The records of churches, boards and committees ought to be placed in the archives or they will be lost. They will be stuck in an old file cabinet to be tossed in a dumpster some cleaning day. Some do not want to part with their records but remember they will still be available to you. If they wind up in a dumpster, they will no longer be available.

Report of the Strategic Planning Committee

The Strategic Planning Committee met nine times in 2002. As was reported to the last Annual Conference, we have been working with the following vision statement for the Bible Fellowship Church:

"We, the Bible Fellowship Church, seek to become an expanding fellowship of churches united to make disciples of Jesus Christ."

Leadership Summit

The statement was developed in presentations to the 119th Annual Conference in April. The Committee then worked with the Pastor, Elder, Deacon Retreat Committee of the Board of Christian Education to provide a Leadership Summit in place of the regular PED Retreat in November. At Pinebrook Bible Conference on November 1-2, members of the Strategic Planning Committee led in open discussion of the strengths, weaknesses, opportunities, and threats facing the denomination. We are grateful for the commitment of the 31 pastors and leaders from 27 Bible Fellowship Churches who took of their time to give input during this important Summit.

A report on the Leadership Summit is attached.

One Voice: BFC2004

Plans are underway for a second denomination-wide gathering on May 15-16, 2004 at Stabler Arena in Bethlehem. "One Voice" will be a two-day gathering for challenge, fellowship, worship, and praise. Our goal is to develop the Vision Statement and related objectives for presentation to the denomination at that time. We are working with the Board of Youth and Young Adults to begin the convocation with a youth-oriented concert on Saturday night and a concurrent adult banquet in a nearby facility. Sunday's gathering will begin in the early afternoon with a worship service followed by ministry for all ages on the Stabler campus. The weekend will then conclude with a worship-gathering for everyone in the Arena. Questions or ideas regarding "One Voice" may be directed to Richard Paashaus at Rpaashaus@Juno.com.

Regionalization

The regions we have established continued to meet during the past year for fellowship, prayer and ministry. Our regions report different levels of activity. Some have met for combined services while others have met for prayer and fellowship. Some have shared ministry efforts and are seeking ways to begin new churches. In some, the delegates have begun to participate. Those regions which meet regularly have found their gatherings and shared efforts to be encouraging, valuable, and contributing to the growth of the Bible Fellowship Church. All pastors and delegates are encouraged to develop the ministry of their regions according to the directives of the Faith and Order regarding regionalization (Faith & Order, 601).

Consolidation of Offices

Though the Board of Missions and Board of Church Extension are not currently seeking consolidation as previously discussed, a Task Force of leaders from both boards and outside counsel have determined that the provision of a denominational administrative center would be a value to both ministries and to the Bible Fellowship Church. With this in mind, the Strategic Planning Committee appointed an ad-hoc committee to consider consolidation of offices and the feasibility of provision of a denominational headquarters or administrative center. This Committee is comprised of Rev. Richard Paashaus, Richard Drosnock, Daniel Oswald, Robert Buckwalter, David Schlonecker, Michael Werley, Robert Evans, and James MacArthur. Their

mandate was to consider options for consolidation of offices for Bible Fellowship Church ministries including some or all of the following: Board of Missions, Board of Church Extension, Board of Directors, Archives, Conference Pastor, and Board of Communications and, further that they were to consider the logic of centralization, appropriate location, the best options (buy, build, lease), the experience of other denominations, cost effectiveness, and timing for the same. They have met three times and have made significant progress. Their findings will be presented to the Strategic Planning Committee in early 2003.

Denominational Communication

Since the last Annual Conference, all pastors and delegates have been included in the BFC

E-groups. The group for pastors and delegates includes 187 members. Last year 299 messages were sent via this group (bfc-AC@yahoogroups.com). This site is host to the official calendar for the Bible Fellowship Church. There are 150 pastors participating in the separate E-group for pastors alone (bfc-pastors@yahoogroups.com). On that group 147 messages were sent last year. Valuable denominational information, prayer concerns, and messages of importance are all being transmitted via this means. We believe this is the most accurate, fastest means of communication within the denomination and encourage continued use of the E-groups. For information regarding this site, please contact Roy A. Hertzog at rhertzog@enter.net. Roy has been a tremendous help in overseeing the activity of these E-groups.

The Committee has expressed to the Board of Communications its strong desire that the BFC website be upgraded and updated and that consideration be given to delegating care of the website to a capable webcarrier. They also have expressed the need for a new logo for the BFC. Both requests have been received by the Board of Communications and will be addressed.

Other Concerns

This year's action at Annual Conference will include the demise of a denominational ministry, The Stewardship Council. The Strategic Planning Committee supports this decision but cautions the fellowship of churches about the potential movement from corporate ministry toward independent congregations. We believe the uniting of the churches for corporate ministry is of great

importance and that the whole is much more than the sum of its parts. We together can accomplish much more than we can individually and separately. May the future of the Bible Fellowship Church include corporate efforts that will expand the Kingdom and carry out God's purposes in a way that we individually could never accomplish.

We appreciate the participation of our Annual Conference Chairman, William G. Schlonecker. Bill attended many of our meetings and gave valuable input in our discussions.

Addendum to the Report of the Strategic Planning Committee Report of the Leadership Summit held November 1-2, 2002

The Strategic Planning Committee has proposed a mission statement to guide, focus and unite the Bible Fellowship Church in its ministry. "We, the Bible Fellowship Church, seek to become an expanding fellowship of churches united to make disciples of Jesus Christ." The Committee has presented this statement but understands that formulating a mission statement is not enough. The mission statement needs to be made practical. We need to understand that statement in terms of ministry objectives; what we are to do. We need to answer in a practical way; "What is God calling the Bible Fellowship Church to do?"

To answer that question, the Strategic Planning Committee has begun a dialogue with those who serve as leaders in our church. The first phase of that dialogue was a Leadership Summit held at Pinebrook Bible Conference in November, 2002. The next phase of that dialogue will be meetings with the leaders in each of our regions and are planned to begin in the fall of 2003.

The Leadership Summit held in November was very helpful. The Strategic Planning Committee is grateful to each church and leader who came to share in the dialogue. The agenda of the summit centered in an analysis of our perceptions of our strengths, weaknesses, opportunities and threats.

What did we learn during this summit?

Strengths - Several strengths were listed: commitment to the authority of the Scriptures, emphasis on missions, elder leadership, emphasis on church planting. Most of us agree that our desire to be taught and led by the Scriptures is not only strong but a vital part of what we are and do.

Weaknesses - Our most deeply felt weaknesses are our lack of ethnic diversity, lack of evangelistic fervor, resistance to change, few opportunities for leadership development, ineffective denominational communication, and lack of denominational identity.

Threats - Our leaders believe we are threatened by such things as the constant change of our culture, our apathy and lack of commitment, the need for a denominational vision, our resistance to change and the absence of a centralized denominational structure.

Opportunities - The groups at the Leadership Summit saw significant opportunities including relevant ministry to our changing and needy culture, a growing and diverse population, telecommunications, and a sound doctrinal position giving us a unique message.

The Strategic Committee is seeking to analyze and understand what we have heard. The next step for the committee is to generate proposals for objectives and ways to implement those objectives. We must seek to identify those issues and characteristics that we believe are important in what we are and do. When the committee has finished the proposals, meetings will be established in regions to allow the input of the leaders of our churches.

The Strategic Planning Committee is grateful to all who participated in the Leadership Summit. As we prepare for further dialogue, we encourage you and the leaders of your church to join in the regional meetings when they are held.

We ask you to pray that our God will guide into greater and more effective ministry to the glory of our risen Savior.

Report of the Study Committee on Credentials and Multi-Staff Churches

The study committee met four times during the year to wrestle with the issues relating to multiple staffs. After due consideration the committee presents the following material:

The committee proposes that a distinction be made between "pastoral staffs" and "church staffs." "Church staff" would be an all inclusive term that would refer to any church employee. The "church staff" would be comprised of the pastoral staff as well as The "pastoral staff" would be comprised of only those individuals who hold or are seeking to hold credentials with the Only those individuals who are seeking or hold credentials with the BFC would be called "pastor" on the local level. If the individual does not hold credentials or is not under the care of the Ministerial Candidate Committee, that individual could be called, for example a "director" or "coordinator" but not a "pastor" or "minister." For instance, the church staff would include sexton, secretary, director of children and youth, choir director, organist, director of women's ministries, pastor etc. The pastoral staff would include, Pastor of children and youth, Pastor of music, etc. The Pastoral Staff would not include a director of youth or a choir director.

The purpose of the differentiation is to set forth clearly those who hold credentials with the BFC or who are seeking credentials with the BFC and those who do not hold credentials with the BFC nor are seeking credentials with the BFC. Individuals who are in training for, or aspire to, any pastoral position would be encouraged to come under the care of the Ministerial Candidate Committee when they sense their call to ministry.

The local church would make a decision as to whether the position that is being filled is to be filled by one who is serving in the capacity of "director" or "pastor." For one to serve as "pastor" one would have to meet the qualifications or be preparing to meet the qualifications set forth in the *Faith and Order* for a "minister" in the BFC. He would also have to be seeking or hold credentials with the BFC.

One who is a member of a church staff but not a pastoral staff would be considered a layperson. One who is a member of

a pastoral staff would not be considered a layperson even if he is not yet ordained. A woman would be eligible to serve on a church staff but be ineligible to serve on a pastoral staff.

One who serves on a pastoral staff of a BFC would not be eligible to serve as a lay delegate to Annual Conference or serve on denominational boards and committees under the category of layperson.

One who serves on a "pastoral staff" could only be eligible to serve in the category "ordained minister" on denominational boards and committees. If an individual is not yet ordained, or has not yet had his previous ordination recognized by the Bible Fellowship, he would have to wait until he is ordained or has had his previous ordination recognized before he could serve on denominational boards and committees.

The Committee recommends the following:

1. Second Reading Material: (The material in bold italics is the second reading material. The appropriate point of insertion in Article 401-1.7 is included.)

Article 401- 1.7 The Board of Elders shall be the channel of communication between the particular church and the fellowship of churches and its organizations. The Elders shall nominate from their number of the congregation and shall elect the appropriate number of delegates based on congregational membership as follows:

1-299 members 1 delegate 300-499 members 2 delegates 500-749 members 3 delegates 750-999 members 4 delegates

When congregations have more than one delegate, the Board of Elders shall designate one delegate as "First Delegate" for purpose of pulpit supply procedures. In the event of death, resignation, or removal of the First Delegate, another First Delegate shall be designated from among the remaining delegates.

A man serving on a pastoral staff is not eligible to serve as a lay delegate to Annual Conference.

2. First Reading Material

- Whereas, there are individuals who are not ordained or whose previous ordination has not been recognized by the BFC and who are serving on pastoral staffs of the BFC, and
- Whereas, because they are not ordained or have not had their previous ordination formally recognized by the BFC and they have been allowed to serve in lay capacities within the BFC, and
- Whereas, in the local church, they function more in keeping with ordained ministers than they do as laymen, and
- Whereas, Annual Conference has recognized the value of having lay representation in its delegates to Annual Conference, and its membership of Conference Boards and Committees, and
- Whereas, having individuals who serve on pastoral staff occupy lay positions on a Conference level violates the spirit, if not the letter, of having lay representation, and
- Whereas, having individuals who serve on pastoral staffs occupying lay positions at the Conference level may be a deterrent from their seeking credentials with the BFC, therefore be it
- **Resolved**, That the material in bold italics be added to the *Faith and Order*, Article 510 General Rules of Elections and Resignations:

Article 510 - General Rules of Elections and Resignations

510 - 1 Categories

- (1) There are three categories of nominees for election to board, and committees. They are ministers, elders, and laypersons.
- (2) Pastoral Staff members are not eligible to serve in the categories of elders or laypersons.
- 3. **Resolved**, any person serving on a pastoral staff of the BFC and who is presently occupying a lay position on a Conference Board or Committee be allowed to serve out that term but is ineligible to be reelected or reappointed to any lay position on the Conference level.

- 4. Whereas, the Faith & Order assumes that a church has but one pastor, and
 - Whereas, many of our churches have more than one pastor on its staff, and
 - Whereas, there is confusion when the *Faith and Order* speaks of the pastor as to whether all that is said applies to only the "Senior Pastor" or all members of the pastoral staff, and
 - Whereas, there is confusion when the *Faith and Order* speaks of the responsibility of the delegate when a church is without a pastor, if those responsibilities can be altered when a church has another member of the pastoral staff on the scene, and
 - Whereas, there is confusion as to the status of individuals who are called "pastors" in the BFC but do not have credentials with the BFC, and
 - Whereas, churches have other individuals in their employ who are ministering in the life of the church which are not considered pastors, therefore be it
 - Resolved, that the Committee to Study Credentials and Multi-Staff Churches be charged with developing legislation for "church staffs" and "pastoral staffs" to be included in the Faith and Order.

Report of the Board of Christian Education

The Board met three times in 2002 to give oversight and input to the corporate Christian education ministries of the Bible Fellowship Church. Much of their work is cared for by subcommittees. Their ministry this past year included the following:

Christian Education Training

A denomination-wide Teacher Training Conference was presented on March 9 at Calvary Bible Fellowship in Coopersburg featuring representatives of the Evangelical Training Association. Responses of those who participated were positive though attendance was limited. The 2003 seminar is scheduled for September 27 in Coopersburg.

In an effort to work with the Inter-cultural Committee to present the Biblical Principles of Living in a teachable format, the CE Training Committee has gathered lesson plans from board members as well as from pastors throughout the denomination. These lesson plans are being formatted for use by local churches. If your church has already taught some of the BPL materials, please submit your lesson plans to Wayne G. Clapier for consideration. Our goal will be to provide the denomination with a guideline for presenting and applying each of the Biblical Principles of Living for various age groups. We are seeking to have this work completed within three years.

Walk Thru the Bible Ministries

Walk Thru the Bible programs were presented by David N. Schoen to three churches in 2002. There has been a slight increase in cost for the local churches. Those interested in providing either the Old or New Testament overview to their congregations should contact David at DaveBBFC@enter.net .

Pastor, Elder, Deacon Retreat

The PED Retreat Committee worked with the Strategic Planning Committee to present a Leadership Summit on November 1-2 at Pinebrook. The Committee deferred its regular plans so that this gathering of pastors and church leaders could take place. Plans

are now underway for the 2003 Retreat on October 30 - November 1 at Pinebrook with guest, Dr. Todd Mangum.

Audio-Visual Materials

In recent years as the cost of video teaching materials has decreased, the use of the video library has decreased as well. Local churches have found excellent teaching resources to be available at reasonable costs and have purchased their own series for repeated use. Nevertheless, the resources available through the denomination are still available to any churches that have use of them. Several series have been culled from the collection but others are used repeatedly. For a current listing of materials now available, please check the BFC website at www.BFC.org.

Family Ministries

In an effort to provide encouragement and ministry resources for families in the denomination and to encourage local churches as they address needs in this area, the Family Ministries Committee has been formed. Plans are underway for a marriage enrichment seminar that will be shared regionally. Ideas for family enrichment should be forwarded to Timothy Cowen at TCowen@att.net.

Other Business

The Committee recognizes the concern for safety for our children, teens and adults in the local churches. In regard to protection from abuse, an ad-hoc committee was called together to consider guidelines for the local church that would provide a framework for trans-congregational application. A report of their findings was approved by the committee and is attached as informational for each BFC congregation. It is suggested that local churches consider the guidelines, making application for their own churches. We trust the material will be helpful.

Protecting Our Children; Protecting Our Leaders: Guidelines for Christian Education Staff in the Local Church

Jesus still loves the little children. Red and yellow, black and white, they are precious in His sight. How devastating it is to have even one of these little ones hurt because of an adult's sinfulness. Lifelong impact can result from even the slightest hint of abuse. Jesus said it would be better for such an offender to have a millstone hung around their neck and cast into the sea than for them to hurt one of these little ones. If He takes this impact so seriously, we should as well.

The recent records of abuse in many churches across the country, including evangelical churches, and the long-standing results of such abuse on the children, parents, perpetrators, and on the church as well are a renewed reminder of the seriousness with which we should approach the care of our children and young people. As Christians, we are called to a high standard, and as Christian leaders, we need to be above reproach in our conduct. It is vitally important for us to demonstrate integrity and trustworthiness to the people we serve.

The Board of Christian Education appointed an ad-hoc committee to develop guidelines for protection from abuse for our children and protection from allegations of abuse for our leaders. The committee met several times and gathered extensive materials on this topic. We found that some of our churches have basic guidelines while others have developed extensive policies to deal with these concerns. Each church is different. Each community is different. Each leader is different. Each child is different. No universal policies would work in these varying situations.

Nonetheless, there are some foundational principles that we believe should be universal. It is our desire that these principles and fundamental principles should be considered by each congregation and that the leaders in each church would seek to implement these guidelines for the good of the children, teens, and adults in your ministries.

1. Criminal Check and Child Abuse Clearance

Have all of your teaching staff undergo a "Child Abuse History Clearance," regardless of their length of tenure, position, or history. Obtaining such clearances helps assure parents of the safety of their children as they participate in our church ministries. This clearance

gives your staff credibility, puts all teachers and helpers on equal footing, and has the potential to protect your children from anyone who has a history of abuse. We suggest the cost for this expense be cared for by the local church. If this is totally impossible, seek other sources of funding (from the individual themselves, from contributions, etc.). Note that many teachers, health care workers, Little League coaches, and classroom helpers may already have clearance that can be copied and kept on file at the local church. Don't be overwhelmed by the initial immensity of this task. Instead, start with your key leaders and work your way through over a reasonable period of time until all of your staff have clearance. Only 1-2 leaders should be privy to this information and all results should be held in highest confidence. Determine in advance which criminal records would mean removal or non-participation in children's ministries, and which may not (ie. type of record, length of time since offense, prior to conversion, etc.) Local churches will want to determine how often such clearances should be repeated.

2. Develop Basic Guidelines for All Teaching Staff

Here are some reasonable, simple policies that will always help:

- a. *Screen all potential staff.* Check references, prepare a basic application form, ask important questions that will create the best environment for the staff member, other staff, and the students.
- b. *Team up Teachers*. Always have more than one teacher or helper in a room at a time. This protects students *and* staff.
- c. *No one drives alone*. When transporting children or teens, always have two adults present.
- d. *Don't send them; take them.* Children should not roam the hallways or go to the bathroom alone. They should be in groups and an adult should be available at all times.
- e. *Use experienced staff.* Regardless of how capable or interested someone new appears, give them six months to a year before placing them in positions of responsibility.
- f. Maintain adequate information records. Be sure to have all necessary details for each child/teen, including such things as parents names, emergency contact number, and specific health concerns.

- g. *Get written permission*. Treat off-premise activities, overnighters, and late night events with special care, being sure to have written permission from parents.
- h. *Wisdom in numbers*. If inadequate supervision is available, cancel an event rather than host an activity where problems are more likely to occur.

3. Report any concerns or allegations immediately.

The tendency in a church family maybe to give the benefit of the doubt, keep issues quiet, or just bypass the appearance of a problem situation. Don't be deceived. If you have a concern, observe a questionable situation, or see someone breaking church policy, report it to your ministry leader immediately. Don't take any allegations lightly.

Many of our Churches have already developed extensive written policies related to this issue. The extent to which each church might develop such policy is in their hands, but *all* churches should have specific, understood, clear, transferable guidelines in place. Remember that our children and teens are at risk. Remember that the credibility of the Church is at risk as well. We need not be consumed by potential problems, but we must be careful stewards of the responsibilities we have been given.

4. Pray for wisdom, guidance, and protection.

The Bible Fellowship Church takes Christian education ministry seriously. By God's grace, there have been minimal issues regarding allegations of abuse. But we can not presume on His grace. We must do our part to carefully lead our staff and ministries. We must pray for His protection on our children and our staff. Taking the precautions mentioned above and providing your local church with adequate guidelines will strengthen what is already being done. Our children are worth the work. Caring for our responsibility wisely will bring glory to the God we serve.

Report of the Study Committee: Secret Societies

The Secret Societies Studies Committee continued its work based on concerns expressed by the 119th Annual Conference with the previous report. The Committee reexamined the issues raised by the existing "Standard on Secret Oath-Bound Societies". We sought input from concerned members of Annual Conference. A representative also met with the Inter-Cultural Ministries Study Committee concerning proposed changes to particular Biblical Principles For Living. Those changes will be reflected in their report.

Clearly the existing Standard (Article 112) has been viewed by the BFC as addressing primarily the matter of Freemasonry. The Committee believes that membership in Freemasonry is not consistent with a commitment to Jesus Christ or to the Christian life. The issues are well documented in the BFC study pamphlet titled, "Secret Societies". However, Article 112 does not specifically name the Freemasons. It was this article's problems which we addressed.

We maintain that it is difficult and perhaps impossible to write a prohibition that only prohibits certain groups. There are thousands of organizations, many of which require some form of oath or affirmation; are all of them included in the prohibition? Are all oaths or affirmations wrong? Which are and which are not prohibited? Who determines which organizations are prohibited? For instance, are fraternities included under the present prohibition? In addition, the present article on Secret Societies raises questions. Is secrecy always wrong? It seems to us that the biblical basis for the present article prohibiting secrecy is insufficient. The only thing we are agreed on is that the Masons are included. This is the problem of using general language to prohibit a specific instance. A large net will catch more than one kind of fish!

For the following reasons, the Committee believes that the best way to deal with the issues raised both in the booklet, *Secret Societies* and in Article 112 is through the formation of a new "Declaration on Particular Issues" rather than through a BPL or specific membership rules:

Study Committee: Secret Societies

- 1. It seems that the only way to write a prohibition which would prohibit the Masons and not unintentionally prohibit other organizations would be to specifically mention Freemasonry in the prohibition. This the committee does not feel is appropriate in a document intended to give transcultural biblical guidelines.
- 2. Any general prohibition would not include every objectionable organization. There are many organizations which are not covered by the present article which are clearly unbiblical. To target separate prohibitions for all other organizations we feel are inconsistent with a Christian lifestyle would be to lose ground made by the whole BPL project.
- 3. There may be some very unusual instances where the leadership of a particular church may choose to allow an individual who has not yet removed himself from membership in Freemasonry to become a BFC member. Although we believe this would be most exceptional, we prefer to give the church biblical guidance and leave the final decision to the leaders of the particular church.

Important issues are raised by Article 112; included in which are the matters of oaths, affiliations, secrecy, and the proper exercise of eldership in the local church. Most important for the proposed "Declaration" is the matter of a believer's affiliations with organizations or societies other than the church. We want to be on record that there are organizations or societies whose beliefs and practices are problematic for, if not completely contrary to, the preeminence of Christ in our lives. Such groups may require the swearing of an improper oath; an allegiance higher than our allegiance to Christ; commitment to beliefs which are contrary to the teachings of Scripture; or even practices which are wrongful according to biblical standards.

Secondly, there is the matter of the oaths themselves and of proper speech for the Christian. We agree with the booklet, *Secret Societies*, and with Article 112 that the Scriptures "admonish against oaths". The Bible also includes clear teaching by principle and practice that there is a proper exercise of oaths. The proper use of oaths is discussed in detail by the *Westminster Confession* (chapter 24). However, the teaching of Christ plainly warns the

believer that oaths can be improper. Among the improper uses of oaths is swearing contrary to our allegiance to Christ or avowals that are not according to truth.

Secrecy is a complicated concern which the committee did not feel it necessary for us to resolve. Nevertheless, we were agreed that the secrecy that is characteristic of questionable affiliations cannot promote godly living or witness. Secrecy which is a cover for erroneous or illicit teaching and practice can have no place in the life of the Christian. How could we ever justify the hidden intake of poisonous beliefs for our spiritual health, or covert practices destructive to the testimony of saving truth?

Finally, we want to affirm the ongoing teaching ministry of elders and pastors in evaluating, rebuking, and encouraging all who enter into membership in our churches. There are a multitude of issues (only one of which is membership in Freemasonry) which impact whether a person is accepted into membership in the church. The way to deal with these many issues is not through writing a multitude of rules but through the proper application of biblical principle by godly leaders. This is a more difficult path and requires greater maturity by the leaders, but we believe that it is the better way.

Furthermore, let us note again that the Annual Conference has always allowed Particular Churches to create specific rules which govern their local congregations. These rules may always be more restrictive than those of Annual Conference but not less.

The committee presents the following resolution:

- Whereas, the committee believes that the present article on Secret Oath-Bound Societies (Article 112 of the Standards of Worship and Life) is not transcultural, and
- <u>Whereas</u>, the committee believes the present article on Secret Oath-Bound Societies, as traditionally understood in the BFC, is not appropriate for formulation as a separate BPL, and
- Whereas, it seems most appropriate to deal with the legitimate concerns raised in the present Article 112 with the adoption of a new <u>Declaration on Particular Issues</u>, entitled, "Affiliations", therefore, be it
- Resolved, that the 120th Annual Conference approve for First Reading, Declaration on Particular Issues: "Affiliations".

Study Committee: Secret Societies

Proposed Declaration:

Article 1005 - Affiliations

1005-1. It is highly inconsistent and anti-Scriptural for Christians to be members of organizations or societies that bind their members with oaths or affirmations that require involvement in practices or with philosophies which are contrary to our allegiance to Christ. We urge believers to refrain from joining any such organization or society. In addition, believers must look with grave concern upon organizations or societies which require secrecy for their basic tenets and practices.

1005-2. The Scriptures teach about both proper and improper taking of oaths. While oaths are not forbidden, the kind of oaths taken by members of such associations are clearly against the teaching of Christ. The secrecy and higher allegiance required by such associations are not in keeping with the believers' call to be light-bearers in the world. This violate Christ's example of openness that rejects secret hidden agendas.

1005-3. Often, being a member of such an organization or society violates the commands of the Scriptures not to be yoked together with unbelievers⁴ nor to have fellowship with the unfruitful works of darkness.⁵ Of supreme importance is that membership in any organization or society must not supercede our relationship with fellow believers⁶ and must not violate our allegiance to Christ.⁷ We cannot serve God and another master.⁸

1005-4. Therefore, elders are encouraged to consider most seriously the affiliations maintained by persons who are seeking membership or hold membership in a BFC, giving godly counsel whenever necessary. Elders may choose to withhold membership or exercise church discipline in certain circumstances based on an individual's affiliations.⁹

Pastoral Appointment List

The pastoral appointments list was first published in 1908 by the secretary of Annual Conference, C. H. Brunner. He began with 1874 when appointments became part of the minutes of Annual Conference. He drew on the written record and, to some extent, on his memory. He maintained the list during his lengthy term as secretary. Following his death, the list was maintained by the secretaries and last published in its entirety in the 1952 Yearbook.

For the next 24 years, the list went without update. In 1976, Willard E. Cassel updated the record which was then published in the 1976 edition of the *Faith & Order*. Willard compiled a further update which was published in the 1994 Yearbook.

The Historical Committee determined to computerize the entire list. In 2002, Richard Taylor, the archivist, completed the record.

What follows is the most recent installment of the record of pastoral appointments including the years from 1993 / 94 to 2002 /03. The computer record was used to create this newest update. The list has been expanded to include those who have been called through the Pulpit Supply system to serve as assistant or associate pastors. Appointments to mission churches are included as well.

Blank spaces indicate that no appointment was made. When a position was vacant until a call was issued, the word, "none", appears in the record. Notes are at the end.
