





In Memoriam: John H. "Jack" Riggall January 19, 1917 – February 3, 2018

From agnostic to ardent follower of Jesus, John H. Riggall, known as "Jack," became the longest-living Bible Fellowship Church minister (101 years, 15 days). Born to an immigrant father (John H.) and mother (Maude B.), both of them first generation U.S. citizens from England, Jack Riggall grew up in Philadelphia at a time when gas street lamps were still used to illuminate the streets. In fact, his first job, at age seven, was to light those very lamps.

Riggall's questions about the existence of God were quelled when he seriously studied the intricacies of the universe. After attending the Episcopal Church, at age 16 Riggall met the Savior at the Salem Mennonite Brethren in Christ Church (now Maple Glen BFC) in North Philadelphia, where his mother had taken



the family to attend worship services. At the church he also met Marianne McKnight, with whom he would spend 40–plus years in ministry together.

Their first foray into ministry was with a mission in the mountains of Kentucky, where he served among the poorest of the poor, teaching in a one room schoolhouse and riding horseback to several small churches. He helped a doctor deliver his first child on the kitchen table.

Four years later, the Gospel Herald Society welcomed him to a church in the Roxborough section of Philadelphia, where he served for two years. The Society's report to the 63rd Annual Conference noted the following about Jack: "He has been a great asset to the work here and is much beloved of his leader (H. D. Yarrington) as well as of the people. His wife and two children are splendidly associating themselves in the conducting of the mission and are a credit to the work of the Lord."

Riggall held charges in Staten Island, NY (four years), the Nazareth–Northampton circuit (eight years), Wallingford, PA (eight years, during which he moved the church from Chester), York (14 years, moving the church to the suburbs during his pastorate), and 1 ½ years in Ephrata, PA.

Riggall's first wife passed away from cancer while he was serving at York. Dorith (nèe Stoneback) Allen's husband, Russell T. (a former BFC pastor who at the time was pastoring Fellowship Church in Phillipsburg, NJ), was killed in an automobile accident in 1979. By God's grace, Jack and Dee (as she was now called) were brought together at Pinebrook Bible Conference, were united in marriage in 1981, and shared more than 30 years of ministry together. Dee passed away less than two months after Jack went to be with Jesus.

Jack served on various Boards and Committees of the BFC, most notably spending several years chairing both the Pinebrook Bible Conference and Ministerial Credentials Committee boards.

Riggall was known as a great talker and was conversant on a variety of topics, even until his dying days. He was passionate about Bible study and teaching God's Word. He was great at asking questions and challenging the prevailing view on a number of subjects.

Jack is survived by two sons and two stepsons: George G. (wife Marguerita) and Daniel J. (wife Fran) of Fairhope, AL and Kennebunk, ME, respectively; and David T. Allen (wife Donna) of Kutztown, PA and Daniel P. Allen (wife Vonnie) of Hatfield, PA. All are ministers: his sons are ordained in the Episcopal Church while his stepsons hold credentials with the BFC. He also leaves behind a daughter, Lois Fiorelli Erb (husband Ernest) of West Chester, PA, and two stepdaughters: Cheryl Smock (husband Jim) of Pottstown, PA, and Cherene Comick (husband Rudy) of Hope Mills, NC. Riggall's legacy also includes 19 grandchildren and 26 greatgrandchildren.

Musical worship was led by Mark E. Barninger with assistance from James Arcieri, Elliot H. Ramos, Richard B. Ravis, and Aaron J. Susek. Conference sang, "I Love Thy Kingdom, Lord" and "I Will Rise."

Keynote speaker William G. Schlonecker addressed the subject of "Expanding the Church by Church Planting," with Elliot H. Ramos serving as translator for Spanish-speaking attendees and those viewing Conference via live stream.

"This conference is one of both celebration and commemoration," Schlonecker said, noting that the reception of two new Particular Churches testifies to the multi-ethnic nature of growth in the Bible Fellowship Church.

He noted that Conference will hear six different "little stories" throughout the three days of BFC Conference from six different speakers. Taken together, they highlight the many different ways that church planting has taken place within the BFC. But Schlonecker noted that while each individual story boasts a different context, the focus needs to be on the "same bigger story" of God's faithfulness and guidance that has produced 70 years of Church Extension work.

Acts 9:31, this year's "theme text," provides a fitting framework for discussing the "Onward and Outward" nature of church planting. "So the church throughout all Judea and Galilee and Samaria had peace and was being built up. And walking in the fear of the Lord and in the comfort of the Holy Spirit, it multiplied."

The work of both planting churches and being churches that honor God is difficult because of growing opposition. Resistance to the growth of the church, Schlonecker said, comes from both outside and inside the church. Increasing secularism is a constant challenge from outside while apathy, Schlonecker noted, is one of the primary challenges from inside the church as we settle for being "nice churches."

"I'm tired of being a 'nice' church. I'm tired of preaching 'nice' sermons," Schlonecker said. "Because God doesn't call us to be nice. He calls us to engage our world with a radical Jesus."

The keynote speaker pointed to analogies from farming: from cultivating seeds and providing nourishment and sustenance as plants grow. "We need to cultivate and create an environment in which church planting can grow and thrive," he said. That begins with cultivating an image of a big God.

Schlonecker, making frequent references to the story of the early church as told in

Acts, cited several individuals from a variety of communities; in each case, they had been appointed by the Holy Spirit to eternal life. Each name he mentioned represented sheep that Jesus said He must bring. "Because Jesus must bring them also, it follows that we must go. We must be faithful in expanding our gospel to reaching new communities and territories," he said.

So why don't we go? What reasons are frequently given for our refusal to participate in the work of the gospel? Schlonecker noted a few: cynicism, unbelief, jaded attitudes. We need, he said, a view of a big God who is still in the ministries of soul-saving and church-establishing.

How big a God do we need to embrace in order to accomplish this gigantic mission? "A God big enough to attract a searching and skeptical world," Schlonecker described. "A God big enough to satisfy those who are desperately seeking something to quench their thirsty souls. Big enough to heal those whom the world has broken and caused to be disillusioned. Big enough to hold up to the skeptical scrutiny of those who grow up in what we call an LGBT world... A big God who stands up to the scrutiny that this generation, a young generation, brings to it."

We must also cultivate a desperate dependence on the Holy Spirit. Such a dependence, Schlonecker said, results in "endurance in the face of weariness, commitment in the face of opposition, and passion in the face of complacency."

"We need the comfort of the Holy Spirit to enable us in the hard work of both church planting and pastoring," Schlonecker said. He urged those in attendance to not fall prey to the "success snare" of nearby works that enjoy the hallmarks of what we normally call success while our ministries, by comparison, seem to be struggling. "I know it sounds like a cliché, but we need to stop looking around at everyone else and fix our eyes on Jesus," he stressed, adding that God alone determines growth and there will be many "success stories" in eternity of faithful pastors who spent their entire ministries serving in numerically small churches.

Finally, Schlonecker emphasized the paramount importance of prayer. "Leverage God's promises through prayer. Don't just talk about prayer; pray! Have your people pray. Lead your people in prayer. Pray with your people."

He concluded by thanking God for the work of church planting over the past 70 years, and then challenging Conference to a "renewed vision, renewed courage, and faith in a big God."

Following the keynote address, David E. Gundrum, Director of Church Extension Ministries, introduced recommendations to receive La Roca de Reading and Northern Lehigh as new particular churches of the BFC. Gundrum also noted that, after several years of working to help re-energize a struggling work in Long Neck, DE, that church has been released from Church Extension and is now standing vibrantly on its own, having grown from 12 members back to a congregation of over 80. "We believed that with God, nothing is impossible," Gundrum said. "We praise God that we can come here tonight and say that God is faithful."

Northern Lehigh, he noted, was the result of a vision that came from Whitehall to a church that had closed but was restarted, rebuilt, and now stands ready to graduate. La Roca de Reading, he explained, has grown from one Hispanic family of four – the Carlos G. Rodriguez family of Guadalajara, Mexico – who knew no one in Reading when they started but ministered to the city of Reading one person and one family at a time until the church was built over the course of 14 years.

Whereas, the Board of Church Extension has assessed the elder candidates and committed participants, and has reviewed the financial reports of La Roca de Reading and Northern Lehigh Bible Fellowship Mission Churches, and

<u>Whereas</u>, Church Extension affirms that both La Roca de Reading and Northern Lehigh Bible Fellowship Mission Churches each have sufficient men qualified to be elders, and a sufficient committed participant group who will sign as charter members of each church, and

<u>Whereas</u>, the financial reports of La Roca de Reading and Northern Lehigh Bible Fellowship Mission Churches have been reviewed, therefore be it

Resolved, that La Roca de Reading Mission Church and Northern Lehigh Mission Church be received into the BFC Conference, and be recognized as Particular Churches.

The motions to receive La Roca de Reading and Northern Lehigh BFC as new particular churches passed unanimously, and with enthusiasm. "We've got two new churches!" the Conference Moderator exclaimed

Both churches are, in a sense, daughter churches: Northern Lehigh from Whitehall, and La Roca de Reading from the churches of the Berks Region.

Aaron D. Smith, Pastor of Northern Lehigh BFC, asked the question many young parents have asked over untold generations: "When should we have a baby?" Smith applied this to Whitehall's decision to undertake replanting a church in Northern Lehigh.

"To do such an action as this requires faith. It requires sacrifice. It requires trials and difficulties," Smith said, noting that his family had to say goodbye to friends when the decision was made for Whitehall to undertake such a project and Smith was tabbed to be the church-planting pastor. The decision was made to close the existing church in Walnutport; the nucleus for the new church plant would come from the surviving members of the Walnutport church and a group that would make the move from Whitehall to Northern Lehigh.

After a summer VBS in 2013, a grand launch was held that October. At present, weekly attendance is around 70, and God has provided a former restaurant as the church's new home. The church's mission statement is one it still shares with Whitehall BFC: "Introducing ordinary people to extraordinary, every-growing life in Jesus our Savior."

Smith introduced Anthony Kutzler, whose former life of drug and alcohol addiction has been transformed through the gospel as presented by the ministry of Northern Lehigh BFC. "Thanks to grace, thanks to Jesus, I don't have to live in that sin anymore," he said. "That's pretty much what the church plant and God have done for me." Also addressing Conference was Northern Lehigh's delegate, Jason P. Musselman, a sixth generation BFC member whose roots date back to Bethel-Allentown and Cedar Crest.

Several representatives from the Northern Lehigh church family came forward and posed for a photograph as Conference applauded.

Pastor Carlos G. Rodriguez, with translating assistance from his son Diego Rodriguez, introduced the ministry at La Roca de Reading via verbal testimony and a multi-media presentation. "We are here to celebrate that, by the grace of God, La Roca de Reading is the first Spanish-speaking particular church in the U.S," he said.

"Thank God that He put it in the heart of the BFC to start Spanish-speaking churches. There is a lot of work to do," Pastor Rodriguez said, noting that census statistics suggest that by 2050, one out of every three residents of the United States could be Hispanic. He thanked many members of his family, praising God for the encouragement he has received. "Thank you for so much love and support all these years, even though you are very far away."

Many others, including several BFC pastors, received thanks for their help in leading to La Roca de Reading's reception as a particular church. Special thanks were given to Grace Bible Fellowship Church in Reading, which houses the La Roca congregation.

"Thank God for this beautiful family of the BFC," Pastor Rodriguez said. "And to finish, thank God for the church of La Roca de Reading. We have seen God's redeeming grace in many lives and families...We can all say that God is our rock."

William Lopez, a U.S. Navy veteran of two terms of service in Iraq who is one of La Roca's elders, testified to God's work in his life. He came to saving faith in 2004 as he came to know Pastor Rodriguez. "From then it's been a journey of picking up my cross and following Him."

Lopez praised God for ethnic church planting in the BFC. "I pray that one day there will be a Bible Fellowship Church in my hometown in Puerto Rico."

A worship team from La Roca de Reading led Conference in singing "At the Cross," first with traditional English musical stylings and then as a rousing number sung in Spanish and blended with "God is so Good." "I Will Call Upon the Lord" also received a peppy treatment in both Spanish and English.

Most of the La Roca congregation made the trip from Reading to Pinebrook to share in the celebration, making wide-angle photography necessary.

Richard E. Taylor, Chairman of the Department of Church Extension Ministries, closed the meeting in prayer at 9:05 p.m. after introducing longtime Church Extension Ministries director Daniel G. Ziegler (who is now a member of the Northern Lehigh congregation). Following adjournment, a reception in honor of the two new particular churches was held in Pinebrook's dining hall.

BFC Conference Proceedings - 2018 Second meeting

Tuesday, April 24, 2018, 8:45 A.M.

The Conference Moderator called the morning's first session to order at 8:45 a.m. as Carl J. Fischer Jr. prayed. Conference immediately engaged in praise of our great God as Mark E. Barninger and several pastor-accompanists led in the singing of "Praise to the Lord, the Almighty" and "Shout to the North."

Timothy J. Bertolet continued the theme of "Onward and Outward" by directing Conference's attention to Ephesians 4:11-16. His theme, "Building a Church with a Building," connects with the story of Faith BFC in York, a church that survived a painful split that caused the majority of the congregation to leave the BFC.

Bertolet, who has served as the York church's pastor since mid-2014, admitted he asked his congregation how to best describe York's pathway back to being a healthy BFC church. Their response to Bertolet was, "Tell them, 'God did the work."

How does God build a church? A thumbnail sketch of Acts reveals many instances where God used His Word to achieve His purposes. "God uses the Word to grow the church," Bertolet said. God used the ministry of the apostles to proclaim the life-giving gospel as they proclaimed the Word to build and build up the early church. "They stuck to the most basic thing of all: the preaching of the Word."

It is important to note that the Lord builds His church by ministering the Word through pastors. The New Testament highlights the delegation of responsibilities within the church so that pastors can focus on the ministry of the Word and of prayer.

"...the shepherds and teachers" in Ephesians 4, Bertolet noted, share one definite article. "These two things go hand-in-hand in the life of the body: shepherding God's people and teaching them the Word of God." The pastor is not to be a hireling but is instead called to shepherd the flock entrusted to his care. He best feeds his flock through the ministry of the Word of God, administering it to their particular needs and doing so carefully and compassionately because the shepherd knows his sheep.

A faithful pastor ministers to hurting people, as Bertolet and others did at York as the Lord bound up the wounds and dealt with lingering scars caused by the York church's fracture.

Ephesians 4:12 focuses on the role of pastor as equipper. His role is "to equip the saints for the work of ministry" so that the body of Christ may be built up. "Your goal and my goal, pastors, is to minister the gospel and to faithfully preach the Word of God."

At York, it was determined, very early in Bertolet's ministry, to hone in on the proclamation of God's Word. No nursery, no children's ministry, bare-bones music...but a strong emphasis on preaching. "We were going to focus on preaching the Word, and letting God do the rest," Bertolet said.

Finally, Bertolet reminded Conference that the Lord uses the Word, given to the people, to build the church into its union with Christ. The goal, Paul said in Ephesians

4:13, is the attainment of "the unity of the faith and of the knowledge of the Son of God, to mature manhood, to the measure of the stature of the fullness of Christ."

What does a built-up body look like? It looks like unity of the faith – a unity of "one Lord, one faith, one baptism" – that we are one in Christ; we know Him personally and are close to Him "in union and in communion." Doctrinal stability is another mark; a church that is built-up is not blown about by every wind of doctrine. "Doctrine matters," Bertolet stressed. And it looks like the church passing along faith to subsequent generations and training future pastors and missionaries for service, and then sending them out.

Joshua P. Miller led Conference in a "Concert of Prayer." He emphasized how often "boldness" accompanied the apostles. "We need to pray for boldness: that He would make us bold men." The time of corporate prayer concluded with the singing of "Rise Up, O Men of God."

After the morning break, Church Extension Ministries celebrated its 70th anniversary with a detailed presentation. David E. Gundrum, Director of Church Extension, introduced the current crop of BFC church planters. Church Extension has formally been part of who we are since 1948. Richard E. Taylor, who serves both as Director of Church Extension Ministries and as a church-planting mentor with Church Extension, said, "A 70th anniversary is a time to celebrate where we've been, celebrate where we're going, and to praise God."

Taylor provided a short review of our history, noting that evangelism and missions took precedence in our early years. "New churches were a by-product; they were not the intention," Taylor said. "They wanted to preach the gospel. They saw themselves as evangelists, and that's where the trajectory of our ministry took us. That's where we went"

The ministry of the Gospel Heralds, though they saw themselves as evangelists, led to the formation of several of our churches. "Churches were started because people were saved," Taylor explained. "That was the trajectory."

By the 1940s, however, denominational language began a shift using language like "extending the church." Church planting became intentional, and the Home Mission Board was formed to parallel the Foreign Missionary Board. The Home Mission Board's name was soon changed to Church Extension. "Here's the point: it's a subtle thing, but a very significant thing that happened 70 years ago," Taylor said. "New churches were no longer a by-product, but now it was the goal. We were not just evangelists; we were starting new churches."

Churches are started because church is the means, according to the Great Commission, of making disciples. "Seventy years and still growing," Taylor said. "And we are not done. We're still growing."

Gundrum cited three current areas of emphases in Church Extension: multiplication (churches planting churches; regions planting churches), connection (independent churches and church plants seeking BFC affiliation), and pioneering (starting new church plants in new geographical areas).

Nathan Brosius, Director of Operations of Pinebrook Bible Conference, greeted the pastors and delegates in his role as Conference Host.

BFC Conference Proceedings - 2018 Third meeting

Tuesday, April 24, 2018, 1:30 P.M.

The afternoon session was called to order as Daniel P. Allen prayed. Marcos G. Ramirez presented the afternoon address, "Building a Church Without a Building." In his message, Ramirez told the story of La Roca de Merida, our particular church in Mexico.

Hurricane Isidore, he explained, hit the Yucatan Peninsula in September, 2002, doing considerable damage to the church building where Ramirez serves as pastor. Some expressed concern following the destruction of their church building, but Ramirez explained, "The church isn't a building. It's a living body of disciples of the Lord Jesus. It cannot be destroyed, because the grace of God sustains it.

Returning to Ephesians 4:11-16, Ramirez drew Conference's attention to several spiritual truths. First, he noted that Jesus Christ has given ministers of the Word to His church. He provided servants, not techniques, Ramirez noted. "Christ equipped servants to carry out the ministry of the Word." While apostles provided essential leadership for the early church, the New Testament established the model for church leadership: elders and deacons, which the BFC continues to utilize today.

Training potential elders for ministry in the church played a key role in Merida's strengthening as leadership training. "God is faithful, and He gave us men," Ramirez said, noting that God brought prospective leaders through the probationary program and into active eldership. Providing for the church's shepherding needs is dependent on God, not on man. "I know the day when I am no longer active as a pastor, God will bring another one," Ramirez said.

The Lord gifts His church as He sees fit, and Scripture shows, again and again, that the ministry of the Word produces spiritual fruit. Paul refers to maturity and growth in Ephesians 4. The presence of spiritual maturity substantiates the presence of strong biblical teaching as those who are spiritually immature, when properly taught and shepherded, are not easily deceived by false teachers. The growth that Paul mentions in Ephesians 4 is primarily spiritual; the body grows as it "builds itself up in love."

"When I see my church, I understand that there is a long way ahead," Ramirez admitted, pointing out a few areas in which the Merida church has not yet attained spiritual maturity. But God is at work, he added, and progress is being made as God continues to act for the good of His people.

While the 134th BFC Conference adopted, at First Reading, a new Biblical Principle for Living on Prayer, interaction between Conference and the Study Committee resulted in a few minor changes which appear below in **bold**.

- 101-2.1 Prayer is a drawing near in our hearts to the living and triune God.¹ In prayer we express our praise² and thanksgiving³ to our sovereign God. We confess our sin⁴ and ask Him to give to us what we need and desire⁵ according to His will.
- 101-2.2 Prayer is the natural way that the child of God communicates with his heavenly Father.⁶ This relationship was formed because of the death and resurrection of Christ, by whom we have bold access to the Father.⁷ Without this union in Christ, we could never hope to speak to and be heard by the sovereign God of the universe.⁸ The believer's prayer, offered in the name of Jesus,⁹ by the power of the Holy Spirit,¹⁰ is a means of receiving the promises of God's Word.¹¹ While God may hear the prayer of an unbeliever,¹² the unbeliever has no assurance or guarantee that the Lord will answer his prayer.
- The Scriptures give much instruction on prayer. Jesus Himself **demonstrated the need for** prayer in his earthly **life and** ministry. **The Lord taught** His disciples a model prayer.¹³ In the model prayer Jesus revealed that the believer is privileged to address God as Father. Jesus taught that we should pray for God's name to be seen as holy. Jesus emphasized praying about the plan of God in the world. Jesus instructed believers to pray that their daily, physical needs would be met. Jesus also

instructed believers to pray that our sins be forgiven, temptation be avoided and the evil one be resisted.¹⁴

- 101-2.4 Prayer that is acceptable to God is not so much the right words but the right heart.¹⁵ This includes freedom from known sin, ¹⁶ an unforgiving spirit, ¹⁷ and selfish desires. ¹⁸ Acceptable prayer includes asking in faith ¹⁹ with an attitude of never giving up.²⁰ Right prayer is both powerful and effective.²¹
- 101-2.5 God's people are encouraged to come together to pray.²² In the Old Testament, the assembling of Israel for prayer was for dedication,²³ worship,²⁴ confession,²⁵ and for petition in time of great need and crisis.²⁶ In Acts, the Church came together corporately for times of devoted prayer.²⁷ Therefore, the local church ought to gather together to worship the Lord in prayer,²⁸ to seek God's guidance,²⁹ to ask God's protection in times of persecution,³⁰ to pray for one another³¹, and to pray for openness to the gospel.³²
- 101-2.6 The practice of fasting in Scripture is often associated with prayer. To fast is to voluntarily abstain from food,³³ or from anything else that is legitimate in and of itself,³⁴ for the purpose of spending more time and intensity in prayer and worship.³⁵ Fasting is a statement that we want our appetite for God to be greater than our physical appetites. The reasons that may prompt us to fast include a personal or national crisis,³⁶ a sense of contrition and repentance over sin,³⁷ and a desire to seek the Lord and His help.³⁸ The New Testament does not require believers to fast, but in His teachings, Jesus expects that they will fast.³⁹ The early church practiced corporate fasting at times.⁴⁰
- 101-2.7 God hears and responds to the prayers of the righteous. 41 God often responds differently than we ask, 42 but always according to His perfect plan and will. 43 Our joyful responsibility is to submit to His answers and trust His grace. Prayers that magnify the name of God, glorify Him, and seek to fulfill His purposes in this world, 44 are prayers that He answers according to His timing for His glory and our good. 45 While God is fully capable of accomplishing these purposes on His own, He chooses to use the prayers of His children to fulfill them.

Report of the Study Committee on Domestic Abuse as a Biblical Grounds for Divorce: (see 2017 BFC Yearbook page 120)

Legislation to be considered at Second Reading

Article 103-4, The Family

Resolved, that the following paragraph, an addition to Article 103-4 of the Biblical Principles of Living, be adopted as Second Reading:

Yes - 150; No - 3.

103-4.3 God instituted the covenant of marriage prior to the fall of mankind in Adam's sin. When sin entered the world, the effects of sin corrupted all things. The marriage covenant between a man and his wife was also corrupted. It is only in Christ, as husband and wife submit to Him, that there is hope for marriage as God intended.

One of the most destructive sins in the marriage relationship is that of spousal abuse. Spousal abuse is the physical, emotional, or sexual mistreatment of the marriage partner. Such abuse is clearly put forward as sin in God's Word.² It is any kind of behavior that a person uses, or threatens to use, to control one's spouse. This is a distortion of God's revealed design for marriage.³ It is a clear violation of Christ's command to love one another⁴ and Paul's admonition to do no wrong to your neighbor.⁵ It is enslaving a spouse rather than giving of oneself. It instills fear rather than developing holiness, and corrupts the relationship rather than cleanses. It is treating a spouse as an enemy rather than offering Christ-like sacrificial love. It is the opposite of caring for one's spouse as one would one's own body. Abuse devalues the marriage in order to establish personal superiority.

The Church is to rebuke the abuser for his/her sin and exhort the abuser to confess, repent, and be reconciled through Christ.⁶ When a church member abuses a spouse, the Bible requires that fellow believers use the means of church discipline in order to urge the individual to repent and be restored. The Church shall act for the protection of the abused and give comfort⁷ and hope in the gospel.⁸ **

Report of the Study Committee on the Pauline Exception (as part of Article 103-5, Divorce): (see 2017 BFC Yearbook page 125)

Resolved, that the report be accepted.

Article 103-5 - Divorce

- 103-5.1 Divorce is the breaking of the marriage covenant instituted and ordained of God. God hates it because it is inconsistent with His purpose¹ and creates problems for all those associated with it. (Delete: It is not permitted for any reason other than adultery,² and should be considered only after careful and prayerful attempts for forgiveness and reconciliation.³ Scripture permits but never requires that a person divorce a marriage partner who has committed adultery.⁴)
- 103-5.2 Divorce may only be initiated after a partner has committed adultery.² In case of adultery, divorce should be considered only after careful and prayerful attempts for forgiveness and reconciliation.³ Scripture permits but never requires divorce in this instance.⁴ In the case of adultery, the Lord places the guilt of the divorce on the unfaithful spouse even if the innocent spouse initiates the divorce.
- 103-5.3 In the event that an unbelieving spouse initiates divorce against the innocent believing spouse, the recipient of the divorce is not guilty for the sin of divorce, but rather the initiator is. The believer in this case is not enslaved to the bonds of the marriage and may remarry.⁵
- 103-5.4 People divorced for reasons other than that allowed by Scripture ought not marry another, but be reconciled, and seek God's resolution for the breakdown of the marriage.⁶ Divorced persons must seek forgiveness for any sin that may have led to, or is associated with, their divorce. They should seek the grace of God for their spiritual growth and healing.⁷

Renumber existing 103-5.3 to be 103-5.5

103-5.5 The church should seek to prevent divorce by offering both premarital counseling and ongoing opportunities for marital instruction. The principles that make for a godly marriage should be evident in the life and example of every Christian family, especially the leadership of the church.

Renumber existing 103-5.4 to be 103-5.6

103-5.6 By the grace of God, those who have been divorced and those who have married divorced persons, if they give evidence of forgiveness and Christian living, may be admitted to church membership and do not forfeit the privilege of serving within the Church. The elders of each particular church should evaluate the circumstances surrounding a divorce or remarriage in order to assure obedience to Scripture and confirm

or establish the legitimacy of any remarriage.11

103-5.7 The church should counsel those considering divorce to seek other solutions to the problems in their relationships. There are times when a church is called upon to exercise discipline towards those who are seeking or who have obtained a divorce. There are also times when a church is called upon to exercise discipline towards those who are seeking to remarry, or who have already remarried. Remarriage is permissible for those who are divorced due to adultery, believers divorced by their unbelieving spouse, or whose return to the former partner is determined by the elders, as they study the Scriptures, to be impossible.¹² Individuals involved in these circumstances must submit themselves to the Word of God in their present situation.¹³

Renumber existing 103-5.6 to be 103-5.8

103-5.8 The responsibility of the church towards people considering divorce, remarriage, or those who have been divorced or remarried, is always to apply the Word of God in love. ¹⁴ The goal of this ministry is to restore any break in their fellowship with God and with the life of the church, to preserve the purity of the church¹⁵, and to clear the reputation of a person.

Whereas, The Bible Fellowship Church seeks to be distinct in biblical fidelity and ministerial faithfulness, and

Whereas, The Church Health Committee of the Bible Fellowship Church has officially included expositional preaching of the of the Scriptures in the marks of a healthy Bible Fellowship Church, and

Whereas, The Articles of Faith of the Bible Fellowship Church do not explicitly proclaim our belief in the high value of expositional preaching of the word of God, therefore be it

Resolved, that Article 18-5 be included in the Bible Fellowship Articles of Faith in order to clearly communicate our belief in the priority of expositional preaching in the church.

Article 18 – The Church

18-5 The preaching of the Word of God is the primary means God has ordained for the salvation, sanctification, and equipping of His people. Thus, expositional preaching of Scripture, particularly as a means of congregational worship, should be given priority among all the ministries of the church.

Conference entertained lengthy discussion concerning Saucon Community's request and the following resolution was moved, seconded, and voted upon:

Resolved, that the Moderator appointed a study committee of five (5) ordained men to study Saucon Community BFC's request and bring a report to next year's Conference.

The motion carried.

Article 508-5, Study Committees: (2017 Yearbook, page 41)

- (1) Purpose. BFC Conference may form a study committee to address a specific topic or question which does not fall under the jurisdiction of one of the standing committees and which is too extensive to be adequately addressed through public debate alone. BFC Conference shall assign a study committee its work in writing by means of a resolution or resolutions.
- (2) Composition. BFC Conference may nominate and elect a study committee, or it may request the Moderator to appoint a study committee, subject to the ratification of BFC Conference. The number of members shall be determined by BFC Conference. The study committee shall exist until dissolved by BFC Conference. Vacancies of study committee membership may be filled by further elections or appointments by the Moderator. BFC Conference may add, remove, or replace members at any time.
- (3) Reporting. A study committee shall submit an annual written report to BFC Conference, and shall do so until it is dissolved by BFC Conference. The written report may include progress made toward the completion of its assignment, a position paper intended to complete its assignment, and any legislation offered to address the assignment. Legislation proposed by the study committee may be amended, but not replaced by substitute motion, prior to being voted on by BFC Conference.
- (4) Dissolution. A study committee is dissolved by vote of BFC Conference when, in the judgment of BFC Conference, its assignment is complete.

Note: proposed changes in these resolutions are indicated by bold-face, underlined type.

Duties:

- (2) It shall take under its supervision the candidates and probationers while in training.
- (3) It shall examine those who offer themselves for service in our Church and determine as far as possible the sincerity and genuineness of their call to the ministry.
- (8) It shall furnish prior to the BFC Conference to the Registrar a list of probationers who are eligible to be members of the BFC Conference. (Delete remainder of sentence)

Resolved: That at Second Reading the following changes to 511-4.5 be approved.

Procedure:

The procedure to be followed by a man offering himself for service in the BFC shall be as follows:

- (1) Men who seek to be ordained in the BFC will fill out an application from the Committee.
- (2) The applicant will carry out a program of personal development and training developed in consultation with the Committee.
 - (3) The candidate will be examined through a series of tests.
- (4) Upon satisfactory completion of the testing and approval of the Committee, the candidate will be recognized as a probationer eligible for a call and recommended to the Ministerial Relations Committee or BFC departments.
- (5) During the time of working in the BFC or in one of the denominational departments or other ministries, the probationer will be under the jurisdiction of this Committee as well as the department or ministry with which he works.
- (6) At the end of the probationary period, upon approval of this Committee, the probationer will be recommended to the Ministerial Credentials Committee. [Delete "... and his probationary period will cease."] Serving [replacing "To serve"] as a candidate and probationer does not guarantee being recommended for ordination examination.

Resolved: That the following changes to 501 be approved at Second Reading.

Procedure for the Recognition of a Minister

All men who desire to have ministerial credentials with the BFC shall apply to the Ministerial Candidate Committee by filling out an application from the Committee.

501-1 Men Entering the Ministry of the BFC

Applicant. An applicant is a man who offers himself to this committee for service in the BFC. Men are encouraged to seek this recognition as early in their educational program as they sense the call of God to the ministry.

Probationer. A probationer is a man who has been approved by this committee and has passed the required examinations. Upon completion of his required examinations, he will be classified as a probationer eligible to receive a call. When a probationer receives a call from the BFC (a Particular Church or department) or other ministry (chaplaincy, etc.) approved by the Ministerial Candidate Committee in consultation with the Credentials Committee, he shall become a licensed probationer. Such other ministry does not include service on the pastoral staff of a church other than a BFC.

Article 511-5.3(8), Ministerial Credentials Committee: (2017 Yearbook, page 32)

Whereas, the Ministerial Credentials Committee has had a man drop his credentials and then asked the Ministerial Credentials Committee to have them reinstated, and

<u>Whereas</u>, the Ministerial Credentials Committee consulted with the Ministerial Candidate Committee per Article 511-5.3(8) for the man to reapply to the Ministerial Candidate Committee, and

<u>Whereas</u>, the Ministerial Candidate Committee agreed the Ministerial Credentials Committee should be the Committee to handle this reapplication process, therefore be it

Resolved, that the Ministerial Candidate Committee should be replaced with Ministerial Credentials Committee in 511-5.3(8) as follows:

511-5.3(8) Ordained Inactive Ministers. A minister who has exhausted his stay in the "Between Calls" and/or "Leave of Absence" categories will be placed in the "Ordained Inactive Ministers" category. He may remain in this category for a period not to exceed ten years, of which time spent in the "Between Calls" and/or "Leave of Absence" categories is counted. At the end of ten years, he loses his credentials with the BFC. In this case, or in any situation where a man loses his credentials, if he wishes to return to active ministry within the BFC, he must reapply to the Ministerial Credentials Committee (replaces Ministerial Candidate Committee).

Interim Pastor Legislation

Resolved, that we amend 409-1.1 to read as follows:

(New wording in **bold** & underlined)

Article 409 Pastoral Change Procedure

409-1 Instituting the Pastoral Relationship

409-1.1 When a church is seeking a Pastor, the Board of Elders shall meet with representatives of the Ministerial Relations Committee to discuss the following:

Temporary pulpit supply. The Board of Elders shall provide for temporary pulpit supply on an interim basis. Pastors serving in this capacity shall be in sympathy with

the F & O of the BFC. The Board of Elders may hire an Interim Pastor to provide more stability during the pastoral vacancy. If the Board of Elders decides to hire an Interim Pastor who does not hold BFC credentials, they must obtain the approval of the Ministerial Relations Committee. The responsibilities and remuneration of the Interim Pastor shall be established by the Board of Elders. The term of service, whether he is BFC credentialed or not, shall be up to a year, and may be renewed on an annual basis with the approval of the Board of Elders and Ministerial Relations Committee.

BFC Conference Proceedings - 2018 Fourth meeting

Tuesday, April 24, 2018, 7:00 P.M.

Tuesday evening's session was a well-attended service of ordination. No Conference business was conducted.

The service began with the singing of "The Church's One Foundation," "Your Great Name," and "Glorious Day (Living He Loved Me"). Jason L. Hoy read Philippians 3:7-11 before praying. After the ordinands were introduced, those in attendance sang, "Holy Spirit, Living Breath of God."

Newly-ordained to the gospel ministry were Brad L. Boyer, Greg W. Carder, Ezekiel R. Mack, and Benjamin J. Triestman. Two others had previous ordinations recognized by the Bible Fellowship Church: Ronnie Burgess and S. Wayne Rissmiller.

Dennis M. Cahill gave the charge to the ordinands based on 1 Corinthians 2:1-5. "It's really not about you or your sermon. It's about the Word of God and the people of God. It's your job to take the Word to the people."

It's not about preaching great sermons or preaching eloquently but preaching with the power of the Holy Spirit of God, Cahill stressed. We must preach with a deep sense of inadequacy and humility, for pride is the enemy of the preacher. And we must always exalt Jesus and the cross of Christ. When we do these things, we can trust in the Spirit taking what we preach and using it in the lives of those who hear our sermons.

Following the administering of the ordination vows, the singing of "Build Your Kingdom Here," and the benediction at 8:15 p.m., the newly-ordained pastors and their families were greeted by their fellow BFC pastors. A time of celebration and fellowship followed in Pinebrook's dining hall.

BFC Conference Proceedings - 2018 Fifth meeting

Wednesday, April 25, 2018, 8:45 A.M.

The Moderator called the meeting to order at 8:45 a.m. as Dennis W. Spinney prayed. Conference worshiped God through the singing of "Blessing and Honor and Glory and Power," "Lion of Judah," and "All I Have is Christ."

The morning's address, by Andrew W. Barnes Sr., was entitled "Rebuilding a Church" and related to the story of New Life BFC of Long Neck, DE's recent history.

The first step to rebuilding New Life BFC was holding a Sunday School class for the small remnant that remained, teaching them the Doctrines of Grace and their adherence to what the Bible Fellowship Church professes to believe. Barnes cited many individuals who played important roles in re-establishing the Long Neck church. "We praise God for the many individuals along the way who came alongside this hurting church – to rebuild it," said Barnes, who has served as New Life's pastor since 2013.

Church planting isn't easy, Barnes related. As a church planter, he has experienced challenges and discouragements. He told the story of a female visitor who, after a morning worship service, told him, "This is a dead church," and then related her doubts that it was even a Christian church – at least partly because its music wasn't to her liking.

Barnes cited Revelation 3:1-6 and the letter to the church in Sardis, to answer two questions pertaining to local churches, with the admission that there are, indeed, churches that are dead (although he disagreed with the woman's assessment concerning New Life BFC). He sought to answer two questions. First, when it comes to local churches, what necessitates rebuilding? Second, how do we rebuild?

Jesus made this accusation concerning the Sardis church: "I know your works. You have the reputation of being alive, but you are dead." Jesus had intimate knowledge of the church at Sardis, just as He has intimate knowledge of our churches. "Jesus knows everything about the church; He's the Lord of the church!" Barnes said.

Sardis had a positive reputation, at least on the surface: that it was an "alive" church, with many programs and a good reputation in the surrounding culture. Our temptation today, Barnes said, is to downplay our distinctives and to be "all things to all people." New Life, like many other churches, faces the pressure to survive, with many surrounding churches that seem to have clear advantages in terms of programs, music, etc. – "the goods," as Barnes called them.

"All I had was the Word of God," Barnes said. And it was that commitment to preach that saw him through and is the centerpiece of the rebuilding of New Life BFC of Long Neck. "All I know is I did my best to preach the Word of God, and God blessed it," he explained.

What necessitates rebuilding, Barnes concluded, is when the church exchanges its commitment to Christ for a desperation to survive. So how does such a church rebuild? According to Jesus' words in Revelation 3:2, the instruction is to "Wake up, and

strengthen what remains." Several commands follow in the letter to the church in Sardis.

A church has to continually be watchful. It must strengthen what was once a clear commitment to Christ and the gospel. The church must remember what it has received and heard – the gospel – and how it received that gospel. Pastors need to ask themselves this question: "Do we still preach with passion, with urgency, with zeal, with conviction?" And, finally, the church must repent: from trying to please the culture and from marginalizing the gospel. "Wake up!" Jesus is telling our churches.

We must continually be watchful. More fundamental than numbers is a clear commitment to Jesus Christ and to God's Word. Jesus' warning to the Sardis church is stark and frightening, according to Revelation 3:3. "If you will not wake up, I will come like a thief [in judgment], and you will not know at what hour I will come against you." The light of what little gospel witness such a church may have had will be extinguished, and that church will die. That's the warning.

The encouragement of Revelation 3:1-6, though, is that there were some in Sardis who were still committed to the gospel. Jesus declares this as their reward: "They will walk with Me in white, for they are worthy." We are called as pastors to strengthen those who are faithful. The faithful, Jesus declares in Revelation 3:5, will be clothed in His righteousness, will never have their names blotted from the Book of Life, and will be confessed by the Son before the Father and His angels.

Churches, he concluded, are rebuilt when we as pastors commit ourselves to the things that glorify the Lord Jesus Christ, and the things that He has declared the church is to be and to practice.

Richard B. Ravis led Conference in a season of prayer, using Psalm 116:1-7 to "lead and feed" pastors and delegates, guiding them into a time of calling upon the name of the Lord. Our prayer time concluded with the singing of "Holy Spirit."

Report of the Executive Board: (page 66)

Resolved, that the report be accepted.

Bible Fellowship Church Executive Director David T. Allen addressed Conference, noting that for three days each year, at BFC Conference, he gladly shares the responsibilities of ministry in the BFC with the pastors and delegates. He referred to the Conference theme, "Onward and Outward," reminding all in attendance that evangelism is to be primary, as it was in the "old days."

Allen pointed to 2018 as being a year of milestones: 70 years for Church Extension Ministries, just over 60 years for Victory Valley Camp, and 50 years for Pinebrook Bible Conference.

The Executive Board recommended the election of Robert A. Sloan, Jr. for a three-year term as President of the Bible Fellowship Church.

Robert A. Sloan, Jr. was elected to a three-year term as President of the Bible Fellowship Church.

Jay H. Fasnacht, BFC Executive Board Treasurer, normally presents budgets at BFC

Conference but was unable to attend due to serious health issues. Ronald C. Mahurin prayed for Fasnacht, thanking God for his influence, at both the local church and denominational levels.

Allen presented the financial statements in Fasnacht's absence, presenting both a revised budget for 2018 and a proposed budget for 2019.

Resolved, that the 2018 revised Executive Board budget be adopted by the 135th BFC Conference (page 79).

Resolved, that an assessment rate of two (2.0) percent be adopted by the 135th BFC Conference for 2019 (based on assessable receipts for 2017).

Resolved, that the 2019 proposed Executive Board budget be adopted by the 135th BFC Conference (page 80).

Allen also provided a point-by-point review of our current status as a denomination in conjunction with our 20/20 Vision. One area of encouragement was the full renovation of our rented denominational headquarters at 1011 Brookside Road, Allentown, PA. He also cited the naming of Rachel Marks and Dana E. Weller as denominational resources for our children and senior saints, respectively, as a positive response to two of our 20/20 Vision Points.

The Executive Director informed Conference of potential future partnerships in the management of Pinebrook Bible Conference.

Daniel P. Allen, former Director of Pinebrook Bible Conference, led in prayer for the future of Pinebrook.

licensed ministers, and

Whereas, pensions paid to retired and disabled ordained or licensed ministers of The Bible Fellowship Church are considered as deferred compensation and are paid to said retired and disabled ordained or licensed ministers in consideration of previous, active service, and

Whereas, the Internal Revenue Service has recognized that The Bible Fellowship Church is the appropriate organization to designate a housing/rental allowance for retired and disabled ordained or licensed ministers who are members of this Conference, therefore be it

Resolved.

An amount equal to 100% of the pension payments received during the year of 2018 be and is hereby designated as a rental/housing allowance for each retired and disabled ordained or licensed minister of The Bible Fellowship Church who is or was a member of the Bible Fellowship Church Minister's Retirement Fund.
- 2. This rental/housing allowance shall apply to each retired and disabled ordained or licensed minister who has been granted the retired relationship or placed on disability leave by the BFC Conference and whose name and relationship to the conference is recorded in the Yearbook of BFC Conference and in other appropriate records maintained by the conference.
- 3. The pension payment to which this rental/housing allowance applies shall be the pension payment resulting from all service of such retired or disabled ordained or licensed minister from all employment by any local church, BFC Conference or institution of The Bible Fellowship Church or of any former denomination that is now a part of The Bible Fellowship Church, or from any other employer who employed the minister to perform services related to the ministry and who elected to make contributions to the pension funds of The Bible Fellowship Church for such retired minister's pension.

Resolved,

- 1. An amount equal to 100% of the proceeds drawn from a 403(b) plan during the year of 2019 be and is hereby designated as a rental/housing allowance for each retired and disabled ordained or licensed minister of The Bible Fellowship Church who is or was a member of the Bible Fellowship Church.
- 2. This rental/housing allowance shall apply to each retired and disabled ordained or licensed minister who has been granted the retired relationship or placed on disability leave by the BFC Conference and whose name and relationship to the conference is recorded in the Yearbook of BFC Conference and in other appropriate records maintained by the conference.
- 3. The pension payment to which this rental/housing allowance applies shall be considered the pension payment resulting from all service of such retired or disabled ordained or licensed minister from all employment by any local church, BFC Conference or institution of The Bible Fellowship Church or of any former denomination that is now a part of The Bible Fellowship Church, or from any other employer who employed the minister to perform services related to the ministry and who elected to make contributions to the pension funds of The Bible Fellowship Church for such retired minister's pension.

BFC Conference Proceedings - 2018 Sixth meeting

Wednesday, April 25, 2018, 1:30 P.M.

Bryan C. McNally opened the afternoon meeting to order with prayer at 1:30 p.m. Conference sang "Your Great Name" before Timothy J. Schmoyer addressed Conference on the theme of "Rebirthing a Church." He brought an appropriate perspective to the topic, having witnessed and played a role in the rebirthing of the Walnutport/Northern Lehigh church through his position as pastor of Whitehall BFC. In 2013, the Whitehall church voted to engage in restarting the Walnutport church via a merger and began meeting as one church in two locations.

Citing statistics that 3,700 churches closed their doors for good in the U.S. in 2014, Schmoyer noted that churches lose their effectiveness. But at the same time, many Old Testament texts stress that God gives hope to those with hurting hearts with prophecies that He will raise up old ruins. "God revives battered walls. God gives life where there is death, and even after death He gives life," Schmoyer said.

We must remind ourselves that Jesus calls Himself "the Resurrection and the Life." Do we believe that? Do we believe His message has the power to resurrect dead things? That includes churches that have lost their effectiveness and have closed their doors.

Asking the question, "Why do churches close?" Schmoyer said we have to understand the factors that lead to slow, gradual decline. We must have humility to learn what causes and what prevents churches from closing, and be willing to change when change is necessary...and refuse to change for the wrong reasons.

What can we do about this? Isaiah 58:10-12 proclaims the blessings of giving ourselves to those who are hungry and afflicted. When we meet needs, the reward is that God will call us "the repairer of the breach" and "the restorer of streets to dwell in."

Northern Lehigh was launched on Oct. 26, 2013 with 12 members of the Walnutport church and 25 members from the Whitehall church. It was what those who were involved called a "progressive church plant." The plan was for the daughter church to gain increasing autonomy as Northern Lehigh grew, and that's what happened, concluding with Northern Lehigh's reception as a particular church on April 23, 2018.

From Whitehall BFC's perspective as a parent in this parent-child relationship, the parent took the lead during Northern Lehigh's infancy and childhood, handling much of the administration so that Pastor Aaron D. Smith could focus on outreach and the proclamation of the Word at Northern Lehigh. In time Whitehall's influence and involvement was phased out, and now Northern Lehigh is standing on its own.

Report of the Board of Missions: (page 88)

Duane E. Moyer, Director of the BFC Board of Missions, reminded Conference that our focus is outward: that the BFC is an "expanding fellowship of churches." The ongoing emphasis of the Board of Missions is on "proclaiming Christ to those who have

the least opportunity to know Him." "Our focus is on reaching people who have no gospel witness at all," Moyer said.

Ralph M. Soper prayed for the work of the BFC's Board of Missions.

Report of Pinebrook Bible Conference: (page 108)

Charles E. Cole, Chairman of the Board of Pinebrook Bible Conference, shared a few stories about Pinebrook's spiritual impact on those who attended during its 50 years as a BFC ministry. He then prayed for the ongoing ministry of Pinebrook Bible Conference, and for the upcoming summer conference season.

Report of Victory Valley Camp: (page 110)

Douglas J. Manwiller, Director of Victory Valley Camp, immediately jumped into updates on the camp's new dining hall project. Since groundbreaking ceremonies on Sept. 9, 2017, work has progressed, and it is anticipated that the new dining hall will be usable by June 1, 2018. "We're excited about the new dining hall, but the dining hall is not who we are," Manwiller said. "It just is going to allow us to do what we do: share God's Word, in God's creation, with godly role models."

Mark R. Orton prayed for Victory Valley Camp's ministry and for specific needs for the summer camping season.

No member of the committee may be elected to consecutive terms.

The members of the committee shall be elected for a term of three years in classes as follows:

Class I One minister & two lay persons
Class II One minister & one lay person
Class III One minister & one lay person

The committee shall organize itself at the call of the chairman of the previous year, at which time new officers shall be elected.

Duties of the Committee

It shall plan and conduct an annual Day of Prayer

It shall provide publicity and arrange registration for the Day of Prayer

It shall receive and disburse funds for the Day of Prayer.

It shall conduct an annual business meeting during the BFC Conference for the election of committee members and to schedule the first meeting for the new year.

It shall provide an annual report on the Day of Prayer to BFC Conference.

It shall elect officers by and from the committee.

Duties of Officers

Chairman

Must be a pastor or elder in a BFC church.

He shall convene and preside over all meetings of the Day of Prayer Committee.

Secretary

He/She shall keep an accurate record of all meetings of the committee.

He/She shall conduct all correspondence for the committee.

He/She shall prepare an annual report for BFC Conference.

Treasurer

He/She shall be in charge of registration for the Day of Prayer.

He/She shall see that all expenses are paid.

He/She shall provide a financial report for the Day of Prayer Committee.

Whereas, the role of delegate was more important during our previous pulpit supply system, and

Whereas, the full board of elders guides a church during a pastoral transition, and

Whereas, more than one man may serve adequately as a delegate, and

Whereas, every delegate has already been elected as an elder by the congrega-

tion, therefore be it

Resolved, that the following legislation be considered at First Reading:

401-1.7 Replace the paragraph with the following:

The Board of Elders shall be the channel of communication between the Particular Church and the fellowship of churches and its organizations. The Elders shall elect from their number enough delegates to attend the meetings of BFC Conference based on congregational membership as follows:

1-299 members 1 delegate 300-499 members 2 delegates 500-plus members 3 delegates

If a delegate is not able to attend all the meetings of BFC Conference, the Board of Elders may, if possible, elect as many delegates as necessary to provide representation at all meetings.

A man serving on a pastoral staff is not eligible to serve as a lay delegate at the BFC Conference.

- 403-3 (7) Replace "the Delegates and Alternate Delegate" with "Delegate(s)"
- 407-5 Replace "the duly elected BFC Conference delegate(s) and alternative delegate(s)" with "the delegates appointed by the Board of Elders"

Report of the Executive Board

After 500 years of being involved in the process of reforming the church, we (the evangelical church and specifically the Bible Fellowship Church) still haven't gotten it right! Although we presume that we have the corner on the truth and the correct way of doing ministry, we've discovered that we're still growing in both of those areas. Maybe that is why the theme of the 2017 BFC Conference was "Always Reforming, Always Being Reformed - Semper Reformanda." Guest speaker Dr. Frank A. James III reminded us of that at the 134th BFC Conference and encouraged us to consider the emphasis that John Calvin had on planting churches and sending out men who were intent on making disciples of Jesus Christ.

Reminding ourselves of the past as we live in the present and continue to plan for the future is always a profitable exercise. So now we turn that corner and recognize that we need to celebrate the present as we anticipate the future. The theme of the 135th BFC Conference is "Onward and Outward" and is based upon Acts 9:31. "So the church throughout all Judea and Galilee and Samaria had peace and was being built up. And walking in the fear of the Lord and in the comfort of the Holy Spirt, it multiplied." The key terms in this verse, "was being built up" (oikodomoumene) and "multiplied" (eplethuneto), seem to indicate that the early church was fulfilling its mission of making disciples of Jesus Christ by doing so internally and externally. Building up the body of Christ, as Paul expressed it in Ephesians 4:12, is one of the purposes of the church. It is what a local church is supposed to be doing. We call that discipleship, and most of our churches do a pretty good job of discipling those within the church. But the early church did more than that. They did not have a cadre of "churched" people to disciple. They had to make disciples the old-fashioned way: go find someone who has not yet accepted the truth of the gospel, share it with him/her, and when the Holy Spirit draws that person to Christ, bring him/her into the church, and baptize and teach him/her all that Jesus commanded (see Matt 28:19-20). That is the multiplication factor of the church, and it is the reason we are here today. Someone shared the gospel with us and we believed it, becoming disciples of Jesus Christ, and then we were taught the Bible, God's Word for us for life. So, onward with building up the church, and outward in evangelizing the lost.

We both contracted and expanded in 2017. The official closing of our church in Brooklyn in March led to the prolonged sale of the parsonage. It is not that it took a long time to find someone to buy the property (it happened in three days!), but it took a long time for the Attorney General of the State of New York to allow the property to be returned to the tax rolls, having been tax exempt for 17 years. The process, which extended until the end of November, was time consuming, expensive, labor intensive, and agitating. But praise the Lord, we survived, with only a few extra gray hairs and a lot of miles being put on the old buggy (17 trips). The property was sold, all the bills were paid by the Executive Board, and some of the excess money was used to help one of our churches refinance a bad mortgage (which is reflected as a new loan on our Balance Sheet). The sale of the Brooklyn parsonage eliminated a BFC asset, which impacted both our Balance Sheet and Statement of Income/Expenses. So we lost another church. It's hard to be An Expanding Fellowship of Churches when you close one of your churches.

On the other hand, some brethren in Chestertown, MD decided to join with us, have been working with Church Extension, and have brought their property with them. Bible Fellowship Church, Inc. President Robert A. Sloan, Jr. signed the transfer papers. This property was effectively "gifted" to the BFC, adding a new asset to our Balance Sheet and a major income line item on our Statement of Income/Expenses. James D. Reff II is the church planting pastor of Grace Community, A Bible Fellowship Church of Chestertown, Maryland.

The same is true of Harvest Fellowship Church on Colebrookdale Road in Boyertown, PA. Barry Parsons has been the pastor and is now working with the Ministerial Candidate Committee to become credentialed with the Bible Fellowship Church. Both congregations are under the care of Church Extension Ministries and hope to become particular churches within the Bible Fellowship Church soon. Church Extension Ministries comes alongside of existing churches who wish to join the Bible Fellowship Church and assists them to become Particular Churches within the Bible Fellowship Church. They also plant new churches where there are no biblically reformed, evangelical witnesses within certain communities,

In an honest attempt to help out Particular Churches that appear to be struggling, the Executive Board asked the Church Health Committee to take both Community Bible Fellowship Church of Howell, NJ and Salem Bible Fellowship Church of Lehighton, PA under advisement. Our church in Howell entered into an agreement to sell its current property, which consisted of an elongated church building and a parsonage, and use the proceeds to pay off its mortgage and move toward Brick, NJ where there is a lack of evangelical churches (unlike their current location, where there are three larger churches within a five-mile radius). The Executive Board selected David T. Allen and Dennis M. Cahill to serve as interim elders during this process.

We completed the renovations of our official "headquarters" on Brookside Road in Allentown. We signed a five-year lease that will keep us there until June, 2022. The office complex consists of six individual offices, a reception area, kitchenette, printing room, and work areas. A 900-square-foot conference room in the lower level can be adjusted to accommodate groups as small as four and as large as 40! There is also a smaller kitchenette in that room. You are welcome to use it for meetings at no charge. Call the office to arrange for a satisfactory date and time, as the official conference room calendar is kept up to date by our secretary.

The BFC Executive Board filed as a foreign corporation in the State of Florida and received that recognition from the State. Our official Florida address coincides with the address of our church planter in Florida, Jason Filbert. We officially hold the corporate name of Bible Fellowship Church, Incorporated, within the state. Although we currently have only one location in the Sunshine State, we have the ability to plant other churches within the state under our corporate banner.

Every decade or so, a corporate trademark must be renewed or it becomes public domain. In order to protect our trademark, An Expanding Fellowship of Churches United to Make Disciples of Jesus Christ, along with the cross design that accompanies it, the BFC Executive Board acquired the services of Panitch Schwarze Belisario & Nadel of Philadelphia to assist in its renewal. One of their new attorneys has married a member of

our Cedar Crest BFC church and is assisting us in this regards.

In an endeavor to remain above reproach in all of our financial and administrative functions, we have, for several years, been moving towards the adoption and accreditation of the highest level of standards that exist within American non-profit organizations. Since we finally were able to complete a full audit of our financial statements, the Evangelical Council for Financial Accountability (ECFA) has accredited Bible Fellowship Church, Inc. Their website notes that, "Founded in 1979, ECFA provides accreditation to leading Christian nonprofit organizations that faithfully demonstrate compliance with established standards for financial accountability, transparency, fundraising, and board governance." As an official member of ECFA, all of our churches can access their materials regarding finances and best practices. In order to get permission to use their website under our name and a valid password, contact the Executive Director.

In addition, our application to the IRS for a Group Exemption was finally completed and is in the final process of being fully accepted. The latest response from an IRS letter dated January 18, 2018 is, "Unfortunately, we are experiencing delays in processing determination letter requests." As of the date of this report, their assessment is still accurate!

An updated Bible Fellowship Church By-Laws that conforms to current standards for non-profit organizations was approved by the Executive Board. It correlates completely to the Faith & Order, but is much easier to access for non-BFC organizations. The need to do this became apparent in dealing with the legal system in both purchasing and selling properties. It also was helpful in an unemployment compensation case that targeted the Bible Fellowship Church. Pastors and employees of churches are not covered by unemployment compensation and should be aware of that fact when they agree to work for a church or department of the Bible Fellowship Church. Both Pinebrook and Victory Valley have good sections in their policy manuals that delineate this fact. As your church hires more staff, you might want to make sure that this written policy is included and "signed off" on by the prospective employee. Pastors, you already know that you are not entitled to unemployment compensation, right?

The Executive Director was invited to or visited 33 different BFC churches during the past year, preaching or participating in worship services during 25 of those church visits. The reason that he might not have visited or preached at your church is possibly because you didn't ask for a visit. He, along with our President, retired pastor Robert A. Sloan, Jr., is willing to share the Word of God along with the good work that the Lord is doing through the Bible Fellowship Church with your congregation and/or church leadership. All you must do to arrange a visit...is ask.

The main BFC website is receiving a major overhaul. Thanks to the work of David E. Brandt and the Communications Committee, www.bfc.org will soon have a new look and feel, and will be more accessible to those using mobile devices. One of the major advantages of having a central website is the tab which contains the locations of our churches and links to each individual website. When your website is current, a visitor might actually be able to attend services on time! The Executive Director has used this feature frequently, but has been frustrated to discover when a church's website is not

current and has actually been late to services which would have been avoided if the information had been accurate. Others have suffered the same frustration, so please be conscious of the immediate implications when you don't maintain accurate, up-to-date information on your website!

The officers of the Executive Board are as follows: Robert A. Sloan, Jr., President; Randall A. Grossman, Vice President; Jay H. Fasnacht, Treasurer; and Ronald L. Kohl, Secretary.

Charles A. Lavigna is the Health Insurance Coordinator.

L. James Roberts, Stephen J. Kauffman, and Hans R. Waldvogel serve as the Personnel Committee.

Dennis M. Cahill, Jay H. Fasnacht, and Charles A. Lavigna comprise the Finance Committee for the Executive Board.

During 2016, the Executive Board retained the following:

The American Insurance Group as our Health Insurance Administrators, JetPay as our payroll processing firm, Brotherhood Mutual Insurance Company as the preferred church liability insurers, American Bank of the Lehigh Valley as the depository of our funds. Molinari, Oswald, LLC as our CPA firm.

The Executive Board wants to maintain a position of being above reproach in all of its dealings and has created a Conflict of Interest Policy, which each member has signed. The written policy may be found at our http://info.bfc.org website, and would be worth considering for adoption by each local church's board of elders.

Resolved, that the 2018 revised BFC Executive Board budget be adopted by the 135th BFC Conference.

Resolved, that an assessment rate of two (2.0) percent be adopted by the 135th BFC Conference for 2019 (based on assessable receipts for 2017).

Resolved, that the 2019 proposed Executive Board budget be adopted by the 135th BFC Conference.

In addition to our own report, several committees and funds report directly to the Executive Board. These reports, written and financial, have been accepted by the Executive Board. They include: Christian Education Committee, Communications Committee, Historical Committee, Youth & Young Adults Committee, Pensions Fund, and the Pinebrook Educational Foundation.

2017 Review and Status: The total of Ministers' Retirement Fund (MRF) annuity payments to the 31 beneficiaries in 2016 was \$147,765, as compared to \$153,735 in

2016, \$155,926 in 2015, \$168,000 in 2014, and \$170,830 in 2013. There were no beneficiaries who went home to be with the Lord in 2017. One beneficiary, John H. Riggall, went home to be with the Lord at the age of 101 on February 3, 2018. Based on the current mortality assumptions, the final year of MRF payments to beneficiaries is still projected to be 2038. Between now and then, it is estimated that the MRF will distribute future benefits totaling nearly \$1,500,000.

Annual Funding: 2017 was the seventh year that the Executive Board funded the Board of Pensions on a monthly "pay as you go" basis in an amount roughly equal to each month's payments to beneficiaries. Funding is supported by a portion of the BFC Conference-wide assessments.

Planned Giving: The benefits of planned giving were clearly evident in 2008 by way of the receipt of a bequest of \$225,000. The Executive Board urges other members of the Bible Fellowship Church to consider including the MRF in their estate planning arrangements. The simplest and most tax efficient method would be to name the MRF as a contingent or primary beneficiary (for married or singles, respectively) of a portion of an IRA or 403(b) account. This arrangement can be adjusted or revoked at any time, and does not involve changing one's Will. For more information, please contact the BFC Executive Director.

The Executive Board recommends the following resolutions to 135th BFC Conference:

Whereas, the MRF annuity rate for 2018 was \$221 per year of service, and

Whereas, cost-of-living adjustments no longer apply to MRF payments, be it

Resolved, that the MRF annuity rate for calendar year 2019 be \$221 per year of service.

Resolution Relating to Rental/Housing Allowances for Retired or Disabled Ministers of this Conference for Calendar Year 2019:

Whereas, the religious denomination known as The Bible Fellowship Church has, and functions through, Ministers of the Gospel who are duly ordained or licensed, and

Whereas, the practice of The Bible Fellowship Church is to provide a parsonage or a rental allowance as part of the gross compensation for each of its active ordained or licensed ministers, and

Whereas, pensions paid to retired and disabled ordained or licensed ministers of The Bible Fellowship Church are considered as deferred compensation and are paid to said retired and disabled ordained or licensed ministers in consideration of previous, active service, and

Whereas, the Internal Revenue Service has recognized that The Bible Fellowship

Church is the appropriate organization to designate a housing/rental allowance for retired and disabled ordained or licensed ministers who are members of this Conference, therefore, be it

Resolved.

- 1. An amount equal to 100% of the pension payments received during the year of 2019 be and is hereby designated as a rental/housing allowance for each retired and disabled ordained or licensed minister of The Bible Fellowship Church who is or was a member of the Bible Fellowship Church Minister's Retirement Fund.
- 2. This rental/housing allowance shall apply to each retired and disabled ordained or licensed minister who has been granted the retired relationship or placed on disability leave by the BFC Conference and whose name and relationship to the conference is recorded in the Yearbook of BFC Conference and in other appropriate records maintained by the conference.
- 3. The pension payment to which this rental/housing allowance applies shall be the pension payment resulting from all service of such retired or disabled ordained or licensed minister from all employment by any local church, BFC Conference or institution of The Bible Fellowship Church or of any former denomination that is now a part of The Bible Fellowship Church, or from any other employer who employed the minister to perform services related to the ministry and who elected to make contributions to the pension funds of The Bible Fellowship Church for such retired minister's pension.

Note: The rental/housing allowance which may be excluded from a minister's gross income is limited to the lesser of (1) the amount of the rental/housing allowance designated by the minister's employer or other appropriate body, (2) the amount actually expended by the minister to provide his housing, or (3) the legally-determined fair rental value of the parsonage or other housing provided. As specified in Rev. Rul. 71-290 C.B. 92, "the only amount that will qualify for exclusion under section 107(2) of the Code as a 'rental allowance' is an amount equal to the fair rental value of the home, including furnishings and appurtenances such as a garage, plus the cost of utilities."

The Bible Fellowship Church Executive Board has recognized that credentialed BFC pastors who were not members of the MRF at the time when the MRF was closed, but still receive pension benefits that were paid by their church into a 403(b) Retirement Plan, should be able to receive the same recognition as those who receive pension benefits under the MRF

The Executive Board brings the following legislation for approval at the 135th BFC Conference.

Whereas, the religious denomination known as The Bible Fellowship Church has, and functions through, Ministers of the Gospel who are duly ordained or licensed, and

Whereas, the practice of The Bible Fellowship Church is to provide a parsonage or a rental allowance as part of the gross compensation for each of its active ordained or licensed ministers, and

Whereas, contributions paid to an authorized 403(b) plan for the benefit of retired and disabled ordained or licensed ministers of The Bible Fellowship Church are

considered as deferred compensation and are paid to said retired and disabled ordained or licensed ministers in consideration of previous, active service, and

Whereas, the Internal Revenue Service has recognized that The Bible Fellowship Church is the appropriate organization to designate a housing/rental allowance for retired and disabled ordained or licensed ministers who are members of this Conference, therefore, be it

Resolved.

- 1. An amount equal to 100% of the proceeds drawn from a 403(b) plan during the year of 2019 be and is hereby designated as a rental/housing allowance for each retired and disabled ordained or licensed minister of The Bible Fellowship Church who is or was a member of the Bible Fellowship Church.
- 2. This rental/housing allowance shall apply to each retired and disabled ordained or licensed minister who has been granted the retired relationship or placed on disability leave by the BFC Conference and whose name and relationship to the conference is recorded in the Yearbook of BFC Conference and in other appropriate records maintained by the conference.
- 3. The pension payment to which this rental/housing allowance applies shall be considered the pension payment resulting from all service of such retired or disabled ordained or licensed minister from all employment by any local church, BFC Conference or institution of The Bible Fellowship Church or of any former denomination that is now a part of The Bible Fellowship Church, or from any other employer who employed the minister to perform services related to the ministry and who elected to make contributions to the pension funds of The Bible Fellowship Church for such retired minister's pension.

Note: The rental/housing allowance which may be excluded from a minister's gross income is limited to the lesser of (1) the amount of the rental/housing allowance designated by the minister's employer or other appropriate body, (2) the amount actually expended by the minister to provide his housing, or (3) the legally-determined fair rental value of the parsonage or other housing provided. As specified in Rev. Rul. 71-290 C.B. 92, "the only amount that will qualify for exclusion under section 107(2) of the Code as a 'rental allowance' is an amount equal to the fair rental value of the home, including furnishings and appurtenances such as a garage, plus the cost of utilities."

Bible Fellowship Church 403(b) Plan: Refer to the 2009 Yearbook for details. There are no changes in IRS requirements for 2018.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS Years Ended December 31, 2017 and 2016

Agency Funds

One of the primary functions conducted under the Missions' ministry is the collection and disbursement of funds for support of missionaries and for special missionary projects. The Organization functions as a conduit for such funds. Accordingly, the funds received and disbursed are not revenues and expenses of the Organization, and the excess of receipts over disbursements is reflected in the Statements of Financial Position as a liability included in advances and deposits.

A summary of agency funds' receipts and disbursements in the years ended December 31, 2017 and 2016, and the balance of agency funds at December 31, 2017 and 2016, are as follows:

Retirement Arrangements

The Organization sponsors a defined benefit plan (the "Plan") for its retired pastors who had attained minimum age 55 as of January 1, 1993, and had served as a Bible Fellowship Church pastor for 15 or more years as of that date. Payment of benefits begins at age 65. Benefits are paid monthly in the form of a life annuity, using a schedule based on retirement age and years of service. Annual benefits have been frozen at \$221 for each year of service. The Organization funds benefits on a pay-as-you-go basis and paid benefits of \$147,765 and \$152,087 to beneficiaries in the years ended December 31, 2017 and 2016, respectively. At December 31, 2017 and 2016, the Organization held cash of \$17,666 and \$14,396, respectively, which is designated for payment of future benefits under the Plan. The Plan had 30 and 31 active beneficiaries at December 31, 2017 and 2016, respectively. At December 31, 2017 and 2016, the Plan's projected benefit obligation was approximately \$1,070,000 and \$1,180,000, respectively.

Report of the Department of Missions

The vision of the Bible Fellowship Church is clear. We say we are "An Expanding Fellowship Of Churches United To Make Disciples Of Jesus Christ." This is more than a slogan. It captures the essence of the Great Commission as well as the spirit of the founders of our denomination. With its outward focus and its commitment to making disciples of Jesus Christ, our slogan says that "mission" is what the Bible Fellowship Church is all about.

There is a tendency for churches and even entire denominations to devote an increasing portion of their resources and energies to serving the established Christian community, maintaining, improving, and developing what already exists. In many cases, any distinctively outward focus has been lost. The Board of Missions exists to challenge the churches of our Fellowship to resist and overcome that tendency.

To help ensure that we maintain that outward-facing perspective, the Board has developed and adopted the following definition, first presented to this Conference in 2015:

Missions, as it relates to the Bible Fellowship Church, describes the collective activities of our churches that are outwardly focused, aimed at: proclaiming Christ to those who have the least opportunity to know Him, leading them to become disciples of Jesus, following Him wholeheartedly in community with other believers, and equipping them to propagate the Gospel by making disciples themselves.


The focus of our collective missionary involvement is not Christendom. Its desired outcome is the establishment of functioning and multiplying communities of disciples where none existed before: communities that are bearing the fruits of the gospel in their locality and beyond.

With these guidelines in hand, the Board is working to ensure, as far as possible, that our emphasis, going forward, and the passion of those we commission for service, be increasingly outward-looking and people-oriented rather than inward looking and institutionally-oriented.


That definition, to some people, seems needlessly restrictive and even extreme. But the need for such a radical definition is illustrated by the following comparison:

Historically, the Board of Missions operated with a general definition of missions. Our handbook informs us that the word "missions" itself was undefined, and the definition of "missionary" was "one who is engaged in service directly involved with the carrying out of the Great Commission or in a supportive capacity [emphasis mine]." This breadth of definition was accompanied by a remarkable increase in the proportion of our envoys serving within the United States and a clear trend away from front-line engagement with the unreached, and towards a preponderance of support and administrative-type vocations as illustrated by the

following charts:

These two maps, one from 1996 and the other from 2017, show the worldwide distribution of our missions family in those two years. Note the clear shift during that two-decade period from international engagement to ministries located within the United States. Note also how few of those ministries are actively engaging the

unreached; the growing immigrant population, for instance.

This analysis yields some shocking findings about where our current approach has taken us: We discover that most of our envoys are in fact support workers, and six out of eight of our current appointees are to support roles. This is not to imply that these support roles are unimportant, or that we have too many support workers: our front-line envoys cannot do what they do without support. But our commitment to front-line missions has not kept pace, and our ratio of support personnel to front line missionaries far exceeds that of most of the agencies we work with. The Board of Missions has been wrestling with the question of how we can bend the trajectory back toward the front lines.

We have chosen to begin raising awareness of the situation by sharpening our definition of "missionary." It seems obvious to us that a "missionary" is someone who is directly engaged in "missions" as we have defined it. In other words:

"A Missionary is one who has been sent with the purpose of actively engaging in initiatives that are outwardly focused, aimed at:

- proclaiming Christ to those who have the least opportunity to know Him,
- leading them to become disciples of Jesus,
- following Him wholeheartedly in community with other believers, and...
- equipping them to propagate the gospel by making disciples themselves.

The impact of this definition has been dramatic. Some local churches have used it to evaluate their present missionary commitments, only to discover how little of their missionary investment is actually dedicated to establishing reproducing communities of disciples where none existed before.

The tendency might be to instinctively reject the more precise definition, but that only serves to perpetuate the trend. We would ask our churches to stop and consider: the Board of Missions is not saying we have "too many" envoys in support work. We are saying that our growth in front-line disciple-making and church-planting has not kept pace with our growth in the area of support ministries. One way to make that point is to reserve the title "missionary" for those who are actually engaged in front-line service, and recognize those in support ministries with two other categories of service: Practical Missionary Partners – those who are primarily engaged in providing practical and technical support to Missionaries, and Administrative Missionary Partners – those who are primarily serving a Sending Agency by providing the administrative services required to keep its missionaries on the field.

This strategy will be implemented going forward. In fact, we have already appointed our first *Practical Missionary Partners:* Jeremy and Rebecca Reinhard, who will be serving with Africa Inland Mission as house parents at Rift Valley

Academy in Kenya. They will be supporting missionary families throughout Africa by providing a safe, godly, caring home for missionary children studying at the Academy.

In addition to the Reinhards, we have one other active appointee couple, Steven and Ali Merrick, who have been appointed as *Missionaries*, headed for tribal ministry with Ethnos 360 in Mexico. They are currently in language and cultural studies in Mexico. We also have two couples who are inactive appointees.

Two of our envoys, Amanda Brennan and Carrie Ziegenfuss, have completed their missionary assignments and have returned to the States. We thank them for their service and praise the Lord for the impact they had during their years with Africa Inland Mission/TIMO in Tanzania.

Paul and Kathryn Kline are approaching retirement and have changed their mission affiliation from World Team to Helenic Ministries.

We currently have 13 active applicants, 10 of whom are applying for missionary status and three for Administrative Missionary Partner status.

Two significant events are scheduled for 2018:

- Missions Rally, May 5 at Faith Bible Fellowship Church of Lancaster from 9 a.m. to 2 p.m. This is an opportunity to meet our envoys face-to-face, to hear about their work, and to learn of ways that we can do here what they do "over there."
- 2. Missions Emphasis Week 3 at Pinebrook, July 14-20. The host pastor is Aaron Smith. The evening speaker will be Sean Christensen, Bible School professor and Area director for World Team in Haiti.

The following resources are available to local churches through the Board of Missions staff:

- The Director, Duane Moyer, is available for consultations with local missions Committees, information regarding missions opportunities, as a speaker for missionary events, and to provide pulpit supply.
- John Elias is available for church or small group training in Muslim outreach.
- For assistance in organizing and deploying work-teams, see Chris and Beckie Merrick.
- See Nelson Randoph for hands-on opportunities for children's groups, youth groups, senior citizens, and others to get directly involved in missions through Operation Christmas Child and similar initiatives. Nelson is willing to work with churches that want to organize community events as well an innovative way to reach non-churched people.

The Director wishes to commend the members of the Board of Missions.

Their challenging questions and insightful counsel have been invaluable in the development of our focus and definitions. Their passion as servants of the Great Commission, and their devotion to the well-being of our envoys, is beyond compare.

Report of Church Extension Ministries

"You have crowned the year with your bounty ..."

Psalm 65:11

The one area of "bounty" that stood out for Church Extension and the BFC this past year was in the area of "connections." Non-BFC churches seeking to connect with the BFC, and non-BFC men looking for planting opportunities, kept the department busy throughout the year. We are seeing a trend surfacing that we label "connectional investigations." This past year we spent a significant amount of hours working with connecting churches, and our Vision & Strategy Committee spent time in its meetings working on policy for connecting with non-BFC churches and church plants.

In recent years Church Extension has been successful in this area of connectional ministry. The Woodbury Heights, NJ; Merida, Mexico; Steelton, PA; and Exeter, PA churches were existing churches and plants that we took through the process of becoming BFC churches. It is not a question of whether we can accomplish connections with churches and church plants outside the BFC but rather how will we deal with the nuances involving connections. Here are a few of those nuances:

Churches and church plants looking to connect normally come from an independent background. How will their years of independency fit into our fellowship, standards, and requirements?

Churches and church plants looking to connect, even though they think they may be doctrinally compatible with the BFC, may have beliefs that do not totally line up with the BFC; i.e. modes of baptism, eschatology, and membership.

Churches and church plants looking to connect may have pastors who do not meet our educational requirements but are doctrinally compatible. What exceptions do we need to make to qualify these men?

Churches and church plants looking to connect may own property that will need to be considered.

Churches and church plants looking to connect may be comfortable with practicing certain things that the BFC does not have declarations on; i.e. tongues, worship styles, etc.

These areas of investigation, along with numerous other questions, are all part of connectional investigations. Currently we have connectional investigations taking place with the following churches: The Gathering Church in Millersville, PA, City Church Refuge in Milford, DE, and Grace Bible Church, Staten Island, NY. At the December, 2017 meeting of our Board, we brought Harvest Fellowship Church in Colebrookdale, PA into Church Extension as a mission church after months of working with the church to test all kinds of compatibility subjects. The common denominator in all three of these connections is that they all are independent and all have transitioned from charismatic/ Pentecostal beliefs to adopting reformed/Calvinistic doctrinal positions. Harvest even took our Articles of Faith as its doctrinal statement before we even began discussions.

We need to work at an intentional process for connectional investigations. We

encourage your church planters to always be sensitive to how the Holy Spirit is moving in their ministries. If we are sensitive to how the Holy Spirit is moving in connections, we need to jump on this movement and be aggressive with inviting more discussions with non-BFC churches.

It is important to make mention of another area of ministry that Church Extension focused on this past year: encouraging daughter church planting. The Newark, DE BFC connected with the new Chestertown, MD Mission Church and is coming alongside it in a mothering fashion. The Cedar Crest, PA BFC approved a daughter church planting project in Upper Macungie Township, PA and we are assisting them in this planting. The Oley, PA and Harrisburg, PA churches are still discussing planting daughter churches. Daughter church planting is not only biblical; it is a way to grow a denomination. Take a look at this chart:

REVIEW OF 2017 IN CHURCH EXTENSION

The BFC Mission Churches recorded 42 people making professions of faith, and the Mission Churches held 14 baptisms! All glory to God!

Financial giving from BFC churches increased; thank you very much.

Our donor list and donor giving increased. Don Skekel served fruitfully as Development Manager.

Some continuing observations:

- 1. Several churches reduced their support for Church Extension.
- 2. A number of churches are not able to give support to Church Extension Ministries.

Two Training Days were held for our men, including guest presenters Ken Klein

(speaking on financial planning) and Director David Gundrum (speaking on Values/Mission and Vision).

A Roundtable at Fellowship Community was held where the planters came together to pray and share.

Door-to-door surveys took place in several of your Mission Churches' target sites. Various publications, prayer letters and other literature were produced to assist your planters.

Work teams and individuals from various churches assisted with renovations and maintenance repairs.

In DELMARVA, Ray Bertolet serves as our Assistant Church Planter. Ray assisted the Long Neck, DE BFC, the new church plant in Chestertown, MD, Joshua Dupiche in Philadelphia, and the new connection in Milford, DE. Ray does yearly evaluations of our properties, along with doing demographic studies for new sites. Harry & Sandra Workman served faithfully as an Aquila & Priscilla Team in DELMARVA. Church Extension continued to oversee the revitalization work at the Long Neck, DE BFC. Long Neck made good progress and was released Jan. 1, 2018. We are continuing our efforts to plant churches in DELMARVA – potential sites: Elkton, MD; Denton, MD; and Selbyville, DE area.

Stephen Diaz is planting the Hispanic church, Lighthouse BFC, in South Allentown. A strong leadership team has developed and the Mission grew in 2017, with goals for relocation to further growth.

We are thankful for the Aquila & Priscilla Teams that serve the church plants. Jason & Joanne Englehart served with Carlos Rodriguez at the La Roca Mission Church. Doug & Kashie Boyd assisted at the Cape May Mission Church. Harry & Sandra Workman served in Delaware.

Joshua Dupiche is planting in Philadelphia. Joshua embarked on full-time planting.

The Cape May County Mission Church - Cape Community Church - Brad Boyer is working with potential leaders, assimilating new people, and identifying committed participants for graduation.

The Adams County Mission Church – John Hanner was called to complete the work of planting the church.

Your Hispanic Church Plants in Reading (La Roca), Allentown (El Faro), and Villa Magna (La Roca), Mexico and potential plant in Lancaster, PA – The plants are reaching Hispanic people with the Gospel. La Roca in Reading, PA, under the leadership of Carlos Rodriguez and his new elder designees, will graduate April 2018. Diego Rodriguez is assisting at the church and with the ministry center in Lancaster, The Center (El Centro). Marcos Angeles also assists Carlos. "The Center" in Lancaster held numerous outreaches, events and mercy ministries. It will be a foundation for a new Hispanic church plant in Lancaster, PA. The Villa Magna Mission Church in Mexico continues to reach people in Villa Magna under the leadership of church planter Freddy Chi. Pastor Marcos Ramírez is our church planting Director in Mexico and has started several Bible studies around Merida that he hopes will be catalysts for church planting. Elliot Ramos, Hispanic

Ministry Liaison, has been very busy with coordinating The Center in Lancaster, meeting with the Hispanic men, going to churches and chairing the Hispanic Task Force.

Daughter Church Planting: Scott Wright from the Harleysville, PA BFC, Tim Zuck from the Saucon Community, PA BFC, along with several churches from the Lehigh Valley Region, and James Reff from the Newark and Townsend, DE churches are daughter church plants. The Northern Lehigh BFC continues to grow under the leadership of Aaron Smith. The Northern Lehigh BFC is a daughter church plant from the Whitehall, PA BFC

The Chestertown, MD Mission Church is seeking to gather people under the planting effort of James Reff and his team. This is our first church in the state of Maryland.

We had numerous meetings with prospective church planters and held a number of meetings with churches seeking to connect with the BFC.

The Naples, FL Mission Church continues to develop under the leadership of church planter Jason Filbert. Jason has embarked on full-time planting.

Thirty-two churches were visited this year by the Church Extension staff. We presented the mission of Church Extension and participated in Missions Conferences along with other meetings at the churches.

Administrative Assistant Ruth Richards served this past year and has now moved to part-time Bookkeeper. Our new Administrative Assistant is Laurie Kuhns. Laurie will organize a volunteer force, assist with the church plants, give assistance to the planters, and much more.

We praise God for Church Extension's faithful volunteers, supporting churches and donors.

The Hispanic Task Force (HTF) is a sub-committee of Church Extension. It reports on the current Hispanic ministries and develops plans for expanding the Hispanic ministries of the BFC.

The Director served on the Ministerial Candidate Committee, along with coaching and meeting with various BFC pastors and BFC churches to assist them.

We held monthly and some quarterly coaching sessions with all the church planters.

We hold all-day church planters' assessments with potential church planters and their wives.



Report of the Committee on the Multi-Cultural Church

The Committee on the Multi-Cultural Church met several times during 2017 with the following purposes:

- Encouraging and fostering multi-cultural church planting by investigating multicultural church planting opportunities.
- Serving as a catalyst for local church involvement in outreach to ethnic communities around them.
- Fostering multi-cultural integration within BFC churches.
- Consulting with churches who wish to extend their witness to multi-cultural communities.
- Directing financial support towards fledgling BFC works among ethnic communities

Funds designated by churches to the Committee have been directed to the support of Church Extension's Hispanic Ministry Liaison, Elliot H. Ramos, and to El Centro, the multi-cultural church planting project in Lancaster, PA which is an initiative of the Hispanic Taskforce, a sub-committee of the CMCC.

A focus of the Committee for the past two years has been the development and testing of a handbook for local churches entitled "Welcoming Diversity." Surveys were conducted in several of our churches to get a picture of the accessibility of our existing works to ethnic groups that live around them. Results varied widely, but there was a sense that not much thought has been given to the question of aggressive integration of people of other ethnic groups into active congregational life, underlining the need for the continued work of this Committee.

The Committee on the Multi-Cultural Church would like also to encourage all the BFC Churches to reach out to the expanding number of multi-cultural people groups in their ministry target sites. Any church which desires assistance in this area is invited to contact the committee chairman, Duane E. Moyer (duane@bfcbom.org). We want to thank the BFC churches for their support.

We've had groups bring 300 teens to a "boot camp" style of retreat to invigorate them to discipleship and create excitement for the second year. We also have had a group that utilized our facilities to bring people from all over the world to gather together as one and praise and worship our Lord and Savior. We continue to try to reach groups that may not have heard about Pinebrook's ministry, and retain our relationship with groups that have used our facilities in the past in order to continue to utilize our resources here at Pinebrook.

Our <u>Retreat Within a Retreat Program</u> continues to provide groups with a work or team-building weekend while spending time in service and spiritual refreshment. We plan to revamp this program shortly to address the ever-changing RWR group needs. These groups provide us with much-needed people to help with our serving of guests. For this we praise God.

We are so encouraged that our <u>Volunteers</u> give countless hours to minister at Pinebrook. From projects like the roof replacement project to coming on our grounds to assist in the gardens, you can serve the Lord at Pinebrook through your gift. Praise the Lord for these volunteers and the encouragement they give to our staff.

We continually are looking for ways to partner the Pinebrook ministry with each individual Bible Fellowship Church. We would like to be an option for your retreat and gathering needs. We continue to strive for financial stability and to strive to be good stewards for Pinebrook's ministry. Some of the major projects, improvements, and renovations that occurred in 2017 included new roofs and improvements to both the indoor and outdoor swimming pools. The enrollment of campers and retreats for 2018 are encouraging.

2018 is the 50th anniversary for Pinebrook as a part of the Bible Fellowship Church. A special day to celebrate this occasion has been planned for Saturday, June 30, at the start of the summer family week ministries. We invite you to share this special day with us.

Finally, please continue to pray for the ministry of Pinebrook Bible Conference. Pray for our staff. Pray for continued financial stability. Pray for spiritual decisions. Pray that we continue to do "All to the Glory of God."

Report of Victory Valley Camp

Praise the Lord for another year of fruitful ministry at Victory Valley Camp. We are humbled and grateful for the opportunities that God has provided over the past year to share God's Word in God's creation with godly role models.

Winter Blast 2017

The theme for Winter Blast 2017 was "Hey Farmer! Sow that Seed!" During God and Me time and Bible lessons, campers dug into the parable of the soils that Jesus told in Luke 8. Campers were challenged to examine the soil of their hearts and be "good soil" – hearing God's Word and doing it, clinging to God even in difficult times, and bearing fruit with patience. We had a total of 194 campers over the course of four weekends. Our prayer is that campers and staff continue to study God's Word and share the gospel with their friends and family members.

Summer Camp 2017

"Don't Worry – Keep Trusting" was the theme for summer 2017 at Victory Valley Camp. God taught all of us (staff and campers) about the importance of trusting Him at all times and in all situations. We were blessed to have 942 campers come through the Valley over the summer. God provided 71 young people to serve as Summer Missionaries for at least two weeks.

Matt and Kristy Messick, BFC missionaries to Ecuador, were at VVC this summer to run our discipleship program for our Summer Missionaries. They led our staff on a journey through Hebrews 11 and taught many valuable life lessons about faith. In addition to leading Monday morning and Tuesday-Thursday afternoon Bible studies, Uncle Matt and Auntie Kristy were around to mentor and disciple staff on a one-on-one basis.

While we had our struggles throughout the summer, it was a blessing to see God at work in the hearts and lives of both campers and staff. When we as a staff seemed to be at our weakest, God showed that He works best through us when we are completely dependent upon Him. Over 30 campers made decisions for Christ this summer (26 salvation decisions, 9 children assured of their salvation, and 6 campers who rededicated their lives to Christ). Please pray that God would continue to work in the lives of the campers and staff who were at the Valley this past summer.

Facilities

Over the past few years, we have been working on upgrading and winterizing our cabins. In 2017, we began this process for the Niche cabin. Our goal is complete both Niche and Nook by June 2018. At that point, all 13 cabins will be winterized.

Construction is underway for the new dining hall and kitchen. Though more funding is still needed, God has graciously provided the funds to begin this project. On September 9, 2017 we held a groundbreaking ceremony, and the work officially began in October. The building is under contract to be completed by June 1, 2018, and we look forward to being able to use this new space this upcoming summer.

Report of the Communications Committee

- 4. Again this year, the Committee was responsible for producing the Annual Yearbook. Don Kuntzman coordinates this project.

Report of the Historical Committee

The Historical Committee meets at least two times each year to review and act on any matters relating to its work. Meetings are often pleasant affairs filled with a mixture of making decisions and sharing stories. The Committee takes its responsibilities seriously. While our history is not our future, our future grows out of our past. Knowing who we were helps us understand who we are becoming. So, maintaining the memory of what we were is not simply an exercise in nostalgia or glorifying the good old days, but rather a critical piece of our denominational identity.

Two years have passed since the denominational archives were moved from Wallingford to Whitehall. The process of unpacking and storing is not yet complete. Shelves were purchased during the year which allow not merely for unpacking but also storing in a way that makes the collection accessible. Our Whitehall church has provided a wonderful space that allows for the preservation of the various items which make up our archives

What is the future of our history? Our churches should understand that our records are slipping away. The Committee would like to encourage churches to put various records in the archives in order to preserve the account of what they have done. An interesting contemporary wrinkle to all this is that many of our minutes and records are now digital. Sooner or later, one digital format is replaced by another and digital records, while easy to store, go out of date. Churches should consider printing paper copies which can be placed in the archives for storage. Paper copies will not be replaced by a new format. It is a difficult thing to determine what records will be significant in the future. If a priority were to be expressed, it would be for the minutes of the congregation and the Board of Elders. Our denominational boards should likewise put a copy of their minutes in the archives.

The Historical Society continues to meet annually for the presentation of papers that explore various aspects of our history. Members of our denomination and others are welcome to join. In recent years, electronic membership has become a possibility. Our publications are made available through email distribution. Some, who prefer the good old days, still like to receive paper copies, which they can do through our regular memberships. For those who would like to join, you can find more information at our website, BFCHistory.org.

The Historical Society will meet this year at the Bible Fellowship Church in Harleysville, PA, on October 27, 2018. Two presentations will be offered. Richard E. Taylor will explore the various denominational publications which were circulated among us. Ronald L. Kohl will review and analyze the changing structures of leadership which we have followed.

Report of the Youth and Young Adults Committee

Over the course of 2017, The Board of Youth and Young Adults met four (4) times to conduct its business, and its three (3) sub committees met as needed.

Events Committee

This committee is charged with planning events for the gathering and building up of the Youth Ministries within the BFC. Our primary event each year is Sno-Glo, which consists of retreats that are held on three weekends each January. Our keynote speaker this year was Mike Herb, an elementary teacher in the Lebanon School District and elder at the Lebanon BFC. Report of the Ministerial Candidate Committee

The Annual Conference of 1960 appointed the first Ministerial Candidate Committee after defining its duties. As a denomination, we have always had a process by which men were approved for the ministry of the Word. The appointing of the committee was an attempt to give clarity to requirements for ministerial candidates. From the very beginning, we have had to make adaptations in the expectations for candidates. An example of that is found in our expectation for training. Originally, men were ordained with no expectation of any formal education. Eventually, we came to believe that men who enter our ministry should have formal education. The Ministerial Candidate Committee has been adapting its procedures since its formation in 1960. During the last few years, we have had to address changing circumstances. We must not allow our procedures to hinder a man who has been called by God, but we must not surrender our standards for recognition of such a man. All of this is to say that the Ministerial Candidate Committee has been reviewing our procedures to discern how to consider men who have limited formal education and who might begin their ministry as a second career.

The Committee met eight times since the last Conference and interviewed 12 men. The list of ministerial candidates includes 41 men.

 millennial reign of Christ; Sabbath principles from the Old and New Testament,
 the "ought" of Article 21 now seems to me based solely on tradition)

The Credentials Committee Makes The Following Additional Recommendations:

- 1. **Resolved**, that an Ordination Service be held at the 135th BFC Conference.
- 2. **Resolved**, that the Cape Community Church, Cape May Court House, NJ; the Calvary Bible Fellowship Church, Sinking Spring, PA; the Kutztown Bible Fellowship Church, Kutztown, PA; and the Cedar Crest Bible Fellowship Church, Allentown, PA be encouraged to have a service in recognition of the ordinations of Brad L. 511-5.3(7) Ordained Inactive Ministers. A minister who has exhausted his stay in the "Between Calls" and/or "Leave of Absence" categories will be placed in the "Ordained Inactive Ministers" category. He may remain in this category for a period not to exceed ten years, of which time spent in the "Between Calls" and/or "Leave of Absence" categories is counted. At the end of ten years he loses his credentials with the BFC. In this case, or in any situation where a man loses his credentials, if he wishes to return to active ministry within the BFC, he must reapply to the Ministerial Credentials Committee (to replace Ministerial Candidate Committee).

The Lord has faithfully provided pulpit supply and interim pastoral ministry in each of these churches. However, we beseech the BFC family to pray for God's provision of a pastor for each church according to the BFC Principles of Order.

Conference Pastor Ralph M. Soper has completed his second year of service in his ministry to our pastors. The committee is grateful for his ministry to the pastors and churches in the BFC.

The committee reminds our churches of three resource booklets: Guidelines for the Pastoral Relations Committee, Guidelines for the Pastoral Search Committee, and Guidelines for Preparing for Pastoral Retirement. Copies are available online at MyBFC. org and from our committee chairman, Byron Widger.

Pastoral Compensation Proposals

The Committee makes the following recommendation and resolution to the 135th BFC Conference:

The committee recommends that each church meet at least annually with each of its pastors to consider the adequacy of his salary package and make adjustments where necessary. The committee reminds each church of its responsibility to fulfill the terms of the pastor's call with respect to Social Security tax, parsonage and/or housing allowance, health insurance, and reimbursement for car and professional expenses. The committee recommends that the church structure the pastor's salary package to provide maximum tax advantage to him.

Resolved, that each church provide a minimum of 3% of the pastor's salary for retirement, plus an additional 1% match if the pastor is voluntarily contributing 1%.

Interim Pastor Legislation Proposal

Resolved that we amend 409-1.1 to read as follows:

(New wording in bold & underlined)

Article 409 Pastoral Change Procedure

409-1 Instituting the Pastoral Relationship

409-1.1 When a church is seeking a Pastor, the Board of Elders shall meet with representatives of the Ministerial Relations Committee to discuss the following:

Temporary pulpit supply. The Board of Elders shall provide for temporary pulpit supply on an interim basis. Pastors serving in this capacity shall be in sympathy with the F&O of the BFC. The Board of Elders may hire an Interim Pastor to provide more stability during the pastoral vacancv. If the Board of Elders decides to hire an Interim Pastor who does not Relations Committee shall approve the action after ensuring that he is in agreement with the F&O of the BFC. First Reading 131 - 20 The responsibilities and remuneration of the Interim Pastor shall be established by the Board of Elders. The term of service, whether he is BFC credentialed or not, shall be up to a year, and may be renewed on an annual basis with the approval of the Board of Elders and Ministerial Relations Committee.

Temporary pulpit supply. The Board of Elders shall provide for temporary pulpit supply on an interim basis. Pastors serving in this capacity shall be in sympathy with the F&O of the BFC. **If the** Board of Elders decides to hire an Interim Pastor who does not hold BFC credentials, the Ministerial Relations Committee shall approve and ensure that he is in agreement with the F&O hold BFC credentials, the Ministerial of the BFC. Terms of service shall be established by the Board of Elders.

Report of the Church Health Committee

The Church Health Committee increased its scheduled meeting times from quarterly to bi-monthly this past year in order to give greater priority to the care and encouragement of our local churches. With deep concern for the health and further development of each congregation, the committee has sought to be proactive rather than reactive in their ministry. Though we willingly assist churches in need, we also are seeking to affirm and encourage congregations that are doing well. We value the input of each committee member, including Steven J. DelDuco, who began serving this year, and Bryan C. McNally, who has joined us in an ex-officio capacity, plus Church Health Pastor Robert A. Sloan, Jr. and BFC Executive Director David T. Allen.

After section 511-3.4 "Conference Church Health Pastor" was adopted at second reading, Pastor Sloan began serving as Interim Pastor of Church Health. He has visited many of our congregations for both encouragement and informal evaluation. He has met with pastors of churches in need as well as churches that are healthy and growing, seeking to provide both with affirmation and support in the work. In our bi-monthly meetings Pastor Sloan shared his observations, suggestions, and input with the rest of the Committee, and in several instances has provided a framework for further assistance. His part-time ministry of 5+ days each month has already been of great value.

While Pastor Sloan, David T. Allen, and the Committee have seen significant progress and are moving forward with our work, we also recognize that there is need for the Church Health Committee to coordinate efforts with the Executive Board, Executive Director, the Ministerial Relations Committee, and at times with the Credentials Committee and Conference Pastor in order to accomplish our goals. We appreciate the excellent working relationship we have with these Bible Fellowship Church leaders and seek to develop that relationship even further in the year ahead. In addition, we recognize the value that other churches in a given region can and should have on churches and pastors in need, and encourage sister churches in each region to "come alongside to help" when the need arises.

On March 25 and again on April 24 the Committee presented workshops on "The Marks of a Healthy Bible Fellowship Church." More than half of our churches were represented at one or both of these seminars. Those who attended found the sessions to be helpful, encouraging, and affirming. Committee members interacted with the pastors and delegates in small groups, and time was set aside for prayer for each congregation. The "Marks of a Healthy Bible Fellowship Church" document was tweaked a bit based on the input of those who attended, and the finished product is now posted on www.MyBFC.org. All pastors, delegates, and local boards of elders are asked to review these materials and use them as an evaluative tool for their congregations.

During 2017 each of the Church Health Committee members sought to make individual contact with the head delegate from each and every congregation. Delegates gave us valuable input about the status of each congregation in addition to the ongoing contact we have with our pastors. It was of great encouragement to hear how many of our churches are doing well and to hear the expressions of appreciation elders have for their pastors. In some cases the committee was made aware of concerns that need to be

addressed. One of our goals in 2018 is to assist these congregations in need.

Currently Pastor Steven J. DelDuco is assisting the Steelton church as it works its way through its current transition in pastoral and lay leadership. David T. Allen is assisting the Howell Church in a similar manner. We have asked David N. Schoen and Robert A. Sloan, Jr. to assist Pastors Robert A. Johnson II and John C. Vandegriff, Jr. in strengthening and developing the Lehighton Church. We believe that these churches and their pastors will be encouraged and supported by other BFC pastors who step in to help. While never wanting to overstep our bounds, we never want a pastor or church to feel that they are alone in transition or struggles. The Church Health Committee will be there to help.

While we are developing additional resources to provide for our local churches, we urge all congregations to consider the following currently available resources:

This document can be found at www.MyBFC.org, along with questions for self-evaluation on the local level. If after reviewing this material church leaders desire further input, please contact the Church Health Committee and we will gladly provide assistance.

- 3. Many of our churches have appreciated the evaluation of Natural Church Development. Go to www.NCDChurchSurvey.org for more information. Though the cost for a full survey is minimal, if that stands in the way of participating, contact the Church Health Committee and we will gladly provide the resources necessary to do this evaluation. When churches do participate in the NCD survey, please assist us as a committee and denomination by sending a copy of the results to the chairman or secretary of the Church Health Committee.

Report of the Committee to Examine 134th BFC Conference Minutes

The purpose of the Committee to Examine Conference Minutes is to "certify that the *Yearbook* is an accurate account of the proceedings of *BFC* Conference" (§511-2.2). Since the Conference no longer distributes and reads a majority of the minutes when it is in session, the Committee welcomes the opportunity to present its report near the beginning of the next Conference so that any inaccuracies from the minutes of the last conference can be corrected and the minutes certified.

In the case of the 2017 *Yearbook*, we found several problems, including legislation that was missing. Interestingly enough, the said legislation, which is up for Second Reading at the 135th annual meeting and enclosed in our report, did appear in the minutes which were online. This might present a conundrum in this digital age. Although it is great to have multiple versions of the minutes—digital copy, *Yearbook*, and video of the proceedings—which, then, do we hold as the official version? The present ruling reads: (§511-2.2) (7) "It shall submit to *BFC* Conference two corrected copies of the *Yearbook* certified to contain an accurate account of the proceedings of the previous *BFC* Conference. These copies shall be placed in the *BFC* Archives." The Committee is making no recommendation for change.

The limitation on this Committee is reserved for just the conference minutes, but it has taken the liberty in the past to review the entire *Yearbook*. It does not have the facility to check the accuracies of the Directories and has refrained from noting errors. It has observed in the 2017 *Yearbook*, however, that some of the churches are not in alphabetical order listed by their town or city as has been the standard in the past.

The Committee also noted an anomaly in the Roll Call. In the past, when a church was without a pastor, the word in brackets "[vacant]" appeared. That was not the case in the 2017 *Yearbook*, leaving some to wonder if the delegate listed was the pastor. Plus, alternate delegates were sometimes listed along with the delegate. This may cause one to ponder if a given church had seated both its delegate and alternate at the same time and if this violates §401-7, which delineates the amount of representation each particular church is permitted based on membership. Both of these inaccuracies are listed below.

The Committee has an intimate understanding of the challenge the *Yearbook* staff faces with all that happens often in such rapid–fire fashion. It is glad to be a safeguard in case something is missed or misrepresented. The Committee wishes to thank Thomas P. Shorb for catching the oversight of the aforementioned legislation. He has been a stalwart over the years, meticulously pouring over the minutes to make sure all is well.

Article 103-5

Divorce 103-5.1

Divorce is the breaking of the marriage covenant instituted and ordained of God. God hates it because it is inconsistent with His purpose1 and creates problems for all those associated with it. (Delete: It is not permitted for any reason other than adultery,2 and should be considered only after careful and prayerful attempts for forgiveness and

reconciliation.3 Scripture permits but never requires that a person divorce a marriage partner who has committed adultery.4)

103-5.2 Divorce may only be initiated after a partner has committed adultery.2 In case of adultery, divorce should be considered only after careful and prayerful attempts for forgiveness and reconciliation.3 Scripture permits but never requires divorce in this instance.4 In the case of adultery, the Lord places the guilt of the divorce on the unfaithful spouse even if the innocent spouse initiates the divorce.

103-5.3 In the event that an unbelieving spouse initiates divorce against the innocent believing spouse, the recipient of the divorce is not guilty for the sin of divorce, but rather the initiator is. The believer in this case is not enslaved to the bonds of the marriage and may remarry.5

103-5.4 People divorced for reasons other than that allowed by Scripture ought not marry another, but be reconciled, and seek God's resolution for the breakdown of the marriage.6 Divorced persons must seek forgiveness for any sin that **may have** led to, or is associated with, their divorce. They should seek the grace of God for their spiritual growth and healing.7

Renumber existing 103-5.3 to be 103-5.5

Renumber existing 103-5.4 to be 103-5.6

103-5.7 The church should counsel those considering divorce to seek other solutions to the problems in their relationships. There are times when a church is called upon to exercise discipline towards those who are seeking or who have obtained a divorce. There are also times when a church is called upon to exercise discipline towards those who are seeking to remarry, or who have already remarried. Remarriage is permissible for those who **are divorced due to adultery, believers divorced by their unbelieving spouse**, (delete: *have been legitimately divorced*) or whose return to the former partner is determined by the elders, as they study the Scriptures, to be impossible.12 Individuals involved in these circumstances must submit themselves to the Word of God in their present situation.13

Report of the Committee to Examine Minutes of Particular Churches

The Committee on Examination of Minutes of Particular Churches met on Thursday, February 15, 2018 at Terre Hill Bible Fellowship Church, Terre Hill, PA.

The minutes of Particular Churches that were sent were examined on the basis of the suggested format for congregational meetings as stated in the Principles of Order of the Bible Fellowship Church in Article 403-3 and 403-4.

The Committee communicated with every church, reminding the pastor to send a copy of the minutes of all congregational meetings, which shall include the Board of Elders' Report and a report on their membership and their annual financial report, no later than February 5, 2018, to:

Committee on the Examination of Minutes of Particular Churches,

The Committee greatly appreciates the churches using the checklist that was sent with the letter to the churches. We are finding that many churches are sending the checklist along with their minutes so that it is much easier to examine the minutes to find the necessary information. In fact, many churches are sending the requested documentation in exactly the precise order found on the checklist. This year, as for many years in the past, the committee found two reports lacking in many of the minutes that were submitted. Quite a few churches didn't have a pastoral relations committee meeting in the past year. Also lacking were reports of audits of the books of the church or any evidence of financial review. This is important so that people can see that we are above reproach. That is why these reports are needed.

This year, we had 28 churches submit their reports before the meeting, and a few others contacted the Chairman with the reasons why their reports would be late. It is important that the reports arrive in good time so that the committee can report to the numerous committees that they need to report their results to as well.

The Committee would like to remind everyone that all minutes pertaining to the previous year after BFC Conference, plus the minutes that contain elections, the proposed budget for the upcoming year, etc., need to be at the designated address by early February so that we can meet before the date that reports are due to the Executive Committee.

This year there were no petitions from any of those congregations who submitted their reports for BFC Conference to consider.

Report of the Study Committee on Prayer

The 134th BFC Conference adopted at first reading the new Biblical Principle for Living on Prayer. In the time since Conference, the committee interacted with the questions and comments that were made from the floor last year and made a couple of minor changes. Those changes are noted in **bold**.

Resolved, that the attached article be included in the BFC BPLs as Second Reading,

Resolved, that 202-1.2 be revised as follows as Second Reading (addition in **bold**):

202-1.2 A Particular Church consists of professing believers voluntarily associated in submission to the Holy Scriptures, for divine worship, **corporate prayer**, godly living, and evangelism. The Particular Churches seek to demonstrate their participation in the church universal by forming unions with other Particular Churches that have a similar understanding of doctrine and organization.

Resolved, that 204-2.3, the section on Personal Qualifications (1) be revised as follows as Second Reading (addition in **bold**):

(1) The minister must have a love for the study of Scripture **and be devoted to prayer** inasmuch as his primary function is to be pastor-teacher.

Prayer

- **101-2.1** Prayer is a drawing near in our hearts to the living and triune God.¹ In prayer we express our praise² and thanksgiving³ to our sovereign God. We confess our sin⁴ and ask Him to give to us what we need and desire⁵ according to His will.
- 101-2.2 Prayer is the natural way that the child of God communicates with his heavenly Father.⁶ This relationship was formed because of the death and resurrection of Christ, by whom we have bold access to the Father.⁷ Without this union in Christ, we could never hope to speak to and be heard by the sovereign God of the universe.⁸ The believer's prayer, offered in the name of Jesus,⁹ by the power of the Holy Spirit,¹⁰ is a means of receiving the promises of God's Word.¹¹ While God may hear the prayer of an unbeliever,¹² the unbeliever has no assurance or guarantee that the Lord will answer his prayer, as does the child of God."
- **101-2.3** The Scriptures give much instruction on prayer. Jesus Himself **demonstrated the need for** prayer in his earthly **life and** ministry and taught **The Lord taught** His disciples a model prayer. ¹² In the model prayer Jesus revealed that the believer is privileged to address God as Father. Jesus taught that we should pray for God's name

to be seen as holy. Jesus emphasized praying about the plan of God in the world. Jesus instructed believers to pray that their daily, physical needs would be met. Jesus also instructed believers to pray that our sins be forgiven, temptation be avoided and the evil one be resisted.¹³

- **101-2.4** Prayer that is acceptable to God is not so much the right words but the right heart. This includes freedom from known sin, is an unforgiving spirit, if and selfish desires. Acceptable prayer includes asking in faith with an attitude of never giving up. Right prayer is both powerful and effective. Provided the right words but the right heart. Figure 1.
- **101-2.5** God's people are encouraged to come together to pray.²¹ In the Old Testament, the assembling of Israel for prayer was for dedication, ²² worship, ²³ confession, ²⁴ and for petition in time of great need and crisis.²⁵ In Acts, the Church came together corporately for times of devoted prayer.²⁶ Therefore, the local church ought to gather together to worship the Lord in prayer, ²⁷ to seek God's guidance, ²⁸ to ask God's protection in times of persecution, ²⁹ to pray for one another, and to pray for openness to the gospel.³⁰
- **101-2.6** The practice of fasting in Scripture is often associated with prayer. To fast is to voluntarily abstain from food,³¹ or from anything else that is legitimate in and of itself,³² for the purpose of spending more time and intensity in prayer and worship.³³ Fasting is a statement that we want our appetite for God to be greater than our physical appetites. The reasons that may prompt us to fast include a personal or national crisis,³⁴ a sense of contrition and repentance over sin,³⁵ and a desire to seek the Lord and His help.³⁶ The New Testament does not require believers to fast, but in His teachings, Jesus expects that they will fast.³⁷ The early church practiced corporate fasting at times.³⁸
- **101-2.7** God hears and responds to the prayers of the righteous.³⁹ God often responds differently than we ask,⁴⁰ but always according to His perfect plan and will.⁴¹ Our joyful responsibility is to submit to His answers and trust His grace. Prayers that magnify the name of God, glorify Him, and seek to fulfill His purposes in this world,⁴² are prayers that He answers according to His timing for His glory and our good.⁴³ While God is fully capable of accomplishing these purposes on His own, He chooses to use the prayers of His children to fulfill them.

Report of the Day of Prayer Committee

At the time of this report (Feb. 15, 2018), the inaugural BFC Day of Prayer had yet to take place, but with 91 church leaders already pre-registered, the committee is anticipating an attendance of well over 200. Michael W. Walker and Richard B. Ravis plan to lead the morning prayer session, "Fresh Encounter," from 10 a.m.—noon, with Clifford B. Boone facilitating the afternoon "Prayer Summit" from 1–4 p.m. The committee has high expectations that, as we seek the Lord's face, our souls will be refreshed, our faith strengthened, and our joy made full.

Proposal for the Purpose, Composition & Election, Duties of Committee, and Duties of the Officers

Resolved, that the following legislation be received as the Purpose, Composition & Election, Duties of Committee, and Duties of the Officers for the Day of Prayer Committee, and be it further

Resolved, that the following legislation be included in Part IV "Resources" in the Principles of Order of the Bible Fellowship Church.

BFC Day of Prayer

Purpose

- 1. To provide an annual day of prayer for the BFC
- 2. To cultivate a culture of prayer within the BFC
- To serve as an annual declaration of the BFC's dependence upon God and desire to seek God's face
- 4. To model how to lead people in public and corporate prayer

Composition and Election

- 1. The Day of Prayer Committee shall be composed of three ministers and four laypersons. Laypersons must be members in good standing at a BFC church.
- The committee shall elect its own members, subject to the ratification of the BFC Executive Board.
- 3. No member of the committee may be elected to consecutive terms.
- 4. The members of the committee shall be elected for a term of three years in classes as follows:

- Class I One minister & two lay persons
- Class II One minister & one lay person
- Class III One minister & one lay person
- 5. The committee shall organize itself at the call of the chairman of the previous year, at which time new officers shall be elected.

Duties of the Committee

- 1. It shall plan and conduct an annual Day of Prayer
- 2. It shall provide publicity and arrange registration for the Day of Prayer
- 3. It shall receive and disburse funds for the Day of Prayer.
- It shall conduct an annual business meeting during the BFC Conference for the election of committee members and to schedule the first meeting for the new year.
- 5. It shall provide an annual report on the Day of Prayer to BFC Conference.
- 6. It shall elect officers by and from the committee.

Duties of Officers

Chairman

- 1. Must be a pastor or elder in a BFC church.
- He shall convene and preside over all meetings of the Day of Prayer Committee.

Secretary

- 1. (S)He shall keep an accurate record of all meetings of the committee.
- 2. (S)He shall conduct all correspondence for the committee.
- 3. (S)He shall prepare an annual report for BFC Conference.

Treasurer

- 1. (S)He shall be in charge of registration for the Day of Prayer.
- 2. (S)He shall see that all expenses are paid.
- 3. (S)He shall provide a financial report for the Day of Prayer Committee.

Whereas The Bible Fellowship Church holds the highest and most reverent view of the Holy Scriptures as the living and active word of God... and...

Whereas The church universal, including the evangelical church at large, has progressively minimized and abandoned the ministry of the clear preaching of the word of God... and...

Whereas The Bible Fellowship Church seeks to be distinct in Biblical fidelity and ministerial faithfulness and

Whereas The Church Health Committee of the Bible Fellowship Church has officially included expositional preaching of the Scriptures in the marks of a healthy Bible Fellowship Church...and...

Whereas The Articles of Faith of the Bible Fellowship Church do not explicitly proclaim our belief in the high value of expositional preaching of the word of God,...

Therefore, Be It Resolved That Article 18-5 be included in the Bible Fellowship Articles of Faith in order to clearly communicate our belief in the priority of expositional preaching in the church.

- 18-5 The preaching of the word of God¹³ is the primary means God has ordained for the salvation, ¹⁴ sanctification, ¹⁵ and equipping ¹⁶ of His people. Thus, expositional preaching ¹⁷ of Scripture, particularly as a means of congregational worship, should be given priority among all the ministries of the church.
- ¹³ 2 preach the word; be ready in season and out of season; reprove, rebuke, and exhort, with complete patience and teaching.(2 Tim. 4:2); he said to them, "I must preach the good news of the kingdom of God to the other towns as well; for I was sent for this purpose." (Luke 4:43); 17 For Christ did not send me to baptize but to preach the gospel, and not with words of eloquent wisdom, lest the cross of Christ be emptied of its power.
