It can rightly be said that the BFC has essentially been built on prayer, and prayer was the focus of the 128th BFC Conference. OK, it's certainly true that every BFC Conference has featured prayer in every session, dating back to our very roots. This year's conference went a huge step further, though, by inviting Daniel Henderson of Strategic Renewal Ministries to address the pastors, delegates and guests on what it means to "ignite the heart of the church through personal renewal, congregational revival and leadership restoration for the glory of Jesus Christ."

BFC Executive Director David T. Allen opened conference on Monday night with a message entitled, "Built on a Foundation of Prayer." The topical message, which was part history lesson, part pep talk, reminded us that movements without prayer are doomed to failure while movements that are built upon prayer have God's blessing. "May it be prayer that carries us forward as we live through today and move toward tomorrow," Brother Allen concluded.

In His role as guest teacher, Henderson challenged pastors and delegates through four sessions spread throughout the conference – two each on Tuesday and Wednesday. Strategic Renewal is a ministry that exists to ignite the heart of the church through personal renewal, congregational revival and leadership restoration for the glory of Jesus Christ.

Henderson's vision is as follows: "Pastor-led, local church-oriented movements of Christ-exalting, worship-led prayer – leading to a full-scale revival, supernatural evangelism and cultural transformation." His central theme was the absolute necessity of worship-based prayer (as opposed to a request-based approach to prayer), one which focuses the attentions of believers on God, not on self. Henderson defined the differences between the two prayer foci thusly: A request-based approach to prayer simply seeks God's hand – what He can do for us – while a worship-based approach to prayer seeks God's face – the beauty of who He is.

The recognition of two new particular churches in Hellertown, PA (Saucon Community) and Woodbury Heights, NJ (New Beginnings) highlighted Monday's opening night of Conference. Church Extension Director David Gundrum likened the recognition of both churches – who were "voted in" by identical and unanimous 91-0 votes – to high school students who are preparing for their commencement exercises. "There are two churches tonight that

are going to receive their diplomas,” Gundrum said. “They’re here to graduate. They’re here to walk.”

One of Monday evening’s connective threads focused on the support both new churches received from existing BFC congregations. Saucon Community was birthed out of our Coopersburg congregation while Woodbury Heights, which started in a garage in Mantua, NJ, received considerable assistance from Grace BFC in Wallingford.

“No one person can take credit for this work,” noted Saucon Community pastor Tim Zuck, speaking for his own congregation but certainly making a statement that is true for both. “The work in Hellertown has been a team effort, a partnership of persons and churches.”

During its existence, Saucon Community has encountered several ebb-and-flow periods, but the church’s growth is proof of God’s guiding hand. “This is just the triumph of God’s grace,” Zuck said. “His grace is the undeniable reason for this church’s existence.”

Likewise, New Beginnings has witnessed God’s sustaining hand throughout its existence as the church survived the deaths of its founding pastor and one of its key elders. Harry Nessler, elder and delegate, noted, “We’re ecstatic to be here tonight, in this position. None of us saw this coming...God did it all.

“He continues to do amazing things every day in Woodbury Heights,” Nessler concluded.

“We’re grateful to be part of the BFC,” explained New Beginnings pastor Dan Williams. “We are not just excited to be New Beginnings. We’re excited to be New Beginnings Bible Fellowship Church.”

While much of Tuesday’s time was devoted to the necessary business of the BFC – reports and finances – Tuesday night’s ordination ceremony brought several guests to Pinebrook as eight men were either ordained or had previous ordinations recognized.

“I am grateful that God led me to the BFC four years ago,” noted Joshua D. Edwards, who has been serving as youth pastor at Bethel BFC in Emmaus. “I am thankful to my God, who, as Paul said, has given me strength and has counted me faithful and has placed me in His service.”

Marcos Ramirez Montalvo, serving in Merida, Mexico, thanked his BFC brothers for extending their welcome across national borders. “Gentlemen, thanks for opening your doors and allowing me to be part of you.”

Brother Ramirez Montalvo, by the way, had the blessing of several “guests” by way of a first-ever live streaming of BFC

Conference. Yes, the BFC has gone high-tech, allowing interested parties from hundreds of miles away – missionaries in the field as well as members of the church in Merida – to watch the proceedings.

Others who were ordained included David J. Peters, Michael D. Roberts, Aaron J. Susek and Timothy M. Zuck, while Mark R. Orton and James Arcieri had previous ordinations recognized. Arcieri's path to the BFC was especially winding and included service in several denominations. That may

explain why his two sons, attending college in Virginia, did not attend Tuesday night's service. "They've seen this before," he said. "This is the third time I've been 'revved up,' so to speak."

While the list of ordained men in the BFC grew by eight, the passing of five faithful servants was also noted at this year's conference as respects were paid to the late James A. Beil, C. Larry Bennett, Walter H. Frank, Harvey J. Fritz, Jr. and David E. Thomann. The many positive qualities of each man were recalled, with David A. Thomann offering this assessment of his father. "While Dad was not a great preacher, he was a great pastor. He loved people, and they loved him back. And the first time you met him, you would know exactly where he stood with the Lord because he wanted to know where you stood with the Lord. "Dad was a faithful servant, but the best thing about him was that he was Dad."

Musical worship was led by Brother Richard T. Paashaus. Monday night's worship time featured an ensemble from Calvary BFC in Coopersburg while a team of pastors provided backing in other sessions. Music ranged from traditional hymns to contemporary pieces by modern hymn writers like Bob Kauflin, Stuart Townend and Keith Getty.

A special standing ovation at this year's Conference was given to R.C. Reichenbach, who presented his last report as secretary of the Beneficiary Society – after 55 years of faithful service. "I think I've paid my dues," Brother Reichenbach said. Donald Kuntzman was elected as his successor.

JAMES A. BEIL

July 10, 1933 - October 23, 2010

Not that I have already obtained this or am already perfect, but I press on to make it my own, because Christ Jesus has made me his own. Brothers, I do not consider that I have made it my own. But one thing I do: forgetting what lies behind and straining forward to what lies ahead, I press on toward the goal for the prize of the upward call of God in Christ Jesus. Phil. 3: 12-14

These verses fitly describe the life and ministry of James A. Beil, who as a Christian, a husband and father, and minister of the gospel persevered through difficulties, pushed past obstacles and pursued excellence in all his endeavors.

James Beil was born in Northampton, PA to Oliver and Clara Deppe Beil. He graduated from Berean Bible School in 1954 and continued his education at Moravian College, completing a BS in Biology. Later he finished his formal education with graduate studies at East Stroudsburg University.



Pastor Beil was licensed as a pastor in 1959, and ordained into the ministry of the BFC in 1962. He served as a pastor for sixteen years in the following churches: Binghamton, NY (mission), Graterford and Harleysville circuit, Scranton, and Nazareth.

In 1974, while pastoring in Nazareth, Beil became the Assistant Administrator at the BFC Home for the Aged in Nazareth. This began a twenty-four year career of leadership with our retirement home ministries. Upon the retirement of F.B. Hertzog, Beil was appointed Administrator of the Home on June 26, 1975. He led the ministry to its relocation to Whitehall in 1988, when Fellowship Manor opened. The home in Nazareth was eventually closed, and the addition of independent living and assisted living units completed the retirement facility of Fellowship Community. When Beil retired in 1998, he left Fellowship Community as a vibrant, growing ministry of the BFC and a bright witness to the gospel in the Lehigh Valley. Following his retirement, he lived at Fellowship Community

and served on the chaplaincy staff.

James Beil was one of the leaders of his generation in the BFC. From 1968 to 1997, he served 27 times as an officer of Annual Conference, including ten times as Chairman of Annual Conference between 1983 and 1997. He also served on the Board of Directors of the BFC for 34 years from 1971 – 2004, including five years as President from 1996 – 2000.

Beil and his first wife Gail (Zimmerman) had two children: Susan (Henderson) and Thomas. Gail died in 2000, and he married Sandra L. Campbell Sharer-Beil in 2002. He is survived by his wife, two children, four step-children, and eleven grandchildren.

James Beil will be remembered for his steadfast, wise and loving ministry of forty years in the BFC. May all the praise go to God who worked through his servant!

The above verse was one of Charles Lawrence Bennett's favorites. He sure knew Who and what he believed and accepted that which was entrusted to him! Everyone knew him as a dedicated Christian, a servant of the Lord, and as Larry (the name his mother used and stuck all his life).

Born and raised in Watchung, New Jersey, Larry, the first of two children of Russell and Marie, entered life on May 6, 1942. He loved cars, especially '57 Chevy's and drag racing, and he even went into the automotive field until he met Jesus Christ when he was 21. From that point on he not only felt called to full-time Christian service, but pursued a pastoral career selling the homestead in Hillsboro, NJ, and, in his early thirties, took his wife and three young children to Bible School. At all three charges, Larry led the churches in building programs and additions. To accommodate an AWANA program, which Larry started in 2002, as well as fellowship meals and other activities, a Fellowship Hall was built behind the historic Zionsville Church. In honor of Pastor Bennett the church has dedicated and named the Fellowship Hall - "Bennett Hall." He was truly loved by his people.

Larry served on two BFC committees - Board of Directors BFC Homes, Inc. and Committee on Statistics.

That which was entrusted to him, the Gospel of Jesus Christ, was something he took very, very seriously. He lived to tell the

story of Jesus and His love. To that end, he always had a pocketful of tracts. He also assisted as a Chaplain at Milford Park and Fellowship Community. In fact, during one of his last rounds at the Fellowship Community he had the opportunity to lead several to a saving knowledge of Jesus Christ.

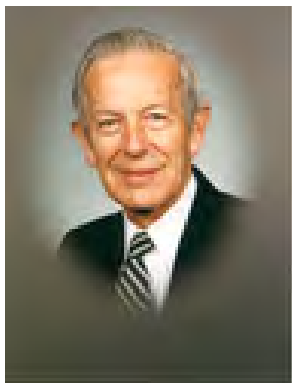

Rev. Walter Harvey Frank, 95, went home to be with his Heavenly Father on July 4, 2010. He will be remembered as a faithful husband, loving father, and dedicated servant of the Lord whose kindness and warm sense of humor won him many friends around the globe. At the time of death, he was a resident at the Covenant Village in Turlock, CA.

Walter was born in Langhorne, PA on December 9, 1914, and moved to Allentown, PA at an early age. He graduated from Allentown High School in 1933. Walter completed a three-year Pastor's Course in the Mennonite Brethren in Christ Church, now the BFC, and took courses of study at Muhlenberg College and Eastern Baptist Seminary. Walter married his sweetheart, Ethel Wieand, on July 26, 1940. He entered the Christian ministry and was ordained in 1942. Walter pastored four churches, including his home church in Allentown.

He traveled in Holland and Germany with Youth for Christ International in 1951 as a Christian evangelist. He served on the Boards of Africa Inland Mission, Orinoco River Mission, Greater Europe Mission, and the International Foreign Missions Association. Walter served as West Coast Director at Large for Greater Europe Mission, traveling the western U.S. and Canada, speaking at missions conferences, Bible schools and seminaries.

He served for nine years as Pastor to Senior Adults at Fair Oaks Baptist Church in Concord, CA. In 1996, Walter and Ethel moved to the Covenant Village of Turlock, CA. There he was a member of the Crossroads Evangelical Free Church.

Walter is survived by Ethel, his wife of 70 years; sister Clara Cressman of Carol Stream, IL; and four sons and one daughter, twelve grandchildren and six great-grandchildren.

In Memoriam:

HARVEY J. FRITZ, JR.

December 29, 1930 - July 31, 2010

Now it is required that those who have been given a trust must prove faithful. (1 Cor. 4:2)

Faithfulness marked the life and ministry of Harvey J. Fritz, Jr. from beginning to end. An only child, Harvey was born in Allentown, PA, in 1930. He trusted Christ as his Savior at the age of ten. During his teen years, a friend from school invited Harvey to the Menno Youth teen ministry of Bethel Church on Eighth Street in Allentown. Harvey was impacted greatly by both the Menno Youth ministry and by the pastor of Bethel, C. Leslie Miller, who involved Harvey in various outreach ministries and leadership opportunities.



Harvey was a member of the first graduating class at Berean Bible School in 1953. Under the teaching and influence of Rev. Jansen Hartman, he began to sense God's call to the pastoral ministry. In a 1959 issue of "M.B.C. Church Edition," Harvey wrote of his call, "It was a personal call because God was dealing with me as an individual to do His will. It was also a divine call. It was not my ambition to be a preacher, nor did I take the man-made aptitude tests to see if I were best suited for the ministry. God intervened in my life and laid the burden upon my heart to preach. For Scripture clearly states in Hebrews 5:4, 'And no man taketh this honor unto himself, but he that is called of God.'" In obedience to God's call, Harvey furthered his preparation at Bob Jones University, where he earned a B.A. in Bible and an M.A. in Christian Education. Not only did Harvey leave Bob Jones with two degrees, but also with his wife, Bertha (Weakland). They were married on August 28, 1954.

Harvey served at eight churches over his five plus decades of ministry in the BFC – Paradise, Spring City, Bethel in Emmaus, York, and Ebenezer in Bethlehem and then in semi-retirement he served at Ephrata and was the founding pastor of Fellowship Community BFC in Whitehall. Harvey served as head of Pastoral

Services at Fellowship Community, and continued on as a chaplain until his death. His smile, uplifting spirit, and encouraging words were a blessing to all around him. During three of his pastorates, he oversaw building programs and he was never afraid to initiate new ministries and evangelistic endeavors, including several radio outreaches over the years.

Harvey served faithfully on numerous denominational boards and committees. His ministry passions included evangelism and discipleship, communicating God's Word, mentoring young men in ministry, and leadership development. Harvey was truly a shepherd, genuinely loving, feeding, and caring for God's people. All who knew Harvey appreciated his gracious spirit, humility, and winsome personality. He impacted people with his smile, kindness, and love for the Lord. He chose to see the best in people and invested in developing others to reach their potential in Christ.

Harvey will be sorely missed by his wife, Bertha, daughter and son. He enjoyed seven grandchildren and nine great grandchildren. Perhaps the last week of Harvey's active ministry sums up his heart. Though not feeling well, he attended Annual Conference, returned home and served two days visiting residents, and then preached his last sermon on Sunday. He entered the hospital two days later.

David E. "Model T" Thomann, faithful servant of the Lord, went to his eternal reward on October 3, 2010 at the age of 93years 10 months and 3 days. He was born on December 1, 1916 to Louis and Emma Thomann of Philadelphia. He was the husband of Lena M. Deppe Thomann (four years) and the late Pauline (Musselman) Thomann (63 years) who died in 2004.



Thomann came to know Christ at an early age through the influence of his godly mother. She would take her children (9 of them) to the Mennonite Brethren-in-Christ Church in Philadelphia. While there he came under the pastoral ministry of J. B. Henry who had a desire to see the young men in his church serve the Lord in the ministry. Among those young men were John Dunn and David E. Thomann.

He graduated from Nyack Missionary College in 1941. He served in the Gospel Herald society in Irvington, NJ; Brooklyn, NY; and Trenton, NJ. He also served as pastor in the Nazareth / Northampton circuit, Jersey City, Easton, Quakertown and Harleysville congregations from 1943 to 1974. Following his service in Harleysville BFC, he took the position of Director of Pinebrook Bible Conference where he served from 1974 to 1982.

He came from a musical family and played several instruments including piano and organ. If needed, he would step in and play for worship services in his congregations. He sang in a men's quartet representing Nyack Missionary College. He also sang first tenor in the denominational Pastors Quartet from 1941 to the time of his death (71 years).

He was the founding editor and publisher of the denominational paper "Fellowship News" from in 1957 to 1966.

He served on the Board of Missions as Chairman, General Secretary and Financial Secretary from 1971 to 1982. Other boards and committees that he served on include: Board of Printing and Publication (editor), Mizpah Grove Board, Board of the Home (secretary), Victory Valley Board (secretary), Ministerial Relations Committee, Ministerial Candidate Committee, and the Board of Directors of Pinebrook Bible Conference (Director).

Following his retirement in 1982, he served as interim pastor at the Terre Hill and Spring City congregations. He then became the Visitation Pastor at Faith BFC in Lancaster where he worked with his son David A. Thomann and where he was awarded the title of Pastor Emeritus, November 3, 2002.

What really defined him was his longing for the Lord's return. Hardly a day went by when he did not remark to someone, "It just may be today!" In his many pastorates, he will be remembered as a man who genuinely loved people and one who led many to the Lord.

David E. Thomann is survived by his second wife, Lena, two daughters and one son as well as six grandchildren and 17 great-grandchildren.

Resolution Relating to Rental/Housing Allowances for Retired or Disabled Ministers of this Conference **for Calendar Year 2012:**

Whereas, the religious denomination known as The Bible Fellowship Church has and functions through Ministers of the Gospel who are duly ordained or licensed; and

Whereas, the practice of The Bible Fellowship Church is to provide a parsonage or a rental allowance as part of the gross compensation for each of its active ordained or licensed ministers; and

Whereas, pensions paid to retired and disabled ordained or licensed ministers of The Bible Fellowship Church are considered as deferred compensation and are paid to said retired and disabled ordained or licensed ministers in consideration of previous, active service; and

Whereas, the Internal Revenue Service has recognized that The Bible Fellowship Church is the appropriate organization to designate a housing/rental allowance for retired and disabled ordained or licensed ministers who are members of this Conference;

Resolved,

1. An amount equal to 100% of the pension payments received during the year of **2012** be and is hereby designated as a rental/housing allowance for each retired and disabled ordained or licensed minister of The Bible Fellowship Church who is or was a member of the Bible Fellowship Church Minister's Retirement Fund.

2. This rental/housing allowance shall apply to each retired and disabled ordained or licensed minister who has been granted the retired relationship or placed on disability leave by the Bible Fellowship Annual Conference and whose name and relationship to the conference is recorded in the *Yearbook* of the Annual Conference of the Bible Fellowship Church and in other appropriate records maintained by the conference.

3. The pension payment to which this rental/housing allowance applies shall be the pension payment resulting from all service of such retired or disabled ordained or licensed minister from all employment by any local church, Annual Conference or institution of The Bible Fellowship Church or of any former denomination that is now a part of The Bible Fellowship Church, or from any other employer who employed the minister to perform services related to the ministry and who elected to make contributions to the pension funds of The Bible Fellowship Church for such retired minister's pension.

Note: The rental/housing allowance, which may be excluded from a minister's gross income, is limited to the lesser of (1) the amount of the rental/housing allowance designated by the minister's employer or other appropriate body, (2) the amount actually expended by the minister to provide his or her housing, or (3) the legally-determined fair

rental value of the parsonage or other housing provided. As specified in Rev. Rul. 71-290 C.B. 92, “the only amount that will qualify for exclusion under section 107(2) of the Code as a 'rental allowance' is an amount equal to the fair rental value of the home, including furnishings and appurtenances such as a garage, plus the cost of utilities.”

Section 1 - Establishment and Purpose

The Pinebrook Educational Foundation was established as a division of the Bible Fellowship Church (“Church”) on October 18, 1994. The purpose of the Pinebrook Educational Foundation is to continue the ministry of Pinebrook Junior College (formerly Berean Bible School) to aid Christian individuals involved in higher education and Christian post-secondary institutions (“Purpose”). Said Purpose will be construed broadly enough to include a wide spectrum of aid projects involving Christian post-secondary education, including but not limited to scholarship aid to students and grants to Christian post-secondary institutions.

Section 2 - Overview

The Pinebrook Educational Foundation shall receive, invest, and administer funds (“Funds”) in accordance with its stated Purpose, and such funds shall be designated for such Purpose, segregated from the general funds of the Church, and administered and distributed by the Pinebrook Educational Foundation’s Board of Directors (“Foundation Board”) in conformity with said Purpose. Emphasis and priority will be given to individuals attending Christian institutions and to higher education endeavors closely related to the BFC. Special consideration shall be given to educational organizations with which the BFC Executive Board has affiliations (as referenced in §512-5.4(3) of the *F&O*).

Section 3 - Control

A. Election and Composition of the Foundation Board

The Pinebrook Educational Foundation shall be directed by the Foundation Board composed of six members (“Board Members”) elected by the **Pinebrook Educational Foundation** and subject to ratification by the BFC **Executive**

Board. Board Members shall be elected in three classes and shall serve three-year terms of service. The three classes shall be composed of two Board Members each. Each Board Member shall serve until a successor is duly elected.

B. Accountability

The Foundation Board shall be accountable to the **BFC Executive Board**. The Foundation Board shall administer all activities and investments of Pinebrook Educational Foundation to ensure that all such activities and investments are financially and legally appropriate with respect to the status of Pinebrook Educational Foundation. The Foundation Board shall report semi-annually to the **BFC Executive Board** and shall report annually to the BFC Conference.

C. Officers of the Foundation Board

The Foundation Board shall elect annually from its number: a Chairperson, a Vice-Chairperson, and a Secretary-Treasurer.

Section 4 - Administration

A. Director/Chairperson of the Pinebrook Educational Foundation

1. An ~~Executive~~ Director of Pinebrook Educational Foundation (“~~Executive~~ Director”) may be selected by the Foundation Board and ratified by the **BFC Executive Board**. The position may be paid or unpaid as determined by the **BFC Executive Board**.
2. The ~~Executive~~ Director shall not be required to be a member of the Foundation Board or the **BFC Executive Board**. Membership on one of these boards will not, however, disqualify an individual from serving as ~~Executive~~ Director. The ~~Executive~~ Director shall not be an officer of the Pinebrook Educational Foundation.
3. The ~~Executive~~ Director shall be responsible for the orderly conduct of the business of the Pinebrook

Educational Foundation. Such duties as administration of the grant and scholarship application process, oversight of all financial activities, investments, administrative procedures, and communication shall be the responsibility of the ~~Executive~~ Director. The ~~Executive~~ Director shall consult with the Foundation Board's Chairperson regarding general administration matters and with both the Chairperson and Secretary-Treasurer of the Foundation Board regarding financial matters.

4. If a ~~an Executive~~ Director has not been selected by the Foundation Board, the Foundation Board's Chairperson shall be responsible for the conduct of the business of the Pinebrook Educational Foundation and shall perform the duties identified in paragraph 3 above.

B. Foundation Secretary

1. The Secretary of the Pinebrook Educational Foundation shall be selected by the Foundation Board subject to approval by the **BFC Executive Board**.
2. The Secretary shall report to and assist the ~~Executive~~ Director (or Chairperson of the Foundation Board if a ~~an Executive~~ Director has not been selected by the Foundation Board).
3. The Secretary shall be a volunteer or a part-time employee until the Pinebrook Educational Foundation activity requires more assistance and additional funding is available for full-time compensation, as shall be determined by the Foundation Board.
4. The compensation (if any) of the Secretary shall be determined by the Foundation Board and shall be subject to approval by the **BFC Executive Board**.

C. Auxiliary Groups

Support groups previously affiliated with Pinebrook Junior College such as the Alumni Association may be encouraged to continue in existence or to be reactivated. The assistance of

such support groups may be sought in raising funds and in providing other assistance to the Pinebrook Educational Foundation.

D. Administration of Funds

1. Pinebrook Educational Foundation Funds shall:
 - (a) be segregated from the general funds of the Church;
 - (b) be separately invested and administered by the Foundation Board; and
 - (c) not be disbursed for any purpose other than the Purpose of the Pinebrook Educational Foundation.
2. A professional investment firm or counselor may be chosen by the Foundation Board to carry out the investment of Pinebrook Educational Foundation Funds. Risk levels and investment criteria shall be determined by the Foundation Board and approved by the **BFC Executive Board**.
3. The Pinebrook Educational Foundation may be the transferee of funds:
 - (a) existing Pinebrook Junior College endowment funds;
 - (b) donations or bequests to, and annuity arrangements made for the benefit of Pinebrook Junior College (or the Berean Bible School);
 - (c) grants from foundations;
 - (d) proceeds from general and endowment investments; and
 - (e) other sources acceptable with respect to the tax-exempt status of the Church.
4. Funds shall be used to disburse grants, scholarships and/or loans in accordance with the Purpose of Pinebrook Educational Foundation and to pay administrative costs of the Pinebrook Educational Foundation.
 - (a) The Foundation Board shall formulate rules for the administration of all Funds. These shall be subject to review by the **BFC Executive Board**.

- (b) Administrative costs shall be paid from the General Fund (as defined in Section 5 herein) subject to the approval of the Foundation Board and review by the **BFC Executive Board**.

Section 5 - Aid Projects/Designated Accounts

- A. The Pinebrook Educational Foundation shall be structured to include many types of aid to Christian higher education in accordance with its purpose. Specific programs of aid shall be designated by the Foundation Board as separately administered endowment or current gift “funds” or “accounts” (“Designated Accounts”) within the Foundation.
- B. A donation identified by a donor for the support of a specific Designated Account shall be used to fund such Designated Account. Designated Account Funds shall be expended by the Foundation Board in furtherance of the specific aid project(s) for which the Designated Account has been established.
- C. Undesignated donations shall go to a General Fund from which administrative costs shall be paid and Board directed grants, loans and scholarships shall be made.
- D. Donors shall be encouraged to contribute to Designated Accounts set up as endowments in order to insure a continuous stream of proceeds for the future. However, donations to Designated Accounts which expend non-endowment restricted (“current gift”) funds are also encouraged.
- E. Additionally, sizable initial gifts may be used to establish a Designated Account (as an endowment or current gift fund) of the donor’s choosing, subject to Foundation Board approval.
- F. There shall be compliance with donor limitations and/or restrictions on Funds received from (or donated, bequeathed, etc. to or for the benefit of) Pinebrook Junior College.

Section 6 - Miscellaneous Regulations

A. Bylaws

The Bylaws of the Foundation Board may be amended by majority vote of the total membership of the Foundation Board at a regular or special meeting.

B. General

The Foundation Board shall be empowered to adopt policies and regulations in addition to its Bylaws. Such policies and regulations must be in conformity with the *F&O* of the BFC and within the rules, decisions, and directives of the BFC Conference.

C. Quorum

Four Board Members attending a duly announced meeting of the Foundation Board shall constitute a quorum. Unless otherwise specified, a majority vote shall mean a simple majority of those attending any meeting of the Foundation Board in which there is a quorum.

- 512-5 Each department shall administer its own finances in conformity with policy approved by BFC Conference. Budgeting, fund-raising, and auditing will be overseen by the BFC Executive Board. All gift annuities established by the departments shall be approved by

the BFC Executive Board and reported annually.

512-6 All funds administered by the departments are held in trust for the BFC Conference. All real estate properties used by the departments are owned by the Bible Fellowship Church.

REVIEW OF 2010 IN CHURCH EXTENSION

- The BFC mission churches recorded *seventy-nine* people making professions of faith and held *twenty-four* baptisms.
- **Financial giving** from churches increased slightly.
- We had net increases in our donor list and donor giving. A number of our faithful donors went home to glory in 2010.
- Two **Training Days** were held for our men, including guest presenters on missional outreach and other pertinent topics.
- Numerous **new contacts were made**, door-to-door surveys took place in the mission churches' target sites and in Delaware and Cape May Court House, NJ. Several thousand Gospel tracts were distributed and numerous bulk mailings were facilitated by the office reaching several thousand people.
- Church Extension, with the assistance of several churches, made renovations and maintenance repairs on the BFC properties we occupy in Allentown, PA, and Cape May Court House, NJ. The costs for these jobs were paid for by the mission churches, BFC churches and Church Extension.
- The **DELMARVA Team** focused their attention on Milford, DE, conducting community surveys and holding a Bible study and a discipleship class in Milford, DE. We are no longer targeting this site for a new church plant. Our efforts will be focused on assisting **Ron Smith, Church Planter Candidate**, and the Newark, DE church with their vision to plant in South Smyrna. Our Aquila & Priscilla Team in DELMARVA, Harry and Sandra Workman, continued their assistance at New Life BFC, Long Neck, DE and assisted with the work in Milford. We hope to launch the South Smyrna plant in July, 2011.
- Several couples serve as **Aquila & Priscilla Teams: Neil and Lisa Christensen** serve the El Faro Mission Church in Allentown. **Jason and Joanne Engelhart** serve alongside Carlos Rodriguez at the La Roca Mission Church, **Doug and Kashie Boyd** assist at the Cape May Mission Church, **Russ and Nell Ruch** serve at the Hellertown Mission Church, and **Tommy and Kelly Gambrell** serve at the Woodbury Heights, NJ Mission Church.
- **Ray Bertolet** continues to hold a Bible study in Milford, DE and is serving part-time as interim pastor at the Camden, DE BFC. He also assisted with work projects at several of the mission churches and will be assisting the new plant in South Smyrna, DE.

- ***Grace Fellowship Church, Harrisburg, PA*** has a vision to move into the city of Harrisburg and grow a multi-cultural church in the city. The church is pastored by David Smith, and Ed Suthers and Jonathan Folks serve as elders. Brother Smith was approved as a probationer in the BFC, and received a call from Church Extension; he is the first Afro-American man to reach this stage of our credentialing process.
- The ***Hellertown Mission Church*** has continued to grow. The mission church has prepared for graduation this year at BFC Conference. All our assessments of the mission church were satisfactory.
- ***Pastor Mark Morrison*** continues to serve full-time as Assistant Director. He is serving as interim church planter at the Cape May County, NJ Mission Church, and coaching the team at the El Faro Mission Church in Allentown, PA. Brother Morrison still needs to raise his full support and we ask that you consider supporting him. Mark is now coaching ***Keith Strunk***, Church Planter Intern at Cape May Court House.
- ***Six ministry and work teams*** were sent out to assist our plants in DELMARVA, Cape May Court House, NJ, South Allentown, PA, Reading, PA, Adams County, PA, and Woodbury Heights, NJ. Cedar Crest, PA BFC again assisted the El Faro Mission Church with a significant outreach in South Allentown called "Light in the Park."
- The ***Cape May County Mission Church*** has experienced some wonderful growth this past year with several active families now assisting at the mission and new families coming into the church. A Bible study takes place mid-week along with numerous fellowship activities. We are seeking a man to be called as full-time church planter and develop the plant in Cape May. Keith Strunk is now serving as an intern here and, Lord willing, may be the candidate for church planter. The mission church completed the renovations on the Family Center and the ministry is progressing well.
- ***Aaron Susek*** serves as church planter at the Adams County Mission Church. The mission continues to experience growth and Aaron is very active networking in the community. The mission developed Gospel Community Groups to provide intimate fellowship for the people and an indigenous outreach to the communities where the groups are located.
- ***Administrative Assistant, Lisa Christensen***, remains a vital asset to the planters and the administration of Church

Extension. Lisa heads up an active volunteer force that assists with numerous mailings and work around the office. This year, **Ruth Richards**, who formerly served as our Administrative Assistant, came back on board as our bookkeeper to assist us with the transition of our books and reporting systems so they are compatible with what the Executive Board is requiring of us. Lisa had back surgery this past year and was out of the office a number of weeks, but we look forward to her recovery.

- We praise God for blessing our two major fundraising projects, **SummerTen and Christmas Gift Month**. A total of over \$130,000 came in through these fundraisers. Praise God for the donors He has raised up to support this mission.
- The **mission church in East/West Hanover Township, PA**, under the leadership of **Pastor Mark Barninger**, has grown and continues to meet at the Holiday Inn in West Hanover Township. The mission continues to look for 24/7 facilities and be more visible in the community. The mission church has informed the director of Church Extension that they will be preparing for graduation in 2012. In 2011 we will assist the mission in preparations for its upcoming assessments.
- **New Beginnings BFC in Woodbury Heights, NJ** has experienced significant growth. **Pastor Dan Williams** and his team successfully passed their assessments, and the mission church will graduate at this year's Conference.
- Our **Vision and Strategy Committee** is working with the director on developing a new *Forward Plan* for 2012.
- A number of meetings were held with **eight prospective church planters**.
- **Forty-seven churches were visited** this year by the Church Extension staff. We presented our mission and vision.
- **Our Hispanic church plants in Reading (La Roca) and in Allentown (El Faro)**, under the leadership of **Pastor Carlos Rodriguez (Reading) and Pastor Elliot Ramos (Allentown)** actively reach Hispanic people in the cities with the Gospel. La Roca continued to grow in 2010 and now meets in the Grace BFC's sanctuary on Sunday afternoons at 1pm. El Faro, in Allentown, was very active this year with a variety of ministries including Light in the Park outreach and its mercy ministry. El Faro will need to experience growth in 2011 in order to reach its graduation goals.
- **Miguel Gonzalez** is a church planter intern at the La Roca Mission Church and ministers alongside Pastor Rodriguez.

Miguel and his wife Jessica are very active with the youth and families of the church. Miguel is seeking the Lord's leading for future ministry in the BFC since 2011 is the last year of his internship.

- **Daughter Church Planting** – This year God has raised new interest among our churches to plant daughter churches. The **Newark, DE and Harleysville, PA churches** are both investigating daughter church planting. **Ron Smith from Newark and Scott Wright from Harleysville** are heading up these investigations. Meetings with the **Capital Region** of churches have begun to discuss and look into daughter church planting and the **Lehigh Valley Region** is discussing daughter church planting.
- I chaired the **Joint Committee on Ethnic Church Planting** this past year. The committee continues its focus on Hispanic church planting and desires to work with all people groups and assimilating them into the BFC. A Merida Task Force is working with the church in Merida, Mexico. Plans are in place to assist Merida with planting daughter churches from the Merida church. A town by the name of Villa Magna has been targeted for a BFC church plant. *The Biblical Principles for Living* has been translated into Spanish. *The Articles of Faith* are also in Spanish and both are available. I held several conversations this past year with some foreign missionaries about church planting and connection with the BFC. I served again this past year on the **Ministerial Candidate Committee** and have enjoyed working with the new men coming into the BFC.

PROJECTIONS FOR 2011 IN CHURCH EXTENSION

- **The DELMARVA Project**
Milford/Camden, Long Neck DE – We have discontinued our efforts to plant a church in Milford, DE but have maintained a presence in the area with a weekly Bible study. Ray Bertolet will continue his interim position as pastor of the Camden, DE, BFC and assist Church Extension with various projects. We will work with the elders of the Camden church and look for the Lord's leading in assisting this church as well as assisting the Long Neck, DE church until it is able to call a pastor.
Newark, DE – The Newark, DE BFC is investigating a daughter church plant in South Smyrna with Ron Smith heading

the investigation. We will focus most of our DELMARVA efforts of planting on this daughter church from Newark.

- **Hispanic Church Planting**

La Roca - Reading, PA Hispanic Church Plant – I will continue my coaching of both Carlos and Miguel and assist them with the mission's growth in terms of monitoring the facility needs, facilitating the program, and developing the mission toward graduation. I will counsel with Miguel about his future ministry with the BFC after this year's internship ends.

El Faro - Allentown, PA Hispanic Church Plant – This year Mark Morrison and I will aggressively work with the El Faro TLT and Pastor Ramos to assist them in reaching their goals of becoming a particular church in the BFC. Ariel Suero is still being considered as an intern to assist Pastor Ramos.

Merida, Mexico – I will be working closely with the Joint Committee on Ethnic Church Planting and Pastor Ramirez to facilitate the Merida church's vision to plant daughter churches, particularly in Villa Magna near Merida. I will also investigate with the Merida church the possibility of establishing a Church Planting Training Center at the Merida church.

Capital Region, PA – Church Extension and the Ethnic Committee began discussions with the Capitol Region regarding the possibility of a Hispanic church plant in the Capital Region.

- **Daughter Church Planting**

Capitol Region – I am encouraging the region to consider a daughter church planting project.

Newark, DE – The Newark, DE BFC is investigating a daughter church plant (see above).

Metro Region – I will revisit discussions with the Metro Region about a church plant in South Amboy, NJ.

Harleysville/Buxmont Region – I will be assisting Scott Wright and the Harleysville church and hopefully some churches of the region in investigating a daughter church plant in the Trooper/Audubon, PA areas.

Lehigh Valley Region – Tim Zuck is dialoguing with the pastors of the Lehigh Valley about a daughter church plant. I will monitor these discussions to see how Church Extension can assist.

- **Connectional Projects**

Grace Fellowship Church, Harrisburg, PA – I will continue working with the leaders at Grace and develop a plan for graduation into the BFC.

- **Recruitment**

Cape May Court House, NJ – We will continue our efforts to confirm and call a church planter to Cape May.

DELMARVA – We will look to call Ron Smith for planting in South Smyrna, DE and Scott Wright for planting in Trooper/Audubon, PA.

Hispanic – Depending on how the Capital Region moves ahead in their approval of a plant in the region, we may need to recruit a Hispanic planter in 2011-12.

- **Church Planting Academy**

We have developed a number of training opportunities for our planters. Yearly, we hold two all-day *Training Days*, three *Church Planters' Roundtables*, a regular *Coaches Corner Newsletter*, and the distribution of *various materials and books*. I would like to begin planning for a Church Planters Academy. This would be for current planters and anyone in the BFC or outside the BFC who would be interested in learning more about church planting and becoming a church planter with the BFC.

- **Graduation Preparations**

I will be assisting with the final steps for graduating and releasing the Woodbury Heights, NJ and Hellertown, PA mission churches. Mark Barninger and the East/West Hanover Township, PA TLT have informed me that the mission church will begin its graduation preparations for 2012. I will be assisting the Hanover mission church with the plan for graduation that will include scheduling their assessments at the end of the year.

- **Facility Needs**

Two plants are searching for new meeting places if they continue their current growth rate. I will be assisting Hellertown, PA and East/West Hanover Township, PA with counsel and with the financial considerations. We may also be searching for launch facilities in the proposed new sites of South Smyrna, DE and Trooper/Audubon, PA.

- **Development**

The Development Committee will be working on several projects in 2011: first, the organization and planning of a thank you dinner for donors who give generously to the Mission; second, further development of our relationship with the Mennonite Foundation in seeking ways to increase our invested funds; third, seeking a retired individual with investment expertise to assist me with donor follow-up and communication.

- **Frontier Concerns**

The BFC has three church frontiers: New England (Thompson, CT BFC), New Mexico (Las Cruces, NM) and Mexico (Merida, Mexico). These churches are far off and isolated from the BFC. Our vision in receiving these churches into the BFC was to cluster other BFC churches near these locations and form regions of several churches in each frontier site. We are doing this in Merida but have not made any efforts recently to cluster other churches near our New England and New Mexico sites. I will investigate how we might be able to plant other BFC churches in our frontier sites and form regions of BFC churches in these frontiers. God has given us these frontiers and we need to consider ways of better connecting with them.

- **Vision and Strategy Committee**

Our current Forward Plan, *Missions Here and Now* is due to end December 2011. The Vision and Strategy Committee will be working this year on a new *Forward Plan* for the Board of Church Extension to approve and recommend to the BFC Executive Board.

I am called to serve Christ and His Kingdom through the preaching and teaching of the Gospel and, at this time, as Director of Church Extension Ministries. It is a great and awesome privilege to serve such a gracious and almighty God.

I am concerned about the struggles that many of our churches are facing with their lack of finances, and now a number of our churches are without pastors and have little financial means to call a pastor full-time. This is a dilemma that more of our churches may face in the future when current pastors who are ministering bi-vocationally, or relying upon the income of their wives to support their ministry, will retire or move out of the church. Church Extension and I are committed to having the mission churches, who

are received into Conference from Church Extension, be fully self-supporting, equipped with a solid core of leaders and have an adequate group of committed members so that the church will be able to continue to grow and battle the attacks of the Devil. We are constantly looking for ways to strengthen our local churches.

I continue to hold to the following conviction: *all our churches must be unified in their doctrinal commitments to the Articles of Faith, engaged in trust and love for each other, and mobilized to accomplish our vision of being an expanding fellowship of churches through the planting of new churches.*

Pray for Church Extension in 2011. Pray for God to give us a mighty unction of His power to fulfill our charge and stand firm. Pray for our team: Assistant Director Mark Morrison, Assistant Church Planter Ray Bertolet, Administrative Assistant Lisa Christensen, Bookkeeper Ruth Richards, Special Projects Coordinator Carol Snyder, and our Aquila & Priscilla teams and many volunteers. Pray for *your* church planters and their families who serve the BFC; and finally, pray for me as I direct this vital mission.

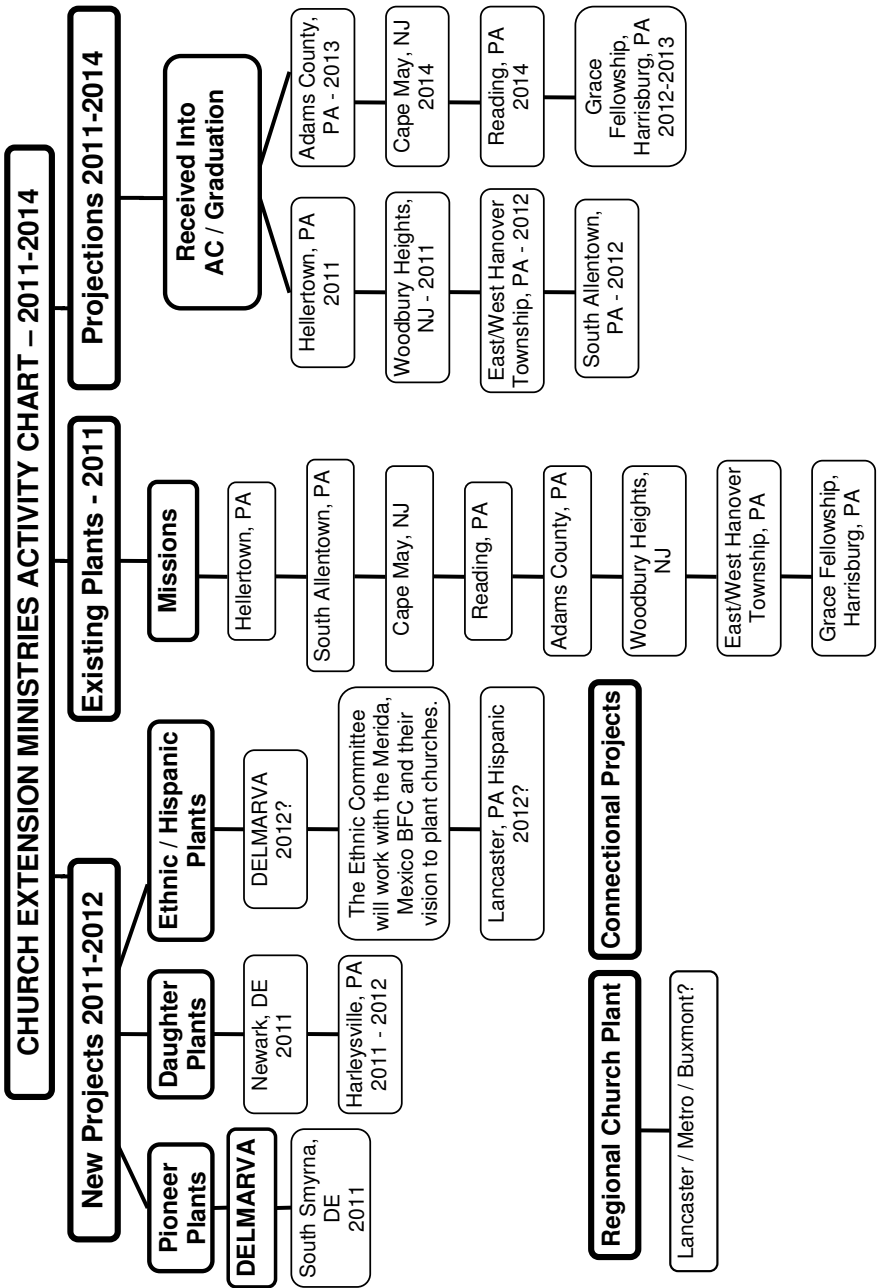

Report of the Committee on Arrangements

The Committee on Arrangements for the 128th BFC Conference met three times during the Conference year in fulfillment of its mandate. The purpose of the committee continues to be to review the mechanics and efficiency of each conference as well as assist in providing hospitality. Any suggestions on what can be done to better accomplish the above are graciously received.

The Committee worked closely with the Agenda and Program Committee under the direction of the BFC Exec.Bd in preparing a new look and agenda for this year's Conference. The goal is to continue to do the work of the BFC while, at the same time, provide spiritually uplifting and challenging messages as well as opportunities to celebrate together and to enjoy the unity we have in Jesus Christ and as BFC leaders. The Monday evening's starting time, focus and address by the BFC Executive Director, along with a guest speaker for the rest of the conference are examples of some of these changes. Report of the Committee on Credentials

The Lord has faithfully provided pulpit supply and interim pastoral ministry in each of these churches. But pray for God's provision for a pastor called according to our rules for each church.

Conference Pastor Ronald C. Mahurin has completed his tenth year of service in this strategic office. The committee expresses its appreciation for his faithful service to our ministering brethren.

The committee reminds our churches of two resource booklets: **Guidelines for the Pastoral Relations Committee**, and **Guidelines for the Pastoral Search Committee**. Copies are available from the chairman.

The Committee makes the following recommendation to the 128th BFC Conference:

Resolved, that the recommended minimum salary for a BFC Pastor in the U.S. be \$34,000 for 2011, and further,

Resolved, that in addition to his salary, the church must provide half of the pastor's Social Security tax, parsonage and/or housing allowance (which would include utilities, repair costs, etc.), health insurance, and provision should be made for reimbursement for allowable car and professional expenses. The church must also contribute a minimum of 3% of the pastor's salary for retirement to the ministers' annuity fund, plus an additional 1% match if the pastor is voluntarily contributing 1%.

During the year, Jacob Susek resigned from the committee because he is not currently pastoring a church. The committee thanks Jake for his friendship, fellowship, and years of service on the committee as secretary.

Report of the Board of Church Health

The Board of Church Health met three times this past year...to interact about YOU...our local churches. It is our desire to encourage you, understand your needs, and help you maintain your health so that the BFC can continue to grow strong in the Lord.

This year members of our Board visited with the elders of local churches to discuss each church's ministry and health. Board members also visited with the pastors of two other churches for updates on their ministries. Their evaluations and reports on those visits were shared with the rest of the Board of Church Health and we are maintaining contact with these pastors and elders for ongoing support.

Executive Director of the BFC, David T. Allen, has met with us several times and has been a significant help in our work. His observations and encouragement have been invaluable.

The leadership of Calvary BFC in Walnutport has requested the input of the Board this year. We are currently working with the Walnutport church and other sister churches within reasonable driving area to support them in their efforts. One other church in our fellowship underwent a self-study with Natural Church Development this past year with Rev. Carl Shank. We encourage all of our churches to consider this self-evaluation and will assist them in doing so if the cost is prohibitive.

We found that the Ministerial Convention with Mark Devers ("IX Marks of a Healthy Church") was profitable and valuable for promoting strong church health in the BFC. Our thanks goes to the Ministerial Convention Committee for making this seminar possible.

The goal of the Board of Church Health is to interact with at least four churches a year in order to assist with their evaluation and provide input to encourage their growth and health. A healthy small church? A healthy large church? We are finding that health is not necessarily commensurate with numbers...but it is our goal to help each church accomplish the goals and purposes the Lord has given them.

After many years of faithful service, Dr. Ronald W. Reed has resigned from the Board due to other responsibilities. Also Gerald D. Rasmus resigned for similar employment reasons.

Continue to pray for your Board of Church Health as we seek to provide all of our fellowships with encouragement, counsel, and support in the year ahead.

Report of the Joint Committee on Ethnic Church Planting

The Joint Committee met numerous times during 2010 to assist and promote BFC Ethnic Church planting with its main focus on Hispanic church planting. We remain dependent on the work of the Spirit for direction: “not by might nor by power, but by My Spirit, says the Lord of hosts.”

For El Faro, our first Hispanic Church plant in Allentown under Pastor Elliot H. Ramos’ direction, 2010 has been a year of numerical growth as well as growth in their financial giving and church outreach. A community outreach, Light in the Park, was held and 220 attended. Men are being trained to be leaders in their homes, at church and in their community. Pray that the Lord will provide two elders from this group of nine men as plans are underway which will, with the Lord’s enabling, eventually lead to Lighthouse graduating from Church Extension.

The La Roca Hispanic Church in Reading under the direction of Pastor Carlos G. Rodriguez is also doing very well. Attendance has increased to a point where 130 to 140 people weekly attend the worship services. Eleven were baptized last year. Miguel Gonzalez is functioning as an assistant and youth pastor and has been a great encouragement with the work there. He passed his oral examination on the *Articles of Faith* and is now a Probationer ready for a call.

The Ethnic Committee continues to spend the majority of its time mentoring the La Roca BFC in Merida, Mexico. Alfred G. Roberts, a member of the Merida Task Force, led a group of four from Faith BFC along with Ethnic Committee member Phil Yerrington in September to teach and encourage leadership and also encourage the church membership in the support of the leadership program. Brother Roberts reported the overall impression is the Merida Church is doing well. The Leadership Class was completed and six of the nine students satisfactorily finished the course. Two of the three that did not finish the course plan to retake the course. Brother Roberts, subsequently, has recommended that in view of the progress made by the leadership training at Merida, the ownership should be transferred from the Harleysville Church to the local Merida Church.

The committee’s other concern for La Roca and Marcos G. Ramirez, the pastor of La Roca, is how can we help Brother

Marcos plant daughter churches near Merida? Does the La Roca Church qualify as a healthy church and will they need financial help? Three families have already volunteered to commit to the church planting movement along with Brother Marcos. Three potential areas for the church plants have been suggested. The Task Force has been dealing with these questions and has expressed confidence in Brother Marcos' leadership ability. A motion by the committee was passed to confer on Brother Marcos the title of Coordinator of Church Planting. David E. Gundrum has forwarded information to Brother Marcos to help him in his determination of what is needed in the Church plant at the Villa Magna Project. Also included was information on the evaluation of the candidate to be considered for the mission pastor of Villa Magna. Director Gundrum would like to meet with Brother Marcos as soon as possible to discuss church planting.

Pastor Dave N. Schoen visited Merida in April from the 16th to the 19th and met with Brother Marcos and finalized arrangements for the Bethel BFC puppet team's arrival. The Team came in July to train and integrate the teens of both churches in the puppet ministry which was presented successfully from July 16 to 31st.

Note: The Ethnic Committee has designated Dave K. Schlonecker as the contact person for any ministry trips to Merida by our churches. Please contact Brother Schlonecker first if you are planning a trip to Merida.

The Committee's translation team is awaiting corrections following the initial printing of the BPL's. A translation service is being checked out.

Finally, we see the need to continue to encourage the BFC churches to reach out to the increasing number of ethnic people groups. Recent statistics show that Latino allegiance to Catholicism is waning and moving to other Christian churches or to no religious affiliation. What's happening is that Latino religious affiliation is being "Americanized" and people claiming no religion at all has doubled. This presents not only an opportunity but also a challenge for His Church to reach the lost people in our land.

Report of the Board of Pensions

2010 Review and Status *(figures rounded for simplicity):*

The total of Ministers' Retirement Fund (MRF) annuity payments to beneficiaries in 2010 was \$186,300 (compared to \$196,000 in 2009 and \$201,700 in 2008): see Statement of Cash Receipts and Disbursements. This is the fourth year that the total disbursements have declined. There are 7 future beneficiaries of the MRF, the youngest of which will begin receiving benefits at age 65 in the year 2013. There were four beneficiaries who went home to the Lord in 2010, and survivor benefits are being paid to the widows, if applicable. Based on the current mortality assumptions, the final year of MRF payments to beneficiaries is projected to be 2035. Between now and then, it is estimated that the MRF will distribute future benefits totaling nearly \$2,600,000.

As anticipated, during 2010, the Net Assets in the MRF decreased by \$26,600 due to disbursements exceeding receipts. The MRF had adequate cash reserves to fund this shortfall.

Annual Funding:

As a result of the BFC transition to the new BFC Exec.Bd format and the conference-wide assessment that began in 2010, there were no contributions from the individual churches to the MRF. Beginning in 2011, the Exec.Bd plans to fund the Board of Pensions on a monthly "pay as you go" basis in an amount roughly equal to each month's payments to beneficiaries. There should be no need in the future to issue any BOP Notes.

403(b) Plan:

Refer to the 2009 *Yearbook* for details. No changes in IRS requirements for 2011.

Planned Giving:

The benefits of planned giving were clearly evident in 2008 by way of the receipt of the bequest of \$225,000. The Board of

Pensions urges other members of the BFC to consider including the MRF in their estate planning arrangements. The simplest and most tax efficient method would be to name the MRF as a contingent or primary beneficiary (for married or singles, respectively) of a *portion* of an IRA or 403(b) account. This arrangement can be adjusted or revoked at any time, and does not involve changing one's Will. For more information, please contact the BFC Executive Director.

Administration:

The Board of Pensions and BFC Exec.Bd express their appreciation to Pension Plan Administrator, Rick Volpe of Asset Planning Services, for his faithful service to the Board of Pensions.

Whereas, cost-of-living adjustments no longer apply to MRF payments, be it
Resolved, that the MRF annuity rate for calendar year 2012 be \$221 per year of service.

2. **Whereas**, the administrative system adopted by the 126th Annual Conference provides means for ongoing administration of the MAF and MRF through the Executive Board of the Bible Fellowship Church, therefore be it
Revolved, that the Board of Pensions be dissolved as of the 128th BFC Conference, and be it, and further
Resolved, that all responsibilities previously assigned to the

Board of Pensions become the responsibility of the BFC Executive Board.

3. **Whereas**, Richard Volpe has provided administrative services for the Board of Pensions since the inception of the Board of Pensions, therefore be it

Resolved, that we express our appreciation to Richard Volpe for his expert and faithful service on behalf of the Board of Pensions.

4. Resolution Relating to Rental/Housing Allowances for Retired or Disabled Ministers of this Conference **for Calendar Year 2012**

Whereas, the religious denomination known as The Bible Fellowship Church has and functions through Ministers of the Gospel who are duly ordained or licensed; and

Whereas, the practice of The Bible Fellowship Church is to provide a parsonage or a rental allowance as part of the gross compensation for each of its active ordained or licensed ministers; and

Whereas, pensions paid to retired and disabled ordained or licensed ministers of The Bible Fellowship Church are considered as deferred compensation and are paid to said retired and disabled ordained or licensed ministers in consideration of previous, active service; and

Whereas, the Internal Revenue Service has recognized that The Bible Fellowship Church is the appropriate organization to designate a housing/rental allowance for retired and disabled ordained or licensed ministers who are members of this Conference;

Resolved,

1. An amount equal to 100% of the pension payments received during the year of **2012** be and is hereby designated as a rental/housing allowance for each retired and disabled ordained or licensed minister of The Bible

Fellowship Church who is or was a member of the Bible Fellowship Church Minister's Retirement Fund.

2. This rental/housing allowance shall apply to each retired and disabled ordained or licensed minister who has been granted the retired relationship or placed on disability leave by the Bible Fellowship Annual Conference and whose name and relationship to the conference is recorded in the *Yearbook* of the Annual Conference of the Bible Fellowship Church and in other appropriate records maintained by the conference.

3. The pension payment to which this rental/housing allowance applies shall be the pension payment resulting from all service of such retired or disabled ordained or licensed minister from all employment by any local church, Annual Conference or institution of The Bible Fellowship Church or of any former denomination that is now a part of The Bible Fellowship Church, or from any other employer who employed the minister to perform services related to the ministry and who elected to make contributions to the pension funds of The Bible Fellowship Church for such retired minister's pension.

Note: The rental/housing allowance which may be excluded from a minister's gross income is limited to the lesser of (1) the amount of the rental/housing allowance designated by the minister's employer or other appropriate body, (2) the amount actually expended by the minister to provide his or her housing, or (3) the legally-determined fair rental value of the parsonage or other housing provided. As specified in Rev. Rul. 71-290 C.B. 92, "the only amount that will qualify for exclusion under section 107(2) of the Code as a 'rental allowance' is an amount equal to the fair rental value of the home, including furnishings and appurtenances such as a garage, plus the cost of utilities."

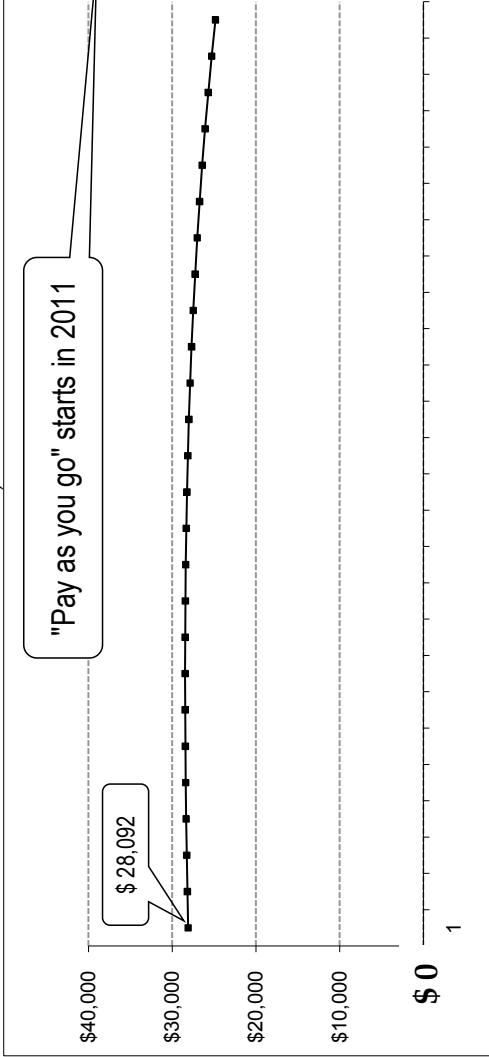

And He rolled up the scroll and give it back to the attendant and sat down. And the eyes of all in the synagogue were fixed on Him. And He said: "Today this Scripture has been fulfilled in your hearing. Luke 4:20f

There are several things to take note of from the above passage: our Lord in the synagogue setting; reading the Scriptures; the declaration of the fulfillment of the Isaiah passage; and the scroll from which He read. Report of the Board of Christian Education

“We sailed slowly for a number of days and arrived with difficulty off Cnidus, and as the wind did not allow us to go farther, we sailed under the lee of Crete off Salmone. Coasting along it with difficulty, we came to a place called Fair Havens, near which was the city of Lasea.” (Acts 27:7-8 ESV)

There are times in our lives, individually and corporately, when “all the wind seems to go out of our sails” and we find ourselves “coasting along with difficulty.” Such has been the experience of our committee this past year.

As of the date of this report, our committee has met three times since our previous report (to the 127th annual meeting of the BFC Conference). After much discussion about our proper role at this point in BFC history, we felt that a significant milestone was reached at our second meeting when we reached a solid consensus and passed the following motion:

Resolved, for the next two years the BFC Board of Christian Education will

- Develop a curriculum based on the BFC *Articles of Faith* and *Biblical Principles for Living* (BPL’s);
- Develop or provide recommendations for other materials compatible with the BFC *Articles of Faith* and BPL’s (a forum or clearinghouse).

A subsequent motion was then passed to seek contracts with two individuals: 1) a primary contract “to develop BFC compatible Adult Curriculum and develop a website and resource clearinghouse,” and 2) a secondary contract “to develop BFC compatible Children’s Curriculum.” Two very capable and highly motivated individuals were found to fill these two positions, and some initial progress was made. But then our fortunes changed and the Adult Curriculum developer had to cease his work for us. Whereas we had stated that our committee’s final approval of the Adult Curriculum was to be the initiation point for the children’s version, the entire curriculum-writing process ground to a halt.

As we enter the new year, our committee is praying for wisdom, searching for another competent and highly motivated Adult Curriculum writer, evaluating other possible options and assignments for our committee, and staying in touch with the BFC Executive Director for advice. We hope to meet again this Spring to set our strategy so that we can “catch the wind in our sails” and bless the entire BFC in whatever ways God may lead us.

Report of the BFC Executive Board

The Executive Board of the Bible Fellowship Church provided leadership for the BFC during 2010. This was the first year of operations with a full-time functioning office and Executive Director. Several items were foundational for the Executive Board's consideration during the year. From an operational standpoint, the consolidation of various office processes and procedures, the establishment of standards for Directors and staff, the process of establishing common financial reporting, and the formation of policies that enforce a higher level of accountability amongst the Departments and BFC Committees have begun in earnest. We are grateful to Fellowship Community for graciously providing a place for the Executive Board to call its official 'headquarters.' Besides giving us a 'home,' they also provide the venue for our monthly meetings. The office staff at Church Extension Ministries, Lisa Christensen and Ruth Richards, also headquartered at Fellowship Community, collects our mail and safeguards it for us. The Board of Missions has given up a corner office at its location on Brookside Road in Allentown, so that the Executive Director would have a place to work, meet with people, and conduct business. This venue has provided for us a better connectivity with our 'web-master,' Donald E. Kuntzman, and provided a receptionist, Carolyn Bloomfield, for the official BFC Executive Board telephone. The serendipitous nature of these accommodations has been expressed in the Executive Director's blog found on the BFC website.

During the year, each one of our four Department Directors met with the whole Executive Board to discuss the status of their Departments. Individually and collectively, the Directors met with the Executive Director to discuss issues relative to their Departments and the BFC as a whole. We give thanks to God for the men He has provided to give leadership to our Departments:

Dana E. Weller, Board of Missions, connecting regularly with our missionaries and our churches;

David E. Gundrum, Church Extension Ministries, working with individual church planters, churches under their care, and our existing churches by providing direction and vision;

Daniel P. Allen, Pinebrook Bible Conference, promoting,

directing, and advancing retreats and our own Bible conference ministry;

Douglas Manwiller, Victory Valley Camp, also directing and advancing our children's camping ministry.

These men have graciously and gracefully submitted themselves to our new denominational structure and have joined together to serve Christ with passion and excellence. Whereas they had previously submitted to their individual boards, now they worked together with their boards to execute the directives of the Executive Board. They willingly complied with the requests of the Executive Director without an expression of annoyance!

From a financial perspective, 2010 was the first year of consolidating, collecting, and allocating the Assessment among the various fiscal responsibilities of the BFC. We are grateful that all of our churches participated in the Assessment and that we were able to pay all of our obligations on time. The majority of the Assessment is allocated to the Pension Fund so that our retired pastors and widows of retired pastors would have some remuneration that reflected their service and ministry within the BFC. Because cost of living adjustments (COLA) have become static, the Executive Board has been able to assume the responsibility of continuing to fund the pensions through the Assessment. Although our annual contribution will continue to rise a small amount over the next few years, we are confident that we can continue to provide this benefit without having to borrow money or place an undo burden upon our churches.

The Executive Board has continued to coordinate the financial reporting and accountability of our Departments and committees. In order to establish a standard to use throughout the BFC, we have begun the process of joining the Evangelical Council for Financial Accountability (ECFA). This decision has shaped our processes and encouraged us to provide exceptional levels of accountability within the Denomination. Several new policies were established in order to ensure that we are 'above reproach' in all of our financial dealings. We are consolidating the finances within the BFC so that these standards can be met. Our Departments report to the Executive Board monthly, and we review their financial situations at each meeting. We have had to step out and help one of our Departments this year so that it would be able to pay its obligations. We are grateful that one of our churches was willing to assist us in this effort. In order to comply with ECFA's standards, we have

engaged the firm of Buckno Lisicky & Company of Allentown to do an official ‘review’ of our financial situation. As a result, the accounts of the Executive Board, all four of our Departments (Board of Missions, Church Extension, Pinebrook, Victory Valley), as well as Pinebrook Educational Foundation and the Pension Fund, will be combined into Statements of Financial Position and Activities in accordance with ECFA standards.

The Executive Board has developed a Directors’ Handbook which is an employee handbook which assures that all of our Directors and ultimately our entire staff are treated fairly and justly. The handbook is available to our churches should they wish to utilize it. It is also accessible on our info.bfc.org website. This particular website is password protected and designed for the benefit of our pastors and elders. It contains our policies, handbooks, expense reporting forms, assessment forms, updates on procedures, healthcare, and other information that is helpful to our churches. The password is available to pastors and elders, but it is not given to hackers or others for whom the information would not be pertinent. Our www.bfc.org website is available to the general public and contains the latest editions of BFC materials. The official calendar of the BFC is found on the website.

One of the concerns of the Executive Board was the high number of IRS EIN’s (Employer Identification Numbers) that were under the name of the Bible Fellowship Church. Upon receiving legal counsel that we should reduce that number to a more manageable level, the Executive Board put into process the consolidation of several of our Departments. The Executive Board has the responsibility of payroll and other interfaces with the IRS. As of January 1, 2011, this was accomplished and several of the EIN’s have now been retired.

Another legal consideration was the publishing of the Bible Fellowship Church in the IRS Publication 78 which lists recognized charitable organizations. What seemed simple was in actuality an arduous process, but the BFC is now included within the Publication. The IRS had recognized our Denomination since 1960 when it confirmed our status under the provisions of section 501(c)(3) of the IRS Code of 1954. Just as a reminder, our exemption can be revoked if we attempt to “influence legislation, or participate in any political campaign on behalf of any candidate for public office.” So we won’t!

The officers of the Executive Board are Randall A Grossman, President; Robert A. Sloan, Vice President; Jay H. Fasnacht, Treasurer; and Ronald L. Kohl, Secretary. Charles Lavigna is the Health Insurance Coordinator. The Executive Board has retained:

The American Insurance Group as Health Insurance Administrators,

The firm of Fitzpatrick, Lentz, and Bubba as our legal representatives,

Asset Planning Services as our Pension Fund administrators,

Brotherhood Mutual Insurance Company as the preferred church liability insurers, and

American Bank of the Lehigh Valley as the depository of its funds.

Internally, L. James Roberts, Stephen J. Kauffman, and Robert H. Zentz serve as the Personnel Committee, while Dennis M. Cahill, Jay H. Fasnacht, and Charles A. Lavigna serve as the Finance Committee for the Executive Board.

The business of the Executive Board in 2010 included receiving requests from the Departments for ratification of their individual board members, reviewing and approving departmental budgets, meeting separately with each Director, and approving and/or clarifying new initiatives of the Departments. In an effort to support our particular churches, we provided funding for a pastoral internship, postponed several repayments of loans, and provided several churches with guidance regarding core values and vision. The Executive Board looked carefully at our fixed assets and decided to sell the Church Extension parsonage to the Director of Church Extension.

The Executive Board spent a considerable amount of time discussing our Core Values and their ramifications for the BFC. We believe that these represent principles, standards, and qualities to which we are committed. They lie at the heart of what we are and define our identity. Because we desire to get them right, we continue to discuss and refine them and are not yet finished! They presently are:

1. We Value the Bible

The Bible is our final authority for life and living. It undergirds all that we believe and do. Our doctrine and principles of living, stated in the *F&O* of the BFC, express our understanding of the Bible. Therefore, we continue to make

sure that our churches conform to the clear teaching of the Bible as expressed in the “Articles of Faith of the Bible Fellowship Church.”

2. We Value Worship of God/Fellowship with God

Our purpose is to worship God. Through Christ's atoning work, we have fellowship with God, allowing us the privilege of bringing glory and praise to God. In prayer, we indicate our dependent relationship and communion with God. Our fellowship with God transforms us so that in daily life we conduct ourselves with Christ-like integrity and love. Therefore, we emphasize these aspects of worship with God within our Denomination.

3. We Value Fellowship with God's People

Fellowship with God's people connects us as the body of Christ. Fellowship is evidenced by developing intentional loving relationships within each church and among the churches. Therefore, we encourage our churches to nurture deeper fellowship within each church, and provide opportunities for our churches to meet and minister together.

4. We Value the Church

The Church is the earthly manifestation of the body of Christ. Within a church preaching/teaching are used to make disciples of Jesus Christ. The church functions as an extended family, intentionally strengthening each individual and family unit, while developing servant leaders. Each member is to be involved in ministry, exercising spiritual gifts with excellence. Therefore, we support and assist our churches, which, although autonomous, are not independent, in accomplishing ministry.

5. We Value the Church's Mission

The Mission of the church is the Great Commission, a commitment to reaching the lost of the world with the Gospel of Jesus Christ and making disciples of all nations by baptizing and teaching them to obey the commandments of God. Therefore, we support and coordinate the efforts of our churches in making disciples of Jesus Christ both near and far.

These five core values are foundational for us in that they will

give us the base upon which we can build and establish a vision for the BFC. These statements reflect the Executive Board. The Executive Board has begun the discussion of vision and what we see as the future of the BFC. The completion of this process will provide direction for our Departments and our Denomination as together we become *an expanding fellowship of churches united to make disciples of Jesus Christ.*

The Executive Board is continuing to seek to streamline our denominational gatherings and make our time together as efficient and effective as possible. Legislation that will bring the BFC Committees in sync with the Departments will be presented to this BFC Conference. Second Reading on the functioning of the Departments will also be a part of this year's Conference. All of the Departments and committees under the auspices of the Executive Board have presented their financial reports which will be included in this year's report of the Executive Board. Consolidating this information will enable us to spend more time at BFC Conference to develop areas that will enable us to better serve our Lord. We have asked Dr. Daniel Henderson of "Strategic Renewal" to lead us in times of prayer and petition as we seek God's guidance and direction. He will guide us through a period of personal renewal, teach us about congregational revival, and encourage us towards leadership restoration, all through our prayer life.

The Executive Board brings the following resolutions for consideration:

1. **Resolved**, that the 2011 revised Executive Board budget be adopted by the 128th BFC Conference.
2. **Resolved**, that an assessment rate of 2 percent be approved by the 128th BFC Conference for 2012 (based on assessable receipts for 2010).
3. **Resolved**, that the 2012 proposed Executive Board budget be adopted by the 128th BFC Conference.

After establishing a corporate office and headquarters for the BFC, the Executive Director attended board meetings of each of our Departments, meetings of the committees that report to the Executive Board, and several other denominational committee meetings, all with a desire to understand the workings of the various aspects of the BFC. He represented the Denomination at building

dedications and mortgage burning ceremonies. He visited twenty-one of our churches, several of them on more than one occasion, and had the opportunity to preach, give official greetings, or just enjoy the service, as requested by the pastor, all with the goal of maintaining positive and enriching relationships within the BFC. He assisted several church elder boards in renewing their core values and establishing a vision for future ministry. He provided for the Executive Board the information requested, and created policies and processes for consideration and ultimate adoption. He met with lawyers, accountants, bankers, real estate agents, insurance agents, and other corporate heads in an effort to coordinate the activities of the BFC. He directed the daily operations of the Executive Board and oversaw the integration of common policies and processes among the Departments. He connected with the treasurers and bookkeepers of our churches in order to help in the Assessment process. In short, the Executive Director considered it a privilege to serve our Lord and the BFC in this capacity and appreciated the support from both the members of the Executive Board and his fellow workers within the BFC. May we, individually and collectively, as *beloved brothers, be steadfast, immovable, always abounding in the work of the Lord knowing that in the Lord your labor is not in vain!* (1 Cor 15:58 - ESV)

Composition and Election

Section 1 - Establishment and Purpose

The Pinebrook Educational Foundation was established as a division of the Bible Fellowship Church (“Church”) on October 18, 1994. The purpose of the Pinebrook Educational Foundation is to continue the ministry of Pinebrook Junior College (formerly Berean Bible School) to aid Christian

individuals involved in higher education and Christian post-secondary institutions (“Purpose”). Said Purpose will be construed broadly enough to include a wide spectrum of aid projects involving Christian post-secondary education, including but not limited to scholarship aid to students and grants to Christian post-secondary institutions.

Section 2 - Overview

The Pinebrook Educational Foundation shall receive, invest, and administer funds (“Funds”) in accordance with its stated Purpose, and such funds shall be designated for such Purpose, segregated from the general funds of the Church, and administered and distributed by the Pinebrook Educational Foundation’s Board of Directors (“Foundation Board”) in conformity with said Purpose. Emphasis and priority will be given to individuals attending Christian institutions and to higher education endeavors closely related to the *BFC*. Special consideration shall be given to educational organizations with which the BFC Executive Board has affiliations (as referenced in §512-5.4(3) of the *F&O*).

Section 3 - Control

A. Election and Composition of the Foundation Board

The Pinebrook Educational Foundation shall be directed by the Foundation Board composed of six members (“Board Members”) elected by the **Pinebrook Educational Foundation** and subject to ratification by the **BFC Executive Board**. Board Members shall be elected in three classes and shall serve three-year terms of service. The three classes shall be composed of two Board Members each. Each Board Member shall serve until a successor is duly elected.

B. Accountability

The Foundation Board shall be accountable to the **BFC Executive Board**. The Foundation Board shall administer all activities and investments of Pinebrook Educational Foundation to ensure that all such activities and investments are financially and legally appropriate with respect to the status of Pinebrook Educational Foundation. The Foundation Board shall report semi-annually to the **BFC Executive Board** and shall report annually to the BFC Conference.

C. Officers of the Foundation Board

The Foundation Board shall elect annually from its number: a Chairperson, a Vice-Chairperson, and a Secretary-Treasurer.

Section 4 - Administration

A. Director/Chairperson of the Pinebrook Educational Foundation

1. An ~~Executive~~ Director of Pinebrook Educational Foundation (“~~Executive~~ Director”) may be selected by the Foundation Board and ratified by the **BFC Executive Board**. The position may be paid or unpaid as determined by the **BFC Executive Board**.
2. The ~~Executive~~ Director shall not be required to be a member of the Foundation Board or the **BFC Executive Board**. Membership on one of these boards will not, however, disqualify an individual from serving as ~~Executive~~ Director. The ~~Executive~~ Director shall not be an officer of the Pinebrook Educational Foundation.
3. The ~~Executive~~ Director shall be responsible for the orderly conduct of the business of the Pinebrook Educational Foundation. Such duties as administration of the grant and scholarship application process, oversight of all financial activities, investments, administrative procedures, and communication shall be the responsibility of the ~~Executive~~ Director. The ~~Executive~~ Director shall consult with the Foundation Board’s Chairperson regarding general administration matters and with both the Chairperson and Secretary-Treasurer of the Foundation Board regarding financial matters.
4. If a ~~an Executive~~ Director has not been selected by the Foundation Board, the Foundation Board’s Chairperson shall be responsible for the conduct of the business of the Pinebrook Educational Foundation and shall perform the duties identified in paragraph 3 above.

B. Foundation Secretary

1. The Secretary of the Pinebrook Educational Foundation shall be selected by the Foundation Board subject to approval by the **BFC Executive Board**.

2. The Secretary shall report to and assist the ~~Executive~~ Director (or Chairperson of the Foundation Board if a ~~an Executive~~ Director has not been selected by the Foundation Board).
3. The Secretary shall be a volunteer or a part-time employee until the Pinebrook Educational Foundation activity requires more assistance and additional funding is available for fulltime compensation, as shall be determined by the Foundation Board.
4. The compensation (if any) of the Secretary shall be determined by the Foundation Board and shall be subject to approval by the **BFC Executive Board**.

C. Auxiliary Groups

Support groups previously affiliated with Pinebrook Junior College such as the Alumni Association may be encouraged to continue in existence or to be reactivated. The assistance of such support groups may be sought in raising funds and in providing other assistance to the Pinebrook Educational Foundation.

D. Administration of Funds

1. Pinebrook Educational Foundation Funds shall:
 - (a) be segregated from the general funds of the Church;
 - (b) be separately invested and administered by the Foundation Board; and
 - (c) not be disbursed for any purpose other than the Purpose of the Pinebrook Educational Foundation.
2. A professional investment firm or counselor may be chosen by the Foundation Board to carry out the investment of Pinebrook Educational Foundation Funds. Risk levels and investment criteria shall be determined by the Foundation Board and approved by the **BFC Executive Board**.
3. The Pinebrook Educational Foundation may be the transferee of funds:
 - (a) existing Pinebrook Junior College endowment funds;
 - (b) donations or bequests to, and annuity arrangements made for the benefit of Pinebrook Junior College (or the Berean Bible School);

- (c) grants from foundations;
 - (d) proceeds from general and endowment investments; and
 - (e) other sources acceptable with respect to the tax-exempt status of the Church.
4. Funds shall be used to disburse grants, scholarships and/or loans in accordance with the Purpose of Pinebrook Educational Foundation and to pay administrative costs of the Pinebrook Educational Foundation.
- a. The Foundation Board shall formulate rules for the administration of all Funds. These shall be subject to review by the **BFC Executive Board**.
 - b. Administrative costs shall be paid from the General Fund (as defined in Section 5 herein) subject to the approval of the Foundation Board and review by the **BFC Executive Board**.

Section 5 - Aid Projects/Designated Accounts

- A. The Pinebrook Educational Foundation shall be structured to include many types of aid to Christian higher education in accordance with its purpose. Specific programs of aid shall be designated by the Foundation Board as separately administered endowment or current gift “funds” or “accounts” (“Designated Accounts”) within the Foundation.
- B. A donation identified by a donor for the support of a specific Designated Account shall be used to fund such Designated Account. Designated Account Funds shall be expended by the Foundation Board in furtherance of the specific aid project(s) for which the Designated Account has been established.
- C. Undesignated donations shall go to a General Fund from which administrative costs shall be paid and Board directed grants, loans and scholarships shall be made.
- D. Donors shall be encouraged to contribute to Designated Accounts set up as endowments in order to insure a continuous stream of proceeds for the future. However, donations to Designated Accounts which expend non-endowment restricted (“current gift”) funds are also

- encouraged.
- E. Additionally, sizable initial gifts may be used to establish a Designated Account (as an endowment or current gift fund) of the donor's choosing, subject to Foundation Board approval.
 - F. There shall be compliance with donor limitations and/or restrictions on Funds received from (or donated, bequeathed, etc. to or for the benefit of) Pinebrook Junior College.

Section 6 - Miscellaneous Regulations

A. Bylaws

The Bylaws of the Foundation Board may be amended by majority vote of the total membership of the Foundation Board at a regular or special meeting.

B. General

The Foundation Board shall be empowered to adopt policies and regulations in addition to its Bylaws. Such policies and regulations must be in conformity with the *F&O* of the *BFC* and within the rules, decisions, and directives of the *BFC* Conference.

C. Quorum

Four Board Members attending a duly announced meeting of the Foundation Board shall constitute a quorum. Unless otherwise specified, a majority vote shall mean a simple majority of those attending any meeting of the Foundation Board in which there is a quorum.

- 12. **Resolved**, that 512-13 "Board of Church Health" be changed to 511-3 "Church Health Committee" and that the same change of terms be implemented throughout the *F&O*.
- 13. **Resolved**, that Duty 11 of the Board of Church Health be deleted.
- 14. **Resolved**, that 512-11 "Credentials Committee" be changed to 511-5 "Ministerial Credentials Committee" and that the same change of Terms be implemented throughout the *F&O*.
- 15. **Resolved**, that 508 "Agencies of *BFC* Conference" be

replaced with 512 - BFC Departments as follows:

- 512 -1 The BFC, both through its particular churches and the BFC Conference, may enter in to joint endeavors to further the cause of Christ in the world. Concerns such as church-planting and cross-cultural missions, education and publication, camps and conferences are addressed more effectively by working together than by working alone.
- 512-2 In order to work together in these joint endeavors, the BFC Conference shall establish departments. The departments shall perform as the servants of the Bible Fellowship Church, shall operate in accordance with the guidelines of the BFC Conference, and shall be directly accountable to the BFC Executive Board.
- 512-3 Each department shall be headed by a department director. The department director is appointed by the BFC Executive Board, who shall implement and oversee a program which will advance the goals fo the department. The department director is overseen by the BFC Executive Director.
- 512-4 Each department is served by a department board, which shall assist the department director in achieving the goals of the department. The department board is elected internally, subject to the ratification of the BFC Executive Board. The number and terms of office for each department board is established in its bylaws.
- 512-5 Each department shall administer its own finances in conformity with policy approved by BFC Conference. Budgeting, fundraising, and auditing will be overseen by the BFC Executive Board. All gift annuities established by the departments shall be approved by the BFC Executive Board and reported annually.
- 512-6 All funds administered by the departments are held in trust for the BFC Conference. All real estate properties used by the departments are owned by the Bible Fellowship Church.
- 512-7 Each department shall submit an annual written report to the BFC Executive Board, which will in turn report annually to the BFC Conference on the status of each department.

16. **Resolved**, that 512-8 “Board of Pinebrook Bible Conference” add duty (7) as follows:
“It shall submit an annual written report to the BFC Executive Board..”
17. **Resolved**, that 512-2 “Board of Bible Fellowship Church Homes, Inc.” be deleted.
18. **Resolved**, that 513 “Miscellaneous Bylaws of BFC Conference” 513-2 be amended as follows:

The tenure of **persons appointed or** elected to study committees created for a specific assignment shall continue until the completion of the specific assignment. Vacancies due to death, resignation, or other crises shall be filled by further **appointments or elections**.

Report of the Board of Missions

And Jesus, walking by the Sea of Galilee, saw two brothers, Simon called Peter, and Andrew his brother, casting a net into the sea; for they were fishermen. Then He said to them, "Follow Me, and I will make you fishers of men." They immediately left their nets and followed Him. Going on from there, He saw two other brothers, James the son of Zebedee, and John his brother, in the boat with Zebedee their father, mending their nets. He called them, and immediately they left the boat and their father, and followed Him.

Mark 4:18-22 (NKJV)

In this passage from *Mark*, Jesus is beginning His Galilean ministry. His path has taken Him beside the sea where some fishermen are actively at work. It is likely in the morning, maybe shortly after daybreak. The men fishing are trying to get their final catch for the day before the sun warms the water and the fish head for cooler, deeper water. The seashore is a busy place at this time of day. Merchants are arriving to buy fish to be sold in their shops in the nearby towns. Bystanders are there as well, curious to see what kind and how many fish have been caught. Some fathers with their young sons have been there from daybreak as well, teaching their sons the nuances of fishing and building memories. Likely, later in the day, back at home, some tales of the big fish that got away will be told with much gusto and animation.

Into this scene walks Jesus. He exchanges pleasant-morning-greetings with many he passes. He threads his way among the people bypassing old rotted hulls of boats that will never sail again. Jesus, too, enjoys the crispness of the morning and the unique aroma of salty fishy sea air. He passes a number of fishing boats anchored on the shore, and then stops where Simon and his brother are casting their nets into the sea. Jesus calls to them "Follow Me ...". Immediately, Simon and Andrew leave their nets, their boat, and the fish they caught, and follow Jesus.

A short distance further along the shore, Jesus sees two other brothers James and John. They are mending nets with their father, Zebedee, and some hired hands. Zebedee has a successful fishing business and is pleased that his sons Simon and John have learned

the fishing trade. They will carry on the business when Zebedee is old and unsteady and hence no longer able to venture out onto the water. Again, Jesus stops, and this time calls to Zebedee's sons. ["Follow Me."] Immediately, James and John leave their father, their friends, and the family business and follow Jesus.

Immediately. No hesitation. No questioning. No qualifications. No looking back. Immediately. Four men would have their lives changed forever. They would impact their world, and ours, in an exponentially greater way than if they had remained fishermen. All because they said Yes to Jesus call to "Follow Me."

The members of the Board of Missions have the exciting and rewarding task of interviewing folks who also have said "Yes" to Jesus call to "Follow Me." Husbands and wives, newlyweds, young and middle-aged people, single ladies and men, all come to the Board of Missions to be approved as BFC missionary candidates, and in the process share their story as to how they heard Jesus "Follow Me" and they share the ministry vision that Jesus has laid on their heart.

Unexpectedly, a married mother whose children are grown hears Jesus "Follow Me." She comes to the Board of Missions to tell her story. A friend had asked her to assist briefly with a small task associated with an international ministry. As she actively pursues the task given her, she becomes aware of the great impact this ministry has around the world. She is busy with many other responsibilities in her life, but her interest in and love for this new ministry keeps growing. One day she dreams ... what could happen in my world, with my friends, at my church, in my city if I ... [Her "Follow Me"]. As she shares her story during her interview with the Board her excitement and enthusiasm are unbounded.

A middle-aged man and his wife come to share their story. He is a successful business man, an entrepreneur. He knows how to start and manage businesses successfully. Over time he becomes aware of the challenges and poverty facing many small and emerging countries around the world. He realizes God has given him the business and people skills which could be used to help men and families in these 3rd world countries start and run their own business and thus reduce the cycle of poverty. [His "Follow Me"]. He can use his business background in practical ways making friends as he does and share his faith in the process. He and his wife know their life style will change but they both firmly believe

this is God's calling for them.

A man and his wife have successful careers doing work that they thoroughly enjoy and from which they receive a genuine sense of accomplishment. They have taken several short term missions trips with their church. The impact of these trips, seeing the fields that are ripe unto harvest, becomes their "Follow Me." But first they have to answer the question, 'Am I willing to give up the career I studied for and love?' They both independently conclude that they are certain of God's call on their lives to enter full time ministry. They apply to the Board of Missions to become BFC missionaries and share the details of their story.

These are just three of the stories the Board of Missions hears in a year. Each story is unique but at some point in the missionary applicant's story, you will recognize Jesus call to "Follow Me".

The Board of Missions

The purpose of the BFC Board of Missions is to assist the local BFC to fulfill the Great Commission of Christ. This is accomplished by directing and promoting the missions programs as well as selecting, overseeing, and caring for the missionaries of the BFC, in cooperation with the local church and sending mission agency. The scope of this work extends to all the world, to all people groups, and to present and future generations.

The Board of Missions is composed of twelve members; namely, Dana E. Weller, Director; Donald Kuntzman, Associate Director, Ralph M. Soper, Chairman; Thomas P. Shorb, Vice Chairman; Daniel Oswald, Financial Secretary; Robert W. Davies, Secretary, Donald E. Faust, Sue Figard, Kevin W. Kirkpatrick, Kim Stengele, Craig Tress, Philip E. Yerrington.

The Board of Missions Staff

Below is a list of the services provided by the staff of the Board of Missions:

1. Missionary Care

The Staff is available and willing to meet with those considering missionary service and with BFC missionaries who need advice or counsel regarding their ministry. Visits to fields of ministry

are undertaken to assist and encourage our missionaries as needs and opportunities arise. Part of this missionary care includes communicating with over 40 mission sending boards under which the BFC's over 150 adult missionaries serve. This communication includes being an advocate for each of the BFC missionaries.

2. Seminars

The Board of Missions offers a host of informational resources to BFC churches.

- **Design Your Impact Workshop** – This five-hour seminar enables church leaders to discover their congregation's key characteristics and resources (their DNA) and move toward identifying a strategic missions focus that can unleash a powerful, new, global dynamic from their church.
- **Knowing Gods Will Seminars** are conducted each year on a denominational level at a fall Retreat Within a Retreat (RWR) held at Pinebrook. This information is also useful as a weekend course for a youth group in a local church setting.
- **P.O.M. (Parents of Missionary) Retreats** – This weekend retreat seminar is designed to keep the parents of our missionaries on track with the ministry of their sons and daughters (and grandchildren) overseas.
- **Culture Link Seminars** is a program that prepares your short-term missionary teams to be fully prepared for ministry. This is a necessary seminar for any church serious about getting the most from a cross-cultural experience.
- **Speaker Resource** – The office personnel remain available for mission emphasis in local congregations. This includes all stated public worship services, Sunday School, mission conferences, and special events. The office also provides a complete listing on our website (see #3) of our missionaries that are currently available for your missionary event needs.
- **Mentoring Services** are available to assist a church's board

of elders and missions committee in developing a comprehensive, long range, and balanced outreach plan that uses every member in God's global cause.

- **Short-term Planning Advice and Assistance** is designed to help you and your church partner with your missionaries. Chris Merrick (Short-Term Projects Coordinator) and Nelson Randolph Short-Term Partnership Coordinator) will assist with short term missions trip planning.

3. **Prayer Calendar**

This publication provides current prayer information for your congregation. The new format is an attractive, readable prayer aid and is offered to churches at a reduced rate. Nearly 1900 are sent out each month.

4. **Board of Missions Website**

The Board of Missions website is quickly becoming a focal point of information for everyone interested in missions within the BFC. This site continues to grow with useful information for the church leadership and anyone seeking God's direction for possible service through the Board of Missions. Personal support needs and biographical information are continually updated and available 24 hours a day. There are also helpful links for planning short-term or career missions involvement. The Board of Missions is now on 'facebook'. A Calendar of Events is provided with information concerning BFC missions related meetings and activities and includes a search by date function. You may log onto the site at www.bfcbom.org.

5. **Email Subscriber Lists**

- **Daily Prayer** is a daily e-mail that allows subscribers to view the Prayer Calendar request for the day, in addition to receiving up-to-the-minute news and prayer requests from the field.

- **Friday Prayer** is an in-depth prayer document produced each Friday and sent by e-mail. This communication, designed

for missionary-to-missionary contact, is also available to a select group of other prayer partners.

- **Tanzania Project Prayer Guide** is a monthly guide to promote the Tanzania Project.
- **“Let’s Fish”** is a newsletter, produced each Wednesday, and is designed to keep those interested in short-term missionary trips and possible career missionary involvement on the cutting edge. It is an outlet for the exchange of ideas, as well as prayer and ministry opportunities. This document enjoys a readership from ages fourteen years through adult, and includes pastors, missionaries, youth leaders, mission chair persons, laymen, and students. There is a readership of nearly 250 each week. A full archive is available on the BOARD OF MISSIONS website.

6. **May Missionary Rally**

This annual gathering of missionaries and BFC churches provides a world-wide panorama of missions, both local and overseas. It is an opportunity for networking and interaction among individuals as they endeavor to draw attention to God’s heart for the world in their churches. A children’s program for Kindergarten through 8th grade has become a successful part of this day. This year’s rally will be held Thursday May 12th, 2011 at the Lebanon BFC in Lebanon, PA.

7. **Missionary In-Residence at Pinebrook Bible Conference Summer Family Camp**

The Board of Missions provides a missionary family for each of the seven weeks of family camp to promote missions in the Bible Fellowship Denomination. Each week the campers have opportunity to interact with a missionary from the Bible Fellowship Church at a very personal level. Additionally, the missionaries have opportunities to present their ministries during public meetings.

8. Office Activities

The office remains the hub for donor and church information and financial processing. We compile and maintain all the necessary information to keep individuals and churches abreast of the financial needs of the entire missionary family. Receipting of financial donations is meticulously recorded for both the donor's and the missionary's records. At the end of each month checks are sent by the Board of Missions to each sending board for the amount of monies received for each BFC missionary serving under that board. Addresses and birthdays are kept up to date and extensive planning is undertaken for the annual Missions Rally.

The Board is especially thankful for the dedication and commitment of the Board of Missions Staff as they faithfully carry out their many daily tasks and responsibilities.

Report of the Conference Pastor

Even a casual reading of the Pauline Epistles will reveal the apostle Paul's great love for the lost and for the church. One such expression of his love is found in his prayer for the church of Ephesus:

For this reason I bow my knees before the Father, from whom every family in heaven and on earth derives its name, that He would grant you, according to the riches of His glory, to be strengthened with power through His Spirit in the inner man, so that Christ may dwell in your hearts through faith; and that you, being rooted and grounded in love, may be able to comprehend with all the saints what is the breadth and length and height and depth, and to know the love of Christ which surpasses knowledge, that you may be filled up to all the fullness of God. Now to Him who is able to do far more abundantly beyond all that we ask or think, according to the power that works within us, to Him be the glory in the church and in Christ Jesus to all generations forever and ever. Amen.” Ephesians 3:14-21 b

Report of Pinebrook Bible Conference

I will open my mouth in a parable . . . things that we have heard and known, that our fathers have told us. We will not hide them from their children, but tell to the coming generation the glorious deeds of the Lord, and His might, and the wonders that He has done. Psalm 78:2-4 (ESV)

Everybody loves a good story. From early childhood nursery rhymes to tomes reserved for pool-side during vacation we love to read and hear stories. This is why television and movies are so popular. And the genius of both is that the story can be told in a relative short period of time - disaster, resolution, case solved, everyone lives happily-ever-after - all in 60-minutes minus way too many commercials.

The greatest story book of all time is the Bible. It is chocked-full of historical events and parables that can be told to the youngest of children (i.e. Adam & Eve, baby Moses in the bulrushes, baby Jesus born in a stable) and confounds the best educated (redemption). When it comes to Christians, like the Psalmist notes for the Jews, our challenge is to continue to tell these inspired stories to each generation.

The unique thing about the story of redemption is that it didn't end with the Gospel. Oh, the act of redemption did, but the stories of those coming to a realization of that redemption, our Savior dying on the cross for our sin, and the acceptance of that gift of eternal life continue everyday. These stories not only thrill, but warm the heart, and I must admit, produces a tear or two from every believer.

Pinebrook Bible Conference has an ongoing story to tell as well. Although there are many facets to the story - some good, some bad - and we will share some of these within this report, one should never lose sight of Pinebrook's purpose and the ongoing story of redemption that takes place on these grounds week in and week out. For instance, did you hear the story of the ten Hispanic boys from our South Allentown church who "happened" to be at Pinebrook during Sno Glo this year. A scholarship gift was given to allow these inner-city youths to attend. During the break-out session after one of the keynote addresses, the Gospel was clearly presented and each one of them, all ten, made a profession of faith

by prayer to Jesus Christ! I never tire of hearing these stories. Whether it's the senior who wrote me recently about his conversion on these grounds in August of 1935 or the newborns from Sno Glo, each one is a testimony of God's grace. Despite the challenges that confront us with and at Pinebrook, may we never lose sight of the stories of redemption and what God is doing at this place. What a tragedy it would be to lose such a place.

2010 Recap

Last year started out in the plus column. Coming off a very good 2009 campaign with good camper day numbers (a camper day equals 4-hours or more on the grounds), the prospect for the year was high. And the first half of the year proved this to be correct with a 14% increase in camper days going into June. That is when the faucet was turned off, so to speak. Although our numbers were up for the first half of the year, finances were running very close to the vest. We discovered later that this was a result of fewer deposits for upcoming retreats. In fact, summer and fall were, in our business, a disaster. Retreats canceled and many that came did so with fewer guests.

The result of this was several fold. First, it was a huge discouragement to the staff and for the plans of Pinebrook. We thought we had weathered the economic storm and were on solid ground. Wasting no time we developed the *Steps to the Summit* plan of renovating and adding more amenities. This came to a crashing halt before the summer ended. Secondly, we were forced to borrow money from the BFC Executive Board and one of our churches. Despite the fact that this is now the second time we've had to do this during my tenure, it is never easy. We are grateful for the Board of Missions, Fellowship Community, Lebanon BFC and the BFC Executive Board for their assistance over the past 7 years. Fortunately, during the "fat" time we were able to pay off several loans and decreased our indebtedness so that our present indebtedness is about the same as it was last year at this time.

One other fall-out from this situation, several part-time and one full-time staff members were let go, hours were reduced for other part-timers as well as many full-time staff members being asked to take non-paid furloughs. I appreciate the attitude of the staff. These are folks who are committed to the Lord and feel a sense of calling to be here. God has blessed them - to Him be all praise.

Again, the problem is not with the expenditure side of the budget. It is with the income. My staff has done a commendable job keeping expenses down. However, this continues to hurt us as many projects have been put on hold until money is available. Not to mention that each staff member is working harder trying to pick-up the slack from those we had to let go. For instance, since the entire cleaning-crew was laid off, the rest of the staff has to do this cleaning. Some of what we should be doing, like our jobs, is not getting done because we are making beds, dusting, cleaning bathroom and vacuuming.

Since this recent downturn mimics what happened several years ago when the recession was new and since in recent days the phone has been “ringing off the hook” requesting retreat information, we are firmly convinced that this has been tied to the economy. As the economy appears to be growing it looks like Christian groups and churches are interested in again conducting retreats. This spring and summer, other than March, look like it will be much better than 2010. It’s too early to make predictions about the fall, but if the interest that has been shown is an indicator, we believe it too will be much better. Hopefully this, along with the other things we are doing will help us dig out of the 2010 hole.

We did not lay down and roll over when all this happened. In fact, we aggressively addressed the problem by hiring a full-time marketing consultant (retreat seeker and booker), have come up with package deals and discounts, are planning some new retreats and programs of our own and, with assistance from Bob Zentz, are redeveloping our development and marketing plan.

Sometimes the financial uncertainties crowd out the ongoing redemptive stories. Yet, despite the problems, there are still many positive things that are happening. Pinebrook’s retreats (Ladies Refresh♥Her, Senior Saints); the retreats co-sponsored with the BFC (Sno Glo, Young Adult, Missions, Hispanic); Summer Family Conference; and other events all have great stories to tell. The completion of Noel’s Nook Camp Fire Arena, which was dedicated each week during the 7-weeks of Summer Conference, will be a place, should the Lord tarry, were hundreds, maybe thousands of stories will be made related to redemption and sanctification.

2011 Prequel

As noted it appears our camper day numbers will exceed last year's numbers. We are also introducing some new things which should generate additional revenue and even more stories. Victory Mountain Mining Company Day Camp debuts in June. This is a summer program for local folks who wish to have their school-age children in a distinctively Christian and structured program during the work week. With Bible stories and teaching during the day, all sorts of activities, a hot lunch cooked over an open fire, weekly trips to various outdoor venues in the Poconos, plus great supervision, we believe this will be a fantastic program. We are grateful for Victory Valley Camp in allowing us to hire their former Day Camp Director, Dawn Schoen. It helps having someone with experience when starting a new program. We are hoping that this program and the summer conference will not intersect. Fortunately, we have plenty of property to keep the two separated.

The 7-weeks of Summer Bible Conference, with an even greater emphasis on families, and the theme: *The Amazing Grace Race* should be a lot of fun. We are trying to mix things up by revamping our schedule to be less "Bible Conference" driven which appears to be dying (when was the last time you went to a Bible Conference that had 2 services each morning, children's service after lunch, youth meeting before dinner, and possibly two speakers each evening . . . Mizpah Grove may be the correct answer). We will continue to have strong Bible teaching in the morning and evening, but plan to break out of the mold by having a cook-out for the Wednesday dinner, family fun time by the pond afterwards and, instead of the typical service in the Fellowship Hall, it will be held at Noel's Nook Camp Fire Arena (weather permitting). We are always open to suggestions as to how to make this even more family orientated.

Two new speakers are being introduced to Pinebrook - Dave Epstein (Conf. 4), pastor of Calvary Baptist Church in NYC and Andy Giessman (Conf.5), professor at BBC will join some of the regulars - Ron Blue (Conf. 2), Stanely Toussaint (Conf. 3), Donald Hubbard (Conf. 5) and Wendell Calder (Conf. 6). Coming back to Pinebrook after a lengthy absence is Dr. George Murray (Conf. 1). Sunday evening concerts feature some new and old. The outdoor concert with fireworks will take place July 3 and feature the Kings Army along with first-timers Paul Paoli Band. Charlotte Ritchie has

been invited back for the second year in a row. Two Sno Glo staples, Danny Oertli, guitarist, and David Dean, comedian, will minister during the fourth and fifth conference, respectively. Mark Cable (June 26) and Don Wyrzten (July 31) are back and one of Word of Life's favorite, Billy Spears, wraps up the concerts on August 7.

We are very excited about the interest Pastor Bob Sloan and Sinking Spring Church has shown in Pinebrook and one of the weeks. They are making a major effort to fill Conf. 5 and plan to have a very contemporary week. We also welcome the Piscataway Church which has adopted Conf. 4. Their worship team will be leading worship. Mark Barninger and the Grantville Church will be focusing on Conf. 1. Pastor David A. Thomann is the new Host Pastor for that week.

Pinebrook should be considered an extension of your ministry. During the summer it affords an opportunity to relax with your folks, spend time with them in an informal setting, and teach them outside of the confines of church. We typically have several baptismal services from the churches during the summer. What a great story that is for someone who may have just recently been converted. And, during the rest of the year with either our retreats, those sponsored by the BFC, or your own, Pinebrook is a place to get away from the hustle and bustle of life and the church to work on relationship building. Our York church conducts a marriage weekend each year. Pastor Keeler has been doing this for years.

The Board Room or Meadowbrook Lounge are available for Board or Elder Meetings and retreats. The Loft at Cedar Lodge is a beautiful apartment that is available to our pastors and missionaries **free-of-charge**. We hope you will take advantage of this lovely facility.

Pinebrook's Team

The list of employees and jobs are as follows: Matt Allen (Director of Food Services), Vonnie Allen (Dining Hall Manager), Jeremy Beichler (Director of Grounds & Facilities), Heather Devenezia (Registrar), Nate Heater (Maintenance), Jeremy Kellerman (Grounds, Paintball), Ann Lee (Bookstore & Office), Steve Rau (Director of Programming & Conference Host), Mike Stettler (Marketing Consultant), John Vandegriff (Director of Development & Marketing, Assistant to Director), Ruthie Vandegriff (Accounting). We also have a several part-time

workers that fill in as needed.

Volunteers also help in the make-up of Pinebrook. One group of volunteers is known as RWR (Retreat within a Retreat). These are folks, often church youth groups, who come for a weekend to work in the Dining Hall, Dish Room, Snack Shop and help us clean up around the grounds and clean-up after a group leaves. What a blessing it is to the staff at Pinebrook to have these groups come. It also saves Pinebrook thousands of dollars in wages we'd have to pay to part-time workers. There are also some groups that come either during the week or on a weekend to do special projects. The WooFoJeites from our Nazareth church came twice to chop down trees and cut/split wood for the wood burner, wood stove and fire places. A special "shout out" goes to the Ruch family which continues to supply plants and flowers from the Didden Greenhouses in Hatfield, PA. Since the BFC has owned and operated Pinebrook, the Ruchs, under the direction of Nell and Russ, have spearheaded a Flower Planting Day (this year it is June 11), to plant thousands of flowers. Without them and all the other friends who volunteer Pinebrook could not function!

The Pinebrook Board of Directors continues to give leadership, counsel and advice. They are working through the new paradigm of BFC leadership. With this in mind the Board has rewritten bylaws and manuals.

Pinebrook continues to partner with East Stroudsburg Christian Academy as well as several churches, one, of which (Bethel Pocono Christian Church), holds its weekly services in the White Chapel on Sunday and Wednesday. Another group has been conducting a Tuesday evening prayer meeting.

We hope that you will support Pinebrook in the following ways: (1) Prayer; (2) Help - labor, RWRs; (3) Encouragement; (4) Financial giving.

Conclusion

I'm not sure how many volumes it would take to contain all the stories from Pinebrook. Any place that has been in existence as long as we have (78-years since founding or 43 since BFC purchased Pinebrook), with all the speakers and all the decisions, it's almost innumerable. Of course, the praise is not in the stories, or the people of the stories, but in the God behind the stories. As we like to say around here: "All to the Glory of God".

Report of Victory Valley Camp

The *Winter Weekends* saw an increase over last year. VVC also added a 4th week for Middle School age children. This year we are reintroducing our Core Challenge and one week of Venture Quest.

Dan Faust was hired as a full-time Program Director on September 1, 2010. Dan is no stranger to VVC. He spent two years as a counselor and then one year as Boys Head Counselor/Outpost Coordinator. In 2009 he served as the Summer Team Leader. Dan graduated from Grove City College in May as a pre-seminary major and married Heather in August. Dan is also a member of Grace BFC in Reading.

The Lord continues to provide financially through our programs, weekend retreats, group rentals, individual gifts and Church support. Being mindful of the economic environment, we have reduced the price of summer camp for 2011 to \$299.00 for a week. - **Dining Hall.** In the spring volunteers helped put a new metal roof on. In the fall, a drop ceiling was installed with improved lighting.

Report of the Study Committee: Kingdom of God

The Kingdom of God Study Committee met five times since the 127th meeting of the BFC Conference.

During the course of the year we continued to study the issue and receive presentations from the various Committee members. Our plan of study has been to focus on the area of large agreement over the already/not yet nature of the kingdom. It has been our hope that this will help us avoid some of the complex issues related to differing hermeneutics of Covenant and Dispensational theology which sometimes arise within discussions of the kingdom of God.

In our first meeting this year, Calvin T. Reed presented work on the role of Christ as the Second Adam and the importance of the three aspects of the Kingdom: God's eternal reign, His present reign and His future reign. It was determined that, with this common ground-work, different members would study different aspects of the Kingdom and its relevance to ministry. We agreed that there was a broad unity on the Committee over these three aspects of the Kingdom.

At our second meeting, we continued to receive presentations from Committee members. Timothy J. Bertolet introduced some work he was beginning on how *Genesis 1-3* lays a foundation for the Kingdom in the First Adam. Davis E. Duggins presented work on the role of the Holy Spirit as related to the Kingdom. Richard B. Ravis presented his work on the historic creeds and the conception of the Kingdom in them. John C. Studenroth presented on the missional aspects of the Kingdom of God starting with *Titus 3:4* and the use of the word *philanthrōpia*. We also began to make plans for a theological seminar at Fellowship Manor to present our work to the wider BFC.

At our third meeting, Timothy J. Bertolet presented a paper "*Genesis 1-3* as the Foundation for the Kingdom of God." He proposed that just as Christ ministers His Kingdom-bearing three offices of prophet, priest and king, so also Adam, created in the image of God, was shaped to be the tri-fold office bearer. We laid the groundwork for our seminar agreeing that the morning sessions would be exegetical work and the afternoon sessions would be practical theology. We discussed the present aspects of the Kingdom but also the necessity of the Millennial Reign as part of the process of the unfolding of the Kingdom. We agreed that the Millennial Reign must advance the present aspects of the Kingdom rather than return to a pre-church form of the Kingdom.

In our fourth meeting, we presented and discussed the work we would share at the conference.

On February 17, 2010, at Fellowship Manor, the Study Committee led a seminar series: “A Fresh Look at the Kingdom of God” as part of the Fellowship Bible Institute’s Ministry Leadership Seminar. The first session presented by Timothy J. Bertolet was a paper “An Overview of the Kingdom of God in the New Testament.” The paper argued that Jesus clearly brought the Kingdom of God by inaugurating it. The New Testament expects future aspects to be fulfilled, but it also clearly sees a present aspect beginning in Jesus’ ministry and being inaugurated in Christ’s coronation as Davidic king on the throne of David at his ascension into Heaven. The second session was entitled “The Second Adam and the Image of God as It Relates to God’s Kingdom” presented by Calvin T. Reed. It argued that because Christ is established as the Second Adam the Millennial Rule must come. Christ’s people are also recreated to bear the image of Christ’s rule and those now redeemed are being renewed in the various aspects of that image. The afternoon session was entitled “Practical Implications for Living as Citizens of the Kingdom of God.” Richard B. Ravis led a presentation and discussion of the role of mercy ministries as an outworking of the reign of God. Michael D. Roberts presented on the relationships between culture, politics and the kingdom of God. John C. Studenroth presented on the significance of the Kingdom of God for evangelism and discipleship.

Our desire is to make this material available to the wider-BFC so that they might benefit from the work of the Study Committee. We are distributing DVDs to the churches of the BFC conference. These DVDs contain the video recordings of the presentations along with PDF copies of the papers and handouts from the seminars. We would encourage the churches to familiarize themselves with the issues related to the Kingdom of God through the usage of these materials.

Our final meeting was to prepare our presentations to the BFC conference.

Our plan is to propose an article on the Kingdom of God at the 129th BFC Conference.

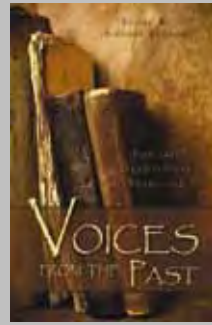
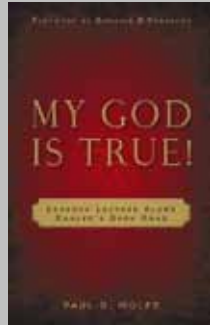
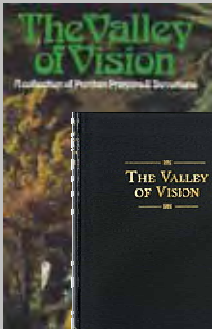

Historical Perspective

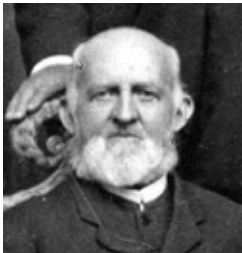
28th Annual Conference
100 Hundred Years Ago
by Richard Taylor, Archivist

Pastor J. C. Roth arrived early to be sure everything was in place and ready. The churches he served would host the 28th Annual Conference of the Mennonite Brethren in Christ. He knew the door would soon open and through it would come his fellow pastors and delegates. Some would come by horse and carriage. Some would arrive on the train and walk the half mile distance to the church. Some had arrived the day before and had already enjoyed the host congregation's hospitality. At 8:00 a.m., on Thursday morning, October 12, 1911, they all converged at 618 Walnut Street in Royersford, PA where the Mennonite Brethren in Christ Temple was located.



The pastors had gathered on the day before for the 22nd Ministerial Convention. They listened to presentations on "Loyalty" and "The Church of Christ in These Perilous Days." They had enjoyed the time of praise and had thoroughly discussed the topics. They were eager learners.

The Conference began as it usually did with some singing followed by preaching from the Chairman, H. B. Musselman. They looked forward to these moments and took delight in filling the meeting room with their booming male voices and hearing a message from their leader. It was routine but wonderful nonetheless. The bar was established to include approximately 25 ordained men and 20 delegates.

When they were done with the opening, excuses were received. W. B. Musselman asked to be excused because of his duties at the Union Gospel Press. Lewis B. Taylor and George A. Campbell asked to be excused for health reasons.

L. B. Taylor was one of the old men and no longer active in the ministry. He had begun active ministry later in life at the age of 60 in 1894. He only served 6 years until 1900 but he was respected. His health had begun to fail.

G. A. Campbell was another veteran of the ministry. He had begun ministry at age 42 in 1887 and served until 1906. He was a veteran of another sort. He did not talk about it much but he had served in the Civil War. This was not something his pacifist Mennonite brothers appreciated. He had begun service in the 2nd Pennsylvania Heavy Artillery which was remobilized as an infantry unit. During an ill-fated attempt to capture Richmond, he was captured and taken as a prisoner of war to Salisbury, North Carolina, in September, 1864.

During an attempt at a mass escape in November of that year, George had been shot in the leg. He was finally released in February, 1865. During his convalescence at Annapolis, Maryland, a nurse shared the gospel with him and he trusted in Jesus. He had only served 6 months but his health was broken and he was never the same. For the rest of his life, he struggled with the after effects of what was then called catarrh, a respiratory weakness.

Both Taylor and Campbell would soon to answer another roll. Twelve days later, Taylor died at age 77 on October 24, 1911. Thirty days later, Campbell joined him ending his days of warfare with poor health on November 11, 1911 at age 66. Both had sent their regrets at not being able to join the brethren but at the time none knew the shortness of their days.

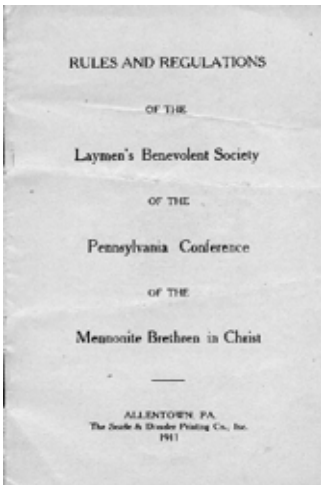
The Conference moved through its early business. Much of it was routine but the men were serious about the work. Committees were appointed. Minutes were reviewed. Ministries were evaluated.

The Presiding Elders gave their reports. W. G. Gehman reported the purchase of lots in Nazareth and Easton. Building work had begun. The Philadelphia Church at 11th and Ontario was now self-supporting. And the Camp Meeting at Shamokin had been “glorious.” The more subdued H. B. Musselman reported that the Mizpah Camp Meeting had been the biggest ever in only its second year, 153 and 165 tents. The last week was “the most harmonious and glorious we ever held.”

Horace A. Kauffman was recommended for ordination. He surprised them all later when he asked that it be postponed. He had “not had the privilege to prove his ability as a pastor in the church according to the discipline.” The conference allowed him to wait.

H. B. Musselman reported on his trip to Indiana where he went to represent the Pennsylvania Conference at the Indiana Conference. Each of the scattered conferences met each year and on occasion visited each other. They were now preparing for the General Conference when the delegates of all the conferences met together. They were scheduled to meet in Bethlehem, Pennsylvania, in 1912. The Pennsylvania Conference was the larger of the conferences and had in years past supplied pastors to the other conferences such as the three Lambert brothers who relocated to the Midwest to fill pulpits there. Musselman noted “the promising young men in their conference, who, if they devote all their time and talents to the work of the Lord, shall be a great blessing to the work...” He also noted “that all their deliberations were with freedom and he was shown due courtesy throughout the Conference...”

On Saturday morning, they were able to take up the request of the Royersford Church to form a Laymen’s Benevolent Society. In earlier days, the church had been opposed to insurance, specifically



life insurance. To take an insurance policy was to deny the Lord’s ability to provide. However, the pastors had been permitted to form a Beneficiary Society for their needs. In 1899, they had organized to “aid those members of the society who may need help on account of sickness or death.” Why should the laymen not be permitted the same? The conference deliberated and finally gave approval. The delegates present were unanimous in joining the society and promising to encourage others at their churches to become a part as well.

The Conference decided to hold an open air meeting at 6:45 that evening at Third and Main Streets. The fiery J. G. Shireman was to preach. All members of the conference were to be present unless excused.

Sunday brought a full day of activity. At 9:45am, H. B. Musselman preached a “glorious” sermon. At 2:00pm, W. G. Gehman gave a “grand message.” At 6:45pm, a song service began after which C. H. Brunner preached. It was reported that “the evening service was also signally blessed of the Lord.” The

Bethlehem Male Quartet was a special addition to the afternoon and evening services. The church was filled to the door. Many had come from the other churches in spite of the rain.

On Monday morning, the Conference returned to its work. They discussed the several denominational publications they were publishing. They expressed appreciation for the “noble work” of the Gospel Workers Society in the printing task. They noted that the Gospel Banner “is being published on nice paper, with a clear type, and arranged in very appropriate departments, with very good reading matter...” They recommended the Gospel Messenger, which “is so beautifully and profusely and instructively illustrated and so helpfully classified and the columns filled with very appropriate reading matter for the various departments respectively,” be distributed in their Sunday Schools free of charge.

On Monday afternoon, after thanking the pastor and members of the Royersford and Spring City classes, they adjourned and went home. Some of the pastors were returning for another year of ministry at the congregation they served. Some had been reassigned to a new congregation which meant a week of packing and preparing to move to a new town. But they would all take up the work for another year and were prepared to continue until Jesus returns.
