A Look Back:

100 Years Ago – 1907 (Richard E. Taylor, Archivist)

The year of our Lord, nineteen hundred and seven. Teddy

Roosevelt lived in the White House. Oklahoma became the 46th state to enter the union called the United States of America. The United Parcel Service had its beginning. James Michener was born. Pavlov was conducting his experiments about conditioned responses. First class stamps cost 2 cents. And, the Mennonite Brethren in Christ were meeting for their 24th Annual Conference, October 10, 1907.

They met at the Royersford Church located at Sixth and Walnut. The stone on the outside of the church proclaimed in a somewhat pretentious way that they had come to the "M. B. And C. Temple of Royersford."

The Annual Conference was preceded by the Ministerial Convention beginning on Wednesday morning, October 9. The pastors and delegates gathered at 9:00a.m. While the pastors shunned formal education, they were eager and enthusiastic learners who wanted to serve the Lord well. If institutions of learning were not helpful, they would learn from each other. Essays were presented. First, George A. Campbell spoke about "The Conversation of the Minister according to Ephesians 5:4." John G. Shireman followed that with "The Life of the Pastor in the Practice of the Doctrines of the Bible." Emanuel N. Cassel addressed the issue of "The Proper Study for and the Education of the Minister." Richard L. Woodring turned his attention to "The Advisability of Employing Evangelists on Already Supplied Territory." William S. Hottel, a superb teacher and preacher even as a young man, topped off the day in the 7:00p.m. meeting with his essay on "Power Needed for Service." Each presentation was

discussed and received.

The pastors and delegates left to enjoy the hearty welcome of their Royersford hosts and get a night's rest. Tomorrow they would begin again.

On Thursday morning, twenty-four pastors and eighteen delegates were ready to begin. They left their host breakfast tables which had been piled high with hospitality and proceeded to the meeting house which was warm and waiting for them.

The chairman, W. G. Gehman, preached from *1Cor. 13* which the secretary called "a very earnest and practical address." They proceeded to pray and seek the blessing of God and the guidance of the Holy Spirit. They turned to the routine reports that have been part of Annual Conferences before and after.

On Thursday evening, they assembled as a committee of the whole. When they met in this way, they could dispense with the niceties of parliamentary procedure and just talk about the matters facing them. The orphanage and the home were to be the primary topics of their discussions. On Friday morning when they reported, they had decided to dismiss some of the wayward brothers and reported that all was well.

They recorded signs of progress. Camp meetings were large and larger. Two new parsonages were ready for the Reading district. A new church and parsonage were purchased in Philadelphia. The spirit of disloyalty at Coopersburg had been conquered with progress noted everywhere in the district, especially at Bethlehem. From Cleveland came the report that the publishing house had large buildings for their headquarters with foundations being laid for a permanent work. The Gospel Mission works at Sunbury and Shamokin were going well. A lot was purchased in Shamokin with a large dwelling in back. A new chapel was nearly finished. The first Gospel Herald Camp Meeting in Shamokin was held that year with 85 tents. Tent meetings had been held in Sunbury, Stroudsburg, Scranton, Washington, NJ, and Norristown. They were all very pleased and encouraged with what they saw.

The Executive Board had little to offer in its report. The Executive Board had first been established six years earlier. They were working to incorporate the churches under the legal name,

Mennonite Brethren in Christ, but not making progress.

They had heard from their missionaries. With joy they resolved: Whereas, Our missionaries in Chili, China, and Turkey, reported good health, excellent courage and God's gracious protection through tests in sickness, railroad accidents,

earthquakes, etc., and

Whereas, God has wonderfully blessed their efforts in the salvation of many souls, healing the sick, etc., in the various places, therefore,

Resolved, That we appreciate the devotion, self-denial, and untiring service of those of our beloved brethren and sisters in the "Regions Beyond," and that we pledge ourselves to continue their support as well as to pray more earnestly that their lives may be protected from the hands of their enemies, that they may be kept in the hour of discouragements and temptations, that they may be used more efficiently and successfully than ever for the salvation of souls, the preparation of the Bride and the hastening of the coming of the Lord.

Missionary Calvin F. Snyder was able to join them at the conference. Snyder was serving as a missionary to China. He and his wife would serve faithfully for many more years and send many exciting and encouraging reports. They were also glad for the correspondence from Rose Lambert, working in Turkey to establish an orphanage and Mr. and Mrs. H. W. Feldges, working in Chile.

The meetings and discussions continued through Friday and Saturday. On Sunday, they gathered for praise and preaching. The secretary gave a full report.

Each service was opened by a song service, in charge of R. L. Woodring. At 10 a.m., H. B. Musselman, P. E. of the Bethlehem District, preached a very instructive, practical Conference sermon from acts 6:4. Our hearts burned within us as the word was preached in the demonstration of power and the Holy Ghost. It will not be without fruit among the ministry.

At 2p.m., Bro. W. G. Gehman, P. E. of the Mt. Carmel District, preached the Ordination sermon from 1 Timothy 3:10; 2 Timothy 4:5. The meaning, object and benefits of ordination were clearly and forcibly set forth. The proper characteristics of a candidate for ordination, including loyalty, faithfulness, obedience, etc., were clearly defined. The brethren C. F. Snyder, B. A., of China; E. E. Kublic, and P. J. Musselman were ordained amidst the manifest presence of the glory of God.

At 7.30 p.m., J. C. Roth preached a stirring sermon on

Abraham's question relating to Sodom, "Shall God destroy the righteous with the wicked?" He depicted clearly the difference between the end of the righteous and the unrighteous. An invitation and altar service followed, ending with a praise meeting. The church was crowded all day and God's blessing rested upon every service. This was by many termed the best Conference they ever attended.

On Monday afternoon, after the morning off, they re-assembled to finish their business and prepare to return home. They reported their elections and more of the report of the Committee on Resolutions.

They had one more major point of discussion. The resolutions were passed.

Resolved, That the word "Church" be dropped from our records wherever it appears in connection with "Mennonite Brethren in Christ."

Resolved, That the Secretary be authorized to make the above corrections on all deeds, charters, and other documents wherever and whenever advisable.

What motivated such a resolution? What prompted them to say that they were not a church? Some might have pointed to their history of being church-outsiders. The church had been a state institution that worked against them. They were not part of the church but outside of it. They were Brethren. Others would speak of the demands of church for bureaucracy and organization. Churches had requirements. It shouldn't be like that for they were simple hearted folks who just wanted to serve the Lord together. They were Brethren. Others were prompted to the change by the rising theology of dispensationalism in which the church was a parenthesis, not a plan. Why would you be something temporary and never intended as part of the work? No, they were not a church; they were Brethren. And Brethren they would be, at least until 1943 when the word "church" quietly crept back into the titles. And when they chose a new name, it was not Bible Fellowship. They were the Bible Fellowship Church.

They adjourned their meeting and returned to their homes thinking little about planting churches and lots about bringing people to Christ.

Conference Reporter 124th Annual Conference Carol Z. Snyder

At ten a.m., Monday morning, April 23, 2007, the 124th Annual Conference of the Bible Fellowship Church was called to order by Chairman Randall A. Grossman. He led in prayer on behalf of the BFC, asking God for wisdom and direction in the proceedings.

Pastor Rick Ravis, a pastor at Christ Community Church in Piscataway, NJ, served as worship leader. In the first service, a number of well-known hymns were sung by the approximately 150 members of Conference. During subsequent times of worship, contemporary praise music was led by a praise band of pastors and delegates.

The conference theme was A Proclamation of Fellowship. Chairman Grossman was the Monday morning speaker; presenting

the message titled, Fellowship Enjoyed in Great Wonder.

Routine business was conducted during the first session. The bar was established (voting members of conference), with most churches being represented by its pastor(s) and delegate. Larger churches had additional representatives. Many first-time members were introduced. The chairman made routine appointments to positions such as parliamentarian, timekeeper and tellers.

During this first day, a unique opportunity was offered to BFC ordained men. The Konolds, Bob and Peg, from Calvary BFC in Coopersburg, PA, were present to take pictures of ordained ministers and make ID cards. Bob, a retired state policeman, provided the equipment needed for this service. The Conference

offers thanks to the Konolds for their volunteer service.

During this Conference, a record number of seven men were approved for ordination to the Christian ministry of the BFC, with two of them being father and son, Ray and Tim Bertolet. Also the former ordinations of two men were recognized. All nine man were seated at the bar on Monday morning. The actual ordination ceremony occurred Tuesday night.

Also on Monday, Marcos Ramirez, pastor of *Iglesia Biblica La Roca* in Merida Yucatan, Mexico, addressed Conference, noting that his church is praying for Annual Conference. He has been in discussion with the *Ethnic Church Planting Committee* of the BFC regarding the possibility of his Mexican congregation becoming part of the BFC fellowship of churches.

Much of the work on Monday included the reception of reports from more than seventeen boards and committees that had functioned during the year. Each day, elections for those to serve on these were conducted.

Every evening, Conference Pastor Ronald Mahurin led a session of reporting and rejoicing-Trophies of God's Grace-when the Conference learned what the Lord is doing in the various regions in the BFC. These reports brought encouragement and prayer support for God's work through the Bible Fellowship Church in seven states and around the world.

On Wednesday morning, Pastor Philip E. Yerrington. Graterford BFC, Graterford, PA, spoke on Fellowship Restored at

Great Grace.

Elections were concluded and numerous recommendations from boards were considered. Also, the Report of the Study Committee on the Millennium was discussed. Another matter of significance was the presentation and adoption of a new Bible Fellowship Church logo.

Conference attenders appreciated the hospitality of Pinebrook Bible Conference and the excellent meals prepared by Pinebrook's

new Food Services Manager, Chef Doug.

Should the Lord delay His return to earth, the Bible Fellowship Church will celebrate its 125th anniversary in 2008. May God help us always to proclaim His glory as we seek to become an expanding fellowship of churches united to make disciples of Jesus Christ.



- (2) A Minister (Delete "ordained") who is without a call to a church is eligible to serve in an elective office and on Conference boards and committees as long as he remains on the list of Ordained Ministers working under the direction of the BFC.

[SECOND READING]

Resolved, that the following replace Article 512-11.3 in the *F&O* and be adopted at Second Reading (changes in bold):

512-11.3 Categories of Ministry

All ordained men who hold Ordination Credentials with the BFC shall be members in good standing in a Particular BFC and shall subscribe annually to the F&O.

The categories of ministry are as follows:

- (1) Ordained Ministers Working Under the Direction of the BFC
- (2) Ordained Ministers Working Under the Direction of the Board of Missions of the BFC
- (3) Ordained Ministers Working in (omit: the Military) Chaplaincy Ministries Under the Sponsorship of the BFC. The BFC qualifies to have men with its ministerial credentials to serve under the U.S. Armed Forces Chaplains Board under the endorsement of the National Conference of Ministry to the Armed Forces; as well as other Chaplain ministries such as the prison and hospital. Applications for such ministries shall be made through the Credentials Committee.
- (4) Ordained Ministers in Retirement. These are men who have retired under the provisions of Section 503. A minister must serve a minimum of five years (cumulative) as an ordained minister in the BFC and be under the care of the Credentials Committee at retirement to be a member of Annual Conference as a "Minister in Retirement."
- (5) Ordained Ministers Between Calls. When a minister leaves his church or ministry without a call to another Bible Fellowship Church, he may be placed in either the "Between Calls" or "Leave of Absence" category, as determined by the Credentials Committee. A Minister who is in the "Between Calls" category is one who is presently seeking a call from a Bible Fellowship Church. He may remain in this category for a maximum of two years. A written request for an extension will be reviewed and may be granted by the Credentials Committee.
- (6) Ordained Ministers on Leave of Absence. (Omit present statement and replace with): A minister who is in the "Leave of Absence" category is not currently open to receiving a call from a Bible Fellowship Church. He may remain in this category for a maximum of two years. A written request for an extension will be reviewed and may be granted by the Credentials Committee. The combination of "Leave of Absence" and "Between Calls" in any consecutive period shall not exceed five years total, except under unusual circumstances as

determined by the Credentials Committee.

(7) Ordained Inactive Ministers. A minister who has exhausted his stay in the "Between Calls" and/or "Leave of Absence" categories will be placed in the "Ordained Inactive Ministers" category. He may remain in this category for a period not to exceed ten years of which time spent in the "Between Calls" and/or "Leave of Absence" categories is counted. At the end of ten years he loses his credentials with the Bible Fellowship Church. If he wishes to return to active ministry within the BFC, he must reapply to the Ministerial Candidate Committee.

[SECOND READING]

Whereas, the category of ministry "Ordained Ministers Working in Other Christian Ministries" was not included in our legislation at last year's 123rd Annual Conference, and

Whereas, this has been one of the credible ministry designations, and

Whereas, we believe this category is one we should continue to have, therefore be it

Whereas, a foreseen faith position is inconsistent with the Articles of Faith of the Bible Fellowship Church, which states "election is a free act of the sovereign God in which from eternity, for reasons known only to Himself, and apart from any goodness in man, He graciously chose..." (Article 11-1), therefore, be it

Resolved, that any persons who presently hold to a foreseen faith position should not sign that they "subscribe without reservation" [F&O, 512-11.2, Duties (4)] to our present Articles of Faith but should declare their reservation regarding Article 11. Whether or not the proposed clarifications are adopted, such persons, if holding credentials, should continue to minister and will continue to be embraced by the Bible Fellowship Church. The Bible Fellowship Church will continue to require persons seeking credentials to be "committed without reservation" [F&O, 512-13.3, Duties (5)] to the Articles of Faith.

Yes - 119; No - 23

Resolved, that the following legislation was approved as First Reading:

Whereas, the words *But unless regenerated* contained in the proposed Article 10 have been construed by many to require that one must believe that regeneration precedes faith, and

Whereas, the Study Committee on the Process and Purpose of God's Calling People to Salvation stated on the conference floor that it was not its intention to imply by these words that regeneration must precede faith, and

Whereas, it is the purpose of the proposed changes to bring a greater clarity to the present articles, and

Whereas, the meaning of the phrase but unless regenerated is not sufficiently clear, therefore be it

Resolved, that the words but unless regenerated be deleted from Article 10 that was adopted at first reading and that the original wording, but left to himself, be re-inserted.

Article 204 - Elders, Deacons, Staff

Having called and assembled His church, our Lord provides for the leadership and care of each Particular Church by providing elders and deacons and enabling them to do their work. Elders are responsible to rule the church and must be qualified men, and deacons are responsible to serve the church and may be qualified men or women. Elders and deacons are the only terms describing continuing positions in the New Testament church. Those who serve in these ways do not create their positions, nor do their positions clothe the individuals with power, but the Lord endows individuals with gifts and qualifications (1 Timothy 3; Titus 1; 1 Peter 5) that enable them to do their work as God Himself has designed.

[FIRST READING]

Resolved, that the new Article 204-1 Elders, 204-1.1, 204-1.2, 204-1.3, 204-1.4 and 204-1.5 be accepted as a First Reading revision to the *Faith & Order*.

204-1 Elders

204-1.1 In the New Testament church Christ has provided men to hold the position of elder to oversee the life of His Church; those whom He commissions He enables to shepherd His Church.

204-1.2 The position of elder is given broad responsibility and authority in the New Testament. Because they are to be examples to the flock in godliness and to govern well, they are

called elders. Because they are responsible for oversight and administration of the life of the church, they are called overseers or bishops. Because they are to care for and feed God's people, they are called pastors (shepherds). Because they serve the people of the church, they are called ministers.

- 204-1.3 All elders together share the authority in and responsibility for the life of the church. Some elders are gifted and recognized as teaching elders; their primary authority and responsibility is in the Word and doctrine and secondarily in oversight. Other elders are gifted and recognized as ruling elders; their primary authority and responsibility is in oversight and secondarily in the Word and doctrine.
- **204-1.4** The work of the elders is to shepherd the flock. This work includes: Guarding (Acts 20:28), Overseeing (1 Tim 5:17; 1 Pet 5:2), Discipling (1 Thes 5:12; 2 Tim 2:2), Preaching and Teaching (1 Tim 5:17; Titus 1:9; John 8:31-32), Evangelizing (2 Tim 4:5), Praying (Acts 6:4, John 17, John 14:12-14, Jas 5:13-16), Serving (1 Tim 4:14; 1 Pet 4:10-11) and Disciplining (Titus 1:9).
- **204-1.5** Elders, as leaders of the people, are chosen by the membership of the church on the basis of Scriptural qualifications.

Resolved, that word "office" be changed to "position" in Article 204-1.6 as a First Reading revision to the *Faith & Order*.

[FIRST READING]

Yes - 127; No - 12

Resolved, that the new Article 204-2.1 and Article-204-2.2 be approved as First Reading to the *Faith & Order* to replace the former Article 204-1.1 through 204-1.3.

204-2 Ministers

204-2.1 The Lord of the Church has given gifts to men called

ministers in His church. This position is the first in the church in both dignity and usefulness. Although all elders are to be able to teach, some elders are specially gifted for teaching and preaching. The Lord of the Church has given those gifts to men we call ministers.

204-2.2 Terminology. The term "minister" is not used in Scripture to identify the specific position of elder, but to indicate the service to Christ and His people given by those who hold this position. "Pastor" is used as a gift to the church. Although neither "minister" nor "pastor" is used in Scripture as a specific position, these titles are used and are interchangeable in practice for those men we call ministers.

Moreover, though the English word "deacon" has its roots in the Greek word "diakonos," which is translated "minister" or "servant"; this gives no basis for women being elders, ministers or pastors.

A minister or pastor in the BFC must hold or be seeking credentials in the BFC.

204-4.1 The position of deacon is presented in the Scriptures as a position not of ruling, but of service. A deacon should be a person of deep spiritual life, exemplary conduct, and sound judgment (1Tim 3; Acts 6:1-8). This position is one of sympathetic service to the church and to the distressed, friendless, or sick, after the example of our Lord Jesus Christ.

204-4.4 Because of the qualifications and dignity of the position of Deacon, each Particular Church shall give careful consideration to ensure that a person who has been divorced or who has married a divorced person is presently characterized as above reproach, and if married, faithful to and exclusively committed to their spouse.

[FIRST READING]

Resolved, that the new Article 204-4.2 and Article 204-4.3 be approved as a First Reading addition to the *Faith & Order*.

204-4.2 Those who serve in this position should be known for their trustworthiness, their temperance, their faith, and their blameless life.

204-4.3 Deacons, as servants of the church, are chosen by the membership of the church on the basis of Scriptural qualifications.

Resolved, that "lay elder" be changed simply to "elder," that "office" be changed to "position," and "exercise" be changed to "hold" in Articles 401-1.1, 401-1.8 and 401-1.9 to be approved as a First Reading revision to the *Faith & Order*.

Resolved, that changes listed under Article 401-2 be adopted at Second Reading (changes found in bold type.)

401-2. The Board of Deacons

401-2.1 The Board of Deacons shall be composed of all deacons duly elected by and from the congregation who meet the qualifications of the Scriptures. They shall be mature **believers** (replaces men) who demonstrate a spiritual wisdom and compassion so that they might serve the needy in a Christlike, merciful way.

401-2.5 Election and Installation of Deacons. Each congregation may elect deacons in keeping with the qualifications set forth in Scripture. Deacons must be (delete male) **members** in full communion in the church in which they are to exercise their office.

The term of office shall be determined by the Particular Church by congregational vote, but shall not be less than three years, except when a Particular Church desires a probationary term of service for newly-chosen deacons. When possible the Board of Deacons shall be divided into not fewer than three classes as determined by congregational vote in each of the Particular Churches.

In the event of a vacancy by death, resignation, or removal, a **member** (replaces man) may be elected to fill the unexpired term of office....

Questions to the congregation - end of 401-2.5

(1) Do you, the members of this church, acknowledge and receive this brother (or sister) as a deacon?

(2) Do you promise to give him (or her) all the honor, encouragement, and support in the Lord to which this (replaces his) position entitles him (or her)?

After the members of the church have answered these questions in the affirmative by holding up their right hands, the minister shall proceed to set apart the candidate by prayer to the office of deacon and shall give to him (or her) and to the congregation an exhortation suited to the occasion.

401-1.1

The lay elders shall be elected by majority vote of the congregation. They shall be mature men who meet the qualifications of Scripture (1Tim 3; Titus 1; I Peter 5). If the congregation has more qualified elders than are needed to serve at one time, the number of active elders shall be determined by the congregation by ballot vote upon recommendation of the Board of Elders.

Yes - 55; No -80

401-1.2

The Board of Elders shall elect one of its members to serve as chairman, and one of its members to serve as secretary. Two thirds of the membership of the board shall constitute a quorum.



Resolved,

- 1. An amount equal to 100% of the pension payments received during the year of **2008** be and is hereby designated as a rental/housing allowance for each retired and disabled ordained or licensed minister of The Bible Fellowship Church who is or was a member of the Bible Fellowship Church Minister's Retirement Fund.
- 2. This rental/housing allowance shall apply to each retired and disabled ordained or licensed minister who has been granted the retired relationship or placed on disability leave by the Bible Fellowship Annual Conference and whose name and relationship to the conference is recorded in the *Yearbook* of the Annual Conference of the Bible Fellowship Church and in other appropriate records maintained by the conference.
- 3. The pension payment to which this rental/housing allowance applies shall be the pension payment resulting from all service of such retired or disabled ordained or licensed minister from all employment by any local church, Annual Conference or institution of The Bible Fellowship Church or of any former denomination that is now a part of The Bible Fellowship Church, or from any other employer who employed the minister

to perform services related to the ministry and who elected to make contributions to the pension funds of The Bible Fellowship Church for such retired minister's pension.

Note: The rental/housing allowance which may be excluded from a minister's gross income is limited to the lesser of (1) the amount of the rental/housing allowance designated by the minister's employer or other appropriate body, (2) the amount actually expended by the minister to provide his or her housing, or (3) the legally-determined fair rental value of the parsonage or other housing provided. As specified in Rev. Rul. 71-290 C.B. 92, "the only amount that will qualify for exclusion under section 107(2) of the Code as a 'rental allowance' is an amount equal to the fair rental value of the home, including furnishings and appurtenances such as a garage, plus the cost of utilities."

Resolved, that the recommended minimum salary for a pastor serving in the BFC for the calendar year 2007 be \$31,000.00. In addition to his salary, the church must provide half of the pastor's Social Security tax, parsonage and/or housing allowance (which would include utilities, repair costs, etc.), health insurance, and provision should be made for reimbursement for allowable car and professional expenses. The church must also contribute a minimum of 3% of the pastor's salary for retirement to the Ministers Annuity Fund, plus an additional 1% match if the pastor is voluntarily contributing 1%.

Note:

The above recommendation is considered the minimum. In establishing a fair and equitable salary and benefits package for the minister, consideration should be given to experience, education and the cost of living as per one's location. In some areas, a higher figure would be more equitable.

Additional information from the Pastoral Relations Committee can be found in the *Yearbook*. One can also contact the Reading BFC for added information.

Resolved, that the Annual Conference ratify the election of Ronald C. Mahurin as Conference Pastor for a term of three years.

Resolved, that the salary for the Conference Pastor be \$26,000 and in addition, we provide \$6,200 for health insurance and \$9,300 for auto and professional expenses. Total - \$41,500

The Ministerial Relations Committee presented the following resolution:

Resolved, that the following legislation be adopted at Second Reading

Article 409 - Pastoral Change Procedure

The orderly transition of pastoral leadership is crucial to the health of a church. As the Chief Shepherd, Jesus Christ should be invoked to provide for the care of His under-shepherds, the pastors, and for the needs of His flock, the congregation. The Ministerial Relations Committee is responsible to provide guidance to both pastors and churches during this transition.

409-1 Instituting the Pastoral Relationship

- **409- 1.1** When a church is seeking a Pastor, the Board of Elders shall meet with representatives of the Ministerial Relations Committee to discuss the following:
 - (1) Temporary pulpit supply. The Board of Elders shall provide for temporary pulpit supply on an interim basis. Pastors serving in this capacity shall be in sympathy with the *F&O* of the BFC.
 - (2) Election of a Pastoral Search Committee.
 - (3) Congregational self-study, pastoral profile, and candidate search procedures.
 - (4) Rules for calling a pastor.
- 409-1.2 The Board of Elders shall call a congregational meeting according to our rules (see §403) in order to elect a Pastoral Search Committee. The Board of Elders shall recommend the composition, size and election of the Pastoral Search Committee. The committee may vary from church to church, but in all cases shall be viewed as subordinate to the

Board of Elders. Under normal circumstances, the chairman of the Pastoral Search Committee shall be an elder.

409-1.3 The Pastoral Search Committee shall maintain regular communication with the chairman of the Ministerial Relations Committee concerning progress in the pastoral search. The Ministerial Relations Committee shall seek to provide guidance and advice to the Pastoral Search Committee in its work.

409-1.4 The Pastoral Search Committee shall seek a candidate who is fitted to the needs of the church and is or will be licensed to serve as a pastor in the BFC. If a candidate is not licensed to serve as a pastor in the BFC, he shall be referred to the Ministerial Candidate Committee. Under ordinary circumstances, the candidate must gain final approval by regular procedures in order to be called by the church.

409-1.5 On certain exceptional occasions, it may be necessary to expedite the procedure for issuing a call to a man who is previously ordained but not licensed by the BFC.

These circumstances are when:

(1) geographic distance allows limited, direct contact.

(2) the demands of current ministry do not allow for the normal process.

(3) the church applies for special consideration because of urgent circumstances.

The expedited process is as follows:

 The church shall request the chairman of the Ministerial Relations Committee to use the expedited process. He, in consultation with the chairman of the Ministerial Candidate Committee, approves or disapproves the request.

(2) If the request is approved, the Ministerial Candidate Committee shall interview the man. If he is approved as a candidate under our rules (see 512-13.4), he shall

be given the Open Book Examination.

(3) Upon the satisfactory completion of the Open Book Examination, the church may seek to issue a call, which

is provisional.

- (4) After the provisional call is issued, the man shall complete all other examinations and requirements of the Ministerial Candidate Committee before beginning the new ministry or moving into church-provided housing.
- (5) When all examinations and requirements are satisfactorily completed, the Ministerial Candidate Committee will approve the man as a licensed probationer (see §514-13.4), effective on the date of the approval of his final examination. The Ministerial Relations Committee will recognize the provisional call as the formal call on the same date.
- **409-1.6** When the Pastoral Search Committee had completed its work, it shall recommend a candidate to the Board of Elders. The Board of Elders shall conduct any other research or interviews it deems necessary, including establishing the terms of the call.
- 409-1.7 When the Board of Elders is ready to present a candidate to the congregation, it shall inform the chairman of the Ministerial Relations Committee of the name and of the terms of the call. The purpose of this consultation is to protect the candidate, the church, and the BFC from unnecessary difficulties. The Ministerial Relations Committee shall have one week to approve or disapprove of the presentation of the candidate to the congregation.
- **409-1.8** If the Ministerial Relations Committee approves the presentation of the candidate, the Board of Elders shall call a congregational meeting according to our rules (see §403) for the purpose of calling a pastor.
- 409-1.9 The congregational meeting shall be led by the First Delegate or, at his request, a member of the Ministerial Relations Committee. Following the report of the pastoral search committee and/or the Board of Elders, the congregation shall vote on the question, "Are you ready to proceed to the calling of a pastor?" If a majority of members present and

voting approve, a vote shall be taken to call the pastor. This vote shall be by written ballot. Absentee ballots are not allowed. The leader of the meeting shall announce the outcome of the vote and inform the congregation that the next step in the process is the approval or disapproval of the call by the Ministerial Relations Committee.

409-1.10 The Ministerial Relations Committee shall be informed of the outcome of the vote. The purpose of this consultation is to advise the Board of Elders concerning the issuing of a call and to approve or disapprove it. If the vote is approved by a strong majority, the Elders will be advised to proceed with the issuing of a call. If the vote is not approved by a strong majority, the Elders may be advised to consider options other than issuing a call. The Ministerial Relations Committee shall have the final authority to approve or disapprove the call.

409-1.11 Upon receiving the approval of the Ministerial Relations Committee, the Board of Elders may proceed to issue a call to the pastor as follows:

The <u>(name)</u> Church, of <u>(city and state)</u>, believing that you are well-qualified to serve as our pastor for the glory of God and our spiritual benefit, invite you,

<u>(name of candidate)</u> to accept this call to serve as our <u>(title of pastor)</u> promising you all proper support, encouragement, and obedience in the Lord.

In order to provide for your needs, we promise to pay you an annual salary of \$\sum_\text{together with additional benefits} as follows: (other benefits may include parsonage use, housing, educational or professional allowances). We also will provide (number of weeks) vacation each year.

We also will pay into your Minister's Annuity Fund the percentage of your salary established by Annual Conference.

We will also pay you a sum equivalent to your selfemployment tax (FICA).

We will also provide health insurance for you and your family, equivalent to a standard set by the BFC Board of Directors and agreed on by you and the church.

And we promise to review with you the a	dequacy of this
compensation annually. We, the elders of	
Church, sign our names to this call on	(date).

409-1.12 Upon receiving the approval of the Ministerial Relations Committee (see 409-1.9), the Board of Elders or Agency Board may proceed to issue a bi-vocational call as follows:

The __(church / agency)___, believing that you are well-qualified to serve as pastor for the glory of God and the benefit of His church, invite you __(name of candidate) to accept this call to serve in the office of __(position / title) __, promising you all proper support, encouragement and obedience in the Lord.

We also will pay into your Ministers Annuity Fund the percentage of your salary established by Annual Conference.

We also will pay you a sum equivalent to your selfemployment tax (FICA). (The following sentence is optional.)

We also will provide health insurance agreed on by you and the (church / agency)_.

This is a call to serve bi-vocationally, that is, with the understanding that you will provide part of your support through other employment than the ministerial position to which we are calling you.

We promise to review with you the adequacy of this call and its conditions each year, to increase our provision for your support as we are able, and to provide full support for you as soon as it is possible.

We sign our names to this call on __(date)_.

409-1.13 An Agency of the BFC may call a person to serve in its ministry. In such cases the board of directors of the Agency shall act in the place of the Board of Elders, Pastoral Search Committee, and Congregation. As in the case of a call to a Particular Church, the Ministerial Relations Committee shall approve the name, the terms, and the call of the candidate. The form of the call shall be modeled after the form for Particular Churches (see 409-1.11).

409-1.15 Upon receiving the call from the church or agency, the candidate has three weeks to accept or reject the call in writing. If the candidate accepts the call, the Ministerial Relations Committee shall set the effective date in consultation with the candidate and the church.

[SECOND READING]

Resolved, that the following be approved as First Reading:

Paragraphs 409-1.1 - 409-1.13 refer to the calling of a Senior Pastor in a church with more than one pastor, or the only Pastor in a church with one pastor. In churches with more than one pastor, the elders may choose to adopt the procedure in paragraph 409-1.14

409-1.14 In churches with more than one pastor, the elders may choose to call a pastor other than the Senior Pastor as follows: The Board of Elders shall serve as the Pastoral Search Committee and shall issue a call without a congregational vote.

The Ministerial Relations Committee shall approve the name, the terms and the call of the candidate. The form of the call shall be modeled after the call in paragraph 409-1.11. The call shall be communicated to the congregation.

[FIRST READING]

Resolved, that the following be adopted at Second Reading:

409-2 Dissolving the Pastoral Relationship (omit present 409-2, 409-2.1, 409-2.2)

(omit paragraph following title of 409-3)

- **409-2.1** An Uncontested Resignation (unchanged except for the following)
 - (2) Omit
 - (2.1) Omit "severance pay"
 - (2.2) Ordinarily . . . The action of the Board of Elders shall be communicated to the chairman of the Ministerial Relations Committee prior to the effective date of the resignation. (omit ". . . by the secretary . . . cannot be reached.").

(omit paragraph (3) and replace (4) with the following:)

(3) The Board of Elders shall call a congregational meeting according to our rules (see 403) in order to consider the resignation of the pastor. When the congregation approves the resignation of the pastor, this information shall be communicated to the chairman of the Ministerial Relations Committee within one week. The special provisions made for the pastor's transition (see 2.1 above), may be announced by the Board of Elders or, if they so decide, approved by the Congregation, by a separate resolution at the same meeting.

409-2.2 A Contested Resignation

(1) Replace final sentence beginning "Rules for communicating the results . . ." with "This decision shall be communicated to the chairman of the Ministerial Relations Committee within twenty-four hours.

409-2.3 Churches Desiring Dissolution of the Pastorate

- If the issues leading to a desire by the church to dissolve the pastorate involve moral or doctrinal charges against the pastor, the church shall follow the procedure outlined in the Book of Discipline (see section 300).
- (2) No changes

409-3.4, 409-3.5, 409-3.6 Omit

[SECOND READING]

Resolved, that the following be approved as First Reading:

Paragraph 409-2.1 - 409-2.3 refer to the resignation of a Senior Pastor in a church with more than one pastor, or the only pastor in a church with one pastor. For pastors called under the procedures 409-1.4, the resignation shall be according to the procedure of 409-2.4.

409-2.4 Resignation or Removal of Pastors called by Boards of Elders.

In the case of a pastor called under the procedure of 409-1.14, resignation or removal is as follows:

Resignation - The pastor submits his resignation to the Board of Elders. He shall submit a copy to the chairman of the Ministerial Relations Committee. The Board of Elders shall act on the resignation, including special provisions such as in 409-2.1

The Board of Elders shall inform the congregation of

the effective date and terms of the resignation.

Removal - Boards of Elders shall adopt the procedure of 409-2.3 except that following the due process of 409-2.3 (1)(2.1-5) the Ministerial Relations Committee may approve the request of the Board of Elders to terminate the pastorate. The effective date and terms of the termination shall be communicated to the congregation. paragraph 409-2.3 (2.12) is in effect in this situation.

[FIRST READING]

Resolved, that the following be adopted at Second Reading:

512-14 Ministerial Relations Committee

The purpose of the Ministerial Relations Committee is to foster a healthy relationship between pastors and churches, to help to resolve problems in the pastoral relationship, and to assist churches in calling pastors.

512-14-1 Composition and Election

Omit (3)

512-14-2 Duties

- (1) The committee shall provide counsel and advice to churches and pastors upon their invitation. The committee may be invited to assist a church in this way upon request of the Board of Elders, the Pastoral Relations Committee of the church, an individual Elder or Elders, or the Pastor.
- (2) The committee may initiate involvement and call a meeting with the Pastor, Pastoral Relations Committee, or Board of Elders if the committee concludes there are matters threatening the health of the pastoral relationship which are not being adequately addressed by the Particular Church. This request for a meeting shall be in writing, stating the reasons that the Ministerial Relations Committee has for requesting it.

(3) The committee shall seek to resolve difficulties in the pastoral relationship whether they have been invited or have initiated involvement in the Particular Church. This involvement may take the form of meetings with the Pastor, Elders or Members, with the Pastoral Relations Committee, with the Board of Elders, or with the Congregation.

(4) The committee shall oversee the resignation of a pastor

according to our rules.

(5) The committee shall meet with the Elders and/or Pastoral Search Committee with respect to temporary pulpit supply, the pastoral search process, and the calling of a pastor. It shall oversee the calling of a pastor according to our rules.

(6) The committee shall refer any problems concerning pastoral relationships that it cannot resolve to Annual Conference for final resolution. This referral may or may not have recommendations concerning resolution.

(7) The committee shall submit a report to Annual Conference, including recommendations concerning the minimum salary package for pastors called under our rules.

406-2 Mission Organizations: (proposed changes are underlined and bold)

406-2.1 Each Particular Church is encouraged to establish organizations that will promote and assist in carrying out its task of world evangelization. Organizations so established are encouraged to inform the Board of Missions and Church-extension Ministries of their officers in order that information can be circulated to and coordinated with similar organizations from other Particular Churches. Suggested bylaws for such organizations are available in the Appendix.

406-2.2 Regional Mission Organization Programs. The Board

of Missions and Church Extension Ministries may coordinate regional programs as deemed advisable.

[FIRST READING]

Resolved, that the following be approved as First Reading:

Article 504 -Membership of Congregations in Annual Conference

504-1. Particular Church.

Any congregation meeting the standards of Article 18 of the Articles of Faith and committed to the F&O, may be admitted to membership in Annual Conference and shall be known as a Particular Church. This admission must follow upon a positive assessment and recommendation by the Board of Church Extension. Assessment includes an evaluation of elders, committed participants and financial stability.

504-2. Mission Churches

- 504-2.1 Any congregation that is under the supervision of the Board of Church Extension of the BFC but has not yet met the standard for recognition as a Particular Church shall be called a mission church. The term mission church is used in a technical sense, but this does not preclude the use of the term church in any of the congregation's public relations activities.
- 504-2.2 The Board of Church Extension has the responsibility of assessing the preparedness of the mission church for admission to Annual Conference.
- 504-2.3 Upon recommendation by the Board of Church Extension, the mission church may be recognized as a church and admitted to Annual Conference by a majority vote of Annual Conference.
- 504-3. Other Congregations
- 504-3.1 Daughter churches of Bible Fellowship Churches

- A Bible Fellowship Church desiring to plant a daughter church shall contact the Board of Church Extension and seek its counsel and assistance in the development and preparation of the daughter church for recognition at the Annual Conference.
- (2) When the parent church determines that the daughter church is ready to pursue membership in the Annual Conference, the parent church shall request an assessment from the Board of Church Extension. The daughter church shall be assessed by the Board of Church Extension.
- (3) The daughter church shall be recommended for membership in the Annual Conference by the parenting church and the Board of Church Extension and admitted to Annual Conference upon majority vote of Annual Conference.

504-3.2 Pre-existing Congregations

- An independent congregation or an established congregation of another denomination desiring membership in Annual Conference shall contact the Board of Church Extension.
- (2) This church shall be evaluated by the Board of Church Extension on the basis of its agreement with the F&O, particularly as to its compliance with Article 18 of the Articles of Faith. This church shall meet the standards of Article 18 of the Articles of Faith and be committed to the F & O.
- (3) This church may be recommended for membership in Annual Conference by the Board of Church Extension upon satisfactory completion of an assessment.
- (4) A majority vote of Annual Conference shall be required for membership in Annual Conference.

[FIRST READING]

Resolved, that the following be approved as First Reading:

Board of Church Extension

The Board of Church Extension governs Church Extension Ministries which consists of the Board of Church Extension, the Executive Director of Church Extension Ministries, church planters serving under the direction of the Board, all other employees of the Board, and mission churches under jurisdiction of the Board.

512-4.1 Purpose

Church Extension Ministries exists to plant churches in order to build the Body of Christ through extending the Bible Fellowship Church.

It does this by evangelizing in areas, communities, and neighborhoods as well as among people, where Bible Fellowship Churches do not exist, by forming and nurturing to maturity new congregations.

512-4.2 Composition and Election

(1) The Board of Church Extension will be composed of the Executive Director of Church Extension Ministries, five ministers and five elders. Classes shall be formed as follows:

Class I Two ministers and two elders

Class II Two ministers and two elders

Class III One minister and one elder

- (2) The Executive Director shall be called by the Board of Church Extension.
- (3) Each class of the Board of Church Extension shall be elected in turn annually by ballot by the Board of Church Extension, subject to ratification by the Annual Conference.
- (4) The term for each class shall be for three years.

512-4.3 Duties

- It shall have authority to establish and oversee the development of mission churches.
- (2) It shall issue calls to church planters credentialed by the BFC.
- (3) It shall have authority to hire church planters not

- credentialed by the BFC, but they must be under the care of the Ministerial Candidate Committee and be seeking credentials in the BFC. In such cases, a contract for ministry shall be established.
- (4) It shall function as a board of Elders in behalf of mission churches.
- (5) It shall receive applications for admission to Annual Conference from daughter churches or congregations outside the Bible Fellowship Church.
- (6) It shall require all mission churches to adhere to the Faith and Order.
- (7) It shall receive and disburse monies designated for Church Extension Ministries.
- (8) It shall make recommendations to the Board of Directors of the Bible Fellowship Church on the approval and consummation of legal transactions for the purchase of real estate and/or the erection of buildings for purposes of Church Extension Ministries.
- (9) It shall make recommendations to Annual Conference on the admission of mission churches and daughter churches to membership in Annual Conference.
- (10) It shall make a written report of its activities to Annual Conference.
- (11) It shall promote the program of Church Extension Ministries and develop a broadening financial base for its ministry.

512-4.4 Executive Director of Church Extension Ministries

The Executive Director of Church Extension Ministries shall be an ordained minister of the Bible Fellowship Church. He shall, by virtue of his office, be a member of the Board of Church Extension and shall be accountable to the Board of Church Extension for his ministry.

512-4.5 Rules Relative to the Recognition of Churches.

(1) Any congregation that has a relationship with the Bible Fellowship Church but has not yet met the standards for recognition as a particular church shall be called a mission church. (See 504-2)

(2) When, in the opinion of the Board of Church Extension, a mission church is prepared for recognition, the Board shall recommend to Annual Conference that this mission church be recognized as a Particular Church and that it be admitted to the membership of Annual Conference. This recognition will be by a majority vote of Annual Conference.

(3) Churches which have been recognized by the Annual Conference are no longer under the jurisdiction of the Board of Church Extension and are no longer eligible for financial aid from the Board. Churches recognized by the Annual Conference shall not again come under the jurisdiction of the Board of Church Extension but may seek counsel from the Ministerial Relations Committee and assistance from the Board of Church Health.

Resolved, that the following be adopted at one reading:

702-1.1 Name- The name of this organization shall be the (Name of Organization) of (Name of Church) (City. State). (proposed changes are underlined and bold)

702-1.2 Purpose -The purpose of this Mission Organization shall be to

- (1) Give diligence to intercessory prayer in behalf of missionaries under the care of the Board of Missions and the Board of Church Extension.
- (2) Encourage sacrificial giving in behalf of missions
- (3) Support missionary projects, both domestic and foreign
- (4) Correspond with missionaries under the care of the Board of Missions and the Board of Church Extension.
- (5) Assist BFC missionaries and missionary appointees under the care of the Board of Missions and the Board of Church Extension.
- (6) Promote spiritual growth among the members of the organization
- (7) Seek to provide spiritual growth to missionaries in remote

- areas of the world (e.g. tapes of good messages and music, Christian magazines, etc.)
- (8) Provide prayer letter reproduction, address maintenance, and mailing services to missionaries under the care of the Board of Missions and the Board of Church Extension where possible
- (9) (Other purposes can be added or deleted to fit the organization's purposes.)
- 702-1.3 Membership -Membership shall be open to Christians of like faith who are interested in missionary work and desire to share in this fellowship.
- Whereas, Church Extension Ministries has received a petition from a church outside the USA to become a mission church of the BFC, therefore be it
- **Resolved**, that, by rule of exception, article 512-4.1 Purpose, be implemented at this Annual Conference.

The Board of Church Health presented the following resolution:

- Whereas, it is the goal of the Board of Church Health to support and assist Particular Churches in need, and
- Whereas, it is imperative that benchmarks be established to allow the Board of Church Health to initiate discussions with local churches with the goal of assisting them in their ministries, therefore, be it
- **Resolved**, that the following legislative addition to the Bylaws for Annual Conference be approved as First Reading:
- 504-1.1 All new Particular Churches will be on a two year probation with open accountability to the Board of Health. 504-1.2 Any congregation that reports any one of the following criteria will allow the Board of Church Health to initiate discussion with that Particular Church:
- (1) Three consecutive years where attendance declined more than 5% per year.
- (2) Three consecutive years of declining offerings.

(3) An Elder Board that has declined to fewer than two lay elders.

[FIRST READING]

- Whereas, we have taken action requiring ministers who now have our credentials and hold a foreseen faith view of election to declare their reservation regarding Article 11; and
- Whereas, our Faith and Order views ministers and elders as bearing equally the responsibility for the life of the church; and
- Whereas, the Faith and Order requires both ministers (512-11.2) and elders (401-11.9) to subscribe annually in writing their agreement with our Articles of Faith; therefore be it
- Resolved, that men now serving as Elders and who hold to a foreseen faith position on election should not sign that they subscribe without reservation to our present Articles of Faith but should declare their reservation regarding Article 11. Whether or not the proposed clarifications are adopted, such men, if now serving as elders should continue to serve and will continue to be embraced by the BFC. Every Board of Elders will continue to require men being considered to become elders to include only those men who are able annually to declare in writing their agreement with the Articles of Faith (401-1.9)
- Whereas, there has been considerable discussion at the 124th Annual Conference of the proposed changes to the Articles of Faith regarding salvation, and
- Whereas, additional materials pertaining to these proposed changes are being prepared for circulation to the churches, and
- Whereas, some Boards of Elders have already voted on the proposed changes and have reported these votes prior to the 124th Annual Conference, therefore be it
- Resolved, that any Board of Elders desiring to change its position on these proposed changes in articles 9-13 prior to the 125th Annual Conference be allowed to do so, and that the revised position be considered to supercede any prior communication with respect to articles 801-3 and 801-4 of the *Faith and Order*.

- Whereas, the Ministerial Relations Committee has reported establishment of nine pastorates, therefore be it
- **Resolved**, that we offer praise to God for His gracious provision of pastors for our churches.

- 2. Whereas, we believe there are men that are called of God to serve as His servants as Pastors, and
 - Whereas, it is important for the gifts and calling that God has given these men to serve are to be recognized by fellow pastors, and
 - Whereas, we believe it is a tremendous encouragement for fellow pastors to show approval, support and unity for those being ordained, therefore be it
 - Resolved, that the Credentials Committee resolution at the 123rd Annual Conference, "that an ordination service be held Monday, May 21, 2007, at a place to be determined" be rescinded, and further be it

Resolved, that the following two-tiered procedure for ordination be approved and instituted at this year's 124th Annual Conference:

Ordination at Annual Conference:

- · Introduction and testimony of the men
- · A charge to the men
- · The administration of the vows
- · The laying on of hands and prayer
- Extending the right hand of fellowship by the members of the Credentials Committee and the ordained ministers of the BFC Annual Conference

Ordination Service at a Bible Fellowship Church:

The second part would be a service in the church where each man is serving. In that service, the man would:

- Affirm his vows of ordination by repeating them, the affirmation to be led by a member of the Credentials Committee.
- · The elders of that church would pray for him.
- The pastors of that region would be expected to be present to extend the right hand of fellowship and greet the man.
- Someone, the ordinand's recommendation, would preach an appropriate ordination sermon.
- All of this can be introduced by a time of worship and praise that would have meaning both to the man and the church.

This service would serve to point out the significance of ordination in the local church and make them part of the process.

3. The Credentials Committee brings the following legislation to Annual Conference:

- **Resolved**, that the following material be adopted as Second Reading:
- Whereas, the Committee on Credentials has been placing ministers in differing categories to determine their eligibility as voting members of Annual Conference, and
- Whereas, one of the categories used does not appear in the Faith and Order, and
- Whereas, there has been confusion as to who is eligible to be a voting member of Annual Conference, and
- Whereas, there have been men in certain Advisory member categories for an indefinite period of time, therefore be it
- Resolved, that the following replace Article 512-11.3 in the Faith and Order (changes in bold).

512-11.3 Categories of Ministry

All ordained men who hold Ordination Credentials with the BFC shall be members in good standing in a particular BFC and shall subscribe annually to the F&O.

The categories of ministry are as follows:

- (1) Ordained Ministers Working Under the Direction of the BFC
- (2) Ordained Ministers Working Under the Direction of the Board of Missions of the BFC
- (3) Ordained Ministers Working in (omit: the Military) Chaplaincy Ministries Under the Sponsorship of the BFC. The BFC qualifies to have men with its ministerial credentials to serve under the U.S. Armed Forces Chaplains Board under the endorsement of the National Conference of Ministry to the Armed Forces; as well as other Chaplain ministries such as the prison and hospital. Applications for such ministries shall be made through the Credentials Committee.
- (4) Ordained Ministers in Retirement. These are men who have retired under the provisions of Section 503. A minister must serve a minimum of five years (cumulative) as an ordained minister in the BFC and be under the care of

- the Credentials Committee at retirement to be a member of Annual Conference as a "Minister in Retirement."
- (5) Ordained Ministers Between Calls. When a minister leaves his church or ministry without a call to another Bible Fellowship Church, he may be placed in either the "Between Calls" or "Leave of Absence" category, as determined by the Credentials Committee. A Minister who is in the "Between Calls" category is one who is presently seeking a call from a Bible Fellowship Church. He may remain in this category for a maximum of two years. A written request for an extension will be reviewed and may be granted by the Credentials Committee.
- (6) Ordained Ministers on Leave of Absence. (Omit present statement and replace with): A minister who is in the "Leave of Absence" category is not currently open to receiving a call from a Bible Fellowship Church. He may remain in this category for a maximum of two years. A written request for an extension will be reviewed and may be granted by the Credentials Committee. The combination of "Leave of Absence" and "Between Calls" in any consecutive period shall not exceed five years total, except under unusual circumstances as determined by the Credentials Committee.
- (7) Ordained Inactive Ministers. A minister who has exhausted his stay in the "Between Calls" and/or "Leave of Absence" categories will be placed in the "Ordained Inactive Ministers" category. He may remain in this category for a period not to exceed ten years of which time spent in the "Between Calls" and/or "Leave of Absence" categories is counted. At the end of ten years he loses his credentials with the Bible Fellowship Church. If he wishes to return to active ministry within the BFC, he must reapply to the Ministerial Candidate Committee.

NOTE: Present article 512-11.3 (5) – "Ordained Ministers Working in Other Christian Ministries" is eliminated.

- Whereas, the category of ministry "Ordained Ministers
 Working in Other Christian Ministries" was not included
 in our legislation at last year's 123rd Annual Conference,
 and
 - Whereas, this has been one of the credible ministry designations, and
 - Whereas, we believe this category is one we should continue to have, therefore be it
 - Resolved, that "Ordained Ministers Working in Other Christian Ministries" be retained and numbered (8) in Article 512-11.3 Categories of Ministries, and further
 - **Resolved**, that the explanation of this category found in our present *Faith & Order* [Article 512-11.3 (5)] be retained.
- Resolved, that an Ordination Service be held Tuesday, April 29, 2008, at the 125th Annual Conference.

(5) It shall safeguard the doctrinal purity of the church by exercising vigilance when examining prospective pastors concerning their beliefs and practices, endeavoring to approve only those who are committed without reservation to the authority of the Scriptures and the doctrines and practices of our church as the system of doctrine taught in the Scriptures.

- (6) It shall license probationers for Annual Conference prior to ordination.
- (7) It shall recommend qualified probationers to the Credentials Committee for ordination examination.
- (8) It shall furnish prior to Annual Conference to the Registrar a list of those probationers who are eligible to be members of Annual Conference.
- (9) It shall submit a written report to Annual Conference.
- 3. Resolved, that the following amendment to Article 505-1 of the *Faith & Order* be approved at first reading:
 - 505-1. Voting Members.
 - (5) probationers who have been licensed by the Ministerial Candidate Committee
- 4. **Resolved**, that the following amendment to Article 204-1.4 of the *Faith & Order* be approved for first reading:

Physical Qualifications. The minister must be a mature man who is physically and mentally fit, being free from impairments that would vitiate the effectiveness of his ministry. His physical and mental fitness should give promise that he will be able to bear the demands of the ministry.

Report of the Board of Directors of the BFC

The Board of Directors of the Bible Fellowship Church held four regular meetings to attend to corporate business related to Annual Conference, to agencies, and to churches.

The Board provided oversight, advice and assistance in respect to fiscal, legal and property acquisition and disposal as follows: Annual Conference, medical insurance, administrative budget, and Board of Church Extension, and churches.

American Insuring Group, LTD, continues as agent of record for BFC sponsored health insurance plans. Policy holders with questions or concerns should contact Mr. David Ross, who administers the program for American Insuring Group, LTD. Mr. Charles Lavigna serves the Board of Directors as Medical Insurance Coordinator and liaison with Mr. Ross. He is available to churches as needed.

A legal suit against Bible Fellowship Church and others, filed in Duchess County, NY, four years ago, was settled in 2005. However, it was not possible at that time for the Holmes BFC to fund the settlement. Accordingly, funds were borrowed by the Board of Directors from Quakertown National Bank to fund the settlement. In 2006 the Holmes Church repaid these funds, and all other funds supplied by BFC entities, with money received in the sale of the Holmes parsonage.

In its meeting of December 1, 2006 the Board of Directors approved the following resolution in response to a proposal from the Strategic Planning Committee that changes be made in the administrative structure of the BFC.

The following churches are presently in the process of seeking a pastor, either a senior pastor or an addition to the pastoral staff: Blandon, PA, Old Bridge, NJ, Whitehall, PA.

The ministry of our Conference Pastor, Ronald C. Mahurin, continues to be a great asset to the ministering brethren. The committee is grateful for his availability to meet with men to share insights from God's Word and from his own rich experience. His counsel, prayer, guidance, and exhortations have been a source of encouragement to many pastors during this year.

The committee makes the following recommendations to the 124th Annual Conference:

1. **Resolved**, that the recommended minimum salary for a pastor serving in the BFC for the calendar year 2007 be \$31,000.00. In addition to his salary, the church must provide half of the pastor's Social Security tax, parsonage and/or housing allowance (which would include utilities, repair costs, etc.), health insurance, and provision should be made for reimbursement for allowable car and professional expenses. The church must also contribute a minimum of 3% of the pastor's salary for retirement to the Ministers Annuity Fund, plus an additional 1% match if the pastor is voluntarily contributing 1%.

Note:

The above recommendation is considered the minimum. In establishing a fair and equitable salary and benefits package for the minister, consideration should be given to experience, education and the cost of living as per one's location. In some areas, a higher figure would be more equitable.

Additional information from the Pastoral Relations Committee can be found in the *Yearbook*. One can also contact the Reading BFC for added information.

- 2. Resolved, that the Annual Conference ratify the election of Ronald C. Mahurin as Conference Pastor for a term of three years.
- Resolved, that the salary for the Conference Pastor be 3. \$26,000.00 and in addition, we provide \$6,200.00 for health insurance and \$9,300.00 for auto and professional expenses.

Total - \$41,500.00

4. Resolved, that the following legislation be adopted at Second Reading, and further

Resolved, that the legislation in bold italics be adopted as First Reading:

Article 409 - Pastoral Change Procedure

The orderly transition of pastoral leadership is crucial to the health of a church. As the Chief Shepherd, Jesus Christ should be invoked to provide for the care of His under shepherds, the pastors, and for the needs of His flock, the congregation. The Ministerial Relations Committee is responsible to provide guidance to both pastors and churches during this transition.

409-1 Instituting the Pastoral Relationship

Paragraphs 409-1.1 - 409.1.13 refer to the calling of a Senior Pastor in a church with more than one pastor, or the only Pastor in a church with one pastor. In churches with more than one pastor, the elders may choose to adopt the procedure in paragraph 409-1.14

- 409- 1.1 When a church is seeking a Pastor, the Board of Elders, chaired by the First Delegate, shall meet with representatives of the Ministerial Relations Committee to discuss the following:
 - (1) Temporary pulpit supply. The Board of Elders shall provide for temporary pulpit supply on an interim basis.

Pastors serving in this capacity shall be in sympathy with the F&O of the BFC.

- (2) Election of a pastoral search committee.
- (3) Congregational self-study, pastoral profile, and candidate-search procedures.
- (4) Rules for calling a pastor.
- 409-1.2 The Board of Elders shall call a congregational meeting according to our rules (see §403) in order to elect a pastoral search committee. The Board of Elders shall recommend the composition, size and election of the pastoral search committee. The committee may vary from church to church, but in all cases shall be viewed as subordinate to the Board of Elders. Under normal circumstances, the chairman of the pastoral search committee shall be an Elder.
- 409-1.3 The Pastoral Search Committee shall maintain regular communication with the chairman of the Ministerial Relations Committee concerning progress in the pastoral search. The Ministerial Relations Committee shall seek to provide guidance and advice to the Pastoral Search Committee in its work.
- 409-1.4 The Pastoral Search Committee shall seek a candidate who is fitted to the needs of the church and is or will be licensed to serve as a pastor in the BFC. If a candidate is not licensed to serve as a pastor in the BFC, he shall be referred to the Ministerial Candidate Committee. Under ordinary circumstances, the candidate must gain final approval by regular procedures in order to be called by the church.
- 409-1.5 On certain exceptional occasions, it may be necessary to expedite the procedure for issuing a call to a man who is previously ordained but not licensed by the BFC.

These circumstances are when:

- (1) geographic distance allows limited direct contact.
- (2) the demands of current ministry do not allow for the normal process.

(3) the church applies for special consideration because of urgent circumstances.

The expedited process is as follows:

(1) The church shall request the chairman of the Ministerial Relations Committee to use the expedited process. He, in consultation with the chairman of the Ministerial Candidate Committee, approves or disapproves the request.

(2) If the request is approved, the Ministerial Candidate Committee shall interview the man. If he is approved as a candidate under our rules (see 512-13.4), he shall be given

the Open Book Examination.

(3) Upon the satisfactory completion of the Open Book Examination, the church may seek to issue a call, which is provisional.

- (4) After the provisional call is issued, the man shall complete all other examinations and requirements of the Ministerial Candidate Committee before beginning the new ministry or moving into church-provided housing.
- (5) When all examinations and requirements are satisfactorily completed, the Ministerial Candidate Committee will approve the man as a licensed probationer (see §514-13.4), effective on the date of the approval of his final examination. The Ministerial Relations Committee will recognize the provisional call as the formal call on the same date.
- 409-1.6 When the Pastoral Search Committee has completed its work, it shall recommend a candidate to the Board of Elders. The Board of Elders shall conduct any other research or interviews it deems necessary, including establishing the terms of the call.
- 409-1.7 When the Board of Elders is ready to present a candidate to the congregation, it shall inform the chairman of the Ministerial Relations Committee of the name and of the terms of the call. The purpose of this consultation is to protect the candidate, the church, and the BFC from unnecessary

difficulties. The Ministerial Relations Committee shall have one week to approve or disapprove of the presentation of the candidate to the congregation.

409-1.8 If the Ministerial Relations Committee approves the presentation of the candidate, the Board of Elders shall call a congregational meeting according to our rules (see §403) for the purpose of calling a pastor.

409-1.9 The congregational meeting shall be led by the First Delegate or, at his request, a member of the Ministerial Relations Committee. Following the report of the pastoral search committee and/or the Board of Elders, the congregation shall vote on the question, "Are you ready to proceed to the calling of a pastor?" If a majority of members present and voting approve, a vote shall be taken to call the pastor. This vote shall be by written ballot. Absentee ballots are not allowed. The leader of the meeting shall announce the outcome of the vote and inform the congregation that the next step in the process is the approval or disapproval of the call by the Ministerial Relations Committee.

409-1.10 The Ministerial Relations Committee shall be informed of the outcome of the vote. The purpose of this consultation is to advise the Board of Elders concerning the issuing of a call and to approve or disapprove it. If the vote is approved by a strong majority, the Elders will be advised to proceed with the issuing of a call. If the vote is not approved by a strong majority, the Elders may be advised to consider options other than issuing a call. The Ministerial Relations Committee shall have the final authority to approve or disapprove the call.

409-1.11 Upon receiving the approval of the Ministerial Relations Committee, the Board of Elders may proceed to issue a call to the pastor as follows:

The <u>(name)</u> Church, of <u>(city and state)</u>, believing that you are well-qualified to serve as our pastor for the glory of God and our spiritual benefit, invite you,

	In order to provide for your needs, we promise to pay you an annual salary of \$ together with additional benefits as follows; (other benefits may include parsonage use, housing, educational or professional allowances). We also will provide (number of weeks)_ vacation each year.
	We also will pay into your Minister's Annuity Fund the percentage of your salary established by Annual Conference.
	We will also pay you a sum equivalent to your self- employment tax (FICA).
	We will also provide health insurance for you and your family, as agreed on by you and the church.
	And we promise to review with you the adequacy of this compensation annually. We, the elders of Church, sign our names to this call on(date)

We promise to review with you the adequacy of this call and its conditions each year, to increase our provision for your support as we are able, and to provide full support for you as soon as it is possible.

We sign our names to this call on (date) .

409-1.13 An Agency of the BFC may call a person to serve in its ministry. In such cases the board of directors of the Agency shall act in the place of the Board of Elders, Pastoral Search Committee, and Congregation. As in the case of a call to a Particular Church, the Ministerial Relations Committee shall approve the name, the terms, and the call of the candidate. The form of the call shall be modeled after the form for particular churches (see 409-1.16).

409-1.14 In churches with more than one pastor, the elders may choose to call a pastor other than the Senior Pastor as follows: The Board of Elders shall serve as the Pastoral Search Committee and shall issue a call in place of the congregation.

The Ministerial Relations Committee shall approve the name, the terms and the call of the candidate. The form of the call shall be modeled after the call in paragraph 409-1.11. The call shall be communicated to the congregation.

409-1.15 Upon receiving the call from the church or agency, the candidate has three weeks to accept or reject the call in writing. If the candidate accepts the call, the Ministerial Relations Committee shall set the effective date in consultation with the pastor and the church.

(First and Second Reading)

409-2 Dissolving the Pastoral Relationship (omit present 409-2, 409-2.1, 409-2.2) (omit paragraph following title of 409-3)

Paragraphs 409-2.1 - 409-2.3 refer to the resignation of a Senior Pastor in a church with more than one pastor, or the only pastor in a church with one pastor. For pastors called under the procedures 409-1.14, the resignation shall be according to the procedure of 409-2.4

409-2.1 An Uncontested Resignation

(2.2) Ordinarily . . . The action of the Board of Elders shall be communicated to the chairman of the Ministerial Relations Committee prior to the effective date of the resignation. (omit ". . . by the secretary . . . cannot be reached.").

(omit paragraph (3) and replace (4) with the following:)

(3) The Board of Elders shall call a congregational meeting according to our rules (see 403) in order to consider the resignation of the pastor. When the congregation approves the resignation of the pastor, this information shall be communicated to the chairman of the Ministerial Relations Committee within one week. The special provisions made for the pastor's transition (see 2.1 above), may be announced by the Board of Elders or, if they so decide, approved by the Congregation.

409-2.2 A Contested Resignation

 Replace final sentence beginning "Rules for communicating the results . ." with "This decision shall be communicated to the chairman of the Ministerial Relations Committee within twenty-four hours.

409-2.3 Churches Desiring Dissolution of the Pastorate (formerly 409-3.3

- If the issues leading to a desire by the church to dissolve the pastorate involve moral or doctrinal charges against the pastor, the church shall follow the procedure outlined in the Book of Discipline (see section 300).
- (2) No changes

409-2.4 Resignation or Removal of Pastors called by Boards of Elders.

In the case of a pastor called under the procedure of 409-1.14, resignation or removal is as follows:

Resignation - The pastor submits his resignation to the Board of Elders. He shall submit a copy to the chairman of the Ministerial Relations Committee. The Board of Elders shall act on the resignation, including special provisions such as in 409-2.1

The Board of Elders shall inform the congregation of the effective date and terms of the resignation.

Removal - Boards of Elders shall adopt the procedure of 409-2.3 except that following the due process if (409-2.3 (1)(2.1-5) the Ministerial Relations Committee may approve the request of the Board of Elders to terminate the pastorate. The effective date and terms of the termination shall be communicated to the congregation. paragraph (409-2.3 (2.12) is in effect in this situation.

The purpose of the Ministerial Relations Committee is to foster a healthy relationship between pastors and churches, to help to resolve problems in the pastoral relationship, and to assist churches in calling pastors.

512-14-2 Duties

- (1) The committee shall provide counsel and advice to churches and pastors upon their invitation. The committee may be invited to assist a church in this way upon request of the Board of Elders, the Pastoral Relations Committee of the church, an individual Elder or Elders, or the Pastor.
- (2) The committee may initiate involvement and call a meeting with the Pastor, Pastoral Relations Committee,

- or Board of Elders if the committee concludes there are matters threatening the health of the pastoral relationship which are not being adequately addressed by the Particular Church. This request for a meeting shall be in writing, stating the reasons that the Ministerial Relations Committee has for requesting it.
- (3) The committee shall seek to resolve difficulties in the pastoral relationship whether they have been invited or have initiated involvement in the Particular Church. This involvement may take the form of meetings with the Pastor, Elders or Members, with the Pastoral Relations Committee, with the Board of Elders, or with the Congregation.
- (4) The committee shall oversee the resignation of a pastor according to our rules.
- (5) The committee shall meet with the Elders and/or Pastoral Search Committee with respect to temporary pulpit supply, the pastoral search process, and the calling of a pastor. It shall oversee the calling of a pastor according to our rules.
- (6) The committee shall refer any problems concerning pastoral relationships that it cannot resolve to Annual Conference for final resolution. This referral may or may not have recommendations concerning resolution.
- (7) The committee shall submit a report to Annual Conference, including recommendations concerning the minimum salary package for pastors called under our rules.

Report of the Conference Pastor



Report of the Board of Church Health

The Board of Church Health met four times during the year to begin its steps of strengthening church health. Numerous pastors and churches were talked with and three churches were visited. Ronald C. Mahurin, Conference Pastor, met with the Board to

discuss opportunities for ministry to our churches.

In October 2005, an Adjourned Session of Annual Conference presented materials from Rev. Carl Shank and Natural Church Development, including a survey that could ascertain the health of the local church. All Bible Fellowship Churches were urged to consider participating in that survey. We are pleased to note that 13 of our congregations have completed the survey and found it to be valuable on a local level. Carl Shank assisted us as a Board in compiling the surveys for a general overview of local church results. He found that the overall responses from the 13 churches showed our strengths to be "Need Oriented Evangelism" with secondary strengths being shown in the areas of Functional Structures, Inspiring Worship, and Holistic Small Groups. The average combined score in all areas was 46, below the median point of the healthy church range and just below the Northeast average of 48. We found it significant that the area of greatest need was "Loving Relationships" where our average score was 38. As further results come in from BF Churches in the coming year, we will continue to compile and compare the findings. We believe it would be valuable for each local church to consider ways they can develop and strengthen relationships within their congregations during the year ahead.

If your congregation has not yet participated in the survey from Natural Church Development, we urge you to consider doing so in 2007. We are so committed to this process that the Board of Church Health is willing to provide financial assistance to churches that would find the \$300 fee to be prohibitive. Whereas, it is the goal of the Board of Church Health to support and assist Particular Churches in need, and

Whereas, it is imperative that benchmarks be established to allow the Board of Church Health to initiate discussions with local churches with the goal of assisting them in their ministries, therefore, be it

Resolved, that the following legislative addition to the Bylaws for Annual Conference be adopted at First Reading:

504-1.1 All new Particular Churches will be on a two-year probation with open accountability to the Board of Church Health. In addition, any congregation that reports any one of the following criteria will allow the Board of Church Health to initiate discussion with that Particular Church.

- (1) Three consecutive years where attendance declined more than 5% per year.
- (2) Three consecutive years of declining offerings.
- (3) Board of Elders that has declined to fewer than two lay elders.

Report of the Board of Church Extension

The Board of Church Extension Ministries is the church-planting arm of the BFC, seeking to strategically assist the BFC to "become an expanding fellowship of churches united to make disciples of Jesus Christ." Largely, the extent to which we are committed to planting new churches in obedience to the Great Commission, will be the extent to which we are successful in accomplishing our mission. Planting churches is at the heart of the Great Commission – gathering new believers into communities of faith and obedience under the authority of Jesus Christ.

The Board met four times since last Annual Conference and various committees of the Board met additional times to accomplish

necessary work.

The Board recognizes the immense value of each member of the team. David E. Gundrum, Executive Director, has provided faithful and diligent leadership for another year. This year the Board called Mark L. Morrison to serve as Assistant Director of Church Extension Ministries, ful-time as of January 1, 2007. He has been working closely with several church-planting pastors in providing oversight, direction, and encouragement. We encourage churches to consider financial support for Mark as he has now begun to serve fulltime with the department. Lisa Christensen, Administrative Assistant, continues to serve with excellence in this area of ministry. William Singletary, long-time Board member and treasurer of Church Extension Ministries for many years, deserves a hearty "well done" as he devotes hours in his retirement to keeping the financial records of the department. Carol Snyder continues to assist in special assignments, publications, and communication. Raymond and Louise Bertolet and John and Judy Pello continue to assist in the Delmarva region.

The Board continues to appreciate and support the concept of "Aquila and Priscilla" teams in the ministry. The Workmans are serving in Long Neck, DE, the Engleharts are serving in La Roca mission church in Reading, PA, and Sandy Mitchell continues to be a part of the Hellertown, PA, mission church. The Pellos are experiencing some challenging health issues and during the past year Philip Mitchell was suddenly called home to be with the Lord. Pray

for these auxiliary team members who are so vital to the development of church plants. Visits to church plants for worship services can go a long way in encouraging church planters and their congregations. Also, numerous church plants would welcome assistance in the areas of music and youth ministry. Why not consider how you or a group from your church can personally be of assistance and encouragement to a particular Mission Church?

The Personnel Committee is very active in meeting with and providing direction for each church planter. This year, Kenneth F. Barber resigned from the pastorate at Long Neck, DE, in order to move south with his new wife, Cathy. Jonathon W. Arnold, Sr. has been called as pastor at Long Neck, effective January 1, 2007. Raymond R. Bertolet has been recommended for ordination by the Ministerial Candidate Committee.

In conjunction with the Joint Committee on Ethnic Church Planting, the Board approved the pursuit of a connection with La Roca church of Merida, Mexico, and will continue to work with the Committee toward this end. With the approval and support of the Board of Missions and the Joint Committee on Ethnic Church Planting, the Board is recommending legislative changes to Annual Conference that will impact the carrying out of the mission of church-planting in the BFC. Also, the Board approved the establishment of a Mission Church in Mantua, NJ, to be known as New Beginnings, embracing this small core group of believers who desired to be a part of the BFC. The Board continues to wait on the Lord for His timing in launching a church plant in the Millsboro/Dagsboro, DE area.

The "Forward Plan for Planting New Bible Fellowship Churches in 2006-2011: Missions Here and Now," provides the blue print for growth along with strategic goals. The Board encourages each local church to review this plan and to consider ways to be increasingly involved in reaching these goals for God's glory. Toward that end, the Board is seeking to establish an Endowment Development Committee to formulate a strategic financial plan to support the five year plan. The Board is encouraged by the increased support and involvement of many churches and concerned individuals, but much more can be accomplished. Hundreds of individuals pray regularly for Church Extension Ministries, many using The Extension Call, the monthly prayer guide supplied. Please

help the Board by making these available and accessible to as many in your congregation as possible. Pray for the Lord to raise up church planters from among our churches. Pray for the church planters who continue to faithfully serve the Lord on the front lines. The Board is deeply grateful to these church planters and their families – for their sacrificial labor of love unto the Lord and His Church. The Board covets the continued prayer and support of so many churches and individuals. Together, let us "expect great things from God and attempt great things for God."

Resolved, that the following be adopted at first reading:

406-2 Mission Organizations: (proposed changes are underlined and bold)

406-2.1 Each Particular Church is encouraged to establish organizations that will promote and assist in carrying out its task of world evangelization. Organizations so established are encouraged to inform the Board of Missions and Church Extension Ministries of their officers in order that information can be circulated to and coordinated with similar organizations from other Particular Churches. Suggested bylaws for such organizations are available in the Appendix.

406-2.2 Regional Mission Organization Programs. The Board

of Missions and Church Extension Ministries may coordinate regional programs as deemed advisable.

Article 504 -Membership of Congregations in Annual Conference [proposed]

504-1. Particular Church.

Any congregation meeting the standards of Article 18 of the Articles of Faith and committed to the F&O, may be admitted to membership in Annual Conference and shall be known as a Particular Church. This admission must follow upon a positive assessment and recommendation by the Board of Church Extension. Assessment includes an evaluation of elders, committed participants and financial stability.

504-2. Mission Churches

504-2.1 Any congregation that is under the supervision of the Board of Church Extension of the BFC but has not yet met the standard for recognition as a Particular Church shall be called a mission church. The term mission church is used in a technical sense, but this does not preclude the use of the term church in any of the congregation's public relations activities.

504-2.2 The Board of Church Extension has the responsibility of assessing the preparedness of the mission church for admission to Annual Conference.

504-2.3 Upon recommendation by the Board of Church Extension, the mission church may be recognized as a church and admitted to Annual Conference by a majority vote of Annual Conference.

504-3. Other Congregations

504-3.1 Daughter churches of Bible Fellowship Churches

504-3.1.1 - A Bible Fellowship Church desiring to plant a daughter church shall contact the Board of Church Extension and seek its counsel and assistance in the

development and preparation of the daughter church for recognition at the Annual Conference.

504-3.1.2 - When the parent church determines that the daughter church is ready to pursue membership in the Annual Conference, the parent church shall request an assessment from the Board of Church Extension. The daughter church shall be assessed by the Board of Church Extension.

504-3.1.3 The daughter church shall be recommended for membership in the Annual Conference by the parenting church and the Board of Church Extension and admitted to Annual Conference upon majority vote of Annual Conference.

504-3.2 Pre-existing Congregations

504-3.2.1 An independent congregation or an established congregation of another denomination desiring membership in Annual Conference shall contact the Board of Church Extension.

504-3.2.2 This church shall be evaluated by the Board of Church Extension on the basis of its agreement with the F&O, particularly as to its compliance with Article 18 of the Articles of Faith. This church shall meet the standards of Article 18 of the Articles of Faith and be committed to the F & O.

504-3.2.3 This church may be recommended for membership in Annual Conference by the Board of Church Extension upon satisfactory completion of an assessment.

504-3.2.4 A majority vote of Annual Conference shall be required for membership in Annual Conference.

512-4 Board of Church Extension. [proposal]

The Board of Church Extension governs Church Extension Ministries which consists of the Board of Church Extension, the Executive Director of Church Extension Ministries, church planters serving under the direction of the Board, all other employees of the Board, and mission churches under jurisdiction of the Board.

512-4.1 Purpose

Church Extension Ministries exists to plant churches in order to build the Body of Christ through extending the Bible Fellowship Church.

It does this by evangelizing in areas, communities, and neighborhoods as well as among people, where Bible Fellowship Churches do not exist, by forming and nurturing to maturity new congregations.

512-4.2 Composition and Election

(1) The Board of Church Extension will be composed of the Executive Director of Church Extension Ministries, five ministers and five elders. Classes shall be formed as follows:

Class I Two ministers and two elders
Class II Two ministers and two elders
Class III One minister and one elder

- (2) The Executive Director shall be called by the Board of Church Extension
- (3) Each class of the Board of Church Extension shall be elected in turn annually by ballot by the Board of Church Extension, subject to ratification by the Annual Conference.
- (4) The term for each class shall be for three years.

512-4.3 Duties

- (1) It shall have authority to establish and oversee the development of mission churches.
- (2) It shall issue calls to church planters credentialed by the BFC.
- (3) It shall have authority to hire church planters not credentialed by the BFC. In such cases, a contract for ministry shall be established.
- (4) It shall function as a board of Elders in behalf of mission churches.
- (5 It shall receive applications for admission to Annual Conference from daughter churches or congregations outside the Bible Fellowship Church.
- (6) It shall require all mission churches to adhere to the F&O.
- (7) It shall receive and disburse monies designated for Church Extension Ministries.
- (8) It shall make recommendations to the Board of Directors of the BFC on the approval and consummation of legal transactions for the purchase of real estate and/or the erection of buildings for purposes of Church Extension Ministries.
- (9) It shall make recommendations to Annual Conference on the admission of mission churches and daughter churches to membership in Annual Conference.
- (10) It shall make a written report of its activities to Annual Conference.
- (11) It shall promote the program of Church Extension Ministries and develop a broadening financial base for its ministry.

512-4.4 Executive Director of Church Extension Ministries

The Executive Director of Church Extension Ministries shall be an ordained minister of the Bible Fellowship Church. He shall, by virtue of his office, be a member of the Board of Church Extension and shall be accountable to the Board of Church Extension for his ministry.

512-4.5 Rules Relative to the Recognition of Churches.

- (1) Any congregation that has a relationship with the Bible Fellowship Church but has not yet met the standards for recognition as a particular church shall be called a mission church. (See 504-2)
- (2) When, in the opinion of the Board of Church Extension, a mission church is prepared for recognition, the Board shall recommend to Annual Conference that this mission church be recognized as a Particular Church and that it be admitted to the membership of Annual Conference. This recognition will be by a majority vote of Annual Conference.
- (3) Churches which have been recognized by the Annual Conference are no longer under the jurisdiction of the Board of Church Extension and are no longer eligible for financial aid from the Board. Churches recognized by the Annual Conference shall not again come under the jurisdiction of the Board of Church Extension but may seek counsel from the Ministerial Relations Committee and assistance from the Board of Church Health.

702-1.1 Name- The name of this organization shall be the (Name of Organization) of (Name of Church) (City. State) . (proposed changes are underlined and bold)

- 702-1.2 Purpose -The purpose of this Mission Organization shall be to
 - (1) Give diligence to intercessory prayer in behalf of missionaries <u>under the care of the Board of Missions and</u> the Board of Church Extension.
 - (2) Encourage sacrificial giving in behalf of missions
 - (3) Support missionary projects, both domestic and foreign
 - (4) Correspond with missionaries under the care of the Board of Missions and the Board of Church Extension.
 - (5) Assist BFC missionaries and missionary appointees under the care of the Board of Missions and the Board of Church Extension.
 - (6) Promote spiritual growth among the members of the

organization

(7) Seek to provide spiritual growth to missionaries in remote areas of the world (e.g. tapes of good messages and music, Christian magazines, etc.)

(8) Provide prayer letter reproduction, address maintenance, and mailing services to missionaries under the care of the Board of Missions and the Board of Church Extension where possible

(9) (Other purposes can be added or deleted to fit the

organization's purposes.)

702-1.3 Membership -Membership shall be open to Christians of like faith who are interested in missionary work and desire to share in this fellowship.

Report of the Executive Director of Church Extension

"...remember the words of the Lord Jesus, that He Himself said ...It is more blessed to give than to receive." Acts 20:35

In Christ's quote, the Apostle Paul sets forth the essence of Christian character- sacrifice! The Church is to be other oriented and willing to give up itself and its possessions for the sake of Christ and His Kingdom. The same sentiment is revealed in two other sections of Paul's writings. In his letter to the Church in Corinth, he tells the Corinthians (1 Cor. 13) that love is centered in how willing we are to give ourselves up for one another. In Romans, the same other-oriented sentiments are expressed when Paul enters into his one-anothering section (Rom. 12). The ultimate example of sacrifice is our Lord's willingness to give up glory for the cross (Phil. 2). In summary, we are not to be holding on, but rather giving up what the Lord has given in order for the Kingdom to grow and people's lives to be blessed.

How does this principle apply to the BFC and specifically to Church Extension and its mission to reach people with the Gospel and plant new Bible Fellowship Churches? The BFC has a vision,

"To be an expanding fellowship of churches united to make disciples of Jesus Christ."

One or several growing churches do not grow a denomination. This is evident by our own history. Looking at the Particular Churches in the BFC (not the Mission Churches in Church Extension), the BFC declined in 2006 from 7,486 members in 2005 to 7,448 in 2006 (2005 and 2006 Yearbooks). There was a loss of 38 members even though six churches grew by more than ten members each. In morning worship services, nine churches grew in attendance by at least ten people while most of the remaining churches lost people and some remained the same. My point is that just because we see a handful of churches growing, we cannot expect to be an expanding fellowship of churches. Growth among some churches does not grow a denomination. It helps but if a denomination is to grow, its churches must have an outward and sacrificial vision. To be an expanding fellowship we must sacrifice our people and resources and plant new BF churches.

Church planting is dependent upon sacrificial church planters and sacrificial churches. When a man follows the call to plant a church, he takes a huge step of faith and makes tremendous sacrifices. No one knows for sure whether or not a new church plant will survive; therefore, the church planter is truly on a faith mission. Our men live on minimal salaries and have little resources or startup materials available to them. They and their families work hard at making contacts, winning souls, gathering people and maintaining support. This weighs constantly on their minds and energies. The ministry, material and financial support we receive from the BFC is very much appreciated, but is not nearly what is needed to plant new churches and be an expanding fellowship. Churches will need to give up people, resources and finances for the church-planting mission of Church Extension Ministries. The idea is not only giving up for Church Extension, the church-planting Mission charged with planting churches, but most of all giving up for the Lord and His Kingdom. Particular Churches ought to plant daughter churches, BFC Regions ought to come together and plant regional daughter churches because this is God's means for building His Kingdom and what He is doing throughout the world. All over the world great church planting movements are focusing on this strategy of churches planting churches, yet few denominations in America, including the BFC, are following what the Holy Spirit is doing through churchplanting movements that are giving up their people and resources to go and plant new churches.

It is not wrong for churches to plan building projects, increase their programs, or add staff, but when these things take precedence over the opportunities to sacrifice and build the Kingdom through evangelistic church planting, a denomination stagnates and declines and the Kingdom suffers.

At last year's Conference I presented the Board of Church Extension's new Forward Plan, *Missions Here and Now*. The Plan calls for thirteen new Bible Fellowship Churches to be planted in the next five to ten years. This is not a grandiose goal compared to a number of other denominations who plan on planting this many churches every six months, but is a great step of faith for the BFC, yet a step that needs to be accomplished if we are going to expand and grow.

Missions Here and Now has a goal of planting five new churches in the DELMARVA Project. This project has bogged down because of the need to assist New Life BFC, DE, get back on its feet and the lack of men responding to calls for church planters to go to the region. Our Plan also calls for planting four ethnic churches among Hispanic people in America. We are pursuing ways to accomplish this through help from sources who minister among Hispanics and our Hispanic Church Planters, Brothers Ramos and Rodriguez. Four daughter churches are to be planted by Particular BFC Churches and two BFC Regions. One pastor and his church, Pastor Dennis Spinney – Thompson, CT BFC, are planning a daughter church plant in Danielson, CT. No regions have yet responded to plant a regional daughter church.

Our Five-Year Plan for planting a church estimates it costs \$280,000 to plant a church in five-years. The math is clear, thirteen new churches multiplied by \$280,000 equals \$3,640,000. The BFC now gives an average of \$360,000 a year to Church Extension and outside sources total about \$200,000. Most of this giving is designated for our present church planters and other portions are needed for administrative costs, staff salaries, equipment and special projects. What we have for starting new churches may be enough to plant one church for five-years. Where will \$3,000,000 come from to reach our goals?

Maybe even more important to reaching our goals is having qualified church planters answer God's calling to reach people with the Gospel and plant churches. Church planting is not a track of ministry most Bible Colleges and Seminaries offer. Yet, it is the Biblical model for missions and those whom we call missionaries from the pages of Scripture were church planters, i.e. Paul, Barnabas, John Mark, Epaphroditus, Silas, Timothy, Acquila and Priscilla, and more. The recruiting of gifted church planters will be a struggle and without the resources for these gifted men, it makes recruiting even more difficult.

I believe we have developed a good plan and strategy for planting new churches, a good process for assessing men to plant, a good team structure, good accountability and training for our men, and good communication and relationships with the churches of the BFC. I remain committed to church planting and the conviction that the planting of new BF Churches is the salvation for a stagnant

denomination. My prayers and my work will continue with the casting of this vision, challenging the BFC to plant churches, raising the resources and financial support necessary to reach our goals, and going after men gifted to reach people with the Gospel and plant churches. I am praying I will be able to count on the churches of our denomination to support this vital Mission called Church Extension Ministries and increase their involvement in church planting through the means of churches and regions planting churches and sacrificially increasing their giving to this lifeblood of the BFC.

I close with a paraphrased quote from my 2005 Report:

"... There exists the potential to do great things for God by means of church planting and establishing new Bible Fellowship Churches. May we look beyond and see the ripe harvest - stepping out into our Jerusalems, Judeas, and Samarias, and the uttermost parts of the world and planting churches. This remains our challenge. The Bible Fellowship Church must become a fervent evangelistic church planting force. May God give us His vision of what He can accomplish through a church planting movement within the Bible Fellowship Church."

There is an Addendum to this report titled, *Church Extension Activity Chart.* You will see the course charted for church planting in the years ahead.

REVIEW OF 2006 IN CHURCH EXTENSION

- We recorded thirty-one people making professions of faith this year and sixteen baptisms.
- Giving from churches increased in 2006 by approximately six percent.
- Two *Training Days* were held for our men including guest presenters and case studies from former BFC church planters.
- Mark Morrison and Frank Lenahan attended CMTC Church Planter's Boot Camp Training in Lancaster and were sponsored by Church Extension.
- I met with two churches seeking Connection with the BFC.
- Hundreds of new contacts were made, door-to door surveys took

- place in target sites, networking in community events, nine VBS programs were organized, and several thousand Gospel tracts were distributed.
- Fellowship Community BFC graduated and is now a Particular Church in the denomination.
- The DELMARVA Team was active in the Millsboro, Dagsboro and Georgetown areas. Our Aquila & Priscilla Team, Harry & Sandra Workman, started a Bible study in their development and the Team assisted at New Life BFC.
- Pastor Ken Barber retired from the pastorate of New Life BFC.
 This young church went through some trials this year. It called Jonathon Arnold to be its new pastor in December. The church is seeking to graduate from Church Extension in 2008.
- The Hellertown Mission grew from twelve to thirty-five this year and a couple from the Nazareth BFC was commissioned to come and help.
- Pastor *Mark Morrison* served part-time as Assistant Director. In December, the Board of Church Extension called him to fulltime ministry. He is assisting at Cape May, NJ, Adams County, PA, Hellertown, PA, and South Allentown, PA.
- Nine ministry and work teams were sent out to assist our plants in DELMARVA, Cape May, NJ, Brooklyn, NY, South Allentown, Hellertown and Reading, PA, and Las Cruces, NM.
- The Cape May County Mission held numerous outreach events, but has not seen significant growth, along with struggles it faced over the past year. The Mission is praying for a growth year in 2007.
- David & Barb Way set up housekeeping in Adams County, PA, and are consistently networking with the community and seeking to gather new people and acquire a full-time meeting place. A team from Bethlehem BFC came to assist with outreach.
- Administrative Assistant, Lisa Christensen, has been a
 tremendous help with all the administrative duties of the
 Mission. This year, the office moved to Fellowship Community
 and, in doing so, gained a very active volunteer force.
- We praise God for the blessing of a monetary gift from the estate of a dear sister in the Lord and supporter of the Mission. This

- gift enabled us to buy some needed office equipment and computers for the staff.
- Willis Dowling continues his bi-vocational church planting ministry and remains actively seeking to develop a church in *Chesapeake, VA*. AWANA club continues, along with several home Bible studies. God has raised up a potential elder.
- New Beginnings BFC in Mantua, NJ, petitioned the Board of Church Extension to be approved as a Mission Church in the BFC. The Board approved this connection and meetings are being held to assimilate this church into the BFC.
- Pastor Dennis Spinney of the Thompson, CT BFC communicated his desire to plant a daughter church in Danielson, CT.
- Our Church Planters and their Organizing Elders implemented the Five-Year Church Planting Plan, comprised of the DCPI Church Planting Handbook and the BFC Church Planting Guide.
- The *Forward Plan: Missions Here and Now* was presented to several regions during the year.
- A number of meetings were held with prospective church planters.
- Thirty-two Churches were visited this year by Church Extension staff where we presented our Mission and ministry.
- We had two fund raising projects, SummerTen and Christmas Gift Month. They were well organized and the responses were good but fell short of our goals.
- The Las Cruces Mission Church continued to grow in size and finances. Plans were made for graduating the Mission in 2008. Planning began on planting a second church in southern New Mexico.
- Our Hispanic Church Plants in Reading (La Roca) and Allentown (El Faro) under the leadership of Carlos Rodriguez (Reading) and Pastor Elliot Ramos (Allentown) continued their outreach to the Hispanic community. La Roca experienced significant growth in 2006 along with many challenges. El Faro grew this year and a new Organizing Elder Board began serving. It is faced with financial challenges. God has raised up several men for leadership.
- I chair the Joint Committee on Ethnic Church Planting. This

year the Committee focused its efforts on Hispanic church planting. We visited a church in Merida, Mexico, interested in becoming a Bible Fellowship Church.

- Jason and Joanne Englehart, a new Aquila & Priscilla team from Blandon BFC, were commissioned by the church to serve alongside Carlos Rodriguez at La Roca Mission Church.
- John Pello (Outreach Assistant) was diagnosed with liver cancer and is undergoing treatments. His wife Judy is battling scleroderma.
- I once again served this past year on the *Ministerial Candidate Committee* and have enjoyed working with new pastors coming into the BFC.

God continues to give me the privilege of serving Him and the BFC. I count this a true blessing. With all the challenges that accompany the call to ministry, they pale in comparison to the honor of serving the King of Kings and Lord of Lords. Pray for the Board of Church Extension and me in 2007. Pray for God to give me wisdom to direct this Mission. Times are dark and doing missions is increasingly difficult. Pray that Mark Morrison and I will be able to assist our men in developing their church plants. Pray for our Team: Lisa Christensen - Administrative Assistant, Carol Snyder - Special Projects Coordinator, John Pello - Outreach Assistant, Ray Bertolet - Assistant Church Planter and our growing list of volunteers. Please pray regularly for our church planters and their families who serve in Church Extension Ministries. They are the spearhead of this Mission and sacrificially serve you as your missionaries to America.



Report of the Joint Committee on Ethnic Church Planting

The Joint Committee met numerous times during the past year and continues to concentrate its efforts on Hispanic Church Planting. Our initial Hispanic Church Plant, the Lighthouse Church in south Allentown, led by Pastor Elliot Ramos, experienced growth in 2006 and is now looking to train several men to be elders.

The Reading, PA, Hispanic Church Plant continues to make progress under Carlos Rodriguez's direction. An ESL program is well attended and it reaches new people. Carlos is seeking to evangelize the ESL people and assimilate them into La Roca. Growth at La Roca has been constant. Attendance varies but averages around sixty with the number of contacts that Carlos maintains over one-hundred. The Berks Regional Resource Team continues to function well. Pray the right timing for La Roca to have its own building. Recently the first baptisms were held and people continue to be saved.

The Joint Committee is considering its next Hispanic Church Planting site. The Delmarva area is one site under consideration. This past year, five members of the Committee: David Gundrum, Elliot Ramos, Al Roberts, David Schlonecker, and Dana Weller traveled to Merida, Mexico and visited the Merida La Roca Church. The Committee representatives met with the La Roca Elders and the church members to discuss the possibility of having the church become a Bible Fellowship Church. At this time, the Elders and Church have declared their agreement with the Faith & Order. Pastor Marcos Ramirez, Senior Pastor of La Roca, is presently seeking credentials with the BFC. If all goes well, the Merida church could be received into next year's Annual Conference. This would be the first church outside of the United States received into Conference. Pray for the Lord's leading.

The Committee met with CAM International Mission and several of its representatives. CAM is seeking ways to assist denominations ministering among Hispanics and planting Hispanic churches in America. CAM has several seminaries in Central America and could provide men to assist our Hispanic church planting enterprise. A Partnership Agreement has been drafted and

is now being considered for approval. If approved, CAM could provide interns from its seminaries to assist our church planters and church planting missionaries to plant Hispanic BFC churches.

The Committee formed a translation team directed by David Schlonecker. This translation team is preparing a Spanish version of the BPLs. Pastor Marcos Ramirez, from the Merida Church, worked hard in producing a draft of all the BPLs in Spanish and the team is editing his translation.

Finally, we would like to encourage our Churches to reach out to ethnic people groups in their ministry areas. Perhaps your church will be used of God to reach a neglected people group and establish a church among the many people coming to our shores from all over the world.

We encourage Annual Conference to continue its support for ethnic church planting. If your church has not budgeted an amount for ethnic church planting, please do so. The opportunities are many and we need your support. Send your contributions to the Board of Missions, designated for Ethnic Church Planting.

Report of the Board of Missions

"There is no one like Thee among the gods, O Lord; nor are there any works like Thine.
All nations whom Thou hast made shall come and worship before Thee, O Lord; and they shall glorify Thy name.
For Thou art great and doest wondrous deeds; Thou alone art God."

Psalm 86:8-10 (NASB)

What a great day it will be when we find ourselves a part of that great throng of "all the nations" who worship before the throne of God and glorify His name! The Lord has been pleased to continue to use the BFC in reaching "all the nations" with the Good News of the incarnation, life, death and resurrection of Jesus Christ to provide salvation from sin. Because of BFC efforts around the world, that great throng of worshipers will include Mexican, French, Austrian, Kenyan, Greek, Costa Rican, Moroccan, Mongolian, Kyrgystani, Bolivian, Ukranian, Spanish and yes, American people. These are just a few of the 32 countries where BFC missionaries are currently in ministry. These missionaries would be the first to tell you that the glory for any fruit of their ministry goes to God, for He is great and does wondrous things, and He alone is God!

It is a great privilege and joy to serve the BFC and its missionaries through the work of the Board of Missions. The Board of Missions Policy Handbook states: "The purpose of the Bible Fellowship Church Board of Missions is to assist local Bible Fellowship Churches to fulfill the Great Commission of Christ. This is accomplished by directing and promoting the missions program as well as selecting, overseeing and caring for the missionaries of the Bible Fellowship Church (in) cooperation with the local church and sending agency."

One of the very key phrases in this purpose statement is "local Bible Fellowship Church" also described as "the local church.". The Board of Missions is not some independent agency that sets an agenda and dictates the direction of the missions program of the BFC denomination. Rather, it exists to "assist" and work "in cooperation with" individual churches. To that end, the Board of Missions serves the local church by responding to and supporting church-led initiatives in missions; by approving missionary candidates, thus giving them access to many individual churches without having to go through repeated approval processes; and by setting standards of education and preparation that help to ensure readiness for missionary service.

The Board of Missions gets really excited when a Pastor or church representative says, "Will you help us? We would like to be involved in missions by_______" (fill in the blank with an area that your church is interested in.) Or, "Our church is small but wants to be involved in reaching all the nations. What can we do?" The Board of Missions provides a wealth of resources to assist BF Churches in their missions endeavors:

1. Missionary Care including field visits

We are available and willing to meet with those considering missionary service and our missionaries needing advice or counsel regarding their ministry. Visits to the field of ministry are made to help and encourage our missionaries as the needs arise. Buttress Fund distributions assist our missionary family in time of financial needs. This year's distribution from this fund was in excess of \$68,000!

2. Seminars

The BOM offers to the BF churches a host of informational resources.

- Design Your Impact Workshop This five-hour seminar enables church leaders to discover their congregation's key characteristics and resources (their DNA) and move toward identifying a strategic missions focus that can unleash powerful, new global dynamics from their church.
- Knowing God's Will Seminars are conducted each year on a denominational level at a fall Retreat Within a Retreat (RWR) held at Pinebrook, but is also useful as a weekend course for a youth group in a local church setting.
- P.O.M. (Parents of Missionary) Retreats. This weekend retreat seminar is designed to keep the parents of our

- missionaries on track with the ministry of their sons and daughters (and grandchildren) overseas.
- Culture Link Seminars is a program that prepares your short-term missionary teams to be fully prepared for ministry. This is a necessary seminar for any church serious about getting the most from a cross-cultural experience.
- Speaker Resource. The office personnel remain available for mission emphasis in local congregations. This includes all stated public worship services, Sunday School, mission conferences, and special events. The office also provides a complete listing on our website (see #3) of all our missionaries that are available for your missionary event needs.
- Mentoring Services are available to assist a church's board of elders and missions committee in developing a comprehensive, long-range and balanced-outreach plan that uses every member in God's global cause.
- Short-term planning advice and assistance to help you and your church partner with your missionaries by means of short-term missions trips through the services of Chris Merrick, Short-Term Projects Coordinator and Nelson Randolph, Short-Term Partnership Coordinator.

3. Prayer Calendar

The Prayer Calendar will provide your congregation prayer information that is current. The new format is an attractive readable prayer aid that is offered to the churches at a reduced rate. Nearly 1900 are sent out each month.

4. Board of Missions Website

The BOM website is quickly becoming a focal point of information needed by everyone interested in missions in the BFC. This site continues to grow with useful information for both the church leadership and anyone seeking God's direction for possible service through the Board of Missions. Personal support needs and biographical information are continually updated and available 24 hours a day. There are also helpful links in planning short-term or career missions involvement.

5. Email Subscriber Lists

- **a.** Daily Prayer Daily Prayer is a daily e-mail you can receive that allows you to not only view the Prayer Calendar request for the day, but also receive up-to-the-minute news and prayer requests from the field. Readership is around 125.
- **b.** Friday Prayer This is an in-depth prayer document produced each Friday and sent by e-mail. This document meant for missionary-to-missionary communication, is also available to a select group of other prayer partners. Readership is 190.

6. Let's Fish.

A newsletter produced each Wednesday intended to keep those interested in short - term missionary trips and possible career missionary involvement on the cutting edge. It is a place for the exchange of ideas, as well as prayer and ministry opportunities. This document enjoys a readership from ages 14 years thru adult, with backgrounds that include pastors, missionaries, youth leaders, mission chair people, laymen, and students. There is a readership of nearly 250 each week. A full archive is available on our website.

7. May Missionary Rally

This annual gathering of missionaries and Bible Fellowship Churches provides a world-wide panorama of missions, both local and overseas. It also provides networking opportunities and interaction between churches as they endeavor to highlight God's heart for the world in their church. A children's program for Kindergarten through 8th grade has become a successful part of this day. This year's rally will be held May 11th at Cedar Crest BFC.

8. Missionary In-Residence at Pinebrook Bible Conference Summer Family Camp

To promote missions in the BFC, the BOM will supply a missionary family for each of the seven weeks of family camp.

Each week the campers will have opportunity to interact at a very personal level with a missionary from the BFC. Additionally, the missionary will have opportunity to present their ministry during public meetings.

9. Office activities

The office remains the hub for donor and church information and financial processing. We compile and maintain all the necessary information to keep you abreast of the financial needs of the entire missionary family. Addresses and birthdays are kept up-to-date for missionary committees and societies. Receipting of financial donations are meticulously recorded for both the donor's and the missionary's records.

The members of the board and the home office thank you for your continued sacrificial giving to the needs of our missionary family. We remind you that the operations of the board are totally dependant upon the financial support of the BFC.

Found elsewhere in this report is the financial and statistical information that will give you a glimpse of what God is doing. An updated list of all the missionaries and sending boards is also in the Annual Conference Yearbook.

For the Period January 1 to December 31, 2006

- Note 1 The Board of Missions has provided a Balance Sheet as of December 31, 2006, and is using the Fund Accounting concept.

 Any excess of cash received as Designated Income over funds disbursed is shown as a payable since it is being held for future payment of missionary support or designated projects.
- Note 2 The liabilities missionary support / projects and awaiting designation and the Total Support Excess includes the balance excess as of December 31, 2006.
- Note 3 The Financial Statements show the investments in the Funds at Market Value and therefore reflect the Increase/Decrease in Market Values at December 31, 2006.
- Note 4 The Board of Missions received a gift and bequest in the amount of \$294,577.29 during 2005 and \$154,464.46 during 2006. The investment income on this fund was \$16,603.99 during 2006. The amount disbursed during 2006 was \$68,550.00, leaving a fund balance on December 31, 2006 of \$397,095.74. This fund is called Buttress Fund. This fund is temporarily restricted since it will be disbursed over a period of years, along with the earnings for missionary support and Board of Missions staff.

At Fellowship Community, Christ-centered caring is our focus. Our compassionate staff encourages spiritual growth while enhancing physical and emotional well-being during the later stages of life.

At the present time, we have 329 residents living on the campus. To assist the residents, we have 245 full-time and part-time employees and 35 contracted Sodexho Dining Service employees who strive to provide the highest level of quality care. We continue to be accredited by the Joint Commission for Health Care Organizations and maintain an excellent standing with the Pennsylvania Department of Health Division of Life Safety, Pennsylvania Department of Public Welfare and the Pennsylvania Department of Insurance.

We are presently completing construction of the Kauffman and Wentz Courts, which will provide an additional 34 independent living units. The first section of the Kauffman Court will be available for occupancy during July 2007.

Fellowship Community reaffirmed its commitment to the pastors and members of the denomination of the Bible Fellowship Church and will continue to give priority admissions to all BFC members. The Board of Directors has developed an Endowment Fund, which will help pay for those BFC members who cannot pay their cost of care. All money from the BFC will be directed to the Endowment Fund.

During the year 2006, Fellowship Community provided charitable care valued at more than \$1,500,000 to needy residents. Approximately \$225,000 was provided to BFC members.

The residents, their families, the staff and the Board of Directors are very grateful for all the various forms of support that have been and continue to be provided by BF Churches, including prayer, volunteers, special gifts and financial support.

We request that you continue to uphold Fellowship Community in prayer, asking the Lord to provide the necessary wisdom, guidance, appropriate staff and all other resources necessary to continue to operate this facility in a God-honoring way, as the ever-increasing number of regulations and restrictions imposed by various governmental agencies and health insurance providers continue to increase the challenge to provide quality care at affordable rates. Then, we would ask that you, as a church body, prayerfully consider whether you might be able to increase the level of financial support you provide for resident care at Fellowship Community.

Report of the Board of Directors, Pinebrook Bible Conference

Like newborn infants, long for the pure spiritual milk, that by it you may grow up to salvation." 1 Peter 2:2 (ESV)

"Infants," that is what young believers are likened to. As Peter infers, they begin as "new born babies" who naturally desire milk. Of course in other passages the inference is that solid food should replace milk as the babies mature in Christ (1 Cor. 3:2; Heb. 5:12).

Following this analogy, therefore, the church is a birthing room, nursery, school house, work place and geriatrics center. It covers the gambit from seekers to saints. We are thrilled when a seeker recognizes his/her need for a Savior and comes to the cross of Jesus Christ. We are delighted to watch them grow in the Lord. And, oh how wonderful it is to observe those seasoned saints as they continue to lead by example, demonstrating God's grace in and through them.

Pinebrook Bible Conference sees her role in an ancillary capacity as she comes alongside of the church to help in the birthing, maturing and aging process. To begin with, since last Annual Conference we've had a lot of new births - from kits (baby foxes) to puffs of fur (baby woodchucks), two piglets, quackers (baby ducks and geese) as well as four little humans (two boys, two girls - one of which was adopted). We celebrate all of this, but in the light of eternity, our purpose is the spiritual new births that have us and the angels in Heaven rejoicing. For example, during the three weekends of Sno Glo a conservative estimate of 50-60 hands were raised by those who prayed a prayer to receive Jesus as Savior. Add to this an early March retreat from an outside group which had an equal number who confessed Jesus Christ. Time and eternity will reveal how many of these actually made it through the birthing process, but this is an indicator of what is happening on these grounds. It would be fair to say that over the 74 years of ministry hundreds and even thousands claimed Pinebrook as their spiritual birthplace. All to the glory of God!

Pinebrook isn't just an evangelistic center, but it is also about spiritual growth and maturity. At the same Sno Glo, approximately

125 came forward to indicate a desire to follow Christ or recommit their lives to the Lord. Every weekend, teens and adults are committing themselves to Jesus as well as literally thousands each year are sitting under the sound teaching and preaching of God's Word. Add to this the spiritual training that takes place during the weeks of Summer Bible Conference, as Pinebrook continues to play a key role in the Kingdom of God. All to the glory of God!

To help in the process, especially with friends of Pinebrook, we have been adding our own retreats. Two were typically held in the past and continue - Spring Ladies Refresh\(\times\)Her and Senior Saints Retreat. Last year, we added the March Madness Men's & Boys' Encounter and this year, a Young Adult Retreat (geared for college-age kids and young married couples). Friday morning Hymn Sings continue to attract seniors. We appreciate Barry & Dianne Kauffman, from our Lancaster church, for assisting with these. The dates for 2007 and 2008 retreats and events are listed below.

Since last year, Pinebrook has added some amenities that are attracting groups and, at the same time, providing good, clean fun and entertainment. Thanks to donations from teens at Sno Glo and other supporters, snow-making equipment was purchased in December. The tubing hill provided a lot of fun for many kids. George and Sarah Smith, from our Walnutport church, joined the staff this year and with them came Paintball. Capture the Flag while "marking" opponents with paint will never be the same. We hope in the near future, to add a climbing wall and ropes course.

Other new staff joined us during the course of last year. After a 30-year absence John and Ruthie Vandegriff, longtime Pinebrook supporters and former employees, returned to the staff as Conference Host & Registrar. Another former employee, Jim Herrold, is also back with the job of obtaining retreats. With Jim and John working together (the Jim & I project), we have seen a tremendous increase in new retreats. Our goal of filling this place 52-weekends a year is becoming a reality. Doug Ryan, along with his family, has taken over the cooking responsibilities. Chef Doug is raising us to new levels in food services. His oldest daughter, Amber, is overseeing the Snack Shop.

Despite working in an aging facility, over 74 years old, we continue to maintain the buildings and do upgrades. The "Lake

House" was completely gutted and restored. Under-Overbrook is going through that same process. An early July flood forced our hand on this one. It, and eight other rooms in Sunnybrook and Overbrook, suffered the blunt of the flood waters. New carpets and thorough cleaning were done in each room.

A ministry as old as Pinebrook needs a fresh make-over on occasion. If we plan to be relevant in the years to come and provide a quality facility and programming, we will need to make necessary changes. To that end, the Strategic Planning Committee of the Pinebrook Board is devoting this year to evaluating our goals and rediscovering our vision.

East Stroudsburg Christian Academy continues to meet on the grounds at Pinebrook. The students have been a huge help in setting up rooms for each weekend retreat with some of the parents

actually cleaning the guest rooms.

A cursory look at our financial statement reveals what appears to be a bleak picture. The negative figures for 2006 are worse than the two previous years. If the metaphorical concept of it being darker before the dawn is true, we believe we are on the verge of breaking through. One way of meeting our budget is by filling our weekends. The "Jim & I" project is doing that very thing. Retreats for 2007 are up compared to 2006. The December - February retreats were up more than 7% compared to the same time last year and Spring retreats are up almost 30%, with the Fall much better than 2006. But in order for us to really advance, financial gifts are needed. Gifts and offerings were only up 4% over last year, not including a large gift annuity. BFC giving totaled around \$22,000 with several churches giving a majority of this.

Many BFCers use Pinebrook's facilities and directly support us with their giving and/or paying of fees. Most churches, on the other hand, only give a "token" gift to Pinebrook. If this truly is our conference center, we are going to need more money. If each church were to double what they gave last year, which for many would only be a couple of hundred dollars, we could start advancing and begin upgrading our facilities.

The other area of assistance is in regards to helpers. RWR (Retreat within a Retreat) is a great way for church youth groups or adults to assist us during weekends. These groups serve in the

week. Workers are also needed any time and for a variety of projects. The wish list of jobs to be completed before the summer is as follows:

- Bridge built (behind Sunnybrook)
- · Guest Services Building portico needs to be rebuilt
- · Under-Overbrook lots of work
- · Landscaping around the fire pond and in various other spots
- Painting, wood chopping, flower planting (June 9), etc. etc. Other jobs waiting in the wings:
 - Renovation of the restrooms in Fellowship Hall (adding several stalls in each)
- Staircase walkway to Director's Study If you can send a work team or just a few to assist, please contact us @ 570.424.1212.

I wish to thank all the staff that surrounds me here at Pinebrook – Jeremy Beichler, Mark & Peggy Cicchinelli, Jess Creeden, Nate Heater, Jim Herrold, Ann Lee, Amber Ryan, Doug Ryan, George & Sarah Smith, Bob Titus, Joel Trayer, John & Ruthie Vandegriff and their families, plus my lifetime companion, Vonnie, and a bunch of part-timers. Especially I thank my associate Errin Mulberry for his tireless efforts to keep everything afloat. The Pinebrook Board is also deserving of thanks. They continue to keep us on track. We are truly blessed with a great staff and board.

Pinebrook is preparing herself for next year's 75th Anniversary Celebration. This will include special speakers and musicians, plus a Cruise (October 11-18, 2008). But we do not plan to rest on our laurels. There is much work to be done as an incubator and learning center that should keep us busy until we hear that, "Well done, good and faithful servant."

Incidentally, as the Director, I would consider it an honor and privilege to come to your church representing Pinebrook and my Lord. Allow me to re-introduce Pinebrook to your folks.

Report of the Board of Victory Valley Camp

Victory Valley Camp completed its 50th year of Christian children's camp ministry in 2006, looking back to our bold and faithful founders for inspiration and forward with hope to the generation that will take up the mantle of those spiritual giants.

Sno-Valley participation continues to increase on the strength of BFC churches bringing children together in groups. Our three weekends saw a total of 165 children come to the wintry woods to

grow in Christ.

Summer 2006 was the second year for our Summer Missionary program, and again, hundreds of adults committed to pray for our young servants of Christ and supported them financially as they ministered the gospel to children and trained them to follow Jesus. Once again, the Lord used the Summer Missionary process to strengthen the faith of many as they learned to rely on God's provision, seeking first the kingdom of God.

Summer Camp and Outpost participation numbers decreased again, as they have each year since the 1999 peak of about 1,000 campers. Summer 2006 saw Victory Valley minister to 669 children in Camp, Outpost and Day Camp – 89 of those in Day

Camp.

Bible Fellowship Church pastors again took time from active schedules to proclaim God's word to our campers. During Summer 2006, campers and Summer Missionaries alike heard from Pastors Randy Grossman (Reading), Danny Williams (Wallingford), Mark Evans (Coopersburg), Elliot Ramos (Allentown), David Gundrum (Church Extension), Al Dommel (Saucon Valley), Mark Morrison (Church Extension) and former BFC Pastor Dennis Lawrence.

Our Mother-Daughter and Father-Son retreats in the fall were lightly attended yet heartily enjoyed by those who came. We took a new approach to the Father-Son event, with a focus on developing the Dads as spiritual mentors for their boys. Throughout the weekend, the fathers took the leadership role in each activity. In addition to Bible study, we lived out several elements of the story of Gideon – including literally tearing down a "pagan" altar and cutting up the Asherah pole, building shelters in the hills to hide from the enemy, kneeling by the stream to

demonstrate how God winnowed Gideon's army, making real torches and ultimately blowing the horns, shattering the clay jars and shouting "A sword for the Lord and for Gideon."

As it has for a number of years, Victory Valley faces the challenge of aging facilities (many of which were built as temporary structures more than four decades ago) as well as sparse capital funds and the normal challenges of finding skilled volunteers to do what work we can afford to do. Nevertheless, the Lord provided a new roof for the Stone House at a substantially reduced price, as well as caps for window frames and other exterior features to protect the wood from weather damage. BFC Missionary Chris Merrick, and several volunteers, assisted Victory Valley Facilities Manager John Masters with this particular project. Many other volunteers helped in ways large and small. Of particular note, Sue Weller continued to beautify the property by planting and maintaining all the flower beds, with plants donated by Diddens Greenhouse, Hatfield.

The cost of maintaining the property, and the ever-escalating cost of insurance, fuel and supplies continually challenges us to rely on the Lord, and on the people of His church.

The staff and Board of Directors are taking steps to not only maintain the ministry but to re-imagine it for a new generation. This will require deep faith and bold action by the Bible Fellowship Church.

Our renewed focus on the local BFC led to the Board's approval of discounted pricing for church groups starting in summer 2007, as well as a small discount for individual campers coming alone from a BFC church.

At the end of 2006, the Board of Directors decided to pursue construction of a new Upper Elements Challenge Course for Children. The camp's existing course is suitable only for teens and adults, so it doesn't get used most of the summer. In 2007, boys and girls as young as five years will enjoy the thrill and faith-bolstering challenge of this new apparatus. The roughly \$38,000 course, including 400' zipline ride, is made possible by a major pledge from a faithful friend of Victory Valley, as well as proceeds from our Fall Golf Challenge and other gifts from churches and other individuals.

The Board would like to recognize Donna Bauer's quarter century of service as assistant director. Her ministry has touched many lives. As this report went to print in early 2007, "Aunt Donna" had just retired from Victory Valley Camp, but not from ministry. Next year's report will include more about this faithful servant of Christ.

Our bookkeeper/registrar, JoAnna Walker, and her husband Mike, received an answer to persistent prayer during the summer when JoAnna gave birth to Emma Joy Walker. JoAnna decided in October to focus her time and efforts on Emma, and so left the camp staff with our blessing.

As part of our overall efforts to reduce the costs that we can control, we have not filled that position, but have contracted with a "freelance" bookkeeper and have volunteers who enter paper registrations into our online system. The transition was made easier by the cheerful, energetic assistance of Stephanie Ott, the director's wife.

Notes to Financial Statements For the Year Ended December 31, 2006

Summary of Significant Accounting Policies General. Victory Valley Camp is a Christian camp, basically for youth, operated as an agency of the Bible Fellowship Church denomination.

Accounting Method. The cash method of accounting is used for

financial statement purposes.

Depreciation. Real Estate and equipment are carried at cost. The organization has elected not to calculate depreciation. This is a departure from generally accepted accounting principles. Federal Income Taxes. The organization is exempt from income taxes

under Section 501 (3) of the Internal Revenue Code as a religious

organization.

Net Assets. Unrestricted net assets are available at the discretion of the Board for use in the organization's program, and those resources invested in land, buildings and equipment. Temporarily restricted net assets are donations given for particular capital projects or debt reduction.

Allocation of Expenses. The organization used the following policy

in allocating its expenses:

a. Costs allocated to program costs include costs related to carrying on the program, maintaining the property and food.

b. General Administration and Debt Service expenses come from

General Revenues.

Use of Estimates. The preparation of financial statements in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities and disclosures of contingent assets and liabilities at the date of the financial statements and the reported amounts of revenues and expenses during the reported period. Actual results could differ from those estimates.

- Note 2. The Cash in Bank Money Market is the monies being held for capital expenditures and Debt Reduction.
- Note 3. The Marketable Securities is invested in American Funds and Merch & Co. Stock. The cost or donated value on December 31, 2006 was \$1,618.55
- Note 4. Note Payable Unsecured Monies were loaned to Victory Valley in the amount of \$100,000.00. The terms are interest only at the rate of 5%, payable quarterly. The principal will be forgiven at death of individual.

Report of the Board of Communications

Although still felt to be a valuable resource for churches, as opposed to purchasing an entire F&O for members, with all the changes made on a yearly basis, we are not sure exactly when to go to press. Those who pre-paid will be issued a credit for this year unless otherwise directed.

Our Chairman for a number of years, William H. Bartron, was called home during this conference year. We miss his leadership and friendship, but have vowed to continue on.

As the new Chairman, I am delighted with the members of the Board working with me. I especially appreciate the work the Snyders do with the *Fellowship News* (Carol, Editor; Clyde, design). I'm also grateful for the financial guidance and bookkeeping given by Rachel Kistler Anderson and Scott Ott's

work overseeing the website. Thanks, too, for the many who have submitted articles for the *Fellowship News*.

Annual Conference directed the Board of Communication to either update the BFC logo, designed more than forty years ago, or create a new one. We assembled a logo committee consisting of members from both the Board of Communications and Strategic Planning Committee. Report of the Board of Christian Education

The Board met four times during this past year to discuss avenues by which we might assist the individual Christian Education ministries of the Particular Churches. Five subcommittees have worked toward this end.

Report of the Strategic Planning Committee

In 1991, the Annual Conference called for the appointment of a Strategic Planning Committee for the denomination. Since that time, the Committee selected by Annual Conference has sought to provide vision, cohesive direction, support, and encouragement for the ministries of the BFC. They worked toward the development and implementation of a Vision Statement, took major steps to regionalize the ministries of the BFC, oversaw the provision of two denomination-wide gatherings for corporate worship, provided evaluation and encouragement to churches in need, took steps toward developing a corporate identity for the denomination, sought to streamline administrative processes, and sought to bring cohesive focus to denominational ministries.

It is quite possible that this Committee has now worked itself out of a job.

During their shared ministry, the Strategic Planning Committee met extensively with pastors, laymen, denominational leaders, agency heads, and even leaders of ministries outside of the BFC to gain perspective for the direction, focus, and vision of our fellowship of Churches. Repeatedly, we heard pastors and laymen asking for more leadership, a structure that would better oversee our denomination, and centralized offices.

Working with the Board of Directors and Agency Leaders, the Committee has developed the foundations for a restructuring of the BFC. A proposed framework for streamlining Annual Conference, developing an executive branch of the denominational ministry for leadership on a year-round basis, moving toward corporate offices, and providing an Executive Director to serve as an encourager and implementer of BFC vision was presented to all of the Bible Fellowship Church pastors, elders, and agency leaders in 2006. Those who reviewed the proposals were positive and supportive and gave significant input to help develop the framework into a useable plan for restructuring of the denomination. We were very pleased with the broad participation and input we received in regional gatherings in the late Fall and Winter of 2006. Our thanks

to all who participated.

After extensive interaction with members of the Board of Directors, we join them in proposing that a Steering Committee be established with the express goal of formulating procedures necessary for the provision of a denominational Executive Board and Executive Director. We believe that such provision will give leadership for the denomination in the years ahead that will be cohesive, comprehensive, and coordinated. Furthermore, we encourage the Annual Conference to expedite this process so that the BFC can proceed in serving our Lord, His Church, and His world more effectively in the days ahead.

We also believe that the establishment of this Steering Committee and the subsequent provision of an Executive Board along with the Executive Director should result in the dissolution of the Strategic Planning Committee as it currently exists. The work we have overseen should be cared for under the auspices of the Steering Committee and the subsequent Executive Board.

Thank you for your support and participation in our work these past 16 years. We trust that the work we have done has strengthened the fellowship of churches and has brought cohesive perspective of ministry and vision to the BFC.

May we, as the Bible Fellowship Church, continue to "seek to become an expanding fellowship of churches united to make disciples of Jesus Christ."

Whereas, the work of the Strategic Planning Committee as established by the Annual Conference and outlined in the Faith & Order of the Bible Fellowship Church will no longer be necessary when the Executive Board and Executive Director are in place, therefore, be it

Resolved, that the Strategic Planning Committee as described in Article 512-17 of the *Faith & Order* of the Bible Fellowship Church be dissolved, and further

Resolved, that the responsibilities for strategic planning now be cared for by the Executive Board and Executive

Director of the BFC, and further

Resolved, that Article 512-17 as well as other references to the Strategic Planning Committee be deleted from the *Faith & Order*. [FIRST READING]

Report of the Board of Pensions

2006 Review and Status (figures rounded for simplicity): Ministers' Retirement Fund (MRF) annuity payments to the 35 current beneficiaries was \$215,900 in 2006 (compared to \$208,300 in 2005 and \$201,500 in 2004): see Statement of Cash Receipts and Disbursements. There are 8 future beneficiaries of the MRF, the youngest of which will begin receiving benefits at age 65 in the year 2013. There were three beneficiaries who went home to the Lord in 2006. Based on the current mortality assumptions, the final year of MRF payments to beneficiaries is projected to be 2036. Between now and then, it is estimated that the MRF will distribute future benefits totaling nearly \$3,703,500. The Present Value lump sum cost of funding these future annual benefits is \$2,181,000. During 2006, the Net Assets in the MRF continued to fall as expected, and are now (\$50,900), as illustrated on the Balance Sheet. Therefore, the present value shortfall is approximately \$2,230,000, which is being funded by contributions from the Administrative Budget and the churches. To provide future retirement benefits for current pastors, the Faith & Order requires churches to contribute to each pastor's individual 403(b) account (the Ministers Annuity Fund, or MAF) at a minimum rate of 3% of Schedule SE compensation (4% if the pastor is also making voluntary contributions). If you are a pastor and your church is not making its contribution to your 403(b) plan, contact the Secretary of the Board, Keith Plows, at P.O. Box 323, 228 Hope Street, Stockertown, PA 18083.

Cost of Living Adjustments (COLA): Partial cost-of-living adjustments have been part of the long-term phase out strategy of the MRF. At its meeting on January 19, 2007, the Board evaluated the cost of eliminating the COLA phaseout for beneficiaries who were more than age 65 when the MRF was frozen on December 31, 1993. The Board concluded that the cost outweighed the benefits when spread over the entire group of MRF beneficiaries. It would be more appropriate to provide additional assistance to individual beneficiaries

who are experiencing financial difficulties.

Interest Bearing Notes: As approved by the 119th Annual Conference (April, 2002), the Board of Pensions began to issue interest bearing notes in 2003 to cover the near-term liquidity shortage of the MRF. In 2006, no Notes were issued, and the total

of Notes outstanding remains at \$90,000. This resulted from the sale of all of the mutual fund assets (\$65,688.08 net proceeds) on Jan 27, 2006 as resolved by the Board at its annual meeting on that date. The Board will need to issue \$40,000 of Notes during 2007, and has a firm commitment from an agency at this time. It is expected that the Board will need to begin issuing Notes again in June, 2008.

The Notes have a 5-year maturity, and carry an interest rate equal to the yield on the 5-year US Treasury Note at date of issue, plus 2.5%. In order to meet the liquidity needs of the Ministers' Retirement Fund for 2008 through 2011, IT IS CRITICAL that the agencies and churches support the issuance of the Notes. Otherwise, the BFC will need to arrange for commercial loans through their banking relationships, at substantially higher cost to the Board of Pensions. If an agency or church has long-term investment assets (legacies, endowment funds, building funds, etc) currently invested in money market funds, CDs or bonds, prayerful and serious consideration should be given to redirecting a portion of those assets to the Board of Pension Notes. Agencies and churches that may be interested in subscribing to the 2008 or 2009 Notes offering should contact Rick Volpe via e-mail mail@faithbfc.org. Subscription requests will be first come, first served, with the Agencies having priority. The Board will advertise the availability of these Notes to the churches during mid 2007.

Annual Funding: The Board of Pensions is requesting a contribution from the Administrative Budget in the amount of \$66,000 for 2008, and \$69,000 for 2009. The contribution rate for churches will remain unchanged at the current rate of \$900 per church plus \$9.00 per member for calendar years 2006 through 2008. Long-term projected contributions from the Churches and the Administrative Budget are shown in the accompanying table labeled "Annual Contribution Data & Assumptions".

Planned Giving: The Board of Pensions urges members of the BFC to consider including the MRF in their estate planning arrangements. The simplest and most tax efficient method would be to name the MRF as a contingent or primary beneficiary (for married or singles, respectively) of a portion of an IRA or 403(b) account. This arrangement can be adjusted or revoked at any time, and does not involve changing one's Will. For more information, please contact the Board at P.O. Box 148, Harleysville, PA 19438,

The Board of Pensions recommends the following resolutions to Annual Conference:

1. Whereas, the MRF annuity rate for 2007 is \$215 per year of service, and

Whereas, partial cost-of-living adjustments are part of the long-term phase out strategy of the MRF, therefore be it

Resolved, that the MRF annuity rate for calendar year 2008 be \$217 per year of service.

Resolution Relating to Rental/Housing Allowances for Retired or Disabled Ministers of this Conference for Calendar Year 2008

2. Whereas, the religious denomination known as The Bible Fellowship Church has and functions through Ministers of the Gospel who are duly ordained or licensed; and

Whereas, the practice of The Bible Fellowship Church is to provide a parsonage or a rental allowance as part of the gross compensation for each of its active ordained or licensed ministers; and

Whereas, pensions paid to retired and disabled ordained or licensed ministers of The Bible Fellowship Church are considered as deferred compensation and are paid to said retired and disabled ordained or licensed ministers in consideration of previous, active service; and

Whereas, the Internal Revenue Service has recognized that The Bible Fellowship Church is the appropriate organization to designate a housing/rental allowance for retired and disabled ordained or licensed ministers who are members of this Conference;

Resolved.

- 1. An amount equal to 100% of the pension payments received during the year of 2008 be and is hereby designated as a rental/housing allowance for each retired and disabled ordained or licensed minister of The Bible Fellowship Church who is or was a member of the Bible Fellowship Church Minister's Retirement Fund.
- 2. This rental/housing allowance shall apply to each

retired and disabled ordained or licensed minister who has been granted the retired relationship or placed on disability leave by the Bible Fellowship Annual Conference and whose name and relationship to the conference is recorded in the *Yearbook* of the Annual Conference of the Bible Fellowship Church and in other appropriate records maintained by the conference.

3. The pension payment to which this rental/housing allowance applies shall be the pension payment resulting from all service of such retired or disabled ordained or licensed minister from all employment by any local church, Annual Conference or institution of The Bible Fellowship Church or of any former denomination that is now a part of The Bible Fellowship Church, or from any other employer who employed the minister to perform services related to the ministry and who elected to make contributions to the pension funds of The Bible Fellowship Church for such retired minister's pension.

Note: The rental/housing allowance which may be excluded from a minister's gross income is limited to the lesser of (1) the amount of the rental/housing allowance designated by the minister's employer or other appropriate body, (2) the amount actually expended by the minister to provide his or her housing, or (3) the legally-determined fair rental value of the parsonage or other housing provided. As specified in Rev. Rul. 71-290 C.B. 92, "the only amount that will qualify for exclusion under section 107(2) of the Code as a 'rental allowance' is an amount equal to the fair rental value of the home, including furnishings and appurtenances such as a garage, plus the cost of utilities."



The results of these assumptions can be seen on the accompanying graph titled "Long-Term Projection of Account Balances". There is enough long-term cash flow from the churches and from the Administrative Budget to provide all of the benefit payments to the retirees. The liquidity shortage from 2007 to 2012 will be covered by issuing interest bearing notes on a periodic basis, as approved at Annual Conference in 2002. This will "bridge" the near-term liquidity shortfall. Repayments are projected to begin in the year 2016 and be complete by 2024.

The ASSUMPTIONS shown above reflect the current strategy of the Board of Pensions. Annual adjustments will be made according to actual rates of inflation and investment return, as well as actual mortality.

Report of the Historical Committee

The past is not our future.

Those who long for the good old days might offer an argument. We would be better off, they suggest, if things were like they used to be. Why don't we just follow the Bible like they used to?

Say it again - the past is not the future. We don't live there anymore. Even though the past seems kinder and gentler, less intense and more secure, it is not where we are and not where we are going. So why bother with history and heritage? Why keep the memories alive? Why remember people long gone?

The philosopher George Santayana said, "Those who cannot learn from history are doomed to repeat it." It is a good thought. The BFC story contains things we would like to forget and things we can never forget. Our past contains lessons to be learned about what not to do and lessons about when we were at our best. Even though the past is not our future, it is our past.

What can we learn?

We learn the BFC is unique. God has led us on a unique journey making us a unique church with a unique task. Only one denomination has ever made the journey we have made. We are not alone in making a journey since every denomination has its own journey. Only our denomination has made our journey. We started as a few people who burned with evangelistic zeal. Our forefathers and foremothers did not look to make a name and did not even think about being a church. God has led from that handful of people. They loved the Lord Jesus and wanted to obey him from the pit of their hearts. They were willing to listen to His word and change when they thought they were wrong. They recognized their faults and looked for ways to improve. God changed us as our journey progressed. As a result, our church is part of God's plan and work in this world. God has led us to an understanding of His word and to expectations that lead us to take what God has given us and what He has made us to the world. The world will be different for it

We learn who we are. The adult was a child once. The child grew. The adult was in the child and the child is in the adult. When adults want to understand who they are, part of the understanding is in the memories of the child. There were events and people who shaped the child and formed the adult. It is no less true for our church. We are changing. What we are becoming is formed from what we were. Why were we so committed to preaching the gospel? Why did we return again and again to the Bible to receive its direction? Why were we obsessed with organization and record keeping? Why was loyalty the great virtue? How does who we were shape what we will be? How does what we were hold us back from our future? What are the strengths that we must not abandon as the processes of change continue?

The Historical Committee believes these lessons are crucial. Learning to understand our strengths and weaknesses is a vital exercise as we face the changes that inevitably come to a people who want to follow God and know that the past is not our future. We are committed to our task of preserving the past believing that we are helping to shape the future.

The routine work of collecting and cataloguing continues. In recent years, the numbers of acquisitions has declined. We believe that many significant documents, records and photographs are still laying around which need to be placed in the archives. We encourage our churches and individuals with important historical material to place them in the archives for preservation and safekeeping. Recently, some very special and unique photographs were given to archives. They were rescued from a pile of material destined for a trash heap. In this case, we appreciate that someone saw their value and protected them. How many more records, documents and photographs will wind up in a land fill? You can help by assuring that historical materials are protected by routing them to the archives where they will be protected.

Our on-line library continues to grow with additions being made on a regular basis. Past minutes, study papers, statistics and other helpful materials are available at our website, bfchistory.org.

The Historical Society was hosted this year by the Fleetwood Church. Jim Mortland from the Fleetwood Church made a presentation entitled, "130 Years in Fleetwood." Jill Davidson, Vice-President of the Society who is a member of the Graterford Church, read a paper entitled, "A Feather in Your Cap: Legalism in the MBC / BFC."

Next year's meeting of the Historical Society will be held at

Wallingford, PA, on October 27, 2007. Presentations will be made on the history of the Wallingford Church and former Pastor E. N. Cassel and his role in the evolution of our doctrinal positions.

 Any Probationer/Ordained man licensed or ordained by the BFC must become a member of the Beneficiary Society of the BFC, except for those designated in paragraph two under membership.

701-1.3

Each Probationer/Ordained man entering the membership must pay into the society an equal amount of money equivalent to the number of years that he was licensed, up to the current year. This amount will be the total of the amounts paid for each year of his service.

The Beneficiary Society of the BFC is a mutual aid society of all ordained and/or licensed ministers engaged in the ministries of the BFC. - Rest of the paragraph eliminated.

701-1.3

3rd paragraph

Ministers receiving Ministers' Retirement Fund benefits, ministers on disability, and ministers under the Ministers' Annuity fund who have retired at age 65 or later are members of the Society but are exempt from dues. Those who continue or choose to continue serving as Pastors under agencies of the BFC must pay dues.

Dues - the dues of all members of the Beneficiary Society shall be set at the annual meeting and shall be paid at Annual Conference. After a Pastor reaches the age of 72 he no longer is expected to pay into the fund of the society. Non-payment by the end of Annual Conference automatically cancels any claims to benefits until payment is received by the secretary.

Benefits - each member of the Society is entitled to death benefits for himself, his wife and his children. Each child is insured until he or she reaches the age of 19.

A widow of a minister not receiving aid from MRF or MAF shall not receive less than \$100 per year.

A member must pay into the Beneficiary Society Fund for at least 10 years to receive full benefits. If a member pays into the fund less than 10 years the benefits are as follows; less than 10 years - ½ of the prescribed benefits; less than 5 years - 1/4 of the prescribed benefits.

When the assets of the Society fall below \$110,000, death benefits for the Pastor revert to \$5,500

Report of the Study Committee: On the Process and Purpose of God's Calling People to Salvation

The Study Committee on the Process and Purpose of God's Calling People to Salvation presented to 123rd Annual Conference changes in wording to various articles relating to soteriology. The committee was then given the assignment by Annual Conference "to supply Annual Conference pastors and delegates with materials giving reasons for their proposed changes" in Articles 9-13 of our Articles of Faith (2006 BFC Yearbook, p. 37). The committee fulfilled its assignment and a copy of those materials, which was sent to each church, comprise Appendix A of this report.

In fulfilling its assignment, the committee stressed once again that the suggested changes in wording do not represent any change in the doctrinal positions presently found in our *Articles of Faith*. Therefore, the committee did not present exegetical material to support the word changes to the present articles. It did not believe that it was necessary to present detailed scriptural support of what we already hold as a body to be true.

Whether ultimately the proposed wording for Article 11, *Foreseen faith*, as proposed is adopted or not, we cannot be ambiguous as to what our present position actually is.

While we do not question the integrity of any who sign that they are in agreement with the *Articles of Faith*, we do question the understanding of any who would hold to a foreseen faith view of election while at the same time affirming that "election is a free act of the sovereign God in which from eternity, for reasons known only to Himself, and apart from any goodness in man, He graciously chose from among the fallen mankind a people unto salvation, that they might be conformed to Christ's image." (Article 11-1)

Therefore, any persons who presently hold to a foreseen faith position should not sign that they are in full agreement with our present *Articles of Faith* but should declare their reservation regarding Article 11. Whether or not the proposed clarifications are adopted, such persons, if holding credentials, should continue

to minister and will continue to be embraced by the Bible Fellowship Church. The BFC, however, will continue to require persons seeking credentials to be in full agreement with the Articles of Faith. The committee is proposing a resolution to this effect.

The committee has become aware that an exegetical study by previous committees of this and related articles has not been preserved. If Annual Conference desires a detailed written exegetical study concerning Article 11 or any or all other articles under consideration, the Committee is willing to present such a study to be circulated before the 125th Annual Conference for

inclusion in a report to the conference.

Upon further reflection and interaction with various individuals, the committee has become aware that the proposed wording of Article 10, But unless regenerated, has been construed by many to mean that one must hold that regeneration comes before faith. And since the committee has already stated on the floor of conference that no such understanding was intended to be communicated by the proposed changes, the committee will present a resolution at this Annual Conference that the words But unless regenerated be removed from the Proposed Article 10 that has been adopted at First Reading.

The committee unanimously proposes the following resolutions:

1. Whereas, it appears that there are some brethren who currently hold to a foreseen faith position as a basis of election, and

Whereas, a foreseen faith position is inconsistent with the Articles of Faith of the Bible Fellowship Church, which states "election is a free act of the sovereign God in which from eternity, for reasons known only to Himself, and apart from any goodness in man, He graciously chose..." (Article 11-1), therefore, be it

Resolved, that any persons who presently hold to a foreseen faith position should not sign that they "subscribe without reservation" [F&O, 512-11.2, Duties (4)] to our present Articles of Faith but should declare their reservation regarding Article 11. Whether or not the proposed clarifications are adopted, such persons, if holding

credentials, should continue to minister and will continue to be embraced by the Bible Fellowship Church. The Bible Fellowship Church will continue to require persons seeking credentials to be "committed without reservation" [F&O, 512-13.3, Duties (5)] to the *Articles of Faith*.

- 2. Whereas, the words But unless regenerated contained in the proposed Article 10 have been construed by many to require that one must believe that regeneration precedes faith, and
 - Whereas, the Study Committee on the Process and Purpose of God's Calling People to Salvation stated on the conference floor that it was not its intention to imply by these words that regeneration must precede faith, and
 - Whereas, it is the purpose of the proposed changes to bring a greater clarity to the present articles, and
 - Whereas, the meaning of the phrase but unless regenerated is not sufficiently clear, therefore be it
 - Resolved, that the words but unless regenerated be deleted from Article 10 that was adopted at first reading and that the original wording, but left to himself, be re-inserted.

Materials for Annual Conference pastors and delegates to understand the proposed clarifications in Articles 9-13 of the Articles of Faith

Dear Pastors and Elders,

In response to the initial mandate from Annual Conference, the committee initiated a study of the biblical teaching on the process

and purpose of God's calling people to salvation.

In the report to the 123rd Annual Conference, the committee unanimously concluded, "The purpose of God's saving individuals is ultimately to bring honor and glory to Himself. The process by which God saves individuals is by choosing them according to His sovereign prerogative, granting faith and life to those who are dead in their trespasses and sins. The Bible teaches that all that He chooses. He saves, and none of those who are saved will be lost. Since salvation is totally the work of God from its commencement to its completion, God is honored and glorified, and man is humbled and kept from boasting in the salvation he receives."

The Study Committee on the Process and Purpose of God's Calling People to Salvation presented changes in the wording of articles that were approved at first reading. In order to facilitate the discussion and vote by the Boards of Elders of particular churches that is required before second reading, the committee was given the assignment by Annual Conference "to supply Annual Conference pastors and delegates with materials giving reason for their proposed changes" in Articles 9-13 of our Articles of Faith (2006 BFC Yearbook, p. 37). It is in fulfillment of that assignment that the committee presents these materials to you.

You received a letter from the Committee on Arrangements dated Oct. 2, 2006, explaining that it is the responsibility of the Boards of Elders of each particular church to review and vote on

proposed changes to the Articles of Faith.

Background to the Report Submitted To the 123rd Annual Conference

It is the committee's sincere belief that the suggested changes in wording do not represent any change in the doctrinal positions presently found in our *Articles of Faith*. Instead, they clarify the meaning that is already present. Therefore, the committee has not entered into a new scriptural study to support the articles; such study was accomplished when the present articles were written. It is the committee's desire to remove any perceived ambiguities, so that each article is clearly understood, even at a cursory reading by one who is not familiar with the BFC. The committee also believes this will aid in the recruitment of pastors by attracting those who hold to the same theological positions that are held by the BFC.

The sole purpose of these materials is to demonstrate that the proposed changes in wording are, in fact, clarifications of the BFC's present doctrinal position, and not changes in position. This will be accomplished by noting how the clarifications are consistent with wording in both the article under consideration and the wording in other existing articles. The committee rejects any suggestion that the proposed clarifications constitute a new position for the BFC. An assertion to the contrary *would* constitute a new doctrinal position for the BFC.

Therefore, the materials that you have before you for consideration represent a study of the Articles of Faith of the BFC, demonstrating that the proposed wording of the articles is consistent with the present wording of the articles; and further, that the clarifications presented are helpful in the recruitment of pastors and in erasing perceived ambiguities.

Article 9 - Sin

Current article in Faith & Order

9-1. Sin is any lack of conformity to the will of God¹ or any transgression of the law of God.² Sin separates man from God, incurring His wrath and judgment, and it is manifest in the selfishness, rebellion, and total depravity of man's conduct and behavior before God and man. Sin is the

cause of the curse on and defilement of the created universe.3

Proposed clarifications

9-1. "Sin is any lack of conformity to the will of God¹ or any transgression of the law of God.² Sin separates man from God, incurring His wrath and judgment, and is manifest in the selfishness, rebellion, <u>unbelief</u> and total depravity of man's <u>being</u>.³ Sin is the cause of the curse on and defilement of the created universe."

¹ All wrongdoing is sin (1 John 5:17a). Anyone, then, who knows the good he ought to do and doesn't do it, sins (James 4:17).

² Everyone who sins breaks the law; in fact, sin is lawlessness (1 John 3:4). For whoever keeps the whole law and yet stumbles at just one point

is guilty of breaking all of it (James 2:10).

- 3 "As for you, you were dead in your transgressions and sins, (2) in which you used to live when you followed the ways of this world and of the ruler of the kingdom of the air. (3) All of us also lived among them at one time, gratifying the cravings of our sinful nature and following its desires and thoughts. Like the rest, we were by nature objects of wrath." (Eph. 2:1-3). "The wrath of God is being revealed from heaven against all the godlessness and wickedness of men who suppress the truth by their wickedness, (19) since what may be known about God is plain tot hem, because God has made it plain to them. (20) For since the creation of the world God's invisible qualities - His eternal power and divine nature - have been clearly seen, being understood from what has been made, so that men are without excuse. (21) For although they knew God, they neither glorified Him as God nor gave thanks to Him, but their thinking became futile and their foolish hearts were darkened." (Rom. 1:18-21). Also Rom. 3:10-12, Rom. 8:7-8.
- ⁴ We know that the whole creation has been groaning as in the pains of childbirth right up to the present time (Rom.8:22). (See also Gen.3:17,18).
- 1. Adding the word *unbelief* to Article 9-1 is consistent with Article 15, Justification, which states, "the sinner is declared righteous solely through faith in the redemptive work of Christ." Prior to faith, man was unrighteous and unbelieving, thereby incurring God's wrath and judgment.
- 2. Total depravity includes not just man's conduct and behavior, but his whole *being* or nature. This is consistent with Article 10-1, Human Ability and Responsibility, which states that

while man has not lost his ability to make decisions, "left to himself, he acts only in accordance with his fallen, sinful nature."

Article 10 - Human Ability and Responsibility

Current article in Faith & Order

- 10-1. In his original creation man was endowed with the ability to will and do good or evil and was accountable for his willing and doing. But by the fall of Adam man lost his ability, apart from God's grace, to will and to do those things necessary for a right relationship with God; however, he is still accountable to God for obedience to all of His commands. Man has not lost his ability to make decisions, but left to himself, he acts only in accordance with his fallen, sinful nature.
- 10-2. Only by God's infinite grace can man will or do anything necessary to his salvation. By that grace, God saves men whom He causes to will and to do good; however, He does this without nullifying man's ability to act responsibly.

Proposed clarifications

- 10-1. In his original creation man was endowed with the ability to will and do good or evil and was accountable for his willing and doing. ⁴ God "will give to each person according to what he has done." To those who by persistence in doing good seek glory, honor and immortality, he will give eternal life. But for those who are self-seeking and who reject the truth and follow evil, there will be wrath and anger. There will be trouble and distress for every human being who does evil: first for the Jew, then for the Gentile; but glory, honor and peace for everyone who does good: first for the Jew, then for the Gentile (Rom.2:6-10). In the past God overlooked such ignorance, but now he commands all people everywhere to repent (Acts 17:30).

⁵ Now what I am commanding you today is not too difficult for you or beyond your reach. This day I call heaven and earth as witnesses against you that I have set before you life and death, blessings and curses. Now choose life, so that you and your children may live (Deu.30:11,19).

6"He saved us, not because of righteous things we had done, but because of His mercy. He saved us through the washing of rebirth and renewal by the Holy Spirit." (Titus 3:5) "As for you, you were dead in your transgressions and sins...(5) made us alive with Christ even when we were dead in transgressions..." (Eph. 2:1, 5)

As it is written: "There is no one righteous, not even one; All have turned away, they have together become worthless; there is no one who does good, not even one" (Rom.3:10,12). Can the Ethiopian change his skin or the leopard its spots? Neither can you do good who are accustomed to doing evil (Jer.13:23). (See also footnote 2).

8 It does not, therefore, depend on man's desire or effort, but on God's

mercy (Rom.9:16).

⁹Yet to all who received Him, to those who believed in His name, He gave the right to become children of God – (13) children born not of natural descent, nor of human decision or a husband's will, but born of God. (John 1:12-13)

¹⁰ Therefore, my dear friends, as you have always obeyed--not only in my presence, but now much more in my absence--continue to work out your salvation with fear and trembling, for it is God who works in you to will and to act according to his good purpose (Phil.2:12,13).

1. The replacement of "by" with *through* in Article 10-1 is simply designed to eliminate a possible misunderstanding of time-chronology. It was through Adam's fall, not "by the time of Adam's fall," that sin came into the world and man lost his ability,

apart from God's grace, to will and to do those things necessary for a right relationship with God.

- 2. The replacement of "but left to himself" with the proposed clarification but unless regenerated asserts nothing more than that fallen man, with a fallen nature, has no other nature from which to work "in accordance with" unless he is first regenerated. In addition, Article 17-1, Perseverance of the Saints, notes that it is "those regenerated by the Word of God through the work of the Holy Spirit become partakers of the divine nature." They are not "partakers of the divine nature" before regeneration.
- 3. "God saves *those* men" is consistent with Article 11-2, Election, which states "those so chosen He redeems by His Son and seals by His Spirit."

Article 11 - Election

Current article in Faith & Order

11-1. Election is a free act of the sovereign God in which from eternity, for reasons known only to Himself, and apart from any goodness in man³ He graciously chose from among the fallen mankind a people unto salvation, that they might be conformed to Christ's image. Those so chosen He redeemed by His Son and seals by His Spirit.

Proposed clarifications

11-1 Election is a free act of the sovereign God in which from eternity, ¹ for reasons known only to Himself, ² and apart from any <u>foreseen faith and/or</u> goodness <u>found</u> in man, ³ He graciously chose from among the fallen mankind a people unto salvation, ⁴ that they might be conformed to Christ's image. ⁴ Those so chosen He redeemed by His Son⁵ and seals by His Spirit. ⁶

¹ For he chose us in him before the creation of the world to be holy and blameless in his sight. In him we were also chosen, having been predestined according to the plan of him who works out everything in conformity with the purpose of his will (Eph.1:4,11).

² "All things have been committed to me by my Father. No one knows the Son except the Father, and no one knows the Father except the Son and

those to whom the Son chooses to reveal him" (Mat.11:27).

³ Who has saved us and called us to a holy life—not because of anything we have done but because of his own purpose and grace. This grace was given us in Christ Jesus before the beginning of time (2 Tim.1:9). For those whom He foreknew He also predestined to be conformed to the image of His Son, in order that He might be the firstborn among many brothers. And those whom He predestined He also called, and those whom He called He also justified, and those whom He justified He also glorified. (Romans 8:29-30)

Having believed, you were marked in him with a seal, the promised Holy Spirit (Eph.1:13).

1. The present article on election states that God chose for "reasons known only to Himself." To postulate that God chooses individuals on the basis of *foreseen faith* is to posit *the* reason for God choosing whom He does. In fact, it is asserted by those who hold to a *foreseen faith* position that we as humans know the reason why God chooses whom He does, namely *foreseen faith*, and that the reason is not just known by God, but He has revealed the reason in His Word. A *foreseen faith* position stands in complete opposition to the plain reading of the current article, which states "for reasons known only to Himself."

Further, the present article states that it is apart from "goodness" that God chooses who will be saved. Foreseen faith would be a "goodness" found in man that men without faith do not possess. Such a faith determines God's choosing of a person; hence, God's choice is no longer "for reasons known only to Himself and apart from any goodness in man." As such, a foreseen faith position is antithetical to our current article on election. Either the basis of God's choosing is a reason known only to God or foreseen faith is the reason. Either it is apart from man's goodness or it is because of the goodness of man's faith. It cannot be both. The present article does not provide room for foreseen faith as a part of God's choosing, but rather man's faith is a result of God's choosing.

2. The addition of the word *found* in the phrase "found in man" simply means that faith was not resident or inherent in fallen

man, but comes as a result of God's grace. God brings fallen man to faith as opposed to discovering faith resident in man's heart. Article 10-1, Human Ability and Responsibility, states that "man lost his ability, apart from God's grace, to will and to do those things necessary for a right relationship with God."

Article 12 - Salvation

Current article in Faith & Order

12-1. Salvation is offered in the gospel to all men¹ and is received by grace through faith and the instrumentality of the Holy Spirit, apart from works or human merit. Salvation centers in a person, Jesus Christ, and receiving Him⁴ includes the remission of sins on the grounds of His shed blood, the imputation of His perfect righteousness, the reception of the Holy Spirit, and the impartation of eternal life.

Proposed clarifications

- 12-1. Salvation is the work of God¹ in which He reconciles fallen men to Himself,²ultimately removes the consequences of the curse, ³ and bestows upon His redeemed Creation⁴ the riches of His grace, all to His glory. ⁵
- **12-2.** Salvation is offered in the gospel to all men⁶ and is accomplished in all the elect. It is received by grace through faith and the instrumentality of the Holy Spirit, apart from works or human merit. Salvation centers in a person, Jesus Christ, and receiving Him¹⁰ includes the remission of sins on the grounds of His shed blood, the imputation of His perfect righteousness. The reception of the Holy Spirit, and the impartation of eternal life.

1. The committee noted that the Articles of Faith nowhere define salvation. Therefore, in 12-1, the Annual Conference approved a summary definition that is a clarification in keeping

with what the articles on salvation teach as a whole. This definition includes scriptural support in the footnotes.

2. That "salvation... is accomplished in all the elect" is consistent with Article 11-1, Election, which states "those so chosen He redeemed by His Son and seals by His Spirit." In addition to the footnoted Scriptures, Ephesians 1:13 says, "And you also were included in Christ when you heard the word of truth, the gospel of your salvation. Having believed, you were marked in Him with a seal, the promised Holy Spirit..." It is only those who have believed who are sealed by His Spirit. As such, when the article presently states that "those so chosen He redeemed by His Son and seals by His Spirit," it is intended to communicate that salvation is accomplished in all the elect.

Article 13 - Repentance

Current article in Faith & Order

13-1. Repentance unto life is a voluntary act of man, accomplished by the convicting power of the Holy Spirit through the Word of God. Repentance consists in a knowledge of sin, a sense of guilt and corruption that results in the confession and forsaking of sin and a turning to God.

Proposed clarifications

13-1. Repentance unto life is <u>a gift of God</u>¹ and a voluntary act of man, ² accomplished by the convicting power of the Holy Spirit through the Word of God. Repentance consists in a knowledge of sin, ³ a sense of guilt and corruption that results in the confession and forsaking of sin and a turning to God⁴ that results in loving, obedient service. ⁵

¹ Or do you show contempt for the riches of His kindness, tolerance and patience, not realizing that God's kindness leads you toward repentance? (Rom. 2:4) When they heard this, they had no further objections and praised God, saying, "So then, God has granted even the Gentiles repentance unto life." (Acts 11:18) 2 Tim. 2:25 "correcting his opponents with gentleness. God may perhaps grant them repentance leading to a knowledge of truth..."

² And repentance and forgiveness of sins will be preached in his name to all nations, beginning at Jerusalem (Luke 24:47). In the past God overlooked such ignorance, but now he commands all people everywhere to repent (Acts 17:30).

³ When he comes, he will convict the world of guilt in regard to sin and

righteousness and judgment (John 16:8).

⁴ For they themselves report what kind of reception you gave us. They tell how you turned to God from idols to serve the living and true God (1

- ⁵ For we are God's workmanship, created in Christ Jesus to do good works, which God prepared in advance for us to do. (Eph. 2:10) We continually remember before our God and Father your work produced by faith, your labor prompted by love, and your endurance inspired by hope in our Lord Jesus Christ. (1 Thess. 1:3)
- 1. The addition of the phrase a gift of God is consistent with Article 10-1, Human Ability and Responsibility, which states, "But by the fall of Adam man lost his ability, apart from God's grace, to will and to do those things necessary for a right relationship with God." Therefore, the act of repentance is not solely the work of man's will but is a gift of God's grace. In addition to the footnoted Scriptures, 2 Timothy 2:25 says, "Those who oppose him he must gently instruct, in the hope that God will grant them repentance leading them to a knowledge of the truth..."
- 2. Loving, obedient service as a result of true repentance is consistent with Article 11-1, Election, which states that those who are chosen "might be conformed to Christ's image." Loving, obedient service is a mark of conforming to Christ's image. It is also consistent with Article 16-1, Sanctification, which notes that sanctification is a "progressive work" that "conforms the whole man" to Christ's image "as the Word of God is believed and obeyed."

Report of the Study Committee on Women Serving as Deacons

Introduction

In our initial assignment we were to answer the question: "Does the Scripture allow women to serve as deacons?" Our report in 2005 answered this question affirmatively. Likewise the Conference approved that recommendation at first reading. At that time, this committee also cautioned the presentation of new legislation by this comment: "Churches in which the leadership is satisfied that the Bible permits women deacons should be allowed to do so. The study committee wants to emphasize that we think Annual Conference should not require the practice of using women in the role of deacon. However, the committee encourages that the door be open to this biblical practice."

In that light, our assignment by the 122nd and 123rd Annual Conferences was to define "minister" more precisely with the intent of providing "legislation covering the entire Article 204."¹

Whereas, the 122nd Annual Conference approved equating "minister" and "pastor"; and

Whereas, the Study Committee on Women Serving as Deacons has been asked to clarify the use of the term "minister" in the Faith & Order (see page 33 and 34 of the 2005 Yearbook); and

Whereas, the Scripture teaches that only males shall serve as elders (whether teaching or ruling elders); and

Whereas, the issue of women serving as deacons is distinct from defining "minister" more clearly; and

Whereas, the Study Committee has not completed the work defining "minister" more precisely with the intent of providing "legislation covering the entire Article 204" (p. 34, 2005 Yearbook); and

Whereas, the 122nd Annual Conference approved recommendation #1 at First Reading; therefore be it

Before presenting the proposed legislation, the following material is presented in anticipation of the fear that underlies much of these discussions: Is allowing women to be deacons the first step in the "slippery slope" for allowing women to be elders? The core concept around which most of the material culminates is this sentence: "Moreover, though the English word deacon has roots in the Greek word for ministry or minister 2, this etymological connection gives no basis for women being elders." (Proposed in section 204-2.2) Although an attempt has been made to clarify and change terminology, the title "minister" has been kept as an appropriate title for the elder who holds that position.

So, what is in this massive report?

- 1. An explanation of the theological flow of the rewording of the legislation.
- 2. An explanation of using the word "position" instead of "office."
- 3. Biblical evidence for having men only serve as elders.
- 4. The proposed legislation.
 - a. The small, 9-point print is untouched legislation. Sometimes printed in both columns just for clarity sake.
 - b. Left column proposed legislation. The proposed legislation includes newly- proposed changes and second reading changes from this committee PLUS italic paragraphs for second reading from the other study committees.
 - c. Right column present form of the F&O we are proposing to change. Some words are highlighted to signify where the change occurred.

<u>Resolved</u>, that the Committee continue its study of "minister" in the coming year.

Resolved, that we recommend to the Annual Conference approval of recommendations #2 and #3 at First Reading; and further Resolved, that the Committee continue its study of "minister" in the

I. An Explanation of the Flow of the Proposed Legislation.

The 204 section of legislation has been renumbered to reflect a logical/theological flow of thought. Basically it flows like this:

A. Elders

- 1. The authority of the plurality of elder-rule; the work of elders; men only.
- 2. Ministers and Pastoral Staff elders working at the behest of elder board.
 - a. Deacons working under the authority of the elders.
 - **b.** Church Staff hired by the church and working under the authority of the elders.

To explain more fully: our *Article of Faith* 18-3 states well, "The Head of the Church administers the affairs of His body through overseers chosen by Himself and selected by the people..." Hence, the only singular administrative function in the local church belongs to Jesus (1Pet. 5:1,4; Col. 1:18). Yet He engages a plurality of elders to get that work done.

"Even churches that claim to be governed by a plurality of elders have redefined eldership so that its original purpose and noble standing have, in practice, been eclipsed by the ordained pastor and his staff." The study group wanted to clearly avoid this misunderstanding.

Elders of NT churches exercised freedom in assigning specific tasks or areas of responsibility to individuals among the eldership and within the local body. The proposed legislation describes the broader responsibilities of the plurality of elders. Within the local church, some responsibilities are reserved for the elders alone while other ministries are transferable outside the plurality of elders. The idea to let the legislation be outlined in such a fashion that it highlights the theological importance of elder-rule church government seems practical and perspicuous. Among other things, pastors would be seen to serve more clearly at the behest of the elder board. Elder boards would be free to formulate their pastoral staff, church staff, boards and committees according to local ministry needs. Men performing tasks that include responsibilities

reserved for elders would be required to be elders; others would not.

The legislation champions the plurality of elder-rule while at the same time recognizes the position of "minister" in our local churches. Strauch describes the principle "first among equals" when he points out that Peter and John bore no special title or formal distinctions from the other apostles and likewise elders who receive double honor formed no official class or receive no special title. "The advantage of the principle of "first among equals" is that it allows for functional, gift-based diversity within the eldership team without creating an official, superior office over fellow elders." Some changes already in progress in our denomination would be validated by this biblical foundation -- a pastor not having to serve as chairman of the elder board; elders not having to sit on every committee.

The overall result would be that the appreciation of the position of elder would be increased.

II. An Explanation of Using the Word "Position" Instead of "Office."

Throughout the present Faith and Order, the word "office" is used to denote the positions of elder and deacon in the church. We have purposely replaced the word "office" with the word "position" or, "elder" or "deacon" when appropriate.

The primary reason why we replaced the word "office" is because in our present, everyday language the word "office" conveys authority. This is precisely the idea to avoid when talking about the position of deacon - especially in discussions and new legislation regarding women as deacons. The new term avoids any kind of linguistic hints that the position of deacon is more than just a position of service and not of ruling or authority.

Moreover, the terms "office" or "officer" are not used in the New Testament for these positions. Although some English translations include the term "office" in 1 Timothy 3:1 there is not a corresponding word in the Greek text.

III. Biblical Evidence for Having Men Only Serve as Elders.

Why do we believe that the Scripture teaches that only men can hold the position of elder in the church?

- 1. In the list of qualifications for elder in 1 Timothy 3:1-7 there is no corresponding mention made of women's qualifications, as there is in the discussion of qualifications for deacons in 1 Timothy 3:8-13.
- 2. There is no mention of a female elder in the New Testament, unlike the specific mentioning of a female deacon in Romans 16:1.5
- 3. There is a specific prohibition given in Scripture to women teaching and exercising authority over men − 1 Timothy 2:12.

"I do not permit a woman to teach or to have authority over a man; she must be silent." We recognize that there are some disagreements over the interpretation of this passage; specifically, whether it is one command or two. However, whether 1 Timothy 2:12 is viewed as one or two commands, the conclusion of both interpretations remains the same — women should not teach in a way that exercises authority over men. Teaching is really an issue extraneous to our purpose. The question, "Can women teach men?" does not directly relate to our assignment. But, the verse clearly excludes women as elders because eldership requires "exercising authority" in the church.

Teaching is an issue because it MAY infringe upon exercising authority. Moreover, previous committees which have studied this subject have concluded the same in 1977^6 and 2001^7 .

Again, we recognize the different exegetical approaches to the verse but all come to same conclusion: women are excluded from the position of elder yet are allowed to teach in some capacity which does not exercise authority in the church (nor gives the impression that a woman is vying for a position of leadership in the church). How this teaching is worked out culturally in each church is a question outside of the realm of this report.

Moreover, the concepts of "quietness" and "silence" enjoined on women in the New Testament strongly correlate to the concept

same time taken a position that disqualified women from holding the office of elder and from the office of pastor-teacher.

"... Perhaps one of the most difficult areas in which to apply the principle [of subordination] is in the area of teaching. That women are disallowed from those areas of teaching that are considered authoritative is clear from Scripture, but we also recognize that there is a non-authoritative kind of teaching from which they are not excluded.

"In seeking to apply the biblical principle to actual situations within the church it is helpful to keep in mind that: (1) the work of an elder belongs to men, and (2) the Scriptures know only two specific classes with respect to ecclesiastical authority — elders and non-elders. That is, all members of the church fall into one of two categories: elders and non-elders. Women have the same possibilities to function in the life of the church in those areas that are allowable to non-elder men."

7 "The remark about not permitting a woman to teach is not to be taken absolutely, but as qualified by the object "a man," which it shares with the following verb. Elsewhere, older women are clearly instructed to teach younger women (Titus 2:3-5), and mothers to teach children (Prov 1:8; 31:1; 2 Tim 1:5; 3:15). There will be differences of opinion among Christians about when a boy becomes a man, and this will probably vary from culture to culture. Given that the word is used in tandem with the neutral verb "to teach" in our context, there is no reason to think that it should be limited to the negative idea of "domineer" here. Particularly when the Scripture teaches that Christian leaders are not to domineer over their followers, but they are certainly to teach. 4. From Old Testament precedents of male leadership in the home, community and spiritual life to practices of the synagogue in the first century, women were not promoted to positions of spiritual authority. Furthermore, until the last century no women were accepted as elders or pastors in the local church. Church history confirms that the saints throughout the ages have come to the same

"Ouietness," the second word which needs elaboration, is sometimes translated as "silence." However, the Greek word in 1Timothy is not the same word as the word for "silence" in 1Cor. 14:33. The word for silence in 1Cor. 14 (sigao)[σιγατωσαν] is the common word for making no sound. Hesychia [ησυχια], the word in 1Tim 2:11-12 (the same word found in I Pt 3:4) is often translated "calmness," "peacefulness," or "quietness."(8) In some passages in the New Testament (e.g., Acts 22:2), hesychia refers to a process of ceasing to make objections or ceasing to be contentious. The word "quietness" in these passages, then, refers to a condition that would be characteristic of those who are taught and who receive what is being said. In 1Thes. 4:11, the word is used to denote the quality of being concerned with one's own affairs and of not trying to handle something that is outside the scope of one's responsibility. "Quietness" in 1 Timothy, then, probably refers to a disposition that is ready for learning and is receptive to direction hesychia is closely related to subordination and could well be a word for the state or personal bearing that corresponds to genuine subordination or submissiveness-that is, a state of peace, trust, and receptivity. Refusal or a disinclination to accept teaching or direction is the opposite of hesychia. The term does not necessarily mean refraining from all speech in public situations or in assemblies of the community, but it would mean refraining from speech which would be directive or involve teaching.

"The difficulty in applying the passage does not arise from an unclarity in the meaning of the passage, but from the difference between the approach to teaching taken by the modern church (and the modern world) and the approach of the early Christians. Teaching today is less a way of exercising authority in a relationship, and more an indoctrination or a transfer of information. Therefore, it is difficult to understand in many situations which contemporary teaching would qualify as the kind of teaching the passage is concerned with." - Man and Woman in Christ: An Examination of the Roles of Men and Women in Light of Scripture and the Social Sciences. IV. The Proposed Legislation.

- Whereas, the 122nd Annual Conference (2005) approved the possibility of women serving as deacons at first reading (2005 Yearbook, p. 34); and
 - Whereas, the Conference asked that study be made of the Principles of Order "to provide legislation covering the entire Article 204 making clear distinction between the qualifications for the offices of elders and deacons and a clarification of the word "minister" (2005 Yearbook, p. 34); and
 - Whereas, in doing that work the Committee identified other needed changes in Sections 201, 202, 204, 401-1, 401-2; therefore be it
 - **Resolved**, that "officers" and "church officers" be changed to "elders" in sections 201-5 and 201-6 as a First Reading revision to the *Faith & Order*.
- 2. <u>Resolved</u>, that "pastor" be changed to "elders" in section 203-3.2 (5) as a First Reading revision to the *Faith & Order*.

⁹ "In fact, women have done almost everything men have, and have done it just as well. The significant exception to that generalization is that, until the very recent past, the "office" of teaching and of the sacramental ministry, with the jurisdictional powers this implies, has been reserved for men. Of course, there have been historical anomalies, and there have been sects and peripheral groups that accepted women preachers who may also have offered the Eucharist. Yet, in its broad central tradition and practice, the church—East and West and in a multiplicity of cultural and social settings—has consistently maintained that to men alone is it given to be pastors and sacramental ministers.

- 4. **Resolved**, that the new Article 204-1 Elders, 204-1.2, 204-1.3, and 204-1.4 be adopted as a First Reading revision to the *Faith & Order*.
- 5. **Resolved**, that word "office" be changed to "position" in Article 204-1.6 as a First Reading revision to the *Faith & Order*.
- 6. **Resolved**, that the new Article 204-2.1 and Article-204-2.2 be adopted as a First Reading to the *Faith & Order* to replace the former Article 204-1.1 through 204-1.3.
- 7. **Resolved**, that Article 204-4.1 and 204-4.3 be adopted as a First Reading revision to the *Faith & Order* at second reading with additional word changes for "office" to become "position".
- 8. **Resolved**, that the new Article 204-4.2 and Article 204-4.3 be adopted as a First Reading addition to the *Faith & Order*.
- 9. **Resolved**, that "lay elder" be changed simply to "elder", that "office" be changed to "position", and "exercise" be changed to "hold" in Articles 401-1.1, 401-1.8 and 401-1.9 to be adopted as a First Reading revision to the *Faith & Order*.
- 10. **Resolved**, that changes listed under #2, pg. 195 of the 2006 Yearbook for Article 401-2 be approved at Second Reading.
- 11. **Resolved**, that "office" be changed to "position" and "exercise" be changed to "hold" in 401-2 as a First Reading revision to the *Faith & Order*.
- 12. **Resolved**, that "office" be changed to "position" in 404 as a First Reading revision to the *Faith & Order*.

Report of the Study Committee on Credentials and Multi Staff Churches

The Study Committee on Credentials and Multi-staff Churches brings the following legislation to Annual Conference:

SECOND READING

Resolved, that the following be adopted as Second Reading for inclusion into the *Faith and Order:*

401-1.1

The Board of Elders shall be composed of the pastoral staff and all of the active lay elders of the congregation. The active lay elders shall designate at least one individual of the pastoral staff as a voting member of the Board of Elders, and shall designate others of the pastoral staff as either voting or non-voting members. The lay elders shall be elected by majority vote of the congregation. They shall be mature men who meet the qualifications of Scripture (I Timothy 3; Titus 1; I Peter 5). If the congregation has more qualified elders than are needed to serve at one time, the number of active elders shall be determined by the congregation by ballot vote upon recommendation of the Board of Elders.

Note:

The **bold - italicized** above replaces — "The Board of Elders shall be composed of the minister and all of the active elders of the congregation......

401-1.2

The Board of Elders shall elect one of its members to serve as chairman, and one of its members to serve as secretary. Two thirds of the membership of the board shall constitute a quorum.

Note:

The **bold-italicized** above replaces — "The minister shall serve as chairman of the Board of Elders; the board shall elect one of its members to serve as secretary....."

A motion was made and approved by this committee to suspend its work until the BFC reorganization is determined.

- Whereas, the Strategic Planning Committee is proposing major organizational changes to the BFC structure, and
- Whereas, the Board of Directors is proposing a steering committee to work on organizational changes, and
- Whereas, the steering committee will likely vitiate the work of the Multi-Staff Committee, therefore be it,
- **Resolved**, that the Study Committee on Credentials and Multi-staff Churches suspend its work until the BFC reorganization is determined.
