Past. Present. Future. All three tenses were in abundance at the 127th Bible Fellowship Conference, held April 26-27, 2010 at Pinebrook Bible Conference.

Right from the start, conference moderator Randall Grossman, in a message entitled "The Unity of the Bible Fellowship Church," highlighted our place as part of the great tree of Christianity that finds its roots and life in Jesus Christ.

"We're a branch, a twig...part of a great tree," Grossman noted, using Hebrews 12:1-2 to accent our connectedness to other branches within Christendom. "We're all connected. We're all related," he said.

That connectedness, he added, is of great benefit because it ties the BFC to many centuries of forbears. "We really do stand on the shoulders of those who have gone before us," Grossman said.

Our past came out in many ways throughout the two-day conference.

It came out in poignant remembrances of faithful saints John Dunn and Robert W. Smock, longtime BFC pastors who went home to be with the Lord since last year's conference.

David A. Thomann, who succeeded Dunn as pastor in Lancaster in 1980, noted his introduction to a little man who would become a dear friend. "You need to know your people," Dunn told Thomann upon his arrival in Lancaster. "You need to be here and get to know your people.

"He was just a good friend who loved his people," Thomann concluded.

Daniel P. Allen, giving praise for Smock's ministry, noted there were times when they held differing opinions while both served at the Ephrata church. Smock, he said, was often dogmatic in the things he held dearly. At the same time, however, he was a selfless servant. "He would go the extra mile," Allen said. "There was no question that he would take the shirt off his back and give it to you."

The past and present intersected on Tuesday during R.C. Reichenbach's time at the microphone. Our brother Reichenbach regularly gives the report of our Beneficiary Society; this year, during a discussion of some changes implemented within the Society, Reichenbach and pastor John H. Riggall got into a goodnatured and somewhat humorous tete-a-tete between 90-year-olds that raised chuckles through the bar.

The present was also a central focus as David T. Allen was approved as BFC Executive Director and was installed during Monday's evening session. Allen sees his new position as one who "guides, coaches and comes alongside you to get done what we're called to do." He said he seeks to instill "a culture of excellence" among the various departments and ministries of the BFC.

While the introduction of a new Executive Director gives an inkling of both the present and the BFC's immediate future, Monday evening's introduction of visiting missionaries and ordination service provided another sense of both tenses.

The BFC has long maintained a strong support base for missions both within the United States and across the globe. Dana Weller, Director of the BFC Board of Missions, noted that the BFC currently supports 170 missionaries in 34 nations.

Several of those missionaries were on hand Monday night to be welcomed by pastors and delegates. Included in that group were Carrie Ziegenfuss and Becky Masessa, two young ladies from our Ebenezer/Bethlehem church who will leave for Tanzania in a few months as the next team in the BFC's burgeoning Tanzania Project. Pastors and delegates got a video update on Tuesday morning, with current BFC missionaries John & Nancy LoRusso taking key roles on screen.

Monday night's service of ordination saw Conference welcome Mark R. Evans and Joshua P. Miller as newly-ordained men while recognizing the previous ordination of Carlos G. Rodriguez. All three men are already serving BFC churches, with Evans at Calvary BFC, Coopersburg, Miller at Grace BFC, Quakertown, and Rodriguez at La *Roca de Reading*.

In his testimony, Evans offered thanks for a long list of people who have played key roles in his life. "God has been very good to me," he concluded.

Miller emphasized God's grace in his life, describing himself as a "wretch" by nature who was saved and called to ministry. "I got His righteousness, and I will be singing His praise for all eternity," he said.

Rodriguez, who grew up in Guadalajara, Mexico, gave praise for his "new friends" in the Bible Fellowship Church. "I really thank the Lord for how He connected me with the Bible Fellowship Church," he explained. "It has been a great adventure of faith."

Keith Plows offered the challenge to the three ordinands from 2 Timothy 2, applying the metaphors of the soldier, the athlete, the farmer, the worker, the vessel and the servant to pastoral ministry. "Someday we'll be evaluated for the job we're doing – by the Lord Himself," he stressed.

Rodriguez, by the way, also factored into a first-time event for BFC Conference. For the first time in our long history, BFC Conference was "live-streamed," allowing interested parties from around the globe to get a look-in at our conference happenings. Rodriguez' mother watched from Mexico during the Ordination service while Colby Weinhofer, one of our missionaries, e-mailed to let us know he was watching conference from Japan.

Monday's activities always include the introduction of first-time Conference participants. This year, included in that number were Dave Smith and Ed Suthers from Grace Fellowship Church in Harrisburg, which is pursuing a connection with the BFC.

"We are real excited about finding the BFC," Suthers said. "We're thankful to be introduced to the BFC, and we're really excited to be here."

While Tuesday brought its fair share of reports and discussion, the morning address by Bob Sloan, "The Uniqueness of the Bible Fellowship Church," stood as a definite highlight and a perfect bookend to Randy Grossman's opening sermon.

Sloan deftly tied together our past, present and future, noting that the BFC's uniqueness is found in a combination of factors, including its doctrine, its unity, its leaders and the path it has taken during its 150-plus year history.

And now, the future awaits as God leads, with a new denominational structure, new church connections and new missions opportunities.

"We are developing a new focus," Sloan noted. "I can't wait to see what it becomes, because we aren't there yet, but we are on that road.

"We should never leave anything undone that God gives us to do," he added. "Our ultimate goal is to make disciples of Jesus Christ, and unity is at the core of it all."

In Memoriam: JOHN DUNN, JR. July 18, 1914 - May 20, 2009

"And we know that all things work together for good to them that love God, to them who are called according to his purpose." Romans 8:28. This was the life verse of John Dunn and he claimed this truth throughout his life.

Born in Philadelphia, he was the son of Ida Ebbeke and John Dunn, Sr. When he was seven, he heard former prisoner Anthony Zeoli speak and he accepted Christ as his savior that night. He was baptized in the



Delaware River at the age of nine and then at the age of 16 he received his call to preach. Pastor J. B. Henry and the Gospel Heralds had a profound spiritual influence on him at this time.

After working in a music store for several years, he joined the Gospel Heralds at the age of 21 and was assigned to Elizabeth, N.J. Later he was assigned to Brooklyn, Roxborough and Trenton. It was at a Sunday School picnic in Trenton, in 1943, that he met Cordelia (Dell) Phillips Banham. A courtship began and they were married in April of 1944.

In 1949 he was assigned to Philadelphia Emmanuel and while serving there, a parsonage was purchased and a new church building was built. A few years later he became pastor at Walnutport, and then in 1961, he returned to Philadelphia Emmanuel.

In 1967 he was assigned to Lancaster. Under his leadership, the membership of this young church grew to 131, with an average Sunday School attendance of 213. He also began a bus ministry to reach area children. During this time a new sanctuary was built, seating 360, and the old building was renovated for Christian Education ministries. On September 30, 1979, Pastor Dunn retired, but a year later he was called to serve as Pastor of Visitation of the Lancaster congregation. He held this position until October of 1987 when he and Dell moved to the Park of the Palms, in Keystone Park, FL. There, even in retirement he continued to minister to others in a variety of ways until the Lord called him home.

In November of 1978, Pastor Dunn was diagnosed with

melonoma and six months later cancerous lymph nodes were removed. When told that his cancer was terminal, he claimed this development as one of the "all things" in his life verse. Bathed in prayer, he remained cancer free the remainder of his life.

Pastor Dunn loved people and he lovingly ministered to them. He loved his Lord and faithfully served Him throughout his life. He loved his wife and his family. He enjoyed sports, games, and gardening. Members at Lancaster still remember the large garden he had and how every year his abundance of cantaloupes was shared with the congregation after an evening service. His quiet impact on many lives is his special legacy.

He is survived by two sons, Jack David Dunn, of Woolrich, N. J., Paul Owen Dunn (Sandra), of New Port Beach, Calif.; five grandchildren and five great grandchildren. His dear wife, Dell, preceded him in death on January 22, 2006.

In Memoriam: ROBERT W. SMOCK October 17, 1928 - November 4, 2010

"For me to live is Christ and to die is gain." Philippians 1:21. Robert W. Smock not only claimed this as his life verse but demonstrated this desire as he served in the ministry of the Mennonite Brethren In Christ and Bible Fellowship Churches for over 63 years.

Born in Bethlehem, he was the son of the late Ida (Hofford) and Walter Smock, Sr. He was the first baby placed on the Cradle Roll of Ebenezer MBC Church in Bethlehem. At the age of eleven he felt the call of God to go into the pastoral ministry and he became a member of the Gospel Herald Society at the age



of seventeen. He was licensed to preach in 1950 and ordained to the Christian ministry in 1953.

His first assignment was Trenton, NJ where he was mentored by Pastor John Dunn. Later he was sent to Binghamton, NY. He served there until he was granted a leave of absence to further his education. Two years later he was reassigned to Trenton.

On November 11, 1949 he was married to Thelma Wolf, daughter of Pastor and Mrs. N. H. Wolf. Together they served as a team in Trenton, Terre Hill, Easton, and then Ephrata, where he became the founding pastor of the Ephrata BFC. Later he moved to Royersford where he served for twelve years before returning to Ephrata to serve as Pastor of Visitation.

Pastor Smock was educated at the Bible Institute of Pennsylvania and was graduated from Philadelphia College of the Bible (B.S.) and the Evangelical School of Theology (M.Div.).

He had a special heart for children and youth ministries and was well known for conducting large rally type daily vacation Bible schools which reached thousands of children. He also developed a large bus ministry and started a Christian school while he served in Ephrata. In addition, he was a member of the board of West-Mont Christian Academy, in Pottstown, where he also served as an administrator and as a Bible and spelling teacher.

Pastor Smock was very active in the Bible Fellowship Conference. Among the many boards on which he served were the Church Extension Board, the Board of the BFC Homes, and the Board of Publications (Fellowship News). At Annual Conference, he assisted the secretaries with tasks such as proof reading.

Former friends and members remember his caring visits and the warm hospitality of the Smocks. Some have described him as a "very caring, dedicated pastor who put others first", as one who "loved to share the Gospel with those who crossed his path" and as one who "selflessly dedicated himself to the work of his Lord."

He loved to travel, but his favorite hobby was playing Scrabble. He readily took on all challengers and those who attend Pinebrook remember the tournaments and games that were always taking place outside of his room.

In addition to his wife, Thelma, he is survived by four children: David, Sharon Mertz, James and Andrew; ten grandchildren and seven great grandchildren. He is also survived by a brother, Walter Jr. (Aurelia).

The pension payment to which this rental/housing allowance applies shall be the pension payment resulting from all service of such retired or disabled, ordained or licensed ministers from all employment by any local church, BFC Conference or institution of The Bible Fellowship Church or of any former denomination that is now a part of The Bible Fellowship Church, or from any other employer who employed the minister to perform services related to the ministry and who elected to make contributions to the pension funds of The Bible Fellowship Church for such retired minister's pension.

Note: The rental/housing allowance which may be excluded from a minister's gross income is limited to the lesser of (1) the amount of the rental/housing allowance designated by the minister's employer or other appropriate body, (2) the amount actually expended by the minister to provide his or her housing, or (3) the legally-determined fair rental value of the parsonage or other housing provided. As specified in Rev. Rul. 71-290 C.B. 92, "the only amount that will qualify for exclusion under section 107(2) of the Code as a 'rental allowance' is an amount equal to the fair rental value of the home, including furnishings and appurtenances such as a garage, plus the cost of utilities."

<u>Resolved</u>, that the third paragraph under Membership be moved and modified to be the second paragraph under Dues, and the modified paragraph would read:

"Ministers receiving Ministers' Retirement Fund benefits, ministers on disability, and ministers under the Ministers' Annuity Fund who have retired at age 65 or later are members of the Society but are exempt from dues. Members who continue on active service are exempt from dues after **they have paid dues for forty years**. **Ministers** over age 65 who choose to continue to serve as pastors or under ministries of the BFC must pay dues until they reach the age of 72 or have paid dues for forty years. Ministers who retire before age 65 are required to pay dues until age 65."

- **<u>Resolved</u>**, that the second sentence under first paragraph of Dues be removed since it was modified and is now included in the second paragraph.
- **<u>Resolved</u>**, that the following be added between the second and third sentences of the paragraph under Benefits:

"If a pastor-member of the Beneficiary Society is called home to be with the Lord, his children are covered until their nineteenth birthday. The coverage of a pastormember's wife shall continue after the death of her husband until her death or remarriage. Wives of ministers who were retired and receiving benefits under the MRF or MAF at the time of marriage shall not qualify for death benefits."

<u>Resolved</u>, that the following be deleted from the last paragraph under Miscellaneous Rules which now reads:

"Each probationer/ordained man upon re-entering the membership of the Society must pay an equal amount of money equivalent to the number of years he was licensed up to the present year. This amount will be the total amount that was to be paid for the years that he was not a paying member of the Society." [ONE READING]

<u>Report of the Ministerial Convention Committee</u> (see page 154) **<u>Resolved</u>**, that the report be accepted.

Whereas, the Ministerial Convention Committee sees it necessary to add one additional member to the committee to

<u>Report of the Study Committee on the Kingdom</u> (see page 156) <u>Resolved</u>, that the report be accepted.

<u>Resolved</u>, that Article 403-1 be amended to read as follows and adopted as First Reading:

"The Board of Elders shall appoint the chairman of the congregational meeting."

[FIRST READING]

- <u>Whereas</u>, the recommended minimum salary for a pastor serving in the BFC was set at \$33,000 at the 2009 Annual Conference, and,
- <u>Whereas</u>, the MRC recognizes the difficult financial challenges facing many of our congregations during the present economic climate of our nation, now therefore be it,
- **<u>Resolved</u>**, that as of our 2010 BFC Conference, our particular churches be advised to maintain no less than the current recommended minimum salary of \$33,000 while striving to give appropriate increases as finances may warrant, and further,
- **<u>Resolved</u>**, that in addition to his salary, the church must provide half of the pastor's Social Security tax, parsonage and/or housing allowance (which would include utilities, repair costs, etc.), health insurance, and provision should be made for reimbursement for allowable car and professional expenses. The church must also contribute a minimum of 3% of the pastor's salary for retirement to the ministers annuity fund, plus an additional 1% match if the pastor is voluntarily contributing 1%.

<u>Resolved</u>, that Ronald C. Mahurin be ratified as Conference Pastor for another three-year term of service.

Proposed Changes to Article 512-11.2(8)

<u>Resolved</u>, that the following amendment be adopted as first reading:

- <u>Whereas</u>, Article 512-11.2(8) instructs the Credentials Committee to notify the Board of Directors of the dates of pastors retiring, and
- <u>Whereas</u>, the Board of Directors has been replaced by the Executive Board, and
- Whereas, the President of the Executive Board has indicated it is not necessary to notify them of a retirement date, and
- <u>Whereas</u>, it is necessary to inform the Board of Pensions, Beneficiary Society and the Conference Pastor of the effective date of a pastor seeking retirement, therefore be it **Resolved**, that we adopt the following change as first reading:

512-11.2(8) It shall receive all requests from those seeking retirement from ministry in the *BFC*. It shall set the effective date of the retirement, change the status of the minister on the conference records, and notify the *Board of Pensions, the Beneficiary Society and the Conference Pastor* of the effective date of retirement.

[FIRST READING]

<u>Whereas</u>, the *Faith and Order* makes no statement regarding Ministers and divorce; and

Whereas, it needs such a statement; and

<u>Whereas</u>, the New Testament usage of the term "elder' is reflected in the F&O §204 by declaring "Elders" (ruling elders or lay elders) and "Ministers" (teaching elders, pastors) are subdivisions of the same positions; and

Whereas, BFC Conference has approved allowing "Elders" to

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serve despite a divorce provided certain issues have been biblically resolved; and

- <u>Whereas</u>, request was made for Biblical evidence showing moral and spiritual qualifications for "Ministers" to be different from the moral and spiritual qualifications for "Elders" and
- <u>Whereas</u>, the study reported that Scripture makes no such distinction (*Yearbook* 2006, p. 43); therefore be it
- **<u>Resolved</u>**, that we approve the following for the *F&O* §204-2.3 (6):

(6) "Because of the qualifications and dignity of the position of minister, when considering a man for ordination, the Ministerial Candidate and the Credentials Committees shall give careful consideration to ensure that a man who has been divorced or who has married a divorced woman has Biblically resolved the issues in family, the church, and community raised by the divorce, demonstrated since the divorce stability of character and is presently characterized as above reproach, and if married, faithful to and exclusively committed to his wife."

[FIRST READING]

Yes - 112; No - 41

And further

<u>Resolved</u>, that we approve the following addition (bold type is the only addition) to the F&O §204-1.6: "Because of the qualifications and dignity of the position of elder, **including minister**, each Particular Church shall give careful consideration to ensure that a man who has been divorced or who has married a divorced woman has Biblically resolved the issues in family, the church, and community and is presently characterized as above reproach, and if married, faithful to and exclusively committed to his wife." [FIRST READING]





Report of the Committee on Credentials

The Committee on Credentials held two meetings during the year in the performance of its duties.

The *Faith and Order* questionnaire was sent to each of the ministers holding Ordination Credentials with the BFC.

Rodriguez respectively, and that they be encouraged to invite the Credentials Committee to send representation to be present at the service.
- 4. Request from BFC Conference

The Credentials Committee has been charged by the BFC Conference to write legislation to be included in the F&O to address the following from page 37 in the 2009 yearbook:

- Whereas, the Bible Fellowship Church has never permitted a man who is divorced or is married to a divorced woman to serve in the office of pastor, and
- Whereas, the *Faith & Order* currently has no statement that directly addresses this issue, therefore be it
- **Resolved**, that the Ministerial Candidate Committee and the Credentials Committee be instructed to continue to apply our historic policy of not permitting a man who is divorced or is married to a divorced woman to serve in the office of pastor in a Bible Fellowship Church, and further
- **Resolved**, that we assign the Credentials Committee to study ways to address this issue in the *Faith & Order* and report to the next BFC Conference.

<u>Resolved</u> that the following be our answer to the BFC Conference:

- <u>Whereas</u>, a man seeking credentials with the BFC has asked the Credentials Committee our position on ministers and the issue of divorce, and
- <u>Whereas</u>, the *F*&O does not currently address the issue of ministers and divorce, and
- <u>Whereas</u>, the Credentials Committee has been given the assignment of reconciling the F & O with our historic position of not allowing a man who is divorced or is married to a divorced woman to serve as a minister in the BFC, therefore be it

<u>Resolved</u>, that the following legislation be adopted at first reading:

204-2.3 The Qualifications for the Ministry, Personal Qualifications (6) be added to read:

(6) Because the ministry is a calling of both dignity and usefulness and because this is a divine calling that makes high and holy demands on those who aspire to this work, therefore a man who has been divorced or is married to a divorced woman is not permitted to serve as a minister in the Bible Fellowship Church.

5. Proposed Changes to Article 512-11.2(8)

504-2. Advisory Members. Advisory members of BFC Conference shall not be included in the call of the roll. They shall not participate in the deliberations of the session except by permission of the Moderator.

Advisory members of BFC Conference shall include:

(1) ordained ministers working in other Christian ministries.

(2) ordained ministers on leave of absence.

(3) probationers who have not been licensed.

(4) missionaries who hold membership in one of the churches and are under the supervision of the Board of Missions.

Report of the Ministerial Candidate Committee

Since May, 2009, the Ministerial Candidate Committee met eight times to carry out its responsibilities.

The Committee has been following a new procedure which has been working well and serves to expedite the process of approval. When a man applies, he begins by filling out the questionnaires which are found at the denominational website. Following the submission of the questionnaires, he meets with a member of the Committee for a preliminary interview. If it is determined that he should proceed, the applicant completes an open book theology exam. If the open book examination is approved, he is then given an oral examination on the Articles of Faith. This important examination serves two purposes: first, it requires that men who serve with us know the Articles of Faith.: second, it allows the Committee to determine if the candidate endorses them. At the completion of the examination on the Articles of Faith, the candidate is approved as a probationer eligible to receive a call. When a man receives a call, he is licensed and begins his two year probationary service (one year if previously ordained). At the completion of his probationary service, the probationer is referred to the Committee on Credentials for final approval and recommendation to the BFC Conference.

The following men have been recommended during the year for ordination examination: Carlos Rodriguez, Joshua Miller and Mark Evans.

The following men were licensed: James Arcieri, Mark Bickel, and Matthew Lynskey.

The following men were approved as probationers eligible to receive a call: Richard Bickings, Miguel Gonzalez, Matthew Lynskey, Richard Jensen, Edwin Suthers, Philip Meyer and Justin Hunter.



Report of the BFC Executive Board

The Executive Board of the Bible Fellowship Church began to serve the BFC immediately following the 126th Annual Conference. The President and Chairman of the Board, Randall A. Grossman, accepted the challenge to organize the Executive Board (ExecBrd) into a working board with the goal of streamlining and administrating the BFC. Robert A. Sloan, Jr. was elected Vice President, Jay H. Fasnacht as Treasurer, and David T. Allen was elected as Secretary. There were several issues that needed immediate attention.

One of the first things that came to us was that the Board of Victory Valley Camp had made a change in directors and the ExecBrd provided leadership in a peaceful resolution of that situation. The ExecBrd directed the Board of VVC to extend parts of the terms of separation for the previous director, Scott Ott, until the end of 2009, and the ExecBrd compensated Scott for services rendered at Pinebrook Bible Conference. In order to provide for the 2009 camping season, an interim director, Douglas J. Manwiller, was named (at the recommendation of the VVC Board) until the ExecBrd had an opportunity to further evaluate the situation. Subsequent to those initial resolutions the ExecBrd decided to extend to the interim director, Douglas J. Manwiller, a contract as Director in consultation with the VVC Board. The ExecBrd continues to meet regularly with the leadership of the camp and monitors their status and financial situation monthly.

Pinebrook Bible Conference also needed attention. Finances had been a concern and the ExecBrd took action to assist them in this regards. Besides closely monitoring their financial situation, the ExecBrd helped facilitate the acquisition of some much needed cash. As a result of the generosity of Bible Fellowship Church Homes, a land purchase was concluded that turned over 7.70 acres of undeveloped land for a price of \$125,000 from the BFC (owners of Pinebrook Bible Conference) to Bible Fellowship Church Homes, Inc. The expenses of the sale of the land at Pinebrook Bible

Conference to BFC Homes were paid out of the proceeds of the sale and the remainder of the proceeds was given to Pinebrook Bible Conference. The addition of summer retreats between the BFC weeks has helped Pinebrook resolve some of its financial shortfalls. The ExecBrd monitors the finances of Pinebrook on a monthly basis and is pleased with the progress that has been made.

In order to assist the ExecBrd in fulfilling its many functions, several individuals and firms filled important internal and external positions for the ExecBrd. In addition, several others who were already serving in other BFC Departments were asked to work alongside of the ExecBrd.

Internally:

- <u>Charles A. Lavigna</u> as Financial Secretary, was appointed as the Health Insurance Coordinator and caretaker of the BFC Health Insurance Fund and process.
- <u>Stephen J. Kauffman and Robert T. Evans</u> became the members of the Communication Team.
- Randall A. Grossman and Robert A. Sloan, Jr. were the Board contacts for the directors of the departments until the appointment of an Executive Director.
- David T. Allen, Dennis M. Cahill, Jay H. Fasnacht, and Charles <u>A. Lavigna</u> continued to serve as the Finance Committee for the ExecBrd.
- L. James Roberts, Stephen J. Kauffman, and Robert H. Zentz served as the Personnel Committee tasked with searching for an Executive Director.
- Robert T. Evans, David T Allen, Robert A. Sloan, Jr., and David A. Thomann began to work with the committees of Pinebrook Bible Conference and Victory Valley to improve understanding of their financial condition, evaluate the significance of this understanding, and also evaluate and bring back to the ExecBrd a recommendation concerning the role of camping ministry within the BFC.
- <u>Don Kuntzman</u>, serving with the Board of Missions, was appointed as Accountant, and given the responsibility to collect monies, make deposits, and pay bills on behalf of the

ExecBrd, under the direction of the ExecBrd Treasurer and Financial Secretary.

<u>Lisa Christensen</u>, serving with Church Extension, was appointed as interim office secretary for the ExecBrd.

Externally:

- David Ross and the American Insurance Group were retained as Health Insurance Administrators for the Bible Fellowship Church.
- The firm of <u>Fitzpatrick</u>, <u>Lentz</u>, and <u>Bubba</u> was retained as our legal representatives.
- Brotherhood Mutual Insurance Company was retained as the preferred church liability insurers.
- <u>American Bank of the Lehigh Valley</u> has become the depository of the conference funds.

As the Board began to function it was noted that there was a piece of legislation that needed clarification. One of the department directors questioned the ExecBrd as to the meaning of the newly passed legislation (512-1.1). The phrase in question is 512-1.1 (4) – "The director of each department shall serve as a non-voting member." This seemingly contradicted the wording of 512-1.1 (1) which stated "The BFC ExecBrd shall have thirteen members …" The inclusion of the department directors would make the ExecBrd a seventeen member board. The ExecBrd determined that the department directors will not need to attend every ExecBrd meeting, but would do so when requested by the Board or if they have a specific desire to meet with the Board. The ExecBrd determined to invite one department director to each meeting and use that time to concentrate on that department.

Part of the work of the ExecBrd was to deal with the legal matters for the BFC. After several years of efforts, Carl C. Cassel reported that the Scranton Church dissolution was completed. Also, the IRS listing of 501(c)3 organizations will soon include the Bible Fellowship Church as a legitimate tax deductible organization. It had been missed in the past by the IRS who recognized their error, but indicated that it will still take several more months before the

IRS updates its listings. A work in progress is that the copyright for the official BFC logo is almost complete.

At each ExecBrd meeting a financial report from each of the departments and the ExecBrd was presented and evaluated. Several changes were suggested that would standardize reporting and facilitate a better understanding of our financial condition. The ExecBrd continued to monitor the real estate held by the denomination and was updated monthly on the payments made by the churches for which we hold notes and mortgages. One financial note with implications throughout the BFC is this: when a donor gives a monetary donation for some specific purpose, the church or department must respect that restriction and the moral obligation given by the donor. Any earnings on that donation, however, whether interest, dividends, gains or losses earned on restricted funds, unless also restricted by the donor, can be used by the church or the department for purposes that the church or department may determine. The ExecBrd continues to strive for excellence and integrity in our financial responsibilities and accountability.

Bringing together all of the administrative budgets and responsibilities of the denomination into one 'assessment' has been a major emphasis of the ExecBrd this year. The ongoing commitment to our retired pastors or their widows requires an amount of money that needs to be paid by the denomination. In the past this was done with an amount due from each church as a church fee and a per member fee. The BFC Administrative Budget also provided a sum almost equal to the amount given by the churches. These were combined, along with the Fellowship News, Administrative Budget and other obligations, into one single assessment based on the reported amount of assessable income by each church. For the year 2010, the Annual Conference determined that two percent of a church's assessable income would be required to meet all of these obligations. The ExecBrd has been working with this amount and has monitored and made adjustments so that all of our obligations can be paid on time.

One goal of the ExecBrd for the year was to find an Executive Director to serve the BFC and present his name to the 127th Conference for ratification. After consideration of several candidates

the Personnel Committee presented David T. Allen as their choice. The ExecBrd interviewed him and then resolved to appoint David T. Allen to be the BFC Executive Director for a term of three years subject to the ratification of the BFC Conference and that the ExecBrd hire him as the BFC Executive Director Designate starting January 1, 2010. The implementation of this took place in small steps as the director designate needed to complete some tasks at Cedar Crest Bible Fellowship Church before beginning full time service.

The President of the ExecBrd, Randall A. Grossman, reminded the board of its responsibility to both administrate and provide visionary leadership for the denomination. As a committee of the whole, however, it was apparent that much more work could and should be done, but without a person dedicated to fulfilling those tasks it would not be able to do it all. Although the Executive Director Designate was not able to begin fully serving in January, by the middle of February he was dedicated to serving the denomination. Although BFC Homes will have office space for the ExecBrd and the departments to call home, it will not be ready until sometime in 2011. In the meantime, the Board of Missions has made an office available for the Executive Director to share at its facility on Brookside Road in Allentown, Pa.

The ExecBrd brings the following resolutions for consideration:

The following churches are presently in the process of seeking a pastor, either a senior pastor or additional pastoral staff: Bethlehem, PA., Camden, DE., Coopersburg, PA., Holmes, NY, Las Cruces, NM., Toms River, N.J. and Walnutport, PA.

The ministry of our Conference Pastor, Ronald C. Mahurin, continues to be a great blessing to our ministering brethren. The

committee is grateful for his availability to meet with men to share insights from God's Word and from his own rich experience. His counsel, prayer, guidance, and exhortations have been a source of encouragement to many pastors during this year. We especially enjoy his concerted effort to meet informally with so many of us during Pinebrook's summer conferences.

The committee makes the following recommendations to the 127th BFC Conference:

- 1. <u>Whereas</u>, the recommended minimum salary for a pastor serving in the BFC was set at \$33,000 at the 2009 Annual Conference, and,
 - <u>Whereas</u>, the MRC recognizes the difficult financial challenges facing many of our congregations during the present economic climate of our nation, now therefore be it,
 - **<u>Resolved</u>**, that as of our 2010 BFC Conference, our particular churches be advised to maintain no less than the current recommended minimum salary of \$33,000 while striving to give appropriate increases as finances may warrant, and further,
 - **<u>Resolved</u>**, that in addition to his salary, the church must provide half of the pastor's Social Security tax, parsonage and/or housing allowance (which would include utilities, repair costs, etc.), health insurance, and provision should be made for reimbursement for allowable car and professional expenses. The church must also contribute a minimum of 3% of the pastor's salary for retirement to the ministers annuity fund, plus an additional 1% match if the pastor is voluntarily contributing 1%.

Note:

The above recommendation is considered the minimum. In establishing a fair and equitable salary and benefits package for the minister, consideration should be given to experience, education and the cost of living as per one's location. In some areas, a higher figure would be more equitable.

Additional information for the Pastoral Relations Committee can be found in the newly published booklet, "Guidelines for Pastoral Relations Committees." 2. <u>**Resolved**</u>, that Ronald C. Mahurin be ratified as Conference Pastor for another three-year term of service.



Report of the Conference Pastor

Report of the Board of Church Health

Serving the Particular Churches of the BFC by promoting strong church health continues to be fleshed out in practice. Workable ways to address, come alongside, or respond to churches are being tried. One pastor sought the Committee's counsel and met with them. Several churches were visited by committee members for on-site observation and counsel. Some pastors and elders were contacted for conversational reviews. The Committee met three times and approved its "Plan to Minister" intended to prioritize its attention to churches.

Several churches are undergoing a second Natural Church Development survey to gauge their health progress. Each church is encouraged to check their spiritual health with an NCD survey or similar tool. Funding is available to help any church with this if the expense is prohibitive.

The resignation of Robert C. Kaatz due to time constraints was accepted.

- <u>Whereas</u>, John C. Vandegriff and Clyde D. Bomgardner, Jr., have been trained in mediation services through Peacemakers, and
- <u>Whereas</u>, Conference Pastor Ron Mahurin suggested that these men offer their services to the Church Health Committee and Ministerial Relations Committee, and
- <u>Whereas</u>, the Church Health Committee looks favorably on the work of Peacemakers, therefore be it
- **<u>Resolved</u>**, that we endorse the ministry of Peacemakers and particularly the ministries of John C. Vandegriff and Clyde D. Bomgardner, Jr., and further
- **<u>Resolved</u>**, that we consider them a resource for Church Health Committee ministry in the future when applicable.

Report of the Board of Church Extension

The Church Extension Ministries Committee continues by God's grace to fulfill its vision statement to "effectively and efficiently plant new Bible Fellowship churches, promote and facilitate daughter and regional church planting, and connect with groups seeking affiliation with the BFC. The Committee met three times since last Annual Conference but was able to accomplish a lot between meetings through the work of sub-committees.

David E. Gundrum, Director, Mark L. Morrison, Assistant Director, and Lisa Christensen, Administrative Assistant, continue to form a cohesive team to oversee the work on a daily basis. The Committee affirms the giftedness and faithfulness of these key individuals and gives thanks to God for their commitment. Lisa faces potential back surgery and in her absence former Administrative Assistant, Ruth Richards, will step in on a temporary basis. Carol Z. Snyder provides help on special projects devoted to publications and communications. Raymond R. Bertolet has assumed a part-time ministry position as interim pastor at the Camden, DE, church. He continues to serve with Church Extension Ministries, and along with his wife, Louise, has been focusing his efforts on the Milford, DE, church plant potential. He has established a Bible study and is making key contacts within the community.

The Personnel Committee this year met with each of the church planting pastors to provide encouragement, accountability, and direction. Miguel Gonzalez has been called to serve as a church planter intern with La Roca Mission Church in Reading, PA. Director David Gundrum regularly meets with prospective church planters who are considering opportunities of ministry within the BFC. Pray that the Lord of the harvest would raise up laborers who will serve in our Jerusalems, Judeas, and Samarias, planting churches for the glory of God.

La Roca BFC in Merida, Mexico, is considering its first daughter church. The Harleysville BFC is partnering with La Roca

to provide leadership development and equipping. After much prayer, discussion, and consultation, Church Extension Ministries' time of providing additional oversight and support for the New Community BFC in Brooklyn has been concluded. With impending changes in meeting place availability, Ralph E. Ritter, church planter, is seeking God's direction regarding the future of the ministry at this time. This church has been a faithful presence on Flatbush Avenue for many years.

Grace Fellowship, near Harrisburg, PA, requested affiliation with the BFC and has been received into Church Extension Ministries. Pastor David Smith and Elder Ed Suthers are presently under the care of the Ministerial Candidate Committee. God is blessing the labors of our faithful church planters. Monthly reports from each of our mission churches include evidences of God's provision and blessing. Continue to pray for these men of God who are serving in these young church plants. We remain grateful for Aquila and Priscilla teams who are invaluable to the work. Harry and Sandra Workman assist in Long Neck, DE, and also have been assisting in survey work in Milford, DE. Jason and Joanne Englehart are serving in the La Roca Mission Church in Reading, and Russell and Eleanor Ruch serve in the Hellertown Mission Church. Neil and Lisa Christensen have been commissioned from the Cedar Crest church and are now on site at the El Faro Mission Church in Allentown. The Sinking Spring church provided personnel and resources each week for the summer ministry at the Cape May Mission Church. They provided music and worship, someone to preach, and people resources to reach out to those in the community. Several men have been interviewed who have an interest in serving at the Cape May Mission Church.

The Committee urges churches to consider daughter church planting and regions to consider a joint effort toward this end. Director Gundrum has met with various churches and regions during the past year to guide them in considering this. He is available throughout the year to meet with any pastor, elder board, or region desiring to explore daughter or regional church planting.

The Committee is deeply appreciative of the prayer and financial support of so many churches and individuals. Evangelistic

church planting remains key to the future of the BFC. A monthly prayer guide, "The Extension Call," is available via either email or postal mail. Contact the Church Extension Ministries office to receive an individual copy or multiple copies for your church. And please continue to pray for your church planters and their families. From Planting the Word in 2009 to Prayer Power 2010

In 2009 we focused on the dynamic power of the Word of God to save and build the Christian up in grace and knowledge. We encouraged our partners and the churches to spend even more time in the study, preaching/teaching, and sharing of God's Word. The Word of God is our light for the Kingdom and our sword to clear the way for the building of the Kingdom by means of evangelistic church planting.

In 2010 our theme is the *Power of Prayer*. Prayer is the fuel that drives our efforts. We pray for God to send us church planters. We pray for God to lead us to the right target areas for planting. We pray for God to raise up the funds for this vital mission. We pray for God to give us wisdom in dealing with the many issues attached to planting. We solicit many partners to pray with us for every aspect of the ministry of building up the Kingdom through church planting. I could go on listing how we pray for the very small things, from the fixing of a piece of equipment in our office, to the large requests such as for God to provide buildings. However, the one prayer that we maintain above any other before His throne is that the Lord will save His people through our witness of the Gospel and that His people will grow in His grace through the ministries of your church planters and the mission churches they serve.

Join with us in 2010 to set more time aside in prayer and to pray more often for your church planters and their kingdom building ministries.

REVIEW OF 2009 IN CHURCH EXTENSION

- We recorded *over fifty* people making professions of faith, and the mission churches held numerous baptisms.
- *Financial giving* from churches increased slightly with some churches decreasing their pledges in 2009.

- We again had a small net increase in the size of our donor list and donor giving. However we experienced a number of our faithful donors going home to glory and others moving out of the BFC and discontinuing their support for the mission.
- Two *Training Days* were held for our men including guest presenters on missional outreach and other pertinent topics.
- Numerous *new contacts were made* and door-to-door surveys took place in some of our target sites. In Milford, DE, five VBS programs were organized along with other community outreaches, and several thousand Gospel tracts were distributed.
- Church Extension, with the assistance of several churches, *made needed renovations and maintenance repairs* on the BFC properties we occupy at Allentown, PA, and Cape May Court House, NJ. The costs for these jobs were paid for by the mission churches, BFC churches and Church Extension.
- The *DELMARVA team* focused their attention on Milford, DE, doing community surveying and holding a Bible study and discipleship class in Milford. We are still targeting this site for a new church plant. Two individuals were saved through our contacting and are now attending the discipleship class. Our Aquila & Priscilla team in DELMARVA, Harry and Sandra Workman, continued their assistance at New Life BFC and assisted with the work in Milford.
- Neil and Lisa Christensen were sent out from Cedar Crest BFC as an Aquila & Priscilla team to El Faro Mission Church in Allentown. Jason and Joanne Engelhart continue serving alongside Carlos Rodriguez at the La Roca Mission Church. Doug and Kashie Boyd assisted us at the Cape May County Mission Church. Russ and Nell Ruch serve as an Aquila & Priscilla team at the Hellertown Mission Church. The Gambrills from the Wallingford BFC presented themselves to serve as an Aquila & Priscilla team at the Woodbury Heights, NJ Mission Church.
- *Ray Bertolet* was assigned to focus his survey and contact efforts on Milford, DE and is serving part-time as Interim Pastor at the Camden, DE BFC. He also assisted with work

projects at several of the mission churches.

- *Grace Fellowship Church, Harrisburg, PA* was received into Church Extension as a connectional church. Grace was an independent multi-cultural church with a vision to move into the city and grow a multi-cultural church there. The church is pastored by David Smith, and Ed Suthers serves as an elder. We look forward to working with the church and assisting with its assimilation into the BFC.
- The *Hellertown Mission Church* has increased in attendance this past year and is working through the steps to graduate from Church Extension in 2011.
- *Mark Morrison* serves full-time as Assistant Director. He is serving as Interim Church Planter at the Cape May County, NJ Mission Church, and coaching the team at the El Faro Mission Church in Allentown, PA. Brother Morrison still needs to raise his full support and we ask that you consider supporting our brother.
- *Five ministry and work teams* were sent out to assist our plants in DELMARVA, Cape May Court House, NJ, South Allentown, PA, Reading, PA, and Adams County, PA. A significant team was formed from the Cedar Crest BFC, Allentown, PA, to assist the El Faro Mission Church with a large outreach in South Allentown, called "Light in the Park."
- The *Cape May County Mission Church* has experienced some growth this past year with several active families now assisting at the mission. With the help of the Sinking Spring, PA BFC over the summer, we were able to see an increase in attendance, as well as develop some new programs and outreach. A well-attended Bible study takes place mid-week and a young adult ministry began under the leadership of Pastor Rick and Denise Moyer. We are seeking a man to be called as a full-time church planter and develop the plant in Cape May Court House. Several candidates are being interviewed.
- Church Extension called *Aaron Susek to plant the church in Adams County.* Aaron and his family came from the Royersford, PA BFC where he served as Assistant Pastor. The

mission has experienced some growth since Aaron began his ministry, and Aaron, along with the Transitional Leadership Team (TLT), have developed core values and a ministry vision to be implemented.

- *Administrative Assistant, Lisa Christensen*, remains a vital asset to the planters and the administration of Church Extension. Lisa has formed a growing and active volunteer force that assists with numerous mailings and work around the office. We especially thank Pastor David and Lena Thomann for their assistance.
- We praise God for blessing our two major fund-raising projects: *Summer Ten and Christmas Gift Month*. A total of over \$100,000.00 came in through these fund-raisers.
- The *mission church in East/West Hanover Township, PA*, under the leadership of Pastor Mark Barninger, has grown and continues to meet at the Holiday Inn in West Hanover Township. The mission is searching for facilities to use fulltime in order to be more visible in the community. There is the possibility that the mission church may be ready for graduation in 2011.
- *The mission church in Woodbury Heights, NJ,* is experiencing significant growth, with a weekly average of over 100 people. They are faced with having to seek larger facilities or establish two services. Pastor Dan Williams and his team are making plans for graduation in 2011.
- The *Strategic Planning Committee* continues its work of developing strategy and materials that will better assist the ministry of Church Extension. This past year the committee worked on establishing "Committed Participant Role" guidelines for the mission churches as a step toward membership roles, when the missions are received into Annual Conference as particular churches.
- A number of recruitment meetings were held with *six prospective church planters*.
- *More than 50 churches were visited* this year by the Church Extension staff. We presented our mission and vision.
- Our Hispanic church plants, La Roca in Reading, PA, and

El Faro in Allentown, PA, under the leadership of Pastor Carlos Rodriguez and Pastor Elliot Ramos, respectively, continue to reach Hispanic people with the Gospel. La Roca experienced significant growth in 2009, now averaging 110 people weekly, along with many challenges. El Faro had a very active year of ministry with the Light in the Park outreach, its mercy ministry, and several other outreach ministries taking place in and out of the church. El Faro needs to experience growth in 2010. Pastor Ramos still needs support; pray for his personal financial support to increase.

- *Miguel Gonzalez* was hired as a Church Planter Intern for the La Roca Mission Church and is ministering alongside Pastor Rodriguez. Miguel and his wife, Jessica, are very active with the youth and families of the church. Miguel completed his testing with the Ministerial Candidate Committee and is now a Probationer with the BFC.
- I chaired the Joint Committee on Ethnic Church Planting • this past year. The committee continues its focus on Hispanic church planting, but is open to working with all people groups and assimilating them into the BFC. A Merida Sub-Committee was formed to work with the church in Merida, Mexico. Plans are in place to assist Merida with establishing a Church Planters Training Center and planting daughter churches. We translated the Biblical Principles for Living into Spanish and will work on the rest of the Faith & Order. The Articles of *Faith* are translated in Spanish and available for you. Church Extension and the Ethnic Committee are open to investigating church planting opportunities overseas and I held several conversations this past year with some foreign missionaries about church planting and connection with the BFC. I am in dialogue with David Riddell, WT International, regarding the church planters who serve under his direction and the BFC church planters coming together for training, sharing and other discussions.
- I served again this past year on the *Ministerial Candidate Committee* and have enjoyed working with the new men coming into the BFC.

• The DELMARVA Project

<u>*Milford/Camden, DE*</u> – We will continue our efforts to raise up a core group for the opening and launching of a mission church in Milford. Ray Bertolet will continue his interim position as Pastor of the Camden, DE, BFC. We will work with the elders of the Camden church and look for the Lord's leading in connecting the Camden church and the work in Milford.

<u>Newark, DE</u> - The Newark, DE BFC has in the past considered daughter church planting. I will revisit the idea of a daughter church plant with Newark.

• Hispanic Church Planting

<u>La Roca - Reading, PA Hispanic Church Plant</u> – I will continue my coaching of both Carlos and Miguel, assisting them with their growth by monitoring their facility needs, facilitating the program, and helping the mission's development toward reaching its goals. I am also coaching both men in their callings and Carlos with furthering his education.

El Faro - Allentown, PA Hispanic Church Plant – This year Mark Morrison and I will work with the TLT and Pastor Ramos to assist them with reaching their goals of becoming a Particular Church in the BFC. An Aquila & Priscilla team is in place to assist the mission and, Lord willing, Ariel Suero will be considered as an intern to assist Pastor Ramos.

<u>Merida, Mexico</u> – I will be working closely with the Joint Committee on Ethnic Church Planting to establish a Church Planters Training Center at the Merida church. We will also assist the church with sending out at least one church planter in 2010 to plant a daughter church in a target site near the Merida church.

<u>Lancaster, PA</u> – Church Extension and the Ethnic Church Planting Committee will be discussing with the Capitol Region the possibility of a Hispanic church plant in Lancaster, PA.

• Daughter Church Planting

<u>Capitol Region</u> – If the Capitol Region is interested in a Hispanic church plant, we will follow the model implemented in Reading and encourage the region to consider this a daughter church planting project.

<u>Metro Region</u> - I will begin discussions with the Metro Region about a church plant in South Amboy, NJ.

<u>Particular Churches and other Regions</u> – There are no BFC churches at this point that have given any indication of serious interest in daughter church planting. However, there are some possibilities with which I will follow up.

• Connectional Projects

<u>Grace Fellowship, Harrisburg, PA</u> – Our recent approval of Grace Fellowship Church as a connectional church in Church Extension will need to be developed. I will be working with the leaders at Grace and working on a plan for assimilation into the BFC.

• Recruitment

<u>Cape May Court House, NJ</u> – We will continue our efforts to recruit for Cape May. I will reach out to the Bible colleges and seminaries in the area, post the need on several ministry position websites and recruit from the MCC candidate listing. <u>DELMARVA</u> – We will look for a planter for DELMARVA, and specifically Milford, as the Lord leads.

<u>*Hispanic*</u> – Depending on how the Lancaster vision unfolds we may need to recruit a Hispanic planter in 2010-2011.

• Church Planter's Academy

We have developed a number of training opportunities for our planters. Yearly we are holding two all-day Training Days and three Church Planters' Roundtable meetings. We also publish a regular Coach's Corner newsletter, and distribute various materials and books. I would like to work with our current planters and Brother Morrison to develop a three-day yearly Church Planter's Academy. This would be for anyone in the BFC or outside the BFC who would be interested in learning more about church planting and becoming a church planter with the BFC. I will also be working with the Merida, Mexico BFC and their plans for a Church Planters Training Center at the church in Mexico (see above).

• Graduation Preparations

I will be working with the following planters and their TLTs to complete plans for graduation in 2011: Dan Williams, Woodbury Heights, NJ; and Tim Zuck, Hellertown, PA. It may also possibly include Mark Barninger, East/West Hanover, PA.

• Facility Needs

Two plants will be searching for new meeting places if they continue their current growth rate. I will be assisting the Hellertown and Woodbury Heights mission churches with counsel and financial considerations.

• Development

The Development Committee will be working on several projects in 2010: 1) the planning of a thank-you dinner for donors who give generously to the mission; 2) the further development of our relationship with the Mennonite Foundation in seeking ways to increase our invested funds; 3) the recruiting of a retired individual with investment expertise to assist me with donor follow-up and communication; and 4) the organizing of a donor solicitation for 2010.

• Frontier Concerns

The BFC has three church frontiers: New England (Thompson, CT BFC), New Mexico (Las Cruces, NM BFC) and Mexico (Merida, Mexico BFC). These churches are far off and isolated from the BFC. Our vision in receiving these churches in the BFC was to cluster other BFC churches near these locations and form regions of several churches in each frontier site. We are currently seeking to do this in Merida but have not made

any efforts recently to cluster other churches near our New England and New Mexico sites. I will be investigating how we might be able to plant other BFC churches in our frontier sites and form regions of BFC churches in these frontiers. I realize that having BFC churches so far away from our hub is challenging, yet God has given us these frontiers and we need to consider ways of better connection. Clustering churches in these frontiers may or may not be the avenue to take – we may find out after discussion and investigation.

God's call in my life is to serve Him and His Kingdom through the preaching and teaching of the Gospel and, at this time, leading Church Extension to complete its vision and forward plan. It is a privilege to serve such a gracious and almighty God. I remain concerned about the struggles we go through as a body of churches and constantly look for ways to strengthen local churches. I hold to the following conviction, that we must be unified in our doctrinal commitment to the Articles of Faith, engaged in trust and love for each other, and mobilized to accomplish our vision of being an expanding fellowship of churches through the planting of new churches.

Pray for Church Extension in 2010. Pray for God to give us a mighty unction of His wisdom and power to fulfill our charge to His glory.

Pray for Mark Morrison and for God to anoint his ministry. Pray for our Team: Lisa Christensen - Administrative Assistant, Carol Snyder - Special Projects Coordinator, Ray Bertolet -Assistant Church Planter, and our growing list of Aquila & Priscilla teams, along with all our volunteers. Pray for *your* church planters and their families who serve the BFC through Church Extension Ministries. Finally, pray for me as I direct this vital Mission.

- **BFC Church Planting Guide and DCPI Handbook** The BFC plan and approach to church planting. A complete systematic process for the planter and his team to move from the initial Identification Stage to the Graduation Stage.
- *Church Planter's Toolkit* The Church Planter's Toolkit includes 12 audio CDs as well as detailed checklists and action planning worksheets to form a comprehensive package for church planters and their team.

Report of the Joint Committee on Ethnic Church Planting

The Joint Committee met numerous times during 2009 to assist and promote BFC Ethnic Church Planting with a focus on Hispanic church planting. Our first Hispanic Church in Allentown, PA, under the direction of Pastor Elliot Ramos, continues to be a strong Gospel witness in the city.

The La Roca Hispanic Church in Reading, PA continues to grow under the leadership of Pastor Carlos Rodriguez. Miguel Gonzalez was called by Church Extension to serve as a Church Planter Intern to assist Pastor Carlos and the La Roca Mission Church. He is in the process of receiving his BFC credentials. Miguel is still in need of financial support. Get to meet this man and his wife, Jessica, by inviting them to share their ministry at your church.

The Ethnic Church Planning Committee realized the importance of mentoring the La Roca BFC in Merida, Mexico. The Committee appointed a Merida Task Force composed of David Schlonecker, Elliot Ramos, Carlos Rodriguez and Al Roberts to monitor and assist La Roca. The areas of financial planning, fulfilling its BFC obligations, leadership training and encouraging fellowship and communication with other BFC churches have been the focus for the Task Force. David Schlonecker was appointed coordinator for all trips from BFC churches and visits to Merida.

Note: The Ethnic Committee designated David Schlonecker as the contact person for any ministry trips to Merida by our Churches. If you are considering a trip to Merida, please first contact Brother Schlonecker.

Al Roberts led a group from Harleysville BFC in June to Merida. They discussed leadership training with the elders and prospective elders. They also worked with the deacons and discussed the role of men in the church and family life. David Gundrum plans a trip in 2010 to hold a Church Planting Seminar and a follow up visit to discuss the formation of a Church Planting Institute at the Church. Pastor Dave Schoen, from the Bethel BFC, Emmaus, PA, plans a follow up trip to Merida in April to work with the newly formed puppet ministry team that grew out of Bethel's ministry trip in July 2008. In an effort to keep Pastor Marcos informed and "in

the loop" a project called "Merida is not Alone" was formed. This plan suggested that a monthly call should be made to Pastor Marcos from our BFC Pastors. Elliot Ramos will compile a list of callers and this list will be placed on the pastors' prayer chain. Another helpful item being considered is the compilation of a handbook to be used as a Resource Manual for Merida and future foreign church plants and churches connecting with the BFC.

Pastor Phil Yerrington is working on developing our partnership with CAM International Mission. CAM is seeking to assist denominations ministering among Hispanics and planting Hispanic churches in America.

The Committee's translation team, headed by David Schlonecker and Miguel Gonzalez, completed its work on preparing a Spanish version of the *Biblical Principles for Living (BPLs)*. *The BFC Articles of Faith* are available in Spanish through the Board of Communications.

Finally, we would like to encourage the BFC Churches to reach out to the expanding number of ethnic people groups in their ministry target sites. "*Ethnic people in America totaled 97 Million in 2003 and this number continues to increase. Hispanics number close to 40 million*..." Every BFC Church has a mission field in its Jerusalem with many opportunities to reach ethnic people with the Gospel, especially Hispanics. Please help fulfill the calling God has given to His church to reach the people of the world in our land.

We want to thank the BFC churches for their support. In 2009, over \$10,000 was received for ethnic church planting. *We encourage the BFC Churches to increase their support for ethnic church planting in 2010*. If your church has not budgeted funds for ethnic church planting, please do so. The opportunities are many and we need your support.

Board of Missions

- (1:1) Paul, Silas and Timothy, to the church of the Thessalonians in God the Father and the Lord Jesus Christ: Grace and peace to you.
- (1:2) We always thank God for all of you, mentioning you in our prayers. (3) We continually remember before our God and *Father your work produced by faith, your labor prompted by* love, and your endurance inspired by hope in our Lord Jesus *Christ. (4) For we know, brothers loved by God, that he has* chosen vou, (5) because our gospel came to vou not simply with words, but also with power, with the Holy Spirit and with deep conviction. You know how we lived among you for your sake. (6) You became imitators of us and of the Lord; in spite of severe suffering, you welcomed the message with the joy given by the Holy Spirit. (7) And so you became a model to all the believers in Macedonia and Achaia. (8) The Lord's message rang out from you not only in Macedonia and Achaia--vour faith in God has become known everywhere. Therefore we do not need to say anything about it, (9) for they themselves report what kind of reception you gave us. They tell how you turned to God from idols to serve the living and true God. (10) and to wait for his Son from heaven, whom he raised from the dead--Jesus, who rescues us from the coming wrath.

(2:1) You know, brothers, that our visit to you was not a failure. 1 Thessalonians 1:1 – 2:1

In this passage from I Thessalonians Paul is enthusiastically telling the Thessalonica Church how happy and thankful he is for their faithfulness and endurance as they continue in the faith and how they have become an example and an encouragement to believers both near and far. Paul also reminds the believers in Thessalonica of the personal involvement of Silas, Timothy, and himself in the process of sharing the gospel and living daily with the new believers in such a way that Paul and his friends' lives were an example as to how a Christian should live. Paul also reminds the church of the work of the Holy Spirit during this initial visit and church planting effort. The result was that, in spite of severe suffering, a thriving, faithful church was successfully planted.

Board of Missions

Planting churches is just one vocation that many BFC missionaries have been called to do. Other BFC missionaries have been called to teach, provide medical assistance, fly a plane, build and maintain homes, churches, and schools, administrate finances, preach, counsel and encourage, manage computer resources, cook and clean, plan and oversee, be a dorm parent, etc., etc. Two everyday tasks that Paul spoke about in the above scripture passage are ones that each and every BFC missionary constantly is trying to accomplish: first, to live their lives in such a way as to be an example of how a Christian should live, and second, to share their faith whenever possible.

The Board of Missions Department

The Board of Missions Department conducts the business matters of the BOM just as most departments do. Budget and financial matters are reviewed and discussed. Folks who are seeking to become BFC missionaries are interviewed and assessed. BFC missionaries on home assignment are often interviewed to understand the progress they have made and the challenges they and their ministry face. The BOM Director always provides an update concerning missionaries who are:

- > candidates and their status with their sending board and support raising efforts,
- > set to leave for the field and when their commissioning date is,
- > coming back to the states as scheduled or who have reasons to come back earlier than planned,
- > especially experiencing difficult times in their family and or their ministry.

Each Department meeting always includes a time of prayer for the missionary families, and for those missionary families facing real challenges, a period of open discussion is held to share ideas which may be helpful. A BOM Sub-Committee oversees requests for and distribution of funds to BFC missionary families from the Buttress Fund. This fund exists as a result of generous contributors to the Board of Missions, whose contributions were given in order to provide assistance to missionaries for personal support, emergency needs, and particular project initiatives.

The Board of Missions Staff

Below is a summary of the services offered by the Board of Missions (BOM) staff:

1. Missionary Care, Including Field Visits

We are available and willing to meet with those considering missionary service and with our missionaries who need advice or counsel regarding their ministry. Visits to fields of ministry are undertaken to assist and encourage our missionaries as needs and opportunities arise. Part of this missionary care includes communicating with over 40 mission sending boards under which the BFC's over 150 adult missionaries serve. This communication includes being an advocate for each of the BFC missionaries.

2. Seminars

The BOM offers a host of informational resources to BFC churches.

• **Design Your Impact Workshop:** This five-hour seminar enables church leaders to discover their congregation's key characteristics and resources (their DNA) and move toward identifying a strategic missions focus that can unleash a powerful, new, global dynamic from their church.

• Knowing God's Will Seminars are conducted each year on a denominational level at a fall Retreat Within a Retreat (RWR) held at Pinebrook. This information is also useful as a weekend course for a youth group in a local church setting.

• **P.O.M. (Parents of Missionary) Retreats:** This weekend retreat seminar is designed to keep the parents of our missionaries on track with the ministry of their sons and daughters (and grandchildren) overseas.

• **Culture Link Seminars** is a program that prepares your short-term missionary teams to be fully prepared for ministry. This is a necessary seminar for any church serious

about getting the most from a cross-cultural experience.

• **Speaker Resource:** The office personnel remain available for mission emphasis in local congregations. This includes all stated public worship services, Sunday School, mission conferences, and special events. The office also provides a complete listing on our website (see #4) of our missionaries that are currently available for your missionary event needs.

• **Mentoring Services** are available to assist a church's board of elders and missions committee in developing a comprehensive, long range, and balanced outreach plan that uses every member in God's global cause.

• Short-term Planning Advice and Assistance is designed to help you and your church partner with your missionaries. Chris Merrick (Short-Term Projects Coordinator) and Nelson Randolph (Short-Term Partnership Coordinator) will assist with short term missions trip planning.

3. Prayer Calendar

This publication provides current prayer information for your congregation. The new format is an attractive, readable prayer aid and is offered to churches at a reduced rate. Nearly 1900 are sent out each month.

4. Board of Missions Website

The BOM website is quickly becoming a focal point of information for everyone interested in missions in the BFC. This site continues to grow with useful information for the church leadership and anyone seeking God's direction for possible service through the Board of Missions. Personal support needs and biographical information are continually updated and available 24 hours a day. There are also helpful links for planning short-term or career missions involvement. One may log onto the site at www.bfcbom.org.

5. Email Subscriber Lists

• **Daily Prayer** is a daily e-mail that allows subscribers to view the Prayer Calendar request for the day, in addition to receiving

up-to-the-minute news and prayer requests from the field.

• **Friday Prayer** is an in-depth prayer document produced each Friday and sent by e-mail. This communication, designed for missionary-to-missionary contact, is also available to the Collegium members and to a select group of other prayer partners.

• **Tanzania Project Prayer Guide** is a monthly guide to promote the Tanzania Project.

• "Let's Fish" is a newsletter, produced each Wednesday, and is designed to keep those interested in short-term missionary trips and possible career missionary involvement on the cutting edge. It is an outlet for the exchange of ideas, as well as prayer and ministry opportunities. This document enjoys a readership from ages 14 years through adult, and includes pastors, missionaries, youth leaders, mission chairpersons, laymen, and students. There is a readership of nearly 250 each week. A full archive is available on the BOM website.

6. May Missionary Rally

This annual gathering of missionaries and Bible Fellowship churches provides a world-wide panorama of missions, both local and overseas. It is an opportunity for networking and interaction among individuals as they endeavor to draw attention to God's heart for the world in their churches. A children's program for Kindergarten through 8th grade has become a successful part of this day. This year's rally will be held May 13th, 2010 at Calvary BFC in Sinking Spring. Grace BFC, Reading, PA, will host the Rally.

7. Missionary In-Residence at Pinebrook Bible Conference Summer Family Camp

The BOM provides a missionary family for each of the eight weeks of family camp to promote missions in the Bible Fellowship Church. Each week the campers have opportunity to interact with a missionary from the BFC at a very personal level. Additionally, the missionaries have opportunity to present their ministries during public meetings.

8. Office Activities

The office remains the hub for donor and church information and financial processing. We compile and maintain all the necessary information to keep individuals and churches abreast of the financial needs of the entire missionary family. Receipting of financial donations is meticulously recorded for both the donor's and the missionary's records. At the end of each month checks are sent by the BOM to each sending board for the amount of monies received for each BFC missionary serving under that board. Addresses and birthdays are kept up to date and extensive planning is undertaken for the annual Missions Rally.

Notes to the Financial Statements

For the Period January 1 to December 31, 2009

- Note 1 The BFC Board of Missions is a department of the BFC denomination. The organization is a non-profit organization and is not required to file an income return because it is a 501 C-3 under the Internal Revenue Code.
- Note 2 The financial statements are preapred on the cash basis of accounting. Items of income are recorded when received and expenses are recorded when paid.
- Note 3 The Board of Missions has provided a Balance Sheet as of December 31, 2009, and is using the Modified Cash Basis. Any excess of cash received as Designated Income over funds disbursed is shown as a payable since it is being held in trust for future payment of missionary support or designated projects.
 Note 4 Notes receivable -
 - The Board of Missions holds two notes receivable from Pinebrook Bible Conference.
 - Note #1 A note dated June 14, 2007 in the amount of \$50,000 with an interest rate of 4.50%. Monthly payments are 36 consecutive payments of \$1,487.35 beginning September 1, 2007
 - Note #2 A note dated November 20, 2007 in the amount of \$55,283.34 with an interest rate of 6.00%. Payments are 31 consecutive monthly interest only of \$276.42 beginning February 1, 2008. The principal balance is due on August 10, 2010.

Note 5 Investments

All investments are serviced by Fidelity Investments and are invested in mutual funds or government notes and are readily available for conversion to cash.

Note 6 The Board of Missions has a fund called Buttress Fund. The balance in this fund on December 31, 2008 was \$464,265. During 2009 the Board received contributions to this fund in the amount of \$1,400. The investment income was \$8,339, loss on investments sold was \$2,921, investment fee was \$35 and increase in market value was \$42,737 during 2009. The amount disbursed during 2009 was \$47,744, leaving a fund balance on December 31, 2009 of \$466,041.62. This fund will be disbursed over a period of years along with the earnings for missionary support and Board of Missions staff.

Report of the Pinebrook Bible Conference Board

Now faith is the assurance of things hoped for the conviction of things not seen. Hebrews 11:1 (ESV)

Faith is a tricky thing. It's difficult to pinpoint in tangible, physical ways or via the five senses, yet demonstrations of its effects abound. We as churchmen not only experience this in our own spiritual lives but see the transforming power of God's grace through faith on a daily basis. The writer of *Hebrews* summed it up well, noting faith's assurance is based on hope and *things not seen*. Yet it is very real. It's not a leap into some deep, dark chasm.

Faith has been tested at Pinebrook over the past few years. We believed that this viable ministry of God should continue. We had faith, not always the strongest, that God would bring us through some deep and troubling waters. For a time it was touch-and-go. Money was extremely tight - hand-to-mouth. Prayers for the Lord to increase our faith were sent heavenward on a daily basis.

In our situation the type of faith needed jumped from *Hebrews* to *James*. This faith required work - much work, hard work, intelligent work, wise work. God answered our prayers and rewarded our faith, as weak as it was, and provided a man, Jay Reinhard, to come alongside, put pencil to paper and figure out what was wrong and where we could cut back. Jay was able to save us \$45,000 in rebates, from overcharging, cutting back, etc. and righted the ship by utilizing sound financial principles and procedures. That, along with an upswing in retreat requests and opening up the summer for weekend retreats, gave us a tremendous 2009 and a good start for 2010.

All glory, of course, goes to God, but many thanks are given to those of you who stood by us during those trying times. Thanks for your prayers and words of encouragement. Also, thanks for your financial gifts and keep them coming! Although our churches are being assessed by the BFC, **none of that money is earmarked for** **Pinebrook.** In fact, Pinebrook is being assessed just like the churches. So we need your continual financial support.

A vigorous winterization program was started before the onslaught of last winter. An outdoor wood-burning unit was placed behind Honeybrook. Herb Sheet Metal from Lebanon, PA, replaced duct-work and added some insulation in all of the motel units. Windows were replaced in the Dining Hall and various adjustments, including a pool cover, were made for the indoor pool, permitting us to reopen it. We are happy to announce that all of this helped us reduce the amount of heating fuel by about 7,000 gallons despite the fact that it was a colder winter than the year before.

As we enter a new year (77th since our founding and 42nd as a BFC ministry), we are working hard to fill up this place with new groups and some of our own new retreats. We're also open to suggestions and would love to partner with you and your church. Pinebrook is in the business of providing a facility and taking care of your needs for a one day, weekend or week-long retreat. We hope that you will think of us first. Let's work together as we strive to fulfill our missions statement which says: "offer real hope to the real world by committing all of our resources for the advancement of the Gospel of Jesus Christ."

What's New at Pinebrook?

- 1. Camp Fire Ring: A generous gift from a family at our Las Cruces, NM, church is making this dream become a reality. Patterned after some of the camp fires at Word of Life, this amphitheater will get great use with our many teen retreat groups as well as during the summer.
- 2. Expanded Plan to Winterize & Modernize: Both winterizing and modernizing are needed for Pinebrook to continue to minister. As you know, our buildings are old. Our plan, *Steps to the Summit*, has us doing both at the same time. We've listened to our guests and are responding to their needs for nicer rooms, more control over room temperature as well as better insulation. The cost is about 10-grand per room for Overbrook, Sunnybrook and Honeybrook. We believe it is well worth it and will give us many more years of use in these buildings. The plan

also stretches us in the future to building a lodge where the old two-story dorm used to be (between the pool and Lake House). We hope this facility will meet the needs for many couples.

3. Staff Changes: During 2009 we saw several key people leave and hired some key people to replace them. The Associate Director, Errin Mulberry, left for ministry at our Sinking Spring Church. Chef Douglas Ryan is now ministering to homeless people in Florida. Mark Cicchinelli is now directing a children's camp in Ohio. And Bob Titus retired at the end of the year. We added Steve Rau, originally from our Ephrata church, as Program Director; Matt Allen as Director of Food Services; and at the start of 2010, Mike Stettler (long time friend of Pinebrook), on maintenance.

The list of employees and jobs are as follows: Matt Allen (Director of Food Services), Vonnie Allen (Dining Hall Manager), Jeremy Beichler (Director of Grounds & Facilities), Heather Devenezia (Registrar), Nate Heater (Maintenance), Jim Herrold (Retreat Booker), Jeremy Kellerman (Grounds, Paintball), Lisa Kellerman (Retreat Sales), Ann Lee (Bookstore & Office), Steve Rau (Director of Programming & Conference Host), Amber Ryan (Custodial), Mike Stettler (Maintenance), John Vandegriff (Director of Development & Marketing, Assistant to Director), Ruthie Vandegriff (Accounting & Dining Hall). We also have a plethora of part-time workers as well as volunteers and, of course, the very popular RWRs (Retreat Within a Retreat). Without these folks we could not function!

The Pinebrook Board of Directors continues to give leadership, counsel and advice. They are working through the new paradigm of BFC leadership. With this in mind the Board is in the process of rewriting bylaws and manuals. The Board hopes to expand its membership, opening up a few slots for Christian leaders who may not be a part of the BFC. We do, however, wholeheartedly embrace our relationship with the BFC and hope that the new working relationship with the BFC Executive Board and Executive Director will be fruitful and fulfilling.

Pinebrook continues to sponsor its own retreats and events. In

2009 we held the following: 7 Hymn Sings: 7 weeks of Summer Bible Conference; Spring Ladies Refresh \Im Her; Fall Senior Saints Retreat; . Golf Fundraiser. The Christmas Banquet was canceled due to snow.

Pinebrook continues to partner with East Stroudsburg Christian Academy as well as several churches, one of which (Provision of Promise) holds its weekly services in the White Chapel on Sunday evening.

We hope that you will support Pinebrook in the following ways: (1) Prayer; (2) Help - labor, RWRs; (3) Encouragement; (4) Financial giving.

The Apostle James noted that *faith without works is dead* and we need to *work out our salvation*. This is not a "works salvation" but a salvation that works. So is our faith. We need to believe that God can and, in the process, we need to be busy in the work of the Lord. As I continue in my sixth year as Director of Pinebrook, I plan to do just that. I hope you will continue to come alongside me in this endeavor. Let's work for the glory of God and have faith to see Him continue to do a mighty work through and in us.

Report of the Victory Valley Camp

Victory Valley Camp has experienced a year of transition. In April 2009 Doug Manwiller was appointed as Interim Director and in November was appointed Director by the BFC ExecBrd. With the summer camping season fast approaching, the Lord blessed the camp with a dedicated leadership team and had 38 returning staff with a combined experience of over 90 years of working at VVC. We were able to recruit a total number of 60 summer missionaries. We thank the Lord for the ministry of training young people to serve.

Despite a downward trend in the economy, we believe that our enrollment numbers have remained strong. We had an average of 92 campers per week, which was slightly higher than last year, and we praise the Lord for the increase. Our total number of campers this year was 554 for 6 weeks of camp, as compared to 614 for 7 weeks in 2008. This year VVC was approached by an outside group called Explorer Girls and we worked out an arrangement with them to exclusively rent our facilities to them for what is normally our last week of the summer. They brought 85 girls along with 30 staff. The Lord worked in the hearts of their girls and 5 made professions of faith. We believe this arrangement was mutually beneficial and furthered the cause of God's Kingdom.

Our summer Day Camp continues to provide daytime activities for local children. This year our total enrollment was 135 for 6 weeks, which is a slight weekly increase over last year. This program requires one leadership staff person and 4 summer missionaries. The strength of this program is its ability to reach into the local community.

The 2009 Budget year ended with a \$13,629.67 surplus. A number of factors contributed to this surplus. First, we were able to increase our revenue with the Explorer Girls rental group. Second, we were able to save money in the kitchen through hiring an onsite summer cook and controlling ordering costs.

We continue with our Winter Weekends as churches continue to

come as groups. We offer three Winter Weekends and had a total of 124 children. We continue to encourage BFC churches to send their children to these weekends in groups. This year 6 churches brought groups, with one BFC church bringing over 30 children. Many of the churches bring their own adult leaders. They testify that the value of these weekends is the building of relationships that last beyond a mere three days.

Victory Hall is booked most weeknights (Monday through Fridays) by local sports teams. Our facilities are rented by churches for picnics and other activities. We seek to offer enjoyable retreat experiences along with access to all our facilities, including the Pavilion, sports fields, dining hall, game room, indoor climbing wall and Victory Hall. Outside groups have taken particular interest in Goliath, our outdoor challenge course.

Facilities Manager John Masters continues with his dedicated service to maintain and improve the facilities at camp. This year he oversaw volunteer groups from various BFC churches. They completed steps from the swimming pool to the campfire site and built a walking bridge with hand rails across the creek. Another group painted the inside walls of Victory Hall and also made a contribution towards the cost of the paint. A member of one BFC Church donated and installed a hardwood floor in the stone house.

We thank the churches that continually pray for Victory Valley Camp and support us financially. Please remember we are <u>your</u> <u>camp</u> and are available to serve you. Please consider Victory Valley Camp when planning your retreats, adult and youth and picnics.

Report of the Board of Christian Education

As of the date of this report, our committee met one time this year and will meet once more before the 127th Annual Conference. Our chairman was not able to meet with us due to extenuating circumstances but asked us to meet and elect new officers, which we did. Our new treasurer has received all the funds from our former treasurer and transferred them to new bank accounts more local to him.

We also continued our discussion of the proper role of this committee in the 21st century, when so many resources are available to each particular church via the internet. Rather than assuming that this committee has more expertise in finding the best resources than anyone else in our denomination, we asked ourselves "Would we be better stewards to post the resources in a manner that would allow outside opinions and recommendations; i.e. a social network or interactive website that goes both ways?" We want to avoid being a "bottleneck" of resources.

As a result of these discussions, we have launched a new experimental web site and would welcome the Christian Ed. chairmen and committees, as well as Sunday School superintendents, all teachers and all interested persons in our congregations to try it out. The address of this new site is <u>http://2chron17.ning.com/</u> and the subtitle is "Where Friends Help Friends Teach the Bible." Anyone in our particular churches who has an interest in Christian Education is welcome to join and "test drive" this interactive site, and make recommendations of either new resources or how to improve the site itself.

We look forward to meeting with the new BFC Executive Board to better understand our role as they see it. Until then we are suggesting at least half a dozen things: Our big vision is 1) to get all ages excited about God and His Word; 2) to theologically and practically equip each young man and woman in the BFC (and beyond) to prepare them to be knowledgeable and fruitful disciplemakers of the Lord Jesus Christ in the subcultures in which they find themselves today; 3) to encourage and facilitate the "crosspollinating" of our people in our churches, so that we can learn from one another and help serve one another; thereby 4) creating a unified and denomination-wide atmosphere, an ethos, of being intentional about our disciple making; and 5) seeking to ensure that we in the BFC have an overall plan for bringing our people along to maturity as disciple makers for Jesus Christ, rather than doing our Christian education haphazardly. Ultimately all of the above is 6) to help our entire denomination across the board to be more intentional about fulfilling our stated vision: "to become an expanding fellowship of churches united to make disciples of Jesus Christ."

Report of the Board of Pensions

2009 Review and Status *(figures rounded for simplicity)*: The total of Ministers' Retirement Fund (MRF) annuity payments to beneficiaries in 2009 was \$196,000 (compared to \$201,700 in 2008 and \$211,300 in 2007): see Statement of Cash Receipts and Disbursements. This is the third year that the total disbursements have declined. There are 8 future beneficiaries of the MRF, the youngest of which will begin receiving benefits at age 65 in the year 2013. There were three beneficiaries who went home to be with the Lord in 2009, and survivor benefits are being paid to the widows, if applicable. Based on the current mortality assumptions, the final year of MRF payments to beneficiaries is projected to be 2034. Between now and then, it is estimated that the MRF will distribute future benefits totaling nearly \$2,900,000.

During 2009, the Net Assets in the MRF decreased by \$13,000 due to disbursements exceeding receipts.

Annual Funding: As a result of the BFC transition to the new BFC Executive Board (ExecBrd) format and the two percent conferencewide assessment beginning in 2010, there will no longer be direct contributions from the individual churches to the MRF. The Board of Pensions and the ExecBrd will annually agree on a funding amount which will come from the two percent assessment. For 2010, the planned amount is \$160,000, which is projected to be \$29,000 less than the projected payments of \$189,000. The shortfall will come from the Net Assets of the MRF, which were \$68,000 at the start of 2010. Depending on actual mortality experience and the actual conference income and expense, adjustments to the support level will be needed. As shown on the graph, the worst case assumption may require a small amount of BOP Notes to be issued beginning in 2012. Based on current mortality assumptions, the total amount of Notes would be less than \$125,000.

Planned Giving: The benefits of planned giving were clearly evident in 2008 by way of the receipt of the bequest of \$225,000. The Board of Pensions urges other members of the BFC to consider including the MRF in their estate planning arrangements. The simplest and most tax efficient method would be to name the MRF as a contingent or primary beneficiary (for married or singles, respectively) of a *portion* of an IRA or 403(b) account. This arrangement can be adjusted or revoked at any time, and does not involve changing one's Will. For more information, please contact the BFC Executive Director.

1. <u>Whereas</u>, the MRF annuity rate for 2010 is \$221 per year of service, and

<u>Whereas</u>, partial cost-of-living adjustments were part of the long-term phase out strategy of the MRF, and

Whereas, the final phase out was for calendar year 2010, be it **Resolved**, that the MRF annuity rate for calendar year 2011 be \$221 per year of service.

 Resolution Relating to Rental/Housing Allowances for Retired or Disabled Ministers of this Conference for Calendar Year 2011

- <u>Whereas</u>, the religious denomination known as The Bible Fellowship Church has functioned and functions through Ministers of the Gospel who are duly ordained or licensed; and
- <u>Whereas</u>, the practice of The Bible Fellowship Church is to provide a parsonage or a rental allowance as part of the gross compensation for each of its active ordained or licensed ministers; and
- Whereas, pensions paid to retired and disabled ordained or licensed ministers of The Bible Fellowship Church are considered as deferred compensation and are paid to said retired and disabled ordained or licensed ministers in consideration of previous, active service; and
- Whereas, the Internal Revenue Service has recognized that The Bible Fellowship Church is the appropriate organization to designate a housing/rental allowance for retired and disabled ordained or licensed ministers who are members of this Conference;

Resolved,

1. An amount equal to 100% of the pension payments received during the year of **2011** be and is hereby designated as a rental/housing allowance for each retired and disabled ordained or licensed minister of The Bible Fellowship Church who is or was a member of the Bible Fellowship Church Minister's Retirement Fund.

2. This rental/housing allowance shall apply to each retired and disabled ordained or licensed minister who has been granted the retired relationship or placed on disability leave by the Bible Fellowship Annual Conference and whose name and relationship to the conference is recorded in the *Yearbook* of the Annual Conference of the Bible Fellowship Church and in other appropriate records maintained by the conference.

3. The pension payment to which this rental/housing allowance applies shall be the pension payment resulting from all service

of such retired or disabled ordained or licensed minister from all employment by any local church, Annual Conference or institution of The Bible Fellowship Church or of any former denomination that is now a part of The Bible Fellowship Church, or from any other employer who employed the minister to perform services related to the ministry and who elected to make contributions to the pension funds of The Bible Fellowship Church for such retired minister's pension.

Note: The rental/housing allowance which may be excluded from a minister's gross income is limited to the lesser of (1) the amount of the rental/housing allowance designated by the minister's employer or other appropriate body, (2) the amount actually expended by the minister to provide his or her housing, or (3) the legally-determined fair rental value of the parsonage or other housing provided. As specified in Rev. Rul. 71-290 C.B. 92, "the only amount that will qualify for exclusion under section 107(2) of the Code as a 'rental allowance' is an amount equal to the fair rental value of the home, including furnishings and appurtenances such as a garage, plus the cost of utilities."

Report of the Historical Committee

The duties of the Historical Committee, according to the Faith and Order, include the following:

- (1) It shall develop and encourage the study of the history of the denomination.
- (2) It shall maintain denominational archives for the accumulation of materials and memoirs relating to the history of the denomination.
- (3) It shall appoint an archivist, who shall be responsible for the maintenance and oversight of the archives.
- (4) It shall determine policy and procedure by which the archivist can maintain and supplement the historical material of the denomination.
- (5) It shall assist the archivist in the collection of relevant historical materials.
- (6) It shall receive and disburse funds received from the Administrative Budget, churches, and individuals.
- (7) It shall encourage each Particular Church and mission to maintain a file of important documents relating to the historical development of the local fellowship.
- (8) It shall make an annual report to BFC Conference.

The Committee has continued to fulfill these duties to the best of its ability believing its work to be significant and important. Perhaps the only controversy we face is just how important this work is. Some write off historical work as a waste of time since we don't live in the past and who cares, anyway? Others understand that the past is the soil from which our present and future grows Understanding what we have been helps to understand what we are becoming. We are seeing significant changes in our leadership structures and how things get done. Understanding where we were weak and where we were strong and where we succeeded and where we failed will be important during this time of transition. The Historical Committee will continue its work of maintaining our story and in so doing desires to be a servant to help us on our journey of becoming a denomination that effectively serves Christ and His kingdom. In addition to its various publications, the Committee maintains a website of resources to provide information and study material for those who want to learn from what we have done to bring us to where we are. Report of the Beneficiary Society

The Lord is my rock, and my fortress, and my deliverer; my God, my strength, in whom I will trust; my shield, and the horn of my salvation, and my high tower. Psalm 18:2

I, as Secretary of the Beneficiary Society of the BFC, am happy to report for the 53rd year that the Society is still rendering its aid to the faithful and beloved pastors and their wives. During this past year of 2009 two of our retired pastors, John Dunn and Robert Smock, and two of our sisters in Christ, Mae K. Hartman and Ruth Seifert, answered the call of our Lord and are now in the presence of the Lord of Glory. They have completed their ministry of love and compassion for the lost and Christ's church. We also have aided Elizabeth Bartron during the year with an aid grant.

The Fund has been doing well throughout the year despite the heavy financial drain on its assets. Our bonds and other investments have aided us in meeting our responsibilities, The officers have labored together to see that all that can be done to help our brethren has been done.

If there has been any increase in our families during the year, be sure to notify the Secretary at once. This is your responsibility. He will need the name of the child and the birth date.

The following articles are submitted to be approved by the pastors. They are not new rulings but are an attempt to clarify regulations pursuant to the operation of our rules on duties, membership and benefits.

1. Under 701-1.3 Rules and Regulations – Membership, modify second sentence of the second paragraph to read:

"Ministers of the *BFC* who are working with other Christian ministries **and inactive ministers** are not members of the Beneficiary Society and are not eligible for benefits from the fund."

2. Move third paragraph under Membership and modify it to be the second paragraph under Dues and the modified paragraph would read:

Ministers receiving Ministers' Retirement Fund benefits, ministers on disability, and ministers under the Ministers' Annuity Fund who have retired at age 65 or later are members of the Society but are exempt from dues. Members who continue on active service are exempt from dues after they have paid dues for 40-years. Ministers over age 65 who choose to continue to serve as pastors or under ministries of the BFC must pay dues until they reach the age of 72 or have paid dues for 40-years. Ministers who retire before age 65 are required to pay dues until age 65."

- 3. Remove second sentence under first paragraph of Dues since it was modified and is now included in the second paragraph.
- 4. Add the following sentences between the second and third sentences of the paragraph under Benefits:

"If a pastor-member of the Beneficiary Society is called home to be with the Lord, his children are covered until their 19th birthday. The coverage of a pastor-member's wife shall continue after the death of her husband until her death or remarriage. Wives of ministers who were retired and receiving benefits under the MRF or MAF at the time of marriage shall not qualify for death benefits."

5. Delete the last paragraph under Miscellaneous Rules which now reads:

"Each probationer/ordained man upon re-entering the membership of the Society must pay an equal amount of money equivalent to the number of years he was licensed up to the present year. This amount will be the total amount that was to be paid for the years that he was not a paying member of the Society."

Ministerial Convention Committee

127th BFC Conference

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Report of the Study Committee: the Kingdom

This committee was formed at the 126th Annual Conference.

The first meeting of our committee took place on June 13, 2009 at Royersford BFC. This was a preliminary meeting where we discussed the goals and approach of this committee. During this meeting we addressed key issues as they relate to the Kingdom and assigned each member to write a one page summary of our current understanding of the Kingdom.

Three emphases were proposed with respect to the kingdom: (1) the universal aspects (God's sovereign rule); (2) the present aspects of the Kingdom with respect to Christ's reign; (3) the future aspects of the Kingdom with respect to Christ's reign (e.g. Millennial; New Heavens & New Earth).

Our second meeting was convened August 12, 2009 at Pinebrook Bible Conference. We invited Todd Magnun from Biblical Seminary to give us a presentation. He reviewed with us the state of the question of the Kingdom of God in evangelical theology and beyond.

At this meeting some of the discussion centered on the "already" and "not yet" aspects of the Kingdom of God. This conception has brought a greater degree of unanimity to Evangelical Theology. Traditional rigid divisions between Dispensational and Covenant Theology have been softened to a degree as numerous Bible scholars and theologians are recognizing there is a greater degree of possible unity if we center on the New Testament's "inaugurated eschatology." One example of this trend is Darrell Bock and Craig Blaising's book "Progressive Dispensationalism."

At this time the committee requests to continue its work and hopes to bring recommendations to the 128th BFC Conference. We still have much work to do for a thorough handling of the issue of the kingdom of God.

1910 / 2010 27th Annual Conference /127th BFC Conference 100 Hundred Years Ago by Richard Taylor

The Annual Conference met in the brick Mennonite Brethren in Christ Church at 10th and Oley Streets in Reading, PA. The building in which they gathered had replaced the "Four Day Church" built in 1884 of hemlock boards in just 4 days. It had been a crude structure but suited their needs. Then, growth had come and a more suitable building was needed. If it only took 4 days to build, it came down pretty fast. The newer brick building was very adequate.

These were quiet years for the Pennsylvania Annual Conference. Doctrinal Issues were debated and decided at the General Conferences held every 4 years so the annual conferences were not required to work on such matters. The General Conference was not due to meet again until 1912. Each of the individual conferences had responsibility for the ministry to their communities. The Pennsylvania Conference gave their time to issues relating to their work in eastern Pennsylvania.

They followed their routines. The conference was opened with singing, prayer and a roll call. The first three pews were designated as the conference bar. To vote, you must sit in these rows. The

basement was to be the meeting place for private sessions where you could talk about actual problems away from the occasional visitor. The pastors gave their oral reports, limited to 10 minutes each. The secretary happily recorded:

The reports were very encouraging, many were moved to tears while listening to what the Lord hath done even at the smaller places. Some of the pastors had severe tests personally and by opposition from outside influences. Notwithstanding this, the Lord blessed the humble efforts of the brethren in the salvation of souls and a number were baptized and added to the Church. The offerings in most instances were higher than ever.

The conference took seriously its responsibilities and held the pastoral servants to a high standard. When the men did not measure up, they took action. The second session recorded:

Committee on Resolutions.- WHEREAS, D.H. Manney and C.A. Parson, Probationers, have left the work of the Lord for which reason they did not appear before the Board of Examiners for examination, therefore,

Resolved, That we drop their names from the Conference and the name of D.H. Manney from the Church records.

WHEREAS, The brethren G.F. Yost and J.T. Anderson did not appear at the Fall examination at the appointed time, thereby greatly inconveniencing the Board of Examiners, therefore,

Resolved, That we deeply regret the oversight and neglect of the brethren and trust that they will do better on this line in the future.

In the third session, down in the basement reserved for private issues where they could speak frankly, they had a discussion. Again, they expressed their high expectations for those who put their hand to the plow and did not allow looking back.

Bro. C.W. Stine, of Lehighton, having tendered his resignation from the ministry, which for reasons justifiable was rejected and Brother Stine was expelled from the ministry. He shall be on probation as a member until the Church is satisfied of his integrity and loyalty.

The secretary recorded the reports of the presiding elders. Clearly they were encouraged.

A. W.G. Gehman, Presiding Elder of the Mt. Carmel District and President of the Gospel Herald Society, reported a successful camp meeting of 85 tents at Easton, Pa. The attendance was large and souls were saved. We held good tabernacle meetings at Nazareth and Easton. The Society has missions at Washington, N.J.; East Stroudsburg, Sunbury, Shamokin and Lansdale, Pa. We held very successful tabernacle meetings at Hackettstown, N.J., and Lansdale and Sunbury, Pa., at which souls were saved and we trust much good accomplished.

The Heralds are active, self-denying and loyal. He also presented the name of M.H. Kline as an applicant for Annual Conference license...

B. W.B. Musselman, being unable to be present personally, reported that he had absolutely nothing against any one, especially not against any one in the church.

He stated that the Lord has been blessing their work more this year than ever. Their presses in the Herald Publishing House are often running day and night, which, together with his other duties, have taxed his time and strength more than ever, necessitating his absence from this Conference session. Thirty of their workers are members of the Pennsylvania Conference.

C. H.B. Musselman, Presiding Elder of the Bethlehem District, reported that there was not a single church or trustee board whose treasury was in debt. It is surprising how loyal the pastors and people are. There is a steady increase manifested all around and the classes are becoming more and more established.

Paralleling the conference to be held 100 years later, the Conference had organized an Executive Board who could handle the issues of the Annual Conference between sessions. They were still trying to make sure all was in place. They were making sure they got it right. The secretary reported:

Resolved, That the Executive Board elected at this Conference shall be hereby duly authorized and empowered to formulate or elect a board according to the requirements of the law in case the election of the present Executive Board is illegal.

Each year, a highlight of the conference was the Sunday gatherings. These meetings were time for encouragement and powerful displays of preaching. In 1910, it was no different. They gathered as they always did.

The morning service was opened at 9:30 by singing and prayer by W.G. Gehman. At 9:45 the Chairman, H.B. Musselman preached a very searching and instructive Conference Sermon, especially emphasizing the characteristics of a faithful minister and the dangers to which he is exposed in these days. At 2 p.m.,after a glorious song service, W.G. Gehman, Presiding Elder of the Mt. Carmel District, gave us a grand and timely message. The evening service was opened at 7 o'clock with a song service, after which W.S. Hottel gave us a stirring address.

A large number of the brothers and sisters from the various classes were present, the weather was all that could be desired throughout the whole Conference. The attendance was very large, the large church being filled every evening and crowded to the doors on Sunday.

The special messages in song were very much appreciated. Many were moved to tears in every service and lasting impressions were made.

They re-assembled on Monday morning after an exciting Lord's Day. They expressed their gratitude to the host Reading Class with a "rising vote of thanks." And they were on their way home.

The reports at the back of the Yearbook showed that missionaries were working in three countries, Chile, Thibet and Turkey. The summer of 1910 had seen camp meetings held at a newly purchased place they called Mizpah Grove. At the Orphanage and Home in Center Valley, Titus Hottel had been appointed as the new manager. Several aged persons and one orphan were residents. Two Sunday School Conferences were scheduled for Bethlehem (on May 30, Decoration Day) and Walnutport (on Ascension Day).

The statistics of the two conferences allow us to make some comparisons (see next page)
